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# Colleges ask for old budget

CHICAGO (AP) — Illinois college administrators urged the Illinois Board of Higher Education today to reaffirm its original budget recommendations and sharply attack Gov. Richard B. Ogilvie's budget request.

These educators labeled Ogilvie's message as "alarming . . . shocking . . . a severe setback to education in Illinois."

They support the recommendation of Dr. James B. Holderman, executive director of the board, who urged the board request an early meeting with the governor and to reaffirm its budget recommendations for fiscal year 1971 which

were cut \$17 million by Ogilvie.

The key points of dissent were on the governor's recommendation that tuition increases go into effect this fall and his 2.25 per cent increase for faculty members.

George L. Clements, board chairman, said he was disappointed that Ogilvie advanced the timing on increases in tuition and reduced the formula for faculty raises.

He said the board will be unable to determine what programs will be curtailed to provide faculty salary hikes until the final budget is approved by the legislature.

The board unanimously accepted Holderman's recommendation that the legislature eliminate the practice of tuition waivers for students who indicate they might pursue a teaching career.

Holderman said the number of students in Illinois colleges who pay no tuition is uncertain. The board agreed that tuition waivers not based on financial need should be phased out.

The only qualification for tuition waivers in the past has been that a student to be in the upper 50 per cent of his high school class and indicate a desire to teach.

Holderman said about half the students at Western Il-

linois and Eastern Illinois universities have such waivers.

Rhoden Smith, president of Northern Illinois University, urged the board to support its original recommendations. "Additional cuts will clearly have far reaching consequences . . . the amount of faculty increases is clearly unrealistic."

John Bernhard, president of Western Illinois: "I am shocked and alarmed by the trends in the governor's message. The impact of the drastic tuition increases, with this late timing, will be severe on many students not prepared

# Harpette granted access to SIU festival records

A motion requesting that SIU produce records concerning the Mississippi River Festival was granted to Harpette, Ltd., promoters of the proposed May Day Fest, in action at the Jackson County Courthouse in Murphysboro, Tuesday.

Judge Rodney A. Scott, in granting the motion by Harpette's attorneys, ruled that Harpette must meet certain expenses which include duplication of the records, time required for the duplication as well as travel and time expenses for any witnesses that may be called to testify.

Scott also asked that Harpette specify the particular records they wish to examine. SIU Legal Counsel Richard Gruny and Harpette attorney W.A. Armstrong argued points of similarity between the May Fest and the Mississippi River Festival held last year.

Harpette contends that there is a marked similarity in amount of people and type of entertainment presented.

Gruny said "The Mississippi River Festival is not relevant to this case." Gruny contends that the greatest difference in the endeavors is that no profit motive was present at the SIU festival.

"The difference is between something cultural and academic and a group of people taking something from a rural area," Gruny said.

Another difference cited by Gruny was that the SIU festival was in a metropolitan area and most of the people in attendance had homes to go to afterward, or could be absorbed by urban facilities after the two to three hour concerts.

"This is unlike the situation of the May Fest. The May Fest is in a rural area with those attending being from eight to 35 times greater in number than the MRF," Gruny said.

"I don't see why the University should be required to give advice on plans for the Mississippi River Festival without payment of one-half the cost to the University for planning plus all costs of duplicating the records and travel expenses for any witnesses," Gruny concluded.

Armstrong countered, "I don't know why a public body wants to hide its planning. The University position, as I see it, is you, (Harpette) aren't doing yours right but we won't let you see what we have."

In granting the motion, Scott said, in his opinion, "The two activities are very dissimilar." He said that it would

be of no great benefit to anybody to explore these records, but he said it was not up to the court to close the door.

Concerning Harpette's payment of evidence and witness expense, Judge Scott said, "This would eliminate the idea of harassment on the part of Harpette against the University."

Armstrong said the only records Harpette is interested in deal with health, safety and welfare features.

Two other motions heard at Tuesday morning's session were denied and stricken from the record by Judge Scott. These motions dealt with the question of whether or not Harpette applied for a license to hold the May Fest in ac-

# New budget studied

Chancellor Robert W. MacVicar, contacted in Springfield Tuesday, said Gov. Richard B. Ogilvie's budget recommendations would have to be clarified before it is clear whether program cuts will be necessary to provide faculty salary increases.

He said he was not in a position to comment on possible program reductions, which were discussed by George L. Clements, chairman of the Illinois Board of Higher Education, Tuesday.

Clements said the board would "be unable to determine until the final budget is approved by the legislature what programs will be curtailed to provide salary hikes."

The governor recommended a 4.5 per cent increase, considerably lower than the 7.1 per cent recommended by the Higher Board.

MacVicar said he was not critical of a recommendation by the board to eliminate tuition waivers for students.

He indicated that in the past it has been important to encourage students to enter professions, such as teaching, with waivers.

He gave his general support to phasing out waivers not based upon financial need, agreed upon by the Higher Board.

He said he regretted the recommendation to increase tuition as rapidly as proposed by the governor. He indicated concern for both out-of-state and in-state students, who would suffer from the hikes.

SIU will be hardest hit among the state's universities in terms of dollars if the tuition increases go into effect.

# 'Serve the People' funded

Student Senate's "Serve the People" campaign received \$1,130 from the city of Carbondale to help finance its pest control and Peoples' Gardens project in City Council action at Tuesday's formal meeting.

The request was made in a letter to the Council by Tom Bevirt, coordinator of the campaign.

The pest extermination project provides low-cost extermination service to the people of Carbondale and the Peoples' Gardens project offers seeds for planting in backyard gardens.

In other Council action, parade permits were issued to the Earth-Renewal Environmental Fair for a parade on April 18 and to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and

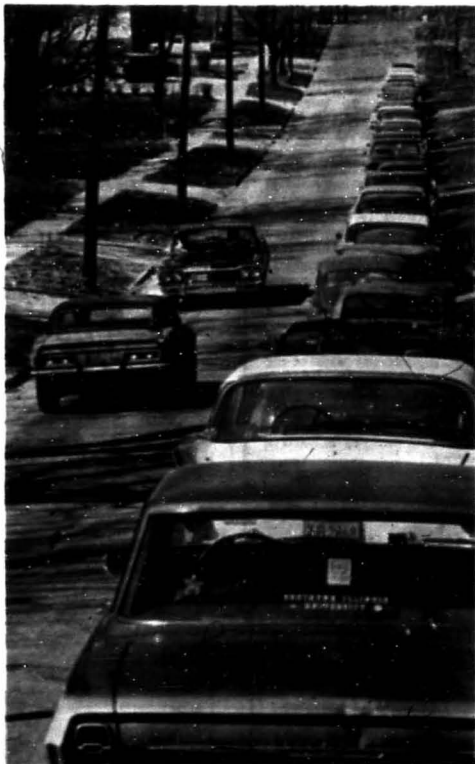
promoters of the Carbondale "All American Day" for a parade May 2.

The Council also approved an amendment to a city ordinance on Carbondale's responsibility for maintenance and construction of sidewalks within the corporate limits of the city.

The amendment set up a Sidewalk Review Board of six members who will act as a recommending board to the Council. The Board will also review petitions for financial hardship relief for persons unable to pay any special tax for sidewalk construction or repair.

Appropriation of \$54,000 of motor fuel tax funds for street maintenance purposes was also passed by the Council.

In other Council action, a bid was awarded on Workman's Compensation Insurance.

# PATCO officials ordered to court

CHICAGO (AP) — A federal judge Tuesday ordered eight officials of the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization (PATCO) to show cause why they should not be held in contempt for violating a restraining order against the controllers' slowdown.

The eight officials were ordered to appear before Judge James B. Parsons in U.S. District Court Wednesday with

doctors' reports attesting to their illnesses.

Judge Parsons also expanded the federal restraining order to include an additional 129 PATCO members at the Air Traffic Control Center at Aurora, and Chicago's O'Hare International Airport. The controllers have failed to report for work the last 14 days, claiming illness. The eight listed in the order

are Carl H. DeBroux, a member of PATCO's national board of directors; William J. Plash, president of the Chicago chapter; Wayne P. Carns, Palwaukee tower PATCO director; Gary J. Rice, a member of Chicago's central PATCO office; Richard J. Shattick, PATCO director at the O'Hare tower; John Strauser, PATCO director at the DuPage tower; Carl Ott, vice president of the Chicago chapter; and Glen Riddens, secretary of the Chicago chapter.

## Construction behind schedule

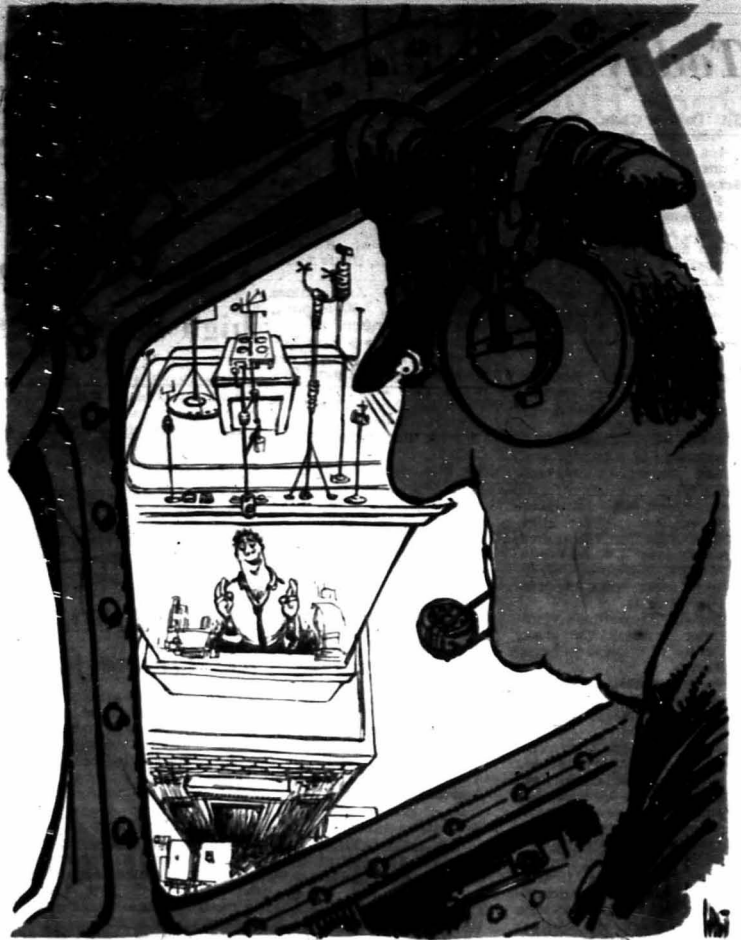

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# TV news commentator to speak at convocation

John Scali, ABC news reporter, will speak at convocation at 1 p.m. Thursday in the Arena.

Scali, an award-winning news commentator, has been the only Washington commentator to accompany President Nixon and Secretary of State William P. Rogers on all their overseas travels. Scali has also played key roles in the Kennedy and Johnson Administrations. He secretly negotiated with Russia's intelligence chief in Washington to help arrange for Soviet withdrawal of its offensive missiles from Cuba during the Cuban Missile Crisis.

Scali has been a reporter for 25 years, during which he has traveled to 53 countries. Scali has been on the "ABC Evening News" with Howard K. Smith and Frank Reynolds and hosts ABC's Sunday afternoon interview program, "Issues and Answers."

Scali accompanied the President on his tour of eight nations, beginning in Manila

and winding up in Romania. The President stopped in Vietnam during this trip. This was the third Vietnam visit for the President and Scali's eighth trip to Saigon. His relationship with President Nixon goes back to 1959 when he reported Nixon's kitchen debate with Nikita Khrushchev in Moscow.

Scali's reputation as the "newsman's newsman" dates back to his 17 years with The Associated Press as its roving correspondent.

Scali's favorite speech topic is, "Washington Wonderland—The Peculiar View from the Nation's Capital," in which he discusses how politics, personal ambition, and pride have helped thrust us in a war in Vietnam.

Another topic is "Beyond Vietnam—The New Isolation," in which he looks beyond Vietnam to present the thesis that the United States is inevitably heading for a period of neo-isolationism that will dominate the next decade.

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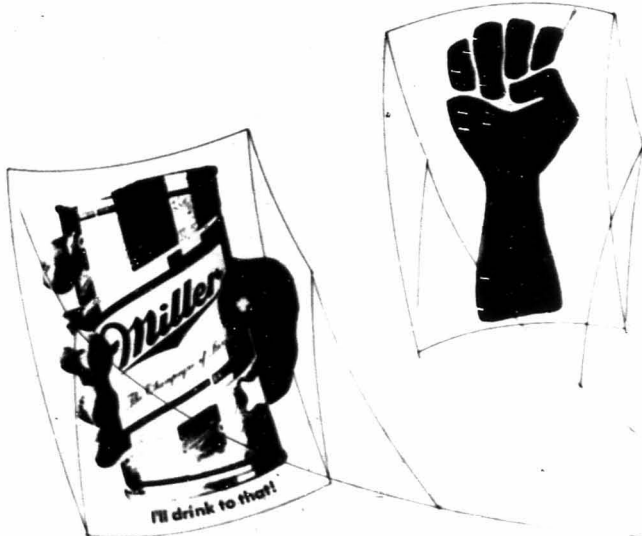
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'Could go down to wire'

# Vote on Carswell uncertain

WASHINGTON (AP)—The future of Supreme Court nominee G. Harrold Carswell rested uncertainly with a shrinking band of uncommitted senators Tuesday on the eve of the climactic confirmation vote.

"This could go down to the wire," said Majority Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana. "It's going to be a real horse race."

Both Mansfield and at least one Republican—Robert J. Dole of Kansas—said Wednesday's vote could be decided by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew who could vote to break a tie to put the 50-year-old appeals court judge on the Supreme Court.

Other Republican leaders continued to profess confidence in confirmation although by far less than the 52-44 Monday vote by which they beat back the effort to return the nomination to the Judiciary Committee.

But privately some of these same republicans conceded they were nervous over the outcome.

Sen. Mark O. Hatfield, R-Ore., announced

Tuesday through an aide that he would vote against confirmation—an announcement which had been expected.

It raised to 40 the number of senators committed against confirmation in an Associated Press poll. The poll showed 44 for confirmation and 12 publicly undecided.

Four senators are expected to be absent. Tacticians on both sides mentioned only a few of the uncommitted as being really unknown quantities. Presumably the others have indicated privately what they will do.

The key votes appeared to be those of Democrat J.W. Fulbright of Arkansas and Republicans Marlow W. Cook of Kentucky and Margaret Chase Smith of Maine.

Fulbright deserted Southern ranks to vote for sending the nomination back to committee. Cook voted against the motion but has indicated that he is troubled by the nomination.

Except for her vote against recommitment, Mrs. Smith has given no hint of her stand.

# College administrators urge board to pass original budget

this late in the year."

Samuel Braden, president of Illinois State: "We do not determine the amount of money we will get. We don't have that authority. We only have the responsibility which no one wishes to share with us these days of running a college."

Quincy Doudna, president of Eastern Illinois: "The budget is a serious setback for higher education in Illinois."

Delyte Morris, president of SIU: "I would hope that a public reaction about student unrest not be viewed as a penalty. Illinois would be the loser and it would be unfair to the mass of students not involved."

David D. Henry, president of the University of Illinois: said the university admini-

trators accepted the "hold-the-line" approach in agreeing with the board on its budget recommendations. He said this should be pointed out in arguing that the board's budget be approved.

The board proposed that tuition hikes go into effect in the fall of 1971. The tuition increases effective this fall, as proposed by the governor, range from 50 to 90 per cent. Nonresident tuition would go from \$720 to \$1,194 a year at SIU—the highest tuition hike in terms of dollars.

And the University of Illinois rate would jump 50 per cent for nonresidents and 70 per cent for residents.

Holderman said the board's recommendation of \$427 million was cut by the governor to \$409.4 million.

cordance with Jackson County Board of Supervisors ordinances.

The original ordinance dated back to 1949 and was amended in 1950 and again on Feb. 11, 1970.

Armstrong questioned the validity and constitutionality of the ordinances, and contended it was not up to the defendants to prove the invalidity of the ordinances, rather the burden rested with the plaintiffs to establish the validity of the ordinances.

Concerned Citizens of Southern Illinois attorney John Feitrich said Harpette never formally applied for a license, nor did they pay the mandatory \$25 application fee.

Harpette contends they applied in a letter dated Dec. 29, 1969 to Jackson County State's Attorney Richard Richman.

In other action, Ted Lorek and James Wham, represent-

## 'No parking' sign shortage causes traffic tie-up

Daily traffic tie-ups on South Marion Street have resulted from a lack of "no parking" signs which prevents SIU Security Police from enforcing the ordinance banning parking.

The ordinance prohibits parking on the east side of South Marion Street near the campus, according to Thomas E. Leffler, chief security officer.

"We don't have the necessary signs yet," Leffler said. "We wanted to post them during the break, but they didn't get to us yet."

There originally were "no parking" signs on South Marion, but the workers who tore down the buildings also tore down the signs, Leffler stated.

As it is now, cars are parking on the east side of Marion Street and autos that have to pass them often have to go up on the west side curb to do so.

Meanwhile, over at the corner of Mill Street and Illinois Avenue, another traffic problem presents itself daily to motorists.

Drivers approaching the stop at Mill Street while traveling north on Illinois find that four lanes exist in a two-lane road.

The state highway department recently painted new lines, allowing for a parking lane on the west side of the street, but they apparently failed to remove the old lane markings.

Harold Hill of the City Public Works Department, said the state highway people were supposed to remove the

old markings.

After a call from The Daily Egyptian, Hill said he was off to inspect the site and investigate the reported lane confusion.

## House urges lower marijuana penalty

WASHINGTON (AP)—Preliminary government findings on marijuana are that it does not necessarily lead to heroin addiction but is a dangerous drug and strong preparations might produce brain damage in some chronic users.

The preliminary findings by the National Institute of Mental Health after three years of study were included in a report released Tuesday by the House Select Committee on Crime.

The committee concluded marijuana traffic is a minimum \$850 million-a-year big business that is leading increasing numbers of young Americans into tragic lives—but that present stiff penalties are threatening respect for law in general and should be reduced.

It suggested a maximum one-week jail sentence for first-offense marijuana possession, during which the violator would be required to take a drug abuse education course.

"The growing drug culture," said Chairman Claude Pepper, D-Fla., "is rapidly

undermining respect for law and doing serious damage to the ability of the criminal justice system to safeguard the lives and property of the American people."

The committee's 120-page report said this is largely because while marijuana helped boost all drug arrests 322 per cent from 1960 to 1968—when 167,177 people were arrested including 43,200 under 18 and 6,243 under 15—judges jailed few of the young people because the penalties are unduly harsh.

"I think a jail sentence of a week would be readily enforced," Pepper said in an interview, "and would be accepted by the public."

The Senate has passed the Nixon administration's proposal that the present two-to-ten year penalties for marijuana possession be reduced to a misdemeanor with a maximum one-year jail sentence.

The committee's \$850 million-a-year figure is one of the first ever estimated on annual marijuana traffic and the report said users probably

spend far more.

The committee staff computed, on the basis of raw government estimates, that six million people used marijuana in 1969—600,000 habitual users spending at least \$20 a week for a total \$624 million, 2.4 million spending at least \$100 during the year for \$240 million and three million experimenters spending an insignificant amount.

The preliminary findings on

marijuana effects, given by NIMH director Stanley F. Yolles in response to questions from Pepper, included a study showing that one-third to one-half of chronic marijuana users also try barbiturates and pep pills and less than 5 per cent try narcotics including heroin.

The paper said the institute hopes to have definitive answers on long-term marijuana effects in two years.

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## City Council, legislators meet

An initial plan to revive a previously defeated impacted cities bill was set at an informal luncheon meeting between the Carbondale City Council and area state legislators Tuesday.

Assembly members attending the meeting were Sen. John S. Gilbert, R-Carbondale; Rep. Gale Williams, D-Murphysboro and Rep. C. L. McCormick, R-Vienna.

On the advice of the legislators, the city of Carbondale will contact other Illinois cities with adjacent colleges or universities to determine their position on state aid and support for the issue.

A tentative meeting between the representatives from these cities and the legislators from the respective districts has been set for May 6 in Springfield.

The noon luncheon was suggested by City Councilman Hans Fischer. Fischer

responded to the Carbondale Citizens' Advisory Council suggestion that the city of Carbondale and SIU take on a joint study to find the cost of services rendered by the city to the University.

Fischer, who opposed the proposal, offered as an alternative the meeting with the legislators on the broader issue of state aid to impacted cities.

At the meeting, the question of the effectiveness of a study made to show the necessity of such legislation was put to the legislators by Councilmen William Eaton and Fischer.

Rep. McCormick said he felt such a study would only slow consideration by the legislators. He feared that the likely approach would be to confront the legislators with the proposal. The other legislators agreed.

The impacted cities proposal, providing a portion of the particular school's budget to the adjacent city, was defeated last year in the Illinois Senate.

Also discussed at the meet-

ing was the Cedar Creek proposal. Under this plan, Carbondale is seeking a loan from the state to match federal funds for construction of an additional water reservoir for the City of Carbondale.

The legislators recommended a meeting with Gov. Richard B. Ogilvie be planned for May 6, the same day as the proposed meeting with legislators on impacted cities.

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# Students ask Ogilvie to change proposed budget

SPRINGFIELD — Members of the Ad Hoc Student Advisory Committee to the Illinois Board of Higher Education have written to the board to express their "deep concern" over the higher education budget submitted last week by Governor Richard B. Ogilvie. The students urged the board to be independent enough to carry the fight for more funds to the General Assembly.

In a letter to Board Chairman George L. Clements, the head of the 38-member student committee, Robert Weinberger, a University of Illinois graduate student, said,

"We fear the financial savings in the new budget will be more than offset by its social cost."

The students said the governor's proposed tuition increase, which would raise tuition rates for resident students an average of 63 per cent, would hit middle-income families hardest. "We fear that the result will be that many qualified high school graduates will be unable to attend college in Illinois. We are worried that the door of opportunity is being closed in their faces."

In his budget message the governor said provision would be made to increase scholar-

ship funds. Weinberger said he did not believe the increase would adequately offset the full impact of the tuition increase.

Of the small increase in faculty salaries, the students pointed out that the Board of Higher Education had recommended a 7.1 per cent increase to keep Illinois from slipping below the national average in faculty salaries. The new budget reduces the request to an average of 2.25 per cent for the full fiscal year.

Weinberger's letter said the "meager increase" was "inadequate if Illinois is to attract and retain the best teachers available." He said the state would be at a "competitive disadvantage in comparison to other states in efforts to improve and maintain the quality of our academic instruction."

Because the cost of living is increasing at more than 6 per cent annually, the letter said, the reduced salary increase in the new budget means that "faculty members will be receiving less pay, in real dollars, than they were last year."

The group noted that the Board of Higher Education had itself said the proposed deferral of capital construction projects represented "unmet needs" and that the likely result would be "a significant constraint upon the ability of the institutions to maintain current standards." The students expressed their fear that the deferrals would "impair high quality education."

The students agreed with the statement in the governor's message that education must become "less of a sacred cow." But, they said, "we do not believe the answer is to risk making it an undernourished one."

The group urged the board to be a "strong and independent advocate of the needs of higher education" rather than "acquiescing in the decisions of the governor." They asked the board to carry the fight for more money to the General Assembly and not "be dependent upon the views of any one individual."

Weinberger said of the letter, "Issues like tuition increases, faculty salaries and building programs may lack the drama of a demonstration to many students, but ultimately they are no less important to the future of higher education in Illinois."

# Simplicity of old ballads may be cry of young

When I was a child growing up in the South Carolina foothill country, radio was still a crystal set hobby. The gramophone had arrived, and such popular songs as "Yes, We Have No Bananas" could be found on the scratchy disks that more commonly recorded operatic arias, Sousa marches and hymns. But for the most part the music we listened to was live, and amateur.

From the submerged black world we could sometimes hear the moving sound of spirituals and work songs and their transmutation into blues and jazz. But the common currency, sung as lullabies, to help pass lonely hours or for general entertainment, was in the form that would now fall under the rubric of "country music."

The guitar and the fiddle were its natural accompaniment, and all of it—even the rousing rhythms of the square dance—had a poignant air. In its purest form, as it still survived in the Appalachian mountain coves, the meter and the language of the ballads

were quite literally Elizabethan.

There were gentle songs to celebrate a true love's graces, anguished plaints of unrequited passion and sagas of many stanzas that recounted ancient highland battles or limned the foibles of men Aesop-style in the antics of barnyard animals. They were songs intended to be sung out of doors, around campfires, in picnic groves, on front porches. Taken West with the receding frontier by the young men of Appalachia they came back as cowboy ballads.

The old forms carried over to new material without much change, and so strong was the imprint and so limitless the conditioned popular taste they even survived the advent of Tin Pan Alley's commercial song factories. When the Southern Railway's crack train, Old 97, went off the rails on a three-mile grade in Virginia between Lynchburg and Danville, the event was celebrated in a ballad sung all along the line. The guitars and the fiddles wove epics from the headlines—Floyd Collins trapped in a Kentucky cave, a choir singer murdered by her lover, Lucky Lindy's lonely

flight across the Atlantic.

The sophisticates of my generation came to scorn country music but it never disappeared entirely. And now the old musical form, not significantly altered in tone and spirit, provides the theme music of the rebellious young—indeed, is considered by some serious critics to constitute a universal language that leaps across barriers of race and culture to create a generational bond.

In slightly altered guise it pours incessantly from the radio, thumps accompaniment to the bare-bosomed stylized movies that enrapture youthful audiences and is the stuff of which the gigantic rock festivals are made. The electronic amplification and the hypnotic blood beat is a sensible distortion, but those who take the trouble to decipher the accompanying lyrics will find the sly in-jokes encased in a dominant mood of nostalgia.

The music of the young is a cry from the heart for a return to the comforting simplicities of childhood, or, failing that, to the America of which the old ballads sang—a land

where love was true, hearts were gentle, the air was pure and the streams ran clear. It is hardly the marching refrain of revolution; take me back, take me back, the guitar insists. Rejecting the polluted, brutalized heritage from their fathers, the young seem to be beating an emotional retreat to the land of their grandfathers. But, alas, history doesn't run backward; the big rock candy mountain never was, and will never be.

The Easy Rider on his motorcycle takes us to a hippie commune where the leader fingers the dry soil and proclaims that, like the Mormons, his followers will make the desert bloom. But the hedonistic faith of the new communards is in freedom and love, while the old pioneers were committed to personal sacrifice and hard work. That twain is likely to meet only in the sweet, sad unreality of old ballads revisited.

# Issue at Con-Con: Appoint or elect officials?

Whether to elect or appoint some officials at the state and county levels has been a controversial issue at the Constitutional Convention.

Officials which have come under debate include the superintendent of public instruction, state treasurer, auditor of public accounts, secretary of state, some judiciary positions and some county offices.

Strong arguments have been presented to the Con-Con for both election by the people and appointment by the governor.

Most of those asking that these officials remain elected justify their position by saying that the officeholders must continue being responsible to the people.

Secretary of State Paul Powell, testifying before the entire convention in late January, stated, "I am still old-fashioned enough to believe that the citizens of Illinois should have the right to vote for and elect their state officials, and to re-elect or defeat those they feel have not properly represented them."

Powell said the governor and lieutenant governor should be allowed to run together as a team, but the supreme court and appellate courts should appoint their own clerks. "This would leave six state officials on the ballots," Powell said. "This includes governor and lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of public accounts, state treasurer, attorney general and superintendent of public instruction."

Jackson County Superintendent of Schools Monroe Deming also says public officials should be elected.

"I have enough confidence in the American people that if they were ever able to select good officials they ought to be more qualified and better able to do so today," he said.

"There is nothing more political than an appointive position by an elected official," Deming said. "If the Constitutional Convention

comes up with a plan for a state board that would literally and truly take the offices out of politics, I would be a lot more receptive to the idea than I am at the present time."

Delmar Ward, Jackson County clerk and recorder, says, "If an official is appointed he just answers to a few people, but if he is elected he answers to everybody."

Among those wanting to see some public officials taken off the ballot is Lt. Gov. Paul Simon. In a speech at SIU in early February, Simon stated he would like to see the positions of clerk of the supreme court, trustees of the University of Illinois and the superintendent of public instruction taken off the ballot and become appointive officials.

"At the same time," Simon said, "I would like to see the governor and lieutenant governor elected together, just as we now elect a president and vice-president on the same ballot."

Robert Hartley, an editor for the Lindsay-Schaub newspaper chain, wrote in a Feb. 22 editorial that making state positions appointive does not "rob the citizenry of any crucial prerogative."

"It (appointive system) places the responsibility for those activities—which are mainly carrying out state laws and policies—squarely on the man who would be responsible for the executive department of state government: the governor," Hartley wrote. "The people have a chance to elect a new governor every four years and at that time he should be held responsible for not just his little circle of activities but all of those appointed by him and active in the executive branch."

Another area in which the method of selection is in question is the judiciary. Illinois State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert Underwood, appearing before the Con-Con committee on the judicial article, said the merit system, where the position is earned by past performance and service, might be appropriate for the heavily populated areas of the state but not for the less populated areas.

As reported in the Southern Illinoisan, Supreme Court Justice Walter Schaefer testified before the Judiciary committee, stating that politics cannot be taken out of the judicial system completely and that he would not oppose a method of electing circuit court judges. But after that, according to Justice Schaefer, promotion to the appellate court or the supreme court should be made by judges, perhaps submitting a list of names to the governor.

The Illinois Bar Association and the Chicago Bar Association have jointly proposed a modified Missouri Plan for the selection of judges. Philip Kurland, professor at the University of Chicago and the school's authority on constitutional law, testified before the committee on the judicial article in Chicago in February.

Kurland endorsed the modified Missouri Plan, saying that "the machinery sought is that which would lead to... the selection of judges on the basis of their competence for the task," and that "political affiliations and past services: ethnic, racial, and religious factors—ought to be made irrelevant as criteria for judi-

cial selection."

Harold Nudelman, vice-chairman of the Judiciary article committee and practicing lawyer in Chicago, is working as a representative of the Chicago Democratic Machine, which is against appointive judges. After listening to Kurland's testimony, Nudelman told a Lindsay-Schaub reporter he opposed appointment systems because "any time you remove any

office from control of the people you have diminished the democratic process."

When the final draft of the new constitution is ready to go to the people of the state for approval or disapproval, the question of appointive or elective systems for public officials and judges will be a major issue. Delegates are working to try to find a system that will be accepted at the polls.

The second team lost the first match against Eastern 13-15, but captured the remaining matches 15-2, 15-3 resulting in a win and a loss meet.

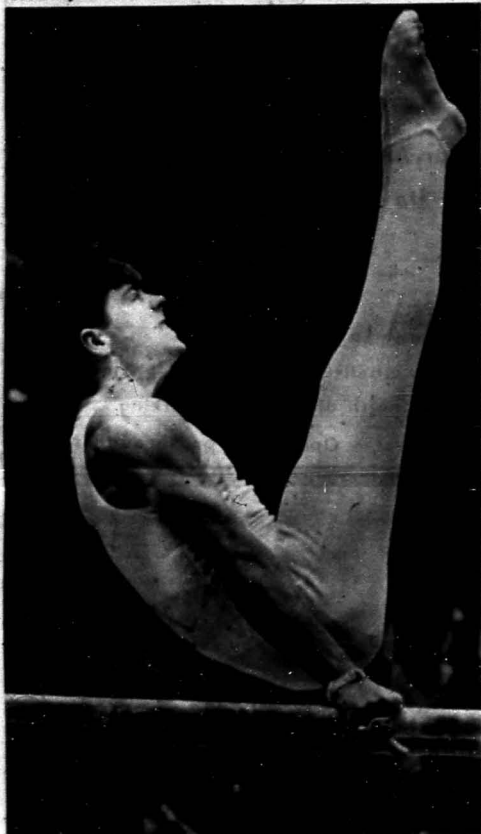
"I think we played well at times and at times we played poorly," said Kay Brechtelsbauer, assistant volleyball coach. "It was team all the

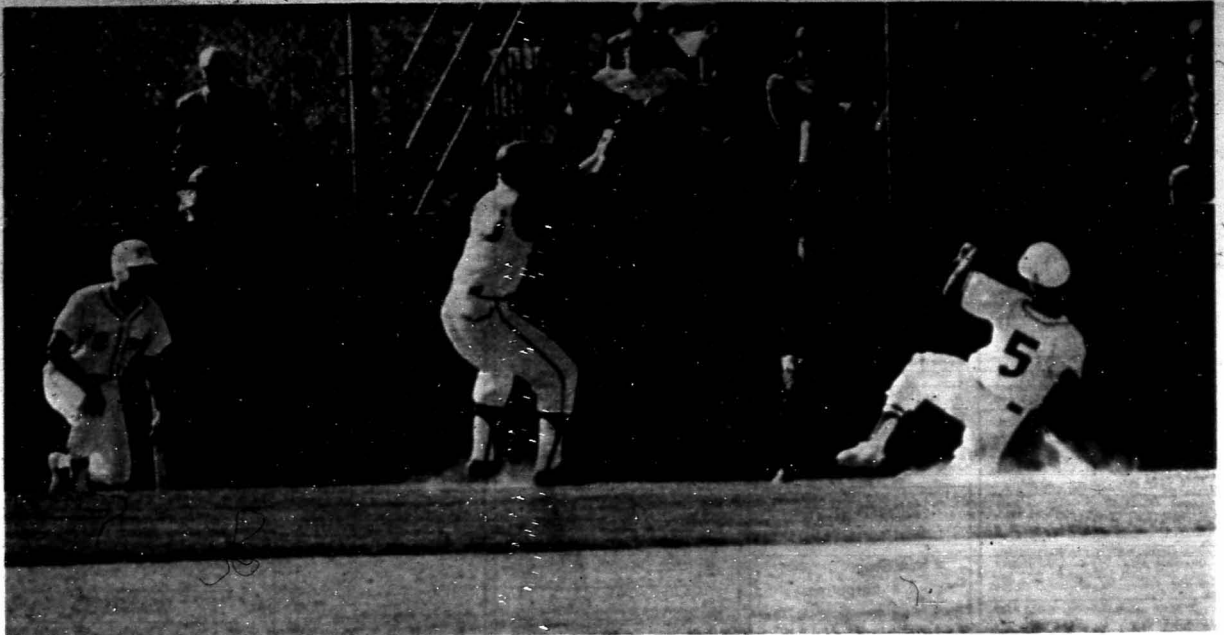

## Baseball comedy of errors: SIU over Moorhead, 11-1

With all due respect to coach Bill Thomas, his Moorhead State Dragon baseball team doesn't belong on the same field with the Salukis.

They've already proved that twice and will face the Salukis again at 3 p.m. today on the SIU diamond.

After absorbing a humiliating 26-3 defeat Monday, the Dragons were held to only one hit Tuesday and succumbed 11-1.

John Daigle recorded his third victory of the campaign against one loss. Sophomore reliever Chuck Richards finished the last three innings.

Tuesday's contest was a comedy of errors on the part of Moorhead. Three throwing errors in the second and third

innings paved the way for a 3-0 Saluki lead.

SIU was held scoreless in the first frame. Monday, the Salukis helped Moorhead inaugurate their new season by collecting 10 runs and eight hits in the first.

Aided by two Moorhead errors in the fifth, coach Richard "Itchy" Jones' Salukis scored five runs on six hits in their biggest uprising of the game.

Bob Blakley and Mark Newman opened with back to back singles to put men on first and third. Dan Radison's single scored Blakley and pushed Newman to second.

Jim Dissmore then wild pitched Radison and Newman to second and third with Bob Sedik at bat. Sedik popped a Texas league fly ball which

fell between the shortstop and left fielder.

Both base runners had to hold until the ball dropped. Newman then scored on a poor throw from the left fielder but Radison was caught between second and third. Daryl Oja tagged him out as he attempted to get back to second.

Gene Rinaldi kept the rally going with a single to left, Sedik moving to third.

Moments later Dissmore tried to pick Rinaldi off first but Rinaldi stole second. First baseman Steve Nelson attempted to catch Sedik off third but threw the ball into left field, enabling Sedik to score the third run of the inning.

An error by Oja on Ray Nygard's grounder scored Rinaldi and left Nygard on first. He scored two batters later when Les Stoots rapped a double to the wall in left center.

The competition figures to get tougher after today's game with Moorhead.

This weekend the Salukis will play fifth ranked Tulsa twice and sixth ranked Mississippi on Monday. All contests will be road games.

## Penguins meet Seals

**PITTSBURGH (AP)** — The Pittsburgh Penguins meet the Oakland Seals Wednesday night in the first National Hockey League play-off game in the Penguin's short history.

The Penguins, who finished in second place in the Western Division, will tangle with the fourth-place Seals in the first game of the quarter-final play-offs.

Second place for the Penguins was almost a compromise between the views of General Manager Jack Riley and Coach Red Kelly, now in his first season at Pittsburgh after two years with the Los Angeles Kings.

Riley said several months ago he would be happy just to make the play-offs. "But Red is shooting for first place and that is good," the general manager said.

The Penguins never had a chance to catch the first-place St. Louis Blues, but they clinched second a week before Oakland and Minnesota knew they would be in the play-offs at all.

The Penguins lost the last game of the season to the North Stars, who clinched third place with the 5-1 victory.

Against the Seals, Pittsburgh has an over-all record this season of 2-3-3. At home they are 2-0-2 and at Oakland they are 0-3-1. The big problem could be winning in Oakland, but the Penguins say they don't see it that way.

"We could have saved ourselves a five-hour plane ride, that's all," said defenseman Bob Blackburn. "It doesn't really matter who we play."

"Anybody can give you trouble in the playoffs," said Kelly. "It's just a short, short, short season."

## Astros win 8-5

**SAN FRANCISCO (AP)** — Norm Miller, Houston's No. 1 right fielder last year but replaced by Joe Pepitone this season, delivered a three-run pinch-hit homer in the seventh inning Tuesday to lead the Astros to a 8-5 opening-day victory over the San Francisco Giants.

Miller, who had only four homers last season and just one in 56 times at bat during the exhibition season, drove a two-strike shot over the left-field fence off Gaylord Perry.
