NOTE

With the enactment of the Civil Administrative Code by the Fiftieth General Assembly, the five separate boards of trustees in charge of the State normal schools were succeeded by the State Normal School Board, consisting of nine members appointed by the Governor, and two ex-officio members—the Director of the Department of Registration and Education, who is designated as Chairman of the Board, and the Superintendent of Public Instruction, who is designated as Secretary of the Board.

This law became effective July 1st, 1917. Governor Frank O. Lowden appointed the following members who, together with the exofficio members, constituted the first State Normal School Board. In June, 1919, Mr. Brown retired from the Board, being succeeded by Frank B. Stitt, of El Paso.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD.

Springfield, Illinois, March 16, 1921.

The Normal School Board met at nine o'clock in the office of Director W. H. H. Miller, the chairman of the Board. The following members of the Board were present:

Messrs. Allen, Bridges, Capen, Neal, Owen, Richey, Walker, Miller, Blair.

Absent: Messrs. Goddard, Stitt.

All of the presidents of the normal schools were present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Fifteen minutes were allowed the president of each normal school to present his *budget* for the next biennium. At the conclusion of the reading of these budgets it was moved by Mr. Walker that the Board approve in detail the revised askings of the normal schools for the next biennium as presented by the presidents of the schools at this meeting, which askings shall be made a part of these minutes. Carried unanimously.

It was moved that the Normal School Board request that the bill covering the normal school appropriation be so amended that the appropriation for salary and wages be made in a lump sum and that the power to fix individual salaries and wages be left solely in the hands of the Normal School Board as is provided under the present Administrative Code. Carried unanimously.

The Board then adjourned.

REASONS FOR REQUESTED CHANGES IN THE BUDGET

SALARIES AND WAGES

Salaries at Normal have been increased but little during the past 20 years.

The biennial increase granted by the legislature during this period has been chiefly used in establishing new positions.

There has been no *general* increase in salaries since 1911, except an increase of fifteen per cent made two years ago. The average increase since 1913 has been less than 21 per cent.

Salaries in the public-school field have increased from 60 to 100 per cent since 1913.

The cost of living has more than doubled, and in spite of recent reductions wages in most occupations and retail prices are nearly 100 per cent higher than in 1913.

Transportation rates in Illinois have been raised 80 per cent besides the war tax.

Freight rates and Pullman rates have been almost doubled.

The increase in wages and salaries asked for is—Fifty per cent average increase in the present pay roll including the summer school for all persons now employed or their successors.

$$$169,766 + 50\% = \dots $254,649$$

Fifty per cent increase will make the salary rate average 80 per cent above the rate prevailing in 1913.

We ask \$16,000 to pay the principal and ten teachers at the S. O. Home, two of whom teach eleven months.

We deduct from the total, \$7000, which we expect to receive as reimbursement from the Federal Smith-Hughes Fund.

For new positions \$15,600. The positions contemplated are—

OFFICE EXPENSES

We ask \$1000 for publicity aside from ordinary printing. This will be used to finance home-comings, conferences, exhibitions, athletic and literary contests, among the high schools, and other new ways of attracting students.

TRAVEL

We ask \$2000 for traveling expenses of extension teachers. The fees collected from students in extension courses and turned into the State Treasury will meet this expense.

OPERATION

We ask larger amounts than the Budget—

For Seeds, Sprays, etc. for Campus, greenhouse, and garden \$150 per annum.

For	Power	3000	per	annum

The local light and power company have been granted an increase in rates to large users.

For School Supplies...... 4000. We are spending this amount today and there is no prospect of a marked decline in prices.

REPAIRS

The report of the State Engineer upon needed repairs at Normal was not made until December 6th, too late to be included in the Budget. He recommended-

We have asked for upkeep of machinery only half the sum recommended by the State Engineer, trusting that the Contingent Fund will be made large enough to provide additional funds if needed. The sum requested, \$2,500, we trust will cover the Reserve Pump and new valves recommended and the relining of the furnaces with fire brick.

Seven thousand dollars per annum is asked for ordinary repairs including the salary of the Utility man, (\$1,800), the repair of our telephone system, redecoration of walls in two buildings, refinishing of woodwork in Main Building, resurfacing of stairs, painting and upkeep of fences, new floors in library building.

The items below not included in the Budget are recommended by the

State Engineer.

EQUIPMENT

Because of our limited appropriations for four years, we have not made needed additions to our laboratory apparatus nor to our supply of books. The sums we request are based upon a careful survey of the needs of each department, for furniture, fixtures, apparatus, and books.

PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS

Our present gymnasium was erected in 1896. It is in almost constant use. We use also the gymnasium of the M. E. Church, and in summer the public-school gymnasium. The school law now requires physical training in all schools, and demands that the normal schools instruct teachers in this work. Our present facilities are far from adequate. We have one small gymnasium erected in 1896. The building requested will meet our needs for years to come.

The woman's dormitory now accommodates 83 girls. The proposed addition will contain an isolated infirmary for cases of contagious disease, and will provide rooms for 45 girls. The parlors, offices, dining room, and kitchen are of ample size.

VISUAL INSTRUCTION

In order that schools may realize the high value of visual instruction there must be in each state a distributing center whence educational films may be had at low cost. In many states such centers have been established at some one of the state's educational institutions. Wisconsin appropriates \$20,000 for this purpose. For two years we have distributed government films furnished by the Bureau of Education. If this work is to be continued it should be expanded and organized. We cannot undertake to continue and develop this work with less than 10,000 dollars per year.

A FEW FACTS ABOUT THE S. I. N. U.

Out total enrollment, exclusive of the Practice School, is 704. Of these, 572 are preparing to become teachers. Approximately 120 students will be graduated in June. Forty of these 120 seniors are young men. It is doubtful if any other normal school in the United States will this year graduate an equal number of young men. Our "Ag Club" is an organization of students, each of whom is carrying at least one course in Agriculture. The Club has more than 120 members. Ninety-five per cent of these young men expect to teach in country schools.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD.

Springfield, Illinois, May 16 and 17, 1921.

The Normal School Board met at nine A. M. in the office of Director W. H. H. Miller, chairman of the Board. The following members were present:

Messrs. Bridges, Capen, Neal, Owen, Richey, Stitt, Walker, Miller, Blair.

Absent: Messrs. Allen and Goddard.

All of the presidents of the normal schools were present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The chairman of the Board stated that the object of the meeting was to take action on the distribution of the emergency salary appropriation which had just been passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor. He spoke of a previous meeting in which the question of the distribution of these funds between the teachers and employees receiving upwards of \$100, or \$100 or less was discussed and an agreement reached. It was decided by the Board to conform as nearly as possible to the understanding that the fund should be distributed on the basis of thirty per cent for the semester for all teachers and employees receiving upwards of \$100 and on the basis of forty per cent for the semester for all teachers and employees receiving \$100 or less.

Omar Wright, Director of the Department of Finance was invited to confer with the Board. The matter was discussed before him somewhat in detail. While no positive commitment was made, the general impression was that he would approve of the action of the Board in making a distribution along the lines laid down in the action of the Board.

The presidents of the normal schools were then asked to make their recommendations of the distribution of this fund upon the agreed basis.

President Felmley made his recommendations for the distribution of the emergency fund for the increase of salaries of teachers for the current year. These recommendations were approved by the Board and are made a part of these minutes.

President Felmley submitted the names of the graduates of the normal school for the approval of the Board. The Board approved the recommendation with the understanding that certain diplomas should be witheld to the end of the summer term and final granting depend upon the completion of certain work in the summer term.

President Lord presented the names of seventy-three graduates. Approved by the Board.

President Brown presented the names of 117 graduates. Approved by the Board.

President Shryock presented the names of 125 graduates. Approved by the Board.

President Morgan recommended two appointments for the Macomb Normal School, which were approved by the Board.

President Shryock presented for discussion the question of the Contingent Fund. After some general discussion of the matter it was left without any definite action.

The Board authorized the presidents of the normal schools to employ teachers for the summer schools within provisions of the budget and that such appointments be submitted to the Board later for its approval.

The chairman of the Board was authorized to secure stationery with a letter-head for the use of the members of the Board.

Upon the motion of Mr. Richey the chairman and secretary were

designated a committee to formulate such rules as seemed necessary to govern the action of the Board in regular meetings.

The secretary of the Board was compelled to leave the meeting for a part of its session. The chairman appointed Mr. William B. Owen as Secretary pro tem.

During the afternoon and a part of the morning session the Board discussed a matter brought before it by Mr. Richey relating to the closer visitation and inspection of the normal schools by the members of the Board. At the conclusion he moved that the normal schools request of the normal school presidents an annual report on the efficiency of their teachers. Action upon this motion was deferred until later in the meeting.

When the Board met at nine o'clock on the morning of May 17th the discussion of the matter was continued. It was moved that Mr. Owen be appointed a committee to present a form of efficiency report of teachers to be presented by the normal schools and placed on file in the office of the chairman of the Board.

The presidents of the normal schools spoke on this motion. The plan in general was approved but it was agreed that such a report should not be made a matter of public record. The motion carried.

The Board adjourned.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE NORMAL SCHOOL BOARD.

Springfield, Illinois, July 6, 1921.

The Normal School Board met in the office of the Department of Registration and Education at nine o'clock July 6th, 1921. The following members were present:

Messrs. Miller, Blair, Capen, Neal, Stitt, Walker.
Absent: Messrs. Allen, Bridges, Goddard, Owen, Richey.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The reports of the presidents of the schools were called for.

President Morgan presented a list of graduates for the approval of the Board and a tentative list with the names of the faculty and employes and salaries as recommended for the year beginning July 1, 1921. The Board approved the recommendation. These lists are made a part of the minutes.

President Morgan also recommended a seal for the Western Illinois Normal School. Action upon this recommendation was deferred until President Morgan could inquire about the legality of the form of the seal.

President Shryock in his report presented his list of faculty and employes with salary recommendations for the year beginning July 1, 1921, which was approved by the Board and is made a part of these minutes.

The suggestion respecting the granting of a bachelor's degree to persons who had attended the normal school for a year, but who received their bachelor's degree in some other institution was referred to the normal school council for its consideration and report.

President Brown presented his salary report for faculty and employes for the year beginning July 1, 1921 which was approved by the Board. Power was given him to fill certain vacancies within the limits of the appropriation. His tentative list of instructors for the summer school was approved.

Report and lists are made a part of these minutes.

President Felmley was not present but his salary list for the faculty and employes for the year beginning July 1, 1921 was presented and approved by the Board, with the understanding that changes might be made with the approval of the Chairman of the Board. Report and lists are made a part of these minutes.

President Lord was not present but his tentative list of salaries for faculty and employes for the year beginning July 1, 1921 was presented and approved by the Board, with the understanding that

changes might be made with the approval of the chairman of the Board. Report and lists are made a part of these minutes.

Three additional names were presented for graduation from the Charleston Normal School:

Erna Lonetta Patterson Marguerite Mary McTaggart Trevor Knott Serviss

Livingston C. Lord was elected president of the Eastern Illinois State Teachers College at Charleston for the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, at an annual salary of \$6,500.

David Felmley was elected president of the Illinois State Normal University for the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, at an annual salary of \$6,500.

Henry W. Shryock was elected president of the Southern Illinois State Normal University for the biennium beginning July, 1, 1921 at an annual salary of \$6,500.

- W. P. Morgan was elected president of the Western Illinois State Teachers College at Macomb for the biennium beginning July 1, 1921 at an annual salary of \$6,500.
- J. Stanley Brown was elected president of the Northern Illinois State Teachers College at DeKalb for the biennium beginning July 1, 1921, at an annual salary of \$6,500.

Following the suggestion made at a former meeting, a uniform letter-head was proposed for use by the members of the Board and the presidents of normal schools. After considerable discussion, the form after being modified, was adopted by the Board.

The Board discussed in some detail the situation resulting from the veto of the "Revolving Fund" which veto rested upon the opinion of the Attorney General that such a fund was unconstitutional.

The Board ordered that the same arrangement which had been followed for the last four years should be continued and authorized the Chairman of the Board to enter into the proper agreement with the presidents of the normal schools for the management of the dormitories, farms and text-book supplies.

The question of the desirability of making the diplomas of the teachers' colleges uniform in their general character was discussed and seemed to meet with the approval of the Board. The matter was referred to a committee consisting of the presidents of the normal schools and the Secretary of the Board to decide upon the form of such a diploma.

The Board adjourned.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN ILLINOIS STATE NORMAL UNIVERSITY

July 5, 1921.

1. ATTENDANCE:

Our attendance for the spring term which closed June 22, was 1057; 944 were registered in the normal department. Our attendance for the present summer term is 846; with one exception, the largest in the history of the school, the exception being the spring term of 1916. It should be kept in mind, however, that in 1916 we had no regularly organized mid-spring term.

II. FACULTY:

Faculty schedule for first session of the summer term, with amounts to be paid, will be found attached.

I recommend for reelection, at the salaries indicated, the members of the faculty whose names appear on attached list.

I recommend the election of the following persons:

Miss Alberta Gibbons, second assistant, department of mathematics, at a salary of \$2000.00. Miss Gibbons is a graduate of the Metropolis High School, an A. B. of the University of Illinois, and an A. M. of Columbia. She has taught, I think, seven years, five years in the high school at Fairfield, Iowa.

Mr. Harold K. Pritchard, half time, in charge of classes in wind instruments. Mr. Pritchard is a graduate of our school; has for the last five years done an immense amount of work without pay. He wants to do our senior college work, and I am sure half of his time will be worth \$1000.00 per year to us.

Miss Ruby Robertson, \$600.00, part time, piano department. Miss Robert son has taught for us two years as student help. Her work is thoroughly satisfactory, and I wish to retain her with an increase in pay.

Mr. Ralph Swain, who has been a member of our orchestra and who has been supposed to do a half day's teaching in the wind instrument division of the orchestra, is not a candidate for re-election.

Twenty or more members of the faculty will be on duty the second session of the summer term. The list of names will be submitted later. I recommend that we divide equally among the twenty or more, the \$5000.00 set apart for the work of the session. The session will open Monday, August 1, and close Friday, September 2. In order to get in the required number of days it will be necessary to keep the school at work four Saturdays.
