SIU Debaters Open Season

Southern's front-line debate team of Keith Sanders and Brandon opened the season last week at the Thoroughbred Tournament at the University of Kentucky with a "respectable" showing by winning four and losing four rounds.

Altogether 16 top-rated schools participated in the tournament, won by Northwestern University. Coach Jack Parker, whose predominantly underclass debaters won 65 per cent of their tests in 22 tournaments across the U. S. last season, began his second year at SIU.

Headed by the veteran twosome of Keith Sanders, Bestina, and Kent Brandon of Carbondale, defending Midwest Regional champs, the squad is composed of three other experienced teams plus a group of six promising freshmen.

Plenty of Depth
Glenn Hastings of Calumet City and Phil Wander of Bloomington are back as a team. Last year they set a 75 per cent winning mark as freshmen against top competition.

Junior Sharon Loveless, Maion, a 67 per cent performer last year, is paired with Barbara El-

zore, Easton, who won 13 of 21 as a freshman.

Michael Morris, son of President Morris, returns after a year of studying in Peru and will team with Dick Fulkerson, of Carbondale.

Newcomers expected to bolster the "attack" are Robert Altman, Esther Hays and Jeff Barlow of Benton; David Horton of Du Quoin; a debate scholarship winner, Carole Berringer of New Tyler and Randy Richmond, Murphysboro.

All were leading high school debaters.

The Illinois State College Tournament will be fought here March 10-11.

Assistant Coach
Parker this season is Roger Hufford, debate coach the past two years at Northern Illinois University. A former debate squad teammate of Parker at Illinois Normal, he is now a Ph. D. student in the speech department here.

Last year Sanders and Brandon, Southern's powerful duo, represented SIU in the National West Point National Championships, third team in five years to make the trip.

They whipped Southern California on the CBS-TV summer program, "Rebuttal." Hastings and Wander out-pointed Northwestern on the same program.

Transportation Color Movie Will Be Made

The present status and potential of the transportation industry will be a topic of a color motion picture that will be made through a cooperative effort by the National Defense Transportation Assn. and SIU.

Col. Alexander R. MacMillan, director of SIU's Transportation Institute, said Friday the film's objectives are "to inform the general public, dispel misconceptions about transportation, encourage qualified young people to enter transportation as a career, and stimulate interest in transportation education."

He said a professional script writer has been hired. The movie will be shot by a professional film-producing company, not chosen as yet.

The NDTA, in a contractual arrangement made with Southern, said the project aims to produce a film which will present the transportation industry "in all of its branches, including but not limited to air, water, rail, truck, bus, highway, pipeline, communications and forwarders and allied industries, in the light of its vital role in the economy and defense of the nation."

The overall cost is not expected to exceed \$80,000 and the University will seek grants for the non-profit service project with the "full cooperative support and encouragement" of the NDTA.

Dec. 4 — THE AWAKENING, a compelling and touching story of a man torn between her religious vows and maternal instinct. Italian dialog with English subtitles.

Jan. 8—CANGACEIRO, an off beat story of a lawless band of men dedicated to violence and brutality. Portuguese dialog with English subtitles.

Jan. 18 — THE SEVENTH SEAL, Swedish with English subtitles, is a story of the Black Death which ravaged Europe in the 14th century (Furr Auditorium).

Feb. 5 — WHERE MOUNTAINS FLOAT, a tale of the enterprises of Greenlanders and Danes from kayak to cutter — from a hunting culture to fishing.

Feb. 19 — WILLIAMSBURG: STORY OF A PATRIOT, a dramatic historical summary of the turbulent years between imposition of the Stamp Act and the outbreak of the American Revolution.

On the same program, THE TWISTED CROSS, traces the rise and fall of Adolf Hitler and the Nazi movement.

March 5 — THE PHANTOM HORSE, Japanese dialog with English subtitles, is a story of modern Japan.

April 2—MUNNA, Concerns the exploits of a small boy, abandoned to an orphanage in infancy, but not adopted because his caste and creed are unknown.

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Salukis Meet Hurons; Could Cinch Title Tie

Rated No. 1 In NAIA Poll

Southern's Salukis, the nation's No. 1 small college football giant according to this week's National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) poll, meet Eastern Michigan's Hurons tomorrow at 8 p. m. in McAndrew Stadium.

A victory for SIU would cinch a tie for its first I-IAC conference crown. Southern, 4-4 in the conference race and 6-0 for the season, edged Lenoir Rhyne 265-263 in this week's poll.

Records are in the making when Coach Carmen Piccone's squad takes the field tomorrow night in their last home game of the season. In shooting for its first conference title, since the league was

formed in 1950, Southern has only Eastern and Central Michigan between it and a perfect League slate.

The team is also hoping to set a new all-time attendance mark for one season. Last week's 12,000 homecoming fans upped the season total to over 60,000. Tomorrow night's contest is a part of this year's Parent's Day activities.

SIU's field general, quarterback Ron Winter, needs one touchdown aerial to set a new school mark, surpassing the record of six in one season by Joe Huske in 1933. Ron connected on two TD passes in last week's 30-6 drubbing of Illinois State.

Winter, having his best year at the helm, has completed 38 of 83 for 578 yards and his record-tying six touchdowns. In contrast the Carni senior completed 35 of 83 for 323 yards and three TD's last year.

Southern's other record smasher, Amos Bullocks, has carried the load in the Saluki ground attack this year. Amos has carried the ball 110 times in six games, netting 596 yards for a 5.4 average per carry. His 596 total places him 127 yards behind the school rushing mark set by Carver Shannon in 1937.

Bullocks has scored eight touchdowns and eight extra points (four two-point conversions for a scoring total of 56 points). The school record for scoring is also held by Shannon with 90 in 1936.

The Salukis are also approaching another school record. The team record for the most points scored in one season is 224, set by Southern's only unbeaten and untied team... the 1930 Salukis. So far this year, SIU has scored 126 points on 26 touchdowns, 30 extra points, and one safety.

State Department authorities said they do not know whether the proposal for a tour of the Soviet athletes will be carried through at a later date.

The Saluki field general, who tossed two touchdown passes last week against Illinois State, has connected on six TD aerials this season. Ron is tied with Joe Huske, who completed six pawdirt missiles in 1933. Winter completed eight of 16 passes for 111 yards Saturday and has already surpassed his 362 total yards gained in the air last year. The Carni senior has now completed 38 of 83 for 578 yards in six games this season.

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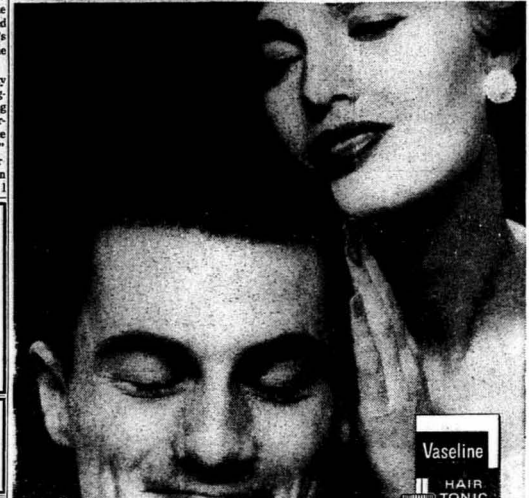

Southern's freshman football team, led by quarterback Dave Harris' two touchdowns, held off a determined Western Illinois junior varsity rally to win, 13-8, Monday afternoon.

Western moved inside the Saluki 10-yard line six times without scoring as the Saluki defense rose to the occasion each time.

The victory was the Saluki's third straight after tying Southeast Missouri, 14-14 in the season opener. It was the second loss of the season for the junior Leaders.

Coach Don Cross' team won their third straight despite Western's use of two varsity backs. Fullback Larry Barnett and halfback Angie Vallejo started against the Saluki varsity and played most of the freshman game at Litchfield. Barnett scored the only Leatherneck TD in the fourth period on a 15-yard trap play. He also added the extra point on a plunge.

All deer hunters must carry valid deer hunting permits obtainable only from the Illinois Department of Conservation, Springfield.

Other hunters are either throwing out decoys from their boats or putting up a last bit of cover on their blinds before the duck season blasts off.
