As the official voice of the student body, the Egyptian wishes to take this opportunity to express the students' earnest plea for your careful consideration of the situation at Southern in your meeting next Monday. As students here, we feel that we have the most legitimate reason for concern over the rumors, complaints, and charges that we read or hear daily about, Southern and her administration. We're getting a little tired of seeing her name connected with "adverse publicity" in the headlines of every other local newspaper we pick up; we're getting a little tired of being asked in all our home towns just what the mess at Southern' is all about; we'd like to see the whole thing clarified. Southern means a lot to us; her reputation means as much. For this reason, we, as students, earnestly ask your aid in either disproving the rumors, if they are rumors, or in remedying the situations which have caused the adverse reports if such reports are facts.

In asking for your careful consideration of this

In asking for your careful consideration of this matter, our only aim is the betterment of our school, we feel that Southern's reputation has suffered long enough and that it is time for definite action to be taken by some authorized group. We ask you to remember that Southern is bigger and more important than any one man or any one group. We ask you to take whatever steps you think necessary to insure that nothing further will be allowed to harm her growth and reputation as a buniversity.

*OLD LADY LEARY hung a lentern in the shad and the result was the great Chicago fire. That much we know, but just what caused the great fire here at Southern in 1883 no one has ever decided. Whatever its origin was, it did althorough job of complete-ly destroying what was the college at that time.

Southern was credited by an act of the State legislature in 1889. The original act did not specify the town in which the college was to be built, so competition between the various communities in "Egypt" became quite spirited, as each wished to become the educational capitol of the region. After a great deal of discussion, Carbondale was finally chosen, to the great disappointment of Du Quoin, Centralia, and Carlyle, each of which had been considered by its citizens to be the ideal spot for the Southern Illimois Normal University to, be established. Realizing that the builsing was doomed, President Robert Allyn directed and led a' band of volunteer workers who began to empty the bloshing buildings of its contents. As there was no time to unscrew desks from the floor, they were torn from their fastennigs by arms that seemed to have muscles of corded steel . . "Prof. J. H. 


