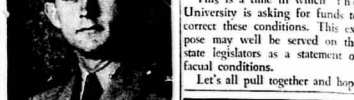

The Veterans Administration recently issued a checklist of deadlines before which eligible veterans of the Korean conflict period must act if they wish to take advantage of certain benefits.

Most of the deadlines resulted from the President's proclamation setting Jan. 31, 1955, as the end of the Korean conflict period governing eligibility for the benefits.

One of the most important deadlines not affected by the President's proclamation requires that eligible veterans who wish to go to school or train under the Korean GI Bill must start training within three years after they leave service of forfeit all further rights to the benefits.

This requirement is contained in the law itself and, therefore, was not affected by the President's proclamation.

Those who start their education or training within the required three-year period must complete their Korean GI Bill Training by Jan. 31, 1963, or eight years after discharge, whichever is earlier.

For GI loans on homes, farms or businesses, eligible veterans of the Korean conflict period now have until Jan. 31, 1965 to receive a VA guaranty of insurance as a result of the President's proclamation.

For vocational rehabilitation under Public Law 894, eligible disabled veterans of the Korean conflict period must start in time to finish their rehabilitation by Jan. 31, 1964, or nine years after separation.

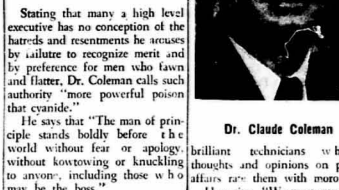

Flattery is Poisonous, Says SIU English Prof

"They have lost their freedom," says an SIU professor, speaking of men who kowtow and knuckle their way to job advancement.
In the current "Forum" publication of Phi Eta Sigma, freshman honor society, Dr. Claude Coleman of the English department, depicts the average administrator as surrounding himself with "sycophants who bring him only sycophantic information as they feel, he wants to hear."
Stating that many a high level executive has no conception of the hatreds and resentments he arouses by a desire to recognize merit and by preference for men who fawn and flatter, Dr. Coleman calls such authority "more powerful poison than cyanide."
He says that "The man of principle stands boldly before a c world without fear or apology without knowing or knuckling to anyone, including those who may be his boss."
Reflecting that among many millions of persons only one here and there stands out as a man of character, Dr. Coleman places Thoreau, Socrates and Jesus Christ among these. He describes them as poor men who occupied private stations in life, free of the encumbrances of bosses.



Dr. Claude Coleman brilliant technicians whose thoughts and opinions on public affairs rate them with mortals." He writes, "We must save what we can of a once free society. We must live free lives as free men without fear or investigation, without regard for favor of advancement, without concern for physical comfort."

But even men who do not occupy private stations in life, who are a part of our complex, industrial society, can with courage and intelligence live free lives, he says. "Unintelligent though it is not worth much, Dr. Coleman continues, "Some young men feel that if they become specialists of some sort, other people can take care of government and public affairs."

Floyd Krubek Resigns To Take Post With Nebraska State U.
Dr. Floyd E. Krubek resigned his position in the Industrial Arts Department Monday to accept an offer from Nebraska State Teachers College at Kearney.
