Press and public relationships were discussed and, as members of the Board viewed their opinions relative to the manner of press relations and relative to the amount of information to be released, it was determined after further discussion that the Chairman of the Board should be designated to make the releases and he was authorized to use his judgment in determining what and how much information should be released.

Discussion of the salary of President Morris. It was determined inasmuch as all the members of the faculty had had a raise already this year, and inasmuch as the Teachers College Board had recently considered raising the salaries of all the presidents, and inasmuch as a salary increase is both needed and highly deserved by President Morris, that an increase in salary be given. There followed considerable discussion as to the amount of salary increase and the following factors were considered in arriving at a figure:

- a. The inestimable value of the work done by President Morris during this past crucial year.
- b. Limitations to the amount of increase as determined by our budget.
- c. The effect on public and faculty relations with the Presidency following any such increase.
- d. The necessity of entertainment and official expenses incurred in the administration of the Office of the President.

Following the above discussion the motion was made by Mr. Lyerla and seconded by Mr. Wham that the salary of the President be increased from \$10,000. to \$14,000. per year (on a twelve-months basis) starting as of August 1, 1949. The meeting adjourned at 12:30 p.m. for luncheon at the University Cafeteria and reconvened at 2:00 p.m.

#### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT MORRIS

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

#### Establishment of an Off-Campus Residence Center at Belleville, Illinois

For the past year, the University has received an increasing number of requests from school teachers and administrators in the Belleville-East St. Louis-Granite City-Alton-Edwardsville area to offer a more comprehensive program of off-campus courses, particularly for elementary and secondary school teachers and for school administrators and supervisors. It is generally agreed that Belleville is the logical center for such an off-campus program, and the public school authorities of that city have offered to make the necessary facilities available at the Belleville Junior High School, Senior High School, Junior College, and Public Library. On February 8, 1949, and again on March 16, 1949, representatives of the University conferred with school men in Washington, Clinton, Madison, Monroe, and St. Clair counties; and the consensus was that the proposal should be carried out as soon as possible. Later in March, a questionnaire was circulated through the county superintendents' offices, asking each grade and high school teacher to indicate whether or not he would expect to enroll in off-campus graduate or undergraduate courses at Belleville if such courses were offered, with the result that 382 teachers indicated an interest in undergraduate courses and 298 in graduate courses.

At the March 28, 1949, meeting of the Teachers College Board, therefore, we reported our intention to establish an off-campus residence center at Belleville. The Teachers College Board referred the matter to its Graduate Studies Committee, and a statement (see Supplement A) was prepared for that Committee. The reaction was unfavorable because a rule of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education limits to one-fourth the amount of a student's credit which can be taken off-campus, even though up to one-half is allowed by the University of Illinois and many other universities. Applying the teachers college measuring-stick to Southern prevented further action on our part until the establishment of a separate board. Meanwhile, the University of Illinois, which does not regard itself as bound by rulings of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, is developing a graduate extension program in Southern Illinois.

With the approval of the Board of Trustees, therefore, we desire to take steps to establish an off-campus residence center at Belleville in accordance with the plan outlined in the attached statement (Supplement A).

The establishment of an off-campus residence center at Belleville, Illinois, was discussed by all members of the Board and by President Morris. A motion was made by Mr. Lyerla and seconded by Mr. Gladson that the administration of the University be empowered to establish an off-campus residence center at Belleville. #### Establishment of Advisory Boards for Terminal Vocational Courses

B. Among the numerous areas of university instruction and function that need to be explored, perhaps the most urgent is the development in and for Southern Illinois of terminal types of vocational instruction in the fields of (1) Agriculture and (2) Industrial Education. At a later meeting of the Board of Trustees, it is hoped that a thorough discussion of

the potentialities of such programs can be held. Meanwhile, however, it would seem desirable to set up Advisory Boards to consider the needs and possibilities in each of the areas; we therefore request approval for the naming of two such Boards.

A motion was made by Mr. Gladson and seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis to authorize the President of the University to appoint such Advisory Boards as he may deem necessary to advise the University concerning the establishment of terminal vocational courses in (1) Agriculture, (2) Industrial Education, and (3) Coal Mining techniques. #### Addition of Graduate Courses Upon Approval of Graduate Faculty

C. At the June 6, 1949, meeting of the Teachers College Board, we requested authorization to add graduate courses to the curriculum upon the same basis as undergraduate courses; namely, immediately upon approval of the appropriate faculty members and the local administration of Southern Illinois University. The Teachers College Board had required us to submit sixty days in advance of each Board meeting lists of courses to be approved first by its Graduate Studies Committee and then by the Board itself. As we understand it, the idea originally behind this procedure (dating back to 1944-45) was to prevent the schools under the Teachers College Board from expanding their graduate programs too fast, and at the time it was indicated that the procedure was merely temporary.

Our graduate program has now developed to a point where only a normal steady expansion of the curriculum need be anticipated, and our graduate faculty has shown excellent judgment and discretion in developing the Graduate School on a realistic and sensible basis. But the Teachers College Board did not act upon our request at the June 6, 1949, meeting, wishing to refer it to its own Graduate Studies Committee. We therefore call to the attention of our new Board of Trustees our desire to adhere to the practice that prevails in most universities of leaving the determination of the graduate curriculum in the hands of the graduate faculty; and request their approval of this procedure. This does not apply, of course, to entire new courses of study in new areas, for which Board approval should be sought, but only to individual courses within established curricula.

A motion was made by Dr. Brown and seconded by Mr. Lyerla to authorize the President of the University to add graduate courses to the curriculum upon the same basis as undergraduate courses; namely, immediately upon the approval of the faculty and local administration of Southern Illinois University.\* The vote was unanimous with each member recording his vote as follows:

## Approval of Pay Roll Titles of Dean, Lecturer, Assistant Instructor, Research Associate, and Graduate Assistant

D. At present our pay roll titles for the faculty-administrative staff are uniform with those of the four teachers colleges and normal schools.

but are not in all cases appropriate for university-type positions. These titles are (1) President, (2) Executive Assistant in Education and Administration, (3) Professor, (4) Associate Professor, (5) Assistant Professor, (6) Instructor, (7) Faculty Assistant.

The title Faculty Assistant has given rise to much confusion because several different types of workers have had to be listed under it. First, there are people engaged in full-time instruction or student personnel work who lack the academic training and experience required for the rank of Instructor. We propose to call these people Assistant Instructors. The requirement for appointment under this title should for the present be the same as for Faculty Assistants (a Bachelor's degree or equivalent), and the maximum salary for the present should remain at \$350.00 per month.

Secondly, among our Faculty Assistants at present are a number We propose to call these Research of full-time research workers. The requirements for appointment under this title would Associates.

be identical with those just stated for Assistant Instructors.

Thirdly, we also classify as Faculty Assistants at present students engaged in part-time instructional, student personnel, or research work and in part-time study toward advanced degrees. Such students are ordinarily called Graduate Assistants, which title we now propose for them. For appointment to this title, a Bachelor's degree should be required and the maximum salary should remain as at present (\$110.00 per month for half-time services).

Approval of the titles Assistant Instructor, Research Associate, and Graduate Assistant would make it possible eventually to abolish the

unsatisfactory and ambiguous title Faculty Assistant.

Another pay roll title which has caused confusion is that of Executive Assistant in Education and Administration, which is now applied both to people solely engaged in administrative work and to people responsible not only for administration but also for instruction and student This title will be subjected to careful examination, personnel work. but for the moment we wish to propose that the customary university title of Dean be used as both the pay roll and the descriptive title for the heads of our Colleges and our Student Life offices, with no present change in their status otherwise.

Oftentimes we desire to bring to the campus for a few days, a few weeks, or a few months a lecturer or consultant with either a high degree of technical training, a broad background of special experience, or both, to advise faculty members, students, and citizens concerning some phase of our developing program or to supplement the work of our instructional departments. Such persons often do not fit into the faculty classifications we now have. We wish to propose for them the customary university title Lecturer, and to place them temporarily on the pay roll at rates of pay justified by the extent of their services and their value to the University.

Senate Bill 681, just approved by the Governor, provides for the employment of "administrative and instructional staff positions at rates established by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University' It is under this authority that we are requesting the Board's approval of these new pay roll titles.

A motion was made by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis and seconded by Mr. Gladson to make the following changes in pay roll titles:

- a. The title of Faculty Assistant is to become "Assistant Instructor".
- b. Research workers are to become "Research Associates".
- c. Part-time student instructors and certain part-time research workers are to be called "Graduate Assistants".
- d. The customary university title of "Dean" is to be used as both the pay roll and descriptive titles for the heads of the University's undergraduate colleges and student life offices with no present change in their status otherwise.
- e. The creation of the title "Lecturer" for those individuals whom it becomes necessary to bring to the campus periodically for periods

of a few days or weeks to render service as a lecturer or as a consultant. These will be individuals who do not fit into the present faculty classifications but whose high degrees of technical training and skills make their services necessary. They are to be placed temporarily on the pay roll at rates of pay justified by their extent of services and their value to the University.

#### Lifting Salary Schedule Ceilings Where Necessary

E. A definite salary schedule for the faculty was first proposed by the State Teachers College Board in 1928, but the 1929 depression struck before it could be put into operation. The schedule was reactivated in 1943. This first schedule incorporated such features as the correlation of salary and rank, a minimum and a maximum salary for each rank, and an automatic increment for teachers below the maxima for their ranks. It has twice been revised upward, and a copy of the latest revision is attached (Supplement B).

A study of the range and other features of the present salary schedule is being made by a staff committee, which will eventually report its recommendations. A matter of immediate concern, however, is the maximum limit imposed by this schedule. This maximum has prevented our hiring several top-flight men in recent weeks—men of the calibre necessary to provide leadership in such important areas as agriculture. We request permission to disregard the ceilings in our present salary schedule in those instances where we must meet competition from other schools in order to attract and retain personnel with the desired qualifications and experience.

Any new and replacement appointments of this kind will, of course, be made within the framework of our present budget. They will not entail an increase, but a slightly different distribution, of the personal services monies, since the salaries paid to these highly qualified people can be offset by bringing in a number of replacements at lower ranks.

A motion was made by Mr. Lyerla and seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis to authorize the administration to lift the salary schedule ceilings where necessary to secure the services of individuals whose backgrounds. experience, and reputations qualify them to positions where needs are critical. This action permits the University to bid in the competitive fields where a particular individual's service must be secured at a figure higher than the present salary ceiling. F. At the June 6, 1949, meeting of the Teachers College Board, we proposed a policy of providing moving expenses for new members of the faculty-administrative staff, where such inducement would enable us to attract highly qualified individuals. Often the paying of moving expenses would enable us to bring people to the staff at a lower starting salary than otherwise and thus would result in an actual economy.

since eventually the lower salary rate would much more than compensate for the monies spent in moving. During this period of severe competition for qualified teachers in certain fields, this policy might well pay for itself many times over in lower salaries and improved qualifications of staff.

The Teachers College Board felt that this proposal should not be adopted on a state-wide scale. We are therefore proposing it to our Board of Trustees as a policy to be approved for Southern Illinois University.

A motion was made by Dr. Brown and seconded by Mr. Gladson that the University administration be permitted to agree to pay the moving expenses on household goods of certain selected new faculty members wherein the cost is not too great and wherein such action may be the determining factor in securing the services of highly qualified individuals. #### Reduction or Elimination of Fees for Certain Students

G. At the March 28, 1949, meeting of the Teachers College Poard, we requested remission of fees to a carefully selected group of foreign students, not to exceed ten in number in any one school year. A number of organizations, such as Rotary International and the Institute of International Education, have been interested in placing foreign students at Southern Illinois University, so that they may receive the benefits of an American education and learn American ideals and principles. These organizations are willing to encourage the students by providing them with scholarships covering part of their expenses for room and board; and certain local groups in Carbondale can provide them with additional assistance. The question had come up, however, as to whether the University could not assist them to the extent of excusing them from tuition and other necessary fees. The situation is particularly acute for these foreign students, since they now classify as out-of-State students and have to pay out-of-State fees.

At the same time, we recommended that the Teachers College Board consider the question of remitting basic tuition to athletes who are able to maintain satisfactory scholastic averages and standards of performance. We pointed to the precedent of the scholarships which have been granted here to students who show unusual competence in music and who play in the University Band and Orchestra.

The Teachers College Board raised the question as to whether it could grant scholarships and referred the whole matter to the Attorney General for a ruling. The Attorney General ruled that it was not within the power of the Teachers College Board to grant scholarships, and on the basis of this ruling the music scholarships that we had been issuing for many years were denied us.

The Chairman of the present Board of Trustees has now written to the Attorney General for an opinion on the question of whether or not the new Board, under its power to establish fees, cannot in special cases of deserving students, reduce or eliminate tuition and other fees. Subject to a favorable ruling by the Attorney General, we request permission of the Board of Trustees to reduce or eliminate fees during the year 1949-50 for not more than ten foreign students, not more than forty music students, and not more than thirty students engaging in athletics, all selected with due emphasis on their scholastic proficiency.

The subject of the reduction or elimination of fees for certain students was discussed and Chairman Davis read an opinion given by the present

Attorney General of Illinois stating that there could be no reduction nor elimination of fees and interpreting such action to be discriminatory.

#### Training Table and Residence for Athletes

H. We request the support of the Board of Trustees for the development of our athletic program in accordance with generally accepted standards both in our conference and in the nation at large. Specifically we desire permission at this time to establish a training table for athletes and to provide a residence house for them, if one becomes available from among University-owned or rented properties.

The above recommendation was tabled for future consideration.

#### Handling of Out-of-State Travel Requests

I. The present practice in Illinois is that expenses for all travel by State employees that takes them outside the State must be authorized by the Governor. Hitherto we have sent requests for such authorization to the Department of Registration and Education for transmittal to the Governor and for the return of his approvals. These requests and approvals were never reviewed by the Teachers College Board.

We now request the Board's view as to whether these travel requests should be submitted through the Board's Chairman, the Board's

Executive Committee, or the President's Office.

The President and Business Manager of the University were authorized to handle the out-of-State travel requests in the simplest and most effective manner possible.

Purchases of Land

J. It will soon be necessary to undertake a study of our general campus plan with a view to establishing a list of priorities for the acquisition of land needed for the program. Meanwhile, however, there are certain tracts which must be purchased almost immediately. We desire approval to proceed with the acquisition of the following tracts, while postponing the decision upon a complete and final list of priorities:

#### SUPPLEMENT A

### CONDITIONS GOVERNING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN OFF-CAMPUS RESIDENCE CENTER AT BELLEVILLE, ILLINOIS

#### I. Nature of the demand:

- 1. There are more than 3,000 teachers, supervisors, and administrators in the area which would be served by such an off-campus center.
  - (1) Many of these are operating under emergency certificates and do not have a baccalaureate degree. Therefore, these want and need senior college courses.
  - (2) A larger number and proportion have bachelor's degrees but are required to take a minimum number of graduate courses within a given period until at least a Master's degree is obtained.
  - (3) In some systems, particularly in Madison County, teachers are required to continue enrolling regularly in graduate courses until they have a minimum of twenty-five semester hours beyond the Master's degree.

2. These people offer as objections to their taking the Master's degree at the University of Illinois the following:

(1) A minimum of half the work must be taken on campus.

- (2) Living conditions are undesirable, due to scarcity and high rents.
- (3) Many of them, by going to Champaign, have to pay out \$700—\$800 per summer and lose a similar amount in summer salaries.
- 3. These people object to taking their work in St. Louis universities for the following reasons:

(1) Excessively high tuition.

(2) Hazardous metropolitan transportation.

- (3) Lack of personal interest in part-time students by staff members.
- 4. These people prefer taking the work in a Southern Illinois University off-campus center for the following reasons:
  - (1) They can live in their own homes and do not have to endure the unwholesome living conditions in university communities. (This will help somewhat to relieve the housing congestion at Carbondale.)
  - (2) They can live and obtain their graduate work at a fraction of the cost entailed in campus residence courses.
  - (3) They can qualify for regular summer salaries by working outside of class periods and on week ends in their school systems.
  - (4) They feel that the Southern Illinois University faculty members will take a personal interest in them.

#### II. Areas to be served:

- 1. All of St. Clair County.
- 2. All of Madison County.
- 3. The northern and eastern half of Monroe County.

4. The northern part of Randolph County.

5. The northern and western half of Washington County.

#### III. Types of courses to be offered:

1. Graduate courses, expecially in elementary education and in educational administration and supervision. Possibly, a limited number of courses in guidance and counseling.

2. Undergraduate courses, especially on the Senior College level, as demanded by those indicating an interest in undergraduate work.

- 3. By offering both graduate and undergraduate courses in an offcampus center, such as Belleville, the following advantages will result:
  - (1) The courses can be taught by resident instructors.
  - (2) Fewer extension courses will be needed in the areas served.

(3) Better library facilities can be made available.

#### IV. Quality of Instruction:

1. Those teaching graduate courses at the off-campus center will be required to meet the same academic qualifications as those offering graduate courses on campus.

2. The courses taught at the off-campus center will have to meet the same requirements as to library and research facilities as though they were being offered on campus.

3. This means that courses will have to be selected on the following basis:

- (1) Those which can utilize the educational experiences of the students as an educational laboratory. Examples: courses dealing with abnormal children, community surveys, administrative and supervisory problems, etc.
- (2) Those which normally require a limited number of texts and reference books which can be made available in the library of the off-campus center. Examples: mental hygiene, school administration, school finance, school law, etc.

#### V. The problem of adequate library facilities:

1. The public library and public school libraries of Belleville cannot be expected to provide any ordinary reference materials for graduate courses. Some newspaper sources may be used as a primary research source for term papers and theses.

2. The St. Louis public library and university libraries (St. Louis and Washington Universities) can be used only in formal research

projects and not as sources of ordinary course references.

3. To make adequate reference materials available, two steps are necessary:

- (1) Determine which courses can most advantageously be offered at the off-campus center and still meet the needs of the students.
- (2) Take immediate steps, as soon as Board approval is obtained, to order duplicate copies of all reference books needed for each course, so that this material will be available at the off-campus center when needed.

4. This same procedure should be followed for undergraduate courses offered at the off-campus center.

#### VI. Other suggested rules governing courses at the off-campus center:

1. It is suggested that, at the outset, and possibly permanently, not more than three-fourths of the total graduate credits for the Master's degree be permitted to be taken at the off-campus center. This would require at least one summer's work on campus.

2. It is also suggested that, at the outset, not more than two full-time instructors, or equivalent, be employed in offering courses in the off-campus center. (A complete survey of all teachers and administrators in the area is in process; and if the results call for any more extensive program than is here suggested, that fact should be known before the May meeting of the Teachers College Board.)

#### VII. Precedents in other educational institutions:

- 1. In offering residence credit in an off-campus center, Southern Illinois University would in no sense be establishing a new or untried educational policy or practice.
  - 2. Examples of similar practices in other universities include:
    - (1) The University of Wisconsin, at Milwaukee.

(2) The University of Indiana, at Gary.

(3) Indiana State Teachers College, at Covington.

(4) University of Georgia, at Atlanta.

(5) University of Alabama, at Montgomery and Birmingham.

#### A. Appointment, Academic Freedom, and Tenure:

(This is Standard XII of the American Association of Teachers Colleges)

1. Appointments

"The appointment of administrative officers and of faculty members and the determination of educational policies should be governed by professional considerations. Political factors should not be permitted to interfere with the efficiency of an institution. The spirit of these principles should also be demonstrated in the internal administration of the college for the development and maintenance of the best type of faculty service and of student growth

"It is presumed that administrative officers and faculty members will be appointed on merit rather than for political or other nonprofessional considerations."

2. Academic Freedom and Tenure

(The following statement concerning academic freedom and tenure was formulated by representatives of the Association of American Colleges and of the American Association of University Professors and agreed upon at a joint conference on November 8, 1940. This statement was endorsed by the Association of American Colleges at its Annual Meeting January 9, 1941, by the American Association of Teachers Colleges at its Annual Meeting on February 22, 1941, and by the Annual Meeting of the American Association of University Professors on December 28, 1941.)

The purpose of this statement is to promote public understanding and support of academic freedom and tenure and agreement upon procedures to assure them in colleges and universities. Institutions of higher education are conducted for the common good and not to further the interest of either the individual teacher or the institution as a whole. The common good depends upon the free search for

truth and its free exposition.

Academic freedom is essential to these purposes and applied to both teaching and research. Freedom in research is fundamental to the advancement of truth. Academic freedom in its teaching aspect is fundamental for the protection of the rights of the teacher in teaching and of the student to freedom in learning. It carries with it duties correlative with rights.

Tenure is a means to certain ends, specifically: (1) Freedom of teaching and research and of extra-mural activities, and (2) a sufficient degree of economic security to make the profession attractive to men and women of ability. Freedom and economic security, hence tenure, are indispensable to the success of an institution in fulfilling its obligations to its students and to society.

#### a. Academic Freedom

(1) The teacher is entitled to full freedom in research and in the publication of the results, subject to the adequate performance of his other academic duties; but research for pecuniary return should be based upon an understanding with the authorities of the institution.

(2) The teacher is entitled to freedom in the classroom in discussing his subject, but he should be careful not to introduce into his teaching controversial matter which has no relation to his subject. Limitations of academic freedom because of

religious or other aims of the institution should be clearly

stated in writing at the time of the appointment.

(3) The college or university teacher is a citizen, a member of a learned profession, and an officer of an educational institution. When he speaks or writes as a citizen, he should be free from institutional censorship or discipline, but his special position in the community imposes special obligations. As a man of learning and an educational officer, he should remember that the public may judge his profession and his institution by his utterances. Hence he should at all times be accurate, should exercise appropriate restraint, should show respect for the opinions of others and should make every effort to indicate that he is not an institutional spokesman.

#### b. Academic Tenure

(1) After the expiration of a probationary period teachers or investigators should have permanent or continuous tenure, and their services should be terminated only for adequate cause, except in the case of retirement for age, or under extraordinary circumstances, because of financial exigencies.

In the interpretation of this principle it is understood that the following represents acceptable academic practice:

- (a) The precise terms and conditions of every appointment should be stated in writing and be in the possession of both institution and teacher before the appointment is consummated.
- (b) Beginning with appointment to the rank of full-time instructor or a higher rank, the probationary period should not exceed seven years, including within this period full-time service in all institutions of higher education; but subject to the proviso that when, after a term of probationary service of more than three years in one or more institutions, a teacher is called to another institution it may be agreed in writing that his new appointment is for a probationary period of not more than four years, even though thereby the person's total probationary period in the academic profession is extended beyond the normal maximum of seven years. Notice should be given at least one year prior to the expiration of the probationary period, if the teacher is not to be continued in service after the expiration of that period, or if extension of the original probationary period is deemed advisable.

(c) During the probationary period a teacher should have the academic freedom that all other members of the faculty

have.

- (d) Termination for cause of a continuous appointment, or the dismissal for cause of a teacher previous to the expiration of a term appointment, should, if possible, be considered by both a faculty committee and the governing board of the institution. In all cases where the facts are in dispute, the accused teacher should be informed before the hearing in writing of the charges against him and should have the opportunity to be heard in his own defense by all bodies that pass judgment upon his case. He should be permitted to have with him an adviser of his own choosing who may act as counsel. There should be a full stenographic record of the hearing available to the parties concerned. In the hearing of charges of incompetence the testimony should include that of teachers and other scholars, either from his own or from other insti-Teachers on continuous appointment who are dismissed for reasons not involving moral turpitude should receive their salaries for at least a year from the date of notification of dismisal whether or not they are continued in their duties at the institution.
- (e) Termination of a continuous appointment because of financial exigency should be demonstrably bona fide.

#### Salary Provisions:

1. All teachers who have completed the probationary period in their employing institution, unless already classified, shall be classified under this schedule.

2. The librarians at each college, members of the campus training school staff, and any others designated by the president as belonging to the instructional staff, shall be included in this schedule.

3. This salary schedule is based on an academic year of 36 weeks.

The various classes provided under this schedule, the proportion of the faculty in each rank, qualifications for each class, and the salaries shall be as follows:

#### GROUP I

Professor

\$4950-5850

Earned Doctor's Degree Proportion of Faculty: 1/8 to 1/4

#### GROUP II

Associate Professor \$4275-5175 Doctor's Degree or equivalent Proportion of Faculty: 1/4 to 2/5

#### GROUP III

Assistant Professor \$3600-4500 Two years of graduate work or equivalent Proportion of Faculty: ½ to 2/5

#### GROUP IV

Instructor \$3150-3825 Master's Degree or equivalent Proportion of Faculty: not over 1/5

5. At the beginning of each academic year an increment of \$90 shall be given to each person until the maximum salary for his rank is reached. Continuity of service automatically entitles a teacher to the annual increments within his class.

#### C. Promotions and Salary Increases:

- 1. Faculty promotions and salary advances other than those provided by automomatic increments, should be determined upon the basis of the following factors:
  - a. Teaching Ability

By this is meant the success of the instructor in securing interest, effort, and progress on the part of students. The primary consideration is that students are stimulated to better standards of scholarship, to keener interest in learning, to greater professional understanding, and to more effective effort toward self-improvement.

Possible methods of evaluation of teaching ability may include classroom visitation, canvass of faculty and student opinion, and the survey of records of students after leaving the institution.

b. Professional Growth

This is essentially a matter of scholarship of a live and progressive character, manifested by such things as continued study, scholarly interests, research and productive and creative work, and professional participation and performance. The essential test of such growth is the teacher's success in holding the respect and esteem of his students and his colleagues within his special field of study and in maintaining professional standards in keeping with those generally approved by the teaching profession.

c. General Educational Service

This refers to the acceptance and fulfillment of educational responsibilities outside of classroom. It may be shown by service in professional organizations of state-wide or national scope, identification with community movements of genuinely educational character outside of the classroom, or by similar types of service by which the college comes to have greater prestige and usefulness in the community, state, and nation.

2. Promotions from one class in the schedule to another shall not follow automatically when a faculty member shall have raised his qualifications to meet the requirements of the class above, but rather shall be made upon the written recommendations of the president to the Teachers College Board.

In appraising the claims of any individual to faculty promotion and/or salary advances other than the automatic increments, it is recommended that the presidents consult department heads, deans, and duly constituted representative faculty bodies.

3. Sex shall not be considered a factor in connection with advancement or promotions.

#### D. Sabbatical Leave and Sick Leave:

- 1. Each year in each teachers college one out of every twenty-five members of the faculty or major fraction thereof may be granted not to exceed a year's leave of absence on half pay for the purpose of attending some institution of higher learning or of otherwise adding to his professional equipment or usefulness, provided that the person shall have already served at least five years in the teachers college. No person shall receive such a leave oftener than once in seven years. The person granted such a leave, however, shall agree to serve at least two more years in any of the state-supported institutions of higher learning in Illinois, and shall give a note with proper security for the amount granted, said note to be cancelled at the end of the two years of service required or at the death of its maker. The leave of absence must be aplied for at the April meeting of the Teachers College Board on the recommendation of the president.
- 2. A teacher whose service is interrupted by personal illness after beginning his work for the year shall receive full pay for two weeks and half pay for the next six weeks. A week's leave of absence with full pay may be granted to a teacher because of serious illness or death in his immediate family.

Dr. Brown made the suggestion that in the event a member of the Board wishes to present a resolution to the Board, that such resolution be written out in advance of the meeting. He stated that in some instances it might prove advantageous to send such resolutions to the members of the Board for their consideration before the scheduled meeting.

Mr. Gladson suggested that the names of all individuals recommended for positions on the faculty, except in the case of emergency or temporary positions, should be submitted to the members of the Board in advance of the meeting at which the person recommended will be considered. A brief biography of each applicant should be included.

These suggestions met with the approval of the Board.

Dr. Brown reported that in compliance with the request of the Board, a letter was written to the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland concerning bond for Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr. In their reply they have stated that their company has furnished bond in the amount of \$10,000.00 for Mr. Miles

and that the Obligee on the bond is changed to read, "Board of Trustees, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Illinois." The official correspondence on this matter has been placed on file in the Offices of the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Gladson stated that he had been working on the matter of scholarships but that he has nothing definite to report at this time. He did, however, state that he had made a trip to Springfield and had conferred with the Chief Assistant to the Attorney General, who is taking the matter under advisement. A complete report will be presented to the Board as soon as it is possible to secure the information.

President Morris was called into the meeting. Before presenting his official report he talked with the members of the Board concerning the entellment at Southern Illinois University, stating that the enrollment is already 3,111, an increase of 98 over the total enrollment of last year and that final figures for this year are not yet available. This information, he said, is very gratifying in light of the fact that there is a general decrease in

university enrollments throughout the country.

Dr. Morris further stated that by next fall there should be a great improvement in the physical plant due to the completion of the new Training School building, which will release the Allyn Building for classroom or office space. He said that the housing situation is greatly improved this year as a result of the new dormitory for boys that has been constructed above the University Drug store, the quarters for men, built by Dr. Miller, and the new girls' dormitory constructed by the Baptist Foundation. All of these, he said, are privately constructed buildings and are not subsidized by University funds nor are they under the direct jurisdiction of the University.

It was Dr. Morris' feeling that the Administration should encourage two other religious groups to set up Foundations, namely, the Methodists and the Catholics because of the large number of students in these two groups. The members of the Board assured Dr. Morris that they had no objections

to the stimulation of interest in this direction.

The President suggested that the next meeting of the Board be held during the Homecoming week-end and that the meeting be integrated with the Homecoming activities. He further suggested that an open-house or a reception be planned to which all faculty, alumni, and townspeople be invited so that they would have an opportunity to meet the members of the Board and their wives.

President Morris asked for Board approval to extend an invitation to Mr. Chance Hill, Landscape Architect, and to Mr. Joseph F. Booton, Chief of Design, Division of Architecture and Engineering, to meet with the members of the Board at the October meeting for the purpose of discussing the physical plant of the University. This met with the approval of the Board.

At this time, Dr. Morris presented each member of the Board with the following reports:

- 2. Business Administration of Southern Illinois University. Prepared by R. W. Kettler and Consultants.
- 3. Some Features of the Statutory Framework Surrounding the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. Prepared by M. M. Chambers and Consultants.

4. Regional Hospital and Professional Education Survey of Southern Illinois conducted for Southern Illinois University. Prepared by Gerhard Hartman.

It was the feeling of the Board that no action be taken until all members had the opportunity to read and study this latter report.

#### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT MORRIS

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

## Proposal by the State Department of Finance to Limit the 1949-50 Internal Budget to 45% of the Biennial Appropriation

A. We have received a request from the State Department of Finance to limit to 45% of the appropriations for the 1949-51 biennium our expenditures for 1949-50, the first year of the biennium.

This request came to us after our internal budget for 1949-50 had already been made up and approved by the Executive Committee of the Board. The request would injure us primarily by depleting the reserves allowed for in our internal budget to the point where no emergency expenditures could be met or no new projects of any sort could be undertaken. Already our various departments and offices have been notified of their departmental budgets for 1949-50 and have made commitments on that basis, so that the depletion of our reserve is a serious matter. We wish to call to the attention of the Board that its own record of accomplishment is at stake, since without reserve funds it can do little more than approve a minimal program for Southern Illinois University.

We respectfully request that the members of the Board of Trustees consider whether or not it wishes to revise the internal budget for 1949-50 as a result of the request of the Department of Finance.

The proposal by the State Department of Finance to limit the 1949-50 internal budget to 45 per cent of the biennial appropriation was discussed at some length. It was generally agreed that the Board and the Administration would not accept the decrease in the appropriation if it is at all possible to prevent it. Mr. Kenneth L. Davis suggested that no action be taken by the Board until after the conference on Wednesday, September 28, at which time Representative Powell and Senator Crisenberry are to meet with Governor Stevenson to discuss the matter. This suggestion met with the approval of the members of the Board.

#### Self-Liquidating Dormitories

B. We request consideration by the Board of our need for dormitory space and of the possibility of meeting this need through the construction of self-liquidating dormitories. We hope to have for inspection by the members of the Board certain drawings which will give them a view of the possibilities. If a suitable program of dormitory construction can be worked out, we shall also need Board consideration of plans for financing it.

Mr. Schaeffer and Mr. Hooton of the architectural firm of Schaeffer, Hooton, and Wilson of Bloomington, Illinois, were asked to come into the meeting. They presented each member of the Board with blueprints of the proposed standardized dormitory design. Each basic unit, as designed, will house 154 individuals.

Mr. Schaeffer then presented the members of the Board with his firm's contract for the construction of dormitories.

Mr. Lyerla made a motion that a committee of the Board be appointed to study the contract and recommend its acceptance or rejection. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis. The vote was unanimous with each member recording his vote as follows:

Dr. Morris was asked to secure information on the number of students who are now commuting to the University. It was tentatively agreed that one women's dormitory, consisting of three units, and one men's dormitory, consisting of one unit, be constructed as soon as possible. Dr. Morris was given authority to contact some bonding companies and to report concerning this matter at the next meeting of the Board, at which time the Board Committee on the architectural contract will make its recommendations to the Board.

#### Purchases of Land

C. We desire approval to proceed with the acquisition of portions of certain tracts of land east of the Training School site and fronting on University Avenue between Mill Street and Grand Avenue. We have been informed by Mr. Chance Hill, our Landscape Consultant, that for the site development of the Training School area we shall need fifty feet (more or less) off the west side of these tracts, contingent upon the position of related buildings:

#### Report of Discussions with the U.S. Department of Commerce

F1. Dean Rehn and Dr. Tudor have recently held discussions with Mr. Clyde Miller, Regional Manager of the U. S. Department of Commerce. As a result of these conferences it seems possible that federal support can be obtained for the partial subsidization of a research program and a supplementary training program aimed toward the improvement of business and industrial employment opportunities in this Southern Illinois' critical employment area. A University committee is in the process of preparing a proposal to be submitted to Mr. Miller. He has been invited to visit the campus during the week of October 3 to 6 to go over these plans with the intention of forwarding them to the U. S. Department of Commerce and to Mr. John R. Steelman.

It was generally agreed by the members of the Board that the University Administration be permitted to work with the Department of Commerce in order to secure federal support for the partial subsidization of a research program and a supplementary training program aimed toward the improvement of business and industrial employment opportunties in this critical southern Illinois employment area.

The joint meeting of the Boards of Trustees of the University of Illinois and Southern Illinois University was discussed. The letter was read from President Stoddard inviting the members of this Board to attend the University of Illinois' Board meeting on October 25. Dr. Morris read a letter from Mr. Janata, Assistant to the President, University of Illinois, in which he stated that if it were not possible for the members of our Board to attend the October meeting, the invitation would be renewed for the November meeting of the University of Illinois' Board of Trustees. It was generally agreed by the members of the Board that it would be impossible to attend the October 25 meeting. Dr. Brown made a motion that we accept the invitation of the President of the University of Illinois and the President of the Board of Trustees of that University to attend their November Board meeting. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis and unanimously passed with each member recording his vote as follows:

General Davis stated that he will get in touch with each member of the Board after he has been notified of the definite time of the University of Illinois' Board meeting. It was agreed by the members of the Board that they would hold a morning session and then join the University of Illinois' Board of Trustees for luncheon and the joint afternoon session.

Mr. Gladson made the suggestion that the officers of the two Alumni Associations should get together, stating that perhaps a working relationship and a common understanding between these two groups would be advantageous to both institutions. This met with the general approval of

the Board.

Mr. Wham, Chairman of the Board's Committee, reported on the architects' contract for the construction of self-liquidating dormitories. He stated that the Committee of the Board, after careful consideration, had revised the original contract. A copy of such revised contract was presented to each member of the Board. Mr. Gladson called attention to the fact that in the original contract it was stated that these plans could not be used for any other dormitory without the consent of the architect. He said the Committee believed this to be an unusual clause and it had been removed from the revised copies.

On a motion by Dr. Brown the following resolution was unanimously approved:

Resolved, That the revised contract with the architectural firm of Schaeffer, Hooton, and Wilson, as recommended by the contract committee appointed by the Board at the meeting on September 24, 1949, consisting of Mr. Wham, Chairman, Mr. Sturgis, and Mr. Gladson, be approved as submitted.

Mr. Wham's suggestion that the contract be signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board and sent to the architectural firm of Shaeffer, Hooton, and Wilson of Bloomington, Illinois, for their signatures was approved.

General Davis suggested that the day and time for future Board meetings be discussed. Several members of the Board felt that Saturday was a very bad day for the meetings. After some discussion it was generally agreed that future meetings of the Board be held on the fourth Monday of each month. It was decided, however, that the December meeting be held on December 19, 1949, because of the Christmas holidays.

Mr. Gladson made the suggestion that future meetings of the Board be scheduled for one o'clock. After some discussion it was agreed that the Board meetings be held at one o'clock in the afternoon unless the agenda for a meeting appears too crowded, in which instance a special morning

session will be called.

Mr. Chance S. Hill, Consulting Landscape Architect, was called into the meeting at this time. He presented to the members of the Board a complete history of the campus expansion plans since their inception in 1940. He displayed four maps to the Board showing the changes in the development of the plans, the last map being the latest revised plan which is under consideration at the present time.

Dr. Morris then called to the attention of the members of the Board a map of the Carbondale Quadrangle prepared by the Geological Survey Division of the Department of Registration and Education. He pointed out that the Crab Orchard area is divided into three main divisions. The first division, Crab Orchard Lake area, is divided into two sections; half of the area is for industrial use and the other half is a wild game and fowl area. Part of the industrial area, he said, is now used by Southern Illinois University.

that is, the old Orduance Plant administration offices. He stated that in the near future, fifteen staff houses will be available for public lease at a nominal fee of one dollar a year, and that he felt it would be advisable for the Uni-

versity to investigate the possibility of leasing these houses.

The second large division of the entire area is Little Grassy Lake, he continued, and in this area it is the Government's plan to permit only installations of certain specified values to be constructed. It will be used, he said, primarily for group camps. It was Dr. Morris' thought that in this group camp area, the University could establish practice teaching courses whereby the directors of the camps could advantageously employ the ability and experience of trained faculty and students, and the students at the same time could be receiving actual experience in camp management and activities.

In his discussion of the third area, Devil's Kitchen Lake, Dr. Morris pointed out that this area is to be leased to individuals at a nominal fee.

Dr. Morris stated that it was his belief that the University officials should investigate this whole area with the idea of developing recreational facilities. Several members of the Board thought that the area near Little Grassy Lake, which could feasibly be joined with Giant City State Park, should be considered. Dr. Morris was asked to continue with the investigation of this whole area.

Mr. Joseph F. Booton, Chief of Design, State Division of Architecture and Engineering, was called into the meeting. Mr. Booton discussed the general plan for new campus buildings, the present status of the building

program and the projected plans.

In answer to questions concerning the style of architecture to be used, he said that he hoped to keep a uniformity of design, yet keep the design flexible enough to permit the use of new styles and new approaches if they appear desirable. The members of the Board were interested to know if it would be possible to use local stone in the construction of the buildings. Mr. Booton suggested that a committee of the Board and interested Southern Illinois quarry managers meet with the group from the State Geological Survey to discuss all the aspects of this question. No official action was taken on this matter.

In his discussion of the additions to the Training School Building, Mr. Booton stated that the contract ceiling includes both the building and the furnishings. He said it was necessary, however, to appropriate \$390,000 for the site development. This brought up the question of the landscape architect's fee. Because of the fact that the State, according to the legislative appropriation bill, is not allowed to pay over  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$  of a specified contract for architectural fees, and due to the fact that a landscape architect's usual fee is 10%, it is necessary to have two contracts with Mr. Chance S. Hill which are divided into: (1) Plans and specifications, (2) Services and supervision.

Mr. Booton then discussed the new Life Science building, saying that the estimated total construction cost would be approximately \$1,000,000 and furnishings and equipment approximately \$147,000. He stated that the site development for this building is estimated to cost approximately \$30,000. The new Library building, he said, at an estimated cost of \$1,652,000, will have a site development cost of approximately \$80,000. He stated that the Library, as planned for the present, will serve approximately 4500 students.

Dr. Morris made the suggestion that we have a scale model of the present and proposed campus constructed. It was agreeable with the members of the Board that Dr. Morris investigate the possibility of having such a

model constructed securing estimated costs of the same.

The proposed new dormitories were the next item under discussion. It was the general feeling of the members of the Board that at this time we should forego the men's dormitory. The solution of this problem will be to add a wing to Anthony Hall and convert it into a men's dormitory, which would then accommodate 130 individuals. The new women's dormitory will be constructed as planned and will provide facilities for 443 women. This met with the general approval of the Board.

In the absence of the Chairman, General Robert W. Davis, Dr. Leo J. Brown, Secretary, called the meeting to order and asked Mr. John Page Wham to preside.

Mr. Wham stated that at the last meeting of the Board, held on November 29, 1949, General Davis had presented the following letter and request

theretofore received by him:

#### "CARBONDALE ILLINOIS, NOVEMBER 1, 1949

"To The Members of The Board of Trustees of The University of Southern Illinois, Carbondale

#### "Attention of General Robert W. Davis, Chairman

"On Wednesday, October 12, 1949, we were informed by Dr. Delyte W. Morris, President, that the University of Southern Illinois was planning to trade or exchange certain properties, formerly owned by us and hereinafter legally described, to an individual for private use.

"We feel that since we were forced to sell our respective properties to the State of Illinois through condemnation proceedings for school or University purposes, and since these properties have served their purpose and are of no further use to the University, that we the owners prior to the State's acquisistion, (sic) should have the privilege to reacquire the within described properties from the State of Illinois for such consideration as the State may demand.

"We, are prepared to live up to any restrictions or conditions placed

on the property by the University.

"At a time convenient to you, we, the undersigned, would be pleased to present our request personally.

Mr. Wham then stated that the Board had called this meeting in consequence of the foregoing request and for the purpose of affording Mrs. Throgmorton, Mr. Chaney, Mr. Crawshaw, Mr. Biggs, and Mr. Bryant, an opportunity to appear and be heard concerning the subject matter thereof; and, further, that on November 30, 1949, each of said parties had been so notified by letter as follows:

"In compliance with your consolidated formal request of November 1, 1949, with reference to certain property on South Illinois Avenue, formerly owned by you, this is to advise that a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has been called for Saturday, December 10, 1949 at 1:00 p.m. in the Bradley Residence, 1008 South Thompson Street. At this time, we shall be pleased to have you appear before the Board and present your request personally.

"You are welcome and invited to appear and present any facts or arguments you desire on matters pertaining to the property which is now property of the State of Illinois but which was purchased from you. If you desire, you are invited to bring counsel, witnesses, or friends to

assist you in presenting your case.

"The members of the Board feel that it is urgent that you attend this meeting and ask that you be at the Bradley Residence promptly at 1:00 p.m.

Mr. Wham stated that the Board was now ready to proceed with the hearing and wished to afford the counsel for said visiting parties the opportunity to be heard.

The first speaker was Mr. C. E. Feirich representing Mrs. Ruth Throgmorton, widow of Earl Throgmorton. Mr. Feirich said that he appreciated the opportunity to be heard. He stated that Mr. Throgmorton, former owner of Tract Number 102 situated in Outlot Number 128 in the City of Carbondale, Illinois, now owned by the University, had declined to sell the property when asked to do so by the University officials. He was very desirous of keeping this land. The State, however, was persistent and a complaint was

filed involving this property. When Mr. Throgmorton realized that the State could condemn this property for use of the State of Illinois for public purposes, and it was stated that these tracts were necessary for the expansion of Southern Illinois University, he agreed to sell. Mr. Feirich stated that the question now was whether the State should trade this property as part purchase price for other real estate as proposed. He argued that the State of Illinois has no right to condemn property unless it can show need for that property and further stated that if the University no longer needs this property, Mrs. Throgmorton feels that she should have the opportunity to repurchase the lot originally sold to the University under compulsion.

Mr. Gladson asked Mr. Feirich if, in his estimation, it would require an Act of the Legislature to convey property owned by the State of Illinois to a private individual.

Mr. Feirich said he was of the opinion that it would require an Act of the Legislature to convey such property. Mr. Wham asked Mr. Feirich if there was any distinction between the power to sell and the power to trade. Mr. Feirich stated that he could not quote any law but that he was of the opinion that there was no distinction.

Mr. Wham then asked the question that assuming we have the right to sell, what agency would receive the monies involved? Would it go into the State of Illinois treasury or into University funds? Mr. Feirich again stated that he had no definite information on this question but that it was his opinion that the monies would go directly into the treasury of the State of Illinois.

Mr. Feirich concluded with the statement, "that if the State and the University officials feel that the property under consideration has value to the University and is to be retained, then we, my client and I, have nothing to say. If, to the contrary, this property is to be sold or traded then my client, Mrs. Throgmorton, should have the opportunity to repurchase it."

Mr. Wham then asked whether there were others who would like to be heard.

Attorney S. S. Du Hamel requested that he be allowed to make a statement for his clients, Mr. Martin Chaney, Mr. Gene Paul Crawshaw, Mr. Lester Biggs, and Mr. T. L. Bryant, formers owners of Tract Numbers 100. 101, and 99, which are now owned by the University. Mr. Du Hamel asked the present status of the land situation. Mr. Wham said that no action had been taken since the Board received the appeal for hearing. He reiterated the fact that this was still an open question, that no final decision had been made, and that it was the general opinion of the members of the Board that no action should be taken taken until after this hearing.

Mr. Du Hamel stated that his clients, citizens of this community, wanted to go along with the University, saying they had sold their property only after it became apparent that the State would institute condemnation suits if they did not. He stated that his clients should have the opportunity to repurchase if the land is not to be used by the State.

Mr. Lyerla then asked whether there would be any complaint with respect to the proposed purchase of the Dowdell property, provided it did not involve any sale or trade of the lots under discussion. Attorney Feirich and Attorney Du Hamel each stated that there would be no complaint if the transaction did not involve a trade or sale of the lots formerly owned by their respective clients.

President Morris gave a short resume of the proposed agreement between the University and John S. Lewis, owner of the portion of the Dowdell tract which it is proposed be exchanged for the four lots on Illinois Avenue and \$65,000 in cash. He emphasized the fact that this agreement contained a clause which stated that any buildings constructed on the lots in question must meet with the approval of the authorities of Southern Illinois University. Dr. Morris then read the agreement which is Appendix H in the report "Land Acquisition Program, Southern Illinois University" dated December 1, 1949.

At the chairman's request, Dr. Morris read an affidavit furnished by John S. Lewis which is as follows:

"December 5, 1949

#### "TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

"I hereby certify that I was the original purchaser of the tract described below, which is the approximately 70 acre tract known as the Dowdell farm, and that continuously since date of purchase on July 16, 1946, from the Dowdell heirs, I have been and always have been sole owner of this tract and all parts thereof except as specified in agreement with Dan W. Hunsaker, contractor, copy of which is appended hereto, and except for a tract sold outright to Leo J. Brown and Mary B. Brown in 1948, which is described in detail in paragraph 3 of the description below:

#### "Description:

"Thirty acres of the North part of that part lying East of the Illinois Central Railroad Right of Way of the East part of the Northeast Quarter of Section 28, in Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the 3rd P.M., more particularly described as follows: Commencing at the Northwest corner of one (1) acre Lot now owned and occupied by G. W. Ensminger as his residence and running thence West along the North line of said Section 28 to the Right of way of the Illinois Central Railroad thence South along the east boundary line of said Right of Way to the South boundary line of the 30 acre tract of land that the present residence of Sam T. Brush is situated on, thence East to the East line of said Section 28, thence North along said East line of said Section 28 to the Southeast corner of the Alex A. Batson, tract of land in the Northeast corner of said Section 28, thence West to the Southwest corner of the Said G. W. Ensminger One Acre Lot, thence North along the West line of said Ensminger Lot to the place of beginning said tract of land containing 30 acres and including buildings formerly occupied by the Dowdell heirs as a home.

"Beginning at a point on the South line of the 30 acre tract conveyed by Sam T. Brush to N. H. Dowdell as recorded in the Recorder's office of Jackson County, Illinois, one hundred feet West of the West side of the Public Road running thence West along said South line of said tract to the East Right of Way line of the Illinois Central Railroad Company, thence Southeasterly along said Right of way line to a point seven feet South of First mentioned course thence East and parallel to first mentioned course to a point one hundred feet West of the West side of before mentioned public road, thence North seven feet to the point of beginning, the South boundary line of said above described tract being about nine inches North of present existing fence.

"A tract of land containing 40 acres out of the Southwest corner of that part of the Northeast Quarter of Section 28-9-1 West of the 3rd Principal Meridian which lies East of the Illinois Central Railroad and more particularly described as follows: Beginning on the East line of the Right of Way of the Illinois Central Railroad at the Southwest corner of a 30 acre tract of land formerly conveyed by Sam T. Brush to N. D. Dowdell running thence East on the South line of said 30 acre tract 1143.4 feet to a point 287 feet West of the West line of Public Road, thence South and parallel to said Public Road 1681 feet more or less to the South line of the said Northeast Quarter of Section 28-9-1, Thence West along said South line 941.4 feet to the East line of the Right of Way of the Illinois Central Railroad; thence Northerly along said East Right of Way line 1681 feet to point of beginning, except 400 feet parallel in width off the south side thereof deeded to Leo J. Brown and Mary B. Brown.

Chairman Wham then asked whether anyone possessed information contrary to or inconsistent with the foregoing affidavit, and each party present, directly or through counsel, replied in the negative.

Attorneys Feirich and Du Hamel were then asked whether they had

anything further to add and each replied he did not.

Mr. Du Hamel then inquired as to whether he might be furnished with a copy of the proposed land purchase and trade agreement with John S. Lewis, and was informed by the Chairman that he was welcome to inspect the instrument and, if he found actual need for a copy, the request would be further considered.

Mr. Wham then said that the Board would appreciate having the opinion of anyone present concerning the value of the Dowdell property. He stated the option price was \$95,000 and since some of the individuals present were constantly dealing in real estate, that the members of the Board would like

to know whether they considered this to be a fair price.

Mr. T. L. Bryant made the statement that the price seemed somewhat high to him since he knows the original cost and selling price; however, he stated that it was very difficult to appraise such property because of many factors, the most outstanding being its close proximity to Southern Illinois University. He said he was not in a position to make any definite statements but that to him, it seemed like a good deal of money.

Mr. Lester Biggs stated that he saw no reason why the petitioners should be asked to estimate the price of property that has no relation to that in question. He stated that he bought farm land and could appraise farm land but that such land was not adjacent to Southern Illinois University, and therefore he felt he was not qualified to make a statement concern-

ing the value of the Dowdell property.

Mr. Wham thanked the visitors and their respective counsel for the interest shown by them and emphasized that the Board is, of course, desirous of operating within its legal authority; is interested only in properly serving the best interests of the University and the taxpayers; and will earnestly endeavor to deal fairly with all parties concerned.

The Chairman stated that following the adjournment of this meeting. the Board would meet in executive session and that the interested parties

would be notified of any action taken.

Meeting adjourned.

#### MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT MORRIS

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

Plans and Specifications for Training School Additions, Power Plant Additions. Library Tunnels, and Life Science Building, and Contracts for Service Shops Building

- A. We respectfully request consideration and approval, at the December 19, 1949, meeting of the Board, of the following matters:
  - 1. Preparation of Plans and Specifications

At the September 24, 1949, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board approved the appointment of the firm of Holabird, Root, and Burgee as associate architects for the preparation of plans and specifications for two additions to the new Training School; namely, the Industrial Arts Shop and the Swimming Pool. We now recommend that this firm be approved to prepare plans and specifications for the following additions to the Training School building:

Cafeteria

Covered Passage

The covered passage is really functionally a part of the Industrial

Arts Shop.

The Board also approved at the September 24, 1949, meeting the appointment of the associate architects Consoer, Townsend, and Associates, who were also the architects who designed the new Power Plant. to prepare plans and specifications for the additions to this plant. Inasmuch as the additions involve the construction of tunnels to serve both the new Library and the new Life Science building, and inasmuch as the financial planning allocates the construction costs as well as the cost of architects' fees to these buildings, we recommend that Consoer, Townsend, and Associates be appointed to prepare the plans and specifications for the tunnels to serve both of these buildings; namely, the Library building and the Life Science building.

We also recommend approval of the following contracts for the preparation of plans and specifications:

It was the consensus of the members of the Board that plans, specifica-

tions, and contracts listed above be approved.\*

Dr. Morris discussed the preparation of plans and specifications for the two additions to the new Training School, namely: The Industrial Arts Shop and the Swimming Pool. He stated that two plans had been submitted by the architects. The first plan, calling for an expenditure of \$285,000.00, which is \$11,000.00 less than the appropriation of \$296,000.00, is impractical he asserted. However, he continued, the second plan as submitted, is completely out of line with the appropriation since it calls for an expenditure of \$600,000.00. He stated that a committee of the Faculty are now working on a compromise between the two plans, and have had conferences with representatives from the architectural firm of Holabird, Root, and Burgee.

Dr. Morris recommended that the allocation for the Site Development Program of the Training School Building be substantially reduced and that the amount thus deducted from that program be added to the construction

costs of the two additions.

He further recommended that the architects plan the Industrial Arts Shop and Swimming Pool in terms of desirable minimums. These recom-

mendations met with the approval of the Board.

The next item which President Morris discussed was the matter of the Landscape Architect's fees. He said that Mr. Chance Hill, the landscape architect for the University, claims that the University is indebted to him in the amount of \$6,098.00, basing his claim on the fact that he was paid on the preconstruction estimates and not on the actual construction costs of the landscaping and site development program. Dr. Morris presented to each member of the Board a statement from Mr. Hill in which he indicates the relationship of planning fees earned in 1946 and 1947 to the amount paid on the same under his contract in 1945. According to the statement of Mr. Hill, he was paid 5% of \$268,935.00, which was the post war planning estimate on which the 1945 contract fees were based. It is his contention that he should have received fees amounting to 5% of the 1946-47 construction costs of \$390,901.00.

Dr. Morris said that he and Mr. Miles were of the opinion that the University was not now obligated to Mr. Hill in this amount and that the only way he could receive payment would be to take his case to the Court of Claims. He said if it met with the approval of the Board, he would ask Mr. Miles to go to Springfield and get data on all payments made to Mr. Chance Hill both from the University and from the State Division of Architecture and Engineering. It was agreed by the members of the Board that Mr. Miles should get all the information and facts concerning this matter from the Springfield office and that specific recommendations be made to the Poard after all facts are assembled.

The above information led to a discussion of the feasibility of the employment of architects on the University Faculty. It was generally felt that such a procedure would be advantageous in three ways:

1. The architects could make all plans and specifications for University buildings and grounds.

2. They could teach academic classes.

3. They could act in an advisory capacity to individuals in our area who are planning to build homes.

No action was taken on this matter.

#### Changes in Faculty-Administrative Pay Roll

Dr. Carl Nelson Reilly has been appointed Associate Professor of Physiology, University Physician, and Director of the Health Service. at a monthly salary of \$600.00, effective December 5, 1949. Dr. Reilly received his Bachelor of Science in Medicine and his Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of Illinois. He served his

internship at the Cook County Hospital in Chicago, and worked for two years in the U. S. Public Health Service. He has been a practicing physician in Marion, Illinois, for the past two years. His military service included two years in the U. S. Army with the rank of First Lieutenant. A statement of his qualifications has been mailed to the members of the Board.

2. Temporary Appointments

The following temporary appointments and reappointments have been made to fill vacancies or to meet the needs of some departments for additional services:

a. Mr. George R. Arnold was appointed half-time Faculty Assistant in Physics at a monthly salary of \$110.00, effective for the period extending from December 7, 1949, through June 9, 1950. Mr. Arnold received his Bachelor's degree from Southern and his

Master's degree from the University of Illinois.

b. Miss Alice Aleen Brennan was appointed Faculty Assistant assigned to the Dean of Men's Office at a monthly salary of \$250.00, effective December 12, 1949, through June 9, 1950. Miss Brennan received her Bachelor of Science in Education degree from Southern, and has been a teacher in the elementary schools of Peoria, Illinois, for the last two years. She has had previous experience as a student assistant in the Dean of Women's Office while attending Southern.

c. Mr. George R. Carter was appointed half-time Faculty Assistant in Physics at a monthly salary of \$110.00, effective for the period extending from December 7, 1949, through June 9, 1950. Mr. Carter received his Bachelor's degree from the University of

Illinois.

d. Miss D. Maxine Clements was appointed Faculty Assistant assigned to the Office of the Dean of the College of Vocations and Professions at a monthly salary of \$250.00, effective for the period from December 5, 1949, through June 9, 1950. Miss Clements received her Bachelor of Arts degree from DePauw University. She comes to us from a position in the Industrial Extension Division of Texas A. & M. College.

e. Mr. Robert L. East was appointed half-time Faculty Assistant in Government at a monthly salary of \$110.00, effective for the period from December 5, 1949, through June 9, 1950. Mr. East has his Bachelor's degree from Southern and has studied at the University

#### Establishment of Independent Extension and Placement Services

C. For sometime we have been operating a combined office of Extension, Adult Education, and Placements with Mr. Raymond H. Dey as the Director.

We now desire to divide these services, naming Mr. Dey as Director of Extension and Adult Education and Mr. Roye R. Bryant as Director of the Placement Service. Mr. Bryant is at present Field Representative for the University and in that capacity has been making numerous contacts with public school administrators, business men, and other citizens of the area. No changes in pay roll title or salary are involved in these assignments.

The designation of separate directors for the Placement Service and for Extension and Adult Education will enable us to organize a thorough follow-up program for all beginning teachers and graduates who go into other fields, to extend invitations to various business firms to interview our graduates, to develop our graduate extension program as a service to the teachers of Southern Illinois, and to arrange campus conferences and workshops requested by various Southern Illinois groups.

For many years our Placement Service has been devoted largely to placing teachers. We now need to make provisions for placing not only our graduates from the College of Education but also our graduates from the College of Vocations and Professions and to some extent the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. This entails numerous contacts with both public schools and the businesses and industries in the area. It implies a more intensive follow-up of our graduates and a more extensive view of the job opportunities available to them. Some of our graduates, particularly from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, are interested in obtaining part-time positions in graduate and professional schools while they pursue advanced studies. The Placement Service should assist the academic departments in locating our graduates in such positions. All in all, the separation of the two offices should make for better programs both in extension and adult education and in the placement of our graduates in teaching, industry, and the professions.

We therefore respectfully request approval of the establishment of separate offices of Placements (with Mr. Roye R. Bryant as director) and Extension and Adult Education (with Mr. Raymond H. Dey as director), effective January 1, 1950.

### Designation of Surveying Officer for Disposal of Unserviceable State Property.

F. Hitherto Orders to Dispose of Unserviceable State Property have been signed by two members of our Executive Committee as Surveying Officers, namley, General Davis and Mr. Sturgis. The time required for handling such orders could be considerably shortened if some University official were designated to process them. We believe that the Surveying Officer should at least see the property to be surveyed before signing the order, and it is not practical or economical for members of our Executive Committee to make an inspection of such items as typewriters to be traded in, scrap iron to be sold, furniture to be discarded, and so forth.

We respectfully request authorization, therefore, to designate Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr., our Business Manager, as Surveying Officer for the purpose of making surveys and signing Orders to Dispose of Unserviceable State Property.

At the suggestion of Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager, Southern Illinois University, the members of the Board took no action on the matter of designating a Surveying Officer for the disposal of unserviceable State property. Mr. Miles stated that effective January 1, 1950, there is a "Property Control Act," which will have some bearing on the disposal of such property. This matter will be taken up at a later meeting of the Board.

#### Reports on the Financial Status of the University

G. On December 12 we mailed to the members of the Board a report from the Business Manager for the period July 1, 1949, to November 30, 1949. We are anxious to provide the type of reports on the financial condition of the University which are most useful to the members of the Board at such time intervals as they may prefer. We respectfully request suggestions on this matter.

There was some discussion among the members of the Board as to whether they would like to have monthly or quarterly reports on the financial status of the University. It was agreed by the members present that a quarterly report would adequately supply them with the information they wished to receive.

#### A Resolution on the Renting of Real Property

H. In accordance with a recent ruling by the Attorney General, we respectfully request the Board to adopt a resolution concerning the rental of real property as follows:

"WHEREAS, It becomes necessary from time to time for the University to rent property, and

"WHEREAS, the available space at the University is not sufficient to

provide for classroom, offices, and residence space,

"THEREFORE, Be it resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the President of Southern Illinois University be authorized to rent from time to time as necessity warrants such properties as in his opinion will help to satisfy the requirements of the administrative, edcuational, and auxiliary operations of the University."

Recently a lease for the property of Miss Mary Moss, 821 South University Avenue, was sent to Director George W. Mitchell of the Department of Finance for approval by his Department. Mr. Mitchell referred it to Attorney General Ivan A. Elliott and received the following in reply under date of December 2, a copy of which he then forwarded to us. It is on the basis of this ruling by the Attorney General that we are requesting the adoption of the above resolution:

"I have your communication of recent date which reads as fol-

lows:

'I am sending you herewith a lease executed by Southern Illinois University, Lessee, for your examination and opinion.

'The questions you are requested to answer are:

- '1. Does the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University have authority to execute such a lease (Ill. Rev. Stat., 1949. Chap. 122, Par. 435.1 et. seq.) or must such leases be executed by the Department of Finance? (Chap. 127, Par. 36(12,13)
- '2. Must a lease executed by a Board of Trustees, as an official body, be authorized by resolution, and must the party who executes it do so under the seal of the University?
- '3. Are there any other features of this lease which cannot be approved?

'Thanking you for your usual courtesies in connection with such requests, I am'

"In reply to your first question your attention is directed to Paragraph 435.7. Chapter 122, Illinois Revised Statutes, 1949, which reads as follows:

'435.7. Contracts, suits, conveyances and expending funds, powers as to.) § 7. The Board shall have power to enter into contracts, to sue and be sued, to acquire, hold and convey real and personal property, and to expend the funds appropriated to the University; provided that the Board in the exercise of the powers conferred by this Act shall not create any liability or indebtedness in excess of the funds appropriated to the University.' (Emphasis supplied)

"You will note that specific statutory authority is given the "Board" to contract. Bouvier's Law Dictionary, 8th Edition, Volume

2 at page 1887, defines a lease as follows:

'a species of contract for the possession and profits of lands and tenements either for life or for a certain period of time or during the pleasure of the parties.'

"In Pope's Legal Definitions, Volume 2 at page 867, we find the

following definition:

'a "lease" is a contract for the possession and profits of land and tenements on the one side and a recompense of rent or other income on the other.'

"It is my opinion that the power to contract given to the Board by the above quoted statute includes the power to execute a lease, and therefore, specifically answering your first question, it is my opinion that the Trustees of the Southern Illinois University have authority to execute a lease such as the lease under consideration.

"Since your second question presents two different problems for consideration, I shall answer them separately as two questions.

"First, I am of the opinion that the Board by resolution should authorize any lease entered into. There are many Illinois cases holding corporations bound by agreements made by the President and Secretary of the corporation, even though the particular officials had no expressed or apparent authority to so bind the corporation. These cases, however, always turn on some additional act or omission amounting to a ratification by the corporation. The general rule to be followed seems to be well stated in *Koch v. National Union Bldg. Ass'n.*, 35 Ill. App. 465, affirmed at 137 Ill. 497. In this case the Court lays down the following rule.

'The president of a corporation has not, as a matter of law, and merely by reason of his holding said office, power or authority to execute deeds, mortagages or leases of the real estate of

the corporation. Hoyt v. Thompson, 19 N. Y. 207.

"'The implied powers of the president of a corporation depend upon the nature of the company's business, and the measure of authority delegated to him by the board of directors. It seems that a president has no greater powers by virtue of his office merely, than any other director of the company, except that he is the presiding officer at the meeting of the board."

'The business affairs of corporations are controlled exculsively by their boards of directors, and such a board may undoubtedly invest the president with authority to bind the corporation by deed or lease, either by express resolution or by an acquiescence in his assumption of authority in that respect, which would justify persons who dealt with him in the inference that he had such authority in fact.'

"Also in connection with this question, I call your attention to Paragraph 435.5, Chapter 122, Illinois Revised Statutes, 1949, which reads as follows:

'Members of the Board shall elect annually by secret ballot from their own number a chairman who shall preside over meetings of the Board, and a secretary.

'Meetings of the Board shall be held at least once each quarter on the campus of Southern Illinois University. At all regular meetings of the Board, a majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

'Special meetings of the Board may be called by the chairman

of the Board or by any three members of the Board.

"You will note that this section requires the Board to meet at least once each quarter, and also provides for the calling of special meetings. It would appear that the provision for frequent meetings and election of a chairman, and for the requirements as to a quorum indicate the intention of the Legislature for the Board to act of record on all matters of importance.

"In view of the above, it is my opinion that the person or persons executing an agreement such as the subject lease should do so by authority of a proper resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees.

"As to the second part of your second question, this is to advise that in N. E. Fire & M. Ins. Co. v. Schettler, 38 Ill, 166 at 171, our Supreme Court stated in part as follows:

'The notion that a corporation can only act under their corporate seal, and by their president and secretary, has become

"A reading of the Act providing for management, operation, and control of the Southern Illinois University, indicates that the Legislature intended to establish a corporate entity or a public corporation for the purpose of serving a governmental function. I find no law that makes a distinction concerning the necessity of the use of a seal by a private corporation or a public corporation. Neither do I find any provision in the pertinent statutes dealing specifically with the necessity of the use of a seal by the instant public corporation.

"I, therefore, advise you that the rule as cited in the case immediately above would seem to control and that a seal need not be affixed to any such lease. I might add however, that the Trustees may, if they see fit, adopt the seal of the University or any other seal for the purpose of having it affixed to such documents. They may also designate the person or persons authorized to affix any seal so adopted.

"In reply to your third question, I find the following additional

objections to the subject lease.

"1. Paragraph No. 2 of the Lessee's covenants and agreements

in the lease reads as follows:

The Lessee will use and occupy said premises for the use of Southern Illinois University, or any other State department, board, commission or agency and for no other purpose and will replace at its own expense any glass or fixtures damaged or broken by the Lessee, its agents or employees during the occupancy by the Lessee of said premises.' (Emphasis supplied)

"I fail to find any legal authority for the Board to lease premises for the occupancy of a State department, board, commission or agency. The provision for leasing for the benefit of any use other than their own would seem to be of no force or effect, and should be

deleted from the lease.

"2. Paragraph No. 3 of the Lessor's covenants and agreements reads as follows:

At the expiration of said lease the Lessor may renew the lease for a further period of twelve (12) months upon the same terms and conditions, provided said Lessee shall give thirty (30) days' notice in writing to said Lessor of its intention to take said twelve (12) months' renewal of said lease.' (Emphasis supplied)

"The word 'Lessor' appearing in the second line appears to be a typographical error and the word 'Lessee' should be substituted.
"3. You will also note that Paragraph No. 3 of the Lessor's

covenants and agreements, set out above, provide for a 12-month extension of the subject lease. When this provision is read together with the earlier part of the lease setting out the period of time covered by the basic lease it is seen that the 12-month period referred to in Paragraph No. 3 is from September 1, 1950 to August 30, 1951. Paragraph 145, Chapter 127, Illinois Revised Statutes,

1949, reads in part as follows:

"(2) No disbursements from appropriations shall be made for rental of office or other space, buildings, or land, except in pursuance of a written lease entered into by the proper State authority and the owner or authorized agent of the property. Such lease shall in no event extend beyond June 30th of the second year following the adjournment of the General Assembly making such appropriation except that the lease may contain a renewal clause subject to acceptance by the State after that date. A copy of such lease or leases shall be filed in the office of the Secretary of State within thirty days after execution."

"June 30, 1951, would be the June 30th of the second year following the adjournment of the General Assembly making the appropriation for this particular lease, and it can readily be seen that August 30, 1951, would extend the term of the lease to two months beyond

the time for which this lease could bind the State.

"In view of the above statute it is clear that the State cannot be bound to pay rent under the subject lease beyond June 30, 1951, and that the option for renewal as related to the period from July 1, 1951, to August 30, 1951, would be in violation of Paragraph 145, supra."

On a motion by Mr. Lyerla, seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis, the following resolution was unanimously approved:

"WHEREAS, It becomes necessary from time to time for the University to rent property, and

"WHEREAS, The available space at the University is not sufficient to

provide for classroom, offices, and residence space,

Dr. Morris brought up the question of releases to the Press. After some discussion, it was agreed that no specific information be given to the Press in advance of meetings of the Board, and that at the close of each meeting, the Chairman and the Administrative Assistant to the Board release such information as they deem desirable to the Director of the Information Serv-

ice of the University.\*

# PROCEEDINGS AND MINUTES

Of a called meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University which convened on Saturday, February 4, 1950, at 5:00 p.m. in the Board's Offices, 1301

South Thompson Street, Carbondale, Illinois

The following members of the Executive Committee were present:

In the absence of the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Leo J. Brown, Secretary, called the meeting to order and asked Mr. O. W. Lyerla, Chairman of the Executive Committee, to preside. Mr. Lyerla stated that this meeting was called to discuss the fire which destroyed a former residence at 305 West Harwood Avenue on the morning of February 1, 1950, which was being used to house the offices of the Dean of Men, Dean of Women, and Housing Service; and to consider possible preventative measures which might be taken to prevent such an occurrence in the future. Mr. Lyerla asked Dr. Morris if he would make some statements concerning the fire and ask other individuals present for statements.

Dr. Morris said that a thorough investigation had been made and that the actual cause of the fire was still unknown. He then called into the meeting the staff members of the offices who were the occupants of the residence.

He asked them for any statements which they would like to make.

Miss Shuman, Dean of Women, said the irregularity of the heat in the building had presented a problem. That is, one or two rooms would be exceedingly hot, while at the same time other portions of the house would be very cold. Mrs. Pulliam, Director of Housing Service, said that she had noticed an excess of fumes in the house and that the day before the fire she had smelled smoke as of burning wood and had reported this to Mr. Rudolph Weber, head electrician. Mr. Weber then checked the basement and the house but found no evidence of smoke or faulty wiring. Mr. Howe, Director of the Physical Plant, stated that the house had been wired with Romax wiring and that there were eleven different circuits in the house, and, therefore, there could not have been an overload on any one circuit.

Dr. Morris stated that the thermostat which was taken from the charred building was set at 85 degrees. He asked who regulated the thermostats? It was discovered that anyone and everyone in the building adjusted the

thermostats.

Mr. Davis, Dean of Men, stated that smoking was permitted in the building, but that sufficient ash trays were provided and that the janitors had been very efficient in emptying all ash trays and wastebaskets at the close of each day. Dr. Morris stated that if there were no further statements from any member of the group that they could be excused at this time.

The employees of the University who were in any way connected with the maintenance and security of the former residence were then called into the meeting. Mr. Freeman, Fireman, stated that he had fired the furnace of the building in question on Tuesday evening, January 31, at 7:15 p.m., and at that time all furnace conditions seemed normal. Dr. Morris asked Mr. Freeman if he also checked the thermostat. Mr. Howe stated that the firemen do not check the thermostats in any of the buildings. Mr. Holder, Night Watchman, stated that he had made his usual rounds and had checked the house at 11:45 p.m. on Tuesday, January 31, and that there were no signs of fire. However, he said that the method now used for checking the outlying residence-offices is simply to walk by the building which, he felt, is a superficial check. He stated that when he was making his next round at 2:00 a.m. he noticed smoke coming out at the base of the front door. He immediately opened the door and there was a terrific blast of smoke and fire. The Carbondale Fire Department was called, but the fire was too far advanced to save the building or any of its contents.

Mr. Ray Barney, Deputy State Fire Marshal, stated that from his own investigation and from the information which he had received he was of

the opinion that the fire may have started from a defective flue.

Dr. Morris asked Mr. Sitter, Plant Maintenance Engineer, if he would make a statement concerning the training of the University firemen. Mr. Sitter said that the firemen had received information on the firing of the various types of furnaces in the 27 outlying residences now being used for offices. Dr. Morris stated that he felt we should have a training course for firemen.

After further discussion with the employees the following precautionary measures were tentatively agreed upon:

- 1. In each outlying building one person should be responsible for the adjustment of thermostats.
- 2. The setting-up of a training course for all University firemen.
- 3. The possibility of the establishment of a new pattern for the watchmen whereby they would open doors and make an internal check of each outlying building just as they do now on all campus buildings.

4. The establishment of a smoking policy in the outlying residences.

The meeting adjourned at 7:30 p.m.

# PROCEEDINGS AND MINUTES

Of the meeting of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University which convened at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, February 13, 1950, in the offices of the Board, 1301 South Thompson Street, Carbondale, Illinois

In the absence of General Robert W. Davis, Chairman, Dr. Leo J. Brown, Secretary to the Board, presided at the meeting. Dr. Brown dispensed with the reading of the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on December 19, 1949, and the minutes of the special meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board held on February 4, 1950. He said these matters would be taken up later in the day.

He asked Dr. Morris to present the guests. Dr. Morris introduced Dr. Gerhard Hartman, Superintendent, University of Iowa Hospitals; Dr. W. Gordon Hartnett, Superintendent, Marion Veterans' Hospital; Dr. Carl N. Reilly, Director, University Health Service; Dr. Percival Bailey, Neurosurgeon, University of Illinois Medical School, and prominent alumnus of Southern Illinois University; and Dr. W. J. Tudor, Associate Professor of

Sociology, Southern Illinois University.

Dr. Morris then stated that the report on nursing education and preclinical medical training, entitled, "Report of a Study of Education and Hospital Needs of the Southern Illinois Area—as Related to the Development of Southern Illinois University," prepared by Dr. Hartman and his associate, Mr. Glen E. Clasen, would be reviewed. He acquainted the members of the Board with the origin of the *Hartman Report*, saying that when he came to Southern Illinois University as President there were two major problems placed before him: (1) A building program, and (2) the demand for nursing education. He further stated that pressure from organized medicine, nurses, and laymen from the area had been brought to bear stressing the critical need for nurses and that after meeting with representatives from those groups, Dr. Hartman was engaged, through the Teachers' College Board, to make a survey. The survey was to embrace the

Southern Illinois area: the 31 southernmost counties. This survey, he stated, not only showed the critical lack of nurses but also indicated medical and health service needs of Southern Illinois. Dr. Morris presented Dr. Hartman, who in turn presented his report to the members of the Board.

Dr. Hartman said that he had experienced the fullest cooperation in making this report from Southern Illinois University, from the hospitals in the area, from Southern Illinois, Incorporated, and from the State Health Department.

He went on to say that certain premises had been developed upon which parts of the discussion had been based. These were:

- 1. Agreement that adequate hospital care should be available to all people, regardless of economic or social status, and that good health is a public asset basic to the happiness of the individual and necessary to the strength and prosperity of the area.
- 2. That the financing of hospital care should be sufficient to provide high quality care, which can only result from a combination of personnel services supplemented by physical facilities, which in turn can only be maintained if financial support is adequate.
- 3. That insofar as possible the cost of hospital service should be a direct responsibility of the residents of the area using the hospital.
- 4. That general tax funds should be used to purchase hospital care for the medically indigent.

The proposed hospital program, he continued, calls for a unit of four hundred (400) beds. These would fall into three categories:

- 1. Indigent patients, 60 per cent of beds
- 2. Cost patients, 25 per cent of beds
- 3. Private patients, 15 per cent of beds

The indigent patients, he stated, always put the heaviest burden on a community; therefore, it was felt that 60 per cent of the beds should be allotted to this group. There would be local autonomy and local control in all referrals, and the doctors in the area would determine those to be admitted.

"Cost" patients, he continued, would be admitted to the hospital only by referral by local physicians. These patients would pay hospital costs, but would not be financially able to pay medical fees.

Private patients, he said, comprising only 15 per cent of the beds, may be admitted by local doctors. The small number of beds allotted to this group would not put the hospital in competition with local hospitals in the area and it would show that the proposed hospital is a democratic one, admitting all three categories of patients.

He emphasized the fact that the establishment of an indigent service in the hospital made it necessary to provide a transportation system which would give equal opportunity for call to all individuals living in the area. This, Dr. Hartman stated, was a very important aspect of the proposal since statistics show that one out of every seven persons is hospitalized once a year.

Mr. Nickell asked if only the indigent patients, or the 60 per cent of the patients, were to be used as so-called "guinea pigs". Dr. Hartman stated that indigent, cost, and private patients would be equally available for medical study and review, and that the combined elements of care, education, and research would be stressed.

In considering the nursing education program, Dr. Hartman said that he had recommended a very cautious program at the beginning, and the expansion of the program as the relative needs of the region became evident. He gave the following proposed development:

- 1. A basic three year nurses program
- 2. Training of practical nurses
- 3. "Post Graduate" nursing education
- 4. A four year college program of nursing education leading to the Bachelor's Degree

As to immediate steps to be taken, Dr. Hartman suggested that the University offer pre-clinical nursing instruction to students in selected hospitals in the area. This immediate contribution to nursing education in the area should be followed by and be continuous with the development of the University's School of Nursing. It was Dr. Hartman's suggestion that we develop the three year basic nursing program and make it an integral part of the University's future educational program. The need for this program seems great, he said, and in addition it would be less expensive than the four year college program. This recommendation is conditioned, he said, on the establishment of the hospital.

In discussing the next phase of the program, the training of practical nurses. Dr. Hartman emphasized the fact that this type of training could be started immediately by working with the hospitals in the area that are equipped to undertake the training. The demand is great for practical

nurses, he asserted, and provision must be made for their training.

The third step, "Post Graduate" Nursing Education, is devised, he said, to give specialized training beyond the registered nurse level. He felt that the University could not train such specialists until the basic program had been completed, but at that time, it should expand its offering, as this type of nursing program would materially improve the quality of care received by patients in the hospitals in the area.

The final category, that of a four-year college program of nursing education leading to the bachelor's degree, is developed in the Report, he said,

as a program for the distant future.

Dr. Hartnett suggested that in the practical nursing program, it might be advisable to work out a plan whereby the University would take all prospective student nurses as a group when they begin their training, then as the training program progresses, the upper 10 per cent of the group would be eligible to further their studies with the idea of receiving the Bachelor of Science in Nursing Education Degree. The next 30 per cent would be eligible for the degree of Registered Nurse, and the remaining 60 per cent would be designated as practical nurses. He further stated that in the hospitals where nurses' training is now being offered, there is too much emphasis on nursing and too little on education. He suggested that the training should consist of more education and less work, and he further stated that the conditions in the Nurses' Training Schools are getting worse instead of better. He stressed the great need of nursing education in this area and asked if it would be feasible for Southern Illinois University to give nine months nurses' training now, and then send the students to hospitals in the area to get their practical training for a period of three months.

Dr. Hartman stated that if the University could give the nine months' training, and the students could receive their practical work in neighboring hospitals, practical nurses could be turned out, but that according to law,

no registered nurses could be graduated.

Dr. Hartman continued his brief review of the Report by discussing the recommendation that Southern Illinois University establish a two year medical school. He stated that the program, as recommended, is a very conservative one stressing courses in the basic sciences, and that in the beginning a conservative approach should be used and the University should move cautiously in expansion. He said that the program here should act as a "feeder" for the University of Illinois Medical School or for a National Pool, and that this idea should be discussed with the authorities at the University of Illinois. The four year schools, he said, are attempting to enlarge the depleted ranks of their junior classes by recruiting students who have completed the first two years at other schools.

He continued with the statement that Southern Illinois University is uniquely prepared to set up such a basic science school, as many of the facilities required in the way of faculty and equipment are already available and can be incorporated into the medical training program with ease. The proposed Southern Illinois Hospital will implement this program to the maximum, he asserted, and will provide all that is needed in the way of clinical facilities. He stated, however, that the establishment of the two-year Medical School is not for immediate concern but is something to be thought of for the future. Dr. Hartman stated that since the completion of

this Report, a bill has been passed by Congress authorizing twice as much federal money for the construction of community and base hospitals as was available when the Report was made.

Mr. Nickell asked if the two-year medical program was legal.

Dr. Hartman stated that it was legal, and he cited Dartmouth University as a University with an excellent two year program. In fact, he said, their students are sought after by the medical colleges.

He concluded that the proposed two-year Medical School at Southern Illinois University would not only help to ease the national problem of doctor shortage, but would aid materially in providing Southern Illinois with more doctors.

Dr. Hartman, in discussing pre-medical education, said that in his Report he had recommended a minimum requirement of three years pre-medical education, avoiding in this three year course subjects that are subsequently part of the medical school curriculum. After completion of this three year pre-medical course and after successful completion of the first year of the medical school, the student should be qualified, he said, for either a Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts Degree.

Dr. Hartman then proceeded with the review of his Report, calling attention to Allied Programs, Out-Patient Departments, Emergency Services, the Continuation Center, and an Integrated Service Program, all of which

should be an integral part of the Hospital Plan.

In speaking of the Continuation Center, Dr. Hartman recommended that a building be provided with adequate rooms to take care of various types of medical and allied professional meetings. In this way the University personnel would keep in contact with community, area, state, and national activities, and it would tend to encourage a continuous process of education among all professional personnel in the entire area. This over-all integrated program, he said, corresponds to the best thinking of the American Medical Association, the various nursing groups, and the professional educators.

Dr. Morris asked Dr. Hartman what recommendations he would give to the Board as the best method for procedure at the present time.

Dr. Hartman made the following tentative recommendations:

1. A revision and adjustment of the "State Hospital Plan", whereby Carbondale would be designated as a Base Hospital Area, with a proposed 400 bed hospital.

2. Employ a qualified Nurse Educator Supervisor to make the necessary contacts and set up the machinery leading to the establishment of

a practical nursing education program.

3. Publish a condensed version of the Survey Report and make it available to all interested individuals in the area. This would be a means for disseminating the information that the proposals made concerning the hospital, education of nurses, and allied personnel were to meet the needs of the area and were in no way the result of a desire for competition with local hospitals.

The Board recessed for luncheon.

Dr. Brown called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. He stated that the members of the Board would like to know the reaction of some of the guests present to the *Hartman Report*.

Dr. Hartnett stated that he felt Nursing Education was of primary importance and that the construction of the 400 bed hospital was a necessity in this area. He felt that the distribution of the 400 beds into the various categories was an excellent plan. He stated that the question outstanding in his mind was, if federal funds were used, to what degree the Board would be obligated.

Dr. Hartman stated that according to Public Law 725, the federal government can neither operate nor regulate the institution. He went on further to say that there were some stipulations to be met, but they had nothing to do with the operation or regulation of the institution. That is, the federal government insists on enforcement of competitive bidding, the use of union labor, and the reservation of the right to see that the institution is complying with basic legislation.

Dr. Brown then asked Dr. Reilly his reactions to the discussion.

Dr. Reilly stated that there is a serious shortage of practitioners in this are, especially of young men. He felt that it is not the money angle which is keeping the young men from establishing themselves in this community and in continuing as general practitioners, but that it is the idea that they cannot keep abreast of what is going on in the field of medicine and that it is difficut to keep themselves on a high level professionally, and to adhere to the best practices in any field, that is, the process of continuous education. He said the development of the program, as outlined in the *Hartman Report*, would tend to keep the young men and general practitioners in Southern Illinois, especially that part of the Report which emphasized the importance of the "Continuation Center".

Dr. Brown then asked Dr. Percival Bailey if he would like to make some remarks.

Dr. Bailey stated that he was appearing today as a representative of the Chicago Alumni Association of Southern Illinois University. He said that he was not here to discuss administration of a medical program, but was here to discuss medical education and its effect on Southern Illinois University. He stated that he was glad to hear that this plan was not contemplated for the immediate present and that he believed it would be a blunder to make the proposed program public at this time. He went on to say that the Alumni group, which he is representing, feels that the University is not consolidating programs that have already been started and that there are undergraduate departments that need facilitating and establishing before the University program launches out into other fields. He said he questioned if the University should even attempt development in the field of medicine. He questioned the responsibility of Southern Illinois University in setting up programs in Nurses' Training when such programs could be carried on in the hospitals in this area.

If it is the plan, he said, to offer curricula leading to the registered nurse degree, the school does not now possess adequate clinical facilities, nor are there a sufficient number of hospital beds in Carbondale where the training could be applied. He went on to say that the nurses' training schools in Chicago are empty and that individuals desiring this type of work could enter one of these schools. F om the stand point of need, he reiterated that at the present time there was no great need for a nurses' training school, since some of the established Nurses' Training Schools now have small enrollments. Until such time as a 400 bed hospital is an actuality, he said, it would be difficult to establish nurses training courses because the nurses would have to be farmed out into institutions over which the University has no control. This, he said, has proved unsatisfactory at the University of Chicago, and nurses are no longer sent out to surrounding hospitals. Dr. Bailey agreed that a nurses' training school is desirable in the community, but until hospital and clinical facilities are available here at the University, it is not feasible to establish such a course.

As to medical training, Dr. Bailey said this was an entirely different question. He referred to Page 277 of Dr. Hartman's Report, where Dr. Hartman states, "Four year medical schools are desperately attempting to enlarge the depleted ranks of their junior classes by recruiting students who have completed the first two years at other schools". He said that he had written to the Deans of our recognized four year medical schools, and in response he had received information directly opposite to the statement just quoted from the Hartman Report. Instead of depleted junior classes, he said, the mortality in medical schools is slight, and last year there were only two or three places available in the junior year at the University of Illinois Medical School, and the Deans receive desperate letters from the Administration of two year medical schools asking for the admittance of their students.

Dr. Bailey further pointed out the tremendous expense of establishing a medical school, \$18,000,000.00 being the lowest figure he had found for the establishment of such a school, with the largest part of this sum necessary for setting up the first two years. This would call for a tremendous state appropriation. He said that Southern Illinois is still a part of the State of Illinois, but suddenly it has set itself apart as an area constituting the southernmost 31 counties. All of this, he believes, will lead to trouble because

it is a fact that Southern Illinois is a poorer part of the State and is a minority. He continued with the statement that half of the money in the State for taxes, improvements, and other expenditures comes from Cook County, and if a hospital is set up here, the rest of the State will have to support it.

Dr. Bailey said that if the two year medical school is eventually set up, trouble will be encountered in getting the students enrolled in medical colleges. There is no 100m for junior students at the University of Illinois Medical School. The faculty there, he said, will be against the proposed school and it is possible that the large and powerful Alumni Association of the University of Illinois will be against the project and will fight it openly.

Aside from all this, he continued, if the two year medical school should be set up at Southern Illinois University, it will suck the "life blood" from the rest of the University. "I have seen it happen at other Universities," he said, "and it will happen here." In times of stress when budgets are cut, funds will go to a hospital and not to educational departments, he asserted.

Dr. Bailey said he looked upon Southern Illinois University as his Alma Mater, and the statements he had made were not out of jealousy, but were facts gained from bitter experience. He stated that he wanted to see the best thing done for Southern Illinois University and for the people of Southern Illinois, and at the present time, that consisted of strengthening and expanding the existing schools and departments of Southern Illinois University.

Dr. Brown then asked Dr. Hartman if he wished to make any remarks. Dr. Hartman stated that the contents of the Survey Report were based on determination of needs on local, state, and federal criteria. As to costs, he said he felt Dr. Bailey's figures were high. He cited North Carolina as an example where \$4,000,000.00 established the two year basic course. He further stated that the proposed over-all cost of the set up as outlined for Southern Illinois University was 9.9 million dollars, and that these were not local figures, which would tend to lower the unit costs of construction because of the location being farther south and in a rural area.
As to Nurses' Training, he said Dr. Bailey's suggestion that the nurses

go to Chicago for their training was unsound because if they get their train-

ing there, in almost every instance, they will stay there.

Dr. Hartman took exception to Dr. Bailey's suggestion that the hospitals in the area should give the nurses' training. He said that they were unable to do this because of lack of funds, facilities, and time for instruction. As to the statement in his Report concerning four year medical schools seeking graduates of the two year schools, Dr. Hartman stated this information was secured from sources including the medical schools themselves. Dr. Hartman said he read into Dr. Bailey's comments the idea that "Chicago has it because it can afford it, and Southern Illinois doesn't have it because it can't afford it." He felt that it should be stressed in setting up appropriations that areas of need should be helped in order to improve the total state picture.

As to the item of the medical college sucking the "life blood" from the University, Dr. Hartman said it had worked just the other way at the University of Iowa. He stated that to have a good college of medicine you must have

a good University.

Dr. Bailey stated that fundamentally there was no great difference in his philosophy and that of Dr. Hartman's; but, he continued, we do have to deal with legislatures in order to get funds to proceed with such programs as contemplated. We cannot alter the fact that Southern Illinois is a minority and has a minority of votes, and that in order to get appropriations, it must swing the big wealthy end of the state. He further pointed out that as a representative of the Alumni Association, he wanted to make the statement that the Alumni fear that if established, the medical school will swing the University.

Dr. Morris stated that Dr. Bailey had pointed out opposition to the program through the University of Illinois Alumni Association. He intimated that perhaps that group should be reminded that the University of Illinois is spending \$15,000,000.00 to make it possible to admit 25 additional medical students. He asked Dr. Tenney to summarize a meeting that was held at Southern Illinois University in April of 1948.

Dr. Tenney stated that in April 1948, an official of the University of Illuois Medical School visited this campus. This official stated, he went on, that the medical school at the University of Illinois was extremely overcrowded, and that as he saw it one solution to this problem was to have "feeder colleges" offer the first two years of medical work, thus relieving the University of Illinois of this obligation so that it could in turn concentrate its facilities on the advanced students.

Dr. Brown stated that the area need for nurses and hospitals is critical. He said that 192 physicians have sent patients to the clinic in Herrin. In one case he said, it took seven and one half months before he could get a patient into the University of Illinois Clinics. When he talked with the authorities about this, he said they asked him not to bring any more patients and to seek local facilities. If the St. Louis facilities are not available, the area is helpless. He stated that there are 13 new hospitals in the area, built and building, and there are few nurses available. He said the demand is for us to help train nurses and it is coming from many sources, not just from the doctors, but from high school principals, and from high school girls themselves. As an example, he stated that 70 per cent of the girls in a Herrin high school group, upon being questioned by a hospital official, named nurses' training as that occupation which they wanted most to enter into after graduation.

Dr. Bailey said that he did not deny the need for this program, but that he questioned the way in which it could be taken care of, stating that actually it is a community need and obligation, and is not the responsibility of Southern Illinois University. However, upon being questioned he was unable to give any constructive suggestions for alleviating the critical shortage of

nurses.

Dr. Brown asked what the reaction of the University of Illinois Alumni Association would be if nurses' training only was started here.

Dr. Bailey stated that there would be very little or no complaint as to nurses' training, but that complaint might be great concerning medical training.

Dr. Morris said there was one basic point he would like to re-emphasize and that was that the University of Illinois Medical School is as large as it can get. Since, he said, this situation exists all over the country, perhaps we have reached a point where duplication of facilities is necessary and because of many factors, duplication of facilities is eminently to be preferred to adding

on to the already established and over-crowded colleges.

Dr. Bailey stated that if a four year medical school had been proposed at Southern Illinois University he would express no opposition. He said that he felt that the University of Illinois was entirely too large in all the undergraduate divisions. In fact, he said, he had urged authorities to establish Liberal Arts Colleges in all of the Teachers' Colleges in the State in order to alleviate this over-crowded under-graduate situation at the University of Illinois.

Dr. Brown stated that if there was no further discussion, he wished to express the gratitude of the people of Southern Illinois to Dr. Bailey for his great interest and help to the boys from Southern Illinois who are in the University of Illinois Medical School. He expressed his gratitude to all the guests present for their interest in coming to the meeting and thanked them on behalf of the Board of Trustees for the comments and information which they had given.

The guests left the meeting at 4:30 p.m., and the Board went into executive session.

## **EXECUTIVE SESSION**

Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, February 13, 1950

The members of the Board met in executive session immediately following the close of the session dealing with the discussion of the Hartman Report.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on December 19, 1949, were discussed and the following revisions were suggested by Mr. Gladson:

On page 4, the statement concerning the approval of contracts was changed to read:

"The Board authorized the President to enter into the following contracts.

On pages 5 and 6, on Items C. D. and E. the following phrase was added:

"Upon the recommendation of Dr. Morris".

To Item H, the following statement was added:

"President Morris was asked to report back to the Board for ratification of any contracts entered into.

At the top of page 8, the phrase should read:
"and at the close of each meeting, the Chairman of the Board should release such information as he deems desirable to the Director of the Information Service of the University."

After the above revisions were made, Mr. Lyerla made a motion that the minutes be approved as revised. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wham, and unanimously passed with each member recording his vote as follows:

Mr. Wham made a motion that the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board held on February 4, 1950, be approved as sub-The motion was seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis, and was unanimously passed with each member recording his vote as follows:

Dr. Brown asked Dr. Morris if anything had been done concerning the precautionary measures which the Executive Committee proposed after the fire. Dr. Morris said that everything possible was being done to prevent future fires. Mr. Gladson asked whether there were any warning devices that could be installed and whether there was adequate watchman service at the girls' dormitory. Dr. Morris stated that watchmen were on duty and that fire escapes, not only on the girls' dormitory, but on all campus buildings were in good condition. Mr. Wham asked whether there was any place where records could be stored in fireproof surroundings. Mr. Miles said there was no such facility available on the campus and that documents are now being housed under the stage in the Auditorium, which in his opinion is a very unsafe place. Dr. Morris agreed with the members of the Board that we must have facilities for fireproof storage for records, and said this was just one example of the great need for an Administration Building.

Mr. Gladson made a motion that President Morris investigate the question of fireproof storage vaults for records and present his recommendations concerning this matter at the next meeting of the Board. ## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular Session assembled this thirteenth day of February, 1950, has, on this date and on previous occasions, approved certain plans for the growth and expansion of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois, and

WHEREAS, in order to provide additional grounds for the location of buildings, site development, and the expansion of facilities, it will be necessary to acquire certain tracts and parcels of real estate, NOW THEREFORE.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, that it is necessary to acquire for use by Southern Illinois University, the following parcels of real estate all located in the County of Jackson, State of Illinois:

The proposed acquisition of land was discussed at some length. Dr. Morris read a letter from Governor Stevenson, in which the Governor released \$174,465.00 for the purchase of land. He did not, however, release the monies for the Dowdell Tract nor for the Tract west of the Campus, which is intended for horticultural work.

Mr. Nickell asked why we desired to purchase the Dowdell Tract, which lies east of the Campus across the railroad tracks, and eventually will be isolated by the new State highway.

Dr. Morris said that the purchase of this land was one of the architect's initial recommedations on the original Campus Plan. He further stated that the problem of securing land in the vicinity of the University is getting increasingly diffcult, and he feared that if we did not purchase the Dowdell Tract it would soon build up.

Mr. Gladson asked if all of the tracts of land listed above have been authorized by the Board. Mr. Miles said he could make no definite statement that these tracts had all been authorized by the Board at past meetings, but that some had been authorized.

Mr. Gladson made a motion that a committee of the Board be appointed to investigate the adequacy and correctness of the values placed on land

tracts Number 103B, Number 103C, Number 106F, and Number 106G presently owned by Mr. John B. Taylor. He further moved that the committee report their findings to the Board at the next meeting. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wham and was unanimously passed with each member recording his vote as follows:

## Application for Federal Funds for Planning Buildings

B. Approval is requested of the following resolution authorizing the filing of applications for federal funds for the planning of University buildings. One of our greatest difficulties in the past is that the professional service fees for preparing building plans have always been provided in the same biennium as the funds for the buildings themselves, with the result that no plans were ready to make it possible to proceed rapidly with the letting of contracts and with actual construction. Public Law 352 of the 81st Congress may enable us to get a much earlier start in subsequent biennia:

## RESOLUTION

Authorizing filing of application with the United States of America for an advance to provide for the advance planning of Non-Federal Public Works under the terms of Public Law 352, 81st Congress of the United States, approved October 13, 1949

WHEREAS, Southern Illinois University herein called the "Applicant", after thorough consideration of the various aspects of the problem and study of available data has hereby determined that the construction of certain public works, generally described as (1) Physical Education Building and Community Center, (2) Student Union Building, (3) Industrial Education Building are desirable and in the public interest and to that end it is necessary that action preliminary to the construction of said works be taken immediately; and

WHEREAS, under the terms of Public Law 352, 81st Congress. approved October 13, 1949, the United States of America has authorized the making of advances to public bodies to aid in defraying the cost of architectural, engineering, and economic investigations and studies, surveys, designs, plans, working drawings, specifications, procedures, and

other action preliminary to the construction of public works (exclusive

of housing); and

WHEREAS, the applicant has examined and duly considered such act and the applicant considers it to be in the public interest and to its benefit to file an application under said act and to authorize other action in connection therewith; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE Board of Trustees the governing body of said applicant, as follows:

1. That the construction of said public works is essential to and is to the best interests of the applicant, and to the end that such public works may be provided as promptly as practicable it is desirable that action preliminary to the construction thereof be undertaken immediately:

2. That Delyte W. Morris be hereby authorized to file in behalf of the applicant an application (in form required by the United States and in conformity with said act) for an advance to be made by the United States to the applicant to aid in defraying the planning cost preliminary to the construction of such public works, which shall consist generally of architectural and engineering services and such other professional or technical services as may be required for the preparation of designs, plans, working drawings, and specifications.

3. That if such advance be made the applicant shall provide or make necessary arrangements to provide such funds, in addition to the advance, as may be required to defray the cost of such action prelim-

inary to the construction of the public works;

4. The said representative is hereby authorized to furnish such information and take such other action as may be necessary to enable the

applicant to qualify for the advance;

5. That the officer designated in the preceding paragraph is hereby designated as the authorized representative of the applicant for the purpose of furnishing to the United States such information, data and documents pertaining to the application for an advance as may be required; and otherwise to act as the authorized representative of the applicant in connection with this application.

6. That certified copies of this resolution be included as part of the ap-

plication for an advance to be submitted to the United States.

Dr. Morris stated that the application for federal funds for planning buildings must be accompanied by a formal resolution from the Board of Trustees, such as presented above. He said it will be necessary for the Board of Trustees to certify that the buildings as proposed in the resolution are a part of our building plan. Mr. Gladson stated that he felt the authorization of such a resolution would commit us to ask for appropriations for only the buildings as proposed in this resolution. He further stated that in his opinion this question had not been thoroughly investigated and there was not sufficient information at hand to make such commitments. He asked whether it was necessary to file the application immediately and whether the buildings as outlined in the application were of high priority.

Dr. Morris stated that the buildings listed were of high priority and that the Industrial Education Building should receive first consideration. The Physical Education and Community Center Building would be second in the group and the Student Union Building third.

Mr. Lyerla made a motion that the Board of Trustees adopt the proposed resolution on the application for federal funds for planning University Buildings as recommended by the President of the University. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis. The motion passed. The vote was as follows:

The members of the Board through unanimous consent approved the changes in the Non-Academic Employees Pay Rolls from May 18, 1949, through December 31, 1949, as recommended by the President of the University.

President Morris presented to the Board a report on present methods used to obtain non-academic personnel for Southern Illinois University. He stated that the average time it takes to get an employee through the regular channels is 66 days. He said the efficiency of the institution is impaired by this delay, and it is creating a critical situation in many of the University offices. Mr. Kenneth L. Davis asked if the procedure as outlined in the accompanying report was the same procedure as had been followed in the past. Dr. Morris stated that it was, and that insofar as he knew, it had been the practice of the Teachers' College Board. Mr. Sturgis stated that he saw no alternative to the procedure and that he felt that we

Approval is therefore requested of a uniform laboratory breakage deposit fee for chemistry and botany of \$2.00, effective at the beginning of the 1950-51 academic year.

By unanimous consent of the Board a uniform laboratory breakage deposit fee for chemistry and for botany of \$2.00, effective at the beginning of the 1950-1951 academic year, was approved as recommended by the President of the University.

# Approval of Master of Arts and Master of Science Curricula in Microbiology, Sociology, and Zoology

F. The Graduate Studies Committee has recommended that the departments of Microbiology, Sociology, and Zoology, which are already authorized to offer graduate courses leading to the Master of Science in Education degree, now be approved for curricula leading to the Master of Arts and Master of Science degrees.

Since the new curricula would embody many of the same courses as the old and since the Master of Arts and Master of Science would be more appropriate than the Master of Science in Education for students in these departments intending to enter research, technology, or business, approval is requested for this recommedation.

Upon recommendation by President Morris, the Board by unanimous consent approved the granting of the Master of Arts and Master of Science Degrees in Microbiology, Sociology, and Zoology.

## Designation of Assistant to Business Manager and Chief Accountant

G. In order to release the time of Mr. Miles for the handling of our land acquisition and building programs, we have asked Mr. Robert L. Gallegly, Chief Accountant in the Business Office for the past three and a half years, to serve as Assistant to the Business Manager.

Mr. Bruce Benedict, formerly Auditor in the Business Office, has been designated Chief Accountant. No changes in payroll title or salary are

entailed in these new assignments.

The Board by unanimous consent approved the designation of Mr. Robert Gallegly as Assistant to the Business Manager and Mr. Bruce Benedict as Chief Accountant.

## Report on Present Methods of Purchasing Supplies and Equipment

H. Under separate cover, we are submitting for the information of the Board a report on present methods of purchasing supplies and equipment for the University.

This includes an outline of the cumbersome procedure now in use and copies of the numerous forms involved. It also contains flow sheets showing both the present procedure and an ideal procedure, which would avoid many of the delays and difficulties of the system now in use.

The report fully documents these difficulties and delays.

After some discussion, the members of the Board agreed that President Morris might talk with members in the Department of Finance in Springfield with the idea of devising some new procedure for purchasing supplies and equipment which would be more efficient than the present method. He was asked to report his findings to the Board.

## Serving of Grade A Milk

I. Because of the great variation in the quality of milk and other dairy products available for the University's food services, approval is requested for a policy of purchasing and serving Grade A milk only in the Residence Hall, the Cafeteria, the Canteen, and any other University food service hereafter.

By unanimous consent of the Board, President Morris was authorized to set up a policy of purchasing and serving Grade A milk only in the Residence Hall, the Cafeteria, the Canteen, and any other University food service hereafter.

The next meeting of the Board will be held on Monday, March 27, 1950, at 1:00 p.m. in the Board's offices at 1301 South Thompson Street, Carbondale, Illinois.

Dr. Morris also stated that direct comment to Mr. Gladson's Committee from any individual faculty member or emeritus faculty member would be invited following the completion of the general report from the faculty. Dr. Morris was asked to present a preliminary report from the faculty at the next meeting of the Board.

The next item for discussion was the consideration of the advisability of publishing and distributing the Hartman Report. General Davis stated that since there had been such favorable reaction and support throughout the area to the information contained in the Hartman Report, that the question had come up concerning the advisability of the publication of this

Report.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Wham made a motion that we do not consider the publication of the Hartman Report at this time.\* The motion was seconded by Mr. Gladson and was unanimously passed with each member recording his vote as follows:

# MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT MORRIS

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

## Report on Fireproof Vaults

A. At the February 13, 1950 meeting of the Board of Trustees, we were requested to investigate the subject of fireproof vaults and report to the Board.

At present, there are two built-in fireproof vaults in the office of the Business Manager and one large fireproof vault in the office of the Registrar. The vaults in the Business Manager's office are used by the Bursar for cash and cash records. The vault in the Registrar's office suffices for the safeguarding of student grades.

Other records of the University, however, are kept in spaces which can scarcely be called fireproof. The very important documents in the President's office, Purchasing office, Accounting office, Personnel Records office, Alumni Service office, Information Service office, Dean of Men's office, Dean of Women's office, Physical Plant office, and so on,

cannot under present circumstances be properly safeguarded.

We are making plans to remedy this situation at the earliest possible moment. The President's office will soon move into the Bradley house on Thompson Street. Part of the basement will be converted into a vault, and since the building will be heated from steam tunnels, greater protection can be provided for valuable papers and records.

On March 7 a visit was made to Camp Ellis to inspect buildings which will soon become available as government surplus. We are filing application for a number of these buildings, one of which could be reerected on our campus to house a number of the above-mentioned offices. By means of a concrete block addition to this office building, a fireproof vault could be provided for the protection of records.

We are also proceeding to replace certain of the ordinary filing cabinets in the various offices with fire-resistant steel cabinets as

rapidly as the budgets of the offices will permit.

No action was taken by the Board on this matter.

## Authorization to Use Reserve Requested by Department of Finance

G. In Accordance with a request made by the State Department of Finance, we have been holding in reserve from our General Revenue and Income Fund Appropriations for Educational Operations \$266,977.00. At a conference last fall with Mr. Mitchell, Director of Finance, we agreed to maintain this reserve until at least the opening of the spring quarter to determine whether or not the expenses of operating the school would permit us to leave this amount, roughly 10% of the money available for the fiscal year 1949-50, unexpended.

We now have requests from a large number of our departments which make it imperative that we begin to spend monies from this

reserve. Among these requests are the following:

1. The Department of Home Economics has requested \$14,000.00 to equip its foods laboratory and clothing laboratory on the first floor of the Main building. Recent visits from the State Vocational Board have resulted in opinions by their representatives that our home economics facilities are entirely inadequate to our needs. Dr. Arthur J. Klein on a recent visit to the campus pointed out the necessity of strengthening this department immediately.

2. The Audio-Visual Aids Service has submitted a request for \$6,200.00 for additions to our film library. There is an extra-ordinary demand in the region for our film service, which already reaches into 185

schools and also provides films to numerous civic clubs, women's clubs, and other adult groups. The number of films rented out has

tripled as compared to last year.

3. The Division of Extension and Adult Education has requested \$2,400.00 for equipment and supplies and \$5,000.00 for personal services for its rapidly growing program of short courses in art, salesmanship, conservation, and so on.

4. The Information Service has requested \$1,000.00 to print a newsletter for the parents of University students and a pamphlet to be distrib-

uted among the high school seniors in the area.

5. The Department of Chemistry, which now has additional laboratory space on the first floor of the Parkinson laboratory, has been unable to equip it and is in need of several thousand dollars worth of equipment and commodities to make it completely useful.

6. The University School has been taking an active part in the Illinois State High School Curriculum Program and needs additional funds to make the required studies of the public schools of the area.

7. The Department of Physics, which has recently added two highly trained members to its staff, finds itself unable to supply them with the equipment and student assistance needed. The department has entered into a cooperative research project with the Capacitor Division of the Sangamo Electric Company, which is located at the Illinois Ordnance Plant. The Physics Department has requested an additional \$5,700.00 to support its new activities.

8. The Veterans Housing Service has requested \$1,200.00 in personal service monies to make possible more adequate record keeping for the veterans housing projects and also to expedite the acquisition of government surplus materials, many of which are still available

if someone has the time and travel funds to go after them.

9. The Department of Industrial Education has requested \$1,800.00 for additional equipment needed to carry on work in blueprinting and

woodworking.

10. \$15,000.00 worth of equipment is needed by the Department of Speech to activate a radio laboratory, which has already been postponed for two years. The radio stations of the area are asking us to provide numerous programs, but facilities are not available at present for training our students.

11. An expert in photography has been added to the Department of Journalism, but his experience cannot be fully utilized because of the lack of equipment in the Photographic Service, which has hitherto been operated on a small scale by students. About \$8,500.00 is needed

for new equipment.

12. Additional bleachers for the Men's Gymnasium, and safe replacement bleachers for the east side of the Stadium must be ordered at once if they are to be available for forthcoming student activity programs, festivals, and other events.

13. Outdoor lighting for the Stadium football field is also an expensive item which must be requisitioned soon for programs and games already

scheduled.

These are merely certain large requests. Almost every day we receive from the various departments of the University smaller requests from departments which are already beginning to feel the pinch of our cramped budget. We must also look forward to the major burdens which will be placed on our operating budget as soon as we attempt to provide additional temporary space for next year's program and as we prepare to move into the new Training School.

Now that the last quarter of the fiscal year is beginning and pressing needs for additional funds have become apparent, we request authoriza-

tion to dip into this reserve.

The above report was received for record. It was unanimously agreed by the members of the Board that this was a matter for the Administration of the University.

## Approval of Salary Schedule Revisions

H. A faculty committee has been studying salary schedules now prevailing in universities and colleges in the Mid-West and has proposed the following revisions in the existing *Salary Schedule for Illinois Teachers Colleges*, which is still in effect at Southern.

These revisions were endorsed by the University faculty at its March meeting. The committee's studies have shown that our present salary spread, both between the highest and the lowest ranks and within each rank, is much too limited. The proposed schedule increases the spread and brings our salary ranges more into line with those of comparable institutions.

While this is only a first step toward the revision of the existing policy on salaries and tenure, approval is requested at the present time for the proposed schedule so that we can proceed to prepare for presentation to the Board of Trustees at an early meeting our pay rolls and internal budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1950. The Board may expect further recommendations as the faculty and administration proceed with their studies of current salary practices in colleges and universities.

## Approval of Uniform Tuition Fees

The Council Advisory to the President has recommended that uniform tuition fees be charged for the three undergraduate colleges and the Graduate School.

At present our students pay a tuition fee of \$15.00 a term, except that juniors and seniors in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and the College of Vocations and Professions pay a tuition fee of \$20.00 This differential was required by the Teachers College Board so that intending teachers would receive the benefit of lower tuition charges. In a university-type program such a differential of fees between those intending to teach and those intending to enter other professions seems discriminatory. An odd inconsistency is that a student enrolled in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences or College of Vocations and Professions will pay \$15.00 a term as freshman and sophomore, and \$20.00 as a junior and senior, but if he then enters the Graduate School he will pay only \$15.00 again.

Effective July 1, 1951, approval is requested for a uniform tuition fee of \$15.00 per term for all students in whatever college or school of the University. It was necessary to defer this date to 1951 because the annual catalog for 1950-51 already shows the old schedule of fees and because the estimates of income from fees in our 1949-51 budget are based on the old scale.

"After a thorough discussion, Mr. Wham made a motion that we do not consider the general publication of the *Hartman Report* at this time."

After the above revision was made, Mr. Lyerla made a motion that the Minutes be approved as revised. The motion was seconded by Mr. Kenneth L. Davis and unanimously passed with each member recording his vote as follows:

Dr. Brown informed the members of the Board that the Egyptian Fire Fighters' Association had approached him and had requested to appear before the Board of Trustees to present their recommendation concerning the purchase by Southern Illinois University of an aerial ladder pumper truck. After a thorough discussion the members of the Board were of the unanimous opinion that the Committee for the Fire Fighters' Association should be heard. Dr. Brown was asked to get in touch with the Chairman of the Comittee and make arrangements for a meeting at either the May or June meeting of the Board.

The next item for discussion was the possibility of a joint meeting, to be held in Carbondale, Illinois, with the Board of Trustees of the University of of Illinois. It was unanimously agreed by the members of the Board that

we should invite the members of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois to attend either the May meeting of the Board, which will be held on May 22, or the June meeting, which will be held on June 26. General Davis stated that an invitation would be written to the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois and that the members of this Board would be duly notified concerning the final plans.

## MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT MORRIS

The Board considered the following matters presented by the President of the University.

## Report on Employment of Football Coach

A. At the March 27, 1950, meeting of the Board of Trustees, we were requested to investigate the possibility of employing Mr. Clark Shaughnessy as head football coach and to report back to the Board.

Mr. Shaughnessy visited our campus on April 4, and gave sincere and sympathetic consideration to the possibility of developing the program at Southern. He reported, however, that certain other commitments might make it impossible for him to accept a position here and that he would give us an answer after attempting to see what could be done. On April 6 we received the following telegram from Mr. Shaughnessy: "Despite my personal preference which is to be with you my situation is such that I have to decline your most appreciated offer. Leaving by plane this noon for Los Angeles. Anything I can ever do for you personally or for the school would be a pleasure. (Signed) Clark Shaughnessy".

We have since learned that Mr. Shaughnessy has accepted a coaching position in California which would permit him to remain on the West Coast. At present, a number of other possible candidates for the coaching position are being considered, but at this writing we have no definite

recommedation to make.

No action was taken on this matter by the Board.

# Preliminary Report on the Klein Report by the Faculty Committee on the Study and Recommendation of University Procedures

B. At the March 27, 1950, meeting of the Board of Trustees, Parts III, IV, and V of the Klein Report, "Legislation Proposed for the Board of Trustees, Southern Illinois University", as revised by the Board's Committee to study this report, were approved temporarily, with a request that they be submitted to the University faculty for comments and suggestions.

The Faculty Committee for the Study and Recommendation of University Procedures has been studying the Klein Report intensively since the March 27 meeting of the Board. The Report has been discussed at two general faculty meetings; and the Procedures Committee has held half a dozen open meetings for further discussion of special points. The Procedures Committee is undertaking to have ready for the Board a statement of certain general reactions of the faculty to the Klein Report, this statement to be mailed to the members of the Board before its April 24 meeting. Following this preliminary statement, it is the hope of the Procedures Committee to present to the Board during the month of May detailed comments on the Klein Report embodying the various suggestions of the University faculty.

President Morris stated that continued study on the Klein Report is being conducted by faculty committees and that he hoped the faculty report would be completed in time for presentation at the May meeting of the Board.

### b. Sabbatical Leaves

In conformity with established regulations, sabbatical leaves for the school year extending from September 11, 1950, through June 9, 1951, inclusive, are recommended for the faculty members listed below. The revised Salary Schedule now prevailing has these provisions concerning sabbatical leaves: "Each year . . . one out of every twenty-five members of the faculty or major fraction thereof may be granted not to exceed a year's leave of absence on half pay for the purpose of attending some institution of higher learning or of otherwise adding to his professional equipment or usefulness, provided that the person shall have already served at least five years. . . . No person shall receive such a leave oftener than once in seven years. The person granted such a leave, however, shall agree to serve at least two more years in any state-supported institution of higher education in Illinois, and shall give a note with proper security for the amount granted. said note to be cancelled at the end of the two years of service required or at the death of its maker." It should also be pointed out that a faculty member on leave of absence does not sacrifice his status as a member of the faculty, as far as the standard provisions concerning rank and salary are concerned. He is subject, however, to reassignment of duties upon returning from a leave if changes in the University's program or organization which occur during his absence make reassignment necessary.

- 1. Dr. W. M. Gersbacher, Professor of Zoology, who first joined our faculty in 1929 for one year's service and returned in 1936, has the Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Illinois. He plans research and advanced study during his sabbatical leave.

### Authorization of Agreement Concerning Maintenance and uilding Laborers

D. A difficulty has arisen concerning the employment of laborers. The Act to Standardize State Position Titles and Salary Rates provides for both laborers (maintenance), who are paid on a scale of \$125 to \$193 per month, and laborers (building), who are paid at prevailing union rates. The International Hod Carriers' Building and Common Laborers' Union has protested the use of our maintenance laborers on certain projects calling for remodeling or slight changes in and additions to certain campus buildings, sidewalks, etc. It is the Union's contention that any such work done by laborers should be done under the laborer (building) classification and not under the laborer (maintenance) classification.

To carry out the desires of the Union in this regard is extremely difficult, since when a project arises calling for building laborers, it is impossible to hire them through present channels without delaying the

work indefinitely.

As a result of these difficulties, we have had several conferences with Mr. Delmar Shackleton, Business Representative of Local Union No. 227 of the Hod Carriers' Building and Common Laborers' Union. He has submitted to us the following proposed Stipulation for Maintenance Em-

"This Stipulation, made and entered into by and between SOUTH-ERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY of Carbondale, Illinois, Party of the First Part, hereinafter referred to as the "Employer", and Local No. 227 of the International Hod Carriers' Building and Common Laborers' Union of America, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, hereinafter referred to as "Union", whose endeavor is to create and maintain harmony in the execution of an understanding for the maintenance employees of the said University. The following paragraphs are hereby mutually agreed by both of the above mentioned parties.

1. "It is understood and agreed that this Stipulation is for the main-

tenance employees only.

"It is further understood that all maintenance employees shall be members of the Union. These employees are extended the privilege of becoming the members of the said Local Union No. 227 within thirty (30) days of their employment, and as a condition of employment with the said Employer are to remain in continuous good standing with the Local Union.

- 2. "All the conditions, privileges, and benefits offered these employees by the Civil Service Commission are to be retained by these employees and by the signing of this Stipulation, they shall forfeit none of these conditions, privileges, and benefits.
- "It is mutually agreed that the employees termed "maintenance" shall be permitted to perform all the maintenance work required; also that they shall be allowed to perform new construction which is required in the maintaining of said University to a sum not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00) on any one (1) particular job, not to exceed the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) per month on all jobs.
- 4. "It is further understood and agreed that all the maintenance employees shall receive the wage of two hundred and nine dollars (\$209.00) per month.
- 5. "This Stipulation and provisions thereof shall continue in full force and be binding upon the respective parties hereto until the.....day of.........., 19...., and from year to year thereafter, unless changed by the parties hereto in writing; if changes desired, then party desiring changes must notify the other party in writing sixty (60) days prior to expiration date after which notice the change or or changes shall be considered."

Further conferences have resulted in agreements to delete the union shop provision in Paragraph 1 and substitute for it a letter agreeing that we will suggest to our maintenance employees that they become employees of the Union when the stipulation is put into effect.

There is also general agreement that Paragraph 2 is unnecessary

since the rights it refers to are guaranteed by law.

With regard to Paragraph 3, we have proposed to the Union that the limit for new construction work to be performed by our laborers should be raised to \$1,000 and that, as our staff of workers affected by the agreement increases, limit of \$1,000 should increase proportionately. Mr. Shackleton has indicated that he may be able to obtain the consent of the Union to this change, provided that only permanent and not temporary maintenance laborers are taken into account in defining an increase in staff.

The rate of \$209 a month referred to in paragraph 4 is a compromise between rates now paid our maintenance laborers and the prevailing rate of \$226.20 which the Union scale provides for building laborers.

Approval is requested for the University's entering into an agreement with the Union on these or closely similar terms.

After a thorough discussion, it was unanimously agreed that the above proposed agreement concerning maintenance and building laborers be referred back to the University Administration and to the Union Officials with the request that Item Number 1 in the proposed agreement be deleted. Dr. Morris was asked to report back to the Board concerning this matter.

#### Approval of Merit Rating Forms for Employees

A tentative agreement with our non-academic employees provides that merit records for all employees shall be maintained on standard forms, which have been approved by the Board of Trustees. ## Authorization of Proposal to Rent Space from the Murdale Airport Authority

F. We have received from Dr. W. C. Bicknell, Chairman of the Department of Industrial Education, and Dr. Otis B. Young, Chairman of the Department of Physics, proposals for the renting of space from the Murdale Airport Authority for use in the programs of these departments, particularly as they are concerned with courses related to aeronautics.

The Murdale Airport Authority has tentatively agreed to construct an annex to the administration building at the Airport which would provide Southern Illinois University with the space required. This space, which would be approximately forty by ninety feet, could be made available to the University at a rental rate of one percent per month of the cost of the facilities to the Airport Authority, or of \$250 per month, whichever figure is the smaller.

Since the Murdale Airport Authority must know the University's intentions before it can proceed with its building program, authorization is herewith requested for renting space from the Authority on these terms.

Mr. Kenneth L. Davis moved that, as recommended, the President of the University be authorized to rent space from the Murdale Airport Authority at a rental rate of one per cent per month of the cost of the facilities to the Airport Authority or of \$250.00 per month, whichever figure is the smaller. He further moved that in the event of emergency or need, the President also be permitted to rent space for similar and related purposes at other nearby airports. ### Authorization for Employing a Supervisor in Vocational Education

G. The University is of the opinion that there is a serious need in Southern Illinois for intensely practical training in such fields as industrial education, agriculture, home economics, and business. While substantial offerings are already available on the University level, there seems to be an unmet need for vocational training for people not interested in a college education as such, but interested in acquiring job proficiencies.

Mr. Ernest Simon, Director of the State Board of Vocational Education, has been exploring with us the extent and character of this need. He and his staff members have come to Carbondale for four conferences on the different vocational fields as follows:

As a result of these conferences we are now formulating tentative programs for these fields, taking into account the possible costs of each.

Mr. Simon is strongly of the opinion that we need a Technical Institute type of program which would have the effect of qualifying us for reimbursement from federal funds under the Smith-Hughes and George Barden Acts.

Our present need is for strong leadership and expert planning in this area. Authorization is therefore requested for employing a supervisor in vocational education who can help us determine the proper handling of such a program, assist us in obtaining necessary staff, and offer direction and guidance as courses are set up.

Upon recommedation by the President of the University, Mr. Lyerla moved that further exploration of the project of a Technical Institute type of program be approved. He further moved that, as recommended, the President of the University be authorized to employ a supervisor in Vocational Education who would be qualified to handle such a program. #### Name for New Training School Building

H. The State Division of Architecture and Engineering has requested copy for an inscription in stone to be placed at the entrance of the new Training School building. We have asked our faculty members to make nominations, and will present their proposals to the Board at the April 24 meeting, with a request that the Board select a name for the building from among those suggested by the faculty.

President Morris recommended to the members of the Board that action on this matter be postponed until a later meeting. He said he felt that more suggestions for names for the new Training School should be secured, especially from civic groups in the area which the College serves, before any definite action is taken by the Board. This met with the approval of the members of the Board.

## Authorization for Employing Nursing Educator

I. Authorization is requested for the immediate employment of a trained person to plan the development of a nursing education program, working cooperatively with the University of Illinois Medical School and with other State agencies concerned with the training of nurses.

The responsibilities of the nursing educator would be to study the needs of Southern Illinois as regards graduate nurses at the three-year level, graduate nurses at the baccalaureate level, and practical nurses;

and to determine the prospective supply of students available in the area. The nursing educator would also aid in the selection and development of a possible faculty for a department of nursing and would advise the nursing students in their training, both on the University campus and in the affiliated hospitals. The nursing educator would also help arrange affiliations with suitable hospitals in the area for clinical training for nurses.

We have received from Miss Emily Cardew, Coordinator of the Affiliation Program in Nursing of the University of Illinois, a statement of qualifications for such a nursing educator and have begun a preliminary investigation of the availability of persons with these qualifications.

## Training of Vocational Agriculture Teachers

J. It is our understanding that Illinois State Normal University is seeking approval from the State Vocational Education Board for the training of vocational agriculture teachers under the Smith-Hughes Act. At present. the University of Illinois is the only institution of higher learning in Illinois accredited for this work.

It is our view that if a second college or university in Illinois is to be accredited, Southern Illinois University should have precedence. In view of the differences in agricultural conditions and opportunities between Northern and Southern Illinois, in view of the lack of facilities for vocational education in this end of the State, and in view of our plans and the plans of Southern Illinois high schools to establish programs in vocational training to meet regional needs, it is requested that the Board of Trustees go on record as favoring any action by the State Vocational Education Board which would leave open the possibility of training vocational agriculture teachers at Southern and as opposing any action which might prejudice the opportunities of Southern Illinois and Southern Illinois University in this regard.

# Authorization to Option Land For Recreational Development at Little Grassy Lake

K. It has been our intention to obtain land just to the west of Little Grassy Lake for the purpose of developing a program in recreation and outdoor education. The land available from the Fish and Wildlife Service, however, constitutes a very narrow strip to the west of the lake. In order to provide the necessary recreation areas, hiking trails, riding paths,

etc., as well as to tie this area into our outdoor education development at Giant City Park, land in depth is needed.

The additional land required consists of 160 acres, which has been

appraised for \$5300.

Authorization is requested, therefore, for obtaining options on this land until such time as the Fish and Wildlife Service is ready to turn over to us for educational uses the government land to the west of Little Grassy Lake. It is feared that if an option is not obtained immediately, the property will be developed and will become unduly expensive to acquire.

## PROCEEDINGS AND MINUTES

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, General Robert W. Davis. He stated that the Committee representing the Coal Belt Fire Protective Association was to appear before the Board at this time. He then introduced to the members of the Board Mr. V. L. Stocks, Secretary of the Coal Belt Fire Protective Association, and requested him to discuss the proposal made by the Coal Belt Fire Protective Association that Southern

Illinois University purchase an aerial ladder pumper truck.

Mr. Stocks stated that he was appearing as spokesman for the Coal Belt Fire Protective Association for the purpose of urging Southern Illinois University to purchase a mobile unit aerial ladder pumper truck. He stated that the need for such a unit is great to both the University and to the fifty mile square area which the proposed equipment will serve. This truck, he said, is the only type of equipment that would be effective in case of fire in one of the large campus buildings. He further stated that if the University purchased such a truck it would be state owned and state operated and the Association would ask for use of it only in cases of emergency, and that the fire chief at the scene of the fire would assume the responsibility for calling out the truck. If and when the mobile unit should be called into the area, Southern Illinois University would be protected, he continued, as fire equipment from surrounding towns would be called in to stand by at the University until the mobile unit returned. He said that the Association was now working out a system of dispatching fire trucks by short wave radio communication in order to give more efficient service. Mr. Stocks stated that a complete aerial ladder pumper truck with a 100 foot ladder would cost approximately \$37,000, while an aerial ladder truck, without pumper, would cost approximately \$20,000. He said that the company from which the truck was purchased would train men to man the equipment. and that it would probably require four firemen to do an efficient job. Mr. Stocks said he would appreciate it if a committee of the Board would be appointed to work with the Committee of the Coal Belt Fire Protective Association to map out a cooperative fire fighting program for Southern Illinois. He thanked the members of the Board for the opportunity of appearing before them and stressed the fact that he and the organization which he represented were interested only in fire protection for Southern Illinois.

General Davis thanked Mr. Stocks and stated that the Board would give

his proposal serious consideration.

The next item for discussion was the purchase of dairy products. Mr. Gordon Parrish, representing the New Era Dairy in Carbondale, Illinois, appeared before the Board. He stated that the New Era Dairy was no longer furnishing milk to the University because at the present time their milk was not considered Grade A by the Jackson County Health Department. He said, however, that the Director of the Health Department had informed him that more tests of New Era milk had been completed and that in all probability by June 15, 1950, the New Era Dairy would be approved as a dispenser of Grade A milk, at which time, the Dairy would present its bid on supplying milk to Southern Illinois University.

Dr. Brown, Secretary, read the minutes of the Board meeting held on April 24, 1950. General Davis requested a vote of the approval of the

The next item for discussion was that of setting the dates for Board meetings to be held during the summer months. President Morris stated that he would like to ask the members of the Board if it would be possible to make the summer meeting dates flexible. He explained that he was making this request because through a recent ruling of the Attorney General, the Board of Trustees must assume full responsibility in the letting of all contracts and that the minutes of the meetings of the Board must show approval of all contracts to be let. As a result of this new procedure in the letting of contracts, President Morris stated that our building program will be expedited if the Board can plan to meet immediately after the bids have been opened. After a thorough discussion, it was the consensus of the members of the Board that the dates of the summer meetings be left open with the exception of the July 24 meeting, which is to be a joint meeting with the Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois. It was recommended to President Morris by the members of the Board that the bids on future contracts be opened in Chicago and a representative of the Board be present at the openings. It was further recommended that President Morris notify the Chairman of the Board immediately upon receipt of the notification of dates for the opening of bids on contracts so that arrangements can be made for a Board meeting to be held immediately following the scheduled opening of bids and also to insure that a member of the Board will be present at such openings.

General Davis stated that plans were not completed for the July 24 joint meeting with the University of Illinois Board, but that as soon as all arrange-

ments were made the members of the Board would be duly notified.

General Davis stated that the Commencement Exercises of the University would be held on June 11, and that all members of the Board had been invited to be present and to participate in the exercises. He said that in the past the Director of Registration and Education for the State of Illinois and a member of the Teachers College Board had presented the diplomas to the graduates. He said that he had asked the Director of Alumni Services to see what the customary procedure for presentation of diplomas is in other universities and that the report received was that it is standard practice for the President of the University to present the diplomas to the graduates.

## Proposed Extension of University of Illinois Civil Service to Other State-Supported Colleges and Universities

A. At a meeting of the Council on Higher Education of the Six State-supported universities and colleges in Illinois at Charleston Wednesday, April 26, 1950, the University of Illinois expressed a willingness to see its Civil Service System extended to the five other State-supported universities and colleges.

There was a general agreement among the representatives of the colleges and universities that an effort should be made to have this done at the next General Assembly. The fact that the position classifications used by the State and its departments do not fit a university or college type of organization, the fact that the State Civil Service system has been markedly slow and ineffective in appointing needed and qualified personnel, and the fact that the six schools of the State operate already effectively under a single Retirement System are the chief arguments for this change.

The support of the Board of Trustees for Southern Illinois University's participation in this movement is therefore requested.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Lyerla moved that, as recommended by the President of the University, the Board of Trustees support Southern Illinois University's participation in the movement to extend the University of Illinois Civil Service System to the other State-supported colleges and universities. Miss Louise Lemmon, part-time Faculty Assistant to supervise student teachers in Home Economics in the Eldorado Township High School, was appointed for the period from March 20, 1950. through June 9, 1950, but there was no demand for her services during part of this period, and so she served from March 20, 1950, through April 28, 1950, instead.
- b. Mrs. Marjory Lyons, who has previously been approved for a summer appointment as Instructor in Physical Education for Women at a monthly salary of \$400.00, has indicated her willingness to serve as assistant in the residence hall for two months of the summer of 1950. It is recommended that she be granted a maintenance allowance of \$20.00 a month in addition to the cash salary of \$400.00 a month already approved for her.
- c. Mrs. Mary C. Rea, part-time Faculty Assistant to supervise student teachers in Home Economics in the Johnston City Township High School, was appointed for the period from March 20, 1950, through June 9, 1950, but there was no demand for her services during part of this period, and so she served from March 20, 1950, through April 28, 1950, instead.

#### 5. Resignations

- a. Mr. Dan Cox, part-time Faculty Assistant in the Physical Plant, resigned effective April 28, 1950, since it had become necessary for him to devote more time to his studies.

## Report on Faculty Reactions to the Klein Report

C. The Faculty Committee on the Study and Recommendation of University Procedures, to which was referred Dean Klein's report on the internal organization of the University, has been holding a series of meetings and has almost completed its summaries of faculty opinion and its suggestions for possible revisions which would help Dr. Klein's report to meet local needs and conditions. It is now apparent that many features of the Klein Report, as well as of the faculty's comments on it, will require special consideration. We therefore suggest that the Board of Trustees invite the Faculty Procedure Committee to the next Board meeting for a discussion of the changes proposed. Meanwhile, individual faculty members can present their comments to Mr. Gladson, Chairman of the Board's committee on this matter, as previously requested by the Board.

President Morris presented to the members of the Board three sections of the proposed *Klein Report* showing revisions suggested by the Faculty Committee to Study and Recommend University Procedures. He called attention to the recommended revisions of the Report and in particular to a Resolution suggested by the Faculty Committee concerning the granting of honorary degrees. He stated that as he viewed the question, there were three alternatives which the Board could consider on this matter.

- 1. Grant no honorary degrees at Southern Illinois University
- 2. The Board of Trustees grant honorary degrees if and when it is desirable
- 3. The Board of Trustees working with a Faculty Committee select those individuals who shall be granted honorary degrees

Dr. Brown moved that the Board should reserve the right, in the event of the establishment of a Faculty Committee on the awarding of honorary degrees, to initiate candidates for honorary degrees and to accept or reject candidates proposed for such degrees by the Faculty through its Committee. ## Report on Internal Budget and Pay Rolls for 1950-1951

D. The internal budget of the University and the pay rolls for 1950-1951 are being prepared by the President's Office and the Business Office for submission to the Board and, subject to their completion and presentation by May 29, approval of them is requested.

The members of the Board were presented copies of the annual internal budget for the year July 1, 1950 to June 30, 1951. President Morris also presented to the members of the Board copies of the proposed Faculty-Administrative pay roll for the nine months of the academic year 1950 to 1951. After some discussion, it was agreed by the members of the Board that they wished to have some time to study these documents and that action on this matter be deferred until the June meeting of the Board. At the suggestion of General Davis, the Executive Committee was asked to meet and to make recommendations concerning the proposed annual budget at the June meeting of the Board. Mr. Lyerla, Chairman of the Executive Committee, stated that he would call the meeting in the very near future.

## Approval of Summer Pay Rolls and Conditions of Appointment

E. Presented herewith is the pay roll showing the distribution of the faculty and administrative salaries for the summer of 1950. Approval of the salaries as indicated is hereby requested.

The approval of the summer pay rolls with the exception of the June portions of the salaries was deferred until the June meeting of the Board for the reason that salaries for the June pay roll were previously established and approved while the July, August, and September portions of the salaries are a part of the annual 1950-51 budget which was deferred for the purpose of further study.

## Resolution Concerning Rerouting of U.S. Highway 51

F. Approval is requested for transmitting to Governor Stevenson the following resolution commending Director Charles P. Casey of the Department of Public Works and Buildings for his interest in our problem of rerouting U. S. Highway 51, and requesting the Governor's support in taking care of the hazards to life and the barrier to our future devlopment which exist as a result of the present location of Highway 51.

"Whereas, U. S. Highway 51 now runs directly through the campus of Southern Illinois University and in the line of students, faculty members, and visitors moving from one building to another on the University

campus; and

"Whereas, the Division of Highways of the State Department of Public Works and Buildings has long contemplated the rerouting of Highway 51 alongside the railroad right-of-way on the east side of the campus; and

"Whereas, Director Charles P. Casey of the Department of Public Works and Buildings has recently expressed interest in solving this

problem; and

"Whereas, at a conference at Carbondale, May 22, 1950, Mr. H. H. Harrison, Traffic Engineer of the Division of Highways in Springfield, and Mr. B. W. Lollar and Mr. E. L. Sherertz of the office of District Nine of the Illinois Division of Highways, assisted us in studying and work-

ing toward a solution of this problem,

"BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University herewith expresses its commendation of Director Casey and of the staff of the Division of Highways for the concern they have shown in safety conditions on the campus at Carbondale, and requests their continued interest and support of the Governor of Illinois in removing the hazards to life and the hindrance to our campus development program which exist as a result of the present location of Highway 51."

# Report on Conferences with the Attorney General and Request for Authorization to Obtain Official Opinions

H. In view of recent conferences in the office of the Attorney General, it appears that important changes in our present operating policies are indicated by opinions he now holds concerning the legal status of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. It is requested that the Chairman of the Board be authorized to request official opinions from the Attorney General concerning such matters as may be decided

by an appropriate committee of the Board of Trustees. As a matter of record, a copy of a letter under date of May 25, addressed to Attorney General Ivan A. Elliott to confirm understandings already reached, is hereto attached.

Honorable Ivan A. Elliott Attorney General Supreme Court Building Springfield, Illinois Dear General Elliott:

It was pleasant to meet with you again Wednesday and to have opportunity to receive from you opinions concerning "some features of the statutory framework surrounding the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University" as contained in a document of that title prepared by Dr. M. M. Chambers. Your interpretations are being transmitted to our Board of Trustees and I shall communicate with you if it is the feeling of the Board that further conferences are desired. In order that errors on my part may be avoided, I am summarizing my understandings of the interpretations you and your staff presented verbally in our conference. Will you please confirm the following summary, if accurate, correct any misimpressions which I may have stated, or note any items which I have omitted?

#### SUMMARY OF THE CONFERENCE

- I. With specific reference to "Summary: The Present Picture and Some Suggestions for Consideration" beginning on Page 28 of Some Features of THE STATUTORY FRAMEWORK Surrounding the BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY, Report of a Study Made in August, 1949, by Dr. M. M. Chambers, the following points were noted as opinions of the Attorney General in relation to various items of the Summary:
  - A. Item 1. Custody of Funds. (a) Non-permanent or current operating funds.
    - 1. The first sentence should read: The Board must comply with Section 6a-1 of the Act Relating to State Finance, as amended 1949.
    - 2. The last sentence "On the authority of Subsection 6 of Section 8 of the charter of 1949, . . . ." is correct, but it would be safer to put such funds into the Southern Illinois University Foundation until further legislative clarification.
  - B. Item 1. Custody of Funds. (b) Permanent funds or endowments. Correct as stated.
  - C. Item 2. Acquisition of land.

    Correct as stated. Section 31 of the Act Relating to State Finance does not apply to Southern Illinois University.
  - D. Item 3. Self-liquidating Building Projects. Correct as stated.
  - E. Item 4. Planning the Physical Plant. Correct as stated.
  - F. Item 5. Letting of Contracts.

    Correct as stated except that there is no Section 39 of the Act
    Relating to State Finance, and Section 31 does not apply. It is not
    known what other section may have been intended by Dr.
    Chambers.\*
  - G. Item 6. Disbursing. Correct as stated.

<sup>\*</sup> Dr. Chambers intended Section 30. Because of an inadvertence, Section 39 was substituted. Section 30 does apply to Southern Illinois University.

H. Item 7. Accounting.

Correct as stated with the recommendation that all except the first sentence be disregarded.

- I. Item. 8. Financial Reporting.

  Correct as stated.
- J. Item 9. Budgeting. Correct as stated.
- K. Item. 10. Purchasing of Commodities.

  The first sentence correct as stated, with the following additional notations:
  - 1. All postage and printing must be purchased through the Department of Finance.
  - 2. Land must be purchased through the Department of Finance if purchased with State funds.
  - 3. The Attorney General advises that coal be purchased through the Department of Finance or, at least, be purchased on bids.
- L. Item 11. Employing Personnel. *Correct as stated*.
- M. Item 12. Government of Students.

  No ruling because none is requested. The Attorney General recommends that legislation be sought to clarify the issue of scholarships.

## II. Additional Interpretations Indicated:

A. Legal Counsel.

Southern Illinois University is a public corporation or body politic and as such can have legal counsel. It is suggested that amending legislation be undertaken to include the statement "established as a body politic" in the laws creating the Board of Trustees of the University, in order to completely clarify the situation.

- B. Condemnation of Land.
  - 1. The University can operate on its own if land is purchased with private funds, including self-liquidating funds. However, it should be noted that in the event any buildings are erected on land with money provided through State revenue, title to such land must be cleared by the Attorney General.
  - 2. The University should work through the Department of Finance in condemnation proceedings involving land to be purchased with funds from State revenue with the land purchased in the name of the State of Illinois for the use of Southern Illinois University.
    - (a) A field representative of the Attorney General should be a matter of record.
    - (b) Legal counsel of the University may carry the burden of the case.
  - 3. The request for condemnation suit to be instituted by the Attorney General's office must come from the Department of Finance.
- C. Acquisition of Land without Condemnation.

  The same points as listed under "B. Condemnation of Land" above, applies here.
- D. Contracts for Buildings, etc.

  It is recommended that the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois
  University follow Section 28 of the Finance Act.\*
- E. Contracts on Buildings and Major Repairs of Buildings Involving Amounts in Excess of \$1,000.00.
  - 1. The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is specifically responsible for the opening of bids and must open them as a Board or specifically delegate the opening.

<sup>\*</sup>This was intended to be Section 28 of the Civil Administrative Code.

- 2. Awarding of contracts cannot be delegated but must be made by resolution of the Board, presumably on the basis of lowest and best bidder.
- 3. All contracts should be filed and referred to in the minutes of the Board in such a way as to identify the contract.
- III. Field Representatives of the Attorney General.

The Attorney General graciously agreed to the appointment of such field representative or field representatives as would be agreeable to the University in the case of instituting condemnation proceedings for acquisition of land.

## Study of Reorganization of the College of Vocations and Professions

I. It has become apparent that the organization of the College of Vocations and Professions may require certain changes if the departments in that College are to function most effectively. As far as we know, there is no parallel in any other university for Southern's College of Vocations and Professions. It was originally planned to do work similar to that which is now proposed for our Technical Institute, and its original title was College of Vocations. Later on, the title was changed to College of Vocations and Professions, and many departments which were related to each other only in the loose sense that they provided some form of professional or vocational competence to our students were grouped together in this College.

For example, Art and Music are now departments within this College. In most universities, these departments are located in a School of Fine Arts. Speech is often assigned to the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, with the work in Drama sometimes included as one of the Fine Arts. Similarly, at most universities, Agriculture and Home Economics are departments in a distinct school or schools, and Business Administration, instead of being within a college, is usually a college or school itself.

Southern Illinois University has advanced far enough along the trail of its development as a University to consider seriously the reorganization of the College of Vocations and Professions into a number of distinct schools or colleges, each of which could develop more effectively if it were given the opportunity to work out its own curricula and to perfect its own program.

We therefore request the endorsement of the Board for entering into a program of reorganization of the College of Vocations and Professions throughout the next year. Studies will be made of the most effective type of reorganization, and the resulting plans will be presented at later meetings of the Board.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Kenneth L. Davis moved that, as recommended by the President of the University, appropriate officials of the University be authorized to enter into a program of planning the reorganization of the College of Vocations and Professions. #### Recommendation of Auditors

J. We have received a request from the State Auditor's office for a recommendation of a firm of auditors to make our annual post audit. Last year our audit was made by Mersinger and Allison, Certified Public Accountants of Springfield and East St. Louis.

Mr. Miles found the work of this firm to be satisfactory and therefore recommends the retention of this firm for this year's annual audit. Approval is requested for passing on his recommendation to the State

Auditor.

No action was taken on this item.

Mr. Gladson stated that it is always advisable to have outside auditors make the annual post audit; however, he said that since the sole responsibility for the financial program of the University is that of the Board of Trustees, the Board should also assume the responsibility of the selection and employment of the auditing firm. He suggested that Mr. Miles make a complete investigation of this question and report back to the Board at its next meeting. He further suggested that Mr. Miles secure the names of the firms who make the audits at the University of Illinois or at Northwestern University. This suggestion was unanimously approved by the members of the Board.

K. Attached is a copy of a resolution and certification form which must be submitted with applications to the Federal Government for government surplus buildings, such as those recently inspected at Camp Ellis. #### Approval of Revised Stipulation for Employment of Maintenance Laborers

L. At the April 24 meeting of the Board of Trustees, we reported a difficulty concerning the employment of laborers and provided the Board with copies of a proposed stipulation for maintenance employees suggested by the International Hod Carriers', Building and Common Laborers' Union of America.

Item 1 of this Stipulation was to the effect that all maintenance employees should become members of the Union. The Board of Trustees recommended that the agreement be referred back to the University administration and the Union officials with a request that this item be deleted and that the President report the results to the Board.

We have now received from Mr. Delmar Shackleton, Business Representative of Local Union No. 227 of the International Hod Carriers', Building and Common Laborers' Union of America, a revised Stipulation from which the objectionable item has been deleted. Approval is re-

quested for our entering into an agreement with the Union on these terms:

#### STIPULATION FOR LABOR EMPLOYEES

This Stipulation, made and entered into by and between SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY of Carbondale, Illinois, Party of the First Part, hereinafter referred to as the "Employer", and Local No. 227 of the International Hod Carriers', Building and Common Laborers' Union of America, affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, hereinafter referred to as "Union", whose endeavor is to create and maintain harmony in the execution of an understanding for the maintenance employees of the said University. The following paragraphs are hereby mutually agreed by both of the above mentioned parties.

1. It is mutually agreed by both parties that the laborers shall perform all maintenance work required in maintaining the University; that these Laborers be allowed to perform new construction which may be required in maintaining the University to a sum not to exceed fifty per cent (50%) of the payroll of permanent laborers in any one month.

2. It is further understood and agreed that all the maintenance employees shall receive the wage of two hundred and nine dollars

The next item for discussion was the awarding of honorary degrees. Dr. Morris presented to the members of the Board a Report from the Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees. The following is taken from the Report:

# SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY CARBONDALE, ILLINOIS

June 7, 1950

Dr. D. W. Morris, President Southern Illinois University Dear Dr. Morris:

In response to your request, the newly elected faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees submits the following report with unanimous approval:

1. The committee believes that it is proper and desirable for the university to honor men and women who have achieved national promin-

ence in their professions or careers or who have contributed notably to the advancement of social welfare or to the arts or sciences, including both former students of the university and others. The first persons so recognized, it is thought, should be the most distinguished living representatives of the university's former students, three of whom stand out clearly: Dr. Percival Bailey, Dr. Dallas B. Phemister, and Mr. W. W. Vandeveer. . . .

The committee recommends that action on the matter of honors be postponed until the 1951 June Convocation, and that in the meantime it be permitted to prepare a careful and thorough report based on detailed investigation of the most desirable procedure. . . .

- 2. In later deliberations, the committee would like to study the possibility of establishing an achievement award for former students, possibly a medal or plaque with suitable inscription, and to plan systematically for awarding honorary degrees to carefully selected persons of national eminence.
- 3. If the Board of Trustees wishes to proceed with awarding honorary degrees at this time, the committee recommends that Drs. Bailey and Phemister be granted degrees of D.Sc. and Mr. Vandeveer the degree of LL.D.

1. Dr. Floyd F. Cunningham, of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, from the rank of Associate Professor to the rank of Professor, effective September 11, 1950.

Dr. Cunningham, who has been Chairman of our Department of Geography since 1947, has a fine record as a scholar and school administrator. He is the author of a laboratory manual "Geography of North America for College Students", published by John Wylie and Sons, and the collaborator with C. F. Jones of Northwestern University on another laboratory manual "Geography of of South America", published by Henry Holt and Company. He has recently been invited by the Beckley-Cardy Company to assume the senior authorship of a series of text books on geography for elementary schools. He is also the writer of approximately a dozen magazine articles and book reviews.

Dr. Cunningham served as Chairman of the Department of Geography at State Teachers College, Florence, Alabama, for 18 years before coming to Southern. He was a member of the Geography staff at Biarritz University, Biarritz, France, in 1945 and 1946, and lectured in Geography for the U. S. Army in 32 German and three Austrian cities. He served as President of the National Council of Geography Teachers for three years and as Secretary for four years; and was one of the ten United States delegates to the International Geography Congress held in Warsaw, Poland. in 1944. He also served as President of the Illinois Council of Geography Teachers for two years and as consultant for the Educational Policies Commission in Washington, D. C., for eight years. He is listed in "International World Who's Who", "Who's Who in America", "American Men of Science", and "Whos Who in American Education".

Dr. Cunningham has been particularly active in carrying the activities of the Geography Department out into Southern Illinois and in extending his help to civic and community groups. Since

coming to Southern, he has taught a number of extension courses and has conducted six one-week conservation workshops out in the area. He has also made a dozen or more talks to civic groups in various Southern Illinois cities from Mt. Vernon to Cairo, has lectured over the radio on conservation, has participated in conferences on the Big Muddy basin and on forestry, and has sponsored the local chapter of Gamma Theta Upsilon, the National Geography Honor Society. He is past Lieutenant-Governor for Kiwanis for the State of Alabama, and was active in organizing the Carbondale Kiwanis group. He has also served since coming here as a trustee of the First Methodist Church of Carbondale.

2. Dr. William H. Freeberg, of the College of Education, from the rank of Instructor to the rank of Assistant Professor, effective September 11, 1950.

Dr. Freeberg, who is one of the younger members of our faculty, has been on the staff of the Department of Physical Education for Men since 1942, and has made a reputation for himself in the field of out-door education. During the past year he was awarded the degree of Doctor of Recreation by Indiana University, the first degree of its kind ever awarded. He has been in demand for reports on his research findings on recreational legislation, has presented papers at national conferences, and has published his results in national journals.

As a result of Dr. Freeberg's expertness in out-door education, we have asked him to direct a summer camping and out-door education program at Giant City State Park during the present

He has already met with success in coordinating the programs of various departments and in obtaining the help of State Officials for this venture.

His off-campus activities include work as a consultant to surrounding cities and towns in organizing their recreation programs, park programs, and community centers. He has also served as Regional Camping Director for the Boy Scouts of America and is a member of the Carbondale park and city recreation planning group.

3. Dr. Margaret Kaeiser, of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, from the rank of Assistant Professor to the rank of Associate

Professor, effective September 11, 1950.

Dr. Kaeiser, who has been a member of the Botany Department at Southern since 1947, has already distinguished herself in scholarship and teaching. She has published a report "Embryo Development in Taxodium Ascendens" in the Transactions of the Illinois Academy of Science (December, 1949). At the meeting of the Illinois Academy of Science last May she gave a report on one of her current research projects "The Structure of the Woods of the Three Southern Illinois Red Cedars". She is engaged in a cooperative research project with the University of Illinois on the Tropical Podocarpus. As a result of this work she has formed contacts with international authorities on tropical woods and has been invited to submit an article to the Wood Collectors Magazine. She has also been invited to read a paper at the Botanical Society of America next September. She was recently offered a position as research assistant to Dr. Paul B. Sears, distinguished botanist at Yale University, but has preferred to remain at Southern.

According to the chairman of her department, she has developed rapidly as a teacher and has taken on a great deal of

extra work in one of our under-staffed departments.

Dr. Kaeiser has several times been called upon to talk to local garden groups and has also served as Vice-President, and delegate to the State meeting, of the American Association of University Women.

4. Dr. W. C. McDaniel, of the College of Liberal Arts and Science, from the rank of Associate Professor to the rank of Professor, effective September 11, 1950.

Upon recommendation of Dean Abbott, we are also designating Dr. McDaniel as Chairman of the Department of Mathematics, effective July 1, 1950. During the past three years he

has served as Acting Chairman.

Dr. McDaniel has been active in local, state, and national mathematical organizations. In October, 1949, he was elected to the Board of Trustees of the Illinois Council of Teachers of Mathematics. Last spring he was elected Chairman of the Illinois section of the Mathematical Association of America and was Vice-President of this Association during the year 1949. He is a member of the American Mathematical Association and National Council of Teachers of Mathematics and has sponsored conferences for Southern Illinois Mathematics teachers during the summer session.

Dr. McDaniel's work on the campus has also been quite valuable. He is a member of the University Budget Committee, of the Salary Schedule Committee, and of the Council Advisory to the President. He has served as Secretary of the University Graduate Council, as financial advisor to the Homecoming Committee, as a member of the Advisory Committee of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, as faculty representative for the Blue Cross Hospital Service, and as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Jackson County Teachers Credit Union.

Dr. McDaniel has also lent his talents as a mathematician to statistical studies of Southern Illinois and Southern Illinois University. These studies have been of great value to us in providing arguments in Southern's behalf before the State General

Assembly.

In spite of the burden of these activities, Dr. McDaniel has continued to serve effectively and well as a teacher and as Acting Chairman of the Mathematics Department.

### REPORT ON ANNUAL AUDIT

D. Mersinger and Allison, Certified Public Accountants of Springfield and East St. Louis, have been designated by the Auditor of Public Accounts to make an examination of the records of the University for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1950. At the May 29, 1950 meeting of the Board, Mr. Miles was requested to obtain information regarding the responsibility of the audit firm and other information regarding responsibility for payment of the auditing services.

At the request of Mr. Miles, the Carbondale National Bank has made inquiries of one bank each in Springfield and East St. Louis regarding the character and ability of the auditing firm, and at the present writing, one letter has been received from the National Stock Yards National

Bank which reads as follows:

"We have your letter of the 8th, regarding Mersinger & Allison, C.P.As. of East St. Louis.

"We have personally known the members of this firm for several years. We also know that they enjoy a good local reputation and their reports have been readily accepted by banks in our community. I have every reason to feel that your customer will be well pleased with their service."

In a conversation with Mr. R. E. Willis, Chief Clerk in the State Auditor's Office, Mr. Miles was informed that an agreement had been made between the Department of Registration and Education and the Auditor's Office several years ago which provided that audits be made on the basis of the fiscal year and that payment therefor shall be made as follows:

Every other year the Auditor's Office will pay for the complete cost of the audit, and in other years, the Auditor's Office will pay for one-third of the cost of the audit.

Since the complete cost of the audit for 1949 was paid by the Auditor's Office, the University would be expected to pay for two-thirds of the cost of the audit for 1950.

Mr. Miles states that the firm of George Rossetter, Certified Public Accountants of Chicago, made the audit for the University of Illinois for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1949.

Mr. Lyerla moved that the Firm of Mersinger and Allison be approved to make the official audit for the Board of Trustees of the records of the University for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1950, and that the University be obligated to pay the amount certified as the University's share by the

### Report on Proposal for Reappraisal of Properties Adjoining Training School Site

E. We quote below for the consideration of the Board a letter received from Attorney Everett Prosser of Carbondale proposing reappraisal of properties adjoining the Training School site now under consideration for condemnation. Attorney Prosser is making this proposal in behalf of his clients, certain of the property owners involved:

"In confirmation of our conference of Wednesday, June 14th, I am herewith submitting in writing a proposition of settlement on behalf of my clients the Delta Sigma Epsilon Sorority, D. M. Karr, Gilbert Etherton, J. Ward Marberry, and Harry Flynn.

"The property owners have authorized me to suggest the appointment of a new appraisal committee, the committee to be appointed as follows: one member by the administration office of Southern Illinois University, one member by the above described property owners, and the third member to be appointed by those appointed in the method set out above. The said committee to be limited to qualified licensed appraisers, real estate brokers, officers of banking institutions, or others whose qualifications and knowledge of current real estate prices in and for Jackson County qualify them as such appraisers. The members of the original appraisal committee to be disqualified to serve on this new committee.

"It being understood and agreed that a written agreement be prepared stating that the decision as to value of this property as found by the committee is to be accepted as final both by the land holders and by the University. With the further provision that a prepared statement describing the property, its present condition and use thereof which statement would be read to the appraisers group before entering upon the premises and making their appraisal.

"We shall be pleased to have you make any suggestions that you feel advisable as to the mechanics of setting up the new appraisal group or the rules under which they are to operate.

"Please be advised that this offer is being made on behalf of the property owners with the desire to reach an amicable settlement without the necessity of a costly condemnation proceedings or the animosity which would naturally develop. May I have your early reply as to the possibility of this program being accepted."

It was the consensus of the members of the Board that if Mr. Prosser's suggestion concerning the appointment of a new appraisal committee to appraise the property in question was followed, it might create a precedent which would lead to future difficulties.

After a thorough discussion, Mr. Wham moved that the Board decline Mr. Prosser's proposal for reappraisal of property adjoining the Training School Site. The motion was seconded by Mr. Lyerla and was unanimously passed with each member recording his vote as follows:

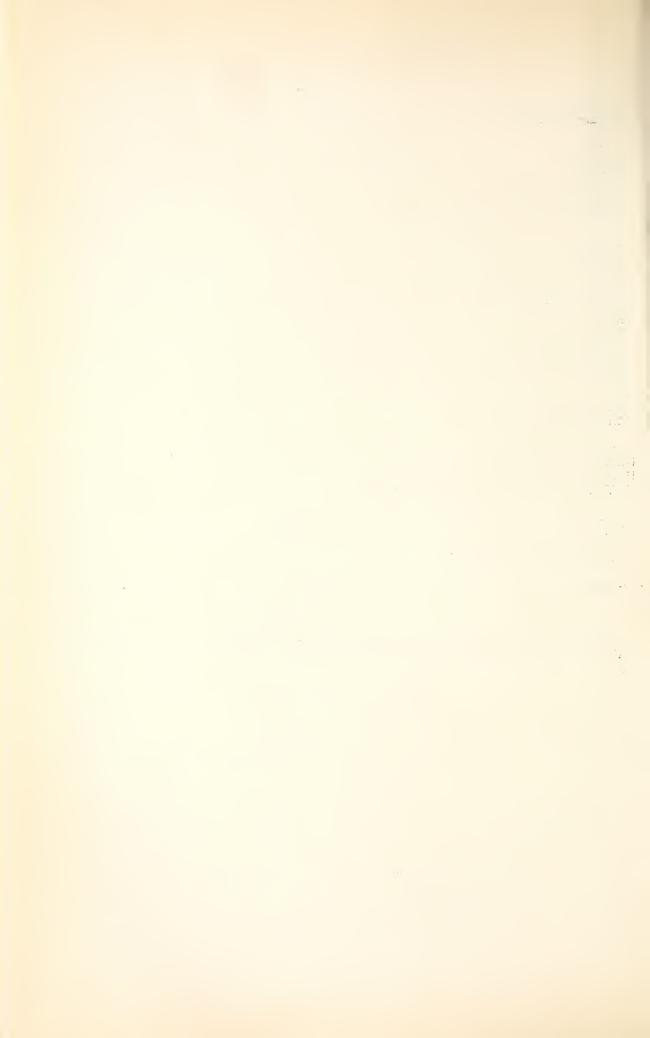

# BY-LAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

ARTICLE I. Meetings of the Board.

Section 1. Regular Meetings. Regular Meetings of the Board shall be held at least once each quarter of the academic year on the campus of the University. Additional regular meetings may be scheduled by the Board. Written notice of all regular meetings and of the agenda therefor shall be given by the Secretary to each member of the Board and to the President of the University not less than ten days prior to such meetings.

Section 2. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Board may be called by the Chairman of the Board upon his own initiative and he shall call a special meeting upon the request of three members. Notice of such meeting shall be given by written or telegraphic notice to all members of the Board at least twenty-four hours prior thereto. Such notice shall designate the time, place, and agenda of the meeting and the source of the call.

Section 3. Quorum. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business except as otherwise provided by these By-Laws. Any number less than a quorum present at a meeting, duly called, may adjourn from time to time until a quorum shall be in attendance.

Section 4. Action in Regular and Special Meetings. At all regular and special meetings it shall be valid to act on any subject within the power of the Board except as provided elsewhere in these By-laws. It shall be the policy of the Board, however, except in case of emergency, to act only upon matters set forth in the agenda or the consideration of which any absent member or members shall have had adequate prior notice.

Section 5. Place of Meetings. All regular quarterly meetings of the Board shall be held at the Southern Illinois University and other regular and special meetings shall be held on the campus unless otherwise ordered by the Board or another place of meeting is indicated in the written notice for a special meeting.

Section 6. Order of Business. The business at each regular or special meeting of the Board shall be conducted in the following manner unless otherwise authorized by appropriate Board action:

- A. Roll call of members.
- B. Reading and approval of minutes of last meeting.
- C. Reading and action with respect to minutes of prior Committee Meetings.
- D. Selection of officers.
- E. Reports and recommendations of the President of the University.
- F. Reports and recommendations of the Treasurer.
- G. Reports of Committees.
  - 1. Permanent Committees.
  - 2. Special Committees.
- H. Communications, petitions, and memorials.
- I. Unfinished Business.
- J. New Business.

Section 7. Rules of Procedure. Board meetings shall be conducted according to Roberts rules of parliamentary procedure, except as modified by the Board. The ayes and noes shall be called and entered upon each vote and any motion involving money shall be by call of the roll. Others may be by voice vote.

Section 8. Minutes. Minutes of the proceedings of the Board shall be kept by its Secretary, personally or by a competent deputy designated by the Board. Minutes of meetings of and actions recommended by the committees of the Board shall be kept by a secretary designated by each such Committee and shall be submitted to the Board for approval. They shall

be deposited with the Secretary of the Board. Action of the Board which utilizes material presented by reports or other documents shall, by the Secretary, be presented in the Minutes in such form as to include the full text of the action so that reference to other reports and documents is not necessary in order to determine the exact meaning of the action taken.

#### ARTICLE II. Officers of the Board.

Section 1. Election of Officers. The Board shall, at its first regular quarterly meeting of each fiscal year, elect by secret ballot from its own membership and by a majority vote of those present, a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary, who shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

Section 2. Determination of Duties. The officers of the Board shall perform the duties expressly enjoined upon them by the laws of this State and by the By-laws and Statutes of this Board and such other incidental duties as pertain to their respective offices.

Section 3. Duties of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board. The Chairman of the Board shall preside over all meetings of the Board. He shall, subject to the provisions of Article I, Section 2, with respect to notice, call the Board or Executive Committee into regular or special session at such times as he may deem it desirable or necessary or at any time upon the petition of three or more members of the Board. He shall have authority to decide any disputes as to the application or meaning of the By-laws and other legislation of the Board, but his decision shall be referred to the next regular or special meeting of the Board for final judgment and adjudication by the Board.

In the absence of the Chairman of the Board, in the event that he is unable to act as such, or in the event that the office becomes vacant, the Vice-Chairman shall act as Chairman of the Board and perform all the duties of the Chairman. In the absence of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman the members of the Board present shall select a Chairman pro tempore.

#### Section 4. Duties of the Secretary of the Board.

- A. He shall attend all meetings of the Board and shall keep a full and accurate record in a suitable book provided for that purpose of all votes and acts of the Board.
- B. He shall promptly furnish a copy of the Minutes of each regular or special meeting of the Board and of the Executive Committee to all members of the Board and to the President of the University.
- C. He shall notify all committees of their appointment and shall furnish to them a copy of all resolutions or orders assigning functions to such committees.
- D. He shall record all calls for meetings of the Board and shall notify all members of such meetings.
- E. He shall keep a record in a separate book of the names of all members of the Board of Trustees, the dates of their appointments, and the dates of the expiration of their terms of office, and a file of all reports made by the committees of the Board.
- F. He shall keep in a separate book a current complete record and text of the By-laws of the Board and shall publish the same, from time to time as directed by the Board.
- G. He shall keep in a separate book a current and complete record and text of the Statutes of the Board and shall publish the same from time to time as directed by the Board.
- H. Immediately after any change, amendment, or addition to the Bylaws, Statutes or Regulations of the Board, he shall furnish the President of the University with an official copy of the text thereof.
  - 1. He shall keep a separate record of all donations made to the institution, including Board action relating thereto.

Section 5. The Treasurer. The Treasurer of the Board of Trustees shall furnish a bond in such amount as the Board may require from time to time, but not for less than Ten Thousand Dollars.

#### ARTICLE III. Committees of the Board.

#### Section 1. Permanent Committees.

A. The Executive. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman and of two other members of the Board elected at the first regular meeting in each fiscal year. The Executive Committee shall have authority to transact such routine business as may arise during the recess of the Board and to act for the Board in all matters of an emergency nature upon which immediate decisions are necessary for the present welfare of the University.

Actions of the Executive Committee shall not become binding until ratified by the Board. All actions taken by this Committee shall be reported in writing to the Board at its next regular or special meeting for approval and ratification and shall be entered in full upon the Minutes of such meeting of such Board.

Section 2. Special Committees. Special committees may be appointed from time to time as the Board may deem expedient. Each committee shall be automatically discharged at the close of each fiscal year unless the Board takes specific action to extend its life beyond that period.

#### ARTICLE IV. Buildings.

Section 1. Buildings. The selection and employment of architects for all buildings of the University; the adoption of plans, specifications and details for such buildings; and the receiving of bids and awarding of contracts for the same shall be by the Board of Trustees.

Section 2. Superintendence of Construction. After any contract shall have been awarded for the construction of a new building, superintendence of the construction of such new building and its acceptance upon completion shall be under the general oversight of a special committee consisting of the President of the University, the members of the Board of Trustees, the Business Manager of the University, the Director of the Physical Plant, and the dean or head of the College or department to be served by such building, when completed, shall be an advisory member of such special committee.

#### ARTICLE V. Board Legislation.

Section 1. Classification of Board Legislation. Legislation by the Board shall be classified as (1) By-laws, (2) Statutes of the Board, and (3) Regulations.

Section 2. By-laws of the Board. Legislation concerning the organization, procedures, and functions of the Board of Trustees itself shall be classified as By-laws of the Board.

Section 3. Statutes of the Board. Legislation concerning the basic structure of the internal operating organization of the University shall be classified as Statutes of the Board.

Section 4. Regulations of the Board. Legislation concerning detailed matters of institutional organization and operation shall be classified as Regulations of the Board.

Section 5. Amendment of Board Legislation. The By-laws and Statutes of the Board may be changed or amended and additional By-laws and Statutes may be adopted at any regular or special meeting of the Board by vote of a majority of the total membership of the Board, provided that not less than two weeks' notice of the intention to change, amend, or add to the By-laws or Statutes in whole or in part (which notice may be included in the call for the meeting) shall have been given to the members of the Board of Trustees. Such notice shall be in writing and shall include the exact wording of the legislation proposed.

The Regulations of the Board may be changed and amended, and additional Regulations may be adopted at any regular or special meeting of the

Board upon the unanimous vote of the members thereof without prior formal notice, or by a majority vote of a regular quorum upon notice given as provided in Article I. Section 2. Such changes, amendments, and additions shall be upon formal motion, indicating specifically the change in, amendment of, or addition to the Regulations of the Board that is intended. An action of the Board which fails to embody such indication shall not have the status of a Regulation.

Section 6. Policy Concerning Consultation. It will be a policy of the Board, whenever practicable, to submit to appropriate subordinate University authority for comment and recommendation, prior to final action by the Board, any proposed Statutes or Regulations of the Board with respect to the internal operation of the University. The Board's freedom of action with respect to matters thus submitted shall not, however, be restricted by the recommendations made.

#### ARTICLE VI. Judicial Authority.

The Board retains its final judicial authority with respect to the interpretation and enforcement of the By-laws, Statutes, and Regulations of the Board and with respect to any controversy that may arise thereunder. It also retains its freedom to refuse jurisdiction, when in its opinion the judgment of subordinate authority should be determinative. The Board also retains its power to withdraw any specific case from the jurisdiction of the President or of any other agency of the University when, in the opinion of the Board, such action will best serve the purposes of justice.

#### ARTICLE VII. The Election of the President of the University.

The President of the University shall be the chief administrative officer of the internal operating organization of the University and shall be selected from time to time by the Board. No less than five affirmative votes shall be required for the initial election of a President of the University. His initial term of office shall be for not less than one year and he shall, thereafter, continue in such office at the will of the majority of the Board, who from time to time shall fix his salary. It will be the policy of the Board to confer with a special committee named by the University Faculty prior to the selection of a new president.
