Dr. Thomas F. Barton, head of the Geography Department, Miss Minette Barber, supervisor of Anthony Hall and member of the English Department; and Dr. Judson P. Landis, acting head of the Sociology Department, have been selected to sponsor the Independent Student Union. The faculty members were chosen by the Independent Council which is the governing body of the Independent Student Union.

It was also disclosed by Miss Landis that the Constitution for the Independent Student Union was adopted and ratified at a Council meeting on Monday, January 22. The Winter meeting of the Delta Assembly of the Southern Division of the Illinois Education Association was held on the campus of Southern Illinois Normal University last Monday evening, January 22.

Mr. George Bracewell, director of rural education in Southern Illinois, was elected to the office of president. Clyde Flynn, Elmhurst, was elected vice president. R. H. Hinkle, Cairo, second vice president. George Patton, West Frankfort, Illinois, was elected to the office of executive committee member. Robert McConnell, Ann Arbor, Michigan, was elected to the office of secretary. J. P. Willis, Golconda, and J. R. Moss, of Christopher, were elected members of the Executive Committee. Mr. Moss will serve for three years, with the exception of J. R. Moss, who will serve on the same committee for one year.

The meeting was under the direction of the acting president, Miss Catherine Taylor, who presided at the meeting, requesting the introduction of Dr. Chester F. Lay, by the former president, Dr. Bruce Martin. Dr. Lay presented a report on the welfare committee of the State Association Group. He reported that the committee had been organized in the fall of 1944, and has since that time been active in promoting the welfare of the teachers. Dr. Lay also reported on the activities of the committee during the past year.

DEAN LENTZ SPEAKS AT INAUGURATION OF THE STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council for the 44-45 school year at Southern was inaugurated Tuesday, January 23, during the regular chapel hour. The inauguration address was delivered by Dean E. G. Lentz, professor of History at Southern, who admitted that two inaugurations within a four-day period was crowding the schedule somewhat. "But," added in comparison to the "great" inaugural, "it only emphasizes the importance of this occasion." Mr. Lentz explained that the inauguration was a very important step in the development of the student body.

Mr. Lentz also spoke of the importance of the student council in the development of the student body. PROPOSED GOALS FOR STUDENT COUNCIL

With the inauguration of its members this week, the Student Council of S.I.U. has been brought clearly into focus for every student on the campus. This organization, the only student governing body with jurisdiction over the entire student body, has itself become aware of the "incomprehensibilities" of its constitution, and has appointed a constitutional committee to propose amendments to, or possibly rewrite the manuscript. We of the Egyptian feel that the student body should know the laws by which the council functions and should have a hand in the renaking of those laws which the students will have to pass on before they are accepted. The constitution is reprinted on this page. Students, read it over carefully and make your suggestions to the council.

The Student Council theoretically, as shown by Dean Lentz in his chapel address at the inaugural services of the Student Council, represents the practical ideology of democracy at Southern. That this has not always been true is due to the indifference on the part of the student body. An appalling lethargy has prevailed among the students which in turn has affected the representative governing agency of the college: the Student Council.

To be effectively interested in student government, it is assumed one must know something about it. There has been no program set up whereby students, especially Freshmen, could be instructed about the Student Council and its functions. A possible remedy to this situation could be a STUDENT GOVERNMENT DAY, in which students meet and discuss the functions and problems faced by the students and the Council alike.

A source of much criticism of past Student Councils has been the elections which are conducted under the jurisdiction of the Council. While not entirely responsible for the niggardly showing of students at the polls, the Council could make a more determined effort to inform students of elections. A typical example can be found in the class officers election of this year. Nominations were held before Christmas and final elections were held on January 2, the day students returned to classes. There is in addition a great deal to be desired in the handling of elections. The present method is haphazard and invites irregularities at the polls. The Student Council should attempt to set up a system analogous to our national set up, for only through practical experience are the students going to become an intelligent electorate, as far as mechanics are concerned.

While the Student Council maintains a relatively high grade standard of 3, for its members, a basic inconsistency exists when a student takes only 4 or 5 hours per term and remains on the Council. Surely, a minimum of hours should also be set up in order to keep standards.

One of the major duties of the Council is to take charge of student dances and parties. Little has been done to formulate plans for an integrated social life on campus. A great deal needs to be done toward providing activities for students who stay over week-ends.

In addition, the Student Council should take the lead in a program of long-term planning for future student bodies, which might include expanding the number of members of the Council on a proportional representation basis to take care of the anticipated increased enrollment. Also the Council could investigate the possibilities of building a STUDENT UNION on our campus.

In an event, the present Council, under the leadership of Miss Doris Crader, has done an enviable job under the existing conditions. The leadership of President Loy should serve as a stimulus to both the Student Council and the student body to raise campus standards by democratic action.

CULTURAL ATMOSPHERE

Egyptian staff members and others who occasionally drop in the "lower depths" of Parkinson Lab were surprised to see the digger walls of the corridor leading from the west end of Parkinson basement to the Egyptian office, earlier this week. Lo, these many years they have been hidden from sight by lumber cut from the virgin forests of Southern Illinois, paper boxes manufactured in a Northern metropolis, antique pieces of furniture of little value, obsolete plumbing facilities and a single double-coat bottle with the neck broken off.

It is the consensus of opinion that the change in the interior of Parkinson basement is for the better; however, the vacuum that has been created should be filled, not with board feet and paper boxes but Picasos, Soporitas, Bentons that would lend "cultural atmosphere" and serve to cover up the obvious defects of the passageway.

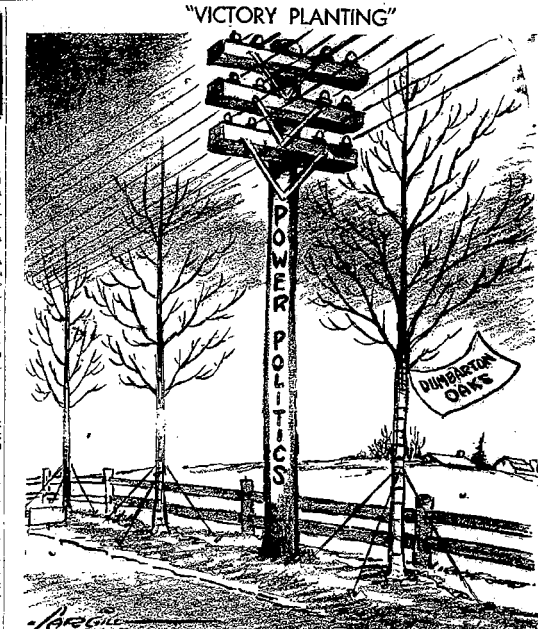
Reporter Hears Council Proceedings I had always wanted to see just how a Student Council meeting was conducted, so after hearing Dean Lentz's fine speech at chapel Tuesday the purpose of such a student organization, attended the Council's meeting this week. There was no important legislation discussed except the necessity of future installation of a bell in Carter's Caf. so that students might know when a new hour had started. Another minor bit of legislation was the electing of a new member to the Board of Publications. After discussing the zoning point or had about the council meetings, I shall leave this report.

My Suggestions Since the revision of the old or the adoption of a new Student Council constitution is being indicated by the Egyptian this week, in line with a Council constitution, I might as well put in my few suggestions. To me the chief objection to the present constitution is the lack of provision and the failure of the high educational standing of the members. This does not mean that all members should have an A average, but rather that the minimum should be some requirement as to the number of hours one must carry to be eligible for election. That sort of about at least be as high as that set for athletes, 12 quarter hours per semester. Under the present set-up, one could sign up for a two hour course in one department, make a C or one system group behind him the next week and elect. Some law that should be included in the new constitution is a clause which would require the use of voting booths. Then the student will be able to vote without party leaders and election officials influencing their votes. After all, this is not Chicago.

ILLINOIS' CONSTITUTION NEEDS STREAMLINING

Naturally being opposition resulted, mainly because many felt a state income tax Governor Green seems to think that taxes on food and other essentials could be lifted. The state is greatly displeased to favor this, and such action appears to give Green an advantage in a down state election.

SOUTHERN'S SHARE IN RECONSTRUCTION

The World Student Relief is the Southern student's opportunity to express their solidarity with fellow-students all over the world who are victims of war. The W.S.S.R. provides aid where it is needed most on an international, inter-racial, non-sectarian, and non-political basis. It means "reconstruction" now. Why is this important to the student at Southern? Have you a friend or brother in a prison camp? He could tell you — one dollar of your money will supply him with notebooks and paper for a month. The students of today hold the future in their hands. They are the potential leaders of tomorrow. The world must be built again and built anew. The people who will do it are in large measure the young people of today in every part of the world — students of the social sciences, of law or medicine, of engineering, theology, languages, the arts. But where are these students? Some of them have been in prison for three or four years; some are refugees and still others are starving. World Student Relief is reconstruction — and it does not have to wait until after the war. It cannot wait if we are to salvage the leadership for the great period of rebuilding ahead. Student relief is the Southern student's share in the building of a better world. Will you do your part in the W.S.S.R. Drive which started this week.

STUDENT COUNCIL CONSTITUTION

PREAMBLE "The wisest possible student participation consists with an orderly and efficient administration is a fundamental principle of the personnel policy of the college. For the promotion of the most effective student participation, a Student Council has been created to give the student body a voice in the formulation and execution of student objectives to integrate student activities to inform the student body of the aims, policies, and ideals of the college, and to cultivate among students a spirit of loyalty in the ideals of the college.

The Student Council bears the same functional relation to the student body that the Senate bears to the faculty. The Council membership consists of four representatives of Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, and Senior classes (two men and two women) elected by each class to serve one year. By invitation two members of the Council sit in the Council of Administration.

The meetings, procedures, and authority of the Student Council are defined in this constitution. Its only power lies in the election of the administration. Specifically it has jurisdiction over student participation, appointment of student members of various administrative committees, the formulation and presentation to the administration of petitions expressing student interests.

An advisory committee of three faculty members gives consultative advice to the Student Council, but does not, except by invitation or direct authority of the administration, participate in Council deliberation. Any semblance of faculty domination or pressure is avoided, genuine being considered to freedom of student action and a high sense of student responsibility.

Article 1. Name and Object Section 1. The name of this organization shall be the Student Council of the Southern Illinois Normal University; and shall be referred to hereinafter as the Council.

Section 2. The object of this Council shall be: (a) to give the student body a voice in the government of the college; (b) to provide a means for the formulation and expression of student opinion; (c) to integrate student activities; (d) to inform the student body of the aims, policies, and ideals of the college; (e) to cultivate a spirit of loyalty to the ideals of the College among students and alumni.

Article 2. Organization Section 1. The Council shall be composed of sixteen members as follows: two men and two women to be elected by each of the classes; freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior.

Section 2. The officers of the Council shall be: (a) President, elected by the Council; (b) Vice-president, elected by the Council; (c) Secretary, with pay and without vote, outside the membership of the Council.

Section 3. Officers appointed and elected, shall serve one year or until their successors are chosen.

Section 4. A steering committee, consisting of the president and two members elected by the Council, shall appoint all committees within the Council.

Article 3. Meetings Section 1. Meetings of the Council shall be held every week at a time and place fixed by the Council.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Council may be held on call of the president or the Council, or by petition of four members of the Council or seventy-five students.

Section 3. Any student group or faculty group is entitled to a hearing before the Council. For this purpose a properly authorized spokesman or committee of not more than three at this meeting may appear before the Council.

Section 4. A complete record of the minutes of the Council shall be kept and published in the Egyptian.

Section 5. Three-fourths of the membership of the Council shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 6. Membership in the Council shall automatically be canceled for non-attendance at three consecutive meetings. A student who fails to attend three consecutive meetings shall be held by special election authorized by the Council.

Section 7. Petitions to the Council on matters other than those of petition to the constitution of the Council may be made by petition to a referendum of the student body. All such petitions must bear honorable signatures of not less than 10 percent of the student body. The Council may or may not call such questions to a referendum. A referendum shall require a majority of the student's vote.

Article 4. Duties of the Officers Section 1. The President, in addition to the usual duties of a presiding officer, may exercise his right to vote on all matters on which the Council shall take action. Section 1. The Election Committee of the Council shall exercise control over the elections of the Council and classes including classes.

A. Elections of the Student Council shall follow these general rules: 1. There shall be four election groups: Freshman Sophomore, Junior, and Senior.

2. Each election group shall elect two men and two women from its class.

3. Sophomore, Junior, and Senior members of the Council shall be elected to serve for a period of one year beginning the 11th week of the Spring term.

4. Temporary freshman representatives to the Council shall be appointed the third week of the fall term by the consent of Men and Women and shall hold office until the formal election of freshman Council members which shall be held the third week of the Winter term. The nominations shall precede the final election by one week.

5. A composite grade point of 3.0 point shall be required for eligibility to the Council.

6. The Election Committee of the Council shall direct the nominations and the election process with the Constitution and By-Laws. In the election as well as in any other election coming in the jurisdiction of the Election Committee, no nominees for office shall list at the polls during the final election.

7. The Council shall direct the nominations and elections of Council members and class officers shall be published in the Egyptian.

8. Vacancies due to Council members failing to return to school shall be filled by the consent of the class. In the case of a vacancy occurring during midterms shall be filled within three weeks of the date of vacancy. The nomination and election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws.

9. In the case of a vacancy in the office of the Council signed by not less than 30% of the voting group shall require the Council to submit a vote the question of "whether or not this certain member shall be recalled from the Council." On this ballot shall be printed the name of the member in question; if a person votes "YES" he shall on the same ballot have the opportunity to name the member in question; if a majority of those voting vote to recall the individual, the individual shall no longer be a member of the Council and a vacancy shall exist. To fill this vacancy, five persons receiving the highest number of nominations votes shall be placed on the final ballot and the election be held the following week.

Article 6. Proposed amendments to this constitution must be submitted in writing two weeks before action by the Council. To become effective they must be passed by a three-fourths majority of the Council and be ratified by the majority of the vote of the student body.
