III. BUDGET SUGGESTIONS

Our Accountant, Mr. Miles, has been at work on our budget for the past three weeks and may have the work completed, I think, by the fifth of October. It will, of course, deal with details. In general the situation with us is as follows:

We have an increase in our college enrollment as compared with last year of approximately 25 percent; as compared with two years ago more than 50 percent. Two years ago we had 487 high school and unclassified students. At the North Central Association meeting one year ago last March we were notified that we should be dropped if we did not within two years cut down the high school and un-

classified attendance to less than 300. We refused registration last year to more than 100 candidates for our high school, and this year we continued our policy of discouraging high school attendance. Today we have only 263 high school and unclassified students. However, making allowance for the enforced reduction in the high school attendance, we have a net gain over all as compared with two years ago of nine percent.

The fact must be kept in mind that it costs much more to teach a college man or woman than it costs to teach a high school boy or girl; consequently, our budget will ask for a considerable increase. College classes must be smaller than those allowed in the high school, and we need additional faculty members. We are planning to ask for \$25,000 addition to salaries and wages. This would provide an addition of ten to our faculty list.

Our college freshman class numbers more than 650, every member a graduate of an accredited or recognized high school. Of the 650 approximately 400 asked for freshman Chemistry. With our two chemical laboratories in full use every hour in the day the maximum number that can be cared for at present is 300. Because of this situation more than 100 freshmen who asked for Chemistry had to be sent into other courses. It is evident that the school if it is to do its work must have a new building. We expect to ask for \$300,000.00 for a chemical and manual arts building.

We are obliged also to alternate the first and second year's work in home economics, offering domestic science one year and domestic art the next. Other college courses which should be offered every year are offered only every other year. This is true in social science, Latin, French, geography. We are unable to restore German for which there is now a demand. In the training school only two grades this fall can have a drawing teacher. Our classes in biology, English, and psychology are overcrowded and must be until we can add to our teaching force.

It is my duty to urge that plans for our new Manual Arts and Home Economics Building be made at the earliest time possible, contracts let, and work begun. The overcrowded condition of our present buildings makes this imperative. May I ask the Board to use its influence to have this done?

IX. MISCELLANEOUS.

I will present under separate cover at the meeting on September 29 our proposed budget for the biennium 1927-1929.

My age will, of course, acquit me of the charge of self-interest if such a charge were made in presenting what follows.

As has been said before to this body and to legislative committees, the Teachers Colleges must in the selection of members of their faculties compete with high schools, colleges, and universities. The desirability of one kind of position over another is an important factor in making one's choice, but the amount of money paid will always have weight and often will be the deciding factor.

I have in mind now particularly the presidency of the Teachers Colleges in Illinois, the salaries paid being \$6,500 a year. Twelve high school principals in Illinois receive salaries varying from \$7,000 to \$12,500 a year—an average of \$9,812.50, which is none too much for capable men. In my judgment, the presidency of a Teachers College is a more desirable position than the principalship of a high school, but the difference in salaries is greater than the difference in the attractiveness of the two positions.

In character, in scholarship, in knowledge of educational philosophy, in teaching skill, in executive ability, in ability to present educational theories and practices to large or small bodies of people, the teachers college president should be no whit inferior to the high school principal. It is a large part of the duty of the president of the Teachers College to instruct and inspire those who are to teach and those who guide and direct teaching. We all want our Teachers Colleges not only to be as good as others, but to be better than others.

II. THE FACULTY.

1. Since the last meeting of the Board Miss Caroline Grote has asked for a leave of absence to attend Columbia University. To adjust this matter Miss Ethel Ray who has been on the faculty for seven years as a training teacher has been appointed dean to take Miss Grote's place, at \$2000 for the regular year instead of

\$1665 which she was to have as a training teacher. Mrs. Charmian Pugh, a graduate of our college course with four years experience is appointed to take Miss Ray's place and do most of her work at \$1200 for the regular year. Miss Mead has agreed to take the remainder of Miss Ray's work. Her salary is to be changed from \$1200 to \$1350 for the regular year.

Mr. W. H. Eller, who has been an assistant professor and has taught physics and directed the college band, has decided to attend the University of Michigan next year and is asking for a leave of absence. Mr. Ransom Harvey, who holds his Master's degree from Brown University, has been appointed to take his place at \$2400 for the regular school year of 36 weeks.

Mr. D. C. Beighey, who has been head of our Commercial Department for five years has resigned to become the supervisor of penmanship in the public schools at Indianapolis, Indiana. I am recommending Mr. J. A. Kirby to take his place at \$2700 for the regular school year.

Mr. E. F. Roberts, who has been a member of the department of Education and who was an extension director last year has resigned to become the director of the department of education in the Teachers College at Stevens Point, Wisconsin. I recommend Mr. S. F. Browne to take his place as extension director at \$2400 for the 36 weeks.

Due to the crowded condition of the Department of Education last year, it was found necessary to add one faculty member to that department, and Mr. R. G. Linder, who holds his Master's degree from the University of Chicago, was appointed at \$2400 for the regular school year of 36 weeks. He will also direct the school band.

Up to this time no head for the art department has been secured for the present. Therefore Mrs. Alberta Strome, who has been an assistant in the department for several years will act as head of the department at \$2000 for the 36 weeks and Miss Virginia Greer, who assisted in the department last year will act as an assistant again at \$1350.

3. By a typographical error in my last report Lucile Van de Steeg's salary for the regular year was made \$1800 instead of \$1890 which she had last year and should have this year. The error should be corrected.

By another error Mr. Sheldon Holcomb of last year's faculty was paid only \$2400, whereas he was promised \$2500 in a letter when he was employed. This error should be corrected and his

name should be put on the first pay roll for this next year for \$100 to be paid from salaries and wages.

On account of the several changes in the faculty since the schedule was approved it seems wise to present a new salary schedule for the 36 weeks salaries and for the yearly salaries which will readjust some of the salaries as to funds. It follows:

VIII. STUDENT LIFE.

1. There are several organizations or clubs in the school which help in directing the social affairs of the college and in working out school matters of general importance to the students. One such organization of men is called the Bachelor's Club. An organization of this sort among the women is called the Dianas. The Kappa Delta Pi club is an organization of high grade men and women who have shown themselves worthy along professional lines.

Thus far the college has held out against all national social fraternities in any attempt to establish chapters. Neither have any departmental honorary fraternities, except the one mentioned above been formed. The policy has been to avoid a multiplicity of weak organizations in an effort to establish one which is strong and hardy.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS.

1. An agreement has been entered into between the state and the city of Macomb by the officers of this board and the city officials to permit the building of a sewer across the college campus.

2. Further negotiations as to kind of paving to be built east of the campus were satisfactory and the contract is about to be let.

3. A preliminary draft of the budget has been prepared for discussion.

4. The Fall Quarter opened with 956 enrolled above the eighth grade. This is 72 more than were enrolled for the Fall Quarter last year. 751 of these are high school graduates and are pursuing some one of the college curriculums.

Mr. Morgan also presented a petition offered to the mayor and city council of Macomb, asking for the construction of a 4-foot concrete sidewalk on the west side of North Charles street, beginning at the south line of West Pierce street and extending south to the north line of West Adams street. 2. The attendance for the summer terms shows a decrease of about 15% over last year. The quality of the students, judged by the comments of the faculty, was exceedingly satisfactory and higher than usual.

- To take the place of Miss Anne Muse in the Department of Physical Education for Women we have chosen Miss Mabel J. Hupprich who has her degree from the Department of Physical Education at the University of Wisconsin and has a limited experience. Her salary is to be \$1620.

- e. To take the place of Miss Marie Peterson, a critic, we have chosen Miss Mollie Duffy, a graduate of the State Normal School at DeKalb who has a degree from the University of Illinois and has done work as a critic at Marquette, Michigan. Her salary is to be \$1675.
- f. To take the place of Miss Eleanor Parson as a critic we have chosen Miss Bonnie Bell who is a graduate of the Normal School at Charleston and later took a degree from DePauw University. She has had an experience of four years as a teacher in the elementary schools of Decatur. Her salary is to be \$1675.

Since the last meeting of the Board we have had three resignations from the faculty then appointed. The six vacancies then reported have been filled. Two more teachers have been employed since the opening of the term because of the crowded condition of our classes in mathematics and science. The new teachers engaged since May 31 for 36 weeks are:

As Professor of the Fine Arts, Clayton Henry Staples, for the past four years a student and teacher at the Art Institute, Chicago. Salary \$2610.

As Assistant Professor of Physical Education for Women, Miss Edna F. Munro, A. M., of Moline, Illinois. Miss Munro is a graduate of Monmouth College with a Master's degree from Columbia and a year's further study at the University of Wisconsin. Her years of teaching include two at the State Normal School at Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania. Salary \$2250.

As Health Adviser, Miss Margaret Nelson, M. D., of Des Moines, Iowa. Dr. Nelson is a graduate of Goucher College and of the Medical Department of Cornell University, N. Y. Salary \$2160.

As Instructor in Reading and Dramatics, Miss Verna Grubbs, A. M., of Ottumwa, Iowa, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Grinnell College and of the University of Iowa, who has taught in the high schools of Quincy, Illinois, and of Calumet and Bay City, Michigan. Salary \$2070.

As Instructor in Shorthand, Miss Esther Ruth Scott, A. B., of Lincoln, Nebraska, who has taught in high schools in Nebraska and Montana. Salary \$1800.

As Instructor in Typing, Miss Irene Johnson of Bloomington, Illinois, a graduate of the commercial department of I. S. N. U., who for two years has taught in the high school at Charleston, Illinois. Salary \$1620.

As Instructor in Geography and Economics in place of Parker M. Holmes, resigned, Leland Shumway Paine, A. M., of Madison, Wisconsin, a graduate of the University of Nebraska, who has done a year's graduate study in the University of Wisconsin. Mr. Paine has taught in I. S. N. U. during the summer of 1926. Salary \$2250.

As Assistant Professor of Public School Music instead of Miss Jessie Carter, resigned, Miss Blaine Boicourt, a graduate of the

Southern Illinois State Normal University and of the Northwestern School of Music with degree B. Music. For several years she has had charge of the music in Harrisburg, Illinois. Salary \$2220.

THE BUDGET.

We are asking for these increases:

\$7,570 a year to increase salaries of teachers not adequately paid, an average of 3½ per cent.

\$16,200 a year for seven additional teachers in Health Education, English, Economics, Art, Practice Teaching, Extension and Correspondence.

\$5,000 for part salaries of training teachers that we hope to secure in the public schools of Normal and Bloomington.

\$1,500 for an Appointment Clerk.

\$1,800 for one School Nurse, as recommended by your Committee

\$1,200 for one library assistant.

\$1,649 for lectures and employees salaries.

\$30,800 to enable us to abolish fees for registration, library, typewriters, towels, and laboratory materials.

\$200 a year in office expense because of a probable increase in telephone rates.

\$900 a year in appropriation for travel now too little to pay transportation of student teachers.

\$900 a year increase in "Operation" ($1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent).

\$20,000 for a third boiler for reserve. Three years ago an appropriation was made which proved too small.

\$3,000 for coal bunker and sidewalks.

\$3,000 for storage water tank and pump.

No increase for general repairs or equipment.

\$250,000 for a Science Building, a request made biennially since 1917.

We have now enrolled 1135 students in science classes (not including Agriculture or Domestic Science.) They are scattered through four buildings. Some of the rooms are unsuitable and ill-furnished.

\$80,000 to complete Fell Hall. The appropriation made by the last General Assembly was vetoed by the Governor.

\$10,000 for rebuilding our Plant House and adding an adequate Tool House.

\$15,000 for a Home Economics Cottage for demonstration.

\$60,000 for a Natatorium to be added to our gymnasium as in our original plan.

\$275,000 for a second residence hall or substantial duplicate for Fell Hall when completed.

Only 1-13 of our women students can be admitted to Fell Hall, 1-29 of our summer attendance. Hundreds of applicants are turned away each year. The accommodations are the best in Normal and set a standard in furnishings and prices. Yet this scale of prices will pay 5 per cent on the investment.

Action by the Board is requested:

1. On the diplomas to be granted to students who finished in our summer terms.

2. On the amended salary schedule including eleven new teachers but no other changes.

3. On the Budget.

After the conclusion of President Felmley's report the presidents were excused. Thereupon the Board took up the consideration of the resignation of President J. Stanley Brown.

The Chairman of the Board reported that a sub-committee, of which he was chairman, had been appointed by the Board to investigate certain charges made against the President of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb; that this committee had made a rather thorough-going investigation and had called a meeting in Chicago on the evening of September 28 to formulate its report, but that on the evening of the 27th of September President Brown had called upon and had presented his resignation. Mr. Shelton said that at the meeting of the sub-committee on the evening of the 28th of September he had informed the committee of the resignation of President Brown. In view of that resignation, the sub-committee wanted further instruction as to whether it should make its report or not. The Board wanted to know some of the facts brought out by the investigation. The Chairman called upon F. G. Blair, the Secretary of the sub-committee, to report the findings of the committee. In the discussion which followed, the question was raised how and why the announcement in the Chicago papers of President Brown's resignation was printed before the matter had come before the Board. Some of the members of the Board felt that the Board had not been treated with proper consideration in the matter.

After an informal vote on the question of the time when his resignation should be made effective, President Brown was invited to come before the Board. He made a statement denying any responsibility or fault in most of the matters complained of by the committee of city superintendents and high school principals. He admitted his responsibility on two of the charges, namely, concerning the athletic situation and the endorsement of teachers warrants, but claimed that all his acts were inspired by no other purpose than what he conceived to be the best interests of the school.

As the hour had grown late, the Board decided to postpone action to an adjourned meeting on the evening of October 6th.

ADJOURNED MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD
OCTOBER 6, 1926.

The Normal School Board met in the office of Director A. M. Shelton, 130 North Wells street, Chicago, at 5:30 P. M., on October 6, 1926.

Members present: Messrs. Bridges, Cole, Loebner, Shelton, Still, Walker, Blair and Mrs. Northam.

Members absent: Messrs. Allen and Curtis.

The meeting had been called to pass upon the report of the Budget Committee and to consider the resignation of J. Stanley Brown.

The Budget Committee had spent two days on the matter of the legislative askings for the five teachers colleges for the coming biennium. The basis on which the askings for the coming biennium were made is as follows:

For salaries and wages the same amount appropriated for the last biennium, plus the amount spent for salaries out of the revolving fund, plus the amount needed for increases in salaries of teachers now employed.

The Budget Committee also recommended an asking for the president's salary of each institution of \$7,500.

For buildings the Budget Committee made the following recommendations:

1. A science building for the Southern Illinois State Normal University at Carbondale, costing \$275,000.
2. A science building for the Illinois State Normal University at Normal, costing \$275,000.
3. A training school building for the Western Illinois State Teachers College at Macomb, costing \$275,000; also \$25,000 for repairing the old heating house into training rooms.
4. An addition to the training school building of the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College at Charleston, costing \$30,000.

On motion the Board approved the general plan and findings of the Budget Committee.

Mr. Blair moved that the resignation of President J. Stanley Brown, as presented to the Board, effective July 1, 1927, be accepted. Mr. Still seconded the motion. After some discussion the motion was passed unanimously.

The meeting adjourned.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD

The Normal School Board met in Chicago on October 15, 1926, at 9:00 A. M.

Members present: Messrs. Bridges, Cole, Loebner, Capen, Still, Walker, and Mrs. Northam.

Members absent: Messrs. Shelton, Blair, and Allen.

Mr. Cole was elected Chairman, and Mr. E. T. Walker, Secretary, *pro tem*. In the absence of the regular Secretary, Mr. Blair, the minutes of the previous meeting were not read.

The budget committee, through Mr. Bridges the chairman, presented the budget report as compiled by the committee and from reports from the presidents submitted to the committee, and the same was approved by the Board. The budget committee also recommended that a business manager for the Board be selected.

On motion, Mr. Bridges, chairman of the budget committee, was instructed to prepare the budget as approved by the Board, and present the same to the Finance Department at Springfield, after any little differences in the figures submitted by the Presidents were adjusted to conform with the budget committee's report.

Mr. Bridges then stated that he was in Springfield on the 14th and had a conference with the Governor regarding a business manager for the Board. He stated that he covered all the points with the Governor, that the Governor expressed himself as being in hearty accord with the matter and asked Mr. Bridges to take the matter up with Mr. Shelton, which he had done. Mr. Bridges further stated that he personally felt that he could well fill the position and offered his services to the Board. Motion was made by Mr. Cole and seconded by Mrs. Northam that Mr. Bridges be employed as business manager of the Board for one year from October 1, 1926, at a salary of \$6,000 and all expenses, the same to be paid out of the revolving fund of the five normal schools. Motion carried.

It was moved that the matter of athletics be referred to Mr. Bridges to outline and report to the Board at its next meeting.

On motion the Chairman and Secretary of the Board were instructed to make up a schedule for the meetings and send the list to the members of the Board.

On motion the business manager, Mr. Bridges, and the Finance Committee were instructed to arrange a date for them to meet with the Finance Department in Springfield as soon as possible after the filing of the budget report with the Department.

Mr. Bridges thanked the Board for the position given him, saying he hoped to save the state a great deal of money and many more times

save the expense of his office, and hoped in working with the presidents he could be of great assistance to them as well as to the Board, and in very many ways make business for the presidents more pleasant and systematic.

There being no further business, on motion the Board adjourned.
