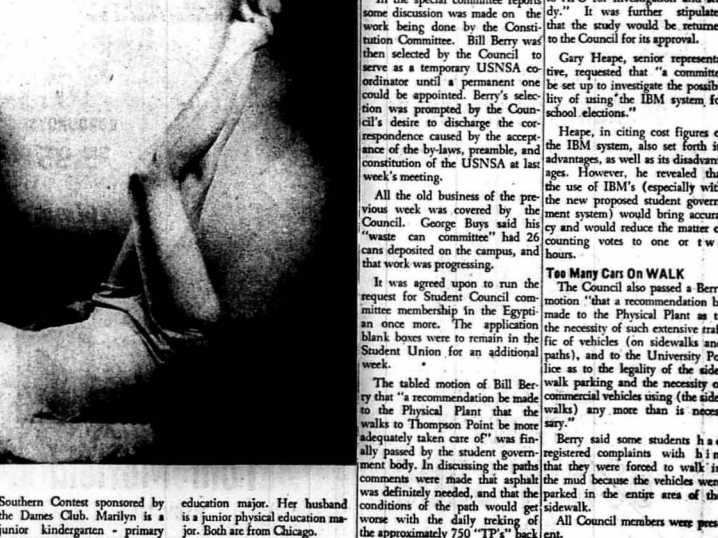
William S. Allen, Chautauqua Housing Project's vice-major, has been appointed Chautauqua's acting Council president for the fall term.

MUSEUM GETS SATIN CAPE

Let's turn back the hands of time—back to the year 1890 and let our minds wander a little.

A young woman, perhaps with shining blonde hair, has just received a package from Australia, the home of her older relatives.

Her big blue eyes might sparkle like diamonds as she unites the package and finds a shimmering brown satin cape.

The satin feels cool against her bare arms as she tries the cape on. Look how the garment fits—around the back and swirling full in front to give room for movement!

The front is drawn tight with brown-threaded loops and tiny satin-covered buttons.

Golden straw has been entwined to form leaf clusters around the bottom of the cape and up the front to the high neckline where the design encircles the neckline.

The cape, now more than 100 years old, is in the possession of the SIU museum.

Miss Francis Barbour, English instructor, gave the cape to the museum after receiving the garment from Mrs. Charles A. Ewing, who resided in Ewing before her death.

"Mrs. Ewing, who was 84 years old at the time of her death in April, 1957," Miss Barbour said, "is the second generation to have the cape, so it must be over 100 years old."

Mrs. Ewing who received the cape from a relative in Australia, was born in England, but came to this country as a baby.

The cape will be on display in the museum in the near future.
