Upon the call of the Chairman, the State Normal School Board met in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction in Springfield at 9:00 A. M., February 6, 1929.

Members present: Messrs. Cole, Hewitt, McMorris, Mason, Shelton, Still, Walker, Blair, and Mrs. Northam.

Members absent: Messrs. Allen and Loebner.

All of the presidents except Mr. Felmley were present. Dean Schroeder represented President Felmley.

The minutes of the previous meeting were presented and approved.

SOUTHERN ILLINOIS STATE NORMAL UNIVERSITY.

President Shryock presented his report, which was received, placed on file, and is made a part of these minutes. This report follows:

II. FACULTY.

The large enrollment of candidates for graduation, all needing practice teaching, made it necessary to employ an additional critic teacher. Mrs. Ora Rogers, B. Ed. of this school was given an appointment at \$1,350 for the academic year of thirty-six weeks. Mrs. Rogers was told that this was to be looked upon as a temporary appointment only.

The Board last fall confirmed the appointment for three months of Miss Sara Baker, Mrs. Dorothy Muzzey, and Mrs. Mary Combs. I wish permission to continue to employ these additional teachers for all or such part of their time as may be needed for the remainder of the academic year.

About the 15th of December Miss Helen Baldwin, Head of the Latin and Greek Department, reported that she was threatened with total blindness. Three or four years ago she had lost the use of one eye, and now it seems that the other eye is about to become useless. She was in the hospital in Chicago under observation for about three weeks. The specialist told her the only chance to save the eye was at least six months of complete relaxation. She has asked leave of absence without salary until the opening of the fall term 1929. Mr. Fuller Combs, A. B. of Wabash, and A. M. of Indiana University, head of the Latin and French in the high school, was transferred to the college work. Mrs. Genevieve Myers, who has taught for us from time to time in emergencies, was asked to take over Mr. Combs' work in the high school. Mr. Combs' salary remains as it was, \$2,400. We are paying Mrs. Myers at the rate of \$200 per month.

III. SUMMARY.

The Board is asked to confirm the appointments of Mrs. Genevieve Myers, Mrs. Dorothy Muzzey, Miss Sara Baker, Mrs. Mary Combs, and Mrs. Ora Rogers. It is also asked to confirm leave of absence granted to Miss Helen Baldwin.

The Board is asked to extend Miss Hilda Stern's leave of absence for another year, or until June, 1930.

II. FACULTY.

1. Miss Doris Denton, a member of the Social Science Department, resigned at the close of the Fall Quarter because of poor health. Miss Denton work was very satisfactory and we were sorry to have her leave the college.

The intelligence tests give evidence that we have but few students of low mental ability. The records from the high schools indicate that we have comparatively few students who were in the lower half of the graduating classes.

President Brown called the attention of the Board to the case of a teacher who had been injured while assisting in coaching the basketball team. The Board approved the recommendation of President Brown that the cost of the medical treatment should not have to be borne by the teacher. It recommends the allowance of this claim to the Court of Claims.

There was some discussion of the responsibility of a president for funds which he had deposited in a local bank if such bank should fail. On motion the presidents were instructed to require bonds from the banks where funds were deposited covering any liability that the president might have in the safe keeping of such funds.

It will be noted from the above report that the college department shows an increase in the number of Seniors, Juniors and Freshmen but a loss in Sophomores. The loss is probably due to the fact that there was a small Freshman class last year. The total college enrollment shows a gain of 8.4%.

The high school department has to be reduced slightly on account of room and the elementary school lost slightly by withdrawals due to poor quarters for the children.

II. THE FACULTY.

1. Miss Eva Colby, head of the Home Economics Department, Miss Ethel Ray, dean of women, and Miss Helen Zook will not be in residence during the remainder of the college year. Misses Colby and Ray will attend Columbia University, and Miss Zook has accepted a position in Wisconsin since she was only employed for the first half of the school year.

2. For Miss Colby's place I recommend Miss Sophia Reed, now in the Department of Home Economics, at the rate of \$260.00 per month for the remainder of the school year instead of \$250.00 which she now receives.

Miss Clara Atteberry is also recommended for Miss Reed's assistant at \$225 per month for the remainder of the year.

Miss Caroline Grote is back from Columbia University where she has finished her work for her doctor's degree except a thesis, and is recommended as dean of women at \$350 per month for the remainder of the year.

Miss Bessie Cooper has also returned to her work as principal of the lower grades of the training school and the salary recommended for the remainder of the school year is \$275.00 per month.

3. When school opened in the fall it was found necessary to add one assistant in English. Miss Pauline Hawkins was appointed at \$150.00 per month.

At the beginning of the winter quarter other teachers were needed for part time. Mr. Harry Test was appointed at \$35.00 per month and Alice Bollin was also appointed at \$30.00 per month.

Besides, Miss Mildred Watson who teaches the Rural School with which the College cooperates was allowed \$25.00 per month for her work.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES.

1. Mr. Ira Post resigned as ground man December 1, 1928, and Roy Carson was added to the force at \$100.00 per month. He has had experience as a fireman and will work part time in the engine room.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION. Nothing to report.

V. THE CURRICULUM. Nothing to report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

1. At present the buildings and grounds are in good condition except that the drives have not been repaired and the old gymnasium has not been transformed into library rooms. Plans and specifications are ready in each case and assurance is given that contracts will be let soon.

2. The ten acres of land the purchase of which has often been discussed by this Board has been bought and the \$15000 has been vouchered to pay for it.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES. Nothing to report.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE. Nothing to report.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS.

It is not too early to predict that the usual difficulties will attend efforts to get appropriations for the Teachers Colleges as provided in the budget of the Normal School Board. Legislative plans should therefore be definitely agreed upon at once and every effort should be put forth to get favorable action on the items provided in this budget.

The conference with members of the legislature which was planned for Western Illinois was held on December 12. It was an excellent meeting but conflicting dates and very bad weather prevented a full attendance.

A careful check has been made on a number of training school building plans and the evidence becomes greater almost daily that \$325,000 is a conservative estimate of the cost of a building which will meet the needs for such a building at Macomb.

X. SUMMARY.

1. The approval of appointments and salaries recommended is requested.
2. The legislative plan which the Board wishes to pursue should be outlined.

1. The appointment of Miss Sophia Reed to take the place of Miss Eva Colby, away on leave of absence, for the remainder of the year at a salary of \$260 per month, which is an increase of \$10.00 a month over the salary Miss Reed now receives.

2. The appointment of Miss Clara Atteberry as Miss Reed's assistant, at a salary of \$225 a month for the remainder of the year.

3. The return of Miss Caroline Grote from her leave of absence to her former work at a salary of \$350 a month for the remainder of the year.

4. Miss Bessie Cooper, also returned from her leave of absence, returned to her former position at a salary of \$275 per month.

5. The appointment of Miss Pauline Hawkins at the beginning of the fall term at a salary of \$150 a month; Harry Test at the beginning of the winter quarter at a salary of \$35 a month, and Alice Bollin at the beginning of the winter quarter at a salary of \$30 a month. Miss Mildred Watson teacher in the rural school, was allowed \$25 a month for her work.

6. The appointment of Roy Carson as ground man at \$100 a month beginning January 1.

President Morgan called attention to the fact that the new budget which the Board had presented to the Finance Department was encountering the same difficulties that former budgets had encountered, and asked for a definite outline of a plan of action.

He reported a conference with the members of the General Assembly residing in the "military tract" in which conference the needs of the normal schools were discussed.

He again brought up the matter of the Lee M. Blair degree which has been left in the hands of the Chairman of the Board. The Chairman said that he would immediately secure legal advice upon the matter.

NORMAL SCHOOL FEES.

At the DeKalb meeting on May 31, 1926 the Finance Committee reported the fees that should or might be required from the students in the various teachers colleges. The report did not meet with the approval of the Board and was voted down, but upon the appeals of the presidents who stated that the money yielded by these fees was needed, the Board voted that the schedule should be operative for one year, beginning September 1, 1926. The report of the committee further recommended that steps be taken at the next session of the legislature to secure sufficient revenue which will make it possible to eliminate all special fees approved in that report.

This question has not been before the Board since. The fees that were provided for one year have, at least at this normal school, been continued for a year and a half longer.

I therefore would recommend that the matter of fees be reported back to the Finance Committee for a new report or that the schedule of fees now in use be continued.

The report recommends that student activity assessment be left to the various student bodies, but provision must be made for the proper handling and auditing of all such accounts under the direction of the governing bodies.

I find a disposition among our students, as soon as any group feels that it needs more money for its purposes, to begin a movement for raising the student tax. This is always resisted by a minority of the students, but when the majority vote the tax the minority has nothing to do but to pay.

I would recommend that the Board impose an upper limit to this student tax just as in the state the library tax, the park tax, even the school tax is limited by legislative enactment. Action upon this point is very much desired by the students at Normal.

ALCOHOL PERMIT.

Under the rules of the United States Government we are permitted to buy tax-free alcohol for scientific use. But certain documents have to be filed in connection with our tax-free alcohol and certified reports made monthly. Heretofore I have signed these reports. But the Treasury Department now asks that you authorize some other person to sign these reports in my absence. I recommend that Miss Flora P. Dodge, my secretary be authorized to sign these reports in my absence.

STATEMENT FROM PRESIDENT FELMLEY OF NORMAL.

December 31, 1928.

To the Members of the Normal School Board:

On March 12, 1928, the opening day of our spring term, the combination of our vault was broken off, the vault opened, and money to the extent of \$653.28 was stolen.

In making my next ten-day remittance to the State Auditor this sum was deducted from the remittance due and the following affidavit was sent:

Affidavit made to Auditor.

"About six o'clock A. M., on March 13, the engineer telephoned me that he had found two of the outside doors of the training school unlocked, and the vault door standing wide open. The combination lock had been smashed off, apparently with a heavy hammer or chisel, and the interior lock had been driven off with a punch so that the bolts could be thrown and the vault opened.

I immediately summoned the sheriff of McLean County. The interior of the vault was in confusion.

All of the late afternoon money from the bookstore and the bag of silver from the financial clerk were missing. On checking up our accounts it was found that the loss was \$653.28. No clue to the burglars has yet been found.

The sale of books and supplies went on until 6:00 P. M., other collections until 4:30 P. M. The cash received in the late afternoon was deposited in the vault.

One of the janitors remains on duty as a watchman until 11:30 P. M. Before leaving he sees that in all buildings except the heating plant, all lights are out, all windows closed, all outside doors locked. We have found him conscientious and dependable through many years of service. From 11:30 to 6:00 A. M. there is a fireman in the heating plant but no watchman patrolling the grounds.

There was a heavy thunder storm at Normal after 1:00 o'clock in the morning of March 13, 1928.

All of the foregoing statements in regard to the theft of money from the vault of the State Normal University at Normal, Illinois, on the night of March 12-13 are true and correct to the best of my knowledge and belief."

Dear Sir:

I have your letter of recent date, in which you state that on March 21, 1928, a remittance was received from the Illinois State Normal University, showing a deduction on account of money stolen from its vault on March 12th. Attached to the itemized remittance sheet is an affidavit of the President of the University in support of the claim that the combination of the vault had been broken off, the vault opened and the contents stolen. You desire to know if under the facts stated the deduction should be allowed.

In reply I will say that the decisions of the courts in this country are somewhat conflicting on the question presented by your letter but the great weight of authority is in favor of holding public officers handling public funds to a strict accountability. In a majority of the jurisdictions the liability of a receiver of public moneys is that of an insurer. The basis of this rule is public policy. In the case of *Tillinghast v. Merrill*, 151 N. Y. 135, the Court said:

"In the case of an officer disbursing the public moneys much may be said in favor of limiting his liability where he acts in good faith and without negligence, and a strong argument can be framed against the great injustice of compelling him to respond for money stolen or lost while he is in the exercise of the highest degree of care and engaged in the conscientious discharge of duty. When considering this side of the case it shocks the sense of justice that the public official should be held to any greater liability than the old rule of the common law which exacted proof of misconduct or neglect.

It is at this point, however, that the question of public policy presents, and it may well be asked whether it is not wiser to subject the custodian of the public moneys to the strictest liability, rather than open the door for the perpetration of fraud in numberless ways impossible of detection, thereby placing in jeopardy the enormous amount of the public funds constantly passing through the hands of disbursing agents.

* * * we think the weight of the argument, * * * is in favor of the rule of strict liability which requires a public official to assume all risk of loss and imposes upon him the duty to account as a debtor for funds in his custody."

In the case of *People v. McGrath*, 279 Ill. 550, 557, the Court said:

"The rule of law is well settled in this state that a public officer and his sureties are liable upon his official bond for money received by him by virtue of his office as an insurer, and are not relieved from liability by the loss of the money without the officer's negligence or default. It was so held in *Estate of Ramsay v. People*, *supra*, *Swift v. Trustees of Schools*, 189 Ill. 584, *Oeltjen v. People*, 160 id. 409, and *Thompson v. Board of Trustees*, 30 id. 99. In those cases it was clearly decided that the liability of the officer was not that of a bailee but that he was an insurer of the funds coming to his possession, and could not be relieved

from payment by unavoidable accident or by the misfeasance or negligence or felony of another, or by any other reason than the act of God or the public enemy. The same doctrine is held in *United States v. Prescott*, 3 How. 578, and *Smythe v. United States*, 188 U. S. 156. The decisions of this court have settled the question in this state, and, though there is a sharp conflict of decision in other states, are in accordance with the great weight of authority elsewhere."

From a consideration of the foregoing, I am, therefore, of the opinion that the affidavit in question is insufficient for the purpose of allowing the deduction, and I am of the further opinion that the legislature alone can afford relief in the premises.

I am also today sending to the auditor from my private funds a check for \$653.28, the amount of the loss on March 13, 1928.

LOSS OF FUNDS OF THE STATE NORMAL UNIVERSITY IN THE HANDS OF S. F. PARSON.
MAY, 1893.

In the spring of 1893 Mr. S. F. Parson, for the past 29 years Professor of Mathematics in the Northern Illinois State Teachers College, was principal of the grammar school in the Normal University. Tuition was charged. Mr. Parson collected as tuition for the spring term and deposited to his account as treasurer, \$515.50, in the Schureman bank in Normal. The bank closed its doors about May 1.

President Cook insisted that Mr. Parson should have turned the tuition over as fast as received to President Cook, and should not have maintained this separate account as treasurer for several weeks in the Schureman bank; for Mr. Cook kept the Normal University funds with its treasurer, Mr. Marquis, of the Peoples Bank in Bloomington.

Upon Mr. Cook's insistence Mr. Parson borrowed the money and made good to the State, so that the President could present a clean report to the Board.

At the Board meeting about June 20, a resolution was passed that Mr. Parson be reimbursed. It was held by the President of the Board, Hon. William H. Green, for many years circuit judge at Cairo, Illinois, that Mr. Parson was in the position of a "bailee without compensation" and that if he exercised due diligence he could not be held responsible for these funds.

No one seemed to know how reimbursement should be effected. The secretary of the Board, Mr. Henry Raab, was instructed to bring the matter before Governor Altgelt. This was done, but nothing came of it. When Governor Tanner came in, with his approval, Mr. Parson was reimbursed the \$515.50 from the funds of the Normal University. Mr. Parson's loss was four years interest.

As President of the institution, I have collected and have held as insurer until disposed of, remittances to the Revolving Fund (\$124,000 for the last fiscal year), also certain other funds not transmitted to Springfield aggregating about \$35,000 a year. The largest sums are collected at the opening of the terms. Our local bank closes at 3:00 P. M. Sometimes we can arrange for a deposit as late as 5:00 P. M., but inasmuch as a large part of the business of the book store and cafeteria is done long after banking hours it has been our practice to carry over from day to day some cash, just as is done by retail merchants whose office safes are fireproof rather than burglar proof. This practice of ours has been going on for 14 years. If we had employed a watchman to patrol the grounds in the latter half of the night it would have cost us in the 14 years \$8,400, which is about thirteen times the loss that actually occurred through this burglary.

Under the circumstances I feel that in some way the Board or State should reimburse me for this loss. I have charged myself with the responsi-

bility for every dollar taken into the institution, although not a cent of it is in the bank in my name. The various employes are custodians of these funds that are not sent to Springfield. Although my personal liability is about twice that of any of the rest of the normal school presidents, because of our larger collections on this campus, I have received no larger salary because of this larger responsibility, and I have used during these years the best protection for these funds that has been afforded by the Board.

The Attorney General points out that the Legislature can afford relief in the premises. But I find that the Court of Claims holds its sessions twice a year, beginning January 1 and September 1. Claims must be filed sixty days before the opening of the session. Hence if I look to the legislature for relief I can file my claim some time this summer, have it considered by the Court in its September term and if a favorable decision is arrived at I may look for reimbursement at the hands of the legislature in July, 1931.

The Board did not take any action on the recommendation with respect to fees charged by the school, or upon the matter of limiting the fees which students might charge for membership in their associations.

The Board approved the recommendation that Flora P. Dodge be authorized to sign certain government documents to secure alcohol for laboratory purposes.

President Felmley's report also presented the fact of the robbery of the safe of \$653.28. President Felmley feeling that he would be personally responsible for this loss, had sent his check to the State Treasurer. It was the unanimous opinion of the Board that Mr. Felmley should not sustain this loss. The matter was referred to the Court of Claims, with the urgent recommendation of the Board that the claim be allowed and pressed through the legislature as rapidly as possible in order to reimburse President Felmley for the amount which he had forwarded to the State Treasurer.

The Board wished to convey to President Felmley their sincere wishes that his health would soon be restored and that he would be able to attend the next meeting.

President Lord had prepared no typed report. He spoke of the budget which had been prepared, and set forth the imperative needs of the increases which had been asked in the budget.

The question was raised as to whether the per capita cost as set forth in a statement presented to the Board was based on the same data. The Board requested the presidents to estimate the per capita cost solely on the students enrolled in the college proper, thus eliminating high school pupils which had been included in some former estimates.

In discussing the matter of the budget, the fact was brought forward that the increase in the budget asked, approved by the Board, was 18½ per cent over the amount received for the previous biennium, and that the Finance Department had cut this amount so as to leave a percentage increase of only 9¼ per cent. It was clear to the Board that every effort should be made to restore the amount thus cut out before the budget was presented to the legislature.

The Secretary suggested that an engagement be made for the Board to meet the new Governor. He was asked to arrange such a meeting. When the Board recessed, it recessed to meet in the Governor's office at 2:30 P. M. The meeting with Governor Emmerson was an agreeable occasion. The Governor was asked if he would meet the five presidents of the colleges to discuss the budget. He said that he would be glad to do so at some convenient time.

As the two matters which were to be referred to the Court of Claims had been satisfactorily arranged, the Chairman of the Board declared that there would be no further meeting to discuss that matter.

The Board adjourned.

VI. BUILDINGS.

1. The new science building is moving along as rapidly as could be expected, considering the severe weather of January and February. The building contains about \$15,000 worth of cut stone. The placing of this stone in a brick building necessarily slows up the work. Since we have begun to get figures upon the furnishings of this building it has become evident that our bill in the legislature for repairs and equipment does not carry enough to purchase the equipment needed. We shall be obliged to draw heavily upon our surplus in the Revolving Fund when it is made available.

2. Our system of program clocks and bells was first installed by the Frick Clock Company some twenty-five years ago. Additions have been made from time to time as new buildings have been put upon the campus. Some of the additional material was purchased from the Standard Electric Time Company. During the last few months our clocks have rendered exceedingly unsatisfactory service, and I think we shall not get away from the constant need of repairs unless we install a homogeneous new system. This the Standard Electric Time Company will do, covering all of our buildings for \$5,500. I am informed that other teachers' colleges of the State have been obliged to take the same step. This, again, will make a heavy draft upon the surplus in our Revolving Fund.

3. Auditory conditions are always poor under the balcony in the Capen Auditorium. Mrs. Percy Eckhart, daughter of the Honorable Charles L. Capen, has given \$200 towards a loud speaker. The students are planning to contribute the rest. The total cost of the best speaker that we can obtain will be a little over \$900, but we do not expect to make this a draft upon any of the funds of the institution.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS.

THE PRESIDENT'S CLAIM FOR STOLEN FUNDS.

I have received a letter from the Secretary of State reporting that the Court of Claims has denied my claim for \$653.28 stolen from our vault on March 12, 1928. The Attorney General had previously written to the effect that under the decisions of the Illinois courts, public officers who are receivers of public moneys must be insurers of these moneys.

The Attorney General added to that letter that I must look to the legislature for relief. I have understood that relief in a case of this kind from the legislature must come upon the recommendation of the Court of Claims. But the Court of Claims denies my petition on the ground that the Attorney General has declared it contrary to public policy to relieve public officers from the responsibility of insurers. I am laying this matter before you for such action as you think ought to be taken in the premises. You already are familiar with the facts.

2. About a month ago I was advised by A. M. Shelton that the bill of Mr. Catron for legal services in connection with the Fitzsimmons suit would be allowed if vouchered against our Revolving Fund. The portion of our Revolving Fund available for expenditure in this biennium is so far depleted that we cannot undertake to pay this bill before June 30, but we are expecting, with your approval, to voucher this bill for payment after July 1.

3. Title to the Real Estate of the Illinois State Normal University. As is well known, the courts have declared that the title to our real estate at Normal is still vested in the old State Board of Education, although its former function as manager of the affairs of the Normal University was in 1917 transferred to the State Normal School Board. Some of the members of the old State Board of Education, that ceased to function in 1917, still survive, but no Governor has filled the vacancies. In time the board will cease to exist.

I think that the title to this real estate should be vested in the State of Illinois. It is therefore suggested that the State Normal School Board should petition the Attorney General to take steps for securing the necessary action to vest the title of these lands and buildings in the State.

The list of candidates for graduation was approved by the Board as printed in the attached report.

President Felmley again referred to the absurd and unjust position in which he has been placed by having to stand the loss of money through the burglarizing of the office safe. The Board reaffirmed its action of former meetings to the effect that President Felmley was in no wise to blame, and that it would be unreasonable and unjust for the State to require him to replace this money. The Board is to propose some plan by which President Felmley may be reimbursed.

He called attention to the fact that as the members of the old State Board of Education were disappearing one by one, that some action should be taken to transfer the title of the real estate of the Normal University to the State of Illinois. The Secretary was asked to take this matter to the Attorney General, asking him to take such action as would effect this transfer.

President Felmley also referred to the claim of Mr. Catron for services rendered to the old State Board of Education. The Board approved the suggestion of paying this bill from the revolving fund.

The Board also approved the recommendation of teachers and salaries for the summer terms, the appointment of Miss Myrtle F. Clancy, and the leaves of absence for teachers as set forth in the report.

The Board also approved the calendar as presented.

President Morgan called attention to the salary schedule, and especially the emeritus plan as now embodied in that schedule. He felt that as the plan now stood it would handicap the presidents in securing new teachers for these schools unless some credit should be allowed for teaching done in other institutions in making up the thirty years of service required for retirement. It was suggested that the term of service required might be cut to twenty-five or even to twenty years, and thereby avoid any just demand for recognition of work outside of the teachers colleges of Illinois. The question was left over until the next meeting for further discussion.

He called attention to certain changes in the faculty which he had recommended.

The Board approved the following recommendations in this report:

1. The list of graduates as presented in the report, provided they make the required number of credits.

2. The faculty list for the first and second summer terms.

3. The proposed calendar for 1929-1930.

President Brown spoke of the desire to put a fireplace in the Women's Building, stating that most, if not all the money would be furnished by the students in the building. The Board approved his suggestion that the State Architect be consulted about plans and as to whether it would be necessary to let the contract through the Department of Public Works.

Another question was raised about the leave of absence provided in the salary schedule which had been adopted by the Board. The plan providing for a year's leave of absence on one-half pay contained the provision that the teacher should make out a note to the president of the school covering the amount of salary which the teacher should receive during that year. This note would be in the nature of a bond that the teacher would return and serve the institution. The legality of this procedure was raised, and the Secretary of the Board was asked to write to the Attorney General for his opinion.

The Board ordered that recommendation of the faculties for the year beginning September, 1929 should be presented at its next meeting. It was decided, unless otherwise ordered by the Chairman of the Board, to hold this meeting in Springfield, on June 24, 1929.

The Board adjourned.
