### Miss Southern Contest Opens Activities Today

It's Spring Festival time at Southern Illinois University, and to students, faculty, and administrators alike that phrase means celebration of the largest variety. Advance notices, barring ill feeling from the weather man, point to the largest galaxy of events in Festival history.

### Fifteen To Compete For Miss Southern In Contest Today

Fifteen girls will compete today in the annual Miss Southern contest which is being held as a feature of Spring Festival. The contest will be held this afternoon at 3 p.m. in Shryock auditorium. Afternoon classes will be shortened so that all classes will be dismissed in time for the contest, according to an announcement sent out by the president's office.

**IN THE CONTEST,** the entries will first appear in formals and will make a second appearance in bathing suits. Judges will select five finalists from the fifteen candidates and will notify them shortly after the contest. The finalists will be presented at the Vaudeville show tonight.

The girl receiving the Miss Southern title will be announced at the Spring Festival dance tomorrow night and she will be presented with a trophy. The coronation will be broadcast at 10:30 p.m. tomorrow night.

**THREE JUDGES** have been selected to judge the Miss Southern contest. The judges represent the cities of Herrin, West Frankfort and Marion.

### Dr. Winn To Speak For Honors Day

Dr. Gloria Winn, associate professor of English, has been selected by the Student Council to make the Honors Day address at the annual Honors Day program to be held May 17, according to Dr. Vera Peacock, chairman of the foreign language department and chairman of the Honors Day committee.

A procession into the auditorium will start the program. Marching in the procession will be the honor students, faculty members representing the various departments, and persons giving awards. Deans of the colleges will present the certificates to the honor students.

**INVITATIONS** have been sent by President D. W. Morris to the parents of honor students who are to be in the program. Following the program, a reception will be held, to which the honor students, their parents, and friends are invited.

The Kellogg scholarship which is awarded each year to deserving and needy English majors will be awarded at the honors day program for the first time. This award has been given for the past two years but not on honors day.

The names of students who will receive scholarships and special awards at the program will not be announced in advance.

A list of students who are to be honored at the assembly is posted in the hall of Old Science.

Woody Herman, internationally known band leader, and his orchestra will be featured at the Spring Festival concert and dance, the real highlight of the gala affair. Herman and his Herd will present a concert in Shryock auditorium at 8 p.m. Saturday night, followed by the annual dance in the Men's gym at 9:30 p.m.

Things will get under way this afternoon at 3 p.m. when the Miss Southern contest will take place in the auditorium. Judges for the Miss Southern contest will be Virgil Ames, the Herrin Supply photographer; Carl Sargen of the Sargen Studio in Marion; and Wade Davis of the Davis Studio in West Frankfort.

**THE MISS SOUTHERN** contestants, 15 in all, will appear on stage both in formals and bathing suits. Flowers for this event have been supplied by William Marberry, assistant professor of botany. Admission is free for the Miss Southern contest.

Tonight at 8 p.m., the "Southern Scandals" will be held, also in the auditorium. Admission is 50 cents per person. Co-chairmen Jim Trigg and Betty J. McConnell of the Scandals report that 15 acts will be slated for the show. Many of these acts consist of humorous skits from organized houses, fraternities, and sororities on campus. In addition, other acts are: Freda Clary, song interpretations; Wanda Crabtree, singing; Johnson Hall, song and dance routine; Bill Plater, act sketching; John Freeman and Ralph Wayne, humorous instrumentalists.

Bill Plater, graduate student from Vienna, will act as master of ceremonies for the Scandals. Ed Lunde will act as light director, and Wilma Dummeier will be stage director. Joe Harding will handle sound effects.

**A PARADE THROUGH** downtown Carbondale will keep the ball rolling tomorrow. In the afternoon, the Carnival, Midway, and concessions will be the highlight on the old football field. Gene Johns and Jane Hindman, co-chairmen of the parade, report that there will be about 20 floats and stunts taking an active part in the parade.

Bob Young is chairman of the concessions committee, which has handled all the props for the carnival and midway. Various organizations will have concessions at the carnival Saturday. Half of the proceeds of the carnival this year will go to the World Student Service Fund, an organization for the benefit of needy students all over the world.

**THE AGRICULTURE CLUB** will present its second annual livestock Judging Contest Saturday from 8 to 12 noon. Some 30 high schools will be represented in the

contest, held for the purpose of acquainting FFA members with the rules of judging livestock. Livestock will be supplied by the SIU experimental farm, in conjunction with the Agriculture club on campus.

Woody Herman will be the star of the Spring Festival concert and dance. Herman and his Herd, who have just played an extended engagement at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago, will perform both at the concert and dance. The Old Woodchopper is featuring Dolly Houston, a beautiful vocalist currently starring with his newly organized orchestra.

Southern's World Student Service Fund drive will begin Monday, April 30 with a kick-off assembly in Shryock auditorium at 10 a. m. George Cuikenic, a traveling secretary of the WSSF organization, will speak at the all-school assembly.

Jan Mayer, chairman of the fund drive, has announced that Pat Randle will auction off a collection of talent and steak dinners from the auditorium stage. All the proceeds will go to the Southern WSSF drive.

**IN ADDITION** to the six steak dinners, donated by President D. W. Morris, students, faculty and townspeople will have an opportunity to bid for the services of the following: the Phi Mu Alpha quartet, a faculty quartet, Jane Hall (a Peter Pan reading), Miss Carbondale—Georgia Greenwood, four waitresses, Dolores Hamp, Audrey Mayer, Mary Jo Zumer, and Virginia Stringer, pianist Chuck White, and organist Virgil Fuchs.

The WSSF collections will be started off with a share of the

proceeds of the Spring Carnival Midway. Throughout the week of April 30 to May 4, various student organizations will hold carnival acts and make collections at the main entrance to the campus.

**MONDAY**, the collections will be made by representatives of the ISA. Tuesday, the Interfraternity council will present acts, and Wednesday Girls' Rally and Alpha Phi Omega will be on duty. The Student Christian foundation, Newman club, and Baptist foundation are scheduled to work Thursday, with Anthony Hall and the Pan-Hellenic council slated for Friday.

Cuikenic, main speaker for the assembly, is expected to arrive in Carbondale Sunday evening. He will be at a coffee hour at the Student Christian foundation at 9 a. m. Monday, and will speak at the 12:30 SCF noonday chapel services.

At 2:00, he will talk to Jack McCrary's Race and Minority Group Relations class, and at 3 p. m. he will be interviewed by B. C. Robbins' radio class.

## Second Annual Photo Fair to be Held Sunday

Plans have been completed for Southern's second annual Photo Fair this Sunday, April 29, according to C. William Horrell, instructor in journalism.

An exhibit of 72 prize-winning photos from the 1950 national high school photographic contest will feature the Fair, to be held in the journalism house, corner of Harwood and Route 51, and adjoining buildings.

The fair, held especially for the amateur photographer who shoots pictures and sends the film to the local drug store for developing, will also include demonstrations on improving snapshots, dye trans-

fer printing and simple developing and printing along with a display of photographic work of SIU students.

**THERE WILL BE** a continuous showing of motion pictures on photography.

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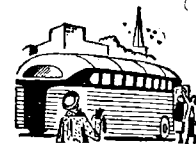
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
