II. THE FACULTY.

Since the date of our last meeting: Miss Alice Jean Patterson, Instructor in Nature Study, died after a brief illness on June 12, 1929. She had served the Normal University for 23 years and had made herself the foremost teacher of Nature Study in the United States.

Miss Verna Grubbs, Assistant Professor of Dramatics, has resigned because of ill health.

Miss Myrtle F. Clancy, Instructor in Physical Education has resigned to accept a position in the University of Utah.

Miss Ellen Mosbaek, Instructor in Physical Education has resigned to accept a position with the State High School Athletic Association.

New teachers recommended:

Clarence Orr, A.M., Superintendent of Schools at Winchester, Illinois, as Extension teacher of History and Education at a salary of \$2,880 for nine months. Mr. Orr received his Bachelor's and Master's degrees at the University of Illinois.

Neva McDavitt, M.S. of Worcester, Massachusetts, as Instructor in Nature Study at a salary of \$2,070 for nine months. Miss McDavitt is a graduate of the State Normal University and has received her Master's degree at Clark University this month.

Jennie Whitten, A.M. of Greensboro, North Carolina, as Instructor in Spanish and Head of Fell Hall, at a salary of \$1,800 plus living. Miss Whitten received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees at the University of Illinois, and has served us before as instructor in Spanish and French.

Emma Lakin, B.S. of Evanston, Illinois, as Instructor in Physical Education for Women, at a salary of \$1,800 for nine months. Miss Lakin is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin.

Norma Albright, B.Ed. of Lincoln. Illinois, as Instructor in Clothing at a salary of \$1,800 for nine months. Miss Albright is a graduate of the State Normal University and has taught Home Economics nine years. This appointment is for one year only during the absence on leave of Miss Josephine Ross.

Russell Packard, Ph.D., of Cincinnati, Ohio, as Associate Professor of High School Education at a salary of \$2,610 for nine months. Mr. Packard received his Bachelor's degree at the Kent (Ohio) State Teachers College, his Master's degree at the University of Akron, his Doctor's at the University of Cincinnati. He will serve while Associate Professor Decker is absent on leave.

Maude Hornish, B.A.E. of Oak Park, Illinois, as Instructor in Art for one year, during the absence on leave of Professor Henri Staples, at a salary of \$1,980 for nine months. Miss Hornish is a graduate of the Art Institute, Chicago.

Mrs. Irene F. Royce, A.B. of Charleston, Illinois, as training teacher in the second grade, at a salary of \$1,890 for nine months. Mrs. Royce is a graduate of the University of Illinois and of the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College.

Miss Louise Spafford of Normal, Illinois, as training teacher in the fifth grade at the Soldiers Orphans Home at a salary of \$1,710 for nine months. Miss Spafford formerly held this position for two years. During the past three years she has taught at Oak Park, Illinois.

Mrs. Eleanor Weir Welch, A.M. now librarian in the Teachers College at Stevens Point, Wisconsin, as Librarian at a salary of \$2,520 for 38 weeks. Mrs. Welch is a graduate (A.B.) of Monmouth College and of the New York Library School.

Miss Juanita A. Brown, A.B. as Instructor in Physical Education for Women with especial attention to Playground Management, at a salary of \$1,800 for nine months. Miss Brown is a graduate of the University of Illinois with two years successful teaching at Monticello, Illinois.

Miss Mabel Clare Allen, A.M. of Alta, Illinois as Instructor in Dramatics at a salary of \$1,890 for 36 weeks. Miss Allen is a graduate of the School of Speech at the Northwestern University. She has taught in the high school at Dunlap, Illinois.

Chester C. Hammerlund, B.S. of Urbana, Illinois, as Instructor in Industrial Arts at a salary of \$2,520 for 36 weeks. Mr. Hammerlund is a graduate of the Normal University (1923) and has had five years practical experience in a garage and machine shop, as well as advanced courses at the University of Illinois.

Kenyon S. Fletcher, B. S., of Charleston, West Virginia, as Instructor in Printing and other Industrial Arts at a salary of \$2,520 for 36 weeks. Mr. Fletcher is a superior musician and will lead our band and orchestra. He is a practical printer as well as for three years a teacher of Industrial Arts. His later education has been at Stout Institute.

John Eugene Fraley, B.Ed., of Pecatonica, Illinois, as Assistant Professor of Nature Study at a salary of \$2,340 for 36 weeks. Mr. Fraley is Miss Patterson's outstanding disciple and has collaborated with her in the preparation of Nature Study textbooks. Since his graduation from Normal in 1922, he has served as principal and superintendent in schools of Northern Illinois. Jane Church, B.Ed., of Hennepin, Illinois as training teacher in Commercial branches in the University High School, at a salary of \$1,800 for nine months. Miss Church is an outstanding graduate of our commercial department and has taught in the Bloomington High School.

Harriett Berninger, A.M. of Urbana, Illinois as Director of Home Study by Correspondence at a salary of \$1,800 for 36 weeks. Miss Berninger is a graduate of the Indiana State Normal School at Terre Haute, with A.B. and A.M. from the University of Illinois.

She has had a wide range of experiences as rural school teacher, high school principal, superintendent of consolidated schools, and assistant in teacher training courses at the University of Illinois. She is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Kappa Delta Pi.

III. EMPLOYEES.

Mrs. Clara Pett, for the past seven years dietitian at Fell Hall, resigns because of impaired health.

Miss Ruth Murphey, for the past five and one-half years our efficient audit clerk, resigned on April 30.

Mrs. Sarah Uhl a graduate of American School of Home Economics is recommended as Housekeeper and Dietitian of Fell Hall at a salary of \$1080 for twelve months. Mrs. Uhl has served as housekeeper at Highland Park, Illinois the past year.

Mr. Glenn Brown, a graduate of our commercial department, is recommended as Audit Clerk at a salary of \$1,800 for 12 months. Mr. Brown has been teaching at Colchester, Illinois.

Miss Ferne Melrose, B.Ed. of Atlanta. Illinois is recommended as Recording Clerk at a salary of \$1,500 for 12 months. Since her graduation from our commercial department in 1927, Miss Melrose has served in a bank in Atlanta.

IV. ORGANIZATION.

The liberal appropriation accorded us by the General Assembly will enable us to carry out plans, long contemplated, for increasing the usefulness of the State Normal University.

1. We expect to install printing equipment in Room 4 in the basement of the Main Building, and have engaged a practical printer who is also a successful teacher of the industrial arts.

We expect to set up a metal shop in our heating plant for Auto Mechanics, sheet metal work, and the like, and have employed a competent, experienced workman who is also a graduate of the University of Illinois.

Under an act of the legislature, graduates of the eighth grade at the Soldiers Orphans Home are to be admitted to the University High School. There are 43 such graduates this year, but many of them are not soldiers' children but dependent children who are likely to be placed in employment during the summer.

But hereafter only soldier's children are to be admitted; they will not be placed in private homes, but are to be given in the school at the Home, as well as in our own high school, pre-vocational training such as our newly equipped shops will provide. all to be taught by college students in training for this field of teaching. \$306,000 has been appropriated for new buildings at the Soldiers Orphans Home to include school rooms and shops.

2. We expect, in accordance with the suggestions of the inspector from the North Central Association, to increase our annual expenditure for books to \$10,000. We have employed a competent, thoroughly trained, experienced librarian, a graduate, A.M., of the New York Library School.

3. We are providing more thorough supervision of the training school teaching in Music, Drawing, Nature Study, and in high school science.

4. We are expecting to put on a second extension teacher, although up to this time we have not been able to organize twelve new study centers.

5. We are renewing the correspondence home study courses for teachers in service, courses that will be parallel to the work of the elementary school so as to bring aid especially to the isolated rural teacher. Eighteen

of these courses are offered, conducted in part by members of the regular faculty but chiefly by three teachers employed especially for this work. The courses are identical with our standard resident work in the same field, demand the same prerequisities, and receive the same credit.

VI. BUILDINGS.

The new Science Building is under roof. Two months should complete the general contract. The equipment should be in place by September 14 when the fall term opens. The room in the heating plant for metal work, the water tank and pump to relieve our deep well pump, the concrete floor for our reserve coal all should be installed this fall.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE.

We are distributing to you the reports (1927-28) of our various student enterprises. Their number is so great that the report becomes rather expensive. No state money is expended by these student organizations, but we shall continue to make these reports as long as they are wanted.

We shall need one additional janitor when the new Chemical and Manual Arts Building is completed, and we ought to have a landscape gardener.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION.

For years we have dated our entire calendar from the beginning of the Spring Term. We arranged the spring opening so that persons teaching seven months might have an opportunity to get in at the beginning of the term. Each year more than 250 rural teachers came in at this time. The plan worked until we decided to add the second half of the summer quarter. As the Board well knows, perhaps three-fourths of the attendance in the second half of the summer quarter is made up of teachers in service, and they must be allowed to get out in time to get to their homes and do some preliminary work before the opening of their schools the first of September. We found that by using the last two days of commencement week, and by teaching seven Saturdays, we could secure the sixty days required for the quarter. With the change in the State law making the minimum term eight months instead of seven, there will be no necessity for special provision for rural teachers. They may enter at the beginning of the Mid-Spring Term. I am therefore submitting a different calendar:

Fall Quarter opens Sept. 9. Fall Quarter closes Nov. 29. Winter Quarter opens Dec. 2. Christmas vacation Dec. 21 to Jan. 5. Winter Quarter closes March 7. Spring Quarter opens March 17. Mid-Spring Term opens April 28. Spring Quarter closes June 6. First Summer Session opens June 9. First Summer Session closes July 18. Second Summer Session opens July 21. Second Summer Session closes August 29.

V. THE CURRICULUM. No report.

Since the last Board meeting there have been the following changes in the faculty for the first summer term.

Miss Blenda Olson has asked permission to be relieved from her work on account of ill health. Her salary was \$397.50. I have appointed in her place Miss Blanche Lauck, at \$315. She holds her Master's degree from the University of Iowa and has been teaching in the Rock Island high school.

Miss Pauline Hawkins, who had been employed at \$225 for the summer term, has been allowed to drop her work. By shifting classes, no one was required to take her place.

Miss Lois Browne, who had been employed at \$360 for the summer term, has asked to be away during that time in order that she may have a minor operation at the hospital. Mr. Carl Runkle, who has just received his Master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, has been appointed to her place at a salary of \$300.00.

The vacancy in the Art Department has been filled by the appointment of Miss Ruby Allen, a teacher in one of the Pennsylvania normal schools, at \$325 for the six weeks.

It has also been necessary to add two teachers in the training school, one full time and the other half time. The full time teacher is Miss Opal Tillman, at \$200 for the six weeks, and the half-time teacher, Miss Blanche Breed at \$112.50 for the six weeks.

Authority was given President Morgan to make appointments to fill vacancies reported for next year.

President Morgan called attention to the failure of the Western and Eastern Teachers Colleges to secure the two buildings so much needed at these two institutions. The point was made very clear that an increase in the operating expense of the five institutions of over \$500,000 had been cited by the Governor as the reason why the two new buildings could not be provided for at this session. It was made very clear that the two institutions at Normal and at Carbondale had profited most by this increase in operating expense, it being made possible for one of them to add over twenty new teachers to the faculty. It seemed to be the general understanding of the Board that the suggestion of the Governor that the Eastern and the Western Teachers Colleges were in line for buildings at the next session would be a part of the legislative program for the next two years.

II. FACULTY.

1. Some weeks ago I sent my resignation to Mr. Francis G. Blair, the Secretary of the State Normal School Board. I requested that the resignation be made effective August 1. I have accepted the position as Superintendent of Schools at Pelham, New York. I was not an applicant for this position and the offer of the position came without the slightest solicitation on my part.

I wish to express to the members of the State Normal School Board my appreciation for the unqualified support which has been given to me during the two years that I have been president of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College. I want the members of the Board to know that their support and their friendship have been greatly needed and greatly appreciated. I shall wish to make a few statements at the time of the Board meeting.

2. Miss Vera Wiswall who has been a member of the Music Department for eighteen years requests a leave of absence for next year in order that she may take her mother to the south for the year. I recommend that this leave of absence without salary be granted.

3. I recommend the appointment of Mr. George Evans as Director of Physical Education for Men at a salary of \$2,900 for nine months. Mr. Evans is to take the position formerly held by Mr. Roland Cowell who has resigned. Mr. Evans has been a very successful coach at the DeKalb High School. He was formerly coach at Boone, Iowa. He is a young man of excellent character, good training, and successful experience.

4. I recommend the appointment of Mr. Frank Phillips as Director of the Training School at a salary of \$2,000 for the college year of nine months. Mr. Phillips has been Superintendent of Schools at Freeport. He was formerly Superintendent of Schools at Monmouth, Illinois, and was Dean of Men at Monmouth College. In my judgment, Mr. Phillips will develop into one of the outstanding training-school directors of the State.

5. I recommend the appointment of Mr. J. Hal Connor as a member of the Department of English. Mr. Connor has been Superintendent of Schools at Chandlerville, Illinois. He has his master's degree from the University of Illinois and he is recommended by the English Department of the University as an outstanding man. Mr. Connor is president of the State Association of English teachers. He has written a number of articles for English Journals and three plays which he has written have been staged at the University of Illinois. Mr. Connor is making a sacrifice in salary. He has been receiving a salary of \$3,000 a year.

6. I recommend the appointment of Mr. George Terwilliger as a member of the Department of Biology. Mr. Terwilliger was a member of that department for three years. During the present year he has been doing graduate work at the University of Denver. He has just received his master's degree. Mr. Terwilliger is quite an outstanding man in his field.

7. I recommend the appointment of Miss Eva P. McKee as a member of the Department of Physical Education for Women. Miss McKee has just received her master's degree in Physical Education from Columbia University. She received her bachelor's degree from Cedar Falls. Miss McKee has had very successful teaching experience in Muscatine, Iowa, and for four years was a member of the Department of Physical Education at the State Teachers College, Pittsburg, Kansas. During one of these years she was acting head of the department.

8. I recommend the appointment of Miss Maurine Bradley as a member of the Department of Music. Miss Bradley is a graduate of Illinois Wesleyan University at Bloomington, and Illinois College at Jacksonville. Miss Bradley has done a year of post-graduate work in Music and has had three years of very successful teaching experience. She has been a part-time assistant in our Music Department during the present school year and we regard her as a young woman of exceptional ability and promise.

9. I recommend the appointment of Miss Ruth Taylor as a member of the Department of English. Miss Taylor has her master's degree from Northwestern University. She received her bachelor's degree from the University of Missouri. Miss Taylor has done graduate work at the University of Chicago and she has had a year of graduate work in journalism. Miss Taylor has taught very successfully in the Teachers College at Warrensburg. She has traveled very extensively in Europe and in the Far East. She comes to us very highly recommended by the Department of English at Northwestern University.

10. I recommend the appointment of Mr. Loren T. Caldwell as a member of the Department of Geography. Mr. Caldwell has completed all of the work for his doctor's degree at the University of Chicago except the required two summers of geological survey courses. These must be completed in the field. Mr. Caldwell has had very successful teaching experience. He received his bachelor's degree at Earlham College and has completed three years of graduate work at the University of Chicago.

11. I recommend the appointment of Miss Blanche Davidson as Dean of Women. Miss Davidson has just received her master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. She is a graduate of Indiana State University. Miss Davidson has had most successful experience as a teacher of English and as Dean of Women. She has traveled extensively and, in my judgment, she will be one of the outstanding Deans of the State. Dean Agnes E. Wells of the University of Indiana states that, in her judgment, Miss Davidson is one of the most efficient women graduates of the University of Indiana in the last ten years.

CONTRACT FOR ELECTRIC SERVICE, LIGHT AND POWER.

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT, made this.....

day of, 19...., by and between the Illinois Power Company, hereinafter called the COMPANY and Northern Illinois State Teachers College hereinafter called the CONSUMER, occupant of the premises at West Lincoln Highway used as a College in DeKalb, Illinois.

WITNESSETH: That in consideration of the mutual agreements to be kept and performed by the parties hereto, respectively, it is agreed as follows:

FIRST: The COMPANY will install its service at a point designated by the COMPANY on the outside of the building of the CONSUMER. The CONSUMER will do all interior wiring, bringing the wires two feet through the walls of the building, in order to connect with the service wires of the COMPANY.

SECOND: During the term of this agreement and the performance by the CONSUMER of the terms hereof, the COMPANY undertakes to contract for sufficient electrical capacity and to reserve its apparatus and lines to an extent sufficient to deliver electrical energy to the CONSUMER at the above described premises at the rate of not to exceed 150 kilowatts continuously night and day.

This COMPANY shall use reasonable diligence in providing an uninterrupted supply of electricity on said premises, but does not guarantee a constant supply, and shall not be liable for damages to the CONSUMER for interruptions in supply, nor for damages to persons or property, arising from defective appliances or their operation.

THIRD: It is expressly agreed that the service to be rendered by the COMPANY to the CONSUMER is for the use of the CONSUMER in the premises described and not to be by him shared with nor sold to any other party or parties whatsoever without the written consent of the COMPANY. It is further expressly agreed that the undertaking of the COMPANY shall be completed by the supplying of electric energy at the point of entrance on the CONSUMER'S premises, and that any appliance or equipment required to utilize said energy shall be furnished and maintained by the CONSUMER: and particularly that the COMPANY shall not be required to furnish lamps of any kind nor maintenance nor renewals of same, nor fuses, nor the service of repairmen or inspectors.

FOURTH: Electric service furnished under this contract will be for the operation of 95 kilowatts in lighting and 50 kilowatts in power, or a total connected load of 145 kilowatts; provided; however, that the above record of Connected Load shall be subject to correction from time to time upon inspection by the COMPANY. The CONSUMER shall notify the COM-PANY in writing of any additions to the above connected load. FIFTH: For the reservation provided for in Section Two herein and for energy used by him as measured by meters owned by the COMPANY, the CONSUMER agrees to pay according to the Rate Schedule No. 18 on file with the Illinois Commerce Commission of the State of Illinois or any amendment or alteration thereof ordered or approved by said Commission. CONSUMER hereby elects to be billed on a measured demand basis.

SIXTH: The CONSUMER consents that during the term of this agreement the COMPANY shall have, through its proper agents and employees at all reasonable hours, access to the premises of the CONSUMER for the purpose of inspecting, adjusting, repairing and otherwise caring for its service connection, meters and other property which may be on the said premises, and for inspection of connected Load, and shall have the right without prejudice to its claim for lawful damages for breach of contract, to discontinue, cut off, and remove its said service as soon and as often as default shall be made by the CONSUMER in payment of bills, or in performance by the CONSUMER of the terms of this agreement, and the CONSUMER agrees to observe and conform to such reasonable rules as the COMPANY may establish to govern the general use of its electric supply.

SEVENTH: This agreement is to take effect on the first day of July. Nineteen Hundred and Twenty-Nine, or when installation is complete and to continue in effect for One year thereafter, or until the first day of July, Nineteen Hundred and Thirty, and thereafter from month to month until terminated by mutual consent or by thirty days written notice given by either party to the other.

EIGHTH: This agreement is not assignable unless assignment is consented to in writing by the COMPANY. All terms or stipulations heretofore made and agreed to by the parties in relation to said electric service, are merged in this agreement, and no such terms or stipulations made by the COMPANY'S representatives shall be binding upon the COMPANY, except as expressed herein.

This agreement is in triplicate and receipt of one copy is hereby acknowledged.

This agreement, although signed, shall not be binding upon the COM-PANY until it is approved by one of its executive officers.

President Brown presented the report of the Students Loan Fund which showed a gratifying improvement within the last two years.

As President Brown's resignation had been sent to the Secretary of the Board, it was presented by him to the Board. After some discussion the resignation was accepted to become effective the first day of August, 1929. The Board then appointed Professor Swen F. Parson to act as President until a new President is chosen. Many members of the Board voluntarily stood to express their appreciation of the great services rendered by President Brown to the Teachers College in the two years he had been there.

The Chairman of the Board appointed a committee to draft a resolution of appreciation to be made a part of the minutes of the meeting. The committee consisted of Messrs. Blair, Lord, Still and Mrs. Northam. The following resolution was drafted:

RESOLUTION OF APPRECIATION OF THE CHARACTER AND SERVICES OF PRESIDENT J. C. BROWN.

Coming to the presidency of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at a time when both its character and reputation had been impaired by previous mal-administration, he brought to the great task of rebuilding this institution in the confidence of the people and the placing of its instructional force upon a sound academic and professional foundation, that high persenal character, that excellent intelligence, that unusual administrative ability which insured success from the very beginning. The State Board wishes to record their appreciation of his wholesome and engaging personality, of his even and firm temperament, of his fearless courage and his unselfish devotion.

We needed a man to "carry a message to Garcia." He did it. In addition to his great reconstructive work within the school itself, his admirable presence on the platform, his engaging voice and worthwhile subject matter have carried him before teachers meetings, citizens clubs and organizations throughout the state, carrying the good news of a new day at DeKalb.

He was a teacher, an administrator, an honest man.

The Board congratulates itself on having had his services for two years, and tries to console itself in its loss.

Mr. Mason called attention to the fact that the legislature had passed a bill reimbursing President Felmley for the loss sustained in the robbery of the safe in his office.

Secretary Blair presented to the Board an amendment to the emeritus plan which provides that in cases of unusual merit, upon the recommendation of the president, ten years of service in other similar teaching positions may be accepted to make up the thirty years required. This amendment was approved by the Board.

Mr. Mason offered an amendment which makes possible exceptions to the salary schedule in unusual cases upon the recommendation of the president of the institution.

The Chairman of the Board then introduced Mr. H. E. Beekman who has been appointed as the new Business Manager in the Department of Registration and Education.

The meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the Chairman.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD.

The Normal School Board met at the call of the chairman at nine o'clock, Tuesday morning, August 27, 1929, in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Messrs. Hewitt, McMorris, Mason, Still, Walsh, Blair, and Present · Mrs. Northam.

Absent: Messrs. Allen, Cole, Loebner, and Walker.

President Shryock, Mr. Parson, Acting President of the Northern Illinois Teachers College and Mr. Schroeder, representing President Felmley, were present. President Lord and President Morgan had engagements which interfered with their getting to the meeting.

The minutes of the previous meeting were presented and approved.

The object of the meeting was to receive and act upon the report of the committee appointed to recommend a president for the Northern Illinois Teachers College and such other matters as the chairman might present. Mr. Blair, the chairman of the committee, in his report stated that the committee, since its appointment, had received the names and considered the qualifications of twenty-five different persons; that it was not an easy matter to secure just the type of information on each person which the committee desired. The general plan employed by each member would be to select out of the list two or three or four persons who, in his judgment, were capable of performing the duties of this position. After over a month and a half of such study, the committee met in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction to determine upon the recommendation to After two hours of discussion, it appeared that the committee the Board. were unanimously in favor of President George Selke of the Teachers College, St. Cloud, Minnesota. The committee communicated with Mr. Selke to find out whether he would accept the appointment if it were made. He signified his desire to accept the appointment if the Board should select him, provided he could secure an honorable release from the Minnesota Upon such assurance the committee was recommending him to the Board. Mr. Blair spoke of his qualifications-that he had had experience Board. in the one-room country school, the village school, the city school, as teacher, principal, city superintendent and county superintendent; that he had held an important position in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, had been a teacher in the School of Education of the University and was at that time president of the Teachers College at St. Cloud. At the request of the committee, President Selke had come to Springfield, and the members of the Board had a chance to meet him.

At the conclusion of his report, Mr. Blair made the following motion: That Mr. George Selke, now president of the Teachers College at St. Cloud, Minnesota, be elected president of the Northern Illinois Teachers College at an annual salary of \$7,500, provided he can secure a release from the Minnesota Board to come to Illinois not later than October 15, 1929.

After some discussion, the report of the committee and the motion were unanimously adopted. It was further moved that the secretary of the Board be instructed to notify Mr. Selke of his election, and the following telegram was sent:

"I am directed by the State Normal School Board to notify you that you have been unanimously elected President of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at an annual salary of seven thousand five hundred dollars a year, provided you can secure a release from the Minnesota Board to come to Illinois not later than October fifteenth.

The chairman of the Board called for any special matter or recommendations which might be presented at a special meeting. The secretary read a letter from the attorney general in response to questions raised before the Board on the plan of granting teachers leaves of absence on half pay. The secretary was asked to have copies of this made for each one of the presidents and for the chairman of the Board.

The Board unanimously ordered that Mr. Parson should receive the salary of the president during the time that he is the acting president.

II. FACULTY.

The following corrections have been made on the second summer session payroll. The name of Miss Harriet Rodgers should not be on the list, and the following additional persons with the salaries indicated were employed. The record of the meeting on June 24th will show that four salaries of \$350 each were unassigned. Because of certain peculiarities in the matter of distribution of work these salaries had to be broken up, and as shown below we exceeded the total allotment for the second session of the summer quarter by \$191. I am asking the Board to validate the changes here shown.

Miss Pearl M. Tiley, Supervisor in the first four grades of the Belleville City Schools, has worked for us a number of times within the past six or eight years through the first half of the summer quarter. We have for at least the preceding two or three years paid her \$360 for the six weeks. I intended to pay her the same for the first half of the summer quarter this year, but in some way which I do not understand, perhaps in cutting the stencil, the amount was put down at \$300. The checks for the June portion were delayed, and she did not receive her first payment until just before the close of the July portion of the session. She failed to speak to me about it because Mr. Furr told her he was sure the second check would bring the total amount up to \$360. She was at her home in Belleville when the July check reached her. She was disappointed and perhaps a little hurt. I think her claim for an additional sixty dollars is a just one, and I do not think it would be illegal to pay the \$60.00 out of the revolving fund since it is a non-lapsable fund. I hope the Board will authorize me to voucher her claim for the additional \$60.00.

Since the June meeting of the Board I have had the following resignations: Miss Edna Gueffroy of the Geography Department resigned to take a place in Mr. Felmley's school; Mrs. Katheryn Holt is asking leave of absence on account of her health; and Miss Madge Troutt, critic teacher at the Brush, is entering Chicago University for her A. M.

For Miss Gueffroy's place I recommend the appointment of Mr. F. W. Cox, who is just completing his work for the Ph. D. at Clark University. Mr. Cox was for six years a member of the faculty at the University of Illinois. Salary for thirty-six weeks \$3,000.

For Miss Troutt's place at the Brush I recommend Miss Mabel Eads, B. Ed. of this school, salary \$800.

For Mrs. Holt's place I recommend Mrs. Edith S. Krappe, A. B., A. M., and all work for Ph. D. completed except thesis, State University of Iowa; salary \$2,200 for thirty-six weeks.

In addition I recommend the appointment of Miss Theresa Keidel, A. B. of Chicago University, and work practically completed for the A. M. at the same school; salary \$2,100 for thirty-six weeks. Miss Keidel will have charge of the fourth grade critic work in the Allyn Training School.

Miss Grace Jones of the Household Arts Department has been a member of the faculty for a good many years. Her father and mother are perhaps in the eighties, and are both helpless. Miss Jones left for New Jersey, her parents' home, in June thinking that she possibly might not return. About ten days ago I had a letter from her saying that she had fully decided to devote her time to her parents. The work in her division of the Household Arts has not been heavy for the past few years, and we are planning to take care of her work, at least for the present, without filling the vacancy. Miss Fry, who is to handle the work in textiles and sewing for the coming year can also teach cookery, and with the help of a parttime student helper can, in my judgment, manage the situation for the present.

We have had applications from twelve towns in Southern Illinois for extension work. I recommend the appointment of Mr. Russell Nolan, A. B., and A. M. of the University of Missouri, formerly teacher in the Harrisburg High School, to take charge of extension work in history for the coming year; salary \$2,200 for the academic year of thirty-six weeks. I should say that Mr. Nolan has already begun his work on his Ph. D.

I wish to change the record with regard to Miss Mary Crawford to fix her salary at \$2,500, with room and board in Anthony Hall, for a period of forty-eight weeks. She will divide her time between the headship of Anthony Hall and work as classroom instructor. SUMMARY.

2. The work of improving the drives and walks on the college campus is about completed. The work was let to Trompeter & Sons of Peru, Illinois, and we have found them very accommodating in making minor changes that the State engineer from the Highway Department recommended. The engineer tells me that their work is highly satisfactory.

3. During the month a survey was made by Mr. Beekman and Mr. Hoskins of our buildings and supplies on hand. We were informed that the State expects to install a system of storekeeping for all of the institutions and this was the preliminary survey to that end. We have had no further report on this matter. We were told that this would create a new position, that of storekeeper, and the providing of a suitable storeroom for all supplies. We shall be able to fill this position at a salary not to exceed \$1,800 per year.

4. We were also visited by Mr. Snyder, an engineer from the State Architect's Department, to investigate our heating plant and our facilities for generating electric power. This survey was made for the purpose of determining the advisability of a change from producing our own electric power to that of buying power from the Illinois Power Company. We have had no report from this survey either. 55

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD.

Upon call, the Normal School Board met in special session in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, Tuesday morning, September 17, 929, at 10:00 A. M.

Present: Messrs. Allen, Cole, Hewitt, McMorris, Mason, Still, Walker, Walsh, Blair, and Mrs. Northam.

Absent: Mr. Loebner.

Presidents Lord, Shryock, Morgan and Acting President Swen F. Parson were present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were presented and approved.

The object of the meeting was to hear the report of the special commitee appointed to select and nominate to the Board a president for the Northern Illinois Teachers College. This committee consisted of Mrs. Northam, Mr. Still, and Mr. Blair who made the report for the committee. He stated that after the former report of this committee, recommending Mr. George A. Selke for the position with the understanding that he would accept providing he could secure a release from his Board, and after the action of the Board unanimously electing him, he had informed Mr. Selke of his election. He further stated that on September 3 he received a telegram from Mr. Selke saying that circumstances over which he had no control made it impossible for him to ask the Board to release him. When informed of this telegram, the Chairman of the Board authorized the committee to make a further study and to present to the Board another recommendation. The Committee, after going over the entire matter, had unanimously decided to recom-Mr. Adams has his mend Mr. Karl Langdon Adams for that position. Gentlemen: I submit the following report for the Western Illinois State eachers College:

The report which I made on June 25, 1929, showed several vacancies in he faculty yet to be filled. Most of these have been cared for, and the folowing additions are submitted:

To take the place of Mr. Wayne Wetzel, in the Industrial Arts Departnent, who is on leave of absence for the year at Teachers College, Columbia Iniversity, Mr. Earl L. Page has been appointed at a salary of \$2,700 for 36 veeks. Mr. Page holds his Bachelor's degree from the State Teachers Colege at Pittsburgh, Kansas, where he specialized in Industrial Arts. He also ook his Master's degree from Iowa State College, at Ames, Iowa, in 1928, where he majored in Industrial Arts. He has had experience as a high school and college teacher in Kansas and Missouri.

Dr. Paul Neureiter, who has been assistant in the Department of Chemstry, discovered that his visitor's permit from Austria could not be extended, and he returned to make application as an immigrant to the United States. The quota was full, and he cannot return until June, 1930. Mr. Clarence J. Black has been appointed as assistant professor in Chemistry at \$2,250 for 36 weeks. Mr. Black holds his Bachelor's degree from Kenyon College, Gambier, Ohio, and has done further graduate work in Wooster College, and the Universities of Chicago and Wisconsin, and in 1928 received his Master's degree from the University of Missouri. During the past year he was doing graduate work in Ohio State University, where he expects to receive his doctor's degree in 1930. He has had experience in high schools, teachers colleges, and liberal arts colleges, and was at one time in charge of the work in Chemistry at Lincoln College in this state.

Miss Margaret Schannenk, who has been teaching the first grade in the elementary school was at a previous board meeting given a leave of absence for this year to work for her Master's degree. Miss Carrie E. M. Burks has been appointed for that position at a salary of \$2,520 for 36 weeks. Miss Burks finished a two-year course at the Central State Normal College at Edmond, Oklahoma, for which she received a life diploma, and later received her Bachelor's and also her Master's degrees in Education at Teachers College, Columbia University. She has done some additional work towards her doctor's degree, and spent part of the year 1925 traveling in Europe. She has taught in the State Teachers College in Chico, Calif., at Bloomsburg, Pa., at Lewistown, Idaho, and also in the State Teachers College at Cedar Falls, Iowa, last year.

Miss Alyce Cain, who has been teaching in the Music Department, resigned at the end of the school year, and Mr. C. T. Silvey has been appointed for that position at a salary of \$2,070 for 36 weeks. Mr. Silvey holds his Bachelor's degree from the University of Texas, and his Master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, New York, which he received in 1928. Since that time he has been doing graduate work towards his doctor's degree. He has taught in Missouri, Texas, and Massachusetts, and during the past year was on the musical staff at Teachers College, Columbia University. Mrs. Martha Stranathan also resigned at the end of the year from a instructorship in the Physical Education Department for Women, and Mis Olive E. Potter has been appointed for the position at a salary of \$2,250 fo 36 weeks. Miss Potter is a graduate of the State Teachers College at Mi Pleasant, Mich., and holds her Bachelor's and also her Master's degrees from Teachers College, Columbia University. She has also been a student in th University of Wisconsin. She has taught Physical Education in the school of Grand Rapids, Michigan, and at Scarborough, New York, where she wa dean of girls as well.

Mr. Raymond Miller was given a leave of absence at a former board meeting to work for his Master's degree during the year, and Mr. L. G. Lin dahl is recommended for his position in the Department of Industrial Art: at a salary of \$2,250 for 36 weeks. Mr. Lindahl holds his Bachelor's degree from the University of Iowa and his Master's degree from the University of Wisconsin. He has taught in the University High School at the University of Iowa, at Wethersfield High School in Kewanee, and at Globe, Arizona

A new position has developed in the Department of Mathematics, and Mr. Edwin W. Schreiber has been appointed for that position at a salary o: \$2,700 for 36 weeks. He holds his Bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan, and his Master's degree from the University of Wisconsin, and has done approximately the work which is required for a doctor's degree at the University of Michigan. He has had experience in the University School for Boys in Chicago, the Union High School at Yuma, Arizona, and the High School at New Castle, Pa., the Proviso Township High School at Maywood Illinois, and has done some teaching in the University of Michigan while working there as a graduate student. During the past summer he has been teaching in the University of Wisconsin.

Likewise a new position has been created for an instructor in French and Latin, and Miss Frances E. Davis has been appointed for that work at \$1,845 for 36 weeks. Miss Davis has been a student in Washington University, and holds her Bachelor's and likewise her Master's degree from the University of Missouri. She has taught in Missouri and Kentucky, and was one year in charge of Latin and French at Stevens College.

An additional position in the Department of Chemistry and Physics was created, and Mr. Lewis E. Miller has been appointed at a salary of \$2,430 for 36 weeks. Mr. Miller holds his Bachelor's degree from Ogden College and is a graduate of the Western Kentucky State Normal School. He also holds a Bachelor's degree from Georgetown College, and his Master's degree from the University of Illinois. He received his doctor's degree from the University of Pittsburg this summer. Most of his teaching career has been spent in the high schools of Ohio, but while a graduate student he has also taught in the University of Pittsburgh and he taught the year of 1928-29 at Wooster College, Wooster, Ohio.

Mrs. Julia Moore resigned at the end of the year as assistant librarian, and Miss Harriett Wirick has been appointed to her position at \$1,440 for 36 weeks. Miss Wirick spent two years at Beloit College and then two additional years at the University of Wisconsin, where she received her Bachelor's degree. Later she attended the University of Minnesota, and received a special degree in library science last June. She has been a teacher in the Community High School at Maeystown, Illinois.

An additional position was also created in English, and Miss Bessie Myers, who was in the department last year while Miss Mabel Corbin was on leave, was retained at a salary reported at a former board meeting. Miss Corbin's salary is to be \$2,430 for 36 weeks.

The position of first assistant librarian has not yet been filled.

Mr. J. A. Kirby has resigned as head of the Department of Commercial subjects, and his position has not yet been filled. Correspondence is under way, however, with applicants for both of these positions and it is hoped that within a few days suitable persons will be found to take them.

With the opening of the new library rooms it has been necessary to add janitor, and Mr. R. O. Gallaher has been appointed at a salary of \$1,260 or 12 months.

Your approval is asked for these appointments and you are also asked o approve Mr. Kirby's resignation.

1. I wish to recommend the appointment of Ed. Chenette in the Department of Music at a salary of \$900 for nine months. Mr. Chenette is to have charge of the band.
