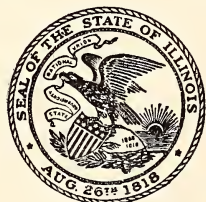

At a regular meeting of the Teachers College Board, with Hon. Frank G. Thompson presiding, the board voted to cause all the proceedings that were not published in printed form since 1936 up to the beginning of the administration of Governor Dwight H. Green and thereafter, to be printed.

The cost of the printing was to be taken from elapsed printing appropriations of the 1943-1945 biennium of the Department of Registration and Education and Superintendent of Public Instruction.

NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

The Normal School Board met in the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction at Springfield, Illinois, on Monday, February 19, 1940, at 10:00 A. M.

The meeting was called to order by John J. Hallihan, Chairman. Roll call by the secretary. Absent: Dr. William E. Sunderman, Charleston.

The report and following resolution was given by Mr. Beich, after meeting with the five State Teachers College Presidents on graduate work being done in the various schools under the tutorship of the University of Illinois:

"We, the members of the special committee of the Normal School Board appointed to cooperate with the presidents of the State Teachers Colleges in a study of the need for offering college work on the graduate level by these colleges, are convinced as a result of the consideration we have given this matter that there is a growing need for such offerings in them which must be met in the future.

"Therefore, we recommend that the Normal School Board authorize the presidents of the five Teachers Colleges to prepare a plan for presenting such work in these colleges after cooperating in so far as possible with the University of Illinois in a study of the whole problem of graduate work for teachers in the state in order that the work of the teachers colleges and the University may be mutually helpful in the program of teacher education. Furthermore, we recommend that the plan agreed upon be reported in full to the Normal School Board at an early date."

A motion was made by Mr. Alschuler and seconded by Dr. Bradley, that the resolution pertaining to graduate work in the Normal Schools be laid upon the table. Board members unanimously voted "aye."

Resolution that the board approve the salary schedule of Northern Illinois State Teachers College as presented to the Board at the meeting on September 11, 1939, in Chicago, Illinois. Motion made by Dr. Bradley and seconded by Mr. Alschuler. Board members unanimously voted "aye."

Discussion by Mr. Hallihan and the Board members of the importance of immediate action on the fire prevention program to carry out the recommendations of the State Fire Marshal's office regarding the Normal Schools.

Resolution: "That it is the unanimous action of this Board that the State Fire Marshal's requirements of every school, of every building in our Normal School system be complied with immediately. That every president of every institution will be held personally responsible for that requirement and that this action be read to each of our five presidents in person at a meeting of the Normal School Board as of this date."

A motion was made by Dr. Bradley and seconded by Mr. Beich that the resolution be adopted. Resolution unanimously adopted.

A motion was made by Miss McIntire and seconded by Mr. Dill that the requisition in the amount of \$409.50 for broadcasts, etc., at Western Illinois State Teachers College be approved by the Board. All board members, with the exception of Mr. Alschuler, voted "aye."

A motion was made by Dr. Bradley and seconded by Mr. Wieland that requisition number 89 of the Southern Illinois State Teachers College in the amount of \$67.90 be approved by the Board. Motion unanimously passed.

A motion was made by Dr. Bradley and seconded by Mr. Alschuler that the following resolution be adopted.

Resolution: "Hereafter, or beginning at this time, any school that anticipates broadcasting or has radio plans or publicity, involving the expenditure of money, must submit same to this Board." Resolution unanimously adopted.

Mr. File brought to the attention of the Board the W. P. A. Statewide Project for discussion and consideration. Miss McIntire moved that we sponsor this Statewide W. P. A. Project in the five Teachers Colleges as outlined in Mr. File's report, not to exceed \$13,650 as the Board's share, to be appropriated out of the permanent improvement fund. Motion seconded by Mr. Dill. All voted "aye." Resolution unanimously adopted.

A motion was made by Mr. Alschuler that we now appropriate a sufficient amount of money, not to exceed \$100,000, to be ascertained by Mr. File from the presidents of the five Teachers Colleges and the State Architect's office to complete the requirements made by the State Fire Marshal's office. Be it understood that this should be in addition to the amount of \$100,000 already appropriated for such purpose. Motion seconded by Mr. O'Harra. Resolution unanimously adopted.

The presidents of the five Teachers Colleges now joined the meeting. Report of the Southern Illinois State Teachers College was read and submitted to the Board by President Pulliam. Mr. Wieland moved that the report be accepted. Seconded by Miss McIntire. Board unanimously voted "aye."

The report of the Illinois State Normal University was read and submitted to the Board by President Fairechild. Miss McIntire moved that the report be accepted, except items referring to the permanent improvement fund and the deleting of sections 11, 12, 13, 14, 20 and 21 of the report. Motion seconded by Mr. Beich. Board members unanimously voted "aye."

A motion was made by Mr. Dill that the budget committee be appointed to allocate \$970,000.00 in the Normal School permanent improvement fund and that all the requests in the reports for money from that fund be deleted from the reports. Motion seconded by Mr. Wieland. All voted "aye."

The report of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College was read and submitted to the Board by President Adams. The Board deleted from Dr. Adams' report items 4, 13, 15 and 17. Added to number 14, the words "as well as Annie's Woods." Number 19 of

Dr. Adams' report was permission to discontinue college sessions for the five schools for September 27th for a meeting of the combined faculties at Springfield. Mr. O'Harra moved that the report be accepted and approved with the understanding that the items deleted already will not be considered. Motion seconded by Mr. Dill. Board unanimously approved and accepted report.

The report of the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College was read and submitted to the Board by Dr. Buzzard. Also a report submitted by Dr. Buzzard to Mr. Beich on graduation fees collected by various teachers colleges throughout the country.

Mr. O'Harra moved that Dr. Buzzard be directed to notify the associate architects that they have been paid more than they are entitled to because of the equipment of the Health Education Building and that nothing more will be authorized for payment by this Board and that if they care to make any further claim that the Board insists on making a claim for a refund to them. Motion was seconded by Mr. Dill. Board unanimously voted "aye."

In Dr. Buzzard's report, it was agreed that under number 7, there should be number 7a, stating a graduation fee of five dollars.

A motion was made by Mr. Wieland that Dr. Buzzard's report be accepted by the Board. Motion seconded by Mr. Dill. All voted "aye."

Report read and submitted by Dr. Morgan of Western Illinois State Teachers College. Board deleted items 6, 7, 8, and 9. Number 14 added—approval of collection of graduation fee of five dollars for 1941. Mr. Wieland made a motion that Dr. Morgan's report be accepted with exception of those items deleted. Motion seconded by Mr. Dill. Board unanimously voted "aye."

Upon the motion of Mr. Dill, seconded by Mr. Wieland, the meeting adjourned.

4. From the above figures, it is observed that the enrollment of college students has increased 15.2% in one year. By classes, the increase is Seniors, 16.8%; Juniors, 17.7%; Sophomores, 17%; and Freshmen, 12.7%.

5. The Extension work has been reduced considerably this year, due to the retirement of one of the staff, and the fact that the enrollment on the campus has been considerably increased and some additional provisions had to be made to care for new classes.

II. FACULTY

1. When the college opened in the Fall, there was such a large number of Freshmen for the English classes that an additional teacher had to be employed to teach two classes in that subject. This had to be repeated for the winter quarter. A mature student, Miss Frances Rogers, who is taking some special courses in speech, and who has her master's degree from the University of Illinois, was given these two classes at a salary of \$80.00 per month for half time.
2. Miss Mary Bennett, who was given a leave for the first part of the college year, has completed her work at the University of Chicago, and will receive her doctor's degree in March. She returned to her work in the Biology Department, and Mr. S. B. Shively, who had her work during her absence, has left the college.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

1. Mr. Creighton Bateson, who has been a member of the janitorial force for more than thirty years, contracted tularemia this fall, and died December 8, 1939. He was a dependable, hard working man, and the college has lost a good employee in his passing.

A requisition was sent in for another janitor, and Mr. William Elam has been certified at a salary of \$100.00 per month. This is a temporary appointment for three months, at the end of which time it will become permanent if he proves satisfactory.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION

1. A very careful study of the problem of graduate work in Teachers Colleges has been made during the past five years, and following a careful consideration of the report of the faculty committee which made the study, the faculty is of the opinion that Western ought to begin to offer some graduate work during the summer, and perhaps one or two graduate courses by Extension. Perhaps the special committee which the Board authorized September 11, 1939, will have some general recommendation at this meeting.

V. THE CURRICULUM—No report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. At the last meeting of the Normal School Board, a request was made for an allotment of \$30,000.00 to purchase and equip a home management house for Western. The Advisory Committee of the Board for this college visited Macomb as requested by the Board, and no doubt will report today. The request for this allotment is renewed.
2. At the same time, a request was made for an allotment for \$60,000.00 to build a super-structure for the swimming pool. That request is hereby renewed.

3. It now develops that the contract for repairs to the roof on the main building did not include all needed repairs. It is suggested that an additional \$8,500.00 may be required to fix the cupola and the remainder of the roof on the main building and the gutters on the gymnasium, so as to prevent damage to these buildings. This amount ought, therefore, to be allotted from the money reappropriated for such purposes.
4. Monroe Hall, the girls' dormitory, has been a source of much concern to me for several years, because I feel that it is a fire hazard, and definitely needs rewiring and new electric fixtures. This need was felt to be so great that repeated reports on it have been made to this Board, and your approval of having it fixed was given on condition that the money could be found to pay for the work. On April 9, 1939, when it seemed possible that the reserve in the dormitory's part of the Income Fund could be used, a requisition for \$17,500.00 was drawn for this work, and the Architect's office made a study of the building preparatory to making plans and specifications for the job. The contract was not let, however, prior to July 1, 1939, and the work has not been done. The hazard still exists, and something must be done before another college year opens. It now seems that since this rehabilitation of the electrical work was included in the Fire Marshal's report, that this work should be done out of the funds which this Board set apart for removing the fire hazards. An allotment of \$17,500.00 for this purpose is therefore requested.
5. Many of the other things recommended in the Fire Marshal's report have not been done, but the State Architect has been requested to furnish estimates, and these will be furnished to the Board or the Advisory Committee, just as soon as they are received.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE—No report due.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. A question has arisen during the interim since the last meeting of the Board as to policy. Some time ago, I was told that when matters that needed immediate attention arose, I was to take them to my Advisory Committee, but when such a matter did come up, letters were written to all of the members of the Board, I am told, although I was not sent a copy of the letter so that I might know what the inquiry was. This was with respect to a requisition I filed to cover the cost of weekly radio programs from the college, which are broadcast over WTAD from our campus, which costs less and is more convenient than to travel seventy-five miles to Quincy, where the station is located. I should like to be able to depend on a policy which the Board has set up.

2. Recently a request has come from the local post of the Legion that the United States flag be flown from our college and from our training school flag poles each day when the college is in session.

It has been the custom for thirty years to have the flag flying one day each week (Thursday, known as Flag Day) and on national and state holidays, as well as on other special days.

To discover the custom in 37 teachers colleges in this and adjoining states, inquiries were made. It was found that slightly more than half of these colleges display the flag every day. It is the rule of the Board in a few cases, and there are R. O. T. C. units in a few. The presidents were divided about equally between those who like to have the flag displayed every day, and those who think it is better to have it displayed on state, national, and special days. Does the Board wish to establish a policy?

X. SUMMARY

The approval of the Normal School Board was given on the following matters:

1. List of graduates for July, 1939.
2. List of graduates for August, 1939.
3. Appointment of Miss Frances Rogers as an assistant during Fall and Winter Quarters, on half time, at \$80.00 per month.
4. Temporary appointment of Mr. William Elam as janitor, at \$100.00 per month.
5. Courses on graduate level, to be offered for summer students and extension students, beginning in the summer of 1940.
6. Allotment of \$30,000.00 to buy and furnish a home management house.
7. Allotment of \$60,000.00 to build super-structure for swimming pool.
8. Allotment of \$8,500.00, the amount estimated by the State Architect to repair roof and cupola on main building, and roof on gymnasium.
9. Allotment of \$17,500.00 to rewire Monroe Hall and equip with new fixtures.
10. Allotment of amount estimated by State Architect to complete repairs recommended by Fire Marshal and special committee.
11. A policy whereby important matters may be carried out by a president with the advice of the advisory committee for the institution over which he presides.
12. Any policy which the Board may wish to have followed with respect to the display of the flag.
13. The plan outlined for the salary for teachers in the affiliated schools.

The Placements Office found positions or assisted in securing positions for 66.8% of the persons enrolled for placements services this year.

Miscellaneous requests were received for teachers of the following subjects which are not at present included in the curriculum of this College: library science, Smith-Hughes home economics, agriculture, industrial arts, and other vocational subjects for NYA and public schools, rural music, art, and reading supervisors, and sight-saving class teachers.

4. The College continues to labor under a very severe handicap because of its very large enrollment. The wave of increase, started by the record-breaking freshman class in 1938, is just beginning to hit the upper classes and the practice school, where emergency measures for caring for it are impossible without sharp increases in expenditure. One can add more people to a freshman English class even if it is bad policy to do it, but facilities for practice teaching are by their very nature relatively inflexible.

I have a letter from Mr. Merwin of the practice schools showing that, whereas we have an existing peak capacity to take care of 180 practice teachers per term, he has applications for practice in the spring term from 259 eligible people. At present, we are carrying 190, or 10 more than there is room for. This is done by doubling up and splitting classes, which does not provide satisfactory and typical practice teaching for the student.

The overcrowded condition is making itself felt in other ways. Certain shop courses in manual arts and agriculture have completely overloaded the facilities that can possibly be made available for them. The College must have its facilities very greatly increased within the next two or three years or it will be necessary for us to limit enrollment. The limitation of enrollment is bound to result in resentment, both against the College administration and against the State administration as a whole. This resentment will be especially acute in Southern Illinois since there is no other place to which the less prosperous students can go.

In my honest judgment the following is a minimum program for the next five years for the College at Carbondale. This program ought to have been begun long ago. Further delay is going to be disastrous to the work of the school.

1. This College needs a complete overhauling of plant and grounds with at least \$2,000,000 for physical expansion now, and more for the future. The next steps that need to be taken to meet even present demands on the College are :
 - a. To buy all the land that we will need in the next twenty years. Each passing year will make this land harder to get and more expensive. The area now under negotiation is only a relatively small part of what any statesmanlike vision for the future would require us to procure.
 - b. To build a model training school on the plot selected for it in order to do two very important things :

First, to get the present scattered and inadequate training school off the campus, where it interferes with the College, and where it occupies space that is desperately needed for other purposes.

Second, to set up in the new building a model, modern, practical program of education for all the public schools of Southern Illinois to see and to imitate; a program in which the education of the student is directed straight to the goal of making him a capable, self-reliant, self-supporting citizen of the modern world, not merely a semi-literate dependent who loses all power of self-direction and self-help when he loses the employment someone else provides. How this may be done is too large a story to describe here, but the program for doing it is well worked out.

2. The College needs an operating budget at least twice as large as the present one, and even then it will still be operating very thriftily compared with other schools doing a similar job with a similar regional responsibility. It needs to be remembered that this College is doing a critically necessary job for a region that is as large in area and in population as several of the smaller states, most of whom maintain both a state university and several state colleges.
3. It needs to be set free from the legal restriction of its function to that of teacher training. It never has, from its earliest beginnings, actually been merely a teacher training institution. It always has been, and by every reasonable consideration of sound public policy indubitably ought always to continue to be the people's great liberal arts college of Southern Illinois, where the poor but able young people from hill farm and coal miner's cottage can come to get their opportunity at success and creative leadership in any field for which they have taste and talent.

II. FACULTY

1. Pursuant to authority given at the last meeting of the Board on September 11, 1939, I have made the following appointments to the faculty:
 - a. To fill the new position in the Physiology and Health Education Department I am submitting the name of Dr. E. L. Borkon. Dr. Borkon received the B. S. degree in 1931, the Ph.D degree in 1937, and the M. D. degree in 1938 from the University of Chicago. He served for four years as an assistant in the Department of Physiology at the University of Chicago and has had research and hospital experience in various laboratories and hospitals in the Middle West. Last year, 1938-39, he served in the Army Medical Service in the North Woods.
I am asking the Board to validate the appointment of Dr. Borkon as the Assistant School Physician at a salary of \$2475 for the thirty-six weeks.
 - b. To fill the position left vacant in the Carterville High School by the resignation of Miss Thelma Woodburn, I am submitting the name of Miss Elinor Douglas. In 1930 Miss Douglas received the B. A. degree and in 1934 the M. A. degree from the State University of Iowa. She has had seven years teaching experience in high school.
I am asking the Board to validate the appointment of Miss Douglas as critic in the Carterville High School. Our portion of her salary is \$396 for the thirty-six weeks.
 - c. For the position in the Household Arts Department, I am submitting the name of Miss Gladys W. Babcock. Miss Babcock received both the bachelor's degree and the master's degree from the University of Minnesota. She was

employed in 1938-39 as a critic in the University High School of the University of Minnesota. It is recommended that Miss Babcock's appointment in the Household Arts Department be validated, at a salary of \$2025 for the thirty-six weeks. She began her work in the Household Arts Department on November 20, 1939.

- d. For the position in the Library, I am submitting the name of Miss Mary Vocelle. Miss Vocelle received the bachelor's degree from Nazareth College in 1934 and her diploma in Library Science in 1938 from the University of Wisconsin Library School. During 1938 Miss Vocelle was employed in the Lewis Institute Library in Chicago.

It is recommended that the appointment of Miss Vocelle be confirmed by the Board at a salary of \$1260 for thirty-six weeks. She began her work as Librarian on October 9, 1939.

- e. For the position in the Zoology Department left open by the leave of absence granted Miss Martha Scott, I am submitting the name of Dr. E. L. Miller. Dr. Miller received the master's degree from Iowa Wesleyan College in 1928 and his doctor's degree from the University of Illinois in 1933. For the last seven years he has been employed as Associate Professor of Zoology at Louisiana State University. He is on a leave of absence from that University for this year.

I recommend that Dr. Miller's appointment be validated at a salary of \$1500 from December to May, inclusive. This appointment is for the remainder of this year only.

2. Just before the opening of the Fall Quarter I received word from Miss Thelma Kellogg, Associate Professor in the English Department, that due to the critical illness of her mother, it would be impossible for her to return to the campus this year. She asked to be released from teaching for the year 1939-40. I am, therefore, recommending that Miss Kellogg's leave of absence be confirmed.
3. For the position in the English Department left vacant by the absence of Miss Kellogg, I am submitting the name of Miss Geneva Parmley. Miss Parmley received the B. S. degree from Central Missouri State Teachers College in 1924, and the M. A. degree from Northwestern University in 1929. She has done additional work toward the doctorate at Northwestern University. Miss Parmley has had fourteen years teaching experience in the public high schools of Illinois.

I am asking the Board to validate the appointment of Miss Parmley as a substitute instructor for this year in the English Department at a salary of \$1890 for the thirty-six weeks.

4. Since the last meeting of the Board, Miss Frances Barbour, an Associate Professor in the English Department, has re-

quested leave of absence for the year because of a long illness that required a year's rest. I am, therefore, recommending that Miss Barbour's leave of absence be confirmed.

5. For the position left vacant in the English Department by the absence of Miss Barbour, I am submitting the name of Miss Winifred Burns. Miss Burns received the A. B. degree in 1925 and the M. A. degree in 1933 from the University of Illinois. She has, in addition to this, done some work toward the doctor's degree. Miss Burns has had eleven years teaching experience in the schools of Illinois. I am asking the Board to validate the appointment of Miss Burns as a substitute instructor for this year in the English Department at a salary of \$1890 for the thirty-six weeks.
6. I have been invited by the University of Illinois to share a course in teachers college education during their summer session with President Baker of the Milwaukee State Teachers College, Milwaukee, Wisconsin. According to the plan proposed I am to teach the first half of the eight-weeks term, Mr. Baker the second. For this service to the University of Illinois the University proposes to pay to the Normal School Income Fund a sum of \$500 for my services for the four weeks.

Since it is necessary from time to time for me to urge other members of the faculty to give up their summer work in order to bring the size of the summer faculty within the budget allowance, since it is a good thing for a member of a college faculty to receive the stimulation of another environment occasionally, and since the invitation to the University of Illinois constitutes good recognition for the College and for me, I should like very much to go. At the time the invitation was extended I took the matter up with the Advisory Committee for the College. They gave me permission to accept the appointment subject to approval by the Board.

III. OTHER EMPLOYEES

Following the usual procedure, I sent a requisition through the Department of Registration and Education to the State Civil Service Commission for an extra fireman for the months of December, January, February, and March. I am asking the Board to validate the appointment of Mr. Joe DeRorre as extra fireman for the four month period at a salary of \$105 per month.

2. The Council of Administration has approved the suggestion that this year the mid-spring term be discontinued altogether. Our regular enrollment has reached a point where it should be most unwise to undertake the rather large extra load and the added confusion which the mid-spring term brings to the College. This will probably mean an added enrollment in the summer term.

It is noteworthy that this is the first serious step that the College is forced to take in the direction of curtailing services because of lack of facilities. If something is not done quite soon to provide facilities for the school, other much more drastic steps along the same road will have to be taken. It is, therefore, recommended that the mid-spring term be officially discontinued.

3. The agreements with the two affiliated schools, namely, the Brush Training School in Carbondale, and the Carterville Community High School at Carterville, are continued this year unchanged. These arrangements are made by mutual agreement between the respective boards of education and the College administration.

4. Since the last meeting of the Board, there has been submitted to the members of the Board the annual report of the Business Manager of the College. I respectfully call attention to this report which gives a detailed account of all the receipts and expenses of the College proper, as well as of all student organizations and auxiliary enterprises of the College.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

Mrs. Wanda Newsum Gum, Assistant to the Dean of Women and Director of Student Employment, presents the following report of the work of the Student Employment Office during the past year, July 1, 1938, to June 30, 1939:

Requests for part-time work were received from 1125 individuals. Of the 1125, 745 completed and returned application forms. A greater number of students were aided in finding employment because of the increased effort made by our Office to find jobs in private employment. A total of 680 students received part-time work, and 594 of these worked at steady part-time employment. The former figure (680) represents 38% of the total average enrollment that received employment through the efforts of this Office. This percentage does not include another group of working students who found jobs without our help. So far, it has not been possible to obtain accurate figures of these students who obtain work for themselves.

Supplement to Board Report for February 19, 1940

Since preparing the report which was mailed to the members of the Board, two situations have arisen on the campus which will require action by the Board. These matters are respectfully presented below for insertion at the point indicated by numbers in the Report to the Board.

II. FACULTY

7. Mr. Troy Stearns, the Director of Rural Education of the College, has presented his resignation effective last Friday in order to accept a position as Director of Rural Education at the Teachers College at Ypsilanti, Michigan. This invitation to go to Ypsilanti came to Mr. Stearns unexpectedly; but since it carries a salary of fifty dollars a month more than he received with us, and since Mr. Stearns feels there are professional advantages connected with the position, he was very anxious to accept it. I am recommending, therefore, that Mr. Stearns' resignation be accepted.
8. I am recommending that Mr. Stearns' position be left vacant pending the time when a suitable person can be found to fill it. Since this position is a nationally conspicuous one because

of its relationship to the Commission on Teacher Education of the American Council on Education, it will be highly important to secure not only a superior person, but one who will be acceptable to the Commission. Accordingly, the Practice Department is arranging to reorganize its work by employing an additional student assistant at one hundred dollars a month, so that it may carry the work forward during the remainder of the year without Mr. Stearns.

9. Mr. Bruce W. Merwin, the Director of Practice Teaching, and Mr. Hal Hall, the Principal of the University High School, have been in correspondence with the State Board for Vocational Education concerning a vocational agriculture course for the University High School, beginning next year. Since half of the teacher's salary will presumably be paid by the Federal Board for Vocational Education, this important addition to the University High School staff can be made at relatively small cost. Furthermore, since no other high school in Jackson County now offers courses in vocational agriculture, Mr. Merwin and Mr. Hall believe that the University High school will collect enough non-high school tuition from farm boys of the area around the College to cover our share of the teacher's salary. I am recommending, therefore, that the Board approve the proposal to establish a Department of Vocational Agriculture in the University High School.

5. Selective Admission.

Although the limitation of enrollment set by the Normal School Board on October 7, 1935, at 1850 students was removed by Board action at the meeting June 19, 1939, Illinois State Normal University is forced to continue the use of a selective admission program and an attempt to control the number of entering freshmen became necessary this year. It was possible to admit only those who are in the upper three-fourths of their high school graduating classes and not one single exception was made in taking anyone in the lowest or fourth quarter of such high school classes. It likewise became necessary to deny admission to many transfer students, including those who were dropped for poor scholarship or were on probation at any other institution. We were only able to accept students who had a "C" average in the school from which they transferred, regardless of whether they were in good standing in the institution from which they wished to transfer. Even with all of these restrictions, the enrollment was 1945, which is really too large for the physical plant of the University to absorb in a satisfactory manner. It would appear that we

must have still further restrictions or provide more housing facilities on the campus in order to meet the needs of the University. Thus far, the restrictions, although illegal by a strict interpretation, have been accepted by the citizens of the state, but we have incurred the enmity and in some instances the open wrath of school administrators who believe that our procedure is undemocratic and unfair to some of their students. This is a problem that will have to be met in the near future, although I doubt whether it will ever be possible to enlarge the physical plant of the University to the extent of meeting the demands of all students who wish to enter this school.

6. Extension Courses for the First Semester 1939-1940.

The demand continues for extension courses and is even more pressing than at times in the past, due to certain requirements and expectations of the Department of Public Instruction that teachers-in-service add to their educational qualifications.

With limited funds and the necessity of restricting the faculty to campus activities, we have been able to meet only a portion of the demands for the first semester of the present school year. The limited offering for this period was distributed as follows:

II. FACULTY

1. Resignations.

- a. Ruth E. Tice, Instructor in lower grades at Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Children's School, in order to accept a position on the staff of the State Teachers College at Emporia, Kansas.
- b. As a matter of record the resignation of Mr. W. A. Hammitt, Director of Religious Education at the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Children's School, is reported even though Mr. Hammitt was on that portion of the payroll provided by the Department of Public Welfare. Mr. Hammitt resigned in order to accept a position as superintendent of the Baby Fold located in Normal.

2. Leaves of Absence.

- a. For health reasons, Mr. L. W. Hacker, Director of the Division of Rural Education, requested a leave of absence for the first semester of the 1939-1940 school year. This leave of absence was granted without pay and due to our financial situation the attempt was made to absorb his work during the time he was absent. I am pleased to report that Mr. Hacker has now returned and resumed his work at the beginning of the second semester and appears to be much improved in health.
- b. Mr. W. I. De Wees, Assistant Professor of Agriculture, requested a leave of absence for the first semester of the 1939-1940 school year in order to do further graduate work in agriculture at the University of Illinois. Mr. De Wees has resumed his work at the opening of the second semester on January 29.
- c. Mr. L. E. Laubaugh, Assistant Professor of Agriculture, has requested a leave of absence for the second semester of the 1939-1940 school year and at this time is attending the University of Illinois in order to do further graduate work in agriculture.
- d. Miss Gladys Bartle, Assistant Professor of Art, has requested a leave of absence for the second semester of the 1939-1940 school year in order to complete her work for the Ph.D. degree at the University of Wisconsin. All of her work has been completed except the thesis upon which she is working this semester.
- e. Miss Camille Montgomery, Instructor in Art, at the June 19 meeting of the Normal School Board was granted a

leave of absence for the first semester of the 1939-1940 school year, and now has asked that her leave be extended for one year from the expiration of the leave granted, or until February 1, 1941. Miss Montgomery is doing work on her doctor's degree at Louisiana State University. She will return to teach during the summer session but would like to be away from the campus the first semester of the next school year.

3. New Appointments Recommended.

- a. Edith L. Goldmann, Instructor in Art, at a salary of \$2025 for nine months work, effective September, 1939, to take the place of Miss Camille Montgomery to whom a leave of absence has been granted. Miss Goldmann has her B.S. and M.S. degrees from the University of Wisconsin and has had teaching experience in elementary and secondary schools of Michigan and Illinois, together with college experience in North Carolina and Iowa. She came to her present position from Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, where she was Assistant Professor of Art.
- b. John W. Green, Assistant Professor of Agriculture, to fill an existing vacancy in the Department at a salary of \$2250 for nine months work, effective September, 1939. Mr. Green has his B.S. degree from Purdue University and his M.S. degree from the College of Agriculture of the University of Illinois, where he has also done considerable work toward his Ph.D. degree and has served as associate in agricultural economics for the past two years. Mr. Green has had public school experience in two Smith-Hughes high schools in Illinois and is the co-author of several publications in the field of agriculture.
- c. Olivia Hansen, Instructor in Commerce, to fill a newly created position, at a salary of \$2025 for nine months, effective September, 1939. Miss Hansen has an A.B. degree from the Colorado College of Education and an M.A. degree from the State University of Iowa. She has had teaching experience in Colorado and Nebraska.
- d. J. E. Young, Assistant Professor of Biology, to fill a newly created position, at a salary of \$2250 for nine months, effective September, 1939. Dr. Young has an A.B. degree from Manchester College and an M.S. and Ph.D. degree from Purdue University. He has had teaching experience in the public schools of Ohio and Indiana, together with college experience as an instructor in Purdue University.
- e. O. L. Young, Assistant Professor of Agriculture, to fill a leave of absence position of Mr. De Wees for the first semester and Mr. Laubaugh for the second semester of the 1939-1940 school year, at a salary of \$2250, effective September, 1939. Mr. Young has a B.S. degree from Purdue

University and an M.S. degree from Ohio State University, doing his work in agriculture with emphasis upon agricultural engineering. In addition to the foregoing work he has done some work on his doctor's degree in agricultural engineering. He has had successful teaching experience in three Smith-Hughes high schools in the state of Ohio.

- f. George W. Bodecker, Instructor and Supervising Teacher at the affiliated Towanda Schools, at an annual salary of \$1575, of which \$810 is paid by Illinois State Normal University. Mr. Bodecker's work is science, physical education, and athletics. He has a B.E. degree from Western State Teachers College at Macomb and B.S. and M.S. degrees from the University of Illinois. He has had eight years of successful high school teaching experience in Illinois.
- g. Jane Kerkhof, Instructor and Supervising Teacher in the Walker Rural Affiliated School, at an annual salary of \$1350, effective September, 1939, of which \$540 is paid by Illinois State Normal University, to take the place of Miss Waneta Sedgwick, resigned. Miss Kerkhof has an A.B. degree from Calvin College in Michigan and an M.A. degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. Her teaching experience has been in Michigan and Illinois.
- h. Margaret Lawrence, Assistant Librarian, at a salary of \$1800 for nine months, effective September, 1939, to fill a newly created position. Miss Lawrence has B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Nebraska and a B.S. in Library Science from the University of Illinois. She has had teaching and library experience in Nebraska.
- i. Merrill Eugenia Pope, Instructor and Supervisor of Student Teachers in the lower grades at the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Children's School, at a salary of \$1710 for nine months, effective September, 1939, to take the place of Miss Tice, resigned. Miss Pope has an A.B. degree from Phillips University in Oklahoma and an M.A. degree from Teachers College, Columbia University, with additional work at the University of Southern California and National University of Mexico. Her teaching experience has been in Oklahoma and Kansas.
- j. Donald L. Weismann, Instructor in Art, at a salary rate of \$2025 for the second semester of the 1939-1940 school year, effective from January 29, 1940, to take the place of Miss Gladys Bartle on leave of absence for the present semester. Mr. Weismann has a B.E. degree from Milwaukee State Teachers College, a Ph.M. degree from the University of Wisconsin and has done considerable work toward his Ph.D. His teaching experience has been largely in the public schools at Sheboygan and Wauwatosa, Wisconsin.
- k. As a matter of record the appointment of Dr. H. R. Pearey as Director of Religious Education at the Illinois Soldiers

and Sailors Children's School is reported, although his salary of \$2016 for twelve months is paid by the Department of Public Welfare. Dr. Pearcy has a bachelor's degree and a master's degree from the University of Louisville and his Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago. He has been an elementary and high school teacher, a superintendent of schools, a special army chaplain, and a minister, coming directly to his present position from the Oakton United (Interdenominational) Church of Evanston, Illinois. He has also served as a special lecturer at Butler University, Indianapolis, Indiana. He began his work February 10, taking the place of Mr. W. A. Hammitt, who resigned effective December 31, 1939.

4. Appointment of Faculty for 1939-1940 School Year.

Since the presidents were requested not to make a regular report at any meeting held since June 19, 1939, the list of faculty passed upon by the Normal School Board at a meeting held on September 11, 1939, is here included as a supplementary report in order to be made an official part of a report from this school. (See included list submitted as a supplementary report but previously acted upon.)

5. Additional Attainments.

a. It is a pleasure to report that the following members of the faculty have completed work for and received doctors' degrees since June, 1939: Regina M. Connell, Latin (Columbia University); Leo J. Dvorak, Music (University of Iowa); Arthur H. Larsen, Education (University of Wisconsin); C. N. Mills, Mathematics, (University of Wisconsin); E. R. Johnson, English (Ohio State University); Robert S. Ellwood, Social Science (Indiana University). Six other members of the faculty expect to receive doctors' degrees before the opening of school in September, 1940.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

1. Death.

a. It is with regret that the death of Miss Beulah Howell, who served for several years under the classification of domestic at Fell Hall (women's residence on the campus) in the capacity of dining room girl, is reported at this time. Miss Howell died February 4 after an illness of about three weeks. Her position will not be filled for the present but student help will be used to carry on the work until such time as we request definite action through regular channels for someone to take her place.

2. Leave of Absence.

a. Miss K. Louise Stretch, junior stenographer in the office of the registrar, requested a six months leave of absence

effective September 1, 1939, due to home conditions. This request was reported in the usual manner and was granted through the usual channels, and is here reported as a matter of Board record.

3. New Appointments Recommended.

a. To fill the position of junior typist in the office of the business manager authorized at the June 19 meeting of the Board, Mrs. Helen Russell was secured and began work July 1, 1939, at a monthly salary of \$100 or \$1200 for the year of twelve months. Her appointment came as a result of reporting the request for help through the Department of Registration and Education to the Civil Service Commission.

4. Election of Employees.

a. As in the case of faculty employment, a list of those persons classed under "Other Employees" was reported at a meeting of the Board held on September 11, 1939, but since this was not made a part of any report of the president, it is here included and presented as a supplement to this report.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION

1. Student Teaching Plan

The off-campus student teaching plan of Illinois State Normal University is identical, with one exception, to that reported last year and includes affiliations with the Towanda Public Schools (elementary grades and high school); Grove, Maple Grove, Little Brick, Houghton and Walker Rural Schools; Normal Public Schools (certain special departments in junior and senior high schools); and commerce in Trinity High School in Bloomington. The one exception to the plan of last year is the addition of student teaching facilities in agriculture and in certain other high school subjects at Chenoa Community High School. However, the Chenoa affiliation, like that of the Normal Public Schools and Trinity High School, is without any cost to Illinois State Normal University for services of supervising teachers. The financial arrangement and obligation of Illinois State Normal University is identical with that reported a year ago.

2. Graduation Fee.

In my report to the Board on June 19, 1939, I raised the question regarding the matter of a graduation fee. Assuming that the inclusion of this fee, which is used in practically all colleges and universities throughout the country including teachers colleges and normal schools, would be sanctioned by the Board and with our catalog already on the press, the information has gone through

that source to the student body and they have accepted the additional fee as a regular and legitimate charge. I would now like to have official sanction for the collection of this fee which is scheduled as due on or before April 5, 1940,

Without the revenue from this fee, Illinois State Normal University would be approximately \$1500 in the red in taking care of commencement expenses of a type borne in the past, which this fee is designed to help cover. We have reached the point where we simply can not carry out the activities of commencement, including diplomas, diploma covers, rental of chairs, speakers, and other expenses, without some increased revenue and this appears to be a common and legitimate way in which to obtain this revenue.

3. The Calendar.

Although the reporting of the calendar for approval of the Board is not due at this time, the necessity of incorporating this information in the summer session bulletin, as well as the general catalog of the University, makes it desirable to obtain Board sanction at this time. The following calendar, agreed upon by the faculty of Illinois State Normal University, is reported with the hope that it will receive Board approval.

V. THE CURRICULUM

1. Agriculture

It is a matter of regret that I am unable to report any definite or final action in regard to the Smith-Hughes agriculture situation at the University. After the proposal of the new Five-Year Plan in the form of a set of standards by the State Board for Vocational Education and the acceptance of this plan by the Federal Office of Education in Washington, Illinois State Normal University took the remaining steps necessary to meet these standards and presumed that the matter was entirely cleared, awaiting final approval of the institution by the State Board for Vocational Education. However, through some channel, a statement was obtained from the Federal Office of Education indicating that the University of Illinois should pass upon the nature and quality of the work done in technical agriculture before Illinois State Normal University could be considered as offering courses which would be the equivalent of those for which a Bachelor of Science degree would

be awarded in the College of Agriculture at the University of Illinois. It is expected that final adjustment will be made on this matter in the near future. There is much detail concerning the situation that could be reported in the effort to keep Illinois State Normal University from qualifying for the education of Smith-Hughes teachers of agriculture. Additional information along this line will be supplied any Board member or other persons interested.

2. Four-Year Elementary Curriculum

Active work is being carried on at the present time by committees interested in the satisfactory development of a four-year elementary curriculum to meet the needs in this direction.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. Immediate needs

a. *Remodeling Old Library.* There does not seem to be any doubt about our getting into the new library by June 1 and the vacating of the old library at that time will make it available for alteration and reconstruction purposes during the summer months. A representative from the Office of Architecture and Engineering states that if we are to have it available for use in September, the construction work must start June 1. This makes it imperative that allocation of funds, the drawing of plans and specifications, obtaining bids and awarding contracts be carried out at an early date, and therefore it is hoped that action will be taken by the Normal School Board at this meeting to set aside funds for necessary work to make available eleven additional classrooms. Dean Schroeder has already started making his program on the basis of the availability of these eleven rooms when school opens in September of this year. From figures provided by the Division of Architecture and Engineering the reconstruction, together with equipment, will cost \$60,000.

b. *Architects' Fees.* It will be recalled that the Normal School Board agreed to earmark from the Permanent Improvements appropriation of the 1939-1941 biennium the sum of \$11,000 to cover the funds required by the Division of Architecture and Engineering for the work in connection with the Home Management House and University Library. Due to not having had any recent meetings of the Normal School Board this allotment was never set aside and therefore the money expended was taken from the original appropriation. This resulted in difficulty in checking the amount of money used by the Division of Architecture and Engineering, since it was not charged against any specific requisition or allocation of funds, and suddenly, and

unfortunately too late, it was discovered that the Division of Architecture and Engineering had expended \$6,000 more than the \$11,000 promised them. All attempts to get a return of this money have been without avail and there does not seem to be any legal way in which that Division can reimburse our fund. We are still keeping within the original amount appropriated for the construction and equipment of both the Home Management House and the Library, but contracts have of necessity had to include this \$6,000 used by the architect's office. I am therefore requesting that the allocation from the Permanent Improvements fund total the \$11,000 plus the \$6,000 or a total of \$17,000.

- c. When the University Library was constructed we found it necessary to utilize a valuable portion of the play area or athletic field used by the women of the University. The activities of this large group of our students were transferred to the southeast corner of the campus, but inadequate space is available unless a large five-foot tile be placed in a ditch cutting through the corner of the campus and covered in order to make available all of this land.

With the completion of the library certain work will need to be done in connection with grading and landscaping beyond that covered by the contract for the buildings. Nothing has been done along this line on the campus in the past twelve years and there is imperative need for reclaiming some portions of the campus not now available and reconditioning certain other areas in addition to that around the new buildings. For this work, a previous request for allocation from the Permanent Improvement fund is made, totaling \$10,000.

- d. *Cook Hall*. This building represents the most serious hazard that we have from the standpoint of poor wiring. The original or old wiring has never been replaced and for the sake of safety, as well as adequate lighting of classrooms in this building, used by the Division of Commerce, the Department of Music, and the school physician, the rewiring is needed. At the same time, the heating lines must be altered in order to permit the return line, not at present a part of the heating installation. It is difficult to heat many of the rooms and this alteration has been requested by the Division of Architecture and Engineering for some time. For the rewiring and the alteration in heating the amount needed is \$12,000.

Total amount requested from the Permanent Improvements fund for the foregoing needs \$99,000.

2. Progress on New Buildings

- a. *The Jessie E. Rambo Home Management House* was completed and occupied at the time school opened on September

12, 1939, although much of the furniture did not arrive for several weeks after the opening of the school year. The house is now fully occupied and is meeting a real need in the Division of Home Economics Education.

- b. *The Milner Library* construction work is about on schedule and there does not seem to be any doubt but what it will be completed, furnished, and ready for use on the opening day of summer session, June 11, 1940. It is now planned to dedicate the building on the afternoon of June 10, which is also commencement day. It has been possible to award all contracts for construction and furnishing within the amount of money available, which seems to represent an unusual procedure in present-day planning and construction of public buildings. It is hoped that all members of the Normal School Board and the presidents of the other teachers colleges will accept an invitation that will be extended to them a little later to be present for the dedication exercises.
- c. *The University Farm* building construction is now practically completed with the erection of a stock judging pavilion, a structure 120 feet by 60 feet, and the machinery building. The machine shop adjacent to the stock judging pavilion and provided by the federal government, both as to building and equipment, will be completed and in use within the next few weeks. The construction of these buildings, together with other work done at the farm, places the agricultural plant in excellent condition to meet the standards set up for institutions educating Smith-Hughes teachers of agriculture.

3. Name of Old Library

It was seemingly planned when the David Felmley Hall of Science was completed in 1930 that the old training school, erected in 1891 and in use during recent years as a library, would eventually be removed when a new building matching in appearance and location the science building would be erected. This would form a north quadrangle on the campus, leaving Old Main exposed to the north as well as to the south as is true at the present time. It becomes imperative, however, for a number of years, that the old library, to be vacated June 1 of this year, be used for class purposes and since it has carried the name library and has been designated on class schedules and programs under the letter "L", which will now be used in connection with the new Milner Library, it is requested that the Normal School Board sanction the desire of the faculty that this building be known as "North Hall" and designated with the letter "N" for program purposes. To name this old building after some person would probably be a mis-

take if the building is to be removed in even the fairly distant future and it is generally agreed upon the campus that the name "North Hall" would serve to designate this building in a satisfactory manner for the present.

4. Fire Protection

- a. *Fire Escapes.* In behalf of the faculty, students, alumni, and many local residents, I wish to protest the procedures being used in the installation of fire escapes on the campus of this University. There can be no question regarding the desirability of providing adequate fire protection and the removal of hazards in connection with fire or any panic situations. The protest is therefore not against reduction of fire hazards, but rather the apparent lack of time given in the consideration of the location of fire escapes and the type of fire escapes to be installed.

Merely the statement that "a fire escape will be located here," regardless of what it does to the appearance of the building or to the use of the building for class purposes, does not seem in keeping with present-day thoughtful consideration and planning. There is such a thing as architectural design and beauty and when such has made its impression on the minds and even the hearts of many persons it seems exceedingly unfortunate to thoughtlessly erect a "silo" directly in front of buildings and especially in front of windows, shutting off the light from offices and classrooms.

There certainly could not have been much investigation as to the type of fire escape used, since there are any number of unfavorable comments from school administrators now using the tubular type of fire escape being installed. These objections even come from public schools where their use is more likely to find less objection than in colleges and universities. If desired, I am willing to present these objections to the Board. Pending a further investigation of the situation, I would like to request that immediate action be taken by the Normal School Board to stop the erection of fire escapes on at least a portion of the buildings on the campus of Illinois State Normal University. I am doing this in the interest of safety, efficient operation of the school plant, and reasonable consideration for architectural beauty.

- b. *Fire Drills.* Some time ago a faculty committee was appointed to draw up plans for fire drills and exit from all rooms in all buildings on the campus. The work of this committee was recently completed and a schedule of directions has now been provided for rapid exit from the buildings. This plan does not include and contemplate use of fire escapes. I am sure that the members of the Normal

School Board can realize that you can not get adults, or even students of college age, especially the type that we have in our summer sessions, to carry out fire drills by use of the tubular type of fire escape. I am informed that there is no legal procedure by which one may be compelled to use such fire escapes for fire drill purposes or even in case of emergency if it is his desire not to do so. For that reason fire drills are ineffective with part of the group doing one thing and part doing something else, none of which would probably be done in exactly the same manner in an emergency. Further, with a program of classes scheduled, some two days a week and others three days a week, in different classrooms at different periods of the day, fire drills to be effective would have to be carried out for every period of each day of the week to familiarize students with what they should do in case of emergency.

It is hoped that the plan of acquainting those in charge of classes and the students of these classes with the location of regular and emergency exits from all classrooms will cover the situation and be just as effective in the protection of students in the event of unusual conditions demanding hasty exit.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

1. Financial Report

The financial report of the business manager covering all funds, including those of various student organizations as well as those handled through the state treasurer, has been delayed in reaching Board members due to our desire to have it printed and bound. This report is now ready and it is expected will have reached members of the Board before the time of this Board meeting. It is hoped that members of the Normal School Board will examine this carefully organized report from the office of the business manager from which examination will undoubtedly come a realization of the many details carried on by the business manager, audit clerk, and university cashier.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE

1. Student Union Building

It is hoped that Governor Horner will have appointed from the Normal School Board a sufficient number of persons to constitute a State board of education in order to take such action, as the type of board under which Illinois State Normal University was founded, as will make it possible to grant a certain amount of land on the campus to a holding corporation known as the Alumni Foundation, for purposes of constructing a Student Union Building. This building would be financed in its construction from a loan made available by the same life insurance company that has provided funds for the student union at the University of Illinois. In addition to this loan, funds provided through the Works Progress Administration would be sufficient to complete a unit of the building costing \$100,000. The furniture and furnishings to the extent of \$15,000

would be provided by funds raised from faculty, students, alumni, and other friends of the University. All steps have been taken to go ahead with the building just as soon as the land transfer has been made. It is hoped that action may be taken at this time in order not to lose the money that has been made available for this building without expense to the State of Illinois.

2. N. Y. A. College Aid

At the beginning of the school year a total allocation of \$25,650 was made from National Youth Administration funds to assist the students of Illinois State Normal University. This fund was used to help 245 students. Effective the first of January, the State office of the National Youth Administration made available \$490 a month additional for the balance of the school year, or a total of \$2,450, making \$28,100 available to help approximately 294 students for the 1939-1940 school year. This financial assistance has been of great help and has enabled the University to carry on many worthwhile projects.

3. Resident Agricultural Project

In eight well-constructed and excellent-appearing buildings on the University Farm the resident agricultural project dealing with 65 young men is in full progress at the present time. This number will be added to in the near future to bring the total up to 100 or possibly 112 as the maximum set for this unit.

This group of young men is rendering valuable service to the University in connection with the acquisition of a practical education in fields of agriculture and industrial arts, as well as from other fields of instruction made available through University facilities.

X. SUMMARY

8. Election of other employees as listed and sanctioned by the Board on September 11.
9. Approval of a graduation fee of \$5.00 to be charged all persons graduating from Illinois State Normal University.
10. Approval of the calendar for the 1940-1941 school year.
11. Allocation of \$60,000 from the 1939-1941 biennial appropriation for Permanent Improvements for the purpose of remodeling and equipping the old library building for classroom purposes.
12. Allocation of \$17,000 from the 1939-1941 biennial appropriation for Permanent Improvements as an amount needed and used by the Division of Architecture and Engineering in connection with services in the planning and construction of the Jessie E. Rambo Home Management House and the Milner Library.
13. Allocation of \$10,000 from the 1939-1941 biennial appropriation for Permanent Improvements for reclaiming and developing certain land areas on the campus and taking care of much-needed landscaping around certain buildings, including those newly constructed.
14. The allocation of \$12,000 from the 1939-1941 biennial appropriation for Permanent Improvements for rewiring of Cook Hall and necessary installation of return heating line for the building.
15. Change in the name of the old library to "North Hall."
16. Stopping the further construction of fire escapes at Illinois State Normal University until the Normal School Board, or at least the advisory committee for this school, has had an opportunity to personally investigate and consider the relocation of certain of these proposed fire escapes.
17. Sanction of designation and transfer to an Alumni Foundation of a certain plot of ground on the campus of Illinois State Normal University for the erection of a Student Union Building from other than State funds.

III. OTHER EMPLOYEES

5. Interim Appointments

- a. The Advisory Committee of Illinois State Normal University having sanctioned a needed additional position as utility man in connection with the maintenance department and this opening having been cleared through the proper channels in Springfield, Mr. James Beckley, formerly serving in a similar capacity at the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Children's School, was assigned to this work, effective August 1, 1939, at a salary of \$115.00 per month.
- b. Due to the resignation of Mr. C. O. Bayles as janitor in the Main building and Fell Hall, effective February 29, 1940, because of poor health, this opening has been reported to Springfield and through the proper channels Earl C. Million of Bloomington is recommended for this position at a monthly salary of \$115.00, effective March 1, 1940.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. Immediate Needs

- a. *Remodeling Old Library.* (Revised) Since the regular Board report for this meeting of February 19, 1940, was completed, an alteration in the type of construction work in connection with remodeling the old library changes the cost and instead of a request for \$60,000.00 the request is now made for \$37,500.00 to cover necessary work. It has been thought not advisable to reconstruct the entire interior of this building, since it may be torn down at such future time as to make excessive expense inadvisable.
- e. *Garage for Home Management House.* In view of the marked decrease in the cost of remodeling the old library into classrooms and because of the very urgent need to have a garage in connection with the home management house, which was originally contemplated and of necessity left out of the final plans, I would like to request the amount of \$1,100.00 for the construction of a brick two-car garage between the home management house and Fell Hall (women's residence) in order to care for the cars of the director of the home management house and the

director of Fell Hall. This request is made because of the inability to locate garage facilities anywhere in that portion of town and the fact that this type of equipment is really a part of the University housing situation.

5. Registration for the winter quarter took place on Wednesday, January 3, after the Christmas recess. The enrollment now totals 1,134 which is a slight drop from figures for the fall quarter, but represents an increase of nearly 200 students over registration figures for the winter quarter, 1939.
6. I wish to report that this college has received the scholarship of \$200 given each year by the Illinois Congress of Parents and Teachers and we were so notified by Mrs. H. M. Mulberry, president of the organization. A faculty committee, after studying eligible student records, awarded \$50.00 of this amount to Miss Hazel Galbo, a freshman student from Galena, Illinois, who is enrolled in the degree course in elementary teaching. Miss Galbo made an exceptionally high record for the fall quarter and was deemed worthy of this award. The committee has not decided whether she will receive the remainder of the fund, but will specify how this is to be distributed later during the college year.

II. FACULTY

1. I wish to report the resignation of Miss Margaret Vandebark, first grade critic teacher in the McMurry Training School who resigned her position in June, 1939, to be married.
2. I wish to report for approval the appointment of Miss Maurine Bloomster to take the position vacated by Miss Vandebark. Miss Bloomster was educated at the Illinois State Normal University and the University of Illinois where she received her bachelor's degree in 1936, and at Columbia University

where she completed the work for her master's degree in 1938. She has had experience in rural schools, at Illinois State Normal University, has lectured at various teachers institutes, and has taught for eleven years in the primary grades in the Champaign, Illinois, public schools. During the summer of 1939 she taught at the University of Illinois Demonstration School. Miss Bloomster began work on September 12, 1939, at a salary of \$2,150 for nine months.

3. I wish to report the resignation of Miss Clara Ohlson, seventh grade critic at the McMurry Training School. Miss Ohlson notified us on August 8, 1939, that she would be unable to return to her work at the college.
4. I wish to recommend for approval the appointment of Miss Esther Williams to take over the position left vacant by Miss Ohlson. Miss Williams had handled this work satisfactorily during the spring quarter while Miss Ohlson was on leave of absence from her college work. Miss Williams receives a salary of \$2,150 for nine months.
5. I wish to recommend for approval the appointment of Miss Elsie Wiggert in the Department of Fine Arts. This recommendation is in the nature of a promotion for Miss Wiggert from part-time to full-time college work. Miss Wiggert began work at the beginning of the fall quarter, 1939, and receives a salary of \$2,150 for nine months.
6. I wish to recommend for approval the appointment of Mr. George Butterfield to teach in the Department of Biological Science. Mr. Butterfield received his bachelor's degree at the St. Cloud Teachers College, St. Cloud, Minnesota, and his master's degree at the University of Minnesota. He has been an assistant in the Department of Zoology and Biology at the University of Minnesota where he has done further graduate work. He receives a salary of \$2,150 for nine months. This position had already been approved by this Board.
7. I wish to recommend for approval the appointment of Dr. John R. Hains to teach in the Department of English. Dr. Hains' appointment was necessitated by the increased enrollment in that department. This matter was taken up with the committee of this college. Dr. Hains received his bachelor's degree at Shurtleff College, his master's and doctor's degrees at Northwestern University. He has had high school teaching experience at Gladstone, Michigan, and Davenport, Iowa, and taught at the J. Sterling Morton High School at Cicero, Illinois. He taught English at the Morton Junior College from 1933 to 1937 and at Northwestern University from 1937 until the present. Dr. Hains receives a salary of \$2,700 for nine months. He began work on January 4, 1940.
8. I wish to report for approval the appointment of Miss Ruth Inez Crawford as art supervisor at the McMurry Training

School and the DeKalb City Schools. Miss Crawford received her bachelor's degree at Michigan State College at Ypsilanti, Michigan, and her master's degree at the University of Michigan where she has also completed one year's work toward her doctorate. She has taught in her major field at the East Detroit High School, East Detroit, Michigan, and at the Saginaw, Michigan, Central Junior High School. Miss Crawford receives two-fifths of her salary, or \$466.62 for the remainder of this school year from the college, and three-fifths, or \$699.96, from the DeKalb City Schools. She reported for work on January 17, 1940, and replaces Mr. Reino Makela who has been art supervisor until a permanent supervisor could be found.

9. On January 23 I received the resignation of Mr. William A. Behl in the Department of Speech, to take effect on February 1, 1940. Mr. Behl is resigning his position here, paying \$2150, to accept a similar position at Brooklyn College, Brooklyn, New York, paying \$2675. In addition to this increase in salary, Mr. Behl is given definite assurance of summer school employment and an annual increase of \$200 a year until the maximum in his classification is reached. I recommend that this resignation be accepted.
10. I wish to recommend for approval the appointment of Mr. Paul K. Crawford of Freeport, Illinois, at present teacher of Speech in the Freeport High School, for the position in Speech in our department here made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Behl. Mr. Crawford has his bachelor's degree from Baker University at Baldwin City, Kansas, and his master's degree in Speech from the University of Wisconsin at Madison, Wisconsin. He has two additional summers' work at Northwestern University toward his doctorate in the School of Speech. He has had teaching experience in the high school at Cameron, Missouri, at Freeport, Illinois, and on the college level at the University of Illinois and at Northwestern University. Mr. Crawford is author of AN OUTLINE OF PARLIAMENTARY LAW published by the College Typing Company of Madison, Wisconsin. He will be in charge of debate work for both men and women here at the college. His record in debate at the Freeport High School is outstanding. His teams have won the state and qualified for national competition on three different occasions. Mr. Crawford receives the same salary paid to Mr. Behl—at the rate of \$2150 for nine months. He began work on Monday morning, February 5, 1940.
11. Dr. Lillian Cobb, head of the Department of Foreign Languages, who has been in that position in this college since 1930, found it impossible to return to the United States from her summer work in France in time to be here for the opening of college. This failure to be present for registration in September was in no sense caused by factors under the control of

Dr. Cobb, but were largely caused by the opening of the war in Europe. Dr. Cobb was under considerable extra expense in attempting to return to take up her work at the college. College opened on September 25 and Dr. Cobb arrived here October 9, 1939. I wish to recommend for the approval of this Board that Dr. Cobb be paid her salary as though she had been present for that time. I believe she merits this consideration.

12. The tremendous increase in enrollment here at the college, an increase of 53% over the figures for two years ago, has caused us to curtail our offerings by extension. We are receiving some unfavorable response to this, but it seems essential that we take care of campus enrollment first. This increased enrollment will necessitate further increases in the staff in the Department of Home Economics, Physical Education for Men, and Music. I believe the new faculty member in the Home Economics Department will need to be employed by the beginning of the spring quarter. Perhaps the addition of the new faculty members in the other departments can be postponed until the beginning of college in the fall. I should like the permission of the Board to employ these additional faculty members as the occasion warrants. The faculty student load is at present the highest it has been since I have been connected with the college.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

1. Mrs. Mildred Erwin who has been employed at the college dormitory for nine years, has resigned. Mrs. Erwin received \$70.91 per month plus meals. Miss Alice Boyle was employed to take her place at a salary of \$54.55 and meals. In the transfer incident to this change, Mrs. Emma Wiltsie who is now receiving \$54.55 and meals, has been given many of the added responsibilities and it is recommended by Miss Morrison, who is in charge of the dining service at Williston Hall, that Mrs. Wiltsie's salary be changed to \$65.00 per month and meals. You can see that this will not add anything to the total expense. In fact, it will be just a little less and will make payment for services more nearly in keeping with the amounts paid to other employees at the dormitory. I recommend that this salary for Mrs. Wiltsie who has been employed for three and one-half years, be changed to \$65.00 and meals per month.
2. We have had so much illness during the past two years among regularly employed school employees that we have been forced to adopt a rather definite arrangement concerning pay for employees who are absent due to illness. At the present time I should like to present for the approval of the Board the plan which we now are using. Employees may be absent due to sickness for a maximum of two weeks if they have been employed for more than a year and their salaries will not be

decreased. Further than two weeks, no employee will receive pay unless the matter is brought specifically to the attention of the Board in cases where it seems desirable to make modifications. In cases of regular faculty members, we follow the rule set up by the Board in its report concerning salaries paid by this Board on February 6, 1929.

3. I wish to report the resignation of Miss Lorene Lytle, Senior Department Bookkeeper, who was transferred from her Civil Service position in this college to a position also under Civil Service in the Office of the Bursar at the University of Illinois and reported for work there on December 4, 1939.
4. I wish to report for approval the appointment of Miss Helen Cline as Senior Department Bookkeeper under Civil Service to fill the position vacated by Miss Lytle. Miss Cline received her business training at Illinois State Normal University and has had further work at the University of Colorado and the University of Illinois. She receives a salary of \$125 per month for twelve months, and reported for work at this college on Monday, December 11, 1939.
5. Miss Linda Kestila has been working as a student assistant in the Office of the Dean of Women since August, 1930. During this time she has been carrying one subject per quarter, completing her work for the Bachelor of Education degree at the close of the summer session, August 4, 1939. Miss Kestila passed the Civil Service examination for Junior Clerk, receiving notice to this effect from the Civil Service Commission on March 24, 1939. I wish to recommend at this time that Miss Kestila be classified as Junior Clerk under Civil Service at the salary of \$110 per month for twelve months, which salary she has been receiving as student assistant. The Dean of Women's office has heretofore not had Civil Service employees since it was deemed advisable to employ a person familiar with DeKalb and vicinity for contacting local people on matters dealing with student housing facilities. Miss Kestila is a DeKalb girl and lives here with her parents. She is capable and efficient in the work of handling personnel records.
6. For a number of years the engineers at the college in charge of the power plant have been on a twelve-hour day—that is, two men have handed the assignment for the twenty-four-hour period. All other employees connected with the power plant are on an eight-hour day. There has been agitation to change the engineers to an eight-hour schedule for several years. It has never become acute, but it does seem to the administration that as we are now settled on a program for the manufacture of our own power in addition to our heating plant work, that we should adjust this schedule in keeping with sound practice. I wish to recommend the employment

of an additional engineer within the salary range set up by Civil Service and also permission to make whatever adjustments seem necessary in the employment of the persons now engaged as engineers.

7. The increase in enrollment, particularly in the enrollment of women students, has increased tremendously the work of the women janitors engaged to supervise the toilet rooms for women and the dressing rooms and shower rooms in the Department of Physical Education for Women. I should like permission to engage another woman janitor to divide this assignment at a salary not to exceed \$75.00 a month to help with this work. At present it is not being adequately handled.
8. I should like to present at this time for the consideration of the Board the policy which we in this college have adopted with respect to the employment of student assistants. I should like to further explain the bases for and the limitations in such employment.

Colleges and universities all over the country make use of some of their best students for handling routine assignments and in some cases, teaching assignments for freshman students. These persons are selected in many cases from the senior students, or if the college offers graduate work, from graduate students who are working on advanced degrees.

The purpose of such employment is two-fold. It makes it possible on a limited budget to take care of services often routine in themselves which would otherwise have to be handled by regularly employed faculty members at salaries three or four times as large. It also makes it possible for these superior students to do a piece of work which contains elements of a college teaching position and gives to them experiences that are rich and compensating. Not only is the money earned regular and valuable, but this type of experience adds a great deal to their sales value as they go out into open competition for positions. It has its limitations in the fact that most faculties do not consider these persons competent to supervise class room work or to do actual teaching. In this college, none of our student assistants do actual teaching work except as they are under the direct control of the regular faculty member. These student assistants in this college are not classed as members of the faculty. We feel the college gains a real service from some of its most competent students at a figure that makes it possible for us to offer this service under our limited budget. The use of student assistants is *primarily to supply this service* and not primarily to supply the student with a position in which he can earn regular amounts. It is properly a charge on Salaries and Wages. At the present time the college has student assistants in the following fields:

IV. THE ORGANIZATION

1. Registration figures for the first semester in extension courses totalled 489. The Extension Division offered eighteen courses in various centers in this area in the following fields: Biological Sciences, Education, English, Fine Arts, Industrial Arts, Mathematics, Music, Physical Education, Social Sciences, and Speech. Fifteen faculty members are teaching these classes.
2. On October 10, 1932, July 15, 1935, and on December 13, 1937, this college through the Normal School Board entered into an agreement with the DeKalb Township High School to handle our high-school student teaching in their institution. This agreement has been continued in force since that time. As compensation, we agreed to pay to the High School Board and to the critic teachers who participate in this activity an amount of \$90 per student teacher per semester. The Department of Finance feels that this agreement should be reinstated by the Board at the beginning of each biennium as a matter of good business procedure. I am recommending that the Board approve this arrangement. It is by far the cheaper and, we believe, the better method for handling student teaching on the high-school level for such a large group.

V. THE CURRICULUM

1. Rural Education

It is customary in this college for our major changes in curriculum to remain constant or nearly so during a four-year period so that they may be given a complete experimental trial. Our last important change was made two years ago. There is likelihood that we will recommend a modified program of student teaching for students who select the two-year curricula, involving an intensive unit of teaching in a rural school removed from the college campus. This experimental program in rural education is being worked out in cooperation with the county superintendents in this immediate area and with the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. There is considerable likelihood that we will operate under this experimental plan, at least in part, during the spring quarter. If this program is adopted by the faculty, it will appear in our annual catalog for next year, a copy of which will be sent to the Board members.

2. Reading Clinic

The college is now entering upon some new work in the field of Reading. For some years, advanced students have been given the opportunity to diagnose difficulties of children in their reading and to use corrective measures with them. To meet the increasing calls for teachers who are prepared for such work in schools, steps are being taken to conduct a Reading Institute at the college during our summer session. We hope to draw superintendents, principals, and teachers to this conference for a four-day intensive consideration of reading problems and their solution. We trust this nation-wide interest in reading may extend into every school in our area. In order to serve this Reading Institute and to serve the college students as well as the schools in our area which bring cases to us for study and help, the college is purchasing two new instruments for clinic work. We believe this will be a very worthwhile addition to our present teacher training equipment.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. I wish at this time to present to the Board a picture of our major expenditures as a basis for the understanding of certain requests which I wish to make in connection with this report. With these figures before you, I should like to make certain oral comments and to answer any questions that members of the Board would like to ask concerning these expenditures.

2. I should like at the present time to request the Board to set aside an allocation of \$400,000 for a science building at this college, this building to house the college cafeteria, the Departments of Biological Sciences, Home Economics, and Physical Sciences, including the work in chemistry, physics, geology, and astronomy. The repairs made this year in our library stack room make it possible for us to devote our entire effort now to a science building. A new building of this type will remove these departments from the main Administration Building and will make it possible for us to reorganize that building to take care of expansion in the other departments in the college. Since this building can hardly be completed before the close of the biennium, I am not asking for an allotment to reorganize and re-equip the quarters now occupied by these science departments. There are many purposes that these places could serve, all of which are important and should fit into a better administrative organization for our entire plant. We have held departmental meetings; we have drawn rough plans; we feel that as soon as this allotment is made, we can contact the State Architect and we should have our plans complete and ready for the letting of the contracts as soon as the frost is out of the ground.
- 3a. I wish to bring to your attention a proposition submitted to me by the Civic Committee of the DeKalb Garden Club asking that I present the matter to this Board. I shall read the letter from the chairman of the committee and my answer to it. I should like to state further to the Board that I believe it is very important that this particular piece of property which is very being donated by the Ellwood Estate be accepted by the State even though there would be some expense in making it an integral part of the college campus. My reason for this is that if this property went into the wrong hands, it could be made a most unsatisfactory entrance to our college grounds and it could, in reality, become somewhat of a nuisance if not an actual pest.
- 3b. With respect to the larger area known as Annie's Woods, I believe that an institution training elementary teachers with an emphasis on nature study should have available a laboratory area such as this for a bird and plant sanctuary. Our Department of Biological Sciences at the college would welcome with

a great deal of pleasure the working out of an area of this type. However, the thorn in the ointment is the fact that it would be of no value to the college unless it were adequately fenced. Since there is no cost in acquiring this property which on open market would bring several thousand dollars, I feel that this Board would be wise to set aside enough money to fence this property and to put the area immediately adjacent to the campus in condition as a part of the college campus. If this meets with the approval of the Board, I should like to recommend an allotment of \$7,500 from the fund for Permanent Improvements to be set aside for these purposes.

4. In the Board report of September 11, 1939, I requested an allocation of \$20,000 for furniture and equipment for Williston Hall. You will note in the early part of this report on BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS that we are attempting to carry out this equipment program directly from our income fund. This added drain on that fund will necessitate that any extras in a permanent building program will have to be made out of allotments from the Permanent Improvement Fund. Hence, I should like to request an additional allotment of \$5,000 for power plant improvement as the contracts already bid on total over \$3,000 more than the allotment. I should also like to request an allotment of \$5,000 for the rehabilitation of our tennis courts.
5. I wish to report as a matter of record to the Board that the committee composed of a representative of the State fire marshal's office, a representative of the State architect's office, and the coordinator of this Board, together with the contractors associated in the fire protection program set up by the Board at its meeting in Springfield last June, met for a final meeting in my office on Wednesday, January 17. At this time a final agreement was made concerning the fire prevention program that was to be carried out in this institution under these arrangements. As my understanding that funds for these improvements have already been allocated by the Board and that this allocation is from the reappropriation of our Permanent Improvement Fund from the last biennium.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. On June 22, 1939, I received a telegram from the national convention of the American Association of University Women, notifying me that our college had been placed on the fully approved list of their organization. We at DeKalb feel that this is a signal honor and one that we have striven to attain. It may be of interest to the Board to know that we are one of fifteen teacher colleges in the United States so accredited, that we are at the present time the only one accredited in this State, and that we happen to be the only college in the

entire list that is accredited with only a Bachelor of Education degree. We believe the Board will understand that this represents acknowledgment of the quality of work that goes into our curriculum offerings and the standards of accomplishment set by our faculty. Since we were inspected as a part of the study conducted by the Committee on Membership and Maintaining Standards as they investigated the accrediting procedure of the American Association of Teachers Colleges, we paid no fee at the time we were inspected. However, there is a fee of \$100 due for this service and I should like the permission of the Board to pay that fee. I should like further the permission of the Board for our college to become a corporate member of the American Association of University Women. The dues for this membership are \$25.00 a year. I should like permission to make this payment.

2. As a further evidence of our service in our area, I should like to present to the Board the placement record for our placement year.

The Fall Quarter of 1938, one year ago, enrolled a 40% increase in student body, changing from 741 to 1,037 registrations. Evenly numbered years have been bringing larger enrollments, although the increase was larger than expected. The Fall Quarter of 1939, an odd numbered year, should normally have brought a decrease in enrollment, with a smaller freshman class than in even numbered years. The 1939 freshman class numbered 472, a 7.8% expected decrease from the freshman class of 512 in 1938. However, the 512 freshmen of 1938 produced 389 sophomores this autumn, a gain of 53.1%, the 171 juniors of 1938 produced 132 seniors for this year, a gain of 36%, and consequently, instead of the expected decrease in total enrollment, the college experienced a gain of 10.9% over the previous high of one year ago (1,037 students), reaching a total enrollment of 1,151 students.

The sophomore and senior class increases indicate the growing desire on the part of students to secure four years of training. Of the 1,151 students enrolled for the Autumn Quarter, 133 students (11.3%) enrolled in the two-year curriculum, and 1,018 students (88.7%) in some one of the four-year curricula. The distribution of

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diplomas and degrees in the Class of 1939 bears out this shift in training period, with 54 students taking the diploma and 116 students receiving the degree.

Shift in the choice of teaching fields is indicated by the following analysis of *Major subject choice* by the student bodies of the years 1937-38, 1938-39 and 1939-40, as per the Fall Quarter enrollment.

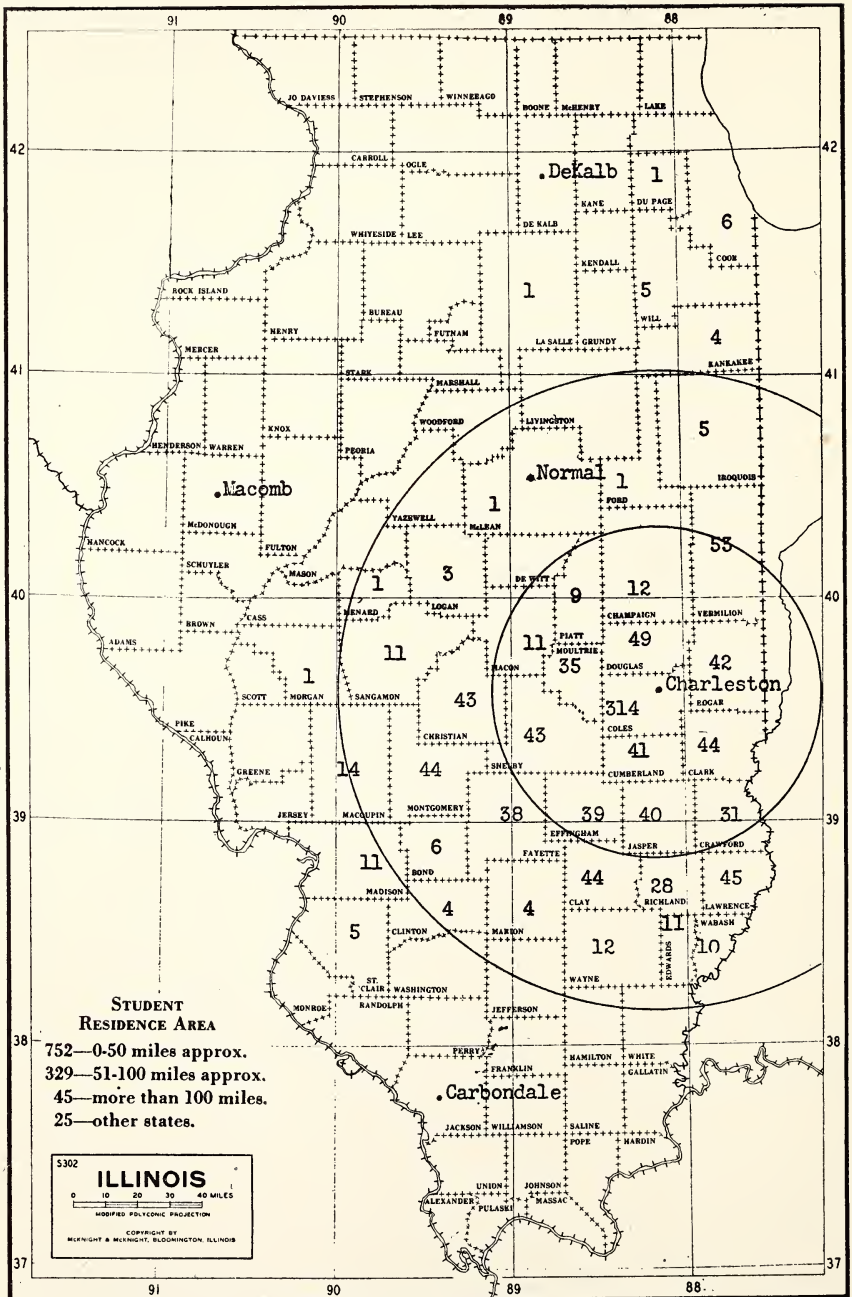

The per capita cost for 1938-39 equals the quotient of the total expense, \$397,732.91, divided by the equivalent number of students for 36 weeks, 1,259.66, and is \$320.84. The decrease from the per capita cost of the previous fiscal year, 1937-38, of \$377.13, is due to the increase of 35% in the equivalent enrollment for the fiscal year, 1938-39, in spite of \$44,596.40 additional cost.

2. Increased enrollment in Home Economics, Industrial Arts and Commerce is bringing about marked lack of opportunity for practice teaching in these fields. Affiliated relationships with nearby school systems will be necessary to accommodate this demand in 1940-41.

V. THE CURRICULUM—No report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. The additional boiler for the heating plant is now being installed, with completion likely about April 15th. Attention of the Board is directed to the mimeographed copies of (1) the report of Mr. William Altenbaumer, inspector of boilers for the Division of Architecture and Engineering, under date of July 15, 1939, and of (2) letter from Mr. C. W. Macardell, Architectural Assistant, under date of July 19, 1939. During the visit of Mr. Altenbaumer for inspection of the heating plant prior to writing specifications for the new boiler, his attention was called to the condition of the stokers of the boilers in use, and his rating of their condition requested. It is hoped the Board will see fit to allot sufficient funds for the installation of stokers similar to that now being installed, as recommended by the Division of Architecture and Engineering.

2. The equipment of the Science Building is being assembled and installed slowly. All departments except chemistry have used much of the former equipment temporarily installed, and have fared surprisingly well. A tremendous shortage of microscopes exists, and with the installation of the chemistry tables, there will be an equally dire shortage in chemical glassware. As the equipment under order is gradually installed, the evidence of additional equipment needed becomes more prominent. Balance tables and reagent shelving are particularly needed in the chemistry laboratories. Cases for care of equipment and supplies under lock, are equally pressing need in botany and zoology. It is hoped that the science equipment will be sufficiently installed for dedication observance in the late spring.
3. Rooms in the Main Building, formerly occupied by the sciences, have on the second floor been rehabilitated for English and Social Science classrooms, and on the third floor for the work in Commercial Teacher Training. Light oak furniture secured through the Department of Welfare, and rehabilitation of floors and walls by the college carpenter and college painter, have provided excellent quarters for the Department of Commerce. The repair work has now been transferred to other portions of the Main Building, and markedly pleasing results are being secured.
4. The dressing rooms in the basement of the women's dormitory have been partially reworked to accommodate (1) the children of the campus elementary school, and (2) the storage rooms, office and practice rooms of the college band. Considerable repair work remains necessary, including a new floor in the old gymnasium, with sound-proofing band quarters and the installation of new toilet and shower facilities in the dressing rooms.
5. Use of the Health Education Building brings (a) every day the need of a new and complete system of walks and drives, and (b) every night the need of a campus lighting system.
6. Other outstandingly needed repair items include:
 - (a) Rewiring and refixturing the Women's Dormitory.
 - (b) New plumbing fixtures in the Women's Dormitory.
 - (c) Rebuilding and replumbing the men's and women's lavatories in the Main Building.
 - (d) Materials with which the college repair force can continue rehabilitation of floors and walls in the Main Building and in the Training School.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

1. The financial report of the college for the Fiscal Year 1938-39 is now nearing completion, and will be mailed under separate cover as usual.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE—No report.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. The attention of the Board is again called to the need for settlement with Messrs. Hewitt, Emerson and Gregg, for associate architects' fees on the equipment of the Health Education Building. A detailed report of the situation is presented from the June, 1939, report.

NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

The Normal School Board met at Charleston, Illinois, on May 20, 1940.

A motion was made by Mr. Alschuler, seconded by Miss McIntire, that minutes of last meeting be dispensed with. Motion carried.

A motion for report of Budget Committee on allotments of permanent improvements fund was made at this time. Motion carried.

Mr. Alschuler, Chairman of the Budget Committee, made his report as follows :

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO ALLOT THE PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT FUNDS FOR THE YEARS 1939-41.

1. The committee has previously been polled by letter concerning the allotment of the sum of \$37,500 for the remodelling and rehabilitation of the old Library building at Normal. The members of the committee having signified their consent to such allotment, Mr. File has taken the necessary steps to get this project under way. It remains the duty of the Board at this meeting to approve this allotment.
2. After the approval of the above allotment to Normal, there remains in the Permanent Improvement Fund available for distribution, the total sum of \$801,068.39. Your committee has met and has agreed upon the following apportionment out of this sum.

(a) To *Eastern Illinois State Teachers College*

1. For lighting of campus.....\$ 8,000
2. For new plumbing in girls' dormitory and Main Building..... 10,000 \$ 18,000

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(b) To <i>Southern Illinois State Normal University</i>

The total of the above allotments is \$742,850, leaving a balance in the Permanent Improvement Fund of \$58,218.39 to care for contingencies during the balance of the biennium.

3. The chairman of this Board and the Co-ordinator are requested to bring this allotment to the attention of the Governor, with the request that the Governor give his approval thereto.
4. In the case of the new Training School Building at Southern Illinois State Normal University, it is expected that the total cost of said building will come to approximately \$600,000. No provision is made in the present allotment for equipment since it is not expected that the building will be ready for equipment during the present biennium. The allocation of an additional amount for equipment and completion of this building is to be an item of first importance at the commencement of the next biennium.
5. The sum of \$150,000 is allotted to Northern Illinois State Teachers College for the commencement of a Science Building, it being expected that such building will cost at least \$300,000 without equipment. It is to be understood as the sense of this Board that the allocation of the additional funds necessary to complete and equip this building shall be an item of first importance at the commencement of the next biennium.

6. Certain requests on the part of the presidents and Board members for individual items of rehabilitation and repair have of necessity had to be eliminated or reduced in amount because of the fact that the total Permanent Improvement Fund would not permit for their allowance. The members of this committee hope that the Legislature will appropriate a sufficient fund at its next regular session so that these items which have had to be passed over at this time can be completed during the next biennium, and it is the sense of this committee that a list of such items be kept by the chairman of this committee, to be included in the budget for the next biennium.

The Board adjourned for lunch. Mr. Beich could not be present for the afternoon session.

Mr. Pulliam presented his report. Motion was made by Mr. Alschuler, seconded by Mrs. Green, that the report be accepted. Motion carried.

Mr. Morgan presented his report. Motion was made by Mr. O'Harra, seconded by Mrs. Green, that report be approved with the exception of items 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 13, 17 and 19. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Mr. O'Harra, seconded by Mr. McMorris, that Mr. Lucien File cooperate with Mr. Wieland in procuring an estimate of cost of having the minutes and reports of the Board printed in book form back to the time of the last printed form, which is about four years, and if it does not cost to exceed \$1,000.00 this expense is to be met by taking \$200.00 from each college. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Mrs. Green, seconded by Mr. O'Harra, that the chairman of the Board appoint a committee of three members of this Board to assist President Fairchild in arranging details with respect to the proposed union building at Normal University and to cooperate with the Attorney General in discovering what the other teachers colleges may do to participate in similar undertakings on their campuses. Motion carried.

Mr. J. J. Hallihan appointed Mr. Beich, Mr. McMorris and Mr. O'Harra as a committee of three to confer with the Attorney General on the Student Union situation at Normal, and also on the matter of transfer of property by the Normal School Board.

Dr. Buzzard presented his report. Motion was made by Mr. McMorris, seconded by Miss McIntire, that the report be approved with the exceptions of items 6 and 7. Motion carried.

Motion was made by Mr. O'Harra, seconded by Miss McIntire, that people interested in a garage at Home Management House at Normal University be permitted to build it. Motion lost. Only two votes cast. Mrs. Green voted Yes, Mr. O'Harra No.

Motion was made by Mrs. Green, seconded by Mr. O'Harra, that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried.

2. One wonders whether the increase in attendance for the college year 1938-1939 and again for 1939-1940, as shown by the enrollments in the sophomore and freshman classes of this year over last, will be reflected this next year in an increased junior enrollment, and likewise the following year, in a larger senior enrollment. In examining the above table, it would seem that 130 juniors enrolled this year from a sophomore class of 253 the previous year. On that same basis, with 309 in the sophomore class this year, the junior class for next year will be approximately 160, and since 309 sophomores this year followed an enrollment of 398 freshmen last year, the number of sophomores next year, following an enrollment of 458 freshmen this year, would be in excess of 350. If these conditions should arise, the college will be very greatly crowded, and we shall have a problem in adjusting classes in the best possible way for this added load.

II. THE FACULTY

1. The following is the faculty list, with salaries, for the First Summer Term of six weeks. These are to be paid from Salaries and Wages.

One-fourth of the June salary for faculty members in this list was provided in the salaries which were submitted before the college opened last fall. The amount in the first column in the table, therefore, completes the salaries for the month of June.

The salaries provided in the second column, or for the second three weeks, complete the First Summer Term, and teachers who teach during the Second Summer Term will have one week's salary from that term combined with this in the second

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. Since the last Board meeting, a contract has been let for the wiring of the girls' dormitory at \$9,980.00, including new fixtures for the same. It is my understanding that this has been allotted from the reappropriated funds by the last General Assembly.

2. At the time the contract for repairs on the main administration building was let, there were included fire screens and doors for this building in lieu of fire escapes, which I believe cost between \$6,000.00 and \$7,000.00. *I am also informed that the needed repairs on the roof and cupola of the main building, which were not included in that contract, will cost approximately \$6,000.00.* Since the cost of the fire doors and screens was paid largely from the Repair and Equipment Fund belonging to the college for the last biennium, it would seem only fair that a similar amount should be allotted to complete the repairs on the roof and cupola, which could easily have been done with the money paid out of the college fund for fire screens and doors. It is requested, therefore, that an allotment of \$6,000.00 be made for this purpose from the fund from which the fire protection equipment was to be constructed.
3. If the allotment of \$30,000.00 to purchase and equip a home management house for the college has not as yet been made, it is requested that such an allotment now be provided.
4. If an allotment to build a super-structure for the swimming pool has not been made, a request for that amount is repeated at this time.
5. Under date of February 29, 1940, the annual contract which the college had with Mr. F. H. Currens and wife for the lease of 24½ acres of farm land expired. A new lease for one year, beginning March 1, 1940, was made for an annual rental of \$245.00, which has been signed by the Director of Registration and Education, the Director of Finance, and the President of the College.
6. In recent years, there has been an unusual movement on the part of higher institutions to provide them with dormitories, union buildings, and other campus additions, either through the cooperation of P.W.A., W.P.A., or by borrowing money from some company which has money to loan, such as a life insurance company, with provisions for repaying the amount borrowed out of fees connected with the use of such buildings by students and faculty. P.W.A. and W.P.A. funds were used in connection with city, State, or national units, but loans from life insurance companies and the like have in general required private leases or ownerships.

The State University is now in the process of completing a Union Building and dormitories by one or more of these plans. The same problem confronts the Teachers Colleges of Illinois, and no State funds have been available for such purposes for about twenty years, and other institutions are persistently providing dormitories and union buildings, either through appropriations from their States, by private endowments, or by carrying out the above suggestions. It is requested, therefore, that the Board consider this matter, and, if

possible, reach some decision as to a way in which such buildings may be erected by the Teachers Colleges of this State.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. The college desires to cooperate with the Committee on Rural Education, and the County Superintendent of Schools of McDonough County, in a thorough-going study of a supervisory program for rural schools. This will be conducted in connection with the Rural School Department of the college, and will constitute a considerable part of its program for the next five years. The college will contribute to this study by allowing one of its faculty members in the Rural School Department to assist in carrying on the work of that Department in this direction.

For the year 1940-1941, the Committee on Rural Education will contribute \$1,850.00 to the expense of the project; the office of the County Superintendent of McDonough County will contribute \$1,000.00; and the Teachers College will contribute \$1,050.00 in faculty service.

In 1941-42, the Committee on Rural Education will contribute \$1,850.00; the office of the County Superintendent of McDonough County, \$1,050.00; and the college \$1,050.00 by faculty service.

In 1942-43, the Committee on Rural Education will contribute \$1,500.00; the office of the County Superintendent of McDonough County, \$1,350.00; and the college \$1,200.00 in faculty service.

During the fourth year, the Committee on Rural Education will contribute \$1,300.00; the County Superintendent's office \$1,500.00; and the college \$1,200.00 in faculty service.

During the last year, the Committee on Rural Education will contribute \$1,000.00; the office of the County Superintendent \$1,700.00; and the college will provide \$1,300.00 in faculty service.

It is understood, of course, that no binding agreement can be made beyond the present year, but the program as stated above outlines the intention of the three cooperating agencies if the money is available. The total statement of the project covers some six typewritten pages, and is available for the consideration of the Board if desired.

2. Following the last Board meeting, the matters which were discussed with respect to the public relations program were fully considered. The Director of Public Relations, Dr. DeForrest O'Dell, was asked to make a statement as to the services of the press representative, for which \$25.00 a month is being paid. Dr. O'Dell's statement follows:

"Mr. Randolph, a Macomb correspondent for the Associated Press, has access to news outlets which the college needs badly. Were it not for his assistance at pertinent times during the year, the college would be deprived of the opportunity of getting certain stories and news items before the public. Even though I had experience with the Associated Press myself, I am not in the position Mr. Randolph is to get the space needed. Mr. Randolph also does a great deal of routine publicity work for the college. During the last year, he has sent out a large number of feature stories to different papers in the Military Tract. I have conferred with him on a number of occasions about general procedure and have found him most helpful. He gives willingly of his time and energy. I am sure he is of real value to our office."

Following the comments of Dr. Bradley, of the Board, with respect to radio, the following letter was written to the manager of WTAD, the station over which the radio program of the college is broadcast:

"Mr. C. Arthur Fifer
Illinois Broadcasting Corporation
Quincy, Illinois

"Dear Mr. Fifer:

"I have before me a copy of the letter which Mr. O'Dell wrote you under date of March 8, 1940, and your reply to him under date of March 13, but I am still wondering if you thoroughly understood his inquiry.

"Perhaps my doubt in the matter is due to the fact that Dr. Preston Bradley, of the People's Church, in Chicago, who uses one of the Chicago Broadcasting stations very often, is also a member of the Normal School Board of Illinois, and when the matter of expense of a radio program which we have with you was brought before this Board, he immediately made this statement: 'Every radio station is required by the national governing body to furnish, free of charge, a certain amount of time on their station for the use of general education.' He stated that it was his impression that the radio station, although it furnished such a program by remote control, was required to pay for the channels necessary to transmit the program to the station. This immediately involved the expense we have with the Bell Telephone Company, and the other arrangements we have made with your station.

"Please let me know whether Dr. Bradley is wrong. If that is the requirement of Chicago stations, is it not also a requirement of your station?

"We have no desire to dodge a legitimate charge against us for our radio programs, but I am put in the position of having to explain to a member of our controlling board what

the exact conditions are. Perhaps, if you have copies of the requirements of the national board which controls all radio broadcasting, you will be able to send me a marked copy, which I may send on to him."

In response to this letter, the manager wrote the following:

"Thank you for your letter of March 20. I am afraid Dr. Bradley is somewhat misinformed on one or two points. First of all, in the rules and regulations of the Federal Communications Commission there is no direct reference as to what is required by a radio station. In the radio act under which the F. C. C. works, there is a sentence which reads substantially as follows: 'A radio station shall be operated in the public interest, convenience and/or necessity'."

At one time there was some agitation to get radio stations to allot a certain percentage of their time for educational purposes. However, other interests stepped in and the result was that at a hearing the Federal Communications Commission Committee reported to Congress that no additional legislation was necessary and that "no fixed percentage of radio broadcasting facilities be allocated by statute to particular types or kinds of non-profit radio programs or to persons identified with particular types or kinds of non-profit activities."

Each station, of course, wants to serve the community, but it does so by a well-balanced program, which means that not only educational programs, but civic programs, news programs, sales programs, religious programs, and, in fact, all programs, are considered in order that a result will be what is called a well-balanced program.

"We are not obligated to accept any particular one, but it is left to us as to what programs we shall take, and as a matter of fact, it is permissible to us to charge for even an educational program. Most stations, however, give a certain amount of free time to the different types of programs mentioned above, and others, and if they cared to, they could pay the line charges, but if we were forced to pay the line charges, any institution in Quincy, Macomb, Chicago, or other place, could demand that we do it, and the result would be—no radio station. In your particular case, as I remember it, you used to broadcast from here, but you suggested that if the lines were put into Macomb, you could give a better-balanced program, and at that time offered to pay the line charges, and that is the way it has been ever since.

"We feel that we are doing our share in giving you the free time, and, therefore, the line charges, if you want to continue to broadcast, must be paid by you.

"I hope this explanation is sufficient, but if you want to go into the matter further, I shall be glad to do so."

Copies of these letters were mailed to Dr. Bradley, but no comment has been received.

It is now the desire of the college to make similar arrangements for the Public Relations Program for the next college year. This will involve an expenditure of \$25.00 per month for the news representative; \$7.95 each week for telephone lines; and \$2.12 per week for trunk lines.

3. With this report is filed a certified statement of the students who have attended the Western Illinois State Teachers College during the current college year on Teachers College Scholarships. The summary of these scholarships is as follows:

4. It would seem to the one who has prepared this report, that the plan of making a lump sum appropriation for improvements and betterments at the five Teachers Colleges, as has been the custom for the last two or three bienniums, is not conducive to the greatest harmony among the administrators of these institutions, and perhaps among the members of the Normal School Board, in that such a plan makes the division of such a fund a bone of contention until the final allotments have been made and the money expended. It would seem to me, therefore, that although the present plan gives some flexibility in meeting new conditions which may arise after the appropriation is made, it would, however, be better to have definite amounts appropriated for the specific use of each institution when the appropriations for the biennium are made. This would not only avoid the discussion which occurs after the money is available, but it would likewise enable the institutions to draw their requisitions promptly for these improvements and betterments, and get their construction started with much less delay than has been experienced under the present plan.

II AND III. FACULTY AND OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

1. I am sorry to report officially the death of Mr. Louis C. Petersen, Head of the Industrial Arts Department of the College. Mr. Petersen has been a member of the faculty for the past thirty-two years and was the oldest faculty member in line of service. In Mr. Petersen the College loses a successful teacher and a man of fine character. Mr. Petersen was sixty-two years old.

2. For the position made vacant by the death of Mr. Petersen, Mr. J. Henry Schroeder has been appointed as Acting Head of the Department.

Since both Mr. Petersen and Mr. Schroeder carried extremely heavy teaching loads, it was necessary to get additional help in the department at once. We are temporarily filling the vacancy by employing Mr. R. J. King as a substitute instructor at a salary of \$200 per month for the remainder of the regular school year. Mr. King's appointment is very definitely a temporary one.

I am not now ready to recommend anyone for this position either for the summer or for next year.

3. Mr. Fred P. Barnes, a member of the Rural Education Department, presented his resignation effective March 6. Mr. Barnes found it necessary to move to a different climate because of serious illness in his family. I am recommending, therefore, that Mr. Barnes' resignation be accepted.

To fill the vacancy created by this resignation, we have, with the approval of the Advisory Committee, appointed Mrs. Mabel Bracewell as instructor in the rural schools for the remainder of the year at a salary of \$200 per month. This appointment also is temporary.

4. Pursuant to authority given at the last meeting of the Board we have appointed Mr. George Bracewell as Acting Director of Rural Education, which position was left open by the resignation of Mr. Troy Stearns. Mr. Bracewell has been a member of the faculty since 1932. He has his master's degree and has completed the residence work for the doctorate.



5. To take Mr. Bracewell's place in the Rural School we have employed a student assistant, Mr. Harold Wright, at \$100 a month. His employment is for the remainder of this year only.
6. Because of the very large enrollment in the College resulting in increased pressure in the Practice Department, it has been necessary to take emergency measures to care for the great demand for practice teaching. After consultation with our Advisory Committee of the Board, arrangements have been made with the Carbondale City Schools whereby four more rooms have been made available for student teachers. The College pays the regular teachers of these rooms \$15 each for the first student teacher under their supervision and \$5 for each additional student teacher, up to the amount of \$30 monthly. This is for the extra burden imposed on them by having to plan for and instruct student teachers. The Carbondale School District receives no compensation for providing us with these facilities.
7. Mrs. Esther Brenton of the English Department has been granted a leave of absence for the month of April in order to permit her to take her final examinations for the doctor's degree. Mrs. Brenton, with my approval, made arrangements with Miss Frances Barbour to take care of her classes while she was away. Miss Barbour is a regular member of the faculty now on leave of absence because of her health.
8. Mr. Sam Stokes, fireman, requested leave of absence for the month of April, due to ill health. A temporary permit for this leave was submitted to the Civil Service Commission and a temporary fireman was employed for the month of April. Mr. Stokes is now back on duty.
9. I am presenting below the pay roll for the summer session. The money to pay all salaries and wages provided for on this payroll is available in the appropriation for salaries and wages for the College.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. I am pleased to report that the Class of 1940, which will be graduated this year, has offered to the College a plot of ground consisting of 1.8 acres which is to be used for a wild life conservation plot for the College. Most of the plot is now covered with a fine growth of native timber with the underbrush undisturbed. The east end of it which is not forested should be planted in southern pine. The plot will not require any large amount of maintenance from the College, since it is to be permitted to grow just as it is so that botany, zoology, and conservation classes may use it for field work.

A part of the plot was sold to the senior class for money which the class raised among its own members and friends of the school, and a part of it was donated by Mr. and Mrs. Alexander, who owned it. The donation from Mr. and Mrs. Alexander was made subject to the condition that it shall never be disposed of by the College for private use, and that it is to remain in its present native condition unless other College lands of equal area are set aside elsewhere for conservation purposes.

I recommend that the Board take proper legal steps to accept this gift for Southern Illinois Normal University.

2. I should like to urge upon the Board some final action on the allocation of six hundred thousand dollars from the Permanent Improvements Fund to the Southern Illinois Normal University for the construction of a new building to house the training school.

I should also like to report progress on the purchase of the site of the building of the training school. On Thursday, May 2, I held a conference with Mr. Hallihan, Mr. Louie Lewis, and Mr. File, in Mr. Hallihan's office. At this time it was decided to appoint a committee of real estate men from the vicinity of the College to reappraise the twenty-one parcels of land that constitute the site. In the course of the conference, the following names were agreed upon as an appraising committee: Mr. Roscoe Taylor, Carbondale, Chairman, Mr. Spreul Rea of Benton, Mr. Roger Kimmel of Murphysboro, and Mr. Floyd Bracy of Herrin. This committee met at ten o'clock on Wednesday, May 8, at Carbondale and spent the greater part of the day going over the land. Their report has been submitted to Mr. Hallihan and Mr. Lewis for their consideration.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

Thirty thousand dollars of the appropriation made to this college for the present biennium is still held in reserve by the State Department of Finance. Because of the increase in enrollment in the College, this money is even more desperately needed now than it was at the time the appropriation was made. I should like to have the Board approve my making a formal request that this money be released to the College in time so that it may be included in the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1940.

If this money is not released, it will be necessary for us seriously to curtail the services of the college, since we cannot continue to operate indefinitely under emergency conditions as we have this year. I do not believe in the policy of permitting the institution to accumulate a deficit in order to secure an allocation from the Reserve Fund. These funds should be given to us because we need them, not because we cannot keep within our budget without them.

X. SUMMARY

The approval of the Normal School Board is asked for the following items which I am recommending:

1. The transfer of \$7,233.75 from the General Revenue Fund of the State of Illinois to the Normal School Income Fund for credit to the Southern Illinois Normal University to cover the Teachers College Scholarships for the year 1939-1940.

2. The validation of the appointment of Mr. J. Henry Schroeder as Acting Head of the Industrial Arts Department.
3. The temporary employment of Mr. R. J. King to fill the vacancy created in the Industrial Arts Department by the death of Mr. Petersen. The salary is \$200 per month.
4. The acceptance of the resignation of Mr. Fred P. Barnes.
5. The validation of the temporary employment of Mrs. Mabel Bracewell to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Barnes at a salary of \$200 per month.
6. The confirmation of the appointment of Mr. George Bracewell as Acting Director of Rural Education.
7. The validation of the temporary employment of Mr. Harold Wright as a student assistant in the rural schools at a salary of \$100 per month.
8. The validation of the temporary arrangements for additional practice facilities with the Carbondale City Schools.
9. The validation of a month's leave of absence for Mrs. Esther Brenton and the employment of Miss Frances Barbour for the duration of Mrs. Brenton's leave.
10. The validation of a month's leave of absence because of ill health for Mr. Sam Stokes, fireman at the College.
11. The salary schedule for the faculty for the summer session, 1940.
12. The legal acceptance of the gift of land to Southern Illinois Normal University.
13. Final approval of the purchase of the land for the new training school at the approximate prices at which the special Appraisal Committee appraised it.
14. Allocation of \$600,000 from the balance in the Permanent Improvement Appropriation for the construction of a new training school building at Southern Illinois Normal University.
15. Approval of a request to the State Department of Finance that the thirty thousand dollars reserved from the appropriation to the Southern Illinois Normal University be released for use during the fiscal year 1940-1941.

II. FACULTY

10. The Commission on Teacher Education, with which we are affiliated, is offering us an opportunity to send one member of our education staff to a special clinic at the University of Chicago to study certain problems of child growth and development. They offer to pay half the salary and the living ex-

penses of the faculty member whom we send, stipulating, however, that we should send one of the key members of our faculty and not a younger staff member still in training. The Council of Administration of the College and the Central Committee cooperating with the Commission have decided that Dr. W. A. Thalman, who has had charge of the Bureau of Child Guidance for the past five years, is preeminently the person whom we should send.

In order to accept this invitation for Dr. Thalman it would be necessary for the Board to do two things: We should have to grant Dr. Thalman a leave of absence for nine months of the regular school year beginning next September, and during that time we should have to meet the half of his salary which the Commission does not pay. Dr. Thalman already has his doctor's degree and will, therefore, gain no personal advantage from this year's work.

It is my judgment that this constitutes both an opportunity and an obligation for the College and that we should make the necessary arrangements.

Incidentally, I may add that Southern Illinois Normal University has had the benefit during the past several months of consultation services by Professor Ambrose Suhrie of New York University, who has spent two three-day periods on the campus in consultation with our training school and education faculties, and by Dr. L. L. Jarvie of the staff of the Commission on Teacher Education, who has spent one three-day period on the campus in consultation with our faculty members who are responsible for student personnel work. These conferences have been extremely stimulating to the College.

2. Selective Admission of Students

It is interesting to note the trend toward some form of selective admission in State-supported institutions. It has generally been considered that it would be difficult if not impossible to limit enrollments and select students in those colleges and universities receiving their support from public tax funds. Practice in a number of instances indicates that this not only can be done but is being done and there is every reason to believe that there will be a marked tendency in this direction in the immediate future.

On May 11, 1940, at a conference held at the University of Illinois and participated in by representatives of the large universities of this State, the liberal arts colleges and the teachers colleges, the matter of a State-wide program for testing high school graduates was discussed. Such a program is highly important for those institutions admitting and seeking to educate capable young men and women. Undoubtedly such a program, which is now used in a number of States, would make possible greater accuracy in the selection of those persons desiring to enter the teaching profession.

Illinois State Normal University, now operating its selective admission procedure for a fourth consecutive school year, is definitely committed to the principles involved in such a program. In general, parents, prospective students, and school administrators have understood and cooperated in the furtherance of this attempt to provide a better type of material from which to develop prospective teachers. There have been a few exceptions where school teachers and administrators have not felt kindly toward such a program but such reactions have generally been based upon personal situations involving failure to admit some student recommended from their particular school.

3. Extension Courses.

Despite inadequacy of staff to meet all of the demands for extension courses, Illinois State Normal University was able to render service in the territory and to the extent listed below.

- c. The appointment of the following employees is recommended to be paid from the Repair and Equipment Fund at salaries indicated opposite their names for a twelve months period beginning July 1, 1940:

IV. THE ORGANIZATION

1. Student Activity Fee.

The necessity of a larger available student activity fund in order to meet the needs of the University, including health and hospitalization, together with a Student Union fee, is responsible for the recommendation that the activity fee now set at \$10.00 each semester be raised to \$12.50 each semester, making a total student fee of \$32.50 for the semester, including fees remitted to the State Treasurer, all textbooks and all activities. It is believed that this slight increase is not exorbitant in view of the service rendered and the general low fee charged. The Apportionment Board, composed of students and faculty, realizes that additional funds are necessary in order to meet a satisfactory minimum activity program in the University.

V. CURRICULUM—No report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. Progress of Building Program.

- a. Milner Library is rapidly nearing completion and will be ready for dedication on Monday, June 10. This is commencement day and it is hoped that all members of the Normal School Board, as well as many other guests from Illinois and surrounding states, will be present for the dedication exercises at 10:00 A. M. on that date. In addition to the dedication, the alumni luncheon and commencement in the afternoon, at which approximately 530 students will receive diplomas, will form a day that we believe will be of interest to all Board members and the presidents of the other teachers colleges.
- b. Remodeling the old library, now designated as North Hall, to provide much-needed classroom space on the campus will start during the first week in June. Plans have been drawn by the Division of Architecture and Engineering and bids were advertised for beginning May 14 to be opened May 28 and contracts awarded so that the work may be under way not later than the tenth of June. An allocation of \$37,500 has been requested for the remodeling of this building, together with such remodeling in the social science library and reading room in Old Main as has resulted from moving to the new Milner Library. The provision of all furniture, furnishings, and special equipment included in the allocation requested.
- c. The University Farm buildings under construction this year are now completed and the stock judging pavilion and machinery building has already been used. The new machine shop is ready for use and the new sheep barn will be made available during the summer. All of these structures are directly in line with meeting the standards for the training of Smith-Hughes teachers of agriculture.

2. Immediate Needs.

- a. One of the most pressing needs of the University at this time is an allocation of funds to make possible the reclaiming of certain territory much-needed on a crowded campus. It is impossible to provide playground space for the children of the elementary school until we can close a ditch in the southeast corner of the women's athletic field in order to provide recreation space on that part of the campus. This part of the project alone will cost \$4,300.00. The construction of sidewalks, servicing the playground area for the lower grades of the Metcalf School, and an altogether too limited amount of planting in connection with the new library and home management house make it necessary to request a total of \$10,000.00 for such purposes.

- b. Illinois State Normal University, in contrast to other building programs of the past few years, has operated within the allocation of funds set aside for the building of the home management house and the University library. In order to do this it was necessary to eliminate an important and essential portion of the home management house and that was a garage in connection with that structure. This project will not be complete until such has been provided and in order to make this conform to the rest of the property, it has now been estimated that an allocation of \$1,800.00 will be necessary to provide this structure.
- e. The heating in Cook Hall needs consideration by the provision of a completely additional return line, and repeatedly recommendations have been made by heating engineers in the state architect's office that this additional facility be provided in the interest of completely heating the building and a reduction in the consumption of fuel. It is estimated by the Division of Architecture and Engineering that this will require \$4,000.00.

No request for an allocation of funds for rewiring and new light fixtures for Cook Hall is made since it is understood that this has been included in the program dealing with the reduction of fire hazards.

3. Early Future Needs.

- a. The educational program of the only one of the teachers colleges absolutely forced upon a limited enrollment basis has been and is severely handicapped by lack of adequate physical plant. It is true that for the past several years there has not been an increase in enrollment, since the institution has labored under insufficient and inadequate quarters since 1935. Recognizing the need that exists in the other teachers colleges and without the desire to handicap complete consideration of these institutions, it would seem that until other institutions are forced into the difficult position of limiting their enrollments over a period of years in order to meet shortage of housing, at least equal consideration should be given to a school that has been and is still laboring under a severe handicap because of building needs. It is hoped that when the next building program is given consideration favorable thought will be given toward including the provision of a building that will include an auditorium, all administration offices of the entire University, classrooms for the Department of Speech and also for the Department of Music. It is believed that it will be possible to provide a building of adequate size to meet these needs at a cost of approximately \$950,000.00. Quarters vacated would be used for much-needed housing in order to take care of the Departments of Psychology, Art, Home Economics, and Industrial Arts.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES—No report

VIII. STUDENT LIFE

1. The appointment of a special State Board of Education to meet the legal requirements for the transfer of campus land to a holding corporation is awaited as the final step before actual operations can begin upon the proposed new Student Union building. It is hoped that such action will be available in time to start the work of this structure as a part of the commencement day activities.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. Considerable interest and agitation has been evident for some time in the possibility of having Illinois State Normal University sponsor Civilian Pilot Training Program such as it is understood is now sponsored by Southern Illinois Normal University. The Bloomington Municipal Airport facilities have been offered in connection with this program. It is not known just as to the extent of interest of the student body but the approval of the Normal School Board is sought in order that such interest may be ascertained and a unit started next September if it seems desirable.
2. Through the kindness of the Carnegie Corporation, Illinois State Normal University has been the recipient of three types of gifts within the past two years. Now that the Milner Library is completed the largest of these gifts, the College Music Set consisting of almost one thousand records of the opera, numerous music scores, a large number of books, and electric victrola and other equipment, is being moved into a special sound-proof room known as the Carnegie Room. This room has also been constructed to receive the Carnegie Art Collection valued at \$2,000.00. Recently, film strips representing source materials of certain books have been made available to the University, which, together with a grant of \$9,000.00 for special books over a period of three years, makes it possible to offer many educational advantages that would not otherwise be possible with limited funds at our disposal. We are much indebted to the Carnegie Corporation for this interest.

X. SUMMARY

The approval of the Normal School Board was given upon the following recommendations:

1. Transfer of \$14,040.00 from the General Revenue Fund to the Income Fund of Illinois State Normal University to cover scholarships according to lists submitted in this report.

2. Acceptance of the resignations of Gladys Wiggins, Anna M. Goldsmith, and Jane Kerkhof.
3. Granting of leaves of absence to Alice Ebel and O. L. Young.
4. Appointment of Mrs. Waneta Sedgwick Catey as supervising teacher in the affiliated Walker rural school.
5. Authorization of the position of Assistant Librarian at an annual salary of not to exceed \$2,200.00.
6. Authorization of the position of assistant in the office of the Dean of Men.
7. Employment of faculty for the 1940 summer session as listed in this report.
8. Employment of faculty for the regular school year 1940-1941 at salaries listed in this report.
9. Acceptance of the resignations of C. O. Bayles and Louise Stretch.
10. Authorization of the position of junior stenographer as indicated in this report.
11. Authorization of the positions of janitor and janitress for the new Milner Library.
12. Authorization of an additional utility and repair position to be paid from Repair and Equipment Funds.
13. Appointment of Earl C. Million as janitor.
14. Appointment of Mrs. Mary Blankenship as domestic.
15. Employment of staff members for the fiscal year July 1, 1940, to June 30, 1941, to be paid from Salaries and Wages.
16. Appointment of employees to be paid from Income Fund as listed in the report.
17. The appointment of employees as listed to be paid from Repair and Equipment Funds.
18. Authorization of increase of \$2.50 per semester in student fees.

It will be noted that Board approval is not requested of the recommendations concerning the need of \$10,000.00 for campus improvements, \$1,800.00 for completion of the home management house project in the nature of a garage, and \$4,000.00 for the heating alterations in Cook Hall, since it is presumed that the budget committee of the Normal School Board will make a report on such items and this report will receive the consideration of the entire Normal School Board.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN: I have the honor to submit the following report:

I. STUDENTS

2. Registration for the spring quarter took place on Monday, April 1. The enrollment at the present time is 1092, an increase of 156 over the spring quarter of 1939. Our enrollment has increased in approximately the same proportion each year for the past two years and has caused a great deal of difficulty in assigning rooms for classes and, of course, has increased the teaching load considerably.
3. The college wishes to report to the Board for record, the names of the students who have presented scholarships under the conditions set up by the scholarship law. We are presenting these names to the Department of Finance through the Department of Registration and Education so that the money may be credited to our Normal School Income Fund before the close of the present fiscal year.
4. Following is a detailed record of the extension work handled during this college year. The demand for this service has been insistent and we have been endeavoring to carry it on as a part of our regular program. This service meets with the hearty and enthusiastic approval of the schools in this area. On several occasions this year we have been forced to refuse to schedule classes because of limited facilities due to increased faculty load and increased enrollment on the campus. Our extension service now dots the entire area which we serve.

5. In conformity with the new policy adopted by the Board some time ago, the degree and diploma graduates for this college year will not be reported until after the close of the spring quarter. Our records at the present time indicate that the number of prospective graduates in both the two-year and four-year curricula will surpass that of any previous year.
6. I wish to report at this time that one of our senior students, Howard Fletcher of Streator, Illinois, was the recipient of the award presented each year by the Illinois Valley Sports Writers Association to an outstanding athlete who has made an extraordinary record in high school and in college. Representatives of the Big 10 universities, professional athletes in baseball and football, superintendents, principals, and college presidents gathered to honor this young man and watch him receive the award. I feel it was a great honor for a fine student and a real tribute to the college.
7. The young men of the college under the leadership of a group of men who hold positions as presidents or vice-presidents in college organizations have been conducting throughout the year a study of the desirability of organizing on the campus at N. I. a men's union. The study has been completed and it meets with the approval of a large percentage of the men of the college. Last week a group of these men presented the matter to the President and the Faculty Council for their approval. At that time this group asked me as president of the college if I would include in the student activities fee charged to men students twenty-five cents (25c) additional, this sum to be used by the men's union as a means of financing

its program. I am presenting this matter to the Board as a question of policy though I believe the men students are united enough behind this program to support the assessment. I recommend that it be allowed and that a statement concerning it be placed in the catalog.

II FACULTY

1. Dr. Lillian Cobb, head of the Department of Foreign Languages, who has been in that position in this college since 1930, found it impossible to return to the United States from her summer work in France in time to be here for the opening of college. This failure to be present for registration in September was in no sense caused by factors under the control of Dr. Cobb, but was largely caused by the opening of the war in Europe. Dr. Cobb was under considerable extra expense in attempting to return to take up her work at the college. College opened on September 25 and Dr. Cobb arrived here October 9, 1939. I wish to recommend for the approval of this Board that Dr. Cobb be paid her salary as though she had been present for that time. Dr. Cobb is on the nine months payroll.
2. The dean of men, Mr. A. Neil Annas, and the dean of women, Miss Blanche Davidson, were both away from the college in August longer than the two weeks designated by the Civil Administrative Code for persons on the twelve months payroll. The amount in the case of Dean Annas was \$95.64. The amount in the case of Dean Davidson was \$150.00. These amounts were deleted from their August checks. I should like the approval of the Board at this time to restore these amounts to Dean Annas and Dean Davidson.
3. Mr. Birchard Coar, who is in charge of instrumental music and who has been away on leave of absence studying for a year at the University of Edinburgh at Scotland, will return to the campus for the beginning of the summer session. Mr. Coar has now completed his residence requirement for his doctorate in instrumental music at the University of Edinburgh. His degree will be granted at a later date.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

1. I wish to report the resignation of Mr. Elmer Turnbloom, stationary engineer in our power plant. Mr. Turnbloom's resignation was effective as of April 15, 1940.
2. I wish to report for approval the employment of Mr. Fred C. Homan of DeKalb who reported for work on April 15. Mr. Homan's appointment as stationary engineer is temporary, pending Civil Service examination for which his application is on file. He will receive a salary of \$1,600.00 per year on the twelve months basis.
3. Miss Marie Barbatti of Taylor Springs, Illinois, reported for work on April 1, 1940. She is classified as Assistant Stenographer, Class B-1, and receives a salary of \$70.00 per month.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION

1. At the regular faculty meeting in April, the faculty members voted to change the commencement date for this year from Wednesday, June 19, to Monday, June 17. By so doing it is possible for us to have the same speaker for both baccalaureate and commencement. The college has secured President D. W. Morehouse of Drake University at Des Moines, Iowa, for these two occasions. V. THE CURRICULUM

The summer session bulletin is just off the press. Copies of this bulletin have been sent to members of the Board. Copy for our annual catalog is now ready to go to the printer and copies will be mailed to each Board member as soon as they are available.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. I wish to make an oral statement to the Board concerning the property which has been deeded to the college by the Ellwood Estate and also a comment concerning the present status of the property known as Annie's Woods.
2. It is my understanding that the Budget Committee will recommend at this meeting of the Board an allotment of the Permanent Improvement Fund for a science building at the Northern Illinois State Teachers College. I have talked this matter over with Mr. Alschuler, chairman of the committee, and he has also discussed the matter with a committee of the Chamber of Commerce in DeKalb. I believe that there is no one thing that would cause as much approval on the campus as to have this allotment made and the work of construction started this year. I am not recommending a fixed amount as I am sure that this amount will be determined largely by the committee.
3. A year or more ago when some extensive repairs were being made in our boiler room, some repairs were needed to our coal-handling and ash-conveying machinery, but due to the possibility of building a new power plant, these repairs were put off. Now that we are definitely sure that a new power plant will not be built and the rehabilitation of our old power plant is under way, the repair of this coal-handling and ash-conveying machinery becomes a necessity. We are experiencing numerous breakdowns which are becoming extremely costly and are making the coal and ash-handling problem very difficult.
4. In connection with the rehabilitation of our power plant, another item of repair which should be taken care of at this time is the repair of our smoke stack. The iron ring at the top of the stack and the top fourteen or fifteen courses of brick have become loose, and therefore an ever-increasing danger of these bricks falling has come about, in which event if they fell to the outside, it would be a hazard to any one walking thereabout. Therefore, it is quite important that this proposition of repairing our stack be taken care of at once.

I shall discuss the estimated cost of these items with the members of the Board orally as this estimate is not at present complete. Both these repair jobs should be done during our shut-down in August and September because it will be almost impossible to operate our power plant during these repairs.

II. FACULTY

1. Change of Status:

- a. Annie L. Weller, Head of the Department of Geography, became 65 years of age on August 3, 1939, and voluntarily requests transfer to the rank of Professor of Geography, Emerita, as of July 1, 1940, under the rules set up by the Normal School Board at the meeting of November 19, 1934. - b. Since the date of reaching this age does not fall before the beginning of the next fiscal year, recommendation for Board action will be deferred until a later meeting.

2. Early next school year the faculty will make a careful study of the value of the quarter vs. the semester plan of organization of the college year, as applied to Eastern, and report the findings to the Board.
3. Affiliation with the Humboldt Community High School, the Humboldt Elementary School and the Oak Grove and Clear-spring rural schools is recommended on contracts similar to those used for 1939-40, with slight salary adjustments made possible by having one less elementary teacher at Humboldt. Affiliation with the Lafferty rural school is discontinued. Negotiations are under way for a rural school with considerably larger enrollment, report of which will be presented at the next meeting of the Board.

V. THE CURRICULUM—No report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. It is hoped the Board will find occasion to examine the repair and rehabilitation work which has been going on by the college carpenter and college painter, particularly in the Main Building and the Training School.
2. The condition of the walks and drives on campus should impress the Board with the necessity for repair and for construction connected with the new buildings. Conferences with the district WPA supervisor in Decatur indicate that by the earliest probable expectancy of approval work on these walks and drives could not begin until late autumn. It is hoped the Board will see fit to allocate funds so this construction can be done under contract as soon as possible.
3. The additional boiler in the heating plant is nearing completion.
4. Under date of April 26, 1940, notification was received from the Department of Registration and Education that the Divi-

sion of Architecture and Engineering recommends a steel water-storage tank with a proportioning valve of 50,000 gallons to provide sufficient water supply and pressure as protection against lack of water in case of fire.

5. Attention of the Board is again called to the conditions of
 - (a) the electrical wiring of the women's dormitory, Pemberton Hall
 - (b) the men's and women's lavatories in the Main Building, and the lavatories of Pemberton hall.
 - (c) the lighting problem along campus drives and walks
 - (d) the decoration need of the auditorium in the Main Building
 - (e) the roof of the Main Building
 - (f) the completion of repair and rehabilitation of the old gymnasium.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES—No report.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE

1. It is hoped that the Board has noted through the columns of the college paper the admirable record which the Teachers College News has achieved for the current school year,
 - (a) Medallist rating by the Columbia University College of Journalism, (b) First class rating by the University of Minnesota College of Journalism, and (c) for the tenth consecutive year, the best college paper in Illinois, by the University of Illinois College of Journalism.
2. The student body is anxious for a Student Lounge, and plans are being made to partially use the auditorium in the Main Building for such a purpose, the Lounge to be furnished largely by student and faculty contributions.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. On April 17, 1940, the Office of the Auditor of Public Accounts transmitted a copy of the report of audit for the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College, from March 1, 1938, to February 29, 1940, copy of which is filed with the Department of Registration and Education.

NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

The Normal School Board met at 9:00 A. M. Central Standard Time at the Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois, September 18, 1940, at the call of Chairman John J. Hallihan. Members present were:

Upon the motion of Mr. McMorris, seconded by Mr. Beich, the minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

A preliminary report was made on the printing of the Board minutes and Mr. File was instructed to proceed to obtain the final estimate based on the printing of both the minutes and the index of same.

Mr. File made a verbal Co-ordinator's Report.

A motion was made by Mr. McMorris, seconded by Mrs. Green, that the presidents be instructed to prepare the budget for their respective colleges, and that these budgets be submitted to the Budget Committee of the Board not later than October 15. Motion carried.

The Board discussed, in general, certain policies with respect to the spending of funds for athletic equipment. It was set forth by the Board and ordered read into the minutes that the Board desires a general policy on the part of the management of the five teachers colleges, whereby equipment used for inter-collegiate athletics should come from Student Activity Fees and Income Fund only.

It was moved by Mr. Wieland, seconded by Miss McIntire, that the expenditure of \$11,600 from the Permanent Improvement Fund of the 61st General Assembly, allotted to the State Normal Schools, be approved for boiler repairs at Western Illinois State Teachers College as recommended by the State Architect's Office. Motion carried.

President Adams of Northern Illinois State Teachers College read his report. It was moved by Mr. Wieland, seconded by Miss McIntire, that the report be accepted as read. Motion carried.

President Pulliam of Southern Illinois State Normal University read his report. It was moved by Mr. Wieland, seconded by Mrs. Green, that the report be approved as read. Motion carried.

President Robert G. Buzzard of Eastern Illinois State Teachers College read his report. It was moved by Mr. McMorris, seconded by Mr. Beich, that the report be accepted and approved with the addition to item 13 page 21 of the words "Not to exceed \$2,000." Motion carried.

President Morgan of Western Illinois State Teachers College read his report. It was moved by Miss McIntire, seconded by Mr. Wieland, that the report be approved as read. Motion carried.

President Fairchild of Illinois State Normal University read his report. It was moved by Mr. Beich, seconded by Mr. McMorris, that the report be accepted and approved as read. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Wieland, seconded by Mr. Beich, that the Board adjourn to meet again at DeKalb, Northern Illinois State Teachers College, on October 28, 1940. The motion carried, and the meeting adjourned until October 28, 1940.

**REPORT OF THE
WESTERN ILLINOIS STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE**

September 18, 1940

NOTE: All important matters except those which pertain directly to the faculty are deferred until a subsequent meeting of the Board.

II. THE FACULTY

Since the faculty list and schedule were submitted on May 20, 1940, the following changes have occurred:

1. Miss Esther Stroup has been secured as teacher in Home Economics, including the direction of the Home Management House, on a half-time basis for the college, the other half of her time to be given to the affiliated high school at Bardolph, at a salary of \$100.00 per month. Miss Stroup received both her B.S. and M.S. degrees from Purdue University, and has had excellent teaching experience, both in high schools, and at Illinois State Normal University.
2. Mr. Harold B. Gilbreth, who at the last meeting of the Board was recommended as Assistant Professor in Commercial Education, has resigned to accept the headship of the Department of Commercial Education at Winthrop College, Rock Hill, South Carolina. This resignation came but a few days ago. It is recommended that it be accepted. Mr. Lewis A. Toll, who was on leave of absence last year to do graduate work at New York University, where he completed all of his residence requirements for his doctor's degree, who has returned, and who was recommended at the last meeting of the Board at a salary of \$2,205.00, should be promoted to Mr. Gilbreth's position, and his salary changed to \$2,250.00. To take Mr. Toll's place, I am recommending Mr. Julius M. Robinson, who holds his B.S. degree from the State Teachers College at Springfield, Missouri, and his M.A. from Northwestern University, at a salary of \$2,115.00 for the regular college year. Mr. Robinson has had rural and high school teaching experience, and for the past two years has been employed in the Pekin Community High School.
3. For the vacancy in the Department of History, reported at the last meeting, Dr. A. A. Welck is recommended, at a salary of \$2,400.00 for the college year. He is also to be principal of the Academy, or college high school on the campus. Mr. Welck received his A.B. degree from Carleton College, his A.M. from the University of Chicago, and his Ph.D. from Columbia. He has had excellent experience as a superintendent of city school systems and as a college teacher, and comes highly recommended.

4. During the summer, Dr. M. N. Thisted, who has been a member of the Department of Education and Dean for Men for the past eight years, asked for a leave of absence in order that he might take his daughter, who is about twelve years of age, to Kansas City, and enter her in the special school for the physically handicapped, in order to see what improvement is possible under such direction. It is recommended that this leave be granted, and that Dr. Arthur J. Ter Keurst be appointed to the position for one year, at \$2,250.00 for the nine months. He received his A.B. degree from Hope College, Holland, Michigan, and his M.S. and Ph.D. degrees from Northwestern University. He has had experience as a high school principal, a normal school and college teacher, and as head of a department of education, and has excellent recommendations.
5. During the summer, Dr. D. Louise Sharp, the Dean of Women, resigned to accept a similar position at the Teachers College at Mount Pleasant, Michigan. It is recommended that her resignation be accepted, and to fill this vacancy, Dr. Elizabeth H. Carter is recommended at a salary of \$2,115.00 for the regular college year. Dr. Carter holds an A.B. degree from the University of Washington, an A.M. from the University of Hawaii, and a D.Ed. from the University of California. She has taught in the elementary and secondary schools, as well as in college, and is well prepared for our work.
6. Recently Dr. John Welker, an instructor in English, asked for a leave of absence for one quarter, in order to take medical treatment and recover his health. It is recommended that the leave be granted, and that Mrs. Dorothy Welker, his wife, be appointed to take his work for the Fall Quarter, at a salary of \$240.00 per month. She received her A.B. degree from the University of Alabama, and her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Chicago. Mrs. Welker taught for a year and a half in high school, and has had six years of college teaching experience.
7. For the vacancy in Mathematics, which was reported at the last Board meeting, Dr. Claude H. Brown is recommended at a salary of \$2,025.00 for the regular college year. Dr. Brown received his B.S. and M.S. degrees from Kansas State College, and his Ph.D. from the University of Kansas. He has taught in the rural schools, high schools, and also the University of Kansas, and has strong recommendations.
8. For the vacancy in the position of Rural Supervisor, in connection with the college and the office of the County Superintendent of McDonough County, for which the college is to pay a salary of \$1,050.00 for the year, Miss Helen Stenson is recommended at the salary stated. Miss Stenson, who has taught in rural schools, village schools, county normals, teachers colleges, and universities, and is well prepared for the

work of a rural supervisor, received her B.S. degree from the Western State Teachers College at Kalamazoo, Michigan, her M.A. from the University of Michigan, and has done additional graduate work at Peabody College and Columbia University.

9. For some time, various advanced students have been acting as laboratory assistants in the Department of Physics and in Visual Education. One of these, Mr. Kimbrough Shake, who graduated from the Western Illinois State Teachers College in 1936, and who has recently been doing graduate work by extension at the University of Illinois, can now very satisfactorily take over the work which these students have been doing. I am recommending that he be employed at \$1,350.00 for the college year.
10. With the above changes, the faculty list and salary schedule for the regular college year, which is to be paid from the Salary and Wage Appropriation, is as follows:

II and III. FACULTY AND OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

1. Resignations

- (a) Miss Helen E. Stenson, a member of the Rural Training Staff, presents her resignation. We do not plan to fill this position at the present time.
- (b) Miss Mary Vocelle, who was employed as one of the librarians at the college last year, presents her resignation in order to accept a position as head librarian of the Glen Ellyn Public Library.

It is recommended that the acceptance of these resignations be approved by the Board.

2. Retirement

- (a) Miss Lulu Clark, a member of the staff of the Allyn Training School, is recommended for retirement on an emeritus basis. Miss Clark is sixty-nine years old and has been a member of this faculty for the past twenty-four years. It is recommended that she be placed on emeritus status.

3. Leaves of Absence

- (a) Mr. Victor Randolph, a member of the Rural Training Staff of the college, requests leave in order to do graduate work.
- (b) Mrs. Mary Combs, a member of the English Department, who for the past year has been working on her doctor's degree at Indiana University, asks that her leave of absence be extended for another year.
- (c) Mrs. Wanda Newsum Gum, part-time instructor in the Sociology Department and Assistant Dean of Women Directing Student Employment, requests leave in order to do graduate work.

It is recommended that these leaves of absence be approved by the Board.

4. New staff members for the regular school year, 1940-41:

- (a) To fill the position left vacant in the Industrial Arts Department by the death of Mr. Petersen, I am submitting the name of Mr. Robert W. English. Mr. English received the Bachelor of Science Degree in 1929 from the James Milliken University and the Master of Arts Degree in 1935 from the University of Illinois. For the past eleven and one-half years he has been a teacher of industrial arts and mathematics in the Community High School at Granite City, Illinois. During summer vacations he has been employed by various industrial companies as draftsman and designer.

It is recommended that Mr. English be employed in the Industrial Arts Department at a salary of \$2,475 for the thirty-six weeks.

- (b) For some time there has been an increasing demand for an additional teacher in the Industrial Arts Department, as this department has been seriously curtailed in the services which it has been able to offer, and all of the classes have been overcrowded. This situation has been made more acute by the demands which have been placed on the department by the Civil Aeronautics Program. Furthermore, the prospect is that other demands connected with the National Defense Program shall shortly be imposed upon the Industrial Arts Department. I am recommending, therefore, that the Board appoint a new person in the Industrial Arts Department.

For this new position I am submitting the name of Mr. Delmar W. Olson. Mr. Olson received the Bachelor of Science Degree from Iowa State College in 1934 and the Master of Arts Degree from Ohio State University in 1937. He has also done additional work on the Ph.D. Degree. For the past three years Mr. Olson has served as supervisor of industrial arts in Clinton County, Ohio. Previous to this, he had an unusually rich background, including teaching experience in some of the public schools in Iowa and summer teaching at Iowa State College. He also had two years of drafting experience for one of the railroads, a short course in aeronautics, and four years of garage and machine shop work.

It is recommended that Mr. Olson be employed in the Industrial Arts Department at a salary of \$2,025 for the thirty-six weeks.

- (c) For the temporary position in the Education Department created by the leave of absence granted Dr. Thalman at the last meeting of the Board, I am submitting the name of Mr. Ronald O. Lippitt. Mr. Lippitt received the Bachelor of Science Degree from Springfield College, Springfield, Massachusetts, in 1935. During the year 1935-36 he was an assistant in the Psychology Department at Springfield College. Since 1936 he has been a research assistant in child psychology at the University of Iowa, from which university he received the M.A. Degree in 1937 and the Ph.D. Degree in 1940.

I recommend that Mr. Lippitt be employed as a member of the Education Department at a salary of \$2,250 for the thirty-six weeks. This appointment is for one year only, since Dr. Thalman will return next year.

- (d) For the past few years our high school has been in great need of teachers of commerce, agriculture, physical education, and manual arts, in order that appropriate training can be given in these fields of work in Southern Illinois. I should like, therefore, to have the approval of the

Board to establish two new positions in the University High School, one position combining commerce and physical education and the other agriculture and manual arts. For the position as teacher of commerce and physical education I am submitting the name of Mr. Leonard J. Keefe of Chebanse, Illinois. Mr. Keefe received the Bachelor of Education Degree from the Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois, in 1936. He has had graduate work at Northwestern University and at the Colorado State College of Education, from which college he received the master's degree in August, 1940. He has taught in the Sheridan, Illinois, High School, and for the past three years has been employed at the Chebanse Township High School.

It is recommended that Mr. Keefe be employed as a member of the staff of the University High School at a salary of \$1,600 for the thirty-six weeks.

- (e) For the other new position in the University High School, that of a teacher of vocational agriculture and manual arts, I am submitting the name of Mr. Earl Cazal. Mr. Cazal received the Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of Illinois in 1934 and the Master of Science Degree from Colorado State College in 1938. He has taught six years in the public schools of Illinois as a teacher of vocational agriculture. For the past five years he has been an instructor in the high school at Sparta, Illinois. It is recommended that Mr. Cazal be employed in the University High School at a salary of \$2,025 for the thirty-six weeks. Half of this salary will be refunded to the college from federal funds by the State Board for Vocational Education.
- (f) For the position made vacant in the Allyn Training School by the retirement of Miss Lulu Clark, I am presenting the name of Miss Madelyn Scott. Miss Scott received the Bachelor of Education Degree from Southern Illinois Normal University in 1931 and the Master of Arts Degree from the University of Chicago in 1936. For the past ten years she has taught in the public schools of Carbondale. It is recommended that Miss Scott be employed at a salary of \$1,575 for the thirty-six weeks.
- (g) We have employed no additional instructor in our Physics Department since the death of Mr. Boomer in 1938. Mr. Boomer was head of this department. However, because of the increase in enrollment in the college and also because of the extra burden of carrying the Civil Aeronautics Authority Program, we find that it will be necessary to employ an additional person in the Physics Department. Accordingly, I am submitting the name of

Mr. Richard E. Watson. Mr. Watson received the Bachelor of Education Degree in 1932 from Southern Illinois Normal University and the M.A. and Ph.D. Degrees from the University of Illinois in 1935 and 1938 respectively. From 1932 to 1934 Mr. Watson taught physics and general science in the Olney High School. During the next two years, 1936-38, he was an assistant in the Physics Department at the University of Illinois. In 1938-39, he was an instructor in physics at the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College at Charleston. Since 1939 he has been employed as Science Editor of the Cooperative Test Service with offices in New York City.

It is recommended that Mr. Watson be employed in the Physics Department at a salary of \$2,340 for the thirty-six weeks.

- (h) For the position in the English Department left vacant by Mrs. Combs' leave of absence, I am submitting the name of Miss Winifred Burns. For the past year, Miss Burns has been a member of the faculty filling the position left vacant in the English Department by the leave of absence granted Miss Frances Barbour.

It is recommended that Miss Burns be re-employed as a substitute instructor in the English Department for next year at a salary of \$1,980 for the thirty-six weeks.

- (i) For the position in the Library left vacant by the resignation of Miss Mary Vocelle, I am submitting the name of Miss Esther Shubert. Miss Shubert received the Bachelor of Education Degree at Eastern Illinois State Teachers College in 1937 and the Bachelor's Degree in Library Science from the University of Illinois in 1938. Miss Shubert's Master's Degree in Library Science will be conferred in October of this year.

It is recommended that Miss Shubert be employed as a librarian at this college at a salary of \$1,350 for the thirty-six weeks.

- (j) For the temporary position in the Sociology Department created by Mrs. Gum's leave of absence, I am submitting the name of Mr. Edward C. McDonagh. Mr. McDonagh received the A.B. Degree in 1937, the A.M. Degree in 1938, and has completed the residence and course requirements for the Ph.D. Degree. All of his work has been taken at the University of Southern California. For the past year he has been at the University of Southern California where he held a teaching fellowship in the Department of Sociology.

It is recommended that Mr. McDonagh be employed in the Sociology Department at a salary of \$2,250 for the thirty-six weeks.

5. Rural Schools Reorganization

We are partially reorganizing the rural school set-up. The resignations last year of Mr. Stearns and Mr. Barnes, and this summer of Miss Stenson have made it possible to reduce the staff of the rural schools from seven full-time and fully paid faculty members to four. Whereas, hitherto, each one of the six schools was presided over by a full-time fully prepared member of the faculty, we have arranged this year to put the six schools in charge of regularly qualified superior rural school teachers. These teachers are to have the status of assistants in our affiliated schools and are to be paid \$125 a month.

Two of the four remaining full-time faculty members will use their time for supervising the work of the affiliated rural schools, and the other two will conduct various phases of extension work in rural education, where the immediate demand for extension service is very large. These changes have the approval of the Commission on Teacher Education with which our rural work is affiliated. They will greatly expand the services of our Rural Department and at the same time save a little over \$1,000 over last year's total for rural practice schools. I am recommending that these arrangements be approved by the Board.

6. New Employees for the year 1940-41

(a) The acquisition of the land for the new training school will make it necessary for us to add a laborer to take charge of the maintenance of the new grounds. Just as soon as the acquisition of the property is complete and we are responsible for taking it over, I should like to have authority to request the appointment of a laborer to this position through regular civil service channels. I have set up a salary of a hundred dollars a month in the budget to pay this man when we shall be ready to put him to work.

(b) Mrs. Grace Lines, assistant cook at Anthony Hall, was recently married and has turned in her resignation. I entered the request through civil service channels for a new assistant cook, and Mrs. Louise Wimberly of Marion, Illinois, was sent and started to work on September 5. She is to be paid fifteen dollars per week for the first two weeks, after which, if her work is satisfactory she is to receive \$65 per month plus her room and board.

7. Cooperation with the NYA

Upon the initiative of the National Youth Administration and pursuant to the suggestion of the National Defense Council, we are setting up in connection with the college a model vocational unit for young men out of school. This unit will employ

thirty young men who are being cared for by the NYA in a Resident Training Project adjacent to the campus. These young men will work a half-day in the State Garage of the Highway Department, where they will gain practical experience, and will spend the other half-day in the shops of the college learning the fundamentals of mechanics, particularly as they relate to automobile, tank, and airplane motors.

The money to pay the instructor is available from the new Federal Appropriation for Vocational Education for the National Defense, but it is necessary to have it expended through an educational agency. It will be necessary, therefore, for the college to employ the teacher, but we will be completely reimbursed for his services from the Federal National Defense Appropriation.

I am recommending, therefore, that Mr. James Hargraves be employed as a faculty assistant in vocational education at a salary of \$150 a month for as long as the arrangement continues. All money spent for his salary will be returned to the college either on a monthly basis or at the close of the year from the Federal National Defense Appropriation under the direction of the State Board for Vocational Education.

I respectfully request the approval of the Board for this arrangement.

8. Promotions in Academic Rank

I am listing below the promotions in academic rank which retirements and increases in the size of the faculty have made advisable. These promotions are made upon the recommendation of a committee consisting of all the full ranking professors of the faculty, who were asked to vote on the names of people who, in their judgment, merited promotion. These promotions are academic recognition granted for superior work and superior scholarship on the faculty. They carry no automatic salary increases.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION

1. I am recommending that agreements with the Public Elementary Schools in the city of Carbondale, with the Carterville High School, and with the six affiliated rural schools, be renewed for the ensuing year.

Relations with the Carterville High School are to be continued on exactly the same basis as they have been hitherto.

The Carbondale Public Schools agreement was changed last year by negotiation with the Carbondale Elementary School Board. These changes are very much to the advantage of the college, since they will save us \$1,750 without sacrificing any of the services we have received hitherto. This concession was made by the Carbondale City School Board on the ground that the teachers college was giving Carbondale considerably more than other teachers colleges do in similar situations.

The new Carbondale Public Schools agreement follows:

1. For the six women critics at present employed, District 95 will pay \$900 per year and S.I.N.U. will pay \$690 a year. In case of vacancies in the above group no replacements will be made.
2. Teachers employed by District 95 may be used for critics by S.I.N.U. as needed. These will be recommended by Mr. Hoffner and will receive fifteen dollars a month for the first student teacher and five dollars a month for each additional student teacher.
3. Mr. Teel will receive full pay as a teacher from District 95 and the balance from the college. He will teach his room as at present; supervise student teachers in other buildings part-time; and will have charge of the Brush Building as directed by Mr. Hoffner.

The agreement concerning the services of Mr. Charles Pater-son, director of the band and teacher of instrumental music, is not to be changed this year.

4. Mr. Cisne will retain his present status and in addition will be permitted to supervise student teachers who may be teaching in the other schools of Carbondale.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. The New Building

I am pleased to report that very satisfactory progress has been made on the new building. The work on the acquisition of the land is just about complete and the State Architect's office has already done a large amount of work on plans.

On the recommendation of the State Architect's office and

with the approval of Mr. File, the Department of Finance, and Mr. Dill, the Chairman of the Advisory Committee of the college, we have engaged Mr. Chance Hill to make a complete plan for the utilization of the college grounds for the future which will include as its most immediate task the planning of the roads, walks and landscaping of the newly acquired land. Our agreement with Mr. Hill is that he is to be paid a fee of one thousand dollars plus his traveling expenses up to an amount not to exceed \$500. Funds for this purpose are available in the Income Fund. I should like to have this arrangement with Mr. Hill approved by the Board.

Mr. Hammond, the chief State Architect, and I have had a meeting with Mr. Miner, the State Director of WPA. Mr. Miner has pledged us the fullest possible cooperation on the landscaping of the grounds. Both Mr. Hammond and Mr. Miner advised against having the WPA do any work on the building.

I have also taken the liberty to discuss the problem of using WPA labor on the campus with the Carbondale Trades Council. In contrast with their attitude several years ago when we were building the stadium, the Trades Council showed an extremely friendly and cooperative attitude. They have agreed to interpose no objections to any kind of work which the WPA might do on the grounds as long as they do not work on the actual construction of the building or on the construction of one necessary approach to it. The Herrin office of the WPA is ready to prepare as generous a project as their rules will permit, just as soon as the State Architect's office and Mr. Hill have prepared the necessary engineer's drawing for the work on the grounds.

2. Emergency Repairs

- (a) During the summer our boilers were inspected by both the State inspector and by the inspector for the insurance company which has the insurance. Both of these agencies have made urgent recommendations for immediate extensive repairs to the boilers. We have had estimates made of the cost of these repairs and it will be necessary for us to have a total amount of \$3,000 in order to make them. I should like respectfully to request that the Board appropriate \$3,000 from the balance of the permanent improvements fund for making these necessary repairs.
- (b) When the old fire escapes were removed after the new ones were installed the contract did not call for bricking up the holes that were left in the walls of the Main Building. Estimates we have had made on the cost of this work indicate it will take \$750 to do it. If money is not available in the special fund for this purpose, we shall need \$750 more than the \$3,000 requested in the previous section.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

For the past fifteen years Mr. Stewart C. Chandler has been State Entomologist on the Southern Illinois area for the State Natural History Survey Division. In this capacity he is already working under the Department of Registration and Education. Mr. Chandler lives in Carbondale and has a great many important relationships with both our Department of Agriculture and our Biology Department.

About ten months ago Mr. Chandler approached me with the proposal that this relationship might be recognized by the college by listing him as consulting entomologist on our staff. This would not interfere with the work he is doing for the State Natural History Survey Division and it would not involve any expenditure of money on the part of the college. It would simply give official recognition to a mutually advantageous cooperative relationship which has existed for some time. I should like to recommend, therefore, that Mr. Chandler be listed as a consulting entomologist affiliated with the Department of Agriculture of Southern Illinois Normal University.

I. STUDENTS

- b. Miss Esther Stroup, Instructor in Home Economics at the affiliated Illinois Soldiers and Sailors Children's School, to accept a position as instructor in home economics and as director of the home management house at Western Illinois State Teachers College at Macomb.

2. Leaves of absence:

- a. Mr. L. W. Hacker, Associate Professor of Education and Director of the Division of Rural Education, for the school year 1940-1941, due to ill health.

Beynon has her Bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska, her Master's degree from the University of Chicago and her Doctor of Science degree from Johns Hopkins University. She has had experience as a high school principal in Nebraska, as teacher in Joliet, Illinois, Township High School and Junior College, and the Texas State College for Women, and comes to us from Smith College at Northampton, Massachusetts. The appointment is for the school year 1940-1941, effective September, 1940, at an annual salary of \$2,250.

- c. Miss Esther M. Humphrey, Instructor in the Teaching of Social Science in the University High School, to take the place of Miss Alice Ebel, on leave of absence for the 1940-1941 school year. Miss Humphrey has her Bachelor's degree from William Jewell College and her Master's degree from the University of Iowa, with considerable additional work on her Doctor's degree. 5. Following the permission granted by the Board, this college has applied to the Civil Aeronautics Authority to participate in the civil pilot training program for the present college year. The application has already been acted upon and we will offer training in ground and flight courses this fall. I shall be glad to give the Board a detailed report of this work after final arrangements are made and the work is established. Student interest in this program is high and we have thus far received many inquiries.
6. The students whose names are listed below completed the requirements for graduation at the close of the spring quarter, June 17, 1940. I should like to point out to the Board that we have the largest graduating class in the history of this college, a total of 235 students over 168 as of last year. It is also interesting to note that the number of persons completing four years of work exceeds the number graduating from the two-year curricula. The trend toward the degree course is growing steadily.

II. FACULTY

1. I wish to call the attention of the Board to the fact that two members of the faculty have completed the requirements for the Ph.D. degree. Mr. Otto J. Gabel, a member of the Educa-

tion Department, received his Doctor's degree from the University of Iowa. Mr. Birchard Coar, in charge of instrumental music, has received his doctorate from the University of Edinburgh, Scotland. Dr. Coar returned from his year's leave of absence, arriving from Scotland on Thursday, July 11. He reported for work at the college on July 12. He had been scheduled to teach classes during the summer session, but his return to the United States was delayed because of the war. He returned to this country by Pan-American Clipper via Lisbon, Portugal.

2. I wish to report to the Board that Miss Minnie Stensland, a regular member of the college faculty in the Department of Music, taught the classes ordinarily handled by Dr. Coar. Miss Stensland handled the work from June 24, the beginning of the summer session, until July 12, when Dr. Coar returned to the college.
3. I wish to report for approval the appointment of Miss M. Anne Bushnell, to teach in the Department of Home Economics. This position deals primarily with the work in the Home Management House. Miss Bushnell received her Bachelor's degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1933 and her Master's degree from Iowa State College at Ames in 1940. She has had teaching experience in foods at the Monroe, Wisconsin, High School and was home advisor of the DeWitt County (Iowa) Home Bureau. During this past year she had a graduate teaching assistantship in the Home Management Division at Iowa State College. She comes to us highly recommended for teaching in this field. She has also had experience in county extension work in Illinois where she worked for three years. Miss Bushnell receives a salary of \$2,150 for nine months and began work on September 11. This position was previously approved by the Board.
4. I wish to report for approval the appointment of Mr. Ralph McKinzie to teach in the Department of Physical Education for Men. Mr. McKinzie received his Bachelor's degree from Eureka College in 1923 and his Master's degree from the University of Iowa in 1938. He was director of athletics at Eureka College from 1921-1937 and held the same position at Wartburg College in Iowa from 1938-1940. He has experience in all sports and was chosen the best all-round athlete in the history of the college he attended. Mr. McKinzie receives a salary of \$2,150 for nine months and began work on September 11. This position was previously approved by the Board.

3. Madge E. Moore, Statistical Clerk, recently employed in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, has been certified to succeed Edith Willson, at a salary of \$1,320 per year, effective September 1, 1940.
4. Florence L. Fair, University Graduate Stenographer, recently employed at the University of Illinois, has been certified to succeed Mrs. Negley, at a salary of \$1,320 per year, effective September 1, 1940.
5. Mrs. Edith Stricker of Charleston, a substitute Domestic in the kitchen of the women's dormitory, has been placed on full-time duty effective September 1, 1940, due to increase in number of boarders and need for cutting down weekly total work hours for women, at a salary of \$50 per month and maintenance.

IV. ORGANIZATION

1. Arrangements have been made with the Kansas Community High School, fourteen miles east of Charleston, for practice-teaching facilities in home economics and commercial studies. Transportation will be by taxi under competitive contract. The instructors involved are listed as affiliated teachers in the nine months faculty.

2. Affiliation has been arranged with the Muddy Point Rural School, southwest of Charleston, to take the place of the Lafferty Rural School used last year. The instructor is reported in the list of affiliated teachers.

V. THE CURRICULUM—No report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. The WPA project covering the much-needed walks and drives, which was held in the regional office at Decatur waiting for the project from Normal to be added, finally left Decatur on September 6th and Chicago September 12th, and is now in Washington for consideration. The Decatur office expects to learn about October 15th or 30th concerning the attitude of the Washington authority and assure us it will take three or four additional weeks to set up the working sheets and secure necessary approval. Any construction before mid-November is unlikely. The Division of Architecture and Engineering has promised to survey for and establish the necessary road and walk levels during the current week.
2. The electrical wiring of the women's dormitory is now in progress. The college has been unable to secure plans and specifications, and does not know the prospective cost of this work. We are promised the privilege of choosing the fixtures but can get no information concerning them.
3. The drawings and specifications for the re-plumbing of the dormitory and the Main Building are completed, according to information furnished on September 16th, but the specifications for the necessary general contract remain to be finished.
4. The plans for the campus lighting system, for which money has been allotted and approved, seem to be at a standstill.
5. The water-tower for increasing pressure and the amount of emergency supply is now under construction. The site is across the drive directly north of the heating plant chimney. This site was chosen by the Division of Architecture and Engineering after consultation with the local member of the Board.

President Fairchild's report of the Illinois State Normal University was discussed. It was moved by Mr. Beich and seconded by Mr. O'Harra that the report be approved. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Alschuler and seconded by Dr. Sunderman that the release of \$27,279.00 requested by Chairman John J. Hallihan from Governor Stelle to complete the Fire Marshal's recommendations with regard to wiring buildings be approved. Motion carried.

Report of President Morgan of the Western Illinois State Teachers College was discussed. It was moved by Mr. O'Harra and seconded by Mr. Dill that President Morgan's report be approved with the exception of item "d" which refers to budget for the coming biennium. Motion carried.

The report of President Pulliam of Southern Illinois Normal University was discussed. It was moved by Mr. Dill and seconded by Miss McIntyre that the report be approved with the exception of item "1" of the summary pertaining to budget for the coming biennium. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mr. Dill and seconded by Mr. McMorris that an expenditure of \$16,000.00 from the Permanent Improvement Fund allotment of \$500,000.00 to Southern Illinois Normal University be ap-

proved for the purchase of certain land adjacent to the Thompson property recently acquired by Southern Illinois Normal University. Land description as follows:

Beginning at a point 860 feet west of the northeast corner of the northwest quarter of Section 28, Town 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian, running thence south 810 feet, thence west to the west line of the said Northwest quarter, thence north along said west line 810 feet to the northwest corner of the said northwest quarter of Section 28, thence east along the north line of said northwest quarter to the place of beginning. There is expected, however, from this conveyance 20 feet off of the north side of said quarter section now being used for the south part of Chautauqua Street and that part off of the west side of said quarter section now being used for road purposes.

There is also excepted from this conveyance a parcel of land 200 x 400 feet heretofore deeded to the State of Illinois, Department of Public Health, as follows: Beginning at a point which is 30 feet west of the northeast corner of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of Section 28, Town 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian, running thence south 400 feet, then west 200 feet, thence north 400 feet, thence east 200 feet to the place of beginning being a part of the northwest quarter of the northwest quarter of Section 28, Town 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian.

Mr. Dill further moved that Southern Illinois Normal University be directed at the same time to draw a requisition in the amount used for the purchase of the land in question from its balance in the Normal School Income Fund, for the purpose of supplementing the Permanent Improvements Fund allotment for a New Training School Building.

It was moved by Dr. Sunderman and seconded by Mrs. Green that the report of President Buzzard of the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College be approved with the exception of item "IX" under the heading "Miscellaneous" and item "4" in the summary both referring to the purchase of glassware and microscopes. Motion carried.

It was moved by Dr. Sunderman and seconded by Mr. Beich that the Board approve a release of \$1,000.00 for glassware from the Permanent Improvement Fund, for Eastern Illinois State Teachers College.

It was moved by Mr. Alschuler and seconded by Mr. Dill that the report of President Karl L. Adams of Northern Illinois State Teachers College be approved with the exception of item "3" in the summary which pertains to the budget for the coming biennium. Motion carried.

The Budget Committee reported on Permanent Improvements and Major Repairs and made recommendations for the next biennium, as follows:

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. The rewiring of the Women's Dormitory is now complete, and the new fixtures are installed. This is very much appreciated by the occupants of the hall, and relieves the fire hazard which has given some grave concern since the opening of the hall in 1913.
2. The contract for fire prevention items which were recommended for the Administration Building in addition to the fire doors and walls between the corridors and stairs has not been let, so far as information is concerned which has come to the college.
3. The contract for repairs on the gutters and roof of the administration building and gymnasium has been let, and the work is now being done.
4. The chairman of the special committee appointed May 20 to investigate means of building a union building at Normal University and similar buildings at the other colleges has not been able to get the needed information as yet. The same problem confronts the colleges with respect to needed dormitories such as those which are being built at the University of Illinois. Not one of our teachers colleges has a dormitory for men. I can furnish a copy of the law Iowa uses.
5. Items have been included in the preliminary budget for the next biennium for a super-structure for the swimming pool, a farm machinery and shop building, a science building, and a library building. The order indicates the importance of the first two or minor requests, as well as of the last two or major requests.

2. Registration for the winter quarter took place on Monday, December 2. The enrollment at the present time is 1,107. Our records indicate that 19 students re-entered college, 12 students entered college for the first time, and 97 left college at the close of the fall quarter. These data should give the Board a picture of our enrollment conditions.

II. FACULTY

I wish to report for approval the employment of Mrs. Madeleine Grenard of Chicago, who will have a half-time teaching assignment in the Department of Mathematics. Mrs. Grenard has her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Nebraska and has at the present time completed all her course requirements for the Doctor's degree at the University of Chicago. She has had teaching experience as head of the Mathematics Department in the high school at Westerly, Rhode Island, and was a teaching fellow at the University of Nebraska and the University of Chicago Laboratory School and the University School for Girls in North Chicago. This special assignment was made necessary by an increased load in the Mathematics Department, augmented by special requests in Mathematics courses in extension. Mrs. Grenard will teach for the twelve weeks of this term at a salary of \$125.00 per month.

III. OTHER SCHOOL EMPLOYEES

I regret to report the resignation of Mrs. Elma Hakala Allaway, who has been serving as Extension Secretary and Assistant Registrar. Mrs. Allaway has served this college for eleven

years and her resignation due to her recent marriage becomes effective on January 1, 1941. We have requested the Civil Service Commission to send applicants for this position, but at the present time we have received no answer.

IV. THE ORGANIZATION

The college is attempting another modification in its student teaching program during this winter quarter—this time, for students preparing to teach in the high schools. Modifications at the present time deal specifically with student teaching for Home Economics majors.

Our plan at present is making use of four centers—Erie, Morrison, Oregon, and Polo. All of these schools are located within forty miles of DeKalb. These young women spend six weeks in these affiliated schools, acting as assisting teachers to the regular Home Economics teacher in the high school: The head of our Home Economics Department here at the college makes a weekly visit to each of these centers and confers with both the students and the Home Economics teacher concerning the program.

The superintendents in these schools are enthusiastic and appreciative of the problems involved. Our report at present is that they are most helpful with each phase of the work. These young students in training are taking active part in regular school activities, extra-curricular affairs, and community life. Miss Rena Hodgen and Miss Gertrude Taylor, from the office of the State Superintendent, are cooperating with the college in the development and supervision of this plan.

I shall be glad to report further to the Board the success of the plan at the close of a unit of student teaching. The college looks forward to a further development in this area as the present facilities of student teaching in the local DeKalb Township High School are being crowded to an extent that is not conducive to the best work either for us or for the high school.

V. THE CURRICULUM—No report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. I wish to report to the Board the present condition of the new Science Building.

Immediately upon the allotment of the funds for this building, the administration at the college, cooperating with a committee of the science faculty, began work with the office of the State Architect in Chicago to develop most effective plans available for the building that was needed here at the college. Since the college at DeKalb is approximately the same size as the college at Charleston, we commenced our plans with the idea of having this building comparable in size to the one at Charleston.

Later, as the plans progressed and as building costs were rising because of the war program, we felt it necessary to reduce the size of the building so that the building at Charleston will have one-fifth larger capacity than the one that is being planned for this college. All the details with respect to room location, use of parts of the building, built-in furniture, and other needs for a college building of this type have been worked out in detail. The completed plans were sent to Springfield and the special details worked out with respect to construction and specifications are now nearly complete for both the electrical and mechanical parts of such a contract.

The Department of Architecture and Engineering expects to have this building ready for bids by the end of January. It seems to me that it would be advisable for this Board to ask for an immediate appropriation of \$300,000 to be devoted for the completion of this building. Failure to do this may result in delaying the construction of this building to the point where building costs are still higher and where the problem of space on the campus here has become even more acute.

I should like the permission of the Board to investigate the possibility of getting this amount as a special appropriation for this specific purpose. I am sure that since we are the last one of the five colleges to receive a major building appropriation, there will be no objection on the part of the other colleges to such a procedure.

2. The Budget Committee of the Board at its last meeting suggested that the request for permanent improvements and extraordinary repairs be left to the action of this Board and not be determined by the action of the Budget Committee.

I am presenting to you at this time a copy of our tentative budget as presented to the Committee which will show these requests on pages 5 and 6. This tentative budget also contains detailed information concerning many of the other requests.

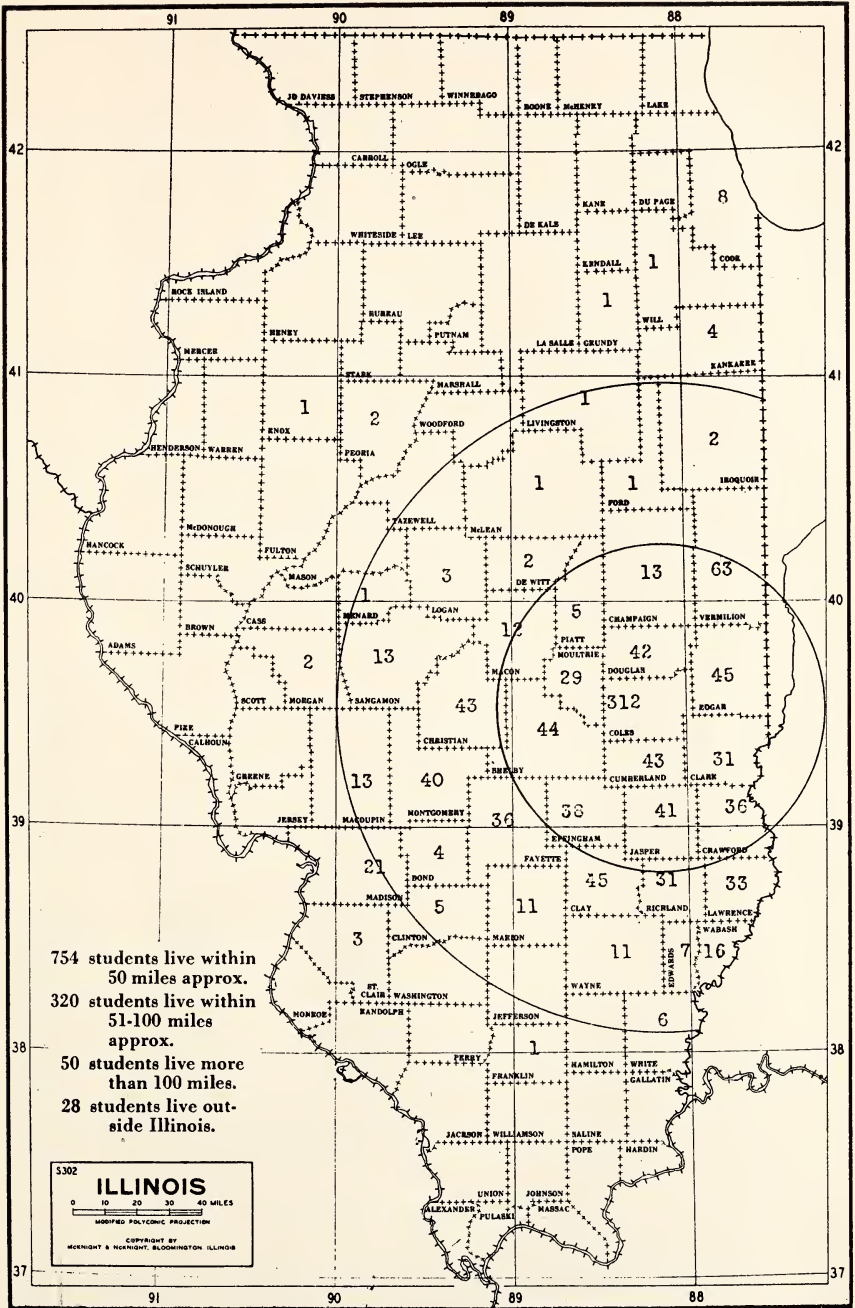
e. Origin of Students

The accompanying map of Illinois indicates the origin of the 1940-41 student body by counties, and depicts its distinctly local and regional character. Coles County contributes 312 students, or 26 per cent of the enrollment. Total expenditure \$392,019.77 divided by 1340.49 (equivalent enrollment for 36 weeks) equals \$292.45, the per capita cost for 1939-1940. This amount is noticeably below the per capita cost of 1938-39 of \$320.84 due to an increase of 110.85 in equivalent enrollment.

II. FACULTY

1. Leaves of absence:

- Alice McKinney, A.M., Instructor in Art, on leave of absence for the Fall Quarter, 1940, due to illness, requests an extension of leave without salary for the Winter Quarter, 1940-41.

- b. Emily V. Baker, A.M., Instructor and Sixth Grade Critic, requests leave of absence without salary for the second half-year, beginning February 1, 1941, in order to continue graduate study at Columbia University.
 - c. Walter A. Klehm, Ed.D., Associate Professor and Head of the Department of Industrial Arts, requests leave of absence from campus duties for approximately half-time, in order to act as Supervisor of the Program for Related Training in Cooperation with the N.Y.A. at Mattoon, Ob-long, Danville and Effingham. Dr. Klehm will draw full salary and the college will be reimbursed for half-salary each month, beginning January 1, 1941, and ending June 30, 1941. This work is directed by the State Department of Vocational Education from the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction.
2. Substitute Instructors :
- a. Marjory Wintersteen, A.M., present substitute instructor for Alice McKinney for the Fall Quarter, 1940, in the same position for the Winter Quarter, 1940-41, at a salary of \$200 per month.
3. Return to duty :
- a. Lucille Magruder, A.M., Instructor in Home Economics, on leave of absence for the Fall Quarter, 1940, has returned to duty with the opening of the Winter Quarter, replacing Wilma Warner, substitute during Miss Magruder's absence.

III. OTHER EMPLOYEES

- a. Edson H. Clodtfelter, Head Engineer, fell in the heating plant on the evening of December 10 and broke a shoulder blade. Mr. Clodtfelter's sick leave has necessitated the shifting of a member of the grounds force to daytime duty in the heating plant for a few weeks.

V. THE CURRICULUM—No report.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

- a. The W. P. A. project for rebuilding the campus drives and constructing new walks has been practically completed in spite of bad weather during the last three weeks. Work will be closed down late in the month and opened in the spring, with the moving of the present greenhouse as the major item.
- b. The rewiring of the women's dormitory is practically complete.

- c. The campus lighting system has met delay in completion due to non-delivery of the boulevard-type light posts and the electrical transformer board. This work will probably not be completed until late in January.
- d. A system of fire-alarm gongs is now being installed as a part of the program of fire hazard reduction.
- e. No action has been taken on the necessary alterations and additions to the interior of the Main Building, bids for which were filed with the Division of Architecture and Engineering through the Department of Registration and Education in July, 1940.
- f. The equipment of fire extinguishers and fire hose has been rehabilitated and added to until the recommendations of the State Fire Marshal have been met.
- g. Contracts for the installation of the stoker repairs for the two older boilers, recommended by the Division of Architecture and Engineering, and for which \$16,500 was allotted and approved, have not been let. Certain other repairs to these boilers have been made under this allotment.
- h. The new additional boiler is now on "the line" and is giving excellent service.
- i. The new water tower is completed but is still in the process of being tested. Because of its stream-line effect it is proving quite a topic of conversation in the local community.
- j. Bids on the necessary general repair (\$7,795.00) and the needed plumbing (\$6,477.00) for the lavatories of the Main Building and the Women's Dormitory have been taken, and exceed the \$10,000 allotted by \$4,267.00. Requisition has been filed vacating unexpended balances in various previous requisitions, totalling \$3,350.99, and \$916.01 added from the appropriation for repair and equipment. It is hoped that the major part of this work can be done during the Christmas holidays.

X. SUMMARY

The Normal School Board approved the following items:

1. Leaves of absence for Alice McKinney, Emily V. Baker and Walter A. Klehm, as stated.
2. Employment of Marjory Wintersteen as substitute Instructor in Art, as stated.
3. Request Division of Architecture and Engineering to place matter of new roof for Auditorium in Main Building, for which not to exceed \$2,000 was released by Governor Horner on September 27, 1940, as an emergency situation, and given immediate attention.
