Job Insecurity

A study conducted among 80 colleges and 80 corporations by Bernard Halldane, a career counseling specialist, who is president of Executive Job Counselors, Inc., founder of the Career Development Institute, and Professor at Wagner College, revealed that 30 out of 100 job graduates leave their jobs before the first year is over. Fifteen more will change jobs before the first year is over.

According to the survey, this turnover and job insecurity among college graduates are the result of many causes, among them, inadequate recruitment and training by industry, as well as inadequate job counseling and career development by colleges.

"Although finding the first job comparatively easy, finding the right job was a problem that has plagued many students for many years," Mr. Halldane pointed out. The graduates themselves who often jump at the first job offer without understanding their own career objectives, the study showed, spend an average of only \$27.40 to help find the first job—\$7 for resumes, 40 cents for telephone calls, \$5 for transportation and lunches and \$15 in employment agency fees. Only 50 per cent of the graduates found jobs through college placement departments, although when placed in a non-metropolitan area only 50 per cent used this college facility. Less than 10 per cent used employment agencies, and the remaining 50 per cent found their jobs through friends or relatives, or through their own job campaigns.

Southern Acres Union Adopts New Schedule

Square dances are held on the second and fourth Saturday nights of each month. An admission charge of one dollar per couple will be charged for the square dances to pay for a professional caller. Some of the Saturday night dances held for the residence halls will also be scheduled for Southern Acres.

A first movie was shown Friday night and another will be shown this Friday. Seven Friday week-end comedies "The Good Earth" and "Daniel Boone". In the future full length feature films will also be scheduled for Southern Acres.

A tournament, which started last week, includes such activities as pool, table tennis, and ping-pong.

The test will not take more than one hour. A list of persons who have passed the test will be posted outside the Registrar's Office the next week.

After a few minutes of being told to go "Deeper and deeper into sleep, Jan's eyes closed and her head slumped to the side. Her breathing became very slow and her body appeared completely relaxed. Jan is one of the many students who have

The telephone rang while Jan was asleep. The disturbance caused Jan to frown. Later she said "I heard a noise, but didn't know what it was." At other times she had an appearance of deep concentration on her face.

Dr. Cunningham Demonstrates Hypnotism

"Now I want you to relax and go deeper into sleep."

At this point she was told "You are sound asleep." "You can't be waken until I tell you to. You are very relaxed. You will feel completely relaxed when you are waken."

"I have done a considerable amount of work in age regression," Cunningham said as he stroked his graying hair. "This is something that is possible only with those who can go into a very deep hypnotic sleep."

Among them is a metronome which contains a bright red light which goes on and off at whatever interval is desired.

Dr. Cunningham is chairman of the Department of Geography at Southern. He has given hypnotic demonstrations before psychology classes here and to many clubs and organizations in Southern Illinois.

Cunningham watched on the light and lifted her from the chair as he continued talking.

"For some reason I have never attempted to regress anyone beyond the third birthday. I expect to do this in the future. Especially since reading career news stories."

"There are so many," he said. "I hypnotized a student one evening half an hour before she took my final examination. While she was under hypnosis I gave her several post-hypnotic suggestions designed chiefly to relax her. She wrote her best examination for me that night."

In Keiper, a part-time student secretary for Dr. Cunningham for the past two years, contacted. He used as a subject for a demonstration for the Egyptian.

Cunningham switched on the light and lifted her from the chair as he continued talking.

"Age regression," Cunningham said seriously, "is not something new. Wolberg in a book entitled 'Medical Hypnosis' tells of regressing an adult to the point where he sucked his thumb. Others have claimed regression back to the first year after their birth. We know that age regression can be carried out in certain individuals even to the point of the behavior patterns they had at a particular age. There have been many experiments to substantiate this."

"She will not go into a deep sleep," Cunningham said. "The difference is that in the deep sleep, the hypnotist is dealing with the subconscious mind. In the light sleep you can only talk to the conscious mind."

"This has been my main interest in hypnosis for the past few years," Cunningham said with a twinkle in his eye. "Although I do give various demonstrations and lectures on the subject."

Cagers Win 2; Down Eastern 80-66; Topple Huskies 77-67

SIU moved into second place in the IAC cage race with an impressive 80-66 triumph over Eastern Illinois here Thursday night. The Salukis had dropped the Panthers 87-83 earlier this year.

The first half was a wild and woolly affair as the score was knotted 13 times and the lead changed hands six times, although Eastern had small lead much of the time. The Panthers led at the intermission by a slim 35-30 margin.

The Southerncs came back strong in the second half, scoring 15 points on baskets by Larry Whitlock. Bob Welch and now by Gordon Lambert and free throws by Whitlock, Joe Johnson and Gus Doss, to four points for the Panthers.

The Salukis kept pounding away at the visitors and increased the lead to 59-42 with nine minutes left in the contest. Until this time, the Easterners had scored only one field goal in the second half.

At this point Eastern guard, John Milliholland, broke through the Eastern basket to ring up the second tally for the 200 Panthers.

Welch increased the Southern lead to 17 by dropping in along jump shot from the corner. From this point on, the Southerncs had things their own way as they romped home with an 80-66 win.

Besides moving into runner-up slot in the IAC, the Salukis set a new school rebounding record by grabbing 61.

Another accomplishment of the SIU squad was holding the high scoring Eastern club to its second half of the season. The Panthers came into the game averaging 92 points, fourth highest among the nation's small colleges.

Welch, who came off the bench midway through the first half, was the scoring leader for the Salukis as he hit for 19 points, 6 following.

Welch were Johnson and Whitlock with 18 and 12, respectively. In the double figures was Warren Talley with 10, all in the first half.

Game scoring honors, however, went to Milliholland with 20. 14 of which came in the first half.

SIU's rebounding effort was fairly even as the Salukis hit 29 of 81 shots for 35.8 per cent as compared to 26 of 85 for 30.2 for the Easterners.

The game was decided at the charity stripe where SIU connected on 22 of 33. Eastern hit on only 14 of 19 charity tosses.
