Trial Expected to Begin Today

Fred Sinroll, former SIU sophomore from Sterling, is expected to go on trial this morning in Jackson County Circuit Court at Murphyboro.

Sinroll is charged with first-degree murder in the fatal shooting of his roommate, Robert Batura, on Dec. 12, 1956. Batura was a member of the Saluki football team.

Eighty prospective jurors have been summoned for the trial and it is anticipated that most of the first day's proceedings will be given to selecting a final jury.

The shooting occurred about midnight Dec. 12 in the boys' rooming house at 713 South Illinois Avenue, Carbondale. John Abramovich and Henry Hillman witnessed the shooting of Batura, a sophomore from Danvers, Mass. Sinroll was allowed to take his final examinations to complete the last quarter, while staying in the Jackson County Jail at Murphyboro. He was later released on \$15,000 bond.

Richard Arterburn, a sophomore from Belleville, was elected president of the Southern Young Republicans Club last week.

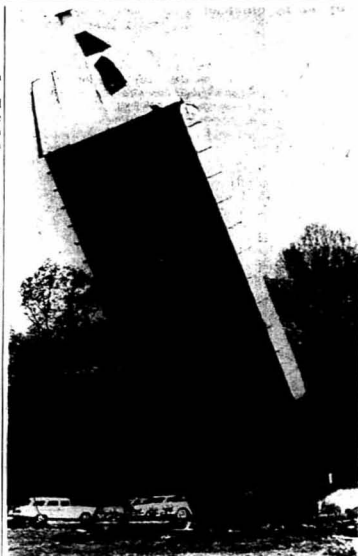

The SIU Textbook Service has announced the sale of rental textbooks at a 20 per cent discount until the seventh week of the quarter.

Lasting the period of sales permits the Service to replace copies which have been sold in time for distribution of books at the beginning of the new quarter.

At the same time, the Service announced that students will be charged one dollar for the late return of each book held before the date announced for the return of books. This date will not be earlier than 12 noon of the day following the last regularly scheduled exam for the quarter.

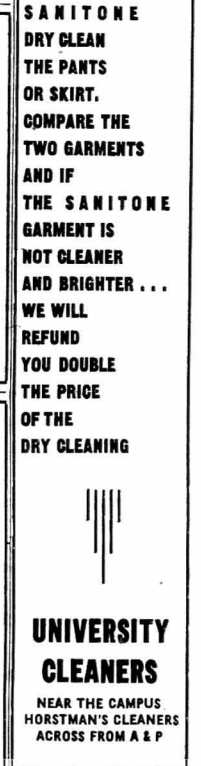

Buyan Stars As Salukis Split With Leathernecks

A sharp single by Roger "Vince" Buyan gave the Saluki baseballers a 3-2 nightcap victory and an even split in an IAC double header with Western Ill last Friday afternoon.

Buyan's heroics came in the final half of the seventh and last inning, after SIU had taken the lead in the fifth to tie the game, 2-2. The rally gave relief pitcher Gordon Lambert the victory and kept the SIU squad in the conference running with a 3-3 record.

The winning run by Southern was pushed across by one out. After Monsehr fanned, North Vogel, the fifth inning hero, drew a base on balls. Then, on an even bouncing ball toward second base, Leathernecks infielder Lee juggled the ball, sending Vogel to the mound and Taylor to first. On the first pitch, Buyan sent his game-winning drive into left center.

Silent Bat In Opener
Salukis bats were relatively silent in the opener, as they fell 4-2, with Ron Avers taking the loss. Avers failed to last the nine-inning distance and was relieved by Gibbs in the ninth. Ron allowed 10 hits and three costly wild pitches. He walked only three, and struck out six in the eight innings he worked.

Western's big inning came in the fourth, as they capitalized on four hits, one an infield double and one a Texas League, to push across two big runs. Buyan, who SIU came back to tie the game in their half of the fourth on singles by Taylor and Buyan, then the only inning, however, that SIU bunched more than one hit, as they picked up only five in the entire game.

Both games were played in a strong wind, although the threat of rain held off all afternoon.

Gillmore Goes Five
Coach "Al" Martin started left fielder John Gillmore on the mound in the second contest. John held the Leathernecks three hits, three runs and two errors in the fifth. Captain Gordy Lambert threw the final two strikes, giving up only one hit and receiving credit for the win.

Seven Salukis hit in the nightcap, with Buyan picking up two. North Vogel, always tough in the clutch, drove home two important runs in the SIU fifth, when he drilled a ground single into left field with the bases full. Up until that time, SIU had stranded seven men in four innings.

Errorless Salukis
The poised SIU infield played errorless ball in the 16 innings, despite the fact that shortstop Richard Jones was operating with an injured toe. Buyan, team third, and first baseman Richard Dillinger made several inning saving plays.

Both Saluki teams in the nightcap were set up by Western errors. A wild throw by pitcher Kelly set up the fifth inning blast, and a jagged grounder gave Southern its seventh inning advantage.

Play Evansville Today
The Salukis travel to Evansville, Ind., today, for a new match with the Evansville club. Two previous games were rained out. Coach Martin's team will travel this week end also, as they will play powerful Central Michigan at Mt. Pleasant Saturday, in an IAC double-header.

Led by Captain Andy Barnett, the SIU golf team took two relatively easy victories on the Jackson Co. links last weekend.

Southern shot out Eastern Ill. last Thursday 15-0, and last Saturday knocked off Rolla 17-5-6-1 last Saturday morning.

EASTERN MATCH

The only exciting part of the match was the overall play of Captain Andy Barnett and the last round shooting of Bill Belva.

Barnett shot a two under par 70 to take all the shooting honors of the beautiful sun kissed afternoon.

Belva had a fair but not good first round of 41, but he got hot and shot a 34 on the back nine. Par for nine is 36. He ended up with a three over par 75 for the 18 holes.

Also looking good for Southern were the other three men of the first five. These men, all freshmen and unexperienced, came through with some low scores. Jim Portoriff shot a 76, Dave Vannatta had a 77 and Loren Frost had an 87.

On the 14th hole, Barnett pulled his drive way off to the left and then proceeded to pitch the ball 30 yards to within three inches of the cup. On the 16th, his pitch shot appeared to be going over the green when it struck the pin and fell straight down five inches from the pin. That was one of the four birdies he had on the two rounds.

ROLLA MATCH

Captain Andy Barnett led Southern's golf team to its second straight easy victory of the week. On Saturday as the host club won over Rolla School of Mines, 27-5-6-1.

Barnett continued to look like the star of the team. He had practiced all winter instead of the few practice rounds, the Southern Illinois weather has allowed him. He started off his first round by knocking a ball out of bounds, which means a two stroke penalty. That first hole resulted in a 6-7, two over par four. The remaining 17 holes of his match he finished in only 65 strokes, three under par.

In the eighteen holes Barnett shot a 71, one under par. His opponent, Harry Penn shot a 79.

The scores weren't as good as Thursday when four of Southern's golfers shot in the 70s.

The only Southern golfer who didn't at least break even in his opponent was Loren Frost, who last year in last year's season.

Fred Lewis, assistant basketball coach at Southern Illinois University, has resigned to become head basketball coach at Mississippi Southern College at Hattiesburg, Miss.

A veteran of five years of pro ball, Lewis was assistant basketball coach at the University of Hawaii for two years prior to moving to Southern last September.

Lewis, who will begin his new duties as coach and associate professor this fall, played college ball at Long Island University, 1942-43, and Eastern Kentucky State College, 1944-45. He was named to All-American teams in 1942-43 and 1943-44.

He received the Rookie of the Year Award while playing with the Sheboygan Redskins professional cage team in 1946-47, and was leading scorer for the Badminton Bulls during the 1947-48 season.

Lewis received his undergraduate degree from Eastern Kentucky College and his master's from New York University. At the present time he is working toward a doctorate degree.

WHY A COACH RESIGNS

When a coach resigns from one University and heads for another, people wonder what the inside story is... and what the reasons are.

In the case of Fred Lewis, Southern's assistant basketball coach last season, the reasons are relatively few and simple... but good.

Head has recently accepted the head basketball coaching position at Mississippi Southern College at Hattiesburg, Miss.

Fred will be leaving an assistant's job at SIU for the top coaching position in one of the top independent schools (familiarly in the country). The Delta school has consistently ranked high in both football and basketball, and is one of Mississippi's top growing institutions.

Lewis will be in complete charge of the basketball program at Mississippi Southern.

At SIU, Fred holds the academic title of assistant professor, but at Mississippi Southern he will be an associate professor.

At SIU, Fred teaches health education and physical education classes, in addition to his coaching duties. At Mississippi Southern, he'll teach no classes except during summer sessions.

At SIU, Lewis, along with other coaches, is employed by University and IAC, making teaching, training of athletes, SIU, Mississippi Southern, an independent school, with no conference to contend with, his style, Fred will be able to have more time to devote to his new position.

We wouldn't be surprised to see some of last season's top Southern Illinois prep stars follow Lewis to Mississippi Southern.

As for salary, the question is not substantial, with his new salary probably in the neighborhood of plus \$8,000.

It's our opinion that the SIU athletic department has been undergoing a mild case of internal friction for the past few months.

We feel that Lewis' resignation only precedes one of higher-level importance... namely that of Carl Erickson, athletic director. Watch for future news concerning Erickson leaving SIU in favor of a post at Kent State, Ohio.

Lewis has admitted his reluctance to leave SIU and Carbondale, and readily admits that the good from down south is just too good to pass by, both academically and financially.

"And after coaching for two years in Hawaii," remarked Lewis, "the southern weather is going to make me happy."
