The Board may be interested to know the program of this year's Music Festival, which differs somewhat from similar occasions in the past.

#### MUSIC FESTIVAL, 1927.

Tuesday evening, May 10, 8 o'clock—Demonstration of Music in the Training School.

Wednesday evening, May 11, 8 o'clock—"Queen of the Sea," a cantata by Hummel, presented by the Girls' Glee Club.

Thursday evening, May 12, 8 o'clock—Concert by the Max Steindel Quartet from the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra.

Friday evening, May 13, 8 o'clock—Concert by the College Chorus, Glee Clubs, and Orchestra.

Saturday morning, May 14, 9 o'clock—Music Memory Contest by the School.

It is hardly necessary to call the attention of the Board to the necessity for the reinstatement of the sum of \$303,748 which was deducted from our budget by the Department of Finance. Without its share of these funds, this school cannot maintain a proper standard of instruction. It is not to the credit of our Teachers Colleges that so many other institutions can and do pay better salaries and, in not a few schools, excel us in equipment.

The need for an appropriation of \$900,000 for the Revolving Fund is so apparent that the mere statement of the fact should be sufficient.

It seems very desirable that the appropriations for salaries and wages for the regular year of thirty-six weeks and for the summer school of twelve weeks should be in one sum, this sum to be distributed by the Normal School Board instead of divided in the appropriation bill.

Another effort ought to be made to give the Normal School Board the same control in the spending of money appropriated that the Board of Regents of the University has. I have some reason for thinking that if a decided effort were made now to bring this about, it might be successful.

President Lord stressed the imperative need of the restitution of the \$303,748 to the budget askings for the five teacher training institutions. He also called attention to the need of increasing the revolving fund so as to include all the amounts turned in by the five institutions.

President Lord also reported the action of the Normal School Council on the matter of greater uniformity on the proposal to consolidate graduation of students and the issuing of diplomas as nearly as possible on one day in the year. He gave the following statements as an agreement of the five presidents:

"Concerning the matter of diplomas which was referred by the Board to the presidents, this is our recommendation: that we report to the Board at its May meeting the names of all who may be graduated in June, July, or August, and send the diplomas for signatures at the same time; that the plan be not mandatory until the year 1927-28; that the date of the diploma be the date of the delivery."

2. The per capita cost is one-third or one-half the per capita cost in colleges and universities.
3. A 6% increase in salaries of persons now employed is needed to bring their salaries to a point 50% above what they received before the war.
4. Six additional faculty members are needed to care for classes which should be formed to reduce large classes to 40 or less.
5. Janitors must be added to care for the new gymnasium.
6. The administration building is being damaged due to a leaky roof.
7. A new sewer system must be developed to remove septic tanks from the campus and care for the new gymnasium.
8. The campus walks are only 3 feet to 3 ft. 6 inches wide. The drives have never been paved or surfaced. The present drives are fourteen to sixteen feet wide.
9. The old gymnasium should be made into a library since our present library will only accommodate 125 students. This will cost \$25,000.
10. This is the only teachers college in Illinois without a special training school building. Some of the children here must recite in basement rooms and cloak rooms. A new building will cost \$275,000 and nothing less will meet the needs.

2. The executive committee of the Federation of Alumni Associations at Western has directed the alumni secretary to send the same material as set forth above to each alumnus of the school in Illinois with the request that he put the needs of the college before the members of the General Assembly who represent his district.

3. The local luncheon clubs have become interested and are asking other clubs to cooperate with them in putting the facts before the public.

### X. SUMMARY.

1. Your approval of the faculty list and salary schedule for the first summer term is requested.

## MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD.

Upon the call of the Chairman and the Secretary, the Normal School Board met Thursday morning, May 19, 1927, in the office of Director A. M. Shelton, 130 North Wells Street, Chicago, at 9:30 A. M.

The roll call showed the following members present: Messrs. Bridges, Blair, Capen, Cole, Loebner, Shelton and Walker.

Absent: Messrs. Allen and Still, and Mrs. Northam.

The Chairman stated the object of the meeting as set forth in the call to receive and act upon the report of the committee appointed by the Board to select and recommend a successor to President J. Stanley Brown, whose resignation becomes effective July 1, 1927.

Mrs. Northam, the chairman of the committee, who had done most of the work in corresponding with candidates, was unavoidably prevented from being present on account of an engagement at Danville, Illinois. The other two members of the committee, Messrs. Cole and Blair, were called upon to present the report.

In substance, the report was that the committee had investigated the qualifications of more than thirty persons who had been considered for the position. At the first meeting of the committee, it was decided that the best person available in the entire country who could be secured for the available salary, should be selected and reported to the Board.

After such consideration and several meetings of the committee, a list of six persons out of the larger number was selected with a view to having them make personal visits. This list was also presented to educational people over the country, asking them to express an opinion as to the relative merits of these men for the place.

After five months of such consideration and study, the committee reached the unanimous conclusion that Mr. Joseph C. Brown, President of the State Teachers College at St. Cloud, Minnesota, was altogether the best person whom the committee could recommend. The following brief summary of his academic and professional qualifications and teaching experience was given:

### "ACADEMIC AND PROFESSIONAL TRAINING.

1. Graduated in 1901 from Hanover College, Indiana, as valedictorian.
2. Did graduate work at Teachers College, Columbia University, in connection with teaching from 1910 to 1915.
3. Received Masters Degree in 1915 from Columbia University.
4. He is a co-author of the following books: The Teaching of Arithmetic; Modern Business Arithmetic; Junior High School Mathematics; Arithmetic for the Grades; and Number Helps.
5. He has also translated and summarized a large number of monographs for the Bureau of Education, Washington, D. C., and has contributed articles to the Elementary School Journal, School Science and Mathematics, Teachers College Record, Educational Administration and Supervision, and School and Society.



## TEACHING EXPERIENCE.

1. Teacher of mathematics, high school, Noblesville, Indiana, two years.
2. Superintendent of schools at Paoli, Indiana, one year.
3. While serving in this place, he was elected to a place in the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College, Charleston, in 1904, and taught in that institution down to 1910.
4. In 1910 he accepted a position in the mathematics department, Horace Mann School, in connection with the Teachers College at Columbia University.
5. In 1916 he was elected to succeed Lotus D. Coffman as instructor in the Teachers College of the University of Illinois. Here he stayed for one year, until his election to the presidency of the State Teachers College at St. Cloud, Minnesota, in 1916.
6. During the last half of the summer sessions of 1925 and 1926 he gave courses in the University of Chicago on normal school administration and supervision. He is invited to give this course in the summer of 1927.

## RECOGNITION.

He has been president of the National Society for the Study of Education, president of the Normal School and Teachers College Department of the National Education Association, president of the Minnesota Education Association, and president of the Minnesota Society for the Study of Education.

Mr. Brown was born in 1879 and was married in 1905. He has two children, a daughter who is a junior in the University of Minnesota, and a son who is a junior in the high school."

The committee had asked Mr. J. C. Brown if he would accept the position if elected by the Board. Before making answer he desired to come before the committee with certain questions and to visit the college at DeKalb. After having presented these questions to the committee and having visited at DeKalb, he again met the committee. After discussing the matter, he said that he could not give definite answer until he returned to St. Cloud and conferred with some of the officials of the school, and then he would give the committee a definite answer.

On Monday, May 16th, he notified the committee that he would accept the appointment if elected and notified before Friday, May 20th.

At the conclusion of the report, Mr. Blair moved that the Board elect Mr. Joseph C. Brown president of the Northern Illinois Teachers College for the year beginning July 1, 1927, at an annual salary of \$6500, with the understanding that he might finish certain courses of lectures which he had engaged to give in the University of Minnesota. This motion was seconded by Mr. Cole. After discussion by the members of the Board, on roll call Mr. J. C. Brown was unanimously chosen president. The Secretary of the Board was instructed to wire Mr. Brown that the Board was unanimous in his appointment, and that he would have the united support of the Board, the State administration, the faculty, the student body of the college, and the school officers, superintendents, principals, and teachers of northern Illinois.

The Board adjourned.

We are arranging next year for training teachers for rural schools in four large, easily accessible, rural schools. The school district will pay to the teacher the highest salary ever paid in the district and will provide janitor service and all needed equipment and supplies. The Normal University will pay enough additional salary to secure a qualified training teacher, and will also pay for the transportation of the student teachers.

Our service in the Price and Houghton Schools the past year has been satisfactory to parents and school boards.

We still are expecting to restore our extension and home study service to the teachers of central Illinois. Two of our faculty, Messrs. Schroeder and Harper, have conducted extension classes the past year at Joliet and Springfield in addition to their regular duties.

#### V. THE CURRICULUM.

The faculty recommend that after September 1, 1929, no person shall be granted a diploma unless in three fourths of the courses taken the grade is above 74 percent or above rank D. This recommendation agrees with the requirement of certain standardizing associations.

#### VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

A new floor has been installed in the women's shower room in the new gymnasium and about 8000 square feet of new sidewalks have been laid since your last meeting. The new campus lights covered by the remainder of the appropriation are not yet authorized.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES. No report.

#### VIII. STUDENT LIFE.

Annie Keller, who gave her life for her pupils in the Greene County tornado of April 19, was for three summers a student at the Normal University. The students have raised \$250 as a memorial fund.

## II. FACULTY.

## 1. Resignations and recommendations:

Miss Jennie Roberts, teacher of art, has recently become director of art in the city schools of Casper, Wyoming, at \$2500 a year. We recommend to succeed her Miss Alma Anderson, who has a bachelor's degree from the University of North Dakota and seven years experience as teacher of art in St. Paul, Minnesota, and the city schools of LaCrosse, Wisconsin, at a salary of \$2000 for thirty-six weeks.

For the position left vacant by the leave of absence given to Mr. Phipps at the last meeting we recommend Mr. Howard W. Gould of James Millikin University who has a bachelor's degree from McKenzie College and a master's degree from the University of Illinois and about half of his work for a doctor's degree. His salary for nine months is to be \$2400, as a teacher of physics.

For the place of Miss Valene Badgley, who has been serving as an assistant in the library, we recommend Miss Annette Badgley, who has recently graduated from the University of Illinois, at a salary of \$1000 for thirty-six weeks.

For an additional teacher in the department of education we recommend Mr. C. H. LeVitt who has a bachelor's degree and a master's degree from Columbia University, has had sixteen different courses in education, and has been Superintendent of schools at Savanna, Illinois, for the past ten years, at a salary of \$3000 for thirty-six weeks.

Up to date we have no one to recommend for the vacancy in mathematics made by the resignation of Miss Anna Parmelee nor for the vacancy made by the resignation of Mrs. Mabel Meyers, a first grade critic.

As President Brown's recommendations with respect to the faculty for the next year involved several important matters, its further consideration was deferred to the subsequent meeting of the Board.

President Brown told how he had invited his successor, Mr. J. C. Brown, to come to DeKalb and confer over the recommendations for the coming year. This fine attitude of helpfulness on the part of the retiring president was appreciated by the Board.

On motion the incoming president, Mr. J. C. Brown, was given a salary of \$7500.

The Chairman called upon Mr. Blair to introduce the new college president to the members of the Board. He briefly sketched the activities of the committee which was appointed by the Board to select the new president of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College; how out of 36 applicants the committee had selected six persons as of such outstanding qualities as to warrant a personal interview; how these six persons had been interviewed by the Board, and how in the end the committee was unanimous for the selection of Mr. J. C. Brown, and how upon the report of this committee to the Board, the Board had unanimously chosen Mr. J. C. Brown. Mr. Blair referred to the fact of Mr. Lord's association with Mr. Brown and asked that he say a word. Mr. Lord spoke in the highest appreciation of the qualities of scholarship, character and personality which Mr. Brown possessed. He predicted for him a long and useful career as president of the school.

Mr. Brown was then introduced. He spoke of his great appreciation of the courtesy and kindness shown to him by President J. Stanley Brown in going over the details of the situation with him. He stated that he did not deem it his duty or within his power to make recommendations to the Board until after he assumed the presidency. He believed that such changes as had been recommended would have to be worked out between the Board and President J. Stanley Brown. The presidents of the schools and the members of the Board present extended a hearty greeting and welcome to President J. C. Brown.

Mrs. Northam suggested that a committee be appointed to draft a statement of the appreciation of the Board of Mr. Charles Capen who had passed away since the last meeting of the Board. It was also sug-

gested that a statement of appreciation from the Board to the retiring president of the DeKalb Teachers College, Mr. J. Stanley Brown, should be offered at the next meeting of the Board. Upon motion a committee of Mr. Cole, Mrs. Northam and President Felmley was elected to prepare these statements.

The members of the Board present desired an early meeting of the Board to take final action upon the matters which had been approved at this meeting. It was agreed by those present that the Chairman of the Board should be asked to call a meeting of the Normal School Board at 2:00 P. M., Chicago time, Monday, June 27th, in Director Shelton's office at 130 North Wells Street, Chicago.

1. The following teachers are leaving the institution for the reasons indicated:

William Strickland, assistant physical director for men, will accept a better salary at Pittsfield, Illinois, in the high school.

Fern Robbins Way, assistant librarian, married during the year and will discontinue teaching for the present.

Charmian Pugh, training teacher, has been filling a temporary position, and will attend Columbia University next year.

Josephine Speicher, assistant in the music department, has been filling a temporary position and the regular teacher will return.

Ransom Harvey, teacher of physics, has been filling a temporary position. The regular teacher will return.

Virginia Greer, assistant in drawing and design, has been filling a temporary position while a suitable person could be found for the head of the department. These arrangements have been completed.

2. The following teachers are asking for a leave of absence for the purposes stated:

Gerald Pugh, assistant in manual training, to work for his master's degree at Teachers College, Columbia University.

Beulah Mitchell, training school teacher, to work for her master's degree at the University of Chicago.

Mildred Mead, training teacher, to work for her bachelor's degree at Columbia University.

Wilbur Greer, assistant in chemistry, to work for his master's degree at Iowa State College at Ames, Iowa.

W. A. Cleveland, head of the Department of Agriculture, to work for his master's degree, undecided where.

3. The following teachers are returning after a leave of absence for the purposes indicated:

Caroline Grote, dean of women, has been attending Columbia University working for her master's degree, which she received in June, 1927.

Claude J. Hesh, assistant in geography, has been at the University of Wisconsin working for his master's degree, which he completed except his thesis.

Alyce O. Cain, assistant in music, has been at Teachers College, Cedar Falls, Iowa, where she worked for her bachelor's degree which she received at the end of the year.

W. H. Eller, teacher of physics and director of the school band, has been at the University of Michigan working for his master's degree which he received in June.

4. The following teachers are recommended:

Miss Gladys Vawter, who has been temporarily employed during the year, to take overflow classes, and who is a graduate of the Western Illinois State Teachers College and who received her master's degree from Columbia University in June, 1926, is recommended as an assistant professor in the department of English, at a salary of \$2160.

Miss Mary Draser, who graduated from the two year normal school course at the Western Illinois State Teachers College in 1915, and who received her bachelor's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, and also received her master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University in June, 1927, and who was an assistant in the art department in the Northern Illinois State Teachers College for a number of years and who has been head of the department of drawing and design in the State Teachers College at Commerce, Texas, since that time, is recommended for the head of the drawing and design department at a salary of \$2385.

Mr. Carl L. Runkle, who finished the four year college course in the Western Illinois State Teachers College in 1924, and who has been teaching in the high school at Youngstown, Illinois, is recommended to teach in our training school in the place of Miss Mitchell, who is asking for a leave of absence, at a salary of \$1500.

Mr. Roy M. Sallee, who is a teacher of several years of experience, and who graduated from the two year course at the Western Illinois State Teachers College some years ago and completed his work for his master's degree at the University of Illinois in June, 1927, with the exception of one-half unit, is recommended as an assistant professor in the department of biology at a salary of \$1980.

Mrs. Julia Moore, who was assistant librarian at one time and later finished her library course at the University of Illinois, is recommended as assistant librarian at a salary of \$1350.

Mr. Rayman Miller, who graduated from the four year course at the Western Illinois State Teachers College in 1924, and who has since been teaching manual training at Winchester, Illinois, is recommended as assistant in manual training at a salary of \$1620.

This leaves the following positions unfilled: assistant in the department of chemistry; one training school position; one teacher of Latin; one teacher of history, one-half time; a number of subordinate positions which are usually filled by advanced students. These will be reported later.

Mr. James C. Burns, who has been in the institution with the exception of about four years since it was opened, has asked to be released from part of his work. It is recommended, therefore, that he be put on a half time schedule at \$1440.

The salary schedule follows, indicating names of faculty, position held, former salary, and salary recommended, with proper totals carried down. These schedules are made out showing the funds from which they are to be paid.

President Felmley when called upon recommended to the Board that the policy of a sabbatical year be adopted by the Teachers Colleges, granting one year in every seven to members of the faculty on half pay. The matter was referred to the President's Council for further consideration and recommendation. His faculty list, with salaries as presented to and approved by the Board at Springfield on June 20, and as printed in the minutes of that meeting, was approved by the full Board. President Felmley's salary was fixed at \$7500 per annum.

Mr. Allen moved that Mr. Bridges be reemployed as Business Manager of the Board at the present salary of \$6000 a year. During the discussion of this motion the question was raised as to how the salary would be paid. The motion was carried.

At the meeting on June 20 a committee consisting of Mr. Cole, Mrs. Northam and President Felmley was appointed to draft suitable resolutions on behalf of the Board for Mr. Charles Capen and President J. Stanley Brown. This committee made its report, which was adopted and is made a part of these minutes. The following are the resolutions:

#### CHARLES LABAN CAPEN.

For the first time in the history of the State Normal School Board was called upon to mourn the death of an active member.

Charles Laban Capen has served more years in directing the policies of our normal schools than any other member of this body, and he brought to this task eminent fitness for the service.

He was descended from the best stock in the country, the New Englanders that moved westward over New York State on to the middle west and the Pacific, usually keeping to the north of the forty-first parallel, the stock that has furnished so much of the intellectual and moral leadership to the development of our national life.

He was graduated from the Normal University in 1865 and the next fall entered Harvard, which was just entering upon that period of liberal and progressive expansion that made it for half a century easily first among American universities. His life was dominated by the principle and ideals of that noble institution. After his graduation in 1869 he entered upon the study and practice of law. His loyalty to the highest principle of his profession won for him an exalted place in the esteem of his associates.

In February, 1893, he was appointed by Governor Altgeld a member of the State Board of Education that for sixty years guided the affairs of the Normal University until replaced in 1917 by the present State Normal School Board. For several years he served as its president. During all these years he took his duties seriously. He was never so busy but he could find time to visit the normal school at least twice a month; he kept in touch with the work, acquainted with its faculty, and ready to lend his counsel and aid in all important matters. At all social functions he was an honored guest. The various contests, platform entertainments, and lecture course numbers found him an interested auditor. Next to his family, and his profession the Normal University occupied the largest place.

Mr. Capen was always a student. The best magazines, the books that educated and thoughtful men were reading were on his table. It often seemed to his friends that he ought to have been a teacher rather than a lawyer; for his interest in young people, his faith in higher education, his passion for sharing his intellectual treasures with others, his work for many years as instructor and dean of the Wesleyan Law School marked him as eminently fitted for this service.

He was always interested in political affairs. Although by inheritance and early training he was a Republican, he later became identified with the reform movement that culminated in the election of Grover Cleveland to the presidency. His associates nominated him repeatedly for mayor and for county judge; but his party was the minority party in Bloomington and McLean County; he was not elected.

Mr. Capen's devotion to principle was one of his most marked characteristics. He would not compromise with his convictions. Having been once convinced that a proposed course of action was right, he persisted in it even to certain defeat. Yet he was a good loser, and accepted defeat philosophically and in true accord with his democratic code. He would often say: "Well, we have done our duty. What more can be asked?"

On Thursday, May 19, 1927, he attended the meeting of the State Normal School Board in Chicago. At the home of his daughter, Mrs. Percy Eckhart he was taken ill the following night. He was able to return home on Friday

but his illness returned. He soon became unconscious and passed peacefully beyond at 8:45 P. M., Saturday, May 21. A gentleman of the Old School! No finer example has lived among us.

PRESIDENT J. STANLEY BROWN.

The State Normal School Board desires to recognize in fitting manner the valuable service rendered to the normal schools of Illinois by President J. Stanley Brown who this week severs his connection with their work.

For fifteen years while principal of the Joliet Township High School he served as one of the most punctual, active, and faithful members of the State Board of Education and of the State Normal School Board. His intimate knowledge of high school problems and high school conditions proved of great value in the deliberations of the Board. For the past eight years he has served as the second president of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College during the difficult period of recovery from the effects of the great war, when the funds available for the financing of the school fell far short of meeting the needs.

Yet his work was accomplished with marked success. He has raised the standards of scholarship, built up the attendance, attracted many young men to the school, and has added to its growing reputation as one of the foremost teachers colleges of the country. His pioneer work in developing the junior college in connection with a high school organization, his active participation in the councils of the National Education Association, his outstanding leadership in social and civic organizations, have been additional features of a brilliant career as an educator.

We trust that his remaining years may be years of continued service and honor in the cause to which he has devoted his life.
