REVIEW OF PAST HOMECOMING GRID-IRON CLASSICS

Although there is to be no Madison and White game for Homecoming this year, one may find much consolation by delving into the records of the Homecoming grid classics of the past year.

Throughout the decades, since 1921, the past features of first Homecoming, Southern teams have won twelve games, lost eight, and tied two. The highest scoring game was in 1941, when S.I.N.U. defeated Charleston 40. On the other end of the scoring record is the 1923 game, which, with the exception of a scoreless tie, is the lowest scoring contest. That year, Southern added out Shortner 29 on a blocked kick.

Such is '21. Southern's grid squad has a record that any football team could be proud of. They have not lost a game on the home field for the past five years and had not lost a conference game for the previous seven years. At this year's Homecoming game S.I.N.U. played Cape Girardeau to a scoreless tie in a sea of mud and water. The game was captained by that team, and around him were such men as Thomas Eastminger, Glenn Pachel, Andy Hines, Ed Gardner, and Cliff W. Hough, and many others. The other game was also against Cape Girardeau in 1937; the score was 13-0.

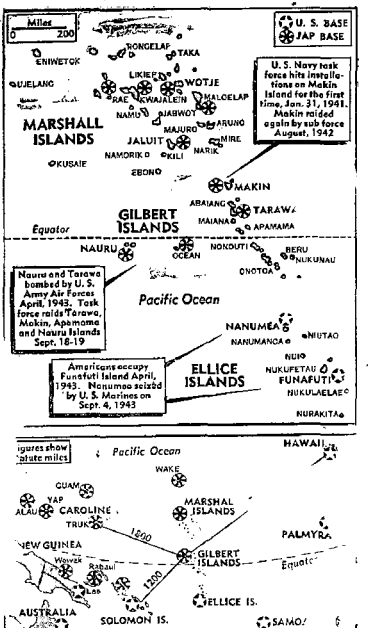

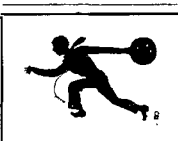

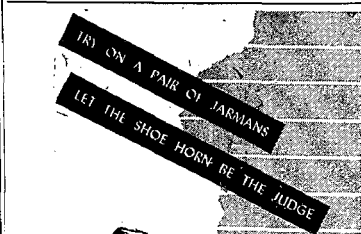
