MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD

The Normal School Board met in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, Springfield, Illinois, at 9:00 a. m., Monday, June 26, 1933.

The following members were present: Mr. Bailey, Mr. Bardwell, Mr. Blair, Mr. Dill, Mr. McMorris, Miss McIntire, Mrs. Reynolds and Mr. Walsh.

The following members were absent: Mr. Bach, Mr. Bradley and Mrs. Northam.

All of the presidents were present.

The minutes of the last meeting were presented as typed and were

approved.

On motion the Board went into executive session. The Chairman of the Board called upon the committee appointed at the last meeting to investigate certain criticisms which had been brought to the Normal School Board about the administration at the Illinois State Normal University at Normal. Mr. Bardwell, the chairman of the committee, reported that President Brown had handed him his resignation, effective on September 1, 1933, and that that would be the extent of the committee report. Some questions were asked and members of the committee spoke of the number of conferences they had had with President Brown and members of the faculty. On motion the resignation of President H. A. Brown was accepted, effective September 1, 1933.

On motion the Board granted President Brown the months of

July and August for leave of absence on pay.

On motion Mr. H. H. Schroeder was made Acting President, be-

ginning July 1, 1933.

On motion it was decided that at the beginning of each meeting of the Board hereafter there should be a brief executive session before the consideration of the reports of the presidents.

The executive session adjourned, and the presidents were called in.

WESTERN ILLINOIS STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

President Morgan being called upon, presented his report, which was received, placed on file, and is made a part of these minutes. The report follows:

Macomb, Illinois, June 26, 1933.

To the Chairman and Members of the Normal School Board:

Gentlemen: I submit the following report for the Western Illinois State Teachers College:

I. STUDENTS.

1. Attendance.

The attendance reports for the Spring Quarter and the regular year will

be reported at the first Board meeting after July 1.

2. The attendance during the past year has been larger, as you know, than in any previous year in the history of the institution. The enrollment for this summer term, however, has been slightly decreased. This may be due to several causes:

a. Change in the certificating law.

 Laxity in requirements by superintendents, due to low salaries and non-payment.

. Insufficient funds of teachers to attend the summer term, due to failure to receive salaries or lack of positions.

d. Abandonment of the second summer term, which may have led some students to go elsewhere where they could make more credit.

e. Tendency to spend money for the World's Fair rather than for attendance upon the summer school.

The real tendency in summer attendance, however cannot be determined from one summer.

Our enrollment for the present summer session is 1,240,—132 below the enrollment for the first session of the summer quarter last year, or approximately a loss of nine and one-half per cent. This would disturb me rather seriously if I did not know that in the case of other teachers' colleges the loss is much greater than ours; in some cases rising as high as twenty-five per cent.

At this point Mr. Walsh called upon the chairman of the committee appointed to present resolutions of respect on President L. C. Lord. Mr. Blair for the committee made the following report:

A RESOLUTION OF RESPECT FOR LIVINGSTON C. LORD. PRESIDENT OF THE EASTERN ILLINOIS TEACHERS COLLEGE.

The committee appointed by the Board to write this resolution submit the following for record:

On May 11, 1933, President Lord, in response to the notice of the Secre-

tary of this Board, wrote as follows:
"Your letter of May 8 came during my absence from the office on account of a slight attack of bronchitis—nothing serious. I expect to be at the Board meeting on June 3 at nine o'clock central time, or ten o'clock daylight saving time. I am looking forward with the usual pleasure to seeing you.

On Monday, May 15th, at 4:00 p. m., President Lord died.

Practically all the members of the Board attended his funeral in Charleston, at two o'clock, Thursday, May 18th. The funeral services were a great tribute to the character and the services of a great man. The members of the faculty, the student body, the alumni of the college, the people of the city of Charleston, and friends from all parts of the state were present to show their respect.

It is impossible in words to measure the value of Mr. Lord. For thirtyfour years he had been president of this institution. He had imparted to it from the very beginning his high ideals of scholarship, of character, of honesty of purpose. No student who has ever attended the institution has failed to catch something of the nobility of his spirit and the genuineness of his character. As a teacher in the class room he was unexcelled. As a leader and a builder of a teachers college faculty he has never had a superior. In his relations to this Board he has never hesitated to state his opinion directly and frankly upon any question which arose. The strength of his position was never weakened by any personal considerations. He was singularly gifted in his power to present the interests of the school to the consideration of the Board. Rarely did he ever conclude a report without presenting the one theme that was nearest to his heart—the necessity of selecting the best qualified men and women which the country affords as teachers in the teachers colleges. In all of his relationships with this Board he has shown a spirit of respect for its members and a willingness to accept its rulings whether such rulings agreed with his recommendations or not.

We wish to record, insofar as words may, our appreciation of his sterling character, of his broad and accurate scholarship, of his great abilities as a teacher of teachers, of his unequalled judgment in the selection and leadership of the faculty of the teachers college, and of the great contribution he has made to the welfare of the State of Illinois in the training of better teachers for the children of Illinois, as President and teacher of the

Eastern Illinois Teachers College.

Gentlemen: I submit the following report for the Illinois State Normal University:

I. STUDENTS.

1. I will report at this time the attendance for the current summer session as compared with last year:

First Summer Term, 1932. 1,844
First Summer Term, 1933. 1,408

In comparison with summer schools throughout the country our summer term here seems to have held its own. Reports have come indicating in many cases even a fifty per cent decrease in summer enrollment. With 1408 students enrolled our summer school is going forward well. In the past our summer school has been so large that library and other facilities were not adequate. Students who are here this summer are in earnest and with the facilities available are doing very good work.

2. I wish to report the list of actual graduates at the end of the regular school year in June. Graduation was held on Thursday, June 8, and the following people received degrees or diplomas and I recommend that the

II. FACULTY.

There are three changes in the faculty for the summer school which occurred near the opening of the term. Associate Professor George H. Brinegar was obliged to give up teaching on account of his own health and the health of his father. I have left that position vacant. Miss Jane Church asked to be released from summer school work on account of her health and I have employed Mr. Ralph L. Boyd in her place at the same salary. Neva McDavitt replaces Edna M. Gueffroy.

The faculty list with salaries as indicated, presented on June 3, is still to be acted upon by the Board. The following changes are suggested as a possible reduction during the coming year: Omission of the position of Dean of the Training Schools, leaving that position unfilled for one year with a saving of \$4,050, thus making the total cost for salaries of faculty for the

year \$257,255.

This change brings the cost of faculty salaries within the amount appropriated and if continued throughout the biennium leaves about \$80,000 for summer session salaries for the two-year period.

In the first list of Other School Employees to be paid out of Salaries and Wages, as presented on June 3, some consolidations and omissions are

possible which I shall present orally at the meeting.

In the second list of Other School Employees paid from the Revolving Fund, as presented on June 3, consisting chiefly of employees at the dormitory, janitors, firemen, laborers, and other similar employees, some reduction is possible and is probably necessary in view of the reduced income during the coming biennium. I shall discuss this orally at the meeting.

He was also asked by the Board to review the matter of the employees and given the power to discontinue any positions which he thought were unnecessary to the economic and successful operation of the school. He was assured that he would have the united action of the Board in such actions as

he should decide to take.

On motion all other faculty members and employees not specifically withheld for further consideration and action by the Acting President were approved with the understanding that all salaries above \$1,200 should show the 10 per cent cut.

Mr. John Hallihan, the newly appointed Director of the Department of Registration and Education, was present and introduced to the members of the Board individually. After the first of July he will become the Chairman of the Normal School Board.

On motion the time and place of the next meeting of the Board was left

to the call of the Chairman and Secretary of the Board.

The meeting adjourned.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD

The Normal School Board met in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, Springfield, Illinois, at 9:00 A. M., Monday, September 25, 1933.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, and the roll was

called by the Secretary.

The following members were present: Mr. Bach, Mr. Bailey, Mr. Blair, Mr. Dill, Mr. Hallihan, Miss McIntire, Mr. McMorris, Mrs. Northam, Mrs. Reynolds, and Mr. Sunderman.

Absent: Dr. Bradley.

The Presidents and Acting Presidents of the Teachers Colleges were present.

At the suggestion of the Chairman of the Board a stenographer was

called in to take down the proceedings of the meeting.

The Secretary presented the minutes of the previous meeting as typed and sent out to the members of the Board a few days after the last meeting.

In discussing the minutes a member of the Board called attention to what appeared to be an omission. He suggested that the following statement be included in the minutes: "That the matter of the Business Manager, the Registrar, the Financial Secretary, and the Recorder be referred to Mr. Schroeder for further study and recommendation respecting the possible consolidation of these four offices."

The Secretary accepted this correction for the minutes, but during the discussion which followed it appeared that the minutes did state that this matter had been referred to the Acting President in a general way for his report at this meeting. The minutes were then approved as submitted.

Mr. Bailey called attention to the fact that at the meeting on June 26 it had been suggested that an executive session of the Board coming at the conclusion of the meeting might create some embarrassment in that it was necessary to ask the presidents to retire. He, therefore, moved that hereafter each meeting of the Board would begin with an executive session, and at the end of this session the presidents would be asked to come before the Board. This motion was adopted.

Mr. Bailey then moved that the Board go into executive session. It appeared that the main object before the executive session was the selection of

a president for the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College.

Mr. Blair presented the report of a committee appointed at the meeting of the Board on June 3 to make a study of the applicants for this position and to recommend to the Board their choice for president. He stated that he hardly knew what status the report had. Mr. Bardwell, chairman of the committee, had asked that all the applications be copied and that each member of the committee be supplied with these copies. A report of this committee was formulated for presentation to the Board at its meeting in Springfield on June 26th. This report was signed by Mr. Bardwell and Mr. Blair, but Mr. McMorris, feeling that he had not had time to give sufficient consideration to some of the candidates, asked that the presentation of the report be deferred. It was then arranged by the three members of the committee to hold a meeting in the Stevens Hotel, Chicago, on Wednesday, July 5th, at three o'clock, to give further consideration to the applications before the committee. As Mr. McMorris wired that it would be impossible for him

to be present, the other two members of the committee decided to present the report to the Board which had been formulated and signed by them on June 3rd. Since that time Mr. Bardwell has resigned from the Board, and the report has the signature of only one member of the committee who is now a member of the Board. Mr. Blair said, however, that he was presenting the report to the Board for whatever consideration they might see fit to give it. This report recited the following facts, and concluded by recommending to the Board Mr. E. H. Taylor for president:

1. That a petition was signed by every member of the faculty save one,

requesting the appointment of Mr. Taylor.

2. A resolution adopted by the student body in Assembly making the same request.

3. A resolution from the alumni association of the school making the same request.

4. Letters from former members of the faculty now occupying positions in other educational institutions.

5. A letter from President L. C. Lord, written six months before his death, recommending Mr. Taylor as his successor.

Mr. Bailey moved that the report be received and placed on file.

It was then suggested that a roll call vote be taken to indicate the choice of the Board for the presidency of this institution. After some dis-

cussion, on motion, it was decided to take this vote by ballot.

Chairman Hallihan said that it would be necessary to define more clearly what the vote would mean when it was taken. Out of the discussion which followed, on motion, it was ordered that if more than one ballot was taken, that the candidate receiving the least number of votes should be dropped from the next succeeding ballot.

When the vote was taken and counted it appeared that out of the ten votes cast, Mr. Robert G. Buzzard had received nine votes and Mr. E. H. Taylor one vote. Thereupon, the Chairman of the Board announced that Mr. Robert G. Buzzard had been duly elected president of the Eastern Illinois

State Teachers College.

Mr. Bailey moved that the Chairman appoint a committee of three to investigate the applicants for the position of president of the Normal University, and report back to the Board at its meeting to be held in Chicago on October 9. Motion carried.

Chairman Hallihan appointed the following members on this committee:

Mr. Bailey, Mr. Blair, and Mr. McMorris.

At this point Mr. Bach presented the following resolution:

"BE IT RESOLVED.

That while we most deeply regret the incident of the resignation from this Board of our former member, Hon. C. M. Bardwell, Aurora, Illinois, who was so recently appointed to membership thereon by the present Governor, we can not allow the reasons assigned by him in the public press for such resignation (damaging to the Normal Schools as they would be, if true) to go unchallenged.

In justice to the Governor may it be said that in his efforts to economize and reduce the costs of government to the taxpayers, he at no time, nor has anyone in his behalf, or by his authority, ever intimated to any of us, nor has any of this Board advocated the lowering of the high standards and requirements of our Normal Schools; and particularly none of us have suggested that the four year course now required for a teacher's diploma be reduced to two years, the course required for a teacher's certificate.

It is true that we have, wherever it could be done without sacrificing the high standards of education, practiced needed economies and have effected

considerable saving to the over-burdened taxpayers.

We hereby reaffirm our belief in our ability even in these critical times to maintain constantly the full four year course for teachers in all of the Normal Schools of this state. In this effort we feel that we have the hearty support of Hon. Henry Horner, Governor of Illinois, and of all men and women interested in education."

At the conclusion of the reading of this resolution, Mr. Bach moved that it be adopted. In the discussion which followed a number of other matters bearing somewhat closely upon the subject matter of the resolution was considered. Mrs. Northam suggested that a committee be appointed to make inquiry about certain facts before action was taken upon this resolution. The Chairman appointed a committee to secure these facts for the Board.

At this point the presidents of the Teachers Colleges were invited to come before the Board. The Chairman called upon the presidents to make

their reports.

2. Last year at this date we had, counting only college students, 1,696 registered. We have today 1,483, a loss of 213. Last year we enrolled 834 freshmen, this year 581, a loss of 253. We have an increase of 40 in the upper classes. Two years ago we enrolled a total of 1,372, a peak enrollment for the fall term in the history of the institution up to 1931. In spite of our losses we have 111 more students than we had in attendance in 1931.

II. FACULTY.

We have this year the biggest demand for practice teaching opportunities that we have ever had in the history of the school. Dr. Merwin's report shows that eleven percent more students are taking practice teaching today than ever before in the fall term. We have an increase in the upper classmen; and these, of course, are the students for whom the practice schools are operated. For several years we have employed a part time student to help in

the rural practice schools, a Mrs. Elsie Parrish McNeill. She now has her B. Ed. Degree from this school and eight semester hours graduate work at the University of Illinois. I recommend that we pay her \$60.00 per month for eight months, and the rural board will take care of the remainder of her compensation.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES.

I am herewith recommending the appointment of Mr. W. G. McCracken as day watchman and superintendent of grounds. For fifteen years, I suppose, Mr. Sherretz, our night watchman, has put in an eighty-four hour week, going on duty at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and working until 2 A. M. For several years we have had the time between 2 A. M. and 7 taken care of by men chosen from the student body, but from 7 A. M. until 2 P. M. we have had no watchman. In trying to adjust ourselves to the general NRA program and to protect our buildings and our students, and particularly to control traffic at the entrance to our grounds, I have decided to ask for a twenty-four hour watchman service. The day-watchman will also be made superintendent of grounds, relieving Mr. Hagler, carpenter and repair man and superintendent of buildings, so that he may give his entire time to repair work. I perhaps may need to remind the board members that where Normal Avenue enters our campus it intersects Meridian Route, No. 2, with its tremendous traffic. It should be further remembered that nearly all the children of our elementary practice school on the campus must cross Route No. 2 four times each day. Ninety percent of all the students must do the same. I may add that for the present year we are saving one faculty salary so that we shall, if we put on the watchman, still keep within our appropriation. Furthermore, I have a sufficient reserve in the revolving fund to take care of the program next year. I recommend the salary of \$125.00 per month for Mr. McCracken.

Last winter our second cook, Mrs. Eva M. Cruse, asked for indefinite leave of absence because of illness. A substitute cook was secured, in fact I think we tried out two different people. After several months Mrs. Cruse decided to retire permanently. Mrs. Batterton, at that time in the office of the director, took up the matter and had certified to us a Mrs. Grace Lines of

Marion, Illinois at \$50.00 per month.

I notified the board at its meeting June 26, in Springfield that Miss Crawford, head of Anthony Hall, would very likely ask for the removal of Mrs. Malone, first cook, and Mrs. Handley, Housekeeper. These women had been with us a good many years and in many ways their conduct had been very satisfactory. Little by little, however, they had developed a tendency to seek favor with the students, and had failed in a good many cases to conform to the lines of conduct laid down for them by Miss Crawford. She finally lodged a very definite protest with me against their further employment, charging deliberate insubordination. I asked for and received their resignations on July 25. Through Mr. Hallihan, Chairman of the Board, I sent to the Civil Service Commission for a first cook and a housekeeper. In due course of time Mr. Hallihan notified me that Mrs. Myrtle Newman of Benton, Illinois had been certified as first cook at \$70.00 per month, and Mrs. Addie Ward of Creal Springs, Illinois, as housekeeper at \$65.00 per month.

About a year ago Mrs. Cora Sanders Norton, stenographer and book-keeper in Mr. Miles' office, asked for indefinite leave of absence. In August of this year she wrote to the State Civil Service Commission and asked to have her seniority recognized so that she might resume her position. The work had been distributed among students. The Secretary of the Civil Service Commission promptly authorized her reinstatement, and as she was badly needed in the office I put her to work beginning August 5, at a salary

of \$90.00 per month.

II. FACULTY.

1. Vacancies because of leaves granted regular members of the faculty are recommended to be filled as follows:

Miss Florence Brown, teacher of third grade in the training school, at \$1,800 for thirty-six weeks. Miss Brown is a graduate of the two year course for teachers at the State Teachers College at Kirksville, Missouri, and holds her Bachelor's degree from the Iowa State Teachers College, and her Master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. She is a member of Kappa Delta Pi, and has had considerable experience in rural schools, city schools, and training schools of teachers colleges. She has had special courses under such well known teachers as Dr. Bagley, Dr. Counts, Dr. Stratemeyer, and Dr. Craig.

Miss Constance Blegan, teacher of Physical Education for women, \$1,782 for thirty-six weeks. Miss Blegan graduated from the State Teachers College at LaCrosse, Wisconsin, in 1923, and took her Bachelor's degree at the University of Wisconsin in 1928 and her Master's degree from the same institution in 1933. She has had considerable experience in the teaching of Physical Education in the grades and in high school, and for the past three years has been director of Physical Education in the State Teachers College at Dillon, Montana. She comes highly recommended by members of the Department of Physical Education at the University of Wisconsin, and by the superintendents and principals under whom she has taught.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION.

The regular departments are continuing their work as in the past, with only minor changes in their courses and in the curriculums. The rural school work offered in the curriculum for teachers of all grades has been growing rapidly, and nearly all of the students who have finished the first two years of it and desire to teach have been placed.

2. From year to year the extension work is being more nearly organized on the same basis as residence work. This slightly reduces the enrollment in this department but the entire staff still carries a heavy load with 675 different persons enrolled last year, which is but fourteen less than the previous year.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

1. Of course the training school building and equipment for which \$350,000.00 was appropriated two years ago are greatly needed, but the appropriation will lapse and the only things saved are the plans and partial specifications.

2. The second story of the tool and implement house, for which \$3,500.00 had been appropriated, and the athletic field fence for which \$3,300 had been

appropriated, have had to be abandoned.

3. Appropriations for the next biennium are so small that much difficulty will be experienced in serving the most conservative needs of the college. For example, the expenditures during the last biennium for coal, light, gas and power total within \$100 of the total appropriation for Operation during the new biennium, thus leaving nothing for laboratory supplies, and items of general operation.

Repairs on the electric wiring in the main building. Two switches were installed in the basement from which circuits were run through 3-inch iron conduits up to the central distributing points near each end of the building on the second floor. At these points steel cabinets fitted with the latest type fuseless switch and circuit breakers were installed to which the existing lighting circuits were connected.

The improvement relieves the overloaded mains in the basement, but, most important, it eliminates the obsolete panels housed in wooden cabinets on wooden mountings, on the second floor, which constituted a serious fire hazard. The new installation is such that it can be extended and made part of a complete rewiring of the building which is much needed.

The dwelling house on the land purchased two years ago has been put into condition by painting and making some repairs. This house is used as a rooming house for men of the college with a member of the faculty in charge. Part of the lower floor is used as a men's club house.

A considerable number of elm trees have died and have been cut down, and more are dying. Their loss will seriously affect the beauty of the campus.

Some needed walks have been made from slabs of limestone taken from a former curbing along Fourth Street on the west side of the campus. This work was done with the regular force of employees.

There are at present 70 girls living in the women's dormitory, eight of

whom pay for board and room in whole or in part by working.

2. Comment on attendance.

With an ever increasing number of graduates being turned out by the high schools of the state and with no increase in the opportunities for employment, there is bound to be an increase in attendance at state teachers colleges, for parents of boys and girls of the ages from 17 to 19 dread the thought of idleness for these young people, and will send them to school if they can possibly manage to do so. Schools involving moderate expense for attending will naturally be favored during periods of economic depression. At any rate normal schools and teachers colleges have always filled up during such periods.

At the same time, the attendance at summer sessions is bound to decrease, as such attendance is made up so largely of teachers in service during the regular year. When school boards no longer grant bonuses for summer school attendance, when teachers' salaries are reduced, when such salaries are not paid in negotiable form or when payment is indefinitely deferred, when teachers sustain serious losses through bank failures, they are not in a position to attend summer sessions.

volving Fund. The asterisk(*) points out changes.

Resignations. There are a number of changes caused by the filling of vacancies caused by resignations. Upon the resignation of Frank S. Salisbury, Dean of the Training Schools, I appointed, subject to your approval, John W. Carrington as Director of the Training Schools. Mr. Carrington is an alumnus of I. S. N. U., has done two years of graduate work and obtained his A. M. degree from the University of Illinois. Mr. Carrington taught in country schools for several years, had ten years of experience as graded school principal, high school principal and small town superintendent in Fairbury, Manteno, Washburn, Homer, and Oakland, and since then has been for some years the city superintendent of schools at Cairo as well as principal of the

Cairo High School during the last three years.

Upon the resignation of Miss Ruberta N. Smith, the Director of the Division of Elementary Education, I appointed, subject to your approval, Miss Margaret Cooper. Miss Cooper is a graduate of Carleton College, obtained an advanced Kindergarten diploma from the State Teachers College at Mankato, Minnesota, and has done an additional two years of graduate work at Teachers College, Columbia University, receiving the M. A. degree and diploma in Elementary Supervision from that institution. Miss Cooper was a kindergarten and primary grade teacher at Hibbing, Minnesota, taught Primary Methods and Supervision at Des Moines College, was supervisor of fourth grade training at the State Normal College at Ypsilanti, Michigan, was supervisor of the Kindergarten and the first six grades at the Summit School, St. Paul, Minnesota, for three years, principal of the primary department and teacher of primary methods at the Mankato State Teachers College for five years, and for four years the director of the elementary school of the Chicago Teachers College.

Professor George H. Brinegar, Associate Professor of Education, resigned since the last meeting of the Board. In his place I have appointed Mrs. Stella V. Henderson. Mrs. Henderson is one of our own graduates, who obtained her A. M. degree at the University of Chicago and has done additional graduate work at that institution. For the last ten years she has taught in

the Joliet Township High School and Junior College.

Upon the resignation of Miss Ruth Gerard, Instructor in Music, I appointed Miss Margaret Westhoff, a graduate of our school, who obtained her A. M. degree at Northwestern University. Miss Westhoff taught music at the Champaign High School, in Junior High Schools at Decatur, Illinois, and at Davenport, Iowa. Her latest position was that of teacher of public school music in Marverove College. Detroit, Michigan.

Upon the resignation of Miss Emma Lakin, Instructor in Physical Education, I appointed Miss Thelma Shomler, a graduate of the University of Iowa, who has done some graduate work at that institution and at the University of Wisconsin. Miss Shomler has taught physical education in a private school for girls and last year taught at the State Teachers College

at Warrensburg, Missouri.

At the Soldiers and Sailors Childrens School I have appointed Miss Frances A. Laughlin to substitute for Miss Dorothy Brosi during the fall and winter quarters. Miss Laughlin has an A. M. degree from the University of Iowa and has taught in intermediate grades in Iowa and Illinois.

In place of Mr. Albert C. Doty, I have appointed Mr. Edson White. Mr. White has recently received his B. Ed. degree in physical education and is

fitting beautifully into his position.

At the request of the Acting Superintendent of the Soldiers and Sailors Childrens School three employees were transferred to the faculty list as assistants in vocational work.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES.

Miss Hazel Voorhees, mimeograph operator, was released, although a most efficient worker. The position is now filled by Mrs. Dorothy W. King, who during the last three years was assistant secretary to the president.

The effect of the various changes in the payroll has reduced the same to \$255,216.50; the total for other school employees is reduced to \$38,322.00; the total for other school employees paid from the revolving fund is reduced to \$38.835.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION.

No report from the Illinois State Normal University at this time would be adequate which ignored the peculiar difficulties by which we are confronted in the somewhat chaotic conditions which obtain. A divisional organization is in the process of coming into being. It has some very positive advantages, but as well its shortcomings. A number of adjustments will have to be

made in the interests of unity in the institution as a whole.

The recently inaugurated scheme for improving student teaching through a greater amount of observation and student participation in the activities of the training school is based on fundamentally sound principles. But it has reached only the initial stage for its inauguration. More time should have been taken to make adequate preparation for putting it into actual operation. Some modifications have even now been made and others will probably have to be made later on. The imposing of the authority of instructor-supervisors on critic teachers in their relations with student teachers has been abolished as it created an intolerable condition of constant chafing. irritation and resulting discord and lack of unity. Perhaps the organization called for by the scheme is top heavy. Possibly the returns are not commensurate with the increased cost. Probably the operation of the scheme will result in a pernicious congestion in the training school. However, we are planning to go on with the experiment this year in order to give it a fair trial. The new director of the training schools and his assistants are open minded and sympathetic toward the general scheme, at the same time thoroughly competent to distinguish between the practicable and the impracticable.

V. THE CURRICULUM.

During the last two years there has been effected a rather comprehensive revision of our curricula. As they are now constituted they contain a number of features that were advocated by different members of our

faculty as long as twenty years ago. A revision should have been made some years ago. However, now that the revision was being made at least one more year ought to have been taken for putting the new curricula into operation. On the one hand they embody a few features that are highly objectionable to the faculty as a whole. Again they contain other features not in any way objectionable in themselves for which the members of the faculty have not had time to prepare. As a result the registration at the opening of our fall quarter this year was easily the most difficult one in the history of the school. Throughout the remainder of the present school year we shall be confronted by similar difficulties. It is only because I have full confidence in the competency and loyalty of our faculty that I look forward with assurance to the solution of these various problems.
