

AUGUST 3, 1956

THE AUGUST MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held at the University camp on Little Grassy Lake on Friday, August 3, 1956, beginning at 11:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer. Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Kern, and Mr. Nickell were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Dean John Erle Grinnell of the College of Education, William H. Freeberg, Chairman, Recreation and Outdoor Education, Business Manager Edward V. Miles, Jr., Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

Prior to the business meeting, Associate Professor William H. Freeberg, Chairman of the Department of Recreation and Outdoor Education, explained the scope of the educational program of the University's camp at Little Grassy Lake, and stressed the need for expansion of facilities. Dean John Erle Grinnell of the College of Education emphasized the desire expressed by various University departments for greater participation in the outdoor education program when facilities are available.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on June 29, 1956, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) INTERNAL ORGANIZATION OF THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION During his first year, Dean J. E. Grinnell of the College of Education has made an intensive study of the internal organization of his college. He has consulted with the members of his staff and with other University administrators, has examined the internal organization of colleges of education on other campuses, and has benefited by the consultant services of Professor Alonzo F. Myers, Chairman of the Department of Higher Education at New York University. He has made certain recommendations for reorganizing the College of Education.

Approval is requested for the following departments in the College of Education, to be activated at such time as seems most practical between now and July 1, 1958.

Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Health Education Physical Education-Men (Academic) Physical Education-Men (Nonacademic) Men's Intramurals Physical Education-Women Recreation and Outdoor Education Educational Theory and Practice Administration and Supervision **Elementary Education** Secondary Education Guidance Special Education Instructional Materials Teacher Training University School Affiliated Schools

In most cases, these departments are already in existence in substantially this recommended form. In some cases, the functions are in existence, but not as formal departments. In many cases, chairmen have already been named. In other cases, it will be necessary to obtain chairmen by carefully reviewing candidates both from the present staff and from other institutions, and assigning them to the departments in accordance with the procedure for such assignments provided in the University Statutes.

Professor Tenney pointed out two major changes involved; namely, the present Department of Guidance and Special Education would be divided into two separate departments, and the Department of Instructional Materials would replace what is presently called Library Service.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the departments for the College of Education, as requested. (B) CONTRACTS AND PURCHASE ORDERS AWARDED DURING THE MONTHS OF MAY AND JUNE, 1956, AMOUNTING TO LESS THAN \$1,000.00

Death

With regret, we report the death of Mr. Lawrence Voss, Assistant Professor of Speech. Mr. Voss was born May 23, 1905, and died July 23, 1956. He was appointed to Southern's faculty in 1950. He received the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from Cornell University and served for five years as technical director of the Cornell University Theater. He served in a similar capacity for Southern's Little Theatre, wrote extensively for *Players Magazine*, and recently obtained a patent on a design for a theatre lighting system. He was a very imaginative and effective designer for the stage and did much to improve the quality of the University's dramatic productions.

The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(G) changes in civil service employees' payrolls from

JANUARY 1, 1956, THROUGH JUNE 30, 1956

A report showing changes in civil service employees' payrolls for the period from January 1, 1956, through June 30, 1956, was presented. A copy of the report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved and ratified such changes. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(H) REGULATION OF STUDENT OPERATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES A. Some Aspects of the Problem of Parking and Motor Vehicles

1. Commuters continue to comprise a large segment of the student body.

2. Although University parking facilities have been greatly increased in recent years, parking pressures continue to increase.

3. The number of student-operated cars is greatly increased.

4. The number of faculty-operated cars is greatly increased.

5. As the area-oriented aspects of the University program have developed, more people more frequently come to the University campus.

6. Increased utilization of evening hours for regular classes causes serious parking conflicts with activity, conference, and cultural meetings.

7. The city streets of Carbondale continue to be glutted with parked cars and increasing traffic pressures.

8. Student and staff commuters encounter great difficulty in finding parking space.

9. Recently the City of Carbondale has considered the enactment of ordinances to prevent overnight parking on streets adjacent to the campus, thus eliminating Monday through Friday storage of cars on city streets.

10. The University is studying construction of a peripheral storage parking area.

11. The University is presently constructing two new parking areas and making substantial enlargements in others.

12. For planning purposes it is vital that policy determination be made to serve as a basis for provision of future parking facilities as to nature, scope, and location.

B. Some Related Aspects of Parking and Motor Vehicle Usage by Students 1. The number of commuting students is large and will continue large, but it is and will continue to be proportionately smaller as the total student body grows larger. a) More students are coming from more distant locations.

b) More housing is being developed both by the University and by private interests in the community.

2. The realization of adequate and growing library facilities provides for more satisfactory utilization of student time.

3. The Student Center building, planned for early construction, will provide for better utilization of student time.

4. Campus planning includes early development of recreational facilities within easy walking distance of the central campus area, as well as provisions for bicycle traffic.

C. Motor Vehicles versus the Educational Process

1. It is felt that use of motor vehicles while in the University does not contribute directly to the educational process.

2. When the concentrated accumulation of motor vehicles becomes excessive it is felt that environmental losses occur.

3. Insofar as possible in an increasingly mechanized world, an atmosphere of quiet contemplation is to be desired on a university campus.

D. Recommended Policy

1. The basic principle of the policy recommended has been considered and approved by

a) Parking Committee, July 18, 1956

b) Student Council, July 21, 1956

c) University Council, July 24, 1956

2. It is recommended that beginning with the summer session of 1957 freshmen will not be permitted to use motor vehicles, and that in each successive year the restriction will extend to the next advanced class until it applies to all students enrolled in the University, except that administrative regulations will be developed to provide for necessary and proper exceptions, with due study of such factors as distance from the University campus, physical handicaps of individual students, married status, students over twenty-one, special problems relating to summer sessions, and individual cases such as outside employment involving transportation.

E. Advantages of the Recommended Policy

1. Application is gradual and delayed for a year to allow for extensive study to develop regulations for application in order to avoid individual hardships. (Students will participate largely in this study.)

2. Provides current students with an opportunity to develop understanding of the policy and to participate in its implementation.

3. Provides time for proper information to be furnished to parents and guardians whose co-operation will be vital.

4. Attains a long range objective of a "walking and bicycling" campus.

5. Encourages private enterprise to establish a Carbondale bus service.

6. Provides the City of Carbondale with time

a) To meet the increased need for safe and adequate sidewalks and efficient street lighting to protect the pedestrian traffic.

b) To study and provide for the problems in connection with large increases in bicycle traffic.

7. Provides a period during which it is expected that the University will

a) Construct additional housing facilities.

b) Provide accessible recreation areas, as for example, around, on, and in Thompson Lake.

c) Extend library facilities.

d) Construct a Student Center building.

e) Construct adequate physical education facilities.

f) Construct adequate campus-wide bicycle paths and bicycle racks.

g) Attempt to provide more adequately for necessary parking in the face of large increases in students and staff, with the nation-wide bulge in enrollment to begin in 1957.

8. Has the endorsement of the appropriate employee and student committees and councils.

9. It seems reasonable to expect that the policy will be executable.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved the recommendation regarding parking regulations, with the understanding that definite policies and administrative procedures would be determined. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

The construction of a sanitary sewer from the corner of Park and Wall Streets in the City of Carbondale, to East College Street, was discussed. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board authorized the administration to negotiate with the City Council for the joint construction of this work upon terms and conditions which seem equitable. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris requested that the Board consider whether or not a joint audit with the Auditor of Public Accounts is desirable for the future, or if the Board wished an independent audit. The Board agreed to authorize the administration to discuss the matter of the audit with the State Auditor, work out a recommended procedure, and then submit the proposal to the members of the Board by letter for approval.

President Morris explained that Dr. Aaron J. Brumbaugh was chosen by the Governing Boards Committee of the Governor's Commission on Higher Education to visit the various state institutions and to study the governing boards. He stated that during his talk with Dr. Brumbaugh he had personally agreed to support an over-all policy-type board, commission, or council for higher education, made up of equal representation from the existing boards (i.e., the Teachers College Board, the University of Illinois Board of Trustees, and the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University).

Mr. Wham presented a letter received from the Illinois Citizens Education Committee, Urbana, Illinois, requesting nominations for lay members of this newly organized committee, which is concerned with education at all levels. The administration was requested to make such nominations.

The meeting was adjourned at 5 p.m.

Meeting of the Board of Trustees

of

Southern Illinois University

SEPTEMBER 27, 1956

THE SEPTEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the offices of the Board, Carbondale, Illinois, on Thursday, September 27, 1956, beginning at 11 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Robert L. Kern, Harold R. Fischer. Mr. Nickell was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Edward V. Miles, Jr., Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on August 3, 1956, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, these minutes were approved as presented.

The Board entered executive session, following which Lindell W. Sturgis left the meeting.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) AGREEMENT WITH SHURTLEFF COLLEGE

For several years Southern Illinois University has been engaged in discussions with Shurtleff College about a possible co-operative arrangement for the offering of extension courses in and near Alton, Illinois. These discussions have centered on the possibility of Southern Illinois University's using the facilities of Shurtleff College without, at the same time, duplicating or competing with the offerings of Shurtleff College. They were interrupted by a change of administration at Shurtleff College, but its recently appointed President, the Reverend Roland E. Turnbull, has recently informed us that the Shurtleff Board of Trustees is willing to accept the following proposal for the handling of Southern Illinois University extension courses on the campus of Shurtleff College:

TENTATIVE PROPOSAL FOR THE HANDLING OF SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY EXTENSION COURSES ON THE CAMPUS OF SHURTLEFF COLLEGE

That Southern Illinois University, in order to serve educational needs of the residents in the general Alton area not being met by other institutions of higher education, will rent certain classroom space and other facilities from Shurtleff College.

That Southern Illinois University shall have complete freedom in selecting for scheduling of courses to be offered on the Shurtleff campus any courses which are open exclusively to graduate students.

That Southern Illinois University shall confer with Shurtleff College before scheduling any courses on the Shurtleff campus or in the City of Alton open to undergraduate students, in order to prevent duplication of effort by the two institutions.

That Southern Illinois University shall be basically responsible for publicizing its offerings.

That Southern Illinois University shall be privileged to forward books from its library on the Carbondale campus directly to Shurtleff College library, these books being ready to sign out; that the staff of Shurtleff College handle the signing out of these books to students in Southern's classes; that Southern's students have the privilege not only of studying in the Shurtleff College library, but also of signing out books from the Shurtleff collection (provided this is not prohibited by regulations of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools).

That the staff of Shurtleff College handle the registration of Southern Illinois University's students on its campus, but that representatives of the two institutions shall confer on the time for carrying out this process, so that Shurtleff College's usual procedures for registration may not be interrupted.

That suitable temporary space be made available for the use of Southern's representatives on those occasions when they are on the Shurtleff campus to assist in the conduct of courses and in the advisement of Southern's students.

That Southern Illinois University have the privilege of using classroom space and dormitory space for the scheduling of workshops or similar activities during the summer months, if this space is not required for the activities of Shurtleff College at that time, any conflicts of interest being resolved by conferences between representatives of the two institutions.

That representatives of Southern Illinois University shall confer with the proper authorities of Shurtleff College before determining the exact

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time of day for Southern's extension classes to be in session, but that in general at least the following minimum provisions shall obtain:

1. That all classrooms in which lecture classes are scheduled shall be available at least ten minutes before and after the scheduled class time.

2. That all laboratory space shall be made available for at least sixty minutes before the scheduled class time, and for thirty minutes following the scheduled closing time.

That Shurtleff College shall provide all janitorial services, all cost of heat and light, and the miscellaneous costs of such small items as chalk, erasers, etc., normally found in classrooms, but that Southern Illinois University shall furnish all special equipment such as maps, motion picture projectors, laboratory supplies, and other similar items, except where by conference it is determined that these materials can be obtained from Shurtleff College, each case being determined on its merits.

That Southern Illinois University shall reimburse Shurtleff College for all the above-mentioned services at the rate of \$1.25 for each student credit hour of work paid for by students taking Southern Illinois University extension courses on the Shurtleff College campus. For example, if thirty students register and pay their fees for a course carrying four quarter-hours of credit, the charge by Shurtleff College for the various services would be 30 x 4 x 1.25, or \$150.00 for the course.

Approval is requested for the principles of co-operation involved in this agreement.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the principles of co-operation involved in the agreement presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(B) CONTRACTS AND COPYRIGHTS FOR THE UNIVERSITY PRESS

The newly appointed editor of the University Press has pointed out the desirability of having a consistent style for contracts with the authors of books published by the University Press, and for the copyrights of such books. Although in the various university presses of the country different styles are used, contracts are most often made out in the name of the press itself, and the press applies for and holds the copyrights.

At Harvard University such copyrights are sometimes taken out in the name of the President and Fellows of the University. At the University of California they are always taken out in the name of the Regents of the University. At certain universities, including the University of Chicago, the University of Florida, the University of Minnesota, and Cornell University, they are taken out in the name of the university. The following list, however, shows that the most common practice is for the copyrights to be taken out in the name of the press itself:

Authorization is therefore requested for the Southern Illinois University Press to enter into contracts with the authors of the books it publishes, and to apply for the copyrights of these publications.

In the discussion which followed, the Legal Counsel advised that the University Press does not possess the necessary legal status for such an authorization. It was therefore suggested that the matter be given further consideration by the University administration, and be re-submitted to the Board, with recommendations, at a subsequent meeting.

(C) contracts and purchase orders awarded during the months of july and august, 1956, amounting to less than 1,000.00

The Board received a report of contracts and purchase orders awarded during the months of July and August, 1956, amounting to less than \$1,000.00, in the total amount of \$145,047.98.

(J) establishment of student union building agency and restricted account

At the present time the University has been placing the interest received from the investment of agency and restricted funds in the Unappropriated Student Activity Fees account. Legal requirements governing the investment of funds by a public officer or body require that income received from investments must revert to the fund from which the investment was made. It is, therefore, recommended that the administration be authorized to establish a Student Union Building Fund as both an agency and restricted account and that all income received from the investment of funds from either of these sources be deposited in the respective Student Union Building Fund account. The purpose of this recommendation is to enable the interest received from investment to be available for the Student Union Building.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board authorized the administration to establish Student Union Building Funds, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris distributed copies of the proceedings of the 33rd meeting of a national organization known as The Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions, together with a brochure describing the services and functions of the organization. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that membership in the organization would be beneficial. The administration was requested to prepare a suggested motion or resolution, approving application for membership by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, and to place it on the agenda for the next regular Board meeting.

Mr. Lindell W. Sturgis re-entered the meeting at this time.

On September 4, 1956, a letter was circulated among the members of the Board by the administration, recommending that C. J. Schlosser and Company of Alton, Illinois, be selected for an independent audit of the University, and that the State Auditor be requested to pay one-third of the total cost of the audit. Approval by the members of the Board was unanimous, as indicated by signatures on the above-mentioned letter.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board ratified the action taken by letter, regarding the selection of an auditing firm. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris presented for discussion the problem of a sewer connecting the University sewer at Wall and Park Streets with the city sewer at College Street. This matter had been discussed previously.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the matter was left in the hands of the administration with power to act on behalf of the Board, but the President of the University was authorized to call a special meeting of the Board if he deemed it necessary or desirable. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris stated that in 1949 a Residence Center was established in Belleville, with general commitments with regard to that area. During the past year or two, interested persons in Edwardsville started working for a college in the area, and requested Professor Tenney to go there to discuss needs and alternatives. President Morris requested that Mr. Robert L. Kern give his impressions of a follow-up meeting, held at Edwardsville on September 15, 1956.

Mr. Kern stated that Professor Tenney had previously put before the Edwardsville group the following alternatives: (1) greater concentration of extension offerings by Southern Illinois University and other colleges; (2) a junior college; (3) a branch four-year college from an existing university; and (4) a university of their own. Mr. Kern indicated that the group had decided on the branch four-year college, to be established by Southern Illinois University. He pointed out that the heavy industries in the area were experiencing difficulty in securing college graduates to fill administrative and executive positions in their organizations. He also explained that President Morris was named a member of an Executive Committee appointed for the purpose of investigating the situation, and that the committee had been requested to report their findings early in November.

President Morris indicated that the highly industrialized area on the east side of the river has great potentialities for improvement in many fields, and that the need for cohesive educational leadership was imperative. He stated that the Edwardsville group had appointed a committee to meet with the Board of Trustees and discuss the matter, including the proposed establishment of a branch of Southern Illinois University. It was the consensus of the Board that such a meeting would be agreeable.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M.

Meeting of the Board of Trustees

OCTOBER 23, 1956

A SPECIAL MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and members of the Executive Committee of the Southwestern Illinois Council for Higher Education was held in the office of the Board on Tuesday, October 23, 1956, beginning at 12:30 P.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Robert L. Kern. Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, and Mr. Nickell were absent.

The following members of the Executive Committee were present: Dr. Robert Lynn, Robert Maucker, Dr. Frank L. Eversull, Miss Berenice Goedde, Matt Welch, Mrs. Lester Klope, George Moorman, Sr., and Truman Davis.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Associate Professor Harold W. See, Professor Raymond H. Dey, Edmund C. Hahesy of Information Service, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisian*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The meeting was called to order by John Page Wham, Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Wham welcomed the visitors and stated that he was especially pleased to see Dr. Eversull, who had at one time served as a member of Southern Illinois University's Board of Trustees. He then turned the meeting over to Dr. Lynn, Chairman of the Executive Committee.

Dr. Lynn explained that the Committee was composed of people from Madison and St. Clair counties, and that their work was the outgrowth of a movement started by a group of citizens in Edwardsville who were interested in obtaining facilities for high education in that community, but who discovered that the problem was beyond the scope of a small community. They had therefore arranged a meeting of a larger group of representatives from Madison and St. Clair counties, and from that meeting this Executive Committee was formed. The Executive Committee, which represented 400,000 people, was given a directive to proceed with as much dispatch as possible with the problem confronting them. Since Southern Illinois University seemed to have been interested in the Madison and St. Clair counties area, and has a kindred spirit in these matters, the Committee was asking it as an established University to help solve this problem. Mr. Maucker, a member of the Executive Committee, then stated that they had gone on record in favor of an institution to provide four years of college training. They were not interested as a Committee in anything less than that.

Dr. Lynn then pointed to the increasing enrollment in the public schools and the potential number of college students, and indicated that while the need was immediate his Committee recognized that study and time might be necessary to arrive at the goal.

Dr. Eversull, speaking as a member of the Committee, stated that there would be no difficulty in getting thousands of people in industries in the area who would come during off-shift or excused time to attend night classes. He also thought that there was need for more educational opportunities for teachers, scientists, and adults.

Dr. Eversull and Dr. Lynn both stated that they had never felt such a public pressure for any movement as the pressure that was being brought to bear in the Madison and St. Clair counties area for additional higher education facilities.

Mr. Wham, speaking for the Board of Trustees, then said that the Board had been mindful of these increasing needs and some years ago had initiated efforts to meet them through extension services, but that it now seemed evident that the problem could not be solved through extension courses.

Dr. Lynn then asked the other members of the Executive Committee to speak on the point of need.

Miss Goedde pointed out that many students in their area could not afford to leave the area to attend school, and that some means should be found to serve these people. Mr. Welch stated that the rapid growth of Southern Illinois University indicated that it might need to have some of the load taken off its campus, and that by setting up a branch it would be doing a favor to all the people of Southern Illinois. Mrs. Klope stated that PTA groups in her district were fully behind the Committee, and Dr. Lynn emphasized that the Committee was expressing the views of those in the area who were thinking about the program. Mr. Moorman indicated his surprise at the way the popular support for the movement had snowballed since Edwardsville had first taken an interest in it. Mr. Truman Davis stated that no one was more conscious than labor that the area needed higher education at a lower cost.

Mr. Wham then asked Mr. Kern of the Board of Trustees for a statement of his views. Mr. Kern stated that the idea of a school in the Madison and St. Clair counties area was something that was indispensable and that the pressure for it was coming from the grass roots. He pointed out that it is difficult to start such things unless there is genuine support from the rank and file of the people. He stated that the Board of Trustees, if it saw fit to go into this matter, would have as its big problem financing at the state level. The members of the Executive Committee then said that this was one of the points upon which they needed advice, and asked how they should go about setting up a budget and obtaining action on it.

At this point Mr. Wham explained that certain members of the Board of Trustees had not been able to attend this specially called meeting but that Mr. Fischer, being mindful of this problem, had written a letter stating that he heartily concurred in the idea that Southern Illinois University should be the guiding hand under which a new school in the Madison and St. Clair counties area should operate. He also stated that for practical purposes he believed that it should be centrally located somewhere in the Madison–St. Clair center of population but far enough to the east of those areas to justify the acquisition of ample acreage both for now and for the future, without paying prohibitive prices. He also felt the school should be close enough to the industrial centers to easily, properly, and profitably furnish the trained personnel that is the recognized need of all successful businesses.

President Morris then reviewed the history of Southern Illinois University's activities in the area and stated the need of convincing the Governor and the Legislature about what should be done.

Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, and Mr. Sturgis all indicated their sympathy with the request of the Executive Committee.

Mr. Wham then stated that the Board's problem is what can be done, and what should be done, to further the project. He stated that the Board had its responsibilities on the Carbondale campus, which has had to get along on meager rations, and that it would not wish to take any action which would be harmful either to the proposed project or to the University.

Mr. Moorman reported that the Edwardsville group had written to Dr. L. R. Lohr, Chairman of the Governor's Commission on Higher Education, telling him of their desire for a four-year school in the Madison and St. Clair counties area and asking his co-operation. His reply was that they should appeal to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

Dr. Lynn proposed a special study by experts, but President Morris stated that the study phase is pretty well done and that it might be possible to rely on studies already made.

Following a short intermission, Mr. Kern moved that the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University express its profound interest in the serious situation in regard to higher educational facilities in the southwestern area of Illinois and further, that the Board make accelerated provision for higher education facilities in the said area as quickly as necessary state and other funds become available. The motion was seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, and was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard nay, none.

There was much discussion of ways and means of proceeding, and it was finally agreed that the University would recommend provisions for starting the program in its biennial budget request for the University. The E tive Committee also stated that it would report to the larger group that it would stand by and be ready for anything it could do. The meeting was adjourned at 4 р.м. NOVEMBER 15, 1956

THE NOVEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board, Carbondale, Illinois, on Thursday, November 15, 1956, beginning at 9 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Kenneth L. Davis, Melvin C. Lockard, Mrs. Stella Collins, Robert L. Kern, Harold R. Fischer. Mr. Nickell was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Assistant Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on September 27, 1956, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

Minutes of a special meeting held on October 23, 1956, were presented. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, these minutes were approved unanimously.

Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board adopt the following resolution.

WHEREAS, Membership by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions would permit the Board of Trustees to send representatives to the meetings of that organization; and

WHEREAS, The Association is primarily interested in the problems of laymen who serve the cause of higher education as board members; and

WHEREAS, At each annual meeting subjects are presented of particular value to board members; and

WHEREAS, The Association serves as a clearing house for the exchange of information among boards, be it

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University be authorized to write a letter to the secretary of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions, expressing a desire to join the Association. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board, notice of the intention to recommend an amendment to Part III, Article VIII, Section 4, A. of the Statutes of the Board of Trustees was mailed to each member of the Board on October 12, 1956. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted unanimously an amendment to the section designated as follows.

Section 4. Degrees and Awards Authorized.

A. The following earned degrees are authorized:

Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.), Master of Science in Education (M.S. in Ed.), Master of Science (M.S.), Master of Arts (M.A.), Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.), Master of Music (M.M.), Master of Music Education (M.M.Ed.), Bachelor of Science in Education (B.S. in Ed.), Bachelor of Music Education (B.Mus.Ed.), Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Science (B.S). Bachelor of Music (B. Mus.).

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT MORRIS

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) MINOR IN RELIGION

In co-operation with the various religious foundations close to the Southern Illinois University campus, the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences has worked out the details of a proposed minor in religion. For some years the University has recognized and accepted by transfer courses taught by staff members of these foundations. The foundations have submitted the credentials of these staff members for scrutiny by the University, so that the same standards can be applied to the staffing of their courses as are applied to the staffing of regular University courses. In accordance with practice prevailing at other state-supported universities, up to fifteen quarter-hours of credit in religion have been accepted for credit toward a degree. Fifteen hours, however, are not sufficient to constitute a minor in religion, since a minor ordinarily consists of twenty-four quarter-hours or more of related courses in a particular field.

The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences has therefore proposed that it sponsor a minor of thirty hours in religion, not more than fifteen hours of which are to be taught by the foundations, with the remaining hours to be supplied by University departments offering existing courses (sociology, English, psychology, history, and philosophy).

Since this proposal would not diminish the University's control over the courses taught, and since the amount and quality of the work accepted

from the foundations would remain the same as in the past, approval of the proposed minor in religion was recommended.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board approved the proposed minor in religion.

(B) EXPANSION OF RESIDENCE CENTER OFFERINGS

Southern Illinois University has been under considerable pressure to provide additional college-level work in the Madison–St. Clair County area, which is one of the most heavily populated areas in Illinois, but also one of the areas most lacking in facilities for higher education. At its August 6, 1949, meeting the Board of Trustees approved the establishment of an off-campus residence center at Belleville, Illinois. Although this residence center has been in operation during the intervening time it has not met the needs of the area for the following reasons:

1. The courses at the Belleville Residence Center were originally designed to aid public-school teachers to obtain additional training. Since 1949, however, there has been a growing interest in a diversified program of training for other professions as well.

2. The offerings at Belleville have hitherto been concentrated largely at the senior-college and graduate levels. There is now a demand for a full four years of undergraduate instruction.

3. The growth of the Junior College at Belleville has made it difficult for Southern Illinois University to expand undergraduate offerings in this area without appearing to be directly in competition with the aims and interests of the Belleville Junior College. Other communities in the area feel, however, that the Belleville Junior College does not take care of their needs and that junior colleges in general cannot provide the kind of training now required.

At a special meeting held on October 23, 1956, the Board of Trustees recognized the interest of the citizens of the Madison–St. Clair County area in obtaining additional facilities for higher education and in obtaining the assistance and leadership of Southern Illinois University to that end. As a first step it was proposed that Southern Illinois University examine carefully the possibility of establishing additional residence centers in the Madison–St. Clair County area, as the existence of specific needs and available facilities in the area become clear. In both the budget for operations and the budget for capital improvements, provisions for additional staff members and for planning the appropriate physical facilities are being recommended. During the planning period the increase of residence center staff and offerings would provide the nucleus of a student body and of a faculty for any further developments.

Approval was therefore requested for the establishment of residence centers in one or more communities in addition to Belleville. President Morris indicated that the Commission on Higher Education had authorized the employment of an expert to make an objective and detailed survey of higher education in southwestern Illinois, and to report his findings to the Commission at the earliest possible time.

After discussion, Melvin C. Lockard moved that the Board approve the establishment of residence centers in one or more communities in addition to Belleville. The motion was seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(C) rate of pay for substitute teachers

For the past several years the University School has been paying qualified substitute teachers at the rate of \$12.00 per day. This is equivalent to \$240.00 per teaching month, or \$2,160.00 for the academic year. In view of the salary rates now current for qualified members of the continuing staff, this figure appears to be much too low. It was therefore recommended that substitutes be paid at the rate of \$18.00 per day, effective with the beginning of the winter term, January 2, 1957.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the above recommendation. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(D) STANDARDIZATION OF CLASS RING

Approximately two years ago, the Student Council and class representatives agreed upon a standardized class ring. Specifications for the ring were approved by the Student Council on July 21, 1956, and by the Acting Director of Student Affairs on October 10, 1956. Standardization of the class ring would enable seniors and alumni to purchase rings from the University Store, with confidence that the basic design will not be changed at frequent intervals.

Approval was requested for the following specifications for a standardized ring for Southern Illinois University: weight—men, $8\frac{1}{2}$ dwt, ladies, $4\frac{1}{2}$ dwt; quality—10K gold; spellout bezel—Southern Illinois University 1869; stone size—men, 12/10 oval, ladies, 8/5 oval; stone choice—synthetic ruby, synthetic blue spinel, and black onyx; special features—as shown on sketch, Old Main on right shank and Saluki emblem on left, with triangular, modernistic arrangement of small triangular area for date and degree if desired; stone finish—men, single facet with buff top to permit encrusting, ladies, double facet; optional—stone back may be enclosed with translucent sealer to permit passage of light and to eliminate collection of dirt behind stone; finish—bright yellow 10K with brown rose in feature areas.

Drawings of the proposed standard class ring, and a jeweler's sample, were presented for inspection by the members of the Board.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board approved unanimously the above specifications.

(E) CONTRACTS AND PURCHASE ORDERS AWARDED DURING THE

MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, 1956, AMOUNTING TO LESS THAN \$1,000.00 The Board received a report of contracts and purchase orders awarded during the month of September, 1956, amounting to less than \$1,000.00, in the total amount of \$72,647.53.

(M) acquisition of land

A recommended resolution regarding Tract 43 was presented. This property, located on Thompson Street, lies immediately west of the Office of the Graduate School and the Home Economics Nursery, and in the center of the campus.

The owner, J. Henry Schroeder, is a member of the University faculty. Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manger, had been negotiating with him for some time. The property was originally appraised in 1946 at \$10,125 and at that time Mr. Schroeder was requesting \$12,000. It was subsequently appraised on December 11, 1954, at \$22,250. In August of this year, Mr. Schroeder, in a conference with Mr. Miles, requested \$50,000 for his property. It was therefore deemed necessary to institute condemnation proceedings for acquisition of the property, and adoption of the resolution was recommended.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled this 15th day of November, 1956, has, on this date and on previous occasions, approved certain plans for the growth, campus enlargement and expansion of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois; and,

WHEREAS, In order to provide additional grounds for the location of buildings, site development, and expansion of facilities necessary for such campus enlargements, it will be necessary to acquire certain tracts and parcels of real estate; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it is necessary for campus enlargement to acquire for use by Southern Illinois University the following parcel of real estate, all located in the County of Jackson, State of Illinois:

Commencing at the Northeast corner of the Northwest quarter of Section 28 in Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the 3rd Principal Meridian, thence running South 625 feet to the place of beginning; thence West 200 feet; thence South $62\frac{1}{2}$ feet; thence East 200 feet; thence North $62\frac{1}{2}$ feet to the place of beginning, situated in the Northeast $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Northwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 28, Town 9 South, Range 1 West of the 3rd Principal Meridian, Jackson County.

WHEREAS, Said unacquired parcel of real estate is necessary for the immediate expansion in campus enlargement of Southern Illinois University and reasonable offers of purchase based on able appraiser opinion have all been refused by the landowner interest in said parcel of real estate; be it further

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it proceed to condemn the above described parcel of real estate to be acquired for necessary campus enlargement.

After discussion, Robert L. Kern moved that the Board approve the recommendation for the request for funds for buildings and other capital improvements. The motion was seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris indicated that the boiler house was built as a heat-producing plant, and the engineers had recommended that when more boilers were added, as the University's enrollment increased, consideration be given to the feasibility of adding the generation of electricity. The building was designed so that ultimately it might be enlarged to provide space for electricity-generating equipment.

President Morris stated that Consoer, Townsend & Associates, designers of the building, had completed a study on the feasibility and financial prospects of an electric plant, indicating a saving to the University. He indicated that within the next biennium it will become necessary to add a new boiler, at approximate cost of \$900,000, and that the boiler house would need to be enlarged to accommodate it. The cost of the necessary boiler, plus a generating plant, would be approximately \$2,169,000, and would take care of an enrollment up to 8,000.

It was the consensus of the members of the Board that President Morris should arrange for the University Architect and the consulting engineers to appear at a subsequent Board meeting to discuss the problem.

Professor Hand reported briefly concerning the status of the construction of the University sewer at Wall and Park Streets, connecting with the city sewer at College Street. He stated that the cost to the University would be approximately \$30,000.

Copies of a report of architectural and engineering services, showing the status of contracts for buildings and other capital improvements, were distributed. President Morris stated that the report gave a scope of planning for the use of funds as they become available.

Final enrollment figures for the fall term, 1956, showed 6,255 resident students, representing an increase of 701, or 12.6 per cent.

Copies of reports prepared by the American Institute of Management were presented. President Morris requested that the members of the Board consider the desirability of a confidential management audit of the University. He stated that the administration was engaged in a re-examination of goals and objectives, and that a faculty committee was studying the statutory basis of organization and functions.

It was the consensus of the members of the Board that the administration should arrange for a representative of the American Institute of Management to appear at the next regular Board meeting to answer questions concerning a management audit.

President Morris indicated that overflow crowds from the Du Quoin State Fair might be accommodated through the use of dormitories on the campus. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that President Morris should contact the fair management regarding such an offer, and report to the Board at a subsequent meeting.

Prior to Vice-President Nixon's appearance on the campus, a Special Bulletin to the Faculty was issued which allowed students to attend the meeting. President Morris requested that the Board consider a future policy regarding dismissal of classes to enable students to hear a candidate for the presidency or vice-presidency.

President Morris reported that a group of citizens from Mt. Carmel has offered to purchase land and erect a building as a gift to the University, if a residency could be established in that city. No recommendation was made by the administration.

The meeting was adjourned at 4 P.M.

Meeting of the Board of Trustees

JANUARY 17, 1957

THE JANUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the offices of the Board, Carbondale, Illinois, on Thursday, January 17, 1957, beginning at 10 л.м.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Robert L. Kern. Mr. Fischer and Mr. Nickell were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Edward V. Miles, Jr., Director of Information service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on November 15, 1956, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) DEPARTMENTS OF SOCIOLOGY AND ANTHROPOLOGY

Upon recommendation of the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, it was proposed that the present Department of Sociology and Anthropology be divided into two departments, to be called the Department of Sociology and the Department of Anthropology, respectively, effective July 1, 1957. Both departments will remain in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

When both of these fields of study were small there were certain advanages in grouping the two of them together. At present, however, there are some ten members of the Sociology staff and some four members of the Anthropology staff. Of the anthropologists, three hold the doctor's degree and one will receive the doctor's degree shortly. Our students in anthropology have been handicapped by the label of sociologists which they have been carrying with them, both in transferring their credits to other schools and in obtaining recognition for membership in professional societies.

Since it is now possible to offer a full curriculum in Anthropology with highly competent instructors, it was recommended that Anthropology be separated from Sociology as an independent department.

(B) RESIDENCE CENTERS

At the November 15, 1956, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the establishment of one or more residence centers in addition to the present residence center at Belleville was approved.

Since that time the Shurtleff College Board of Trustees has unanimously voted to suspend operations of Shurtleff College on June 30, 1957, and to offer the physical facilities of Shurtleff to Southern Illinois University on a lease basis, with option to purchase. The terms of the lease are to be established by an impartial appraisal of the property.

The East St. Louis Board of Education has offered its present high school building to Southern Illinois University at \$1.00 per year, effective next September when a new high school building will be completed and occupied. An inspection by representatives of Southern Illinois University has shown that in large part this building is in excellent shape, having an adequate power plant and having recently been improved in many ways. The building, which consists of an older and a newer part, is too large for a residence center operation, at least in its initial phases. It was proposed to the officials of the East St. Louis High School that only the newer part, which houses virtually all the special facilities that would be needed, might be leased, in order to cut down the expense of maintenance and operation, with an option to lease the rest at such time as enrollment pressures justify it. The East St. Louis officials agreed to consider this possibility.

Our investigation of these two sites clearly shows that neither would be suitable as the permanent site for a full-fledged university operation. The Shurtleff College campus has a capacity of perhaps 500 students and lacks the acreage for the inevitable expansion. The East St. Louis High School building, although it has held as many as 2,000 high school students, is not suited for an adequate schedule of college-level offerings. As interim locations for residence centers, however, both are excellent and the State of Illinois could meet the problem of educating fairly large numbers of additional college students at very little expense in these temporary locations.

Both the Shurtleff and East St. Louis officials have been clearly told that these sites could not be considered for a branch university but that they might well serve at least on a temporary basis for residence centers.

It was therefore recommended that the East St. Louis High School and the Shurtleff College campus be approved as locations for additional residence centers, subject to the satisfactory outcome of negotiations with the respective boards and to the provision of funds by the State of Illinois for the operation of these centers.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board approved this recommendation. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(C) RECOMMENDATION FOR ADDITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

At the November 5, 1953, meeting the Board of Trustees approved the establishment of 175 scholarships covering tuition only for worthy students enrolled in the University. At the July 12, 1955, meeting this number was increased to 200. At that time it was suggested that it would be well to wait for a year or so before materially enlarging the number of scholarships.

When the first 175 scholarships were established, there were 3,569 resident college students enrolled in the University. In the fall of 1956, 6,255 students were enrolled. It therefore seemed desirable again to take into account the increased number of worthy students who can qualify for such scholarships.

Approval was therefore requested for awarding a total of not more than 300 scholarships covering tuition for the academic year 1957–58 and thereafter. As had been done in the case of the scholarships already established, the administration will study the best way to distribute these scholarships and will make periodic reviews of the effectiveness and equity of such distribution.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, this request was approved. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(D) LAND ACQUISITION

A resolution which included those tracts of land necessary for campus expansion was presented. At the July 12, 1955, meeting of the Board of Trustees, a resolution was adopted which incorporated all tracts of land which the Board had previously approved in the campus master plan for acquisition by negotiation or condemnation. The resolution presented brought up to date the land acquisition program of the University and made it possible, when deemed necessary, to institute condemnation proceedings for property in the expansion program of the University.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled this 17th day of January, 1957, has, on this date and on previous occasions, approved certain plans for the growth, campus enlargement, and expansion of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In order to provide additional grounds for the location of

buildings, site development, and expansion of facilities necessary for such campus enlargements, it will be necessary to acquire certain tracts and parcels of real estate; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it is necessary for campus enlargement to acquire for use by Southern Illinois University the following parcels of real estate, all located in the County of Jackson, State of Illinois:

Tract 10-a. Lot 2 in Block 1 in Whitney Heights Addition to the City of Carbondale, Illinois.

Tract 14-a. Lot 6 in Block 5 in Whitney Heights Addition to the City of Carbondale, Illinois.

Tract 18-a. The north 220 feet of the H. B. Keller tract in Whitney Heights Addition to the City of Carbondale, Illinois, as shown by the recorded plat thereof in book 6 of plats, at page 12 in the Recorder's Office of Jackson County, Illinois. (G) RESOLUTIONS ACCEPTING BIDS FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Resolutions were presented, pertaining to the acceptance of bids for capital improvements, as per contracts listed above.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved contracts, purchase orders, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during the months of October and November, 1956, amounting to less than \$1,000.00; approved contracts, purchase orders, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during the same period, amounting to \$1,000.00 or over; and adopted resolutions accepting bids for capital improvements. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The Board entered executive session, at which time Mr. Henry B. McNaughton and Mr. Frederick P. Harrsen, representatives of the American Institute of Management, were introduced. Each spoke briefly concerning a proposed management audit of the University, outlining the objectives of the proposed study and the general procedure customarily followed. Mr. McNaughton and Mr. Harrsen were excused from the session at noon.

It was the consensus of the members of the Board that individual consultants and other commercial organizations should be considered before a decision was made regarding a management audit.

The executive session was continued through the luncheon hour, where the following nine representatives from the Mt. Carmel area met with the members of the Board: William E. Brubeck, Roy Dee, Stanley Chapman, Frank Johnson, George Fischer, Bert Freedman, Robert Orr, Eugene White, and Paul Waterbury.

At President Morris' request, Mr. Brubeck stated the purpose of the meeting as follows: The residents of Mt. Carmel propose to erect a building on an adequate tract of land, if Southern Illinois University can see the way clear to accept it as a gift, staff it, and operate it. Mr. Brubeck presented an outline of the proposal and pointed out that the building to be erected could be used not only for regular college classes, adult education, and extension work, but also as a center for work in geology and agriculture.

After full discussion, Mr. Wham thanked the group and stated that the Board of Trustees would consider the proposal further, after the University administration had completed a study of all relevant data to the point of a definite recommendation.

The Board reconvened in open session at 2:30 р.м.

(L) This section, concerning purchasing procedure and practices, was withdrawn from the agenda for resubmission at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Trustees.

(M) APPROVAL OF ORGANIZED GROUP HOUSING

Upon recommendation of the housing staff and the Office of Student Affairs, the following statement of policy was presented for approval. It was explained that the proposed policy would protect organized groups in obtaining property for residential purposes. This procedure had been in effect for several years, although it had not been a formally approved policy of the Board.

Any organized group of students of Southern Illinois University, negotiating for the renting, leasing, or purchasing of property, is required to secure the approval of the Office of Student Affairs through the Coordinator of Student Housing, and shall obtain approval for such arrangements from the Legal Counsel of the University.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved unanimously the policy recommended.

(N) APPROVAL OF RESIDENCE POLICY

The following proposed regulations were submitted for guidance of he Registrar and the Legal Counsel in defining residence of students for purposes of registration at Southern Illinois University. There are several lifferent tests of whether a person is a resident of the State of Illinois. A lifferent test is used for voting than is used for taxation purposes. The Jniversity of Illinois Board of Trustees has adopted regulations along he same lines as the proposed regulations. In view of the differential of amounts of tuition for residential and nonresidential students, the problem becomes more acute each term. The proposed policies had been approved by the Registrar, the Legal Counsel, and the Vice-President for Instruction, and were submitted for approval.

PROPOSED REGULATIONS DEFINING THE RESIDENCE OF STUDENTS FOR

Purposes of Registration in Southern Illinois University

1. Evidence showing the residence of every applicant for admission to the University must be submitted to the Registrar at the time of application for admission, and resident or nonresident fees shall be assessed on the basis of evidence appearing in the Registrar's records.

2. In all cases where the records indicate that the student's home is outside the State of Illinois, the nonresident fee shall be assessed. A student who takes exception to the ruling may file a claim for a refund but this must be submitted to the Registrar within ten days of the opening date of the term for which the charge was made. After this period the student loses his right to a refund for the term for which the fee was assessed.

3. In the case of a student who is a minor, the residence of the parent, or if the student has no parent, the guardian of his person, shall govern unless there is proven to have been complete emancipation of the minor from his parents or guardian and he has established residence in the State of Illinois.

4. Any student, adult or minor, whose parents have established a bona fide residence in the State of Illinois will be regarded as a resident for registration purposes; except that an adult student who has established a residence on his own account outside of the State must conform to the terms set forth in regulation 6 to be classified as a resident for registration purposes.

5. A wife is classified as a resident for registration purposes if her husband is a bona fide resident of the State of Illinois preceding and at the time of her registration.

6. An adult student whose parents are deceased or whose parents reside outside the State, to be considered a resident of Illinois for purposes of registration, must be a bona fide resident of the State for three months preceding the beginning of any term for which he registers at the University and must present evidence that he is self-sustaining and not under parental control.

7. An adult alien, who has taken out first naturalization papers, may qualify as a resident of the State for purposes of registration in the University if he has lived within the State for at least a period of twelve monthnext preceding the beginning of any term for which he registers at the University, subject to the provisions of rules 4 and 6.

8. Several factors will be considered in the determination of each individ

ual case. Among the factors to be considered will be (a) location of draft poard registration; (b) voting address, if any; (c) the degree of self-support of the student; (d) location of summer or vacation employment.

In the above regulations an adult student is considered to be a male 21 years of age or more and a female 18 years or more.

9. All cases of appeal shall first be referred to the Legal Counsel of the University. An appeal from the Legal Counsel shall be in accordance with University Statutes.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board approved unanimously the esidence policy submitted.

(O) FAMILY HOUSING UNITS

A proposed resolution, approving plans for family housing units and authorizing application to be made to the Housing and Home Finance Agency for the funds necessary for construction of the first stage of family nousing units, was presented.

The administration proposed the eventual construction of 470 family nousing units to be located east of the Illinois Central Railroad tracks (on he Dowdell property), within the property bounded on the north by Park Street, on the east by the extension of Wall Street, and on the south by the extension of the reservoir road. A report entitled "A Program for Family Housing," dated January, 1957, outlining the needs, objectives, and a proposed solution for family housing at Southern Illinois University, had been made available.

The first stage of the proposed project called for the construction of nousing units for 200 families on Tracts 109, 110, and 111 (University lesignation). This land is not now owned by the University, but has been neluded in the master plan approved by the Board for acquisition.

The proposed project included the following numbers and types of apartnents: 10 no-bedroom apartments; 50 one-bedroom apartments; and 140 wo-bedroom apartments.

The estimated cost for application of loan to the Housing and Home Finance Agency for construction, land development, utilities, furniture and furnishings, architects' fees, Government field expense, legal and administrative expenses, and interest during construction, was based on \$10,000 per unit for the 200 units, or a total of \$2,000,000. The proposal envisioned a completely self-liquidating project.

Approval of the following resolution was requested.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting n regular session, does approve a report submitted to them, entitled "A Program for Family Housing," dated January, 1957; and WHEREAS, With the increased enrollment in the graduate programs of the University, and the ever-continuing presence in the student body of married couples; and

WHEREAS, These persons are necessary for the instruction of the students of Southern Illinois University, and it is an obligation of the Board to provide housing therefor; and

WHEREAS It appears that the available facilities within the immediate community for the housing of married students and their families, and for married instructors and their families, will be insufficient; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that an application be made to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government for a loan not to exceed \$2,000,000 to finance the construction of not to exceed 200 apartment units, and that the President of the University be and is authorized to make application to and to negotiate with the said Housing and Home Finance Agency for and in behalf of the Board of Trustees for the said loan not to exceed \$2,000,000.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted the resolution as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris explained that an appraisal of the Shurtleff College property will be necessary to establish the terms of a lease for use of the physical facilities. He stated that the total cost of such appraisal would be approximately \$2,500, and requested the approval of the Board for payment of one-half of the cost, or \$1,250, by the University. The request was granted.

President Morris requested the advice of the members of the Board concerning a policy instituted by the Carbondale National Bank and the First National Bank, both of Carbondale, whereby a service charge of oneeighth of one per cent is levied on transactions in government securities amounting to \$4,000 or less, and a charge of \$5.00 on transactions amounting to more than \$4,000. Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager, stated that one such charge had been collected by the Carbondale National Bank during the month of January, and amounted to \$5.00. The Board instructed Mr. Miles to recover the charge of \$5.00 which had been paid previously, and to inform both banks that the Board was unwilling to pay the service charges in view of the balances maintained in both banks.

Copies of "Salaries Paid and Salary Practices in Universities, Colleges, and Junior Colleges, 1955–56," National Education Association Research Bulletin, October, 1956, were presented. President Morris explained that facts concerning faculty salaries at Southern Illinois University had been interlined in red. A copy of the study was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

President Morris presented copies of the minutes of the meeting of Shurtleff College Board on December 11, 1956, at which meeting it was voted to suspend the operation of Shurtleff College as of June 30, 1957. He stated that Mr. Robert B. Maucker of Alton, Illinois, served as recorder for the meeting. A copy of these minutes was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

The annual audit report of the Southern Illinois University Foundation, prepared by C. J. Schlosser & Company of Alton, Illinois, was presented and accepted for the record.

The meeting was adjourned at 4 P.M.

THE FEBRUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the offices of the Board, Carbondale, Illinois, on Tuesday, February 19, 1957, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Robert L. Kern. Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Fischer, and Mr. Nickell were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Edward V. Miles, Jr., Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on January 17, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, these minutes were approved as presented.

By common consent, the election of officers of the Board was postponed until the full Board could be present.

MATTERS PRESENTED BY PRESIDENT MORRIS

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) Acting on advice from Professor Wendell E. Keepper, Dean of the School of Agriculture, President Morris requested that this section, which concerned Vocational Agriculture, be withdrawn for resubmission at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Trustees.

(B) ESTABLISHMENT OF INSTITUTES

As the Board of Trustees had been informed, certain functions of the University which draw upon the various colleges, schools, and departments for instructional, research, and educational services can best be operated through institutes, such as the Small Business Institute which was established by the Board of Trustees at its meeting on July 8, 1954, and the Community Development Institute which was established at the June 29, 1956, meeting. It was reported that these institutes typically operate under a director, but draw their staffs largely from existing departments.

Certain functions under the auspices of various staff members in the existing departments were reported to have reached a stage of development where it was desirable that they be formally recognized and assigned to institutes. Approval was requested for the establishment of the following institutes, effective July 1, 1957.

Latin American Institute

The purpose of this institute, it was explained, would be to provide a co-ordinated program of Latin American studies at Southern Illinois University, to encourage exchange of students between the United States and Latin America, and otherwise to encourage co-operation between the countries in our hemisphere. Further, the functions of the institute would be to offer courses in Latin American subjects through the various instructional departments, and to provide a field major. The institute would also engage in research and would attempt to obtain grants in support of such research. It would sponsor and direct conferences and special programs promoting a better understanding and appreciation of Latin America and its people. It would collect and disseminate information concerning employment opportunities in Latin America, and information concerning opportunities for Latin Americans in the United States. Labor Institute

It was explained that the function of the Labor Institute would be to promote harmony and co-operation between labor and management by encouraging the training of students and others interested in labor and industrial relations, and by providing advice on the technical aspects of labor and industrial relations to labor, to industry, and to the public. This program would be carried out through the conducting of research and special surveys which might be of use to labor and industry in Southern Illinois, through the use of various specialists in the several departments of the University providing courses of instruction for students entering industry and labor, and through the establishing of appropriate special courses for personnel of industrial concerns within the area and the membership of various labor groups.

Rehabilitation Institute

The purpose of this institute, it was explained, would be to co-ordinate and augment the training of college students and other field worker interested in counseling with or providing services for the handicapped to provide counseling and consultative services to the appropriate community agencies and to handicapped individuals. These functions would be carried out through a program of instruction which would co-ordinate the efforts of departments within the University in the developing o rehabilitation counseling curricula, providing consultant services to community agencies in the general area of rehabilitation, and initiating and conducting theoretical and practical research bearing on the methods and echniques of rehabilitating the handicapped.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the establishment of Latin American Institute, a Labor Institute, and a Rehabilitation Institute, effective July 1, 1957.

(C) CAMPUS POLITICAL ORGANIZATIONS

At the March 27, 1950, meeting of the Board of Trustees the folowing policy was adopted by the Board of Trustees regarding student political groups:

Upon recommendation of the Dean of Men and Dean of Women, the Council Advisory to the President has reaffirmed the policy that partisan political groups, such as young Democrats, young Republicans, or young Socialists, should not be officially recognized as a part of the student activities program of the University. It is felt that while students should be encouraged to interest themselves in political matters, they should do this by affiliation with community groups and not in organizations sponsored by the school. Campus political activities often embarrass the University, especially when it seeks to regulate them as it does other student activities.

On April 6, 1956, the President of the Student Council wrote President Morris requesting the removal of the ban on student political organizations on the campus. Mr. Reynold's letter stated that the Council had at their meeting on Thursday, April 6, 1956, recommended to the Board that the pan be lifted.

A special subcommittee of the University Council was appointed under late of May 8, 1956, to consider the request of the Student Council. The subcommittee recommended a change in University policy, recommending that the University give recognition to campus groups which are affiliated with legal political parties of the State of Illinois. This recommendation had the concurrence of the Director of Student Affairs.

A special subcommittee of the Joint Council of Higher Education, at their neeting on January 4, 1957, submitted a proposed statement of policy which was as follows:

Student Political Organizations, representing political parties legal in the State of Illinois, should be recognized as a campus-student organization if they meet he same criteria as applied to other campus clubs.

In view of the above detailed actions, it was recommended that the Board pprove the change of policy as contained in the report of the special ubcommittee of the Joint Council of Higher Education, and that the folowing policy be adopted:

tudent Political Organizations, representing political parties legal in the State f Illinois, should be recognized as campus-student organizations if they meet ne same criteria as applied to other campus clubs.

I. Clark Davis, Dean of Men and Acting Director of Student Affairs, appeared before the Board. He stated that the recommended change of policy would enable students to express themselves in one important phase of citizenship by participation in campus political groups affiliated with political parties legal in the State of Illinois. Dean Davis explained that a co-ordinating committee, composed of faculty members, would work closely with the Chairman of the Government Department to co-ordinate the activities of such groups.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board approved the recommended change of policy, and adopted the policy set forth above.

(D) This section, which concerned contracts and copyrights for the University Press, was withdrawn for resubmission at a subsequent meeting of the Board of Trustees.

(E) SALARY ADJUSTMENTS FOR REAPPOINTEES

Each school year, in the spring, the administration has cleared for the next year a number of reappointments of staff members already serving on term appointments. At the end of a biennium this procedure involved a salary difficulty growing out of the inability to predict exactly what salary levels could be made available through the state's budgetary provision for personal services. This difficulty did not apply to staff members on continuing appointments, because their salaries are adjusted to new salary levels in the Annual Internal Budget, which is prepared after the state's provision for personal services becomes known. To hold people on term appointments, however, it is necessary to give them some assurance of their reappointment before salary levels are established.

Approval was therefore requested to clear reappointments through the Board of Trustees as necessary at old salary levels subject to the understanding that if a general improvement of salary levels becomes possible suitable adjustments could be recommended in the internal budget for next year.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board approved the recommendation made regarding salary adjustments for reappointees. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard nay, none.

(F) REMISSION OF FEES FOR FACULTY AND STAFF

For many years full-time faculty and staff members who registered for either credit or noncredit courses have not been required to pay tuition. Faculty and staff members have, however, been required to pay the cost of textbook and materials required for the classwork. It wa the explained that this policy had been followed since the time when the University was still a Teachers College. During this period there was the assumption that authority from the Board of Trustees had been granted for the remission of tuition to faculty and staff members. However, recently the policy came under scrutiny and an attempt to find the authorization whereby these fees had been remitted disclosed no record that the Board of Trustees had formally approved the policy.

The administration felt that the remission of fees was desirable, in that it assists and encourages the faculty and staff in technical and professional upgrading. The Board was informed that approximately 200 faculty and staff members were presently registered for courses.

It was, therefore, requested that the Board approve formally the traditional policy of remitting tuition exclusive of costs of books and supplies for full-time faculty and staff members of Southern Illinois University taking either credit or noncredit courses.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board formally approved the policy recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(G) purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during the months of december, 1956, and January, 1957, amounting to less than \$1,000.00

The Board received a report of purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during the months of December, 1956, and January, 1957, amounting to less than \$1,000.00, in the total amount of \$167,507.96.

(N) CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES PAYROLLS FROM JULY 1, 1956, THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 1956

A report showing changes in civil service employees payrolls for the period from July 1, 1956, through December 31, 1956, was presented. A copy of the report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved and ratified such changes. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(O) LAND ACQUISITION

As had been indicated in the last Board meeting, certain tracts contained in the campus plan which had been approved by the Board were inadvertently omitted from the resolution approved at that time by the Board. The two tracts were contained in a recommended resolution bringing up to date the Board approval of the University's land acquisition program.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled this 19th day of February, 1957, has, on this and on previous occasions, approved certain plans for the growth, campus enlargement, and expansion of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In order to provide additional grounds for the location of buildings, site development, and expansion of facilities necessary for such

campus enlargements, it will be necessary to acquire certain tracts and parcels of real estate; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it is necessary for campus enlargement to acquire for use by Southern Illinois University the following parcels of real estate, all located in the County of Jackson, State of Illinois:

Tract 95-b. The South 64 feet of the East 185 feet of Outlot 123 in the City of Carbondale, Illinois.

Tract 95-c. The North $53\frac{1}{2}$ feet off the North side of Outlot 123 and $12\frac{1}{2}$ feet off the South side of Lot 752.

WHEREAS, Said unacquired tracts are necessary for the immediate expansion of the campus of Southern Illinois University, if reasonable offers of purchase based on able appraiser opinion are refused by the owner or owners of such tracts; be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it proceed to condemn the above described tracts to be acquired for necessary campus enlargement.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board adopted the resolution as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris indicated that a supplement to the budget request had become necessary because of the proposed lease of the East St. Louis High School building and the Shurtleff College facilities. He requested the advice of the Board as to whether revisions should be made in the materials already forwarded to the Department of Finance, or a supplementary request presented to the Budgetary Commission. He indicated his preference for presenting a request for additional funds for the operation of facilities made available in the Madison–St. Clair area, as a supplement to the regular budget request. He expressed the belief that the additional request should stand on its own merits, and should not be considered in connection with the program on the Carbondale campus.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved a request of \$580,000 for the operation of residence centers in Madison and St. Clair counties, the request to be submitted as a supplement to the regular budget. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris explained that the University of Illinois was involved in a suit before the Supreme Court regarding the operation of an educational television program. He proposed that, as a matter of institutional co-operation, Southern Illinois University should offer any assistance

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possible, inasmuch as the result of the suit would be of great importance to every educational institution in the state.

On motion of Robert L. Kern, the Board approved any possible cooperation with the University of Illinois in their suit. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Kern, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The meeting was adjourned at 12 noon.

THE MARCH MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board, Carbondale, Illinois, on Thursday, March 14, 1957, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, and Vernon L. Nickell.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Edward V. Miles, Jr., Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Martin F. Oehmke was welcomed to Board membership by the Chairman of the Board.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on February 19, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

By secret ballot, in accordance with Part II, Article II, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as officers until their successors are elected and qualified: John Page Wham, Chairman; Lindell W. Sturgis, Vice-Chairman; Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary.

In accordance with Part II, Article III, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as members of the Executive Committee: Harold R. Fischer and Kenneth L. Davis. As stated in the By-Laws, the third member of the Executive Committee shall be the Chairman of the Board.

Consideration was given to the naming of a representative of the Board of Trustees as a member of the Board of Directors of Southern Illinois University Foundation, replacing Robert L. Kern, whose term would expire on June 30, 1957, and who had resigned as a member of the Board of Trustees. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, Martin F. Oehmke was unanimously elected to serve as the Board's representative, his term to expire June 30, 1960.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article VIII, Section 1, A. of the Statutes of the Board of Trustees was mailed to each member of the Board on March 1, 1957. Vernon L. Nickell moved that the proposed amendment be reworded, and proper notice of the intention to request amendment be given the members of the Board two weeks in advance of the next regular meeting. The motion was seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, and was carried by unanimous vote.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board unanimously adopted the following resolution honoring Professor Maurits Kesnar, a faculty member at Southern Illinois University since 1946, who died on February 22, 1957.

WHEREAS, Professor Maurits Kesnar came to the campus of Southern Illinois University with a rich and varied background as a composer, arranger, and conductor of instrumental music; and

WHEREAS, He devoted his talents and his energy to strengthening the Department of Music and to raising the standards of instruction and performance within the department; and

WHEREAS, He gave much to the world of music through his research in the field of orchestration, and through his many published compositions for woodwinds and strings; and

WHEREAS, He brought deep satisfaction and lasting enjoyment to the many area participants in the Southern Illinois Symphony Orchestra, as well as a great cultural advancement to the entire Southern Illinois area as concert audiences; and

WHEREAS, The University and the community have suffered the loss of a truly devoted teacher and a friend of music lovers and music students; be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees in regular meeting assembled that the Board express its understanding and appreciation of Professor Kesnar's service to the University and to the music world, its deep regret for his untimely passing, and its sincere sympathy to his family and friends. Be it further

Resolved That this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this Board, and that copies be sent to the University administration and faculty, and to Professor Kesnar's family.

(E) RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREE

A recommendation was made that at the June, 1957, commencement, or some commencement thereafter, the honorary degree of Doctor of Science be awarded to Major Alexander P. de Seversky, an outstanding authority on air power.

Alexander P. de Seversky was born June 7, 1894, in Tiflis, Russia. He graduated from the Imperial Naval Academy in 1914, and served as Chief of Russian Naval Fighter Aviation of the Baltic Sea during the war against Germany in 1915. After the Russian Revolution, and before the Bolsheviks seized power, he was sent to the United States by the provisional government as a member of the Russian Naval Mission, arriving early in 1918. In 1921, as Special Consulting Engineer for the War Department, he worked closely with General William E. Mitchell, and at General Mitchell's request developed the first synchronous bomb sight, which was completed in 1923 and purchased by the United States and British governments. Shortly after he became a United States citizen in 1927, he was commissioned a Major in the United States Air Corps Specialists Reserve. In 1931 he founded the Seversky Aircraft Corporation (now called Republic Aviation), of which he was elected president and served as general manager and chief designer until 1940. In 1930 he designed and built the first air-cooled engine fighter with turbo-supercharger for high altitude flying, later known as the P-47. During these years he conceived and developed an array of inventions affecting every phase of aeronautics and aerial weapons. He has twice been the recipient of the famous Harmon Trophy, awarded in 1940 and 1947. In March, 1945, Secretary of War Patterson appointed him Special Consultant, and in that capacity he went to the European Theater of Operations, then to the Pacific Theater, and the following year to the Bikini atomic tests to analyze and report on the employment of air power and the effects of bombing. On December 18, 1946, he was awarded the Medal of Merit. Major de Seversky is the author of two books, Victory Through Air Power, published in 1942, and Air Power-Key to Survival, 1950. He has written for the McNaught column on air power, for the United Press, and for King Features, in addition to many articles published by Reader's Digest, American Mercury, Cosmopolitan, and others. His home is at Asharoken Beach, Northport, Long Island.

This recommendation was initiated by the Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees, and was endorsed by the administration.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, the Board unanimously approved the awarding of the honorary Doctor of Science degree to Major Alexander P. de Seversky at the June, 1957, commencement, or some commencement thereafter. (F) CHANGES IN FACULTY-ADMINISTRATIVE PAYROLL

Death

The death of Mr. Maurits Kesnar, Professor of Music, was reported. Mr. Kesnar was born July 8, 1900, and died February 22, 1957. He was appointed to Southern's faculty in 1946. He received the Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from the University of Iowa. He organized and conducted the Southern Illinois Symphony Orchestra, and had an impressive record of published compositions.

(G) INCREASE IN TUITION

President Morris reported that it has been the basic philosophy of Southern Illinois University to do all in its power to develop the area it serves. This philosophy included keeping the costs of an education at the minimum so that the middle and lower income families (those that are in the majority and need it most) could afford the benefits of a college education.

All colleges and universities in the United States are facing recordbreaking enrollments. To help finance this additional burden, Illinois state officials believe that tuition fees should be increased at the state institutions of higher education.

The parents of the young people entering Illinois state colleges and universities are expected to share part of the greater cost and the general taxpayer the balance. It was recommended that Southern's tuition be increased as follows:

President Morris explained that in recent conferences Governor Stratton had recommended tuition increases for all state colleges and universities, effective the fall quarter of 1957. He stated that students from outside Illinois, including foreign students, now comprise less than five per cent of the student body. He also stated that the intermingling of students from other parts of the country was a desirable aspect of the total educational process.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board unanimously approved the recommended increases in tuition, effective the fall quarter of 1957.

Copies of a summary were distributed, showing the operating budget appropriation requests approved by Governor Stratton on March 13, 1957, and translating the total appropriation in terms of line item classifications. A copy of the summary was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

MAY 16, 1957

THE MAY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held at The National Bank of Mattoon, Mattoon, Illinois, on Thursday, May 16, 1957, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, Vernon L. Nickell.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on March 14, 1957, copies of which had seen sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article VIII, Section 1, A of the Statutes of the Board was mailed to each Board member on May 1, 1957. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, the Board adopted unanimously an amendment to the section designated, substituting the following subsection:

Section 1. Degrees and Awards.

A. Earned degrees shall be awarded by the authority of the Board of Trustees upon completion of requirements for the particular degree to be awarded as contained in the then current edition of the University Bulletin, and upon the recommendation to the President by the appropriate school or college Faculty.

Vernon L. Nickell presented copies of a letter received from Dr. William S. Vincent, Executive Officer of the Citizenship Education Project of

Teachers College, Columbia University, concerning a summer workshop in citizenship education. No formal action was taken on the proposal contained in the letter.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) RATIFICATION OF APPROVAL FOR VOCATIONAL

AGRICULTURAL APPLICATION

On March 25, 1957, the following letter was sent to all members of the Board:

It now seems advisable for the University to submit a formal request to the Illinois Board of Vocational Education for approval of Southern Illinois University to offer training for Vocational Agriculture teachers. The next meeting of the Board of Vocational Education will be held on April 11, which precedes the next meeting of the Board of Trustees. I am, therefore, taking this means of bringing the matter to your attention.

Under existing federal laws, more specifically the Smith-Hughes Act, funds are made available by the federal government to certain high schools approved for courses in agriculture. The administration of the funds is in accordance with a plan submitted by the Vocational Education Board of the State of Illinois. The plan also includes funds to the colleges or universities approved to train teachers of Vocational Agriculture under the Smith-Hughes Act. At the present time only the University of Illinois is authorized to train teachers of Vocational Agriculture under the plans submitted by the Vocational Education Board every five years.

To qualify as a university approved to train teachers of Vocational Agriculture, it is necessary that the school meet certain requisite standards regarding laboratories, classrooms, and staff. The administration believes that with the opening of a new classroom and laboratory building in agriculture next fall, with the staff which has been steadily increasing in numbers and areas of interest in the past few years, and with the test farms and experimental centers progressing in a rapid fashion, the University is in a position to request approval of the Vocational Education Board as an institution authorized to train teachers of Vocational Agriculture. Dean Wendell Keepper of the School of Agriculture has examined the published standards of approved schools and reports that by fall we will more than adequately comply with these standards.

Statewide there is an ever-increasing need for qualified people in the field of Vocational Agriculture, particularly in Southern Illinois. One of the factors necessary for high schools to receive Smith-Hughes assistance in their agricultural programs is that a qualified person be available for teaching the subject. At the present time none of the graduates of this University are so qualified by virtue of not having graduated from an approved institution. Further, several schools approved in Southern Illinois cannot rely upon our graduates to replace vacancies which occur on their staffs because of this restriction. Of the 249 majors in agriculture registered in the fall of 1956, thirty-seven freshmen and twenty-two sophomores intended to become teachers qualified under the Smith-Hughes Act. This means that it will be necessary for them to transfer to another school in order to qualify. The present situation is unfair to the graduates of this University, the high schools of the area, and the agriculture students of Southern Illinois who desire and deserve the added agricultural attention which accompanies grants of Smith-Hughes funds.

Approval is, therefore, requested that an application with supporting data be submitted to the Board of Vocational Education of the State of Illinois requesting approval of the institution as an institution approved to train teachers of Vocational Agriculture. This request will necessitate the adding of a program of teacher training and a course in the principles of Vocational Agriculture in our School of Agriculture. No additional facilities nor staff in addition to that normally required for increased enrollments would be necessary to activate the program if approval were granted.

Will you please indicate your reaction to this request on the enclosed copy of this letter and return to me?"

Approvals were received from seven members, with Mr. Nickell abstaining due to his presence on the Illinois Board of Vocational Education which must pass upon the request of the University.

In view of these approvals, an application was submitted to the Illinois Board of Vocational Education. It was requested that the Board formally ratify this action as a matter of record.

Mr. Nickell stated that the Illinois Board of Vocational Education, at its last meeting, considered the application presented as a notification of interest. He indicated the formal procedure which would precede any action on the University's application.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board formally ratified action taken by letter dated March 25, 1957. Mr. Nickell abstained from casting a vote because of his membership on the Illinois Board of Vocational Education.

(B) summer session book rental fee

It had been customary for the University to charge only a fraction of the regular book rental fee for the summer session. In the winter terms the fee is \$5.00 per student and in the summer it had been \$3.75. The Instructional Aids Council recommended that the summer book rental fee should be the same as the winter term because the cost of administration was approximately the same.

The administration recommended that the Board approve a book rental fee of \$5.00 per student for the summer session, to be effective for the summer session of 1958.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the recommendation made concerning book rental fees.

(C) APPROVAL OF LEASE WITH SHURTLEFF COLLEGE

At the November 15, 1956, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board had approved and authorized the establishment of additional residence centers in the Madison–St. Clair counties area. At the January 17, 1957, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board had approved the East St. Louis High School and the Shurtleff College campus as locations for these residence centers, subject to the satisfactory outcome of negotiations with the respective boards and to the provision of funds from the State of Illinois for the operation of these centers. At the February 19, 1957, meeting the Board had approved and authorized that an additional request be made to the legislature for \$580,000.00 to operate these additional residence centers in the Madison–St. Clair counties area.

In the meantime, negotiations were conducted with the Board of Education of the East St. Louis High School District relative to its building.

Negotiations had been completed with the trustees of Shurtleff College and a proposed lease was submitted for which Board approval was requested, together with authorization for the Chairman and Secretary to execute the agreement for and in behalf of the Board of Trustees. A copy of the above-mentioned lease was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, the Board approved the proposed lease and authorized the Chairman and Secretary to execute the agreement for and in behalf of the Board of Trustees, contingent upon the receipt of funds from appropriations. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(K) Special award

It was recommended that the Southern Illinois University Distinguished Service Award be presented to the following person at the August, 1957, commencement, or some commencement thereafter:

Mr. Joseph Carroll McCormick of Olmstead, Illinois, who was graduated from Southern Illinois Normal University in 1922. While a student he was active in the Socratic Literary Society, the Agriculture Club, and the Forum Debating Club, and held offices in each organization. After his graduation, he taught for seven years in the public schools of Wayne, Jasper, and Pulaski Counties. Mr. McCormick has been successful in securing the passage of legislation authorizing county-wide road districts, and has actively supported legislation for the improvement of rural school districts. He has been a member of the Educational Council of 100 since its formation. He served as a member of the Board of Directors of that body for six years, as secretary-treasurer for three years, and is presently Director of District VIII. He is a charter member of the Rural Education Committee, now known as the Illinois Council for Community Schools, and serves as a member of the executive committee. He is also serving on the Board of Directors of Southern Illinois Association for the Crippled, Inc., and is a member of numerous organizations including the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Farm Bureau, and various church groups.

Increases were requested for the following reasons:

1. Since the original rate of \$17.00 per week was established for the Thompson Point Residence Halls in July, 1955, there had been a steady increase in costs. The University had experienced a general salary and wage increase for the 1955–57 biennium and it was anticipated there would be another increase for 1957–59. There had also been a steady increase in the cost of food, supplies, and equipment used in this operation.

2. At the time the \$17.00 rate was established at Thompson Point, a rate of \$15.00 per week was in effect at Woody Hall. It was proposed that an increase at Woody Hall be enacted as of the time the Thompson Point program would go into full operation.

3. An original computation was made of the daily food cost per man of \$0.80 at Thompson Point. Experience in feeding men, and meeting greater requirements for quantity on items such as meat, indicated a budget of \$0.86 per day per man.

4. It was necessary to budget for a greater number of persons at Thompson Point eating more of the meals which would be available than at Woody Hall. Experience indicated that fewer meals will be missed in men's residence units.

5. Thompson Point was budgeted originally for a vacancy loss of only 30 per cent during the summer months. The vacancy loss of about 75 per cent at Woody Hall points to a considerably higher loss during summer months at the Point.

6. The request for a rate increase at Woody Hall was based primarily on the general anticipation of rising costs and upon losing some summer income when Thompson Point would be in full operation.

7. An increase of \$0.25 per week was requested for double room accommodations at the Southern Acres Residence Halls, to bring those rates in line with the rates at the Dowdell Barracks on campus.

Board approval of the proposed increases was recommended.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the proposed rental increases. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, Mrs. Collins.

(O) MISSISSIPPI RIVER BASIN INVESTIGATIONS

It was pointed out that there had not been awareness of the potential economic connection between the major waterways bordering Southern Illinois on three sides and the economy of the area. For a number of years the University has discovered one thread after another in the fabric of socioeconomic improvement of Southern Illinois, which directly relates to the increased utilization of the Mississippi and Ohio rivers.

In line with the University's policy of devoting time and attention to the natural and human resources of Southern Illinois, it was recommended that the Board approve "Mississippi River Basin Investigations." The project would be divided into five major areas, as follows:

1. Reconnaissance study of the Mississippi from its source to its mouth;

2. Detailed study of the Mississippi from St. Louis to Memphis;

3. Detailed study of the Ohio from Evansville, Indiana, to Cairo, Illinois;

4. Faculty seminars on the subject and its various facets;

5. Interstate forums.

This pilot study would serve as both a basis for and a stimulus to additional faculty research and investigation of resource utilization. In addition, public attention has been focused on the relationship between waterways and riparian lands in recent years, due to increased problems of water control and use of water in industrial processes. In future years, the University would be in a position to offer educational leadership and orientation to a public which might become confused by conflicting proposed programs. The proposed "Pilot Study" would serve as the core and basis for increasing public knowledgeability of our water resources and should encourage enlightened public action.

The University had obtained the services of Dr. Charles C. Colby, noted geographer and the author of the "Pilot Study of Southern Illinois," for this proposed project.

To commence the program, authorization of the Board was requested. Details of proposed expenditures were to be submitted in the annual budget.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board authorized the administration to commence the program outlined above. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

(P) RECOMMENDED TUITION CHARGES EFFECTIVE FALL QUARTER, 1957

At the last Board meeting the administration recommended and the Board approved increases in the resident and out-of-state tuition charges. Board approval of the following proportionate charges, based on the full-time student tuition approved at the last meeting, was recommended. In order to avoid an odd-cents charge of \$83.33, it was recommended that the out-of-state full-time fee be \$83.00. This would reduce the \$100.00 increase in this fee, approved at the last meeting, to \$99.00.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, the Board approved proportionate charges based on the full-time student tuition approved at the meeting held on March 14, 1957, as set forth above.

(Q) settlement for delivery of impure gas for the

CHAUTAUQUA STREET HOUSING PROJECT

On November 17, 1956, the persons within the University administration responsible for the Chautauqua Street Housing Project felt it necessary to request the inhabitants of the project to evacuate their homes. This condition was caused by the delivery to the tanks supplying propane gas for the area of some impure gas containing butane by our contractor, the Trammel Propane Company of Harrisburg.

It was the opinion of the State Fire Marshall, as well as other experts in this field, that the deliveries made by the Trammel Propane Company caused the difficulty.

The Legal Counsel and the Director of Auxiliary Enterprises determined all of the expenditures caused the University as a result of the incident. This amounted to a total of \$1,663.71. The Trammel Propane's insurance company has now agreed to settle this matter for \$1,663.71, the amount of damages sustained by the University. It was requested that the Board approve this settlement and authorize the execution of a release and indemnity agreement by the President.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the settlement for damages incurred, and approved the execution of a release and indemnity agreement by President Morris.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted unanimously a resolution commending the staff of Auxiliary and Service Enterprises.

> REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS President Morris recommended that the scholarships approved by

the Board be made flexible, so that if a student holding a scholarship should withdraw from school the unused portion of that scholarship could be assigned on a quarterly basis. By common consent, the Board expressed approval of this interpretation of scholarships covering tuition.

President Morris informed the Board that the annual meeting of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions would be held October 10–14 at Boulder, Colorado. He requested that the members of the Board consider the appointment of a representative to attend the meeting. No specific action was taken in this regard.

Regarding the method to be used in reporting graduates to the Board, which was discussed at a previous meeting, President Morris indicated that five institutions had indicated that they did not report individual names of graduates to their governing boards. These institutions were Ohio State University, Pennsylvania State University, the University of Texas, the University of Iowa, and Michigan State University.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board authorized the administration to file the official commencement program as a record of graduates.

President Morris briefly discussed the proposed internal budget to be submitted to the Board at its next regular meeting. He indicated that a great deal of study had been devoted to the question of salary levels for faculty members.

President Morris reported to the Board regarding Senate Bills 502 and 726, which provide operating and capital improvements budgets for the University. He also reported on Senate Bill 5, which would authorize the Board to offer degrees in engineering.

President Morris stated that bank charges instituted by the two local banks continue to be a pressing problem. It was the consensus of the Board that Mr. Harold Fischer should be added to the Board's Banking Committee, and that this committee should consider banking charges.

President Morris stated the desirability of a decision regarding air travel. He explained that the local airport had acquired a Cessna 310 which was well instrumented and capable of flying after dark and in weather conditions not possible for the smaller planes. He stated that it would be possible for the University to purchase the plane and engage them to operate it, or to hire a pilot for the University. He further stated that, beginning with the next biennium, it might be to the University's best interests to purchase the plane.

Mr. Wham stated that in his opinion a survey was necessary to determine the need for such a plane, and the feasibility of its acquisition, maintenance, and operation in contrast to rental or charter. The administration was requested to survey the situation and to place the item on the agenda for the next regular Board meeting.

Mr. Wham expressed a vote of thanks, on behalf of all members of the

Board, to Mr. and Mrs. Lockard for their generous hospitality during the day.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:45 р.м.

THE JUNE MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board, Carbondale, Illinois, on Tuesday, June 25, 1957, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke. Mr. Sturgis and Mr. Nickell were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Lee Chesley, State Editor of the Chicago American, Carl Mayhew, reporter for The Southern Illinoisan, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on May 16, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article III, Section 2, A. and Section 3 of the Statutes, and the addition of Section 15 to Part III, Article IV, was mailed to each member of the Board on June 10, 1957. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted unanimously amendments and addition to the sections designated, to read as follows:

Part III, Article III

Section 2. The President's Office.

A. Personnel.

The President's Office shall include the Chief Officer of Instruction, with

the title Vice-President for Instruction; the Chief Executive Assistant, with the title Vice-President for Business Affairs; the Legal Counsel and Assistant to the President; the Executive Dean of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Office; and such executive and clerical assistants as may be required and authorized.

Part III, Article III

- Section 3. Other Offices of the Central Administration Directly Responsible to the President or His Delegated Representative.
- A. The Area Services Office (see Article VI, Sections 1 and 2 below).
- B. The Student Affairs Office (see Article VII, Section 1 below).
- C. The University Health Service (see Article VII, Section 2 below).
- D. The Southwestern Illinois Residence Office (see Article IV, Section 15, below).

Part III, Article IV

Section 15. The Southwestern Illinois Residence Office.

- A. Purpose
 - 1. The Southwestern Illinois Residence Office shall be an all-University agency for the general administration and direction of Residence Centers and all other educational and community service programs offered by Southern Illinois University in Madison and St. Clair Counties and adjacent area.
 - 2. It shall be the responsibility of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Office:
 - a. To provide the central administration and control of Residence Centers in Southwestern Illinois.
 - b. To direct the activities of the Residence Centers in the interest of meeting the higher education needs to be served.
 - c. To coordinate with the appropriate administrative office on the Carbondale campus the activities of the Residence Center in the areas of:
 - (1) Instructional activities, including Adult and Technical Education and Extension.
 - (2) Business affairs.
 - (3) Student affairs.
 - (4) Area Services.
 - 3. The Residence Centers shall offer undergraduate and graduate degree courses culminating in such degrees as may be authorized by the Board of Trustees.
- B. Organization
 - 1. The Southwestern Illinois Residence Office shall be administered by an Executive Dean.
 - 2. The Executive Dean shall be responsible to the Chief Officer of Instruction for the administration of his unit, as it relates to instruction, and for the enforcement of such Statutes and Regulations of the Board of Trustees and such Rules of the instructional units of the University as relate to the work of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Office. He shall, with the assistance of his staff and the approval of the Dean of the Graduate School and the Graduate Council, draw up Rules and Regulations for the operation of such Graduate programs as may be authorized.

- 3. The Executive Dean shall be responsible to the Chief Executive Assistant for the conduct of business matters of the Residence Office.
- 4. He shall nominate to the appropriate administrative officer of the central administration all personnel for the Residence Office. Wherein the duties of these positions parallel that of a campus unit such individuals shall be jointly nominated by the Executive Dean and the campus administrative officer of the unit which such position parallels. He shall nominate to the Chief Officer of Instruction all instructional staff for the Residence Centers, the selection and approval to be made jointly with the appropriate dean involved.
- 5. He shall coordinate in cooperation with the responsible directors activities relating to Area Services and Student Affairs.
- 6. He shall submit to the President recommended budgets for the operation of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Office.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article VIII, Section 4, A. of the Statutes was mailed to each Board member on June 10, 1957. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted unanimously an amendment of the section designated, to read as follows:

Part III, Article VIII

Section 4. Degrees and Awards Authorized.

A. The following earned degrees are authorized:

Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.), Master of Science in Education (M.S. in Ed.), Master of Science (M.S.), Master of Arts (M.A.), Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.), Master of Music (M.M.), Master of Music Education (M.M. Ed.), Bachelor of Science in Agriculture (B.S. in Agr.), Bachelor of Science in Education (B.S. in Ed.), Bachelor of Music Education (B. Mus. Ed.), Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Science (B.S.), Bachelor of Music (B. Mus.).

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) INTERPRETATION OF BOARD-AUTHORIZED SCHOLARSHIPS

A question had arisen in regard to the proper interpretation of the Board's action in establishing scholarships. Where it was provided that a number of annual scholarships shall be awarded, it was recommended that the administration be authorized to consider these as term or quarter scholarships instead of annual scholarships.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the interpretation of scholarships as recommended. (B) RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING APPLICATION FOR SMALL DORMITORY HOUSING

At the October 6, 1955, meeting of the Board a resolution was adopted authorizing the administration to seek approval of a loan of \$1,500,000.00 from the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government for the construction of organized group housing. After the application was submitted, it was necessary to assure the Agency that dormitory space would be leased on an individual basis and not to groups. In view of this assurance, which was given, the adoption of the following amendatory resolution authorizing the application for a loan was recommended.

WHEREAS, From time to time the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has authorized and directed the University administration to plan and establish an over-all housing program for Southern Illinois University; and

WHEREAS, Preliminary planning and programming for various types of housing have been accomplished; and

WHEREAS, After investigation and study it is deemed advisable to build fifteen housing units, each housing forty-five students, at a cost of approximately \$100,000.00 per unit; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the administration of the University be and is authorized to make application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government for a loan of \$1,500,000.00 to finance the construction of the said housing units.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the amendatory resolution recommended.

(J) CONSIDERATION OF THE ANNUAL INTERNAL BUDGET FOR 1957–1958

In closed session, salary lists covering proposed administrative and faculty salaries, nonacademic rates, and prevailing rates were presented in lieu of the regular budget, Names, present salaries, proposed salaries, and proposed percentage increases were shown for each category.

President Morris indicated that the proposed over-all increases for faculty and administrative personnel averaged about 14 per cent.

After discussion, Martin F. Oehmke moved that the Board approve the salary lists submitted for administrative and faculty personnel, with the administration granted the authority to adjust salaries as necessary and present such adjustments at the next regular Board meeting, together with the completed budget. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

A list of proposed nonacademic rates for 1957–58 was presented, showing the average increase to be between 12 and 13 per cent.

After discussion, Kenneth L. Davis moved that the proposed nonacademic rates for 1957–58 be approved, with the administration granted the authority to adjust salaries as necessary and present such adjustments at the next regular Board meeting, together with the completed budget. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Salary lists for prevailing rate groups and for negotiated rates were presented.

After discussion, Martin F. Oehmke moved that the Board approve the lists covering prevailing rates and negotiated rates, with the administration granted the authority to adjust salaries as necessary and present such adjustments at the next regular Board meeting, together with the completed budget. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

In executive session, Melvin C. Lockard moved that the budgeted salary of President Delyte W. Morris be changed from \$21,500.00 to \$25,000.00 per year, and that the budgeted salary of Emma Louise Morehouse, Recorder in the Office of the Board of Trustees, be changed from \$4,200.00 to \$5,520.00 per year. The motion was seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Martin F. Oehmke moved that the Board approve an increase in mileage reimbursement from seven cents per mile to ten cents per mile for the members of the Board of Trustees only. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris reported briefly on summer session enrollment. Total enrollment for the summer session of 1956 was 2,886. The present total enrollment of 3,023 excluded workshops to be conducted later in the summer, and also excluded the Alton Residence Center summer session to begin July 1, 1957.

President Morris explained that banks for the deposit of funds collected at the Alton and East St. Louis Residence Centers should be named.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board named the First National Bank and Trust Company of Alton, Illinois, as the depository in that city. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board named the First National Bank of East St. Louis, Illinois, as the depository in that city. The vote on both motions was unanimous.

President Morris stated that Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager, who was then on sabbatical leave, was presumably serving his last year before retirement. He proposed that Mr. Miles be given the title of Professor, the proposal having been recommended by the deans and approved by President Morris and by Vice-President Charles D. Tenney.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board unanimously approved the title of Professor for Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr.

President Morris indicated that he had talked to Dr. Harold W. See, Executive Dean of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Office, concerning office space being leased in the Broadview Hotel, East St. Louis, Illinois. Dr. See had recommended that the University continue to lease this space for the coming year.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board accepted the recommendation made by Dr. See. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris explained a \$438,000.00 program at the state level approved by the Civil Aeronautics Authority for Murdale Airport, for im-

provements to be made next year. The local board's participating portion, amounting to \$142,000.00, was requested from the legislature. The Governor thought the project worthy, but because of the tightness of the budget had recommended that the participating amount come from funds appropriated to the University. The Murdale Airport would be able to pay a part of this amount, leaving some \$111,000.00 as the University's participating portion. President Morris explained that the benefits to be derived by the University would include the use of hangar space, instructional space, and classroom space. He recommended approval of the participating portion to be paid from funds set aside for permanent improvements. He also recommended that the Legal Counsel be instructed to draw up an arrangement of benefits which would assure that full value was received from such expenditure, and that a full statement of the program be prepared for the press.

To a question from Mr. Wham, President Morris replied that the program might be approved in principle, enabling the Board to determine what benefits the University would receive. Mr. Lockard indicated that a statement of the plan should be cleared with the Governor before being publicized.

Martin F. Oehmke moved that the Board approve in principle the expenditure of approximately \$11,000.00 for rental of classroom, hangar, and apron space, and primacy of use of the property of the Murdale Airport Authority. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris requested the members of the board to consider names for the new dormitory buildings on Thompson Point. By common consent, the Board agreed to consider a list of names to be submitted by the administration at the next regular meeting.

At the May 16, 1957, meeting the administration was requested to make a study of the cost of owning and operating a Cessna 310 plane, compared with present contractual air travel use. President Morris presented copies of such study, and recommended that the plane be purchased for \$42,500.00.

Mr. Wham stated that the plane contemplated for purchase was of the most advanced design, and that the price seemed fair.

President Morris suggested that the Board accept the thirty-day option to purchase, as offered by the Murdale Airport Authority, and consider the advisability of purchasing the plane. By common consent, the Board agreed to accept such thirty-day option.

The meeting was adjourned at 4 р.м.

LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

I present herewith the University's internal operating budget for all divisions for the fiscal year July 1, 1957, to June 30, 1958, and for academic, administrative, and civil service appointments beginning July 1, 1957.

The budget has been prepared in accordance with current approved policies after considering requests presented by all operating units of the University.

I recommend that:

1. This budget covering the allocation of the University's income for the year beginning July 1, 1957, be approved.

2. The President of the University be authorized in accordance with the needs of the University and the equitable interests involved and within the total income (a) to make such changes and adjustments as are needed, (b) to make such additional appointments as are necessary, and (c) to accept resignations.

All the above is subject to the By-laws, Statutes, and Regulations of the Board of Trustees.

A BILL

For an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. Section 2. The following sum or so much thereof as may be necessary, for distributive purposes, is appropriated to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University:

For awards covering portion of scholarships pertaining to

student fees, in accordance with Article 30 of the

"School Code", as amended \$ 150,000

Section 3. The following named sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, respectively, for the purposes named, are appropriated from the Southern Illinois University Income Fund to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University:

ESTIMATED ENROLLMENTS

There are several types of on-campus degree students, not all of them producing cash income. Each non-veteran produces \$35.00 per twelveweeks term. Students on state scholarships and faculty members taking university courses produce no cash income for educational operations. Veterans of the Korean war do not take the place of World War II veterans as a source of income, since under Public Law 550 they at most pay the same tuition as non-veterans.

PERSONAL SERVICES-FACULTY, ADMINISTRATIVE, AND NON-ACADEMIC

1. It has been possible to recommend substantial increases in salary for members of the faculty and administrative staffs. These increases have been made on a merit basis through careful evaluation of individuals. An attempt has also been made to increase the spread of faculty salaries to bring them closer into line with the spread now prevailing at other universities.

It should be noted that the market for qualified teaching and research personnel has continued to become more competitive as the demand has increased much more than the supply. A factor which has become quite important during the past few years is the increasing demand by industries and governmental agencies for personnel having the kind of training which university faculty members have. The result is that universities must now compete not only among themselves, but with these other agencies, for staff members. At the same time rapidly increasing college and university enrollments are requiring large increases in the teaching staffs of collegiate institutions. The salary increases recommended in this budget will improve considerably the ability of Southern Illinois University to obtain and hold good faculty members. However the market has been changing so rapidly that the institution may anticipate many staffing difficulties in the near future.

2. It has been possible in this budget to make general increases for lowsalaried office workers and other civil service employees whose scale has been low and who have been falling behind those civil service workers who receive prevailing rates or whose salaries are determined by negotiation. The new salaries are consonant with the ranges established by the University Civil Service System.

3. A considerable amount of the additional personal service money has gone into extending on a two-year basis positions added in 1956–57 to meet emergency conditions brought about by the large enrollment increases; to replacing on a permanent basis temporary people employed on an emergency basis; and to adding positions to departments and offices to handle increased enrollments, to develop new programs, and to improve existing programs.

4. Salary rates for persons on leave without pay are shown in parentheses since they do not affect actual expenditures.

PERSONAL SERVICES-STUDENT

1. A total of approximately \$1,050,000.00 has been provided for student help as compared to about \$714,000.00 last year. It is planned in the future to use more student help in the various offices and in the physical plant. All students enrolling at Southern are encouraged to examine not only the financial, but also the educational opportunities provided by participation in a student work program. The appropriate departments are developing training courses for office workers, physical plant workers, laboratory assistants, and other student employees. Great care is being exercised in assigning students to work programs consistent with their study programs. A central Student Work office has been established, and student work supervisors are engaged in on-the-job training.

2. The pay scale for student employees in 1957-58 has been increased ten cents an hour over the scale for the preceding year. The rates will now range from 80 cents to \$1.15 per hour.

3. In recommending student help allotments for 1957-58, consideration has been given to any civil service personnel also made available to the departments so as to achieve as much equity as possible in the distribution of total help.

TRAVEL

1. In order to provide equitable distribution and more effective control of travel funds, the allotments for travel are made in four categories as follows:

a. Institutional travel, which involves travel on University business not identified with a specific department or office.

b. Convention travel, which involves travel to conferences, conventions, and professional meetings. This has been allocated on a pro-rata basis to the major functions of the University, and will be distributed from the offices of the vice presidents, the deans of major educational units, the director of the office of Student Affairs, and the director of the Area Services office.

c. Departmental travel, which involves travel that departments and offices must do in order to perform their regular functions.

d. Air travel, which involves travel where additional convenience and speed serve the best interests of the University.

2. Travel allotments to the various accounts will be used in part for travel in University-owned passenger automobiles. Since the operating cost of these automobiles is chargeable against state appropriations other than travel and such costs are passed on to departments and offices using such service, the allotments for travel exceed the state appropriations for travel.

EQUIPMENT

Study has shown that over 75 per cent of the equipment items ordered cost under \$75.00. Approximately one-fourth of the equipment money has therefore been distributed to the departments and offices for the purchase of small equipment.

With the exception of an allocation to the library for the purchase of books, other equipment monies have been placed in a general account to be allotted periodically as studies of needs determine. These studies should show whether or not there are any items of equipment needed for general University use that have not been purchased by the departments and whether or not certain departments have special needs which have not been met by the allocations hitherto made to them.

OTHER CURRENT EXPENSES

1. Inasmuch as travel and equipment have been allotted separately in this budget, Other Current Expenses include contractual services, commodities, stationery-printing-office supplies, employer contributions to the University Retirement System, refunds, and awards and grants for scholarships.

2. The film rental service of the Audio-Visual Education department will charge other departments for the use of instructional films. On the basis of experience, allocations have therefore been allotted to the departments to be used for this specific purpose.

3. The problem of providing for the on-campus expenses of interviewees, consultants, and other official visitors to the campus has been met by allotting limited funds for this purpose to the offices that handle convention travel.

GENERAL COMMENTS

1. The University's internal operating budget includes recommended budget allocations for restricted funds, that is, funds not appropriated to the University from General Revenue or University Income Fund. Income for restricted funds is provided from instructional research, and student aid grants made by outside agencies, from University student activity fees, and from other minor sources. Also included for information are the estimated operations of the University's Service and Revolving Funds. The titles of all such accounts, as well as those of auxiliary enterprises, are enclosed in parentheses.

2. This year the graduate assistantships for the instructional units have been budgeted to the schools and colleges rather than to the departments. The deans will distribute the assistantships among the departments in accordance with the needs for the services and the availability of suitable candidates.

RULES OF THE UNIVERSITY FACULTY

of Southern Illinois University

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Rules of the University Faculty of Southern Illinois University

Article I MEMBERSHIP

"The University Faculty shall consist of the President, the Chief Officer of Instruction, the Chief Executive Assistant, the Business Manager, the Registrar, the Director of Libraries, the academic Deans and Directors, the Director of the University Health Service, the Director of Student Affairs, the Dean of Men, the Dean of Women, the Director of Area Services, and all Professors, Associate Professors, Assistant Professors, and Instructors." (B)*

ARTICLE II OFFICERS AND MEETINGS

SECTION 1. Officers. "The presiding officer of the University Faculty shall be the President of the University or his delegated representative. Otherwise, in his absence, the Acting President shall serve." (C,1)

"A Secretary of the University Faculty shall be appointed or reappointed annually from the faculty by the President after consultation with the University Council." (C,2,a) "The Secretary shall hold the minutes of meetings of all faculty bodies and shall serve as custodian of all official records and reports by faculty committees, of communications to and from the faculty, and of the legislation of the Board of Trustees transmitted to him by the President of the University." (C,2,b,1) "He shall receive from each major unit in the educational organization of the University copies of the rules enacted by it, together with any changes made therein from time to time." (C,2,b,2)

SECTION 2. Meetings. a. Regular meetings shall be held at least once during an academic term, at a time determined by the President or Chief Officer of Instruction. Such meetings shall be called by the President or Chief Officer of Instruction in accordance with the procedure outlined in Paragraph e of this section governing the proposed agenda. A greater number of regular meetings during any term of the academic year or during the summer session, may be determined by: (1) a majority vote of the University Faculty at any regular or special meeting; or (2) a majority vote of the Faculty Council, with the subsequent approval of the University Faculty.

b. Special meetings may be called by the President or Chief Officer of Instruction, and shall be called by one of these officers if requested by: (1) a twothirds vote of the University Faculty at any regular or special meeting; (2) a two-thirds vote of the Faculty Council; or (3) a petition of twenty-five members of the University Faculty to the President, through the office of the Secretary of the University Faculty.

c. A majority of the University Faculty shall constitute a quorum.

d. The first two items of business at a regular meeting shall be: (1) the approval of minutes of the previous meeting, and (2) the selection of agenda items to be discussed at the present meeting.

* All quotations come from Part III, Article IV, Section 5 (pp. 18-21) of the By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees, as approved May 25, 1951, and amended September 17, 1953.

e. The agenda for each regular meeting shall be proposed by the Agenda Committee of the Faculty Council and submitted in writing to each member of the University Faculty at least five days before the meeting at which the proposed items are to be considered. Items for the agenda may be presented to the Agenda Committee of the Faculty Council by the President, the Chief Officer of Instruction, or any member of the University Faculty. The University Faculty may, by a majority vote of those present, exclude any item from the proposed agenda or add thereto any item which has been rejected by the Agenda Committee of the Faculty Council. By a two-thirds vote of those present, the University Faculty may add new items to the agenda.

f. The agenda proposed for a special meeting shall be included in the call for that meeting.

g. In case of doubt concerning the procedures to be used in conducting a meeting of the University Faculty, Robert's Rules of Order shall be followed, except where they conflict with the By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees, or with the Rules of the University Faculty.

h. The Secretary of the University Faculty shall provide the members of the University Faculty with the minutes of a regular meeting prior to the date set for holding the next regular meeting.

ARTICLE III

FUNCTIONS, POWERS, AND DUTIES

SECTION 1. General. The University Faculty shall consider all matters referred to it by the President or the Faculty Council (see Section 2) and may discuss, or make recommendations upon, all matters of general concern to the University Faculty.

SECTION 2. Faculty Council of the University Faculty. a. Composition. "The Faculty Council . . . shall consist of the President . . . the Chief Officer of Instruction . . . the Secretary of the University Faculty . . . the Academic Deans and Directors, and nine members from each of the four tenure ranks (Professors, Associate Professors, Assistant Professors, and Instructors) selected as follows:" (E,2)

b. Election of Members. "Each year members of each of the four [tenure] ranks, except those on term appointments of a year or less, shall elect or re-elect three persons from their rank to serve three-year terms, bearing in mind as qualifications for membership in the Faculty Council the scholarship, educational standards and proficiency, and interest in broad University welfare of those nominated." (E,2,d). The terms of one-third of the elected members shall expire on June 30 of each year.

The members of the University Faculty from each rank will nominate, in the following manner, twice as many persons as there are positions to be filled from that rank: The Secretary of the University Faculty shall supply each member of the University Faculty with a ballot containing the names of the faculty members of the rank concerned. The ballot shall indicate what members of the rank are also members of the Faculty Council and when their terms on the Council expire. Each member of a given rank will vote for twice as many persons as there are positions to be filled in his rank and return the ballot in a sealed envelope. The nominees will be those persons who have received the highest number of votes. Ballots containing an alphabetical list of the nominees for a given rank shall be mailed by the Secretary of the University Faculty to all University Faculty members of that rank. Each member will vote for as many persons as there are positions to be filled and return his ballot in a sealed envelope. The persons receiving the highest number of votes will be elected. All ballots will be counted by the Canvassing Committee of the Faculty Council. All ties will be broken in a manner determined by this Committee.

c. Vacancies. If an elected member of the Faculty Council is to be absent from the University for two or more quarters of the academic year, he shall be replaced by the person who, in the most recent election for Council members, received the next highest number of votes in the rank concerned. Such replacement shall be temporary or for the remainder of the term, depending upon whether the absent member does or does not return to the faculty. If the vacancy cannot be filled in this manner, a special election shall be held, following the procedure outlined in Section 2,b of this Article. A member's status on the Faculty Council will not be affected by his promotion in rank during his term of office.

d. Duties. "The Faculty Council is the body to which the University Faculty delegates its legislative and regulatory functions, as hereinafter listed, subject to the procedure indicated for maintenance of the authority of the University Faculty." (E,1)

"The Faculty Council shall serve as a University Curriculum Council ..., shall recommend Rules and Regulations concerning the admission of students and their dismissal for academic reasons ..., and shall constitute a Committee on Committees" for recommending needed faculty committees and nominating committee personnel "subject to additional nominations from the floor preceding elections by the University Faculty." (E,3,c,d,f)

The Faculty Council shall consider all matters referred to it by the University Faculty, by the President or Chief Officer of Instruction, or by any member of the University Faculty, provided the referral procedure conforms to the Rules of the Faculty Council. Also, "the Faculty Council may recommend amendment, addition to, or elimination of any Statutes or Regulations of the Board of Trustees concerning educational matters." (E,3,e)

"The Faculty Council shall prepare rules for its own organization and for the conduct of its own activities and responsibilities in harmony with the *By*-*Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees*" (E,3,a) and with the Rules of the University Faculty.

e. Referral of a proposed University Faculty Rule. The Secretary of the University Faculty shall print and distribute to members of the University Faculty any recommendation of the Faculty Council along with a summary of the discussion and voting thereon, if such recommendation is intended to have the force of a Rule of the University Faculty. "If within eight calendar days after publication, fifteen per cent of the voting membership of the University Faculty so request [in signed statements sent to the Secretary of the University Faculty], the recommendation shall be referred to the University Faculty at its next regular or special meeting. Any change in the recommendation must be approved by a majority of the voting membership of the University Faculty. If there is no such call for referral of the recommendation to the University Faculty within eight calendar days after publication [excluding vacation periods], the recommendation shall be submitted to the approval of the President." (E,e,h)

f. Distribution of proceedings to University Faculty. The Secretary of the University Faculty shall distribute a summary of the proceedings of each Faculty Council meeting to the members of the University Faculty.

g. Obligations of members and committee officers. Each elected member of the Faculty Council is to be regarded as holding a position whereby he represents the interests of the University and Faculty as a whole in those matters under the jurisdiction of the Faculty Council. The chairman and secretary of each Faculty Council committee shall transmit important minutes and documents to their successors.

SECTION 3. Revision of Statutes or Regulations of Board of Trustees. a. "The University Faculty shall have power to recommend, through the President of the University, amendment, addition to, or elimination of any Statutes or Regulations of the Board of Trustees concerning educational matters." (D,4)

b. If the Faculty Council originates such revisionary action, such proposals shall be subject to the same procedure as outlined for the adoption of a "Rule" under Section 2,e of this Article.

SECTION 4. Election of University Council and Budgetary Council Members. a. University Council. The University Faculty shall choose the elective members of the University Council in the following manner: The colleges and the group of faculty members not assigned to any college shall each submit to the Secretary of the University Faculty three nominations for each position to be filled on the University Council by a given college or the noncollege group. The nominees for the noncollege group shall be chosen by means of a mail ballot sent by the Secretary of the University Faculty to each member of the group. A ballot containing the names of the nominees listed in alphabetical order for each college and for the noncollege group, and accompanied by the current elected membership of the University Council with expiration dates of terms, shall be sent to each member of the University Faculty. Each member will vote for as many persons as are to be elected from each college or group and return the ballot in a sealed envelope to the Secretary of the University Faculty. The person receiving the highest number of votes in each college or group will be elected.

b. University Budgetary Council. The University Faculty shall submit to the President a list of seven nominees from which the President will choose two persons to represent the University at large on the University Budgetary Council for terms of three years. The nominees will be chosen in the following manner: The Faculty Council, at any regular or special meeting, shall nominate fourteen persons from the floor. The Secretary of the University Faculty shall submit a ballot containing the names of these nominees to the University Faculty at any regular or special meeting. Additional nominations may be made from the floor. Each member of the University Faculty will vote for seven persons. The seven persons receiving the highest number of votes will constitute the nominees to be submitted to the President.

SECTION 5. Referenda and Appeals. "Whenever the procedures outlined in the [By-Laws], Statutes, [and Regulations of the Board of Trustees] fail by default or design, the University Faculty may, by a majority vote, ask the President or Acting President to send its recommendations to the Board. The President or Acting President shall either transmit them to the Board at its next regular meeting or notify the Faculty within ten days that he prefers not to do so. If the Faculty votes by a two-thirds majority at its next meeting following such notification to repeat its request, the President or Acting President shall be obliged to present the recommendations to the Board at the earliest opportunity." (D,5)

ARTICLE IV

ADMISSION POLICY

(On April 28, 1955, the Board of Trustees approved this Article as an amendment to the Rules of the University Faculty.)

SECTION 1. General Admission Information for Undergraduates. a. Admission at Southern Illinois University constitutes admission to a particular college or instructional division as well as admission to the University, except in the case of a student who is admitted as an unclassified student. In addition, the applicant is expected to indicate the particular major field in which he is interested. Should he be undecided, he should enroll in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, unless he plans to teach, in which case he may enroll in the College of Education. A student may later change his college or major subject if he desires. If such change is made later, however, he may need to make up the elementary requirements of the newly chosen curriculum and thereby delay his graduation.

b. Students may be admitted at the beginning of each session of the University. Application for admission should be initiated with the Office of Admissions and should be done sufficiently far in advance of the desired entrance date to permit all necessary processing work to be completed by then. A general admission requirement is the filing of a transcript of record covering all previous high school and college work. Such transcripts should be mailed to the Office of Admissions.

c. Any student, though already matriculated at Southern, who undertakes work in another institution, whether in the regular session, summer session, or extension, and who plans to continue study at Southern, is required to file a record of such work with the Registrar at Southern. He must keep his academic record complete. These transcripts become a part of his permanent record and are not returned to the student.

d. Admission requirements do not apply for entrance into noncredit Adult Education courses offered by the Division of Technical and Adult Education.

SECTION 2. Admission of Undergraduate Students Without Previous College Experience. a. To be eligible for admission, a person, whether a resident or nonresident of Illinois, must be a graduate of a recognized high school or 21 years of age. Graduates of nonrecognized high schools may be admitted by the Director of Admissions by examination. Persons 21 years of age and not high school graduates are required to pass the General Educational Development Tests within the first period of attendance at this University.

b. A high school graduate who did not rank in the upper three-fourths of his high school graduating class will be admitted to the University on probation. Such a student will be placed under the special supervision of the dean of the college or the director of the division in which he is enrolled, and will be subject to this University's scholarship rules.

c. Veterans, both resident and nonresident of Illinois, who are not graduates of recognized high schools nor 21 years of age may qualify for admission by passing the GED Test.

d. All new students at Southern Illinois University must take the American Council on Education Psychological Examination, a diagnostic reading test, an English placement test, and a mathematics placement test. These are given during New Student Week, and also once each quarter in the school year. A student will not be considered as having completed his admission requirements until these tests have been completed. Information concerning the testing program may be obtained from the Office of Student Affairs.

SECTION 3. Admission of Transfer Students to Advanced Standing. a. To be eligible for admission to advanced standing, an applicant must present a full record of his academic experience. This includes transcript and evidence of graduation from high school, and transcript and evidence of good standing from every college or university attended. Failure to do so will be cause for dismissal from the University. All such transcripts should be mailed directly from the institution to the Office of Admissions.

b. Admission by transfer does not necessarily mean that all credits presented for transfer will be accepted. Transferable credits are determined through evaluation at the time of presentation. In all cases, at least three-fourths of transferable credits from any institution must be of "C" quality or better.

c. An applicant desiring to transfer to this University is subject to this University's scholarship rules. A case involving admission on probation will be referred to the dean or director of the college or division in which the student desires to enroll before final admission will be granted.

SECTION 4. Re-entrance. a. Students who were in attendance and in good standing at the close of the preceding quarter need not make application for re-entrance before registration. However, a former student not in attendance at the close of the preceding quarter must contact the Office of Admissions for re-entrance clearance prior to registration.

b. A former student who seeks re-entrance, but who is not in good standing at Southern, must clear his status before the Office of Admissions will prepare his registration permit. It is to the interest of the candidate to initiate re-entrance clearance early so that all inquiries may be answered and so that the candidate can find time to complete any requirements that may be imposed upon him.

SECTION 5. Admission to Graduate School. a. Admission to the Graduate School is granted by the Registrar and the Dean of the Graduate School, but approval for majoring in a particular department can be given only by the chairman of that department. Field majors must be approved by the chairman of each department concerned. Unconditional admission to the Graduate School is granted only to graduates of fully accredited colleges and universities; graduates of institutions of limited accreditation, however, may be given conditional admission, depending upon the merit of the institution concerned. Students whose undergraduate records are not such as to indicate ability to do high quality work should not expect unconditional admission to the Graduate School.

b. Forms upon which application may be made for admission to the Graduate

School may be obtained from the Office of the Graduate School. With the application, the applicant must submit an official transcript (sent directly from the college or university from which the degree was received) of all his undergraduate work and of any graduate credits which he may wish to transfer.

c. A student who wishes to enter the Graduate School immediately after graduation may submit, during the final term of undergraduate work, a transcript bearing an indication of the courses he is taking, together with a statement from his registrar that graduation will follow successful completion of his current enrollment. A supplementary transcript which records all completed courses and the degree earned must be submitted before full admission can be granted. A student who has completed his undergraduate work and has been recommended for graduation may be admitted to the Graduate School before the bachelor's degree is conferred. Credentials submitted to the University become its permanent property and are placed on file in the Registrar's Office.

d. Undergraduate students who are within one term's work (sixteen quarter hours) of meeting requirements for the bachelor's degree may take courses for graduate credit by applying for admission to the Graduate School and obtaining approval from the departmental chairman concerned for their proposed major. Undergraduates who take such courses for graduate credit must also obtain the approval of the Dean of the Graduate School at the time of registration.

e. A student holding a bachelor's degree, and wishing to take graduate or undergraduate courses without their being counted toward a degree at Southern, will be admitted as an "unclassified graduate student." Special application forms for such status may be obtained from the Graduate Office or the Office of Admissions. In such capacity he may enroll in graduate or undergraduate courses for which he has had the prerequisites. No course can be credited toward a master's degree unless the student, at the time the course is taken, has applied for admission to the Graduate School as a regular graduate student.

SECTION 6. Admission to Full Graduate Standing. a. Written approval for each student to major in the department of his choice must be obtained at the time of his first registration in the Graduate School from the chairman of the department or his representative. If this is not done, the student will have no assurance that courses taken in the department will lead to a major or be applied toward a master's degree at this University. The process by which a proposed major is approved is initiated by the Dean of the Graduate School, who informs each student of the action taken by the departmental chairman, and of any conditions which have to be fulfilled before the major can be considered for final approval.

b. The student attains full graduate standing when he has fulfilled the prerequisites of his major department and has made satisfactory scores upon the Graduate Aptitude Test—or has completed half the work for the master's degree with an average of "B" or better in the event that his scores are not satisfactory. In no case is such a successful completion of half the required work to be considered an acceptable alternative to taking the Graduate Aptitude Test.

UNIVERSITY FACULTY COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. General Policies Concerning Committees. a. Membership. The

University Faculty shall create University Faculty committees and select their personnel on the basis of recommendations and nominations by the Faculty Council. In general, the number of elected personnel on any University Faculty committee shall be a multiple of five, and the term of office shall be five years, with the term of one in each group of five elected members expiring annually. At the first election, the person receiving the highest number of votes will serve for five years, the one with the next highest number, four years, and so on.

b. Election of Members. Elected members of University Faculty committees shall be chosen in the following manner: The Faculty Council shall nominate twice as many persons as there are positions to be filled on any committee. The Secretary of the University Faculty shall submit to each member of the University Faculty, at any regular or special meeting, a ballot containing the names of the nominees. This ballot shall be accompanied by a list showing the current membership of the committee and the expiration date of the term of each member. Opportunity will be given for additional nominations from the floor. Each person will then vote for as many nominees as there are positions to be filled. The persons receiving the highest number of votes will be elected.

c. Selection of Chairman. Each committee composed of elected members only shall elect its own chairman annually. The chairman may succeed himself. The President of the University shall be asked to name the chairman of any committee composed of both elected and appointed members.

d. Organization of Committees. Not later than fifteen days following the election for full-term membership on any wholly elective committee, the Secretary of the University Faculty shall call a meeting of this committee for the purpose of effecting its organization.

e. Duration of Term. A member of any University Faculty committee shall hold office until his current term as a member of the committee expires, or until as soon thereafter as his successor on the committee is chosen and qualified.

f. Vacancies. A vacancy occurring in the elected membership of any committee during the year shall be filled by the person who received, at the last annual election for membership on that committee, the next highest number of votes. In case the vacancy cannot be filled in this manner, a special election to fill the vacancy shall be held in the manner outlined in Paragraph b of this section. A person chosen by either method shall hold office temporarily or for the remainder of the unexpired term, depending upon whether the person replaced does or does not return to the campus before his term on the committee would expire.

SECTION 2. Standing Committees of the University Faculty. a. Community and Welfare Service Committee. The function of this committee will be to aid and promote responsible philanthropic fund-raising campaigns by University and non-University groups through collecting monies, and through publicity and other activities necessary to such campaigns. The personnel of this committee shall be: Director of Area Services as Chairman; departmental chairmen; director or administrative head of Personnel Office, Library, Museum, Health Service, Student Affairs, Audio-Visual Aids Service, University School, Vocational-Technical Institute, Registrar's Office, University Extension, Placement Service, Duplicating Service, and Statistical Service.

b. Faculty Salary and Rank Committee. The function of this committee is to make a continuing study of salary schedules, standards for promotion in rank and adjustments in salary, and the mechanics of the pay plan. It will report periodically to the faculty and to the administration the results of such studies, and will make recommendations to the faculty on these matters when requested by the faculty or administration to do so. The *personnel* of this committee shall consist of the President of the University or his designated representative as chairman ex officio with power to vote in case of a tie, five members elected by the University Faculty, and five members appointed by the President.

c. Convocations Committee. The function of this committee is to work with the administration in planning academic convocations such as Commencement and Honors Day. Its *personnel* shall consist of five faculty members elected by the University faculty, two students, Director of the Alumni Office, two members appointed by the President of the University, and the Registrar or his designated representative.[†]

d. Graduation Appeals Committee. The function of this committee is to hear and pass upon appeals for special consideration in the matter of meeting general requirements for graduation. Its *personnel* shall consist of the academic dean and the Registrar.

e. Honors Work Program Committee. The function of this committee is to formulate the Honors Work Program. Its personnel shall consist of five members elected by the University Faculty, preferably representing the various broad areas of study.

f. Honorary Degrees Committee. The function of this committee is to make recommendations to the President of the University concerning candidates to receive honorary degrees from the University, and concerning honors and awards, other than degrees, to be given at commencement to persons not enrolled in the University. The *personnel* of this committee shall be five members to be elected by the University Faculty.

g. Faculty Welfare and Service Committee. The function of this committee is to deal with such problems as retirement benefits, insurance, health service plans, faculty flower fund, and other matters pertaining to the general welfare of the faculty referred to it by the Faculty Council. Its personnel shall consist of the Secretary of the University Faculty and five members elected by the University Faculty.

h. Lectures and Entertainment Committee. The function of this committee is to advise the Director(s) of Programs concerning the content of Universitysponsored all-campus programs and to evaluate these programs. The personnel shall consist of five members elected by the University Faculty and two students chosen by the Student Council.[‡]

ARTICLE VI AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. Amendments to Rules of University Faculty. Amendments to the Rules of the University Faculty may be adopted at any regular or special meeting by an affirmative vote of a majority of the membership of the University Faculty, or of two-thirds of those voting on the amendment, provided any proposed amendment has been submitted in writing by the Secretary of the University Faculty to each member of the University Faculty at least two weeks before the meeting at which it is to be considered. Any proposed amendment to the Rules of the University Faculty shall become effective only after approval by the Board of Trustees and incorporation in the Regulations of the Board.

SECTION 2. Effect of Amendments of the By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees. Any change in the By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees adopted in the prescribed manner, shall automatically supersede any conflicting portions of these University Faculty Rules.

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
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
