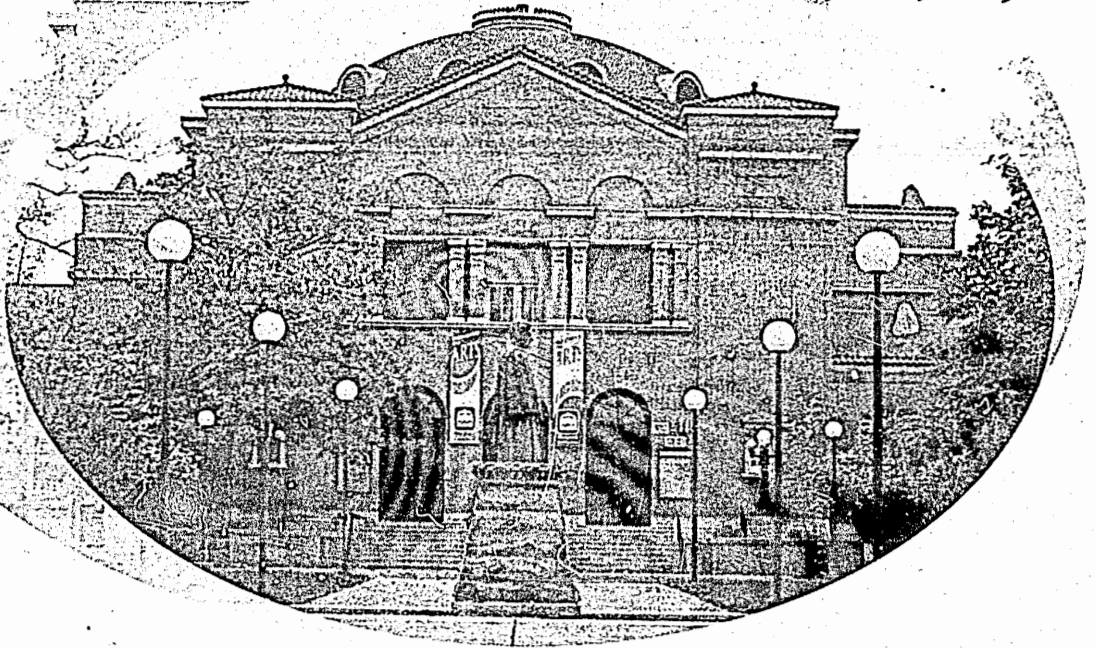

Students pursue alternative job routes

REWARDING: Graduates find careers in service groups and military.

Following graduation, some students choose the 9-to-5 route, while others, such as Jennifer Nguyen, explore the options available to them.

When Nguyen graduated from SIUC in 1993 with a bachelor's degree in biological sciences, she was considering a career in teaching. Then she discovered a way to find out if that career choice was indeed the right one for her.

Nguyen saw an article in Mademoiselle magazine about the AmeriCorps volunteer program's opportunities in education. She decided to join.

"I thought it was cool because you get a stipend and a scholarship," she said. "I wanted to make sure I wanted to teach and get certified."

AmeriCorps is a part of President Bill Clinton's national service initiative, which is administered through state governments.

Volunteers of AmeriCorps work to meet the state's education, public safety, human and environmental needs.

"It's known as the domestic Peace Corps," said Kathy Lorentz, coordinator of Student Development.

There are full- and part-time positions in AmeriCorps. Members are responsible for

completing 900 to 1,700 hours of training and service. They also receive a living allowance of \$4,415 per year and an educational award of \$2,362.50 per year.

During her service in AmeriCorps, Nguyen worked with at-risk seventh-graders as a tutor and mentor. The experience she had in AmeriCorps confirmed to her that she should continue her education and be certified in teaching.

"The most rewarding thing is the impact you have on the kids," she said. "This school year I'm getting into a teaching program in California where I will get certified and be paid for it."

The Peace Corps is another option open to students who do not want to pursue traditional employment.

Peace Corps members serve in more than

90 countries and in a variety of fields for a two years or longer.

To be eligible to serve in the Peace Corps, an applicant must be a United States citizen at least 18 years of age. Volunteers train for eight to 12 weeks before going on assignment.

After completing their service, volunteers receive a re-adjustment allowance of \$5,400 and job-hunting assistance. More than 50 institutions award scholarships and assistantships for returning volunteers.

While there used to be a Peace Corps group on campus, there is no longer a Peace Corps office in Carbondale. However, interested students can contact Kathy Lorentz in Student Development for information on how

Grace periods allow extra time for loan repayments

Graduation brings images of freedom, interesting careers and new beginnings for many students — but it also means repaying multiple student loans.

Eric Weems, assistant director of the SIUC Financial Aid Office, said the key to repaying student loans is constant communication with the loan holder.

"If I was going to give students advice about loans, I would tell them not to be shy towards the loan holder," Weems said. "If you have questions, ask them. If you go into default, it can really hurt you."

Students have a six-month "grace period"

in which to find a stable career so they may begin paying back student loans. After this time, students either can begin payments or apply for deferment or forbearance.

Julie Allard, senior loan officer at the SIUC Credit Union, said students often do not understand the difference between deferment and forbearance.

"Deferment is an option where the student does not have to make loan payments for a specified amount of time," Allard said. "The federal government will pay the loan holder the interest over this time. Forbearance is where the student does not have to make the principle payments, but the interest is still their responsibility."

Interest on all federal loans is variable, changing annually every July 1. The average student has 10 years to repay student loans, but because of multiple repayment options, this can be extended up to 25 years.

According to Illinois Student Assistance Commission documents, the average student

in 1995 had \$10,146 worth of student loans, "which rose 15 percent to \$11,668 in 1996."

According to SIUC Financial Aid documents, there are many categories of deferments. Deferments can be granted for returning to school on "at least a half-time basis, becoming disabled, caring for a newborn child or experiencing economic hardship."

Consolidation of loans is an option for students who have multiple loans and cannot afford separate payments to each loan holder. Consolidating loans simplifies multiple payments into a single manageable loan payment. Although consolidated loan holders have smaller payments, they will incur more interest over longer time periods of repayment.

Weems said the addition of the Direct Loan Program to SIUC in 1995 simplifies loan repayment for exiting students.

"The Direct Loan Program offers the same loans, but the holder has changed," Weems said. "Your loan is sent directly to SIUC and credited to your account. Before, students had

to go to the Bursar, pick up a check and then deposit it into their accounts."

Under the Direct Loan Program, Weems said, students find it is easier to contact the loan holder in case of problems.

"Unless you were very diligent, it was not hard to lose track of the loan in years past," Weems said. Now you can call SIUC, and there is a phone number we can give you for help. Loan holders will always try to work with students, but you have to make sure you ask for that help."

Above all, loan officers say, exiting students should realize the importance of repaying loans.

Allard said the result of choosing not to repay loans or failing to make payments could result in serious consequences.

"Going into default can result in damaging your credit record, getting your wages garnished, not being able to receive other financial aid and also not being able to be licensed by the state for certain jobs," she said.



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Making employers take notice

A resume is the first chance an employer has to see what a graduating senior can offer to a company, and first impressions can be lasting ones.

If a resume appears poorly constructed, then several experts agree that the employer's initial perception of an individual will be just as poor.

Karen Benz, a University Career Services specialist, said employers typically look at a resume for about 60 seconds, so it is important to make the resume clear and easy to read.

"Keep sentences and paragraphs short," she said. "Use one type face and good, quality paper."

As a designer, James Kelly, an associate professor in journalism, said that using good paper often can make a resume stand out.

"I would try to impress them with quality," he said. "I would do that by using very good quality paper with a watermark, and the best quality laser printing I could get. I would put a cover letter on matching paper."

Kelly said copy shops and office supply stores will be able supply pure-white paper

that is ideal for resumes. He said using heavy black on white paper is the ideal way to design a resume.

Employers such as Glenn Edwards, regional director of human resources for the Pepsi Cola Bottling Company in Marion, said unusually designed resumes seldom attract

much attention.

"Design has got some impact, but there hasn't been any design that has put a person in or out," he said. "In general, I look for content about education, and I look at extracurricular activities in school."

Edwards said he looks at more than 500 resumes a year, and the most important thing he considers in reading each resume is how involved the person is outside the classroom.

He said he will not rule anyone out based on

errors in grammar or misspellings in a resume, but it takes away from the person's overall excellence if such mistakes are present.

But avoiding grammar mistakes does not guarantee an interview. Benz said a strong statement about an individual's career goals within the resume can go a long way toward getting a desired interview.

"Your career objective is the most important part and each section (of the resume) should be related to it," she said. "At the top of the resume put the career objective followed by education, honors and activities."

She said that using concise language and action words to describe a person's abilities and accomplishments help to write strong career objectives.

While a career goal and extra activities need to be included, Benz said a graduating senior's grade point average should have a prominent place on a resume only if it is higher than a 3.0.

As a last piece of advice for graduating seniors, Benz said it helps to list job experiences that show new graduates can stick with a job and advance.

"List all experiences a person has that pertain to the job being considered," she said. "Employers are not looking for obvious duties, but what skills were acquired and you how you list them. They are looking for a person who takes on increasing responsibility and stayed with it (the job)."

Resume Dos & Don'ts

Do

- Spend time listing all your good qualities. This is where you get credit where credit's due
- Include a job objective, clearly and concisely focus your resume on your future objective to show the employer "where I am going" not "where I have been" or "where I am now"
- Include experience and skills directly related to the job objective
- Start each sentence with an action word
- List all related experience, paid or unpaid, including experience from school activities and committees such as organizing fund raising events, sorority and fraternity treasurer or social chairperson, etc.
- Research the position and company before the interview
- Keep your resume down to one or two pages
- Follow-up the interview with a personalized thank you letter

Don't

- Leave out the objective
- Include material or history not related to the job objective
- Use long, repetitive explanations
- Include personal history
- Presume that the "personal scanner" understands skills included in job titles - tailor your job description
- Take for granted skills that you perform well as a matter of course
- Replace a job description with a job title - it's not self explanatory. A manager at one company may not do the same activities as a manager in another company.
- Forget to include you GPA under education, if it is a 2.5 or higher
- List references from whom you have not received permission or a positive response
- Send a "form" thank you letter, personalize each one

to apply.

But if a graduate does not wish to participate in volunteer programs, the military is another consideration for those who shrink at the thought of a routine job.

Staff Sgt. David J. Smith, of the U.S. Army's recruiting office at 807 S. Illinois Ave., said a graduate can obtain entry-level positions in the Army as an E-4 specialist or a corporal with a bachelor's degree.

"Those positions are what we call our bottom of management level," Smith said. "It's sort of like starting as an assistant manager at McDonald's. E-4 is almost the bottom of the

enlisted ranks."

A single college graduate starting at the E-4 level makes \$1,115 per month, while a married graduate makes \$1,500 per month.

Smith said U.S. Army recruiters look for people who display certain character qualities.

"We look for people with good qualifications, a decent education, a good background," Smith said. "We don't want drugies or convicts. We want people with good, moral standing."

Benefits for U.S. Army recruits include up to \$65,000 during three years to help repay student loans.

Other benefits include full medical and dental coverage, free lodging, food and clothing, \$200,000 in life insurance, 30 days paid vacation and unlimited sick days.

Cash bonuses range from \$1,000 to \$12,000, depending on the job the recruit chooses after training. The length of employment for those jobs varies.

"Terms last from a minimum of two years or a maximum of six years depending on the job, or on the person and what he or she wants to do," Smith said.

There are more than 210 positions, but some are not always open. Applicants can choose their jobs from a list of positions based on their test results.

Some of the positions available in the military include civil service specialist, broadcast journalist, psychological operations specialist, computers, medical and legal specialists, finance, accounting and aviation.

Smith said if the graduate does not like

any of the jobs, the recruit does not have to join.

"A lot of people think you are committed the moment you walk into a recruiting station," Smith said. "A lot of people walk by and they are afraid to look in, afraid to turn their heads because they think we'll recruit them. You're not committed until you pick a job and swear in."

Smith said many graduates do not consider all of the alternative options to regular jobs that are available to them, including options in the U.S. Army. He said graduates could be missing the opportunity to gain valuable experience and benefits.

"For instance, a lot of people really don't know what the Army's all about or what they can do," he said. "When they find out, 50 percent of them really like it."

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Internships help students find a place in real world

Although Hamilton Arendsen was seeking a paid internship upon graduation, he decided to find a job for the summer and further his education.

As commencement ceremonies approach, Arendsen, who will receive a bachelor of arts degree in political science, is considering all

his options before setting foot into the real world. Because he could not find a paid internship, he plans to work and pay his way through law school.

"If I could find an internship with a political official or organization that would compensate my living expenses I would take it," Arendsen said.

After interning for U.S. Sen. Russell Feingold, D-Wis., last summer, Arendsen made contacts with other political officials and expected to find a paid internship in his hometown of Spring Green, Wis. Without a paid internship, he would not be able to pay for his living expenses or law school.

"Anytime you can find an internship in your chosen career field, I think it's a positive situation," Arendsen said. "But I really need a job, because I'm going to grad school."

Karen Benz, University Career Services specialist, said it is best for students to fulfill internships during their sophomore and junior years so contacts can be made.

Although Career Services provides internship information to juniors, and not graduating seniors, it can be helpful for students who are undecided about future career

plans.

"It can only help in possibly getting a job after completing an internship with an employer," Benz said. "If a person is promised a job upon completion of an internship, it will not be a disadvantage."

After interning for political officials such as U.S. Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., and Attorney General Jim Doyle, Arendsen said he then knew he wanted to work in politics.

Getting an internship is the best way to gain hands-on experience and make contacts with the right people, he said.

"Not only do you make contacts and friends, but you learn the proce-

dures and duties you'll be responsible to carry out in your future career," he said.

While most companies fill internships with junior-level students, Neiman Marcus department store in St. Louis makes it a priority to fill internship positions with college graduates. Being fresh out of college is not good enough for a full-time position at the department store, said Murray Foster, the store's assistant manager of human resources.

Foster said before jumping into a career, a person needs exposure to the key areas of his or her chosen career field. Interns are taken very seriously because they are responsible for part of the business.

"We do not hire managers as college graduates for job positions,"

Foster said.

"The intern process is a learning and training ground for manage-

Arendsen said this late in this semester, he still is considering an internship.

If an internship comes along before he accepts a summer job, he will take it as long as it is a paid position.

"I always try to leave my options open," Arendsen said.

"For anyone who can't find a job in their chosen career field, an internship can provide valuable experience."

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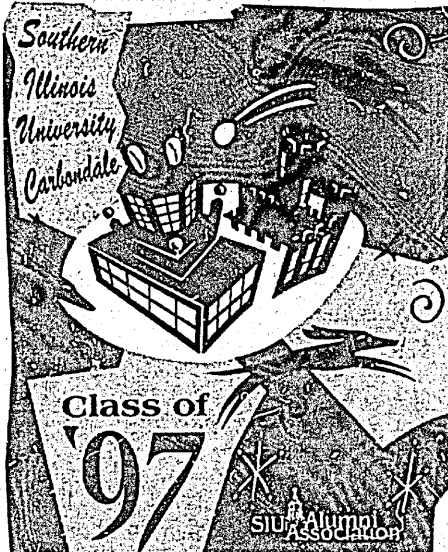
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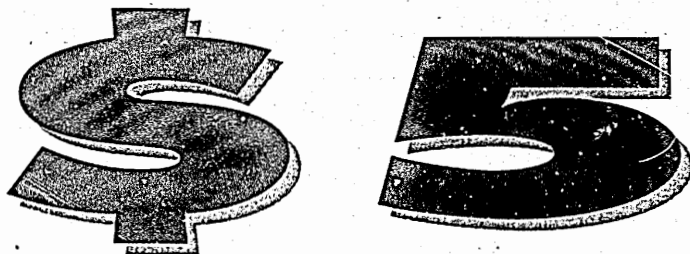

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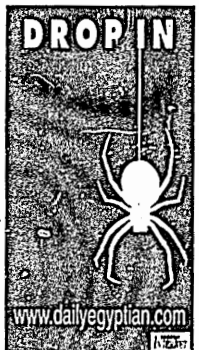

Grads find deals on wheels

START YOUR ENGINES: Dealerships offer recent college graduates rebates, special financing.

The American dream: a house, a car, a family, a great paying job. And while local car dealers are not likely to help college graduates achieve most of these goals, they may be able to help get them on the road to success with special deals on new cars.

Monty Smith, a sales manager for Vogler Ford, 1170 E. Main St., said a College Graduate Program offered by Ford and Mercury gives graduates a special opportunity.

"It's an additional \$400 rebate above and beyond any other rebates that may exist. It's for graduates of a four-year college, or a junior college, or a trade school, and some graduate students may qualify as well," he said. "Also anyone who's going to graduate during this calendar year is eligible for an early rebate. All they need is a letter from their department saying they are going to graduate."

Smith said the rebate is not the only incentive offered. He said special financing also is available through the program.

"There are more generous financing terms, lower down payments, and the credit history requirements are lower," he said. "You don't have to have much credit history, as long as you are employed and don't have a bad credit history."

While many graduating seniors qualify, Smith said 40 to 50 of them take advantage of the program annually.

He also said the models purchased do not generally vary a great deal.

"It's a relatively common thing, but not nearly as many people take advantage of this as qualify," he said. "We usually see it with the car line, mostly Escorts and Mustangs, but Ford Rangers are popular, too."

Smith said the program often

"Cavaliers, S-10s, Geo Metros — they're looking for the less expensive cars," he said.

Bruce Wallace, a sales manager at Wallace Chrysler-Plymouth-Mazda, 303 E. Main St., said Plymouth also offers a \$400 rebate incentive to graduates, but Mazda does not.

"Chrysler has a first-time-college-graduate buyer program," he said. "It's offered in addition to any other rebates."

Wallace said that students who purchase vehicles from Wallace also tend to purchase the less expensive vehicles.

"They are usually buying the entry-level cars," he said. "The Plymouth Neon, the Plymouth Breeze — they're the least expensive cars, and students getting out of college don't usually have a bunch of money."

While most students probably will not have trouble picking out a car of their dreams, finding a car they can afford and paying for the insurance for that vehicle is another consideration altogether.

Loren Mason, an agent of State Farm Insurance, 600 Eastgate Drive, said that while insuring certain vehicles can be expensive, there are logical keys to buying a vehicle that can be insured at a reasonable cost.

"Buy the oldest car you can with the least mileage — that's the best insurance bargain," she said. "Whether your car has 150,000 miles, or 35,000 miles, you're going to pay the same premium for the same vehicle."

For students who are not picky as to what kind of car they buy, Mason offered advice on how to get the absolute cheapest insurance.

"Buy an old bomb, and insure it with liability only," she said.

allows graduates who would not otherwise be able to purchase a vehicle to get on the road.

"We've found that quite often it (the rebate) serves as all the down payment that is needed," he said. "So they are able to buy when they otherwise would not be able to."

Ford and Mercury are not the only companies that offer graduates special deals.

Steve Koenig, general sales manager for Vic Koenig Chevrolet-Geo, 1040 E. Main St., said General Motors offers a similar program featuring a \$400 rebate and some special financing on select models.

The program is an incentive offered on less expensive models rather than the luxury vehicles, but Koenig said those are the vehicles graduates are looking for anyway.

Alumni Association helps students maintain ties

More than 185,000 members in 121 different countries share the benefits of the SIU Alumni Association, an association official says.

Sheri House, assistant director for member services of the SIU Alumni Association, said membership in the Alumni Association allows graduates to maintain their ties with the University.

"As time progresses, graduates of school reflect more fondly on their school experience," she said. "What we do is make them feel that the University is still here for them."

She said graduates who join the association receive *Alumnus* magazine, which updates graduates on events at SIU and news from alumni worldwide.

Greg Scott, assistant director of public relations for the SIU Alumni Association, said the association helps graduates obtain jobs by helping them contact other alumni.

"It's important for students to know what the Alumni Association does before they join," Scott said. "We keep

graduates in touch with their alma mater, and let them know that their ties with the University doesn't have to end after graduation."

Scott said the association, which has been operating for more than 101 years, provides social and career networking opportunities at alumni events across the country.

Scott said that after alumni join the association, they also will receive discounts at the University Bookstore, local hotels and motels, car rental businesses and local restaurants.

He said the Alumni Association is not restricted to graduates. Undergraduates also can join and participate in association activities. He said about 30 undergraduates are members this year.

House said membership dues support scholarships, student recruitment, Morris Library, and the Externship Program. That program allows students to train and get hands-on experience in the career field they plan to enter. She said about 185 students participated in the program this year.

She said about 400 graduating seniors joined the association this year.

Graduates interested in joining the SIU Alumni Association should fill out an application, pay \$15 for the first year and \$30 for every subsequent year. Lifetime memberships cost \$400.

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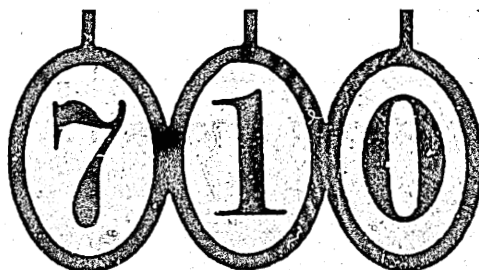
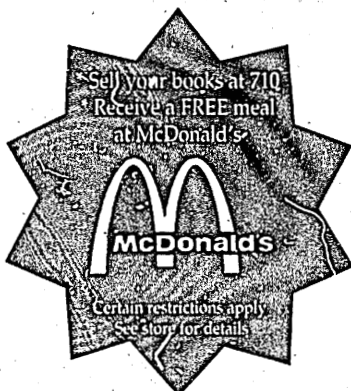

Graduates head into rosy job market

CAREER PLACEMENT:

Recruitment is up as companies try to fill entry-level positions.

SIUC graduates are entering a more favorable job market than in past years, a career specialist says.

James E. Seales, University Career Services director, said the market for entry-level positions is stronger than in past years.

"We went through several years of corporate downsizing," he said. "Now that it has run its course, most of the corporations and educational institutions have a feel for how much money they have to hire on the entry level. So they are starting to open up those positions."

He said the areas of business, engineering and education have been strong in job placement and

are expected to remain strong next year.

According to a survey by the National Association of College and Employers, employers planned to visit 8.6 percent more college campuses nationwide and to hire 17 percent more new college graduates than last year.

A salary survey conducted by the same group showed that the number of recruiters on college campuses has increased 26.6 percent.

Karen Benz, a career service specialist for the College of Business, said recruitment of graduates has increased this year.

"Recruiting for us has been up about 12 percent overall," she said. "We had 55 companies on campus this fall to interview our students and 78 this spring."

Judy Eaton, a career service specialist for the College of Engineering, said recruitment has been excellent this year.

"It's been a record year," she

said. "I think I've sent over 4,000 resumes out, and over 200 companies with vacancies have come to SIUC."

Eaton said companies including McDonnell Douglas Corp. and Intel have recruited students from SIUC.

Eaton said students who prepare to find a job should avoid problems. "If students go about their search systematically, they should be able to find a job with little problem," she said.

Seales said although engineering, education and business majors will remain strong, there are opportunities in other areas.

"Next year, the projection is that business, engineering and education majors are going to run strong again," he said. "These are the areas that will run strong, but that doesn't mean that there will not be lucrative opportunities for other fields."

He said many companies are interested in different areas, including liberal arts.

"In past years, we would do well

to place a liberal arts major anywhere," he said. "Now we have corporations actively looking for liberal arts majors."

Mary Payne, a career systems specialist for the College of Agriculture, said students entering the job market benefit from experience.

"College of Agriculture students usually have an advantage because they participate in internships while they're here," she said. "So it really prepares them for the job market."

Seales said students who enroll in University Career Services have an advantage over other students.

"About 90 percent of all vacancies will come through this office," he said. "But less than 30 percent of the students are registered with this office."

He said many of the job openings received do not appear in newspapers.

"Some students have the idea that 'All I have to do is pick up a Chicago Tribune or a St. Louis Post

Dispatch and find out what's vacant,'" he said. "So when you hear a student say, 'Oh, I've got this degree, but there aren't any jobs out there for me,' they probably have never been through this office."

He said the service teaches students to properly write a resume, has mock interviews and sends the resumes out to interested companies.

"We have 60,000 vacancies worldwide," he said. "We're putting you in contact with more employers than you could possibly do on your own."

Seales said the service placed 33 percent of students enrolled in the service in 1996.

He said another 10 to 12 percent were placed in jobs that did not relate to their discipline.

Payne said students should take advantage of the services offered by University Career Services.

"It makes them better prepared for their interviews and gives them an edge."

Some students pursue advanced degrees to broaden knowledge

Avoiding the 'real world' is not a good reason to attend graduate school.

When chosen for the right reason, graduate school can be the best option for a student with a bachelor's degree.

Paul LeBlanc, vice president of Graduate School Affairs for the Graduate and Professional Student Council, gave presentations in October and February at on-campus resident halls concerning applying to graduate school.

In a paper he presented to the Resident Housing Assistants of University Housing on Feb. 3, LeBlanc gave four possible motives for attending graduate school: to advance a career, to become a teacher or professor, to avoid joining the "real world" and because there is nothing better to do.

LeBlanc said that the first two reasons are legitimate, but the second two show an unclear career direction.

He also said that it may not be to a student's advantage to apply to or attend graduate school without clear direction for a vocation.

Blanc said graduate school is for

those interested in expanding their knowledge in their chosen field.

"Graduate levels are more specific," he said. "A lot of people opt to go as a way to get ahead. Generally, master's level is all they need."

LeBlanc said that few under-graduates know about the declining

students who later enter the job market are likely to get few job offers right away.

"Most people only get one offer when they get out of school," he said.

"The number of offers does not reflect a person's ability, but rather, the fact that there are more graduates than openings."

Shulman said the market for political scientists has been poor for the last eight to 10 years.

"And that's not just political science, either," he said. "People (with graduate degrees) will often times be on the market for two or three years before they get an offer."

He said it is not unusual for a large number of applicants with graduate degrees to apply for one position.

"There will be 200 to 350 applicants for one position at a university," he said.

Bradley Best, a doctoral candidate in political science, said a combination of factors led to his decision to attend graduate school.

"I had many fine professors during my undergraduate years that exemplified the ultimate combination of scholar and public figure. They encouraged me to pursue graduate-level studies," he said.

"I'm also very interested in political science, so it was a combination of these two things that made me decide to go to graduate school."
