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MINUTES OF MEETINGS



MEETING OF JULY 25, 1957

THE JULY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Thursday, July 25, 1957, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, Vernon L. Nickell. Mr. Sturgis was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on June 25, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) APPROVAL OF DEPARTMENTS FOR GRADUATE STUDY

Effective July 1, in accordance with reorganization plans approved by the Board of Trustees, a number of new departments came into existence. Most of these were offshoots of already existing depart-

ments which have been offering graduate work. It does not follow, however, that the new departments possess the qualifications in staff preparation and in library and laboratory facilities which would qualify them as graduate departments. Our Graduate Council has therefore undertaken a careful study of the new departments to ascertain whether or not they are qualified to offer graduate work, and has recommended that the following be so approved:

School of Agriculture—Animal Industry, General Agriculture, Plant Industry

School of Communications—Speech, Theater

College of Education—Educational Administration and Supervision, Secondary Education

School of Fine Arts—Design

College of Liberal Arts and Sciences—Anthropology, Physiology

Each of these departments has at least three persons holding the doctor's degree or equivalent, and possesses the necessary facilities for the offering of graduate work. Approval is therefore requested for their offering graduate work at the master's degree level.

The former departments of Home Economics and Business Administration are also subdividing. It is felt that at the present none of these new departments should offer its own distinct major on the graduate level. The departments wish, however, to offer field majors, drawing upon the staff members and facilities of several of the new departments. Approval is therefore requested for the following field majors for the master's degree:

School of Business—Business, Business Education

School of Home Economics—Home Economics

Professor Tenney indicated that Willis G. Swartz, Dean of the Graduate School, had recommended that the Department of Elementary Education in the College of Education also be included as a department approved to offer graduate study.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved recommendations concerning the offering of graduate work in the departments listed, including the Department of Elementary Education.

(B) ESTABLISHMENT OF SCHOOL OF HOME ECONOMICS

At the June 29, 1956, meeting of the Board of Trustees, a plan for a School of Home Economics was presented to the Board with a request that the Board approve the establishment of a School of Home

Economics with four departments (Clothing and Textiles, Food and Nutrition, Home and Family, and Home Economics Education), effective not before July 1, 1957, with the understanding that the period intervening should be spent in the study of the facilities, staffs, and curricula of the proposed departments.

During the current year these studies have been proceeding, and we are now prepared to recommend that the school be formally established as of the beginning of the current fiscal year.

It is further recommended that Professor Eileen E. Quigley, who has been serving as chairman of the Department of Home Economics since 1948, be designated as Dean of the new School of Home Economics. Professor Quigley's assignment to this position has been recommended not only by the members of her department, but also by the deans of the other schools and colleges.

For the four departments in the School of Home Economics we are recommending chairmen as follows: Clothing and Textiles—Professor Adeline Hoffman; Food and Nutrition—Professor Marion A. Wharton; Home and Family—Professor Betty Jane Johnston; Home Economics Education—Professor Anna Carol Fults.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the formal establishment of the School of Home Economics, with Professor Eileen E. Quigley as Dean, effective July 1, 1957, and approved the recommendation concerning chairmen of the four departments in the new school.

(C) PURCHASE ORDERS, CONTRACTS, AND ENCUMBRANCE AUTHORIZATIONS AWARDED DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE, 1957, AMOUNTING TO LESS THAN \$1,000.00

The Board received a report of purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during the month of June, 1957, amounting to less than \$1,000.00, in the total amount of \$148,786.88. A copy of the report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

(E) RESOLUTIONS ACCEPTING BIDS FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Resolutions were presented, pertaining to the acceptance of bids for capital improvements, as per contracts listed above.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved contracts, purchase orders, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during the month of June, 1957, amounting to less than \$1,000.00; approved contracts, purchase orders, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during the same period, amounting to \$1,000.00 or over; and adopted resolutions accepting bids for capital improvements. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(F) This section, concerning purchasing procedures and practices, was deferred for consideration at a subsequent meeting.

(G) LEASE OF FACILITIES FROM MURDALE AIRPORT AUTHORITY

At its last meeting, the Board of Trustees approved the expenditure of approximately \$11,000.00 to cover the lease of certain facilities by the University from the Murdale Airport Authority. This amount was to cover a part of the Authority's commitment to the federal and state governments for the jointly sponsored construction of new facilities. Since that time detailed information concerning the facilities to be acquired and the participation of local funds in the construction program have been made available.

The project in which the University has committed its participation includes: land acquisition and clear zones for the northeast-southwest runway; extension of the northeast-southwest runway, including lighting system and approach clearances; provision for a sewage disposal system; and provision for a water supply system. The total cost is \$104,000.00 of which the federal government is contributing \$53,000.00, the state aeronautical department is contributing \$30,000.00, and the local board must provide \$21,000.00. Of the necessary \$21,000.00, the Authority has \$6,000.00, leaving a balance of \$15,000.00.

In accordance with the instructions of the Board at the last meeting, the following lease is submitted to cover the expenditure of \$15,000.00

for the 24-month period from July 1, 1957, to June 30, 1959. Following the lease is a statement on the larger segment of the proposed project.

LEASE

This indenture of lease made and entered into this first day of July, 1957, by and between the Murdale Airport Authority, a municipal corporation of the State of Illinois, hereinafter called Lessor, and the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a body politic and corporate of the State of Illinois, hereinafter called the Lessee.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, LESSOR owns an airport known as the Southern Illinois Airport, located in the County of Jackson, State of Illinois, hereinafter called the "Airport"; and

WHEREAS, Lessee is an educational institution engaged in the offering of courses and instruction; and

WHEREAS, Lessee desires to lease certain facilities, premises, rights, licenses, services, and privileges in connection with and on the Airport, and Lessor is willing to lease the same to Lessee upon the terms and conditions hereinafter stated;

NOW, THEREFORE, For and in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained and other valuable considerations Lessor does hereby demise and let unto Lessee, and Lessee does hereby hire and take from Lessor, certain premises and facilities, rights, licenses, services and privileges in connection with and on the Airport as follows, to-wit:

1. *Use of Airport*

The use, in common with others authorized so to do, of the Airport and appurtenances thereto, together with all facilities, equipment, improvements, and services which have been or may hereafter be provided at or in connection with the Airport from time to time, including, without limiting the generality hereof, the landing field, sewage and water facilities, radio aids, signals, and all other conveniences for flying, landings and take-offs of aircraft, which use, without limiting the generality hereof, shall include:

(1) The right to train, subject to rules and regulations, as hereinafter provided, on the Airport, personnel and students of the Lessee in matters, techniques and subjects of air transportation and air science. For this purpose, in addition to the public space which the Lessee shall have a common right to, shall include the exclusive use of one classroom in the main building consisting of one room 20 by 20 feet;

(2) The right to establish, maintain, operate and control, using in connection therewith all weather facilities and data available to the Lessor, a weather bureau station consisting of one room 12 feet by 20 feet located in the main administration building;

(3) The exclusive use of one T hangar approximately 32 feet by 40 feet commonly known as Hangar No. 20;

(4) The exclusive use of a ramp area located southwest of the main taxi way and consisting of approximately 15,000 square feet of concrete and turf on which are presently installed seven tie-down areas;

(5) Approximately five acres of ground located west of the south end of the north-south sod runway;

(6) The full and free right of ingress to and egress from the premises and facilities of the Lessor for Lessee, its employees, agents, passengers, guests, patrons, invitees, students and all others having business with the above specified persons.

2. *Term*

The initial term of this agreement shall be for the period commencing on July 1, 1957, and ending on June 30, 1959; subject, however, to the option hereby granted by Lessor to Lessee to renew this agreement for nine additional terms of two years each under the same terms and conditions as provided herein for the initial term hereof, provided, however, that the rental fees and charges for said renewal terms as provided herein shall not be the same rental fees and charges as for the initial term, said rental fees and charges for renewal terms to be at the amount of \$1.00 for every additional term of two years hereof.

3. *Rental Payments*

Lessee agrees to pay to Lessor for the use of the premises, facilities, rights, licenses, services and privileges granted hereunder a rental fee and charge of \$15,000.00, payable in monthly installments covering the preceding calendar month.

4. *Rules and Regulations*

Lessor shall adopt and enforce reasonable rules and regulations which Lessee agrees to observe and obey with respect to the use of the Airport, which shall provide for the safety of those using same; provided that such rules and regulations shall be consistent with safety and with rules and regulations and orders of the Civil Aeronautics Authority with respect to operation of the Airport and provided further that such rules and regulations shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of this agreement or the procedures prescribed or approved from time to time by the Civil Aeronautics Authority with respect to the operation of the Airport.

5. *Notices*

Notices to Lessor provided herein shall be sufficient if sent by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the Lessor in care of Murdale Airport Authority, Carbondale, Illinois, and notices to Lessee if sent by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, addressed to Business Manager, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Illinois, or to such other respective addresses as the parties may designate to each other in writing from time to time.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have caused this agreement to be executed the day and year written above.

It may be recalled that the above discussed project was the initial step of more extensive improvements which were to be in part financed by a lease to the University of additional facilities of the Authority. Since the time of the last meeting of the Board, it has been possible to obtain a detailed statement on the commitments which the Authority will make to the University and, further, to ascertain the exact improvements and additions which are to be made to the Airport itself.

The following is a list of increments of work which it is proposed to add to the Airport together with a total estimated cost thereof:

1. Land acquisition for extension of the north-south runway, 95 acres	\$ 35,000.00
2. Clearing zones on the north-south runway	8,000.00
3. Construction of a north-south runway, 4,274 feet by 100 feet	260,000.00
4. Taxi ways to T hangars	5,000.00
5. Lighting system extension for north-south runway	8,000.00

Of the total estimated cost, the Civil Aeronautics Authority has agreed to participate to the extent of \$222,000.00 and to that end have committed funds in that amount. The Illinois Department of Aeronautics has received by specific state appropriation \$80,500.00 for this project, leaving the sum of \$141,500.00 for local participation. It is still uncertain as to the exact amount which the Murdale Airport Authority can obtain from the sale of bonds, due to vagaries of the tax assessment rolls from year

to year in any given county and also due to the uncertainty of what the new bonding authority bill passed by the last General Assembly will mean for Jackson County. Although there is no definite figure available the estimates are between \$30,000.00 and \$50,000.00 for the two year period during which the work will be in progress. It is apparent that the obligation to which the University is asked to commit itself amounts to approximately \$100,000.00. In return for this commitment from the University the Authority is willing to make the following commitments:

1. All space and facilities not presently committed to the Civil Aeronautics Authority and by other contractual arrangements will be leased to the University. The additional contractual arrangement include revenue bonds and the operator's agreement with Midwestern Aero Service.
2. The initial term of the lease will be for two years but with renewals at \$1.00 for every two years for a total period of twenty years.
3. The Authority will make full use of both its general obligation and revenue-producing bond power to defray as much of the cost of the improvements as can be had from these various powers.
4. The University will have full right to teach, instruct, use and exercise all facilities and appurtenances thereto of the Airport Authority including all improvements added thereto.

The Board may recall that it was advised at its last meeting that this proposition resulted from a suggestion made by Governor Stratton when called upon by the Murdale Airport Authority which was seeking funds for the same purposes outlined above. Following the suggestion by the Governor, the Authority called upon the University administration, requesting the suggested assistance.

There are several advantages which will accrue to the University's program as a result of having unlimited use of airport facilities together with the vast improvement of these facilities. Ever-increasing attention and educational awareness of air science, development of air science programs, particularly in a University where there is a major Air Force ROTC program, contributes to the advisability of accepting the suggestion of the Governor.

The development of additional facilities for weather bureau data would be of great value.

Approval of commitment of these funds along the manner above outlined is recommended, with exact details subject to later review.

The Board discussed at length the leasing and improvement of certain facilities at the Southern Illinois Airport. The matter was thereupon deferred for additional study and until the next meeting.

(H) DORMITORY FUNDS OF 1952 AND 1956

Information reports showing the status of the various accounts comprising the Dormitory Revenue Fund of 1952, the Dormitory Revenue Fund of 1956, and the Dormitory Construction Fund of 1956 were presented. A copy of each report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

Formal approval by the Board was requested for the transfer of \$37,000.00 from the Dormitory Revenue Account to the Interest and Sinking Fund Account, Dormitory Revenue Fund of 1952. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard the Board formally approved transfer of funds for the purpose specified, and accepted the reports submitted. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer and was carried by the following vote: Yes, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(I) PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO POLICY RELATING TO EMPLOYEE BENEFITS

At its meeting of July 11, 1957, the Merit Board of the University Civil Service System of Illinois considered recommendations for changes in and additions to the Policy Relating to Employee Benefits. These recommendations were made in accordance with the duty conferred by statute upon the Merit Board to make recommendations for policies relating to the conditions of employment at the various state-supported institutions of higher education. Its recommendations were made after consideration of the recommendations of the Employees' Civil Service Advisory Committee and the Faculty-Administrative Committee, each of which bodies have a representative from this University.

We recommend that these proposals be added to and incorporated in the Policy Relating to Employee Benefits of Southern Illinois University.

The proposals are as follows:

I. Proposed policy (new) to be added at the end of the section on "Legal Holidays" as Section D:

D. To be eligible for holiday compensation, an employee must have been scheduled to work the nearest scheduled day before or day after the holiday, except when the employee is on disability leave or vacation, or when rotating of schedules provides work arrangements which do not constitute a layoff.

(The effect of this additional section is that for an employee to be eligible for holiday compensation, he must have been scheduled to work the day before or the day after a holiday, except when he is on sick leave or vacation.)

II. Proposed policy (new) to be added as Section D, under the heading "Work Week":

D. All work days and work weeks and all overtime required of women employees shall conform to the provisions of the Illinois Revised Statute, Chapter 48, "An Act Concerning the Hours of Employment for Females in Certain Occupations."

(This is already provided by law and the University is obligated to follow its provisions.)

III. OVERTIME PAY

Present Policy

C. By mutual agreement between a department and an employee, with the approval of the Director, the employee may work overtime with equivalent time off at straight time (in lieu of cash payment), such time off to be taken at some mutually agreeable time.

1. Provided that this does not conflict with local prevailing practice.

Proposed Policy

C. By mutual agreement between a department and an employee, the employee may work overtime with time off at time and one-half in lieu of cash payment, such time off to be taken at some mutually agreeable time, provided that no more than 40 hours of overtime should be accumulated which may be taken as time off in lieu of cash payment.

IV. DISABILITY LEAVE WITH FULL PAY:

Present Policy

A. Each employee shall accumulate disability leave with full pay at the rate of one working day for each month of service until total accumulation is 45 working days. Amount of leave accumulated at the time when any disability begins shall be available in full and additional leave shall continue to be earned while an employee is using that already accumulated. After an employee has accumulated a total of 45 working days his rate of accumulation shall be reduced to one work day for each two months of service. There shall be no limit in the amount which may be accumulated at this rate thereafter. If use of available leave thereafter reduces the total to less than 45 days, the accumulation will again be at the rate of one day per month until a new total of 45 days is reached.

Proposed Policy

A. Each employee shall accumulate disability leave with full pay

at the rate of one working day for each month of service. Amount of leave accumulated at the time when any disability begins shall be available in full and additional leave shall continue to be earned while an employee is using that already accumulated. There shall be no limit in the amount which may be accumulated.

(Studies have indicated that this change will provide a negligible increase in cost and will only benefit the employees with longer tenure who have not taken advantage of their disability leaves.)

Present Policy

B. Disability leave may be used when it is necessary for an employee to be absent from work because of illness in his immediate household or family.

Proposed Policy

B. Disability leave may be used when it is necessary for an employee to be absent from work because of an emergency illness in his immediate household or family.

(This change clarifies the intendment of the policy by adding the word "emergency.")

V. Proposed policy (new) under the heading of "Funeral Leave":

Approval with pay will be granted for a leave of up to three days for the funeral of a member of the immediate family or household, and for one day for the funeral of a relative outside the immediate family or household. Leave beyond these amounts may be approved under special circumstances, but will be charged against disability benefits. If leave is requested to attend the funeral of someone other than a relative, it may be granted up to one-half day, but time so used shall be charged against disability leave of the employee making the request.

(This is self-explanatory.)

VI. VACATIONS WITH FULL PAY:

Present Policy

B.1.

b. For those employees, other than those employees in prevailing rate groups, with ten or more years of service, vacation shall be three work weeks in each year of service.

c. For all employees in prevailing rate groups, vacations shall be two weeks in each year of service, unless under a generally prevailing practice a longer period of vacation is provided, in which case prevailing practice shall be followed.

Proposed Policy

B.1.

b. For those employees with ten or more years of service vacation shall be three work weeks in each year of service.

(This allows even "prevailing wage" employees three weeks vacation after they have worked ten years and is consistent with the provisions of the new Personnel Code adopted for state employees, effective July 1.)

It is recommended that upon termination of employment for any cause, including death, the former employee shall in addition to any other amounts due be paid for accrued vacation time.

President Morris asked Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board's representative on the Merit Board of the University Civil Service System, for her opinion regarding the proposed policy amendments. Mrs. Collins stated that she had supported the proposed amendments, which were among a number of proposals made at the Merit Board.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board unanimously approved the recommended proposals for addition to and incorporation in the Policy Relating to Employee Benefits of Southern Illinois University.

(J) PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF MOTOR VEHICLE REGULATIONS

At its meeting of May 27, 1955, the Board of Trustees approved the levying of fines for violation of motor vehicle regulations. At its meeting on March 8, 1956, the Board approved allocating these fines collected on the campus to the Student Union Building Fund. In furtherance of regulating the ever-increasing volume of traffic in the University community, the Board adopted a policy at its meeting on August 3, 1956, prohibiting freshmen, with certain exceptions, from using automobiles while students at the University. This prohibition was to be extended to include each advanced class, so that after a period of four years no student would be allowed to possess an automobile.

Revised Student Motor Vehicle Regulations have been prepared by the Office of Student Affairs, reviewed by the Legal Counsel, the University Parking Committee, and the Student Council. The regulations were promulgated at the direction of the Board in its action of August 3, 1956. Included in the revised regulations is a schedule of fines for violations. Since the levying of these fines is dependent upon the power of the Board to prescribe rules of conduct for students, they are submitted herewith and recommended for approval:

XI. *Penalties:*

A. Students must report to the Parking Section, Office of Student

Affairs, to settle their violations within one week or have their fines charged against their records.

- B. Fines shall be assessed in the Office of Student Affairs. Payment of the fines shall be made at the Bursar's Office.
- C. The fine schedule shall be as follows:
1. Illegal possession or use of motor vehicle
 - a. First offense—\$50.00
 - b. Second offense—suspension from the University
 2. Falsification of registration records—\$25.00 and disciplinary action
 3. Flagrant violations—\$5.00 and possible revocation of privileges
 4. Failure to register motor vehicle—\$5.00
 5. Failure to display proper registration and/or permit decals—\$5.00
 6. Routine violations
 - a. First offense—\$1.00
 - b. Second offense—\$3.00
 - c. Third offense—\$5.00
 - d. Fourth offense—\$10.00 and revocation of privileges.

Copies of "Student Motor Vehicle Regulations" were distributed.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the schedule of penalties for violations of motor vehicle regulations.

(K) CHANGES IN FACULTY-ADMINISTRATIVE PAYROLL

The following additions and changes were reported and approval requested.

Death

The death of Mrs. Mae Trovillion Smith, emerita Assistant Professor of English, was reported. Mrs. Smith was born August 7, 1890, and died July 11, 1957. She was a member of Southern's faculty from 1919 to 1931, was reappointed in 1941, and served until her retirement June 1, 1957. She received the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees from Indiana University, and completed additional graduate work at George Peabody College for Teachers. She was the author of five books and was frequently invited to appear as guest speaker for clubs and organizations throughout the area.

The death of Mr. Floyd V. Wakeland, Associate Professor of Music, was reported. Mr. Wakeland was born May 24, 1901, and died July 18, 1957. He was appointed to Southern's faculty in 1939. He received the Bachelor of Music degree from Illinois Wesleyan University and the Master of Music degree from Bush Conservatory. His work with the University's choruses, Madrigal Singers, and the festival *Music Under the Stars* was well known and widely appreciated.

WHEREAS, Both his splendid instruction and his pleasing personality have endeared him to the hearts of his colleagues and students, and to the community; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, assembled in regular meeting, that the Board express its understanding and appreciation of Mr. Wakeland's great service to the University and to music lovers throughout the area, its sincere regret for his untimely passing, and its sympathy to his family and many friends. Be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be made a part of the permanent records of this Board, and that copies be forwarded to Mr. Wakeland's family and to the University administration and faculty.

(L) CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEE PAYROLLS FROM JANUARY 1, 1957, THROUGH JUNE 30, 1957

A report showing changes in civil service employee payrolls for the period January 1, 1957, through June 30, 1957, was presented. A copy of the report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved and ratified such changes. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(M) CONSIDERATION OF ANNUAL INTERNAL BUDGET FOR 1957-1958

Copies of the Annual Internal Budget proposed for 1957-1958 had been distributed to members of the Board of Trustees prior to this meeting.

President Morris stated that the recommended budget would dis-

tribute about one million dollars for increased levels in salaries throughout the University, approximately as follows: 13.1 per cent in administrative salaries; 14.7 per cent in the academic ranks; 12.8 per cent for nonacademic personnel; 7.7 per cent in the prevailing rate groups; and 17.3 per cent in the negotiated rate groups. He indicated that gifts and grants totaling approximately \$315,000.00 were expected.

President Morris pointed out that the biennial appropriation had been divided to allocate fifty per cent for the first year of the biennium, but a transfer of funds might throw this percentage off, as it did in the last biennium with the transfer of funds from the capital improvements appropriation. He explained that there would be flexibility in the second year of the biennium because a major portion of the first year's budget had been allocated to non-recurring expenses. He further explained that it would be possible to withdraw funds from such non-recurring expense items for reallocation to various departments, and that this flexible amount was approximately one-half million dollars.

The Board discussed the Madison-St. Clair Counties Residence Center operation. President Morris stated that Governor Stratton, in discussions with the administration and with members of the Board, had endorsed the program but had been unwilling to commit additional funds from state revenue during the present biennium, unless through a deficiency appropriation.

Following a general discussion of the proposed budget, Melvin C. Lockard moved that the Board approve the budget as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

The Board discussed the acquisition of a Cessna 310 airplane offered for sale by the Midwestern Aero Service, Inc., in accordance with a report which had been submitted to them. Various terms were discussed, and Mr. Wham reported on his investigation of the original manufacture and history of the airplane. The Board then authorized the administration to purchase the airplane for a price not to exceed \$40,000.00, including a new paint job, provided (a) an independent appraisal indicated that the value of the airplane was not less than this amount; (b) free hangar space was provided; and (c) the contract for air travel was renegotiated with a minimum not to exceed \$400.00 per month.

A copy of the report presented to the Board was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

President Morris presented a proposal from Dr. Harold W. See, Executive Dean of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Office, for a num-

ber of scholarships of the same type used on the Carbondale campus, to be awarded in the Madison-St. Clair Counties area. He stated that Dr. See had suggested twenty-five or thirty scholarships. Mr. Davis asked if these would be in addition to the scholarships already authorized by the Board, to which President Morris replied affirmatively.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved scholarships to be awarded in the Madison-St. Clair Counties area in the same proportion as scholarships already authorized for the Carbondale campus. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Mr. Vernon L. Nickell left the meeting at this time.

President Morris indicated that Willis G. Swartz, Dean of the Graduate School, had raised a point regarding foreign students: as out-of-state tuition is increased, an additional financial burden is placed on foreign students. President Morris indicated that the crucial question was how much the attendance of foreign students should be encouraged. Dean Swartz had pointed to action taken by Ohio State University, where out-of-state tuition is charged the first year, after which foreign students were considered as residents for tuition purposes.

Mrs. Collins asked if it were not true that most of the foreign students received help, either from their own governments or from our government. Professor Tenney replied that one economic limitation to such students was the amount of money they were permitted to take out of their countries. He stated that many of them experienced great difficulty because of that limitation.

No specific action was taken on the point of tuition for foreign students.

President Morris again mentioned the meeting of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions, to be held at Boulder, Colorado, on October 1-14, 1957.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board authorized any member of the Board to attend the meeting at Board expense; further, Mrs. Stella Collins was designated as the Board's official representative. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The distribution of the Annual Report of the Board of Trustees for 1955-1956 was discussed, following President Morris' explanation of requests received from various persons.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M.



MEETING OF AUGUST 27, 1957

THE AUGUST MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Tuesday, August 27, 1957, beginning at 9 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke. Mr. Nickell was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on July 25, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) CHANGES IN NAMES OF DEPARTMENTS

In order to clarify nomenclature and to simplify record keeping, a number of changes in the official titles of certain academic departments have been recommended, as follows:

General Agriculture to Agricultural Industries
General Management to Management

Secretarial Science to Secretarial and Business Education
Fine and Applied Arts to Art

Approval is requested for these changes of title, effective immediately.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, the Board unanimously approved the recommended changes of official titles of academic departments.

(B) SCHOLARSHIPS FOR FOREIGN STUDENTS

At the July 12 and August 9, 1955, meetings of the Board of Trustees, the question of scholarships for foreign students was raised. It was reported that at the University of Illinois twenty-five four-year Board of Trustees' scholarships are awarded each year to foreign students. The Board of Trustees authorized twenty-five one-year tuition scholarships to be awarded each year to foreign students at Southern.

Since that time, two difficulties have arisen: (1) the tuition fees of the University have been increased to a point which makes it virtually impossible for those foreign students who must earn the larger part of their expenses to attend Southern; (2) with the growth of the graduate program, an increasing number of foreign students have become interested in Southern. Many of these students wish to attend more than one year, and whenever their scholarships are renewed the total number of individuals we can provide for is correspondingly decreased.

It is therefore recommended that an additional twenty-five one-year tuition scholarships, to be awarded to foreign students each year, be authorized. This will bring the total figure for tuition scholarships to 350 per year, 300 for American students and 50 for foreign students on the Carbondale campus.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved an additional twenty-five one-year tuition scholarships to be awarded to foreign students each year, making a total of fifty tuition scholarships for foreign students. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(C) PURCHASE ORDERS, CONTRACTS, AND ENCUMBRANCE AUTHORIZATIONS AWARDED DURING THE MONTH OF JULY, 1957, AMOUNTING TO LESS THAN \$1,000.00

(K) RESOLUTION APPROVING LEASE WITH THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF SCHOOL DISTRICT 189, ST. CLAIR COUNTY, ILLINOIS

Following is a lease which has been negotiated between the East St. Louis School District (The Board of Education of School District 189, St. Clair County, Illinois) and the University relating to the use of facilities in East St. Louis for the coming year. It was originally planned that the East St. Louis Residence Center could be housed in a separate building which was to have been abandoned for school purposes by the District. Delays in construction, however, have made it impossible for the East St. Louis High School to vacate by this fall the building which was to be made available to the University. For this reason the East St. Louis School District has made available a portion of a new building to the University.

It is requested that the following resolution be approved:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has by

previous action authorized and established a residence center in the City of East St. Louis, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Education of School District No. 189, St. Clair County, Illinois, has made available a portion of one of its buildings, commonly called the Morrison School, for the purposes of holding classes and operation of the East St. Louis Residence Center;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the attached lease, which is incorporated herein and made a part of this resolution as if set out in full herein, be and is approved and that the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees be and are hereby authorized to execute the said lease on behalf of the Board in pursuance of this resolution.

LEASE

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this _____ day of August, A.D. 1957, by and between Board of Eductaion of School District No. 189, St. Clair County, Illinois, a body corporate and politic, hereinafter referred to as the "Landlord," and the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, hereinafter referred to as the "Tenant."

Witnesseth That:

For and in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants herein contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The Landlord does hereby demise and lease to the Tenant the New Addition to the Morrison School, which said school and New Addition are operated by the Landlord, which said New Addition was constructed during the school year 1956—57, which said New Addition is located at 630 North 59th Street, East St. Louis, Illinois, and which said New Addition consists of four (4) classrooms together with the facilities relating thereto, to have and to hold the same unto the Tenant from September 1, 1957, through and including December 20, 1957.

2. The Tenant hereby agrees to pay to the Landlord the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) as rental for said premises, which said sum shall be due and payable on November 1, 1957.

3. The Landlord hereby grants unto the Tenant an option to renew this lease for a period commencing on December 21, 1957, and terminating on March 21, 1958; provided, that the Tenant, on or before December 10, 1957, serves upon the Landlord a written notice exercising this option and renewing this lease; and the Landlord hereby grants Tenant an option to renew this lease for an additional period commencing on March 22, 1958, and terminating on June 20, 1958; provided that the Tenant, on or before March 12, 1958, serves upon the Landlord a written notice exercising this option and renewing this lease.

4. If the option or options created in paragraph 3 hereof is or are exercised by the Tenant, the Tenant hereby agrees to pay to the Landlord the

sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) as rental for said premises for each of said renewal periods, which said sum shall be due and payable on or before the date upon which each of said renewal periods commences.

5. The Tenant will, during the term of this lease or any renewal or extension hereof, pay thirty-three and one-third per cent (33 $\frac{1}{3}$ %) of all bills for all services rendered to the Landlord for the operation of the said Morrison School, including said New Addition, by any utility company or companies, including, but without thereby limiting the generality of the foregoing language, gas, electric and water service, and excluding telephone services, which said telephone services for said New Addition and for Tenant's use shall be furnished by the Tenant at its own expense.

6. The Tenant will, during the term of this lease or any renewal or extension thereof, pay thirty-three and one-third per cent (33 $\frac{1}{3}$ %) of all bills rendered for all fuel incurred in the heating of said Morrison School, including the said New Addition.

7. The Landlord will furnish custodial services and the Tenant will, during the term of this lease or any renewal or extension thereof, pay twenty-five per cent (25%) of the costs and expenses of such custodial service and maintenance, between 7:00 A.M. and 4:30 P.M. of each day, custodial services in and for said Morrison School, including said New Addition, and the Tenant will, during the term of this lease or any renewal or extension thereof, pay one hundred per cent (100%) of all costs and expenses of maintaining custodial services in and for said Morrison School, including said New Addition, resulting from the maintenance of custodial service after the hour of 4:30 P.M. of each day.

8. The Landlord will, during the term of this lease or any renewal or extension thereof, maintain and keep in force a fire insurance policy with an extended coverage endorsement, all in the amount of \$70,000.00 on said New Addition to said Morrison School, which said policy shall be written in favor of the Landlord and the Tenant, as their interests may appear. The Tenant will pay one hundred per cent (100%) of all premiums thereon and therefor.

9. The Tenant will make the aforesaid payments by it assumed under paragraphs 5 through 8, both inclusive of this lease, within thirty (30) days after it receives from the Landlord an itemized statement of the charges to be paid. The Tenant, through its agents, may inspect and verify bills, statements and records upon which said bills submitted to the Tenant are predicated.

10. The Landlord agrees to maintain and keep in repair the interior and exterior of the premises leased, including the roof and the glass windows thereof, and the Tenant agrees to reimburse the Landlord in accordance with the procedure provided in paragraph 9 hereof for the cost of such maintenance and repair unless such maintenance and repair is occasioned by unavoidable accident or reasonable and customary use of the premises.

11. Neither party will make any alterations in the leased premises without the written consent of the other party.

12. The Tenant, through its officers, agents and employees, will provide by regulation and other reasonable measures that the students enrolled in its classes held at said New Addition shall not be permitted to smoke or allowed to co-mingle with the students of the Landlord, either in Morrison School,

said New Addition, or on the premises surrounding the same. The Tenant shall provide by regulation and other reasonable measures that its officers, agents, employees and students be prohibited from parking on the school grounds surrounding said School and New Addition between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. of each day.

13. The Tenant will quit, deliver up and surrender possession of the premises to the Landlord upon the termination of this lease or upon the termination of any extension or renewal hereof, by limitation or otherwise, with all window glass replaced, if broken, and with all keys, locks, bolts, plumbing, fixtures and heating appliances in as good condition as they now are, ordinary wear tear for college purposes excepted.

14. The Tenant will furnish and equip said New Addition at its own costs and expense and, upon termination of this lease or any renewal or extension thereof, shall remove at no cost or expense to the Landlord such furniture, fixtures and equipment purchased and acquired by the Tenant.

15. The Tenant further covenants and agrees that it has examined said premises and accepts the condition thereof.

16. Any and all notices required to be served by the provisions of this lease shall be served by United States Mail:

- a. Upon the Landlord in care of the Secretary of the Board of Education, 240 North Sixth Street, East St. Louis, Illinois; and
- b. Upon the Tenant in care of Dr. Harold W. See, Broadview Hotel, East St. Louis, Illinois;

provided either party may change the location where said notices shall be served by serving notice as provided in this paragraph.

17. This lease shall be binding upon the successors of the parties hereto.

(L) APPROVAL OF ASSISTANCE TO LEGAL COUNSEL IN MATTERS OF LITIGATION

For the past few years, Mr. Orin H. Pugh has as Assistant Attorney General assisted the Legal Counsel in the trial work of the Board of Trustees. This arrangement was made at the request of the Attorney General. A few months ago Mr. Pugh resigned as Assistant Attorney General. The Legal Counsel has recommended that assistance be provided him in trial work. Mr. Pugh's resignation as Assistant Attorney General would terminate the previous arrangement; however, the Legal Counsel is of the opinion that Mr. Pugh's extensive experience in the field of litigation and his performance on behalf of the University uniquely qualifies him to continue to render assistance to the Board.

For these reasons it is recommended that the administration be authorized to employ Mr. Pugh on a per case basis to assist the Legal Counsel in matters of litigation.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board authorized the administration to employ Mr. Orin H. Pugh on a per case basis to assist the Legal Counsel in matters of litigation. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The Board discussed the charges levied by local banks for servicing of University accounts. It was agreed that at the next regular meeting of the Board the Banking Committee would talk with officials of the Carbondale National Bank and the First National Bank concerning this matter.

The Board also deferred until the next regular meeting the matter of naming dormitory buildings on Thompson Point.

The meeting was adjourned at 11 A.M.



MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 23, 1957

A SPECIAL MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Monday, September 23, 1957, beginning at 1 P.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Martin F. Oehmke, Vernon L. Nickell. Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard, and Mr. Fischer were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Edward V. Miles, Jr., Assistant Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, University Architect Charles Pulley, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman of the Board. In the absence of Mr. Melyin C. Lockard, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Martin F. Oehmke served as Secretary pro tempore. The purpose of the special meeting was to consider bids which had been submitted for the construction of the new Home Economics building group.

President Morris opened the meeting by distributing a summary statement giving breakdowns according to the separate contracts upon which bids were received. He stated that the original plans had called for a Home Management House immediately to the north of the main building. The bids submitted were far above estimates, and it was necessary to determine how best to retract to figures of available funds. The program which was recommended to the Board was to proceed as had

been done in the case of the Library, where the shell of the building had been completed, and as much internal work as possible with available funds. President Morris stated that this would allow provision for utilities, completion of the shell, site work around the building, and completing with fixed and moveable furniture and equipment fifty-five per cent of the total floor space in the building. He explained that the external appearance would be finalized, and that completion of the internal part of the building could be concluded with as little difficulty and disruption as possible.

President Morris explained that the discussions with the contractors had provided that contracts would be awarded in each case with the provision that the portion of the work which could not be completed with funds available at this time should remain open to the option of the Board to accept at a subsequent time, plus an increment for any general price increase or decrease. He further explained that it had been his decision to deal with various bidders, rather than to deal only with the low bidder.

Mr. Nickell questioned whether it was legal to complete only a portion of a building. Mr. Rendleman answered in the affirmative.

Mr. Wham asked if there would be some utility for the unfinished portions of the building, and President Morris replied that those portions could be used for storage, as was the case of the unfinished portions of the Library building. President Morris stated that the proposed building represented a solution to the needs and projected functions of the University program, and any cut-back would deter the utilization and operation of these functions in the future; therefore, to provide that the functions could be realized at a future time, the method recommended to the Board had been determined to be the most feasible and economical way to proceed.

In reply to a question from Mrs. Collins, Mr. Charles M. Pulley, University Architect, stated that the duct work would be available for the future installation of air conditioning machinery, but that funds presently available would not permit its immediate installation. Mr. Nickell stated that a completed building on the campus of Southern Illinois University should be air conditioned because of the University's geographical location.

In reply to a question from Mrs. Collins, President Morris indicated that the Home Management House was to be deferred at present, although the apartment unit on the top floor of the main building had been planned for, and would serve this purpose.

In reply to a question from Mr. Nickell, President Morris stated that to completely construct and equip only that portion of the building for which funds were available would be uneconomical in view of the

complications which would arise on the extension of utilities and site development.

In reply to a question from Mr. Wham, President Morris indicated that if the auditorium were eliminated there still would not be sufficient funds to complete the rest of the project.

After extended discussion, Vernon L. Nickell moved that the Board approve the recommendation made by the administration, on condition that Governor Stratton approved the procedure and the construction of the building with incompleated portions. The motion was seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Oehmke; absent, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard.

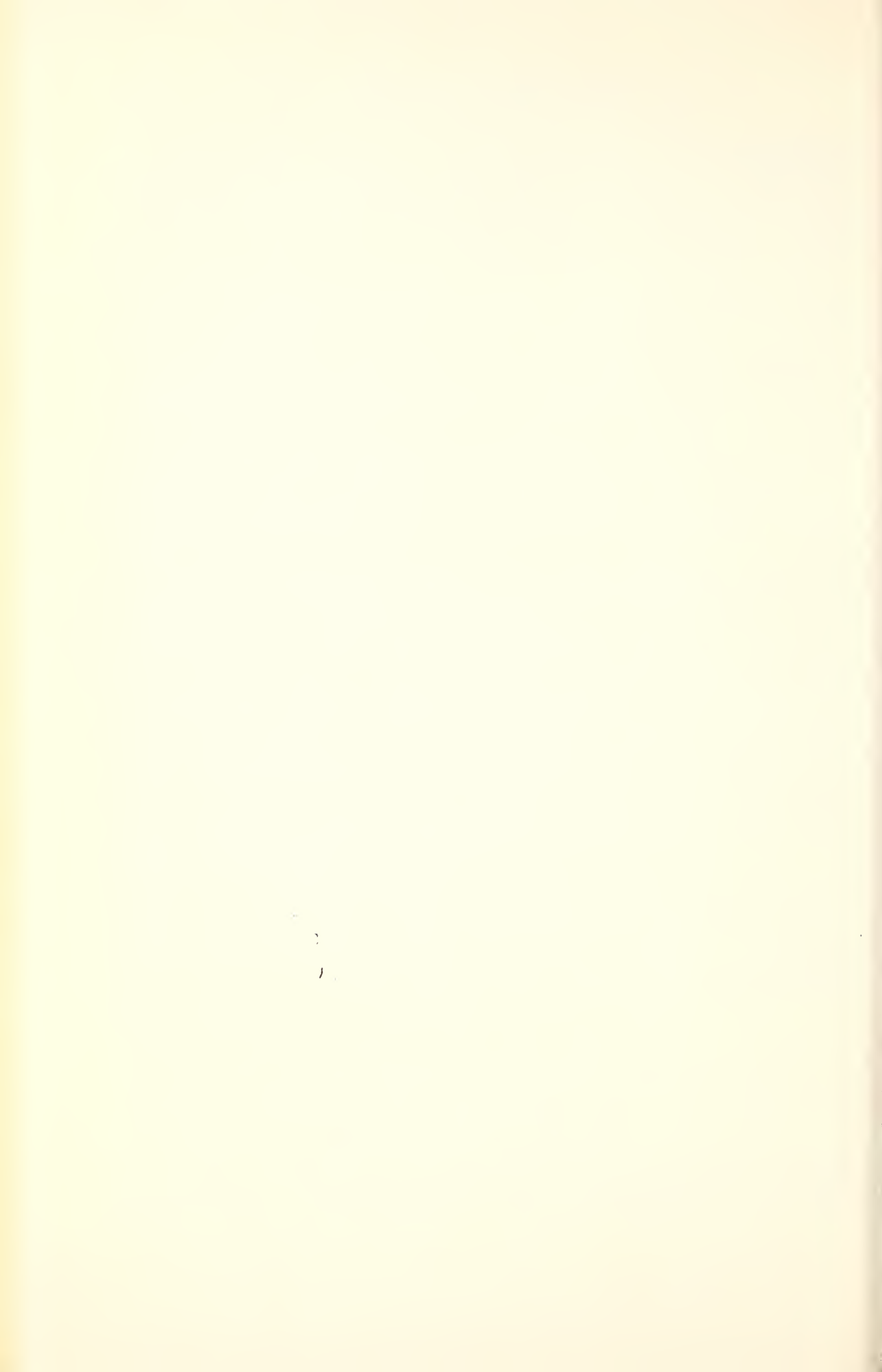
During an executive session the following matters were discussed:

On September 9, 1957, Mr. Daniel M. MacMaster, Secretary of the Illinois Commission of Higher Education, had requested that the Board of Trustees select one of its number for membership on the Committee of Delegates, an advisory body to the Commission. By common consent, the members of the Board designated John Page Wham to serve as a member of the Committee of Delegates, with Lindell W. Sturgis named as alternate, subject to reconsideration or ratification of the full Board at its next regular meeting.

President Morris reported that Mr. Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager, had planned to retire in September, 1958. Since the Governor had vetoed the changes in the University Retirement System, Mr. Miles had indicated, upon inquiry from President Morris, that he would like to remain on the staff for two years.

President Morris indicated his desire for Mr. Miles to withdraw from the routine Business Office functions, assuming he were agreeable, and to work on special assignments in such matters as land acquisition, studies of possible means of financing for student and staff housing, and the review of plans for future buildings in terms of costs. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that this arrangement would be acceptable.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 P.M.





MEETING OF OCTOBER 2, 1957

THE OCTOBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Wednesday, October 2, 1957, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, Vernon L. Nickell.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on August 27, 1957, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part IV, Article III, Section 1, was mailed to each member of the Board on September 18, 1957. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted unanimously an amendment to the section designated as follows:

Section 1. Ranks Recognized. The following faculty payroll classifications, as distinct from University Faculty status, shall be recognized: professor, asso-

ciate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, research associate, field representative, community consultant, coordinator, coach, assistant instructor, graduate assistant, and research assistant. (The graduate or research assistant is distinguished from fellow or scholar by the fact that the assistant is required to render academic service to the institution, while the fellow or scholar is strictly a student.)

The matter of naming a member of the Board of Trustees to serve on the Committee of Delegates, an advisory body to the Commission of Higher Education, was again presented. On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, the Board ratified action taken at the special meeting held on September 23, 1957, designating John Page Wham to serve on the Committee of Delegates, and Lindell W. Sturgis to serve as alternate.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) REPORT OF JUNE AND AUGUST, 1957, GRADUATES

On May 16, 1957, Part III, Article VIII, Section 1, A of the Statutes of the Board of Trustees was amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Degrees and Awards.

A. Earned degrees shall be awarded by the authority of the Board of Trustees upon completion of requirements for the particular degree to be awarded as contained in the then current edition of the University Bulletin, and upon the recommendation to the President by the appropriate school or college faculty.

On the same date the Board authorized the administration to file the official commencement program as a record of graduates. Copies of the official corrected commencement programs, showing the names of students to whom degrees and certificates were awarded, have been placed on file in the Board office. These programs have been certified by the Registrar's Office. A summary of degrees and certificates awarded at the June 16, 1957, commencement is shown in Table 1.

(K) PURCHASING PROCEDURES AND PRACTICES

Our Purchasing Agent, Mr. William V. Connell, made a survey of twenty-two universities regarding purchasing procedures and practices. Of this number, seventeen replied. From the copy of the survey recently submitted you will notice that the universities contacted are well known and highly regarded as a group. On the basis of the results from this questionnaire and our own experience with our present procedures, we recommend the following changes.

1. *Requisitions for Executive Committee Approval*—That the present rule calling for requisitions of \$1,000 or over going to the Executive Committee for joint approval be changed to \$2,500 or over.

JUSTIFICATION

a. Most requisitions between \$1,000 and \$2,500 represent larger quantities of operational supplies. The number of these routine requisitions is increasing rapidly as the University grows and as our purchasing gets more and more centralized.

b. Requisitions requiring Executive Committee approval take ten (10) additional days to process because of mailing delays. Fiscal officers are aware of this and try to keep requisitions under \$1,000. If the minimum were increased to \$2,500, better prices on the larger purchases would result and supervising the tendency to keep under the minimum would be easier.

2. *Reporting Purchase Orders, Contracts, and Encumbrance Authorizations*—That our lump sum reporting to the Board be changed from purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations up to \$250 to purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations up to \$1,000; that we list purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations from \$1,000 to \$2,499, instead of \$250 to \$1,000 as at present; and that we give the details on all purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to \$2,500 or more, instead of \$1,000 or more.

JUSTIFICATION

a. The record keeping and the analysis necessary to compile the report will be substantially reduced. For example, the report to the Board for January, 1957, required eleven (11) pages, single-spaced typewritten. This report would have required only five (5) pages under the proposed purchasing procedures and practices. To show that the month selected, January, is a conservative comparison, the month of March, 1957, showed 962 purchase orders and contracts compared with 655 for January.

b. In the past four years total purchase orders and contracts increased 241 per cent, but those requiring listing for the Board matters (those between \$250 and \$1,000), increased 328 per cent.

c. The part of the report requiring the most time is the category \$1,000 and over, which increased 280 per cent over the past four years, almost three times as many.

3. *Purchasing Agent's Discretion on Taking Bids*—That our Purchasing Agent be given the discretion of taking or not taking competitive bids

on requisitions up to \$500. At the present time the Purchasing Agent is authorized to forego competitive bidding if the requisition is \$50 or less. The Purchasing Agent has found that taking competitive bids involves so much paper work and expense that it would actually be cheaper in many cases not to have competitive bidding.

JUSTIFICATION

Normally, items with the following characteristics can be purchased advantageously to the University without competitive bidding.

- a. Those regularly purchased so that previous prices obtained by competitive bid will serve to monitor the offering of a single bidder.
- b. Those on which the market price is relatively stable.
- c. Those which historically are sold at low or fixed mark-up.
- d. Those which are used in a continuing manner so that delay in securing delivery would hamper the using department's ability to perform its function.
- e. Those which it is not practical to stock in large quantities.
- f. Those which, if bid competitively, would not develop an appreciable savings.
- g. Those in which there is the element of timing or urgency created out of a given set of circumstances irrespective of the using department's responsibility to have anticipated the need.

Examples are some paper stocks, filing cabinets and related metal office furniture, carbon paper, typewriter ribbons, Pyrex laboratory glassware, merchandise for resale by the University Store, re-run printing of office procedure forms.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the recommendations made by the administration regarding Point 1 and Point 3, as set forth above. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

(L) FACULTY-ADMINISTRATIVE PAYROLL—SUMMER, 1957

A report of the faculty-administrative payroll for the summer months of 1957 was submitted, and a copy was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, the Board approved and ratified the summer payrolls as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

(M) RECOMMENDATION FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF DEPARTMENT OF FORESTRY

For a number of years the School of Agriculture has been build-

ing a program in forestry training and working cooperatively with the U.S. Forest Service, the State Division of Forestry, and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. This program has developed to the degree that it is desirable to establish a Department of Forestry in the School of Agriculture. This recommendation is predicated upon the following reasons:

1. There is a strong demand for forestry graduates. Experts in the field conservatively estimate the 1200 forestry jobs are annually unfilled because of the lack of trained personnel.

2. Many Illinois students desire to study forestry but there is no established institution within the state which offers a four-year program.

3. A program in the production and utilization of forest crops will be a definite asset in improvement of the economy of Southern Illinois.

4. The geographical location of the University facilities is most advantageous for the establishment of such a program.

5. All twenty-six presently accredited forestry programs in the country are functioning as a separate school or college or as a department in a school or college.

This recommendation is in accordance with the study of Dr. Joseph S. Illick, Dean Emeritus, State University of New York, College of Forestry, who served as forestry consultant to the University during the fall of 1956. It is recommended that the department be established effective with the winter term of the present school year and that Dr. A. B. Caster, Chairman of the Department of Plant Industry, be appointed Acting Chairman of the department for the present.

To a question from Mr. Nickell, regarding an experimental laboratory, President Morris replied that experimental facilities would serve the purposes of the University and the forestry services.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved the establishment of a Department of Forestry in the School of Agriculture, effective with the winter term, 1957-58, and approved the appointment of Dr. A. B. Caster as Acting Chairman of the new department. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

The meeting was adjourned at 1 P.M.



MEETING OF NOVEMBER 4, 1957

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Executive Dean of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Centers Harold W. See, Bruce Kipp, reporter for the *East St. Louis Journal*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of a special meeting of the Board held on September 23, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard these minutes were approved as presented.

Minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on October 2, 1957, were also presented. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved these minutes as presented.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, the Board adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Robert L. Kern, a former member of the Board of Trustees

of Southern Illinois University, and his brother Richard P. Kern, have presented the Kern family library to the University, and

WHEREAS, This collection of some four thousand volumes reflects the wide and discerning reading interests of a cultured family over several generations and contains many representative works dealing with the social, political, and religious life of the times, and

WHEREAS, The library is an invaluable asset to the existing collection of a growing University Library, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the Board accept the gift of the Kern family library and express its sincere gratitude to the donors for their generous gift to the University. Be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be spread upon the minutes of the Board, and that copies be forwarded to Mr. Robert L. Kern and Mr. Richard P. Kern.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) RESIDENCE CENTERS TUITION

At the May 16, 1957, meeting of the Board of Trustees, Residence Centers tuition was set at \$7.00 per quarter hour of credit, effective the fall quarter of 1957.

When the Alton and East St. Louis Residence Centers enrolled full-time and part-time day students, it seemed clear that they should be charged the same rates charged on the Carbondale campus. The Carbondale part-time resident student carrying eight credit hours or less pays \$17.50 tuition, as approved in the May meeting. This rate was also applied at Alton and East St. Louis. During registration it was discovered that this was inconsistent with the \$7.00 per credit hour charged at the Belleville Residence Center. A student at Belleville carrying a four-hour course would be charged \$28.00, plus the book rental fee, while a student at East St. Louis would pay only \$17.50, plus the book rental fee. To correct this discrepancy, it has been decided that the Belleville tuition should correspond with that charged at Alton, East St. Louis, and Carbondale.

It is recommended that the Board delete the line referring to Residence Centers tuition from the action taken on May 16, 1957, changing tuition charges.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell the Board approved the deletion recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(B) INCREASE OF GRADUATING SENIOR FEE

Each graduate of the University is assessed a graduating fee of \$15.00 by authority of the Board of Trustees. This fee is disbursed for the following purposes: Alumni Dues, \$2.00; Commencement Fund, \$10.00, Student Promotional Activities, \$3.00.

Since the time this original fee was approved, the Board of Directors and the Legislative Council of the Alumni Association have approved the increase of Alumni Association dues from \$2.00 to \$4.00 per year.

Alumni dues were originally established at \$2.00 in 1946 and there was no increase in the annual dues until June 15, 1957. Due to the tremendous increase in costs of printing, engraving, photographs, postage, and other services provided by the Alumni Office to the alumni, faculty and students, it was deemed necessary to increase the amount of dues to \$4.00.

Each graduating senior, by payment of the graduating fee, automatically becomes a member of the Alumni Association for the first year following graduation. To conform to the increase of alumni dues, it is recommended that the fee for graduates be increased to \$17.00, to be distributed for the following purposes: Alumni Dues, \$4.00; Commencement Fund, \$10.00; Student Promotional Activities, \$3.00.

President Morris explained that the policy of including one year's Alumni Association dues in the graduating fee was initially established with the concurrence of the graduating class of that year. He stated that the students seemed to favor this plan, and that it was important to have first year graduates associated with the Alumni group.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the recommended graduating fee of \$17.00.

(J) SCHOOL FOR FAMILY HOUSING UNITS

Under date of October 24, 1957, copies of a letter from Mr. Clyde V. Winkler, Superintendent of Carbondale City Schools, to Mr. Vernon L. Nickell and Mr. Nickell's letter of October 4 to President Morris were sent to members of the Board of Trustees. As requested in Mr. Nickell's letter, this item was placed on the Board agenda.

President Morris initiated the discussion by explaining that Mr. Nickell had received a letter from Mr. Clyde V. Winkler, Superintendent of Carbondale City Schools, raising a question regarding school facilities which would be necessary by virtue of the large number of family apartment units which the University was planning to erect within the next few years. Mr. Nickell had referred the problem to the Board for its consideration.

President Morris explained that Mr. Winkler had estimated that for 400 housing units there would be 400 or more children of school age. From the University's experience it would appear that this estimate was in error. At the present time there are 105 families living in the Chautauqua Street Housing Project, and from this number of families there are ten children who are six years old, and one child who is five years of age. The number of children of school age in this housing project gives some estimate as to how many children to expect when other family housing units are erected.

It was explained that at the Chautauqua Street Housing Project all

units are two-bedroom units, while the plans for future housing are for 160 units initially, to include twelve no-bedroom apartments, forty-eight one-bedroom apartments, and one hundred two-bedroom apartments. President Morris expressed his feeling that even when 400 apartment units were erected, an estimate of the number of children of school age would be closer to fifty than to four hundred.

In addition, it was pointed out that the University School has an enrollment of 304 students and that all of these, with the exception of twenty-four, come from within the Carbondale City School District. President Morris stated that the method of enrollment in the University School had been on a priority of application basis, and that the Board might wish to consider this policy in the future.

Mr. Nickell indicated that it would be well for him to reply to Mr. Winkler's letter and, in addition to those matters discussed by the Board, to call to Mr. Winkler's attention the possibility of state aid for children living on University owned property.

President Morris stated that although he was taking exception to Mr. Winkler's letter, he wished to emphasize that Mr. Winkler was doing an excellent job with the Carbondale City Schools, and that this had been of considerable help in bringing in new University faculty members.

(K) APPROVAL OF ESTABLISHMENT OF VOCATIONAL INDUSTRIAL
TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM

It seems advisable for the Board of Trustees to submit a formal petition to the Illinois Board of Vocational Education for approval of Southern Illinois University to offer training for vocational industrial teachers. There is an acute shortage of vocationally certified teachers of auto mechanics, machine shop, building trades, electricity, and similar fields. This has reference to the certification which is authorized by federal laws and which is based on an apprenticeship as well as college preparation.

Especially in Southern Illinois there is a need to develop vocational industrial education. State-wide the shortage of these teachers is increasing. A check of the entire state would show that many of these teachers are certified provisionally and that many are teaching without degrees. Students now at Southern Illinois University who expect to enter this vocational industrial teaching serve an unsupervised apprenticeship either before, after, or during the college training period. With the new program, better teachers could be prepared and a sound direction could be given to the industrial experience required.

The University's Vocational-Technical Institute instructors of these trades are themselves tradesmen, and work taken under them should be considered toward an apprenticeship. Furthermore, the University's

College of Education, through the Industrial Education Department, can specify and teach the professional subjects. The internship could be a supervised apprenticeship whereby the student could gain some credit while completing his industrial experience. The University's Industrial Education staff has qualified vocational industrial teacher trainers who can supervise this work.

Approval is, therefore, requested that an application with supporting data be submitted to the Board of Vocational Education of the State of Illinois, requesting approval of the institution as an institution approved to train teachers of Vocational Industrial Education and, if approved, such a program be activated. No additional facilities nor staff, in addition to that normally required for increased enrollments, will be necessary to activate the program.

In the ensuing discussion, the Board was advised by Mr. Nickell as to recent progress in the approval of the Vocational Agricultural program.

President Morris requested that paragraph 4 of the above section be amended to read as follows: "Approval is, therefore, requested that an application with supporting data be submitted to the proper State agency, requesting . . ."

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the submission of an application for approval of the institution as an institution approved to train teachers of Vocational Industrial Education, as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

In executive session, Mrs. Stella Collins reported briefly concerning her attendance at the annual meeting of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions, as official delegate representing the Board of Trustees. This meeting was held at Boulder, Colorado, October 10-14, 1957. A copy of Mrs. Collins' report of the convention was filed with the Secretary of the Board.

President Morris reported briefly concerning the Home Economics Building. He stated that negotiations for a contract providing authority for the Board to reinstate portions of the work were proceeding, but that a controversy had arisen as to what method would be used for computing any additional costs if the Board was to retain the privilege of reinstatement. He indicated that it might be necessary to vary the method in this particular contract from that which was originally suggested to the Board. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that the administration should continue to negotiate with the J. L. Simmons Company, and be empowered to arrive at an agreement within the general principles of the previous Board action for providing for reinstatement.

The meeting was adjourned at 4 P.M.



MEETING OF DECEMBER 11, 1957

THE DECEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Wednesday, December 11, 1957, beginning at 2 P.M.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the regular meeting held on November 4, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis these minutes were approved as presented.

Lindell W. Sturgis reported briefly for the Board's Banking Committee. He stated that at a recent meeting with the presidents of the First National Bank and the Carbondale National Bank, both of Carbondale, the Banking Committee had agreed to accept and pay bank charges. On Mr. Sturgis' motion, the Board approved the acceptance of service charges as set up by the local banks, until further notice. Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board.

(A) RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREE

We recommend that at an appropriate convocation during the Fine Arts Festival to be held in May, 1958, the honorary degree of Doctor of Music be awarded to Mlle. Nadia Boulanger.

Mlle. Nadia Boulanger, world-renowned music theorist, pedagogue, and musicologist, was born in Paris, France, September 16, 1887. As the director of the American Conservatory of Music at Fontainebleau she has been the source of inspiration for countless American musicians and the teacher of America's greatest composers. Her influence as a teacher of teachers has been world-wide, and in an age given to sprawling, undisciplined self-expression her emphasis upon intellect and discipline in the musical art has made her the most important figure in the field of musical pedagogy today. Mlle. Boulanger was the first woman to conduct the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and has become a dominant voice in the musical profession in Europe and America.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the award of the honorary degree of Doctor of Music to Mlle. Boulanger, as recommended.

(B) REPORT ON PRESENT STATUS OF MADISON-ST. CLAIR COUNTIES PROGRAM

Dr. Harold W. See, Executive Dean of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Centers, reported orally regarding the present status of the residence centers operation. Copies of the report were placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

(J) APPLICATION FOR APARTMENT HOUSING UNITS

At the meeting on January 17, 1957, the Board of Trustees adopted a resolution authorizing an application for funds from the Housing and Home Finance Agency to construct "not to exceed 200 apartment units" and for a loan "not to exceed \$2,000,000."

In subsequent negotiations, it became necessary to reduce the request for apartment units to \$1,500,000 and to reduce the number of units to 160. The Housing and Home Finance Agency has now asked that a specific resolution containing these figures be approved by the Board of Trustees. The suggested resolution follows:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University on January 17, 1957, did approve a report submitted to them, entitled "A Program for Family Housing," dated January, 1957; and

WHEREAS, With the increased enrollment in the graduate programs of the University, and the ever continuing presence in the student body of married couples; and

WHEREAS, These persons are necessary for the instruction of the students of Southern Illinois University, and it is an obligation of the Board to provide housing therefor; and

WHEREAS, It appears that the available facilities within the immediate community for the housing of married students and their families, and for married instructors and their families, will be insufficient; now, therefore, be it

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that an application be made to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government for a loan of \$1,500,000 to finance the construction of 160 apartment units, and that the President of the University be and is authorized to make application to and to negotiate with the said Housing and Home Finance Agency for and in behalf of the Board of Trustees for the said loan of \$1,500,000 for 160 apartment units.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(L) APPROVAL OF STUDENT IN-TRAINEE CATEGORY

The University, through its Department of Special Education in the College of Education, has been awarded a grant for research with and training of handicapped persons.

It involves handicapped persons in an experimental program who, in addition to receiving non-credit instruction, will also be receiving training of a type which will allow them to better equip themselves for economic sufficiency.

Previously approved student categories do not fit these particular students and it is, therefore, requested that the category "Student Trainee" be adopted for use of persons who may be a part of an experimental program and who receive non-credit instruction and training.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the category "Student Trainee" for use as designated above.

(M) APPROVAL OF SALE OF IBM STOCK

As a part of a research grant made to the University for immigration studies, ten shares of International Business Machine Corporation

stock was given to the Board of Trustees for purposes of financing the studies. It is, of course, necessary to sell this stock to obtain the funds necessary to finance the project. A formal resolution must be adopted by the Board of Trustees before a sale can be effected. Approval of the following resolution is requested:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University hereby approve the sale by the Business Manager of Southern Illinois University of the ten shares of International Business Machine Corporation stock, ownership of which is evidenced by stock certificate number F-526377, issued by the International Business Machine Corporation, which certificate has been received by the Board of Trustees from the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, and the Business Manager of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute such documents as may be necessary for this sale.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the above resolution.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris displayed a drawing of a proposed trailer park and indicated that the park would provide for 62 trailers on lots approximately 30 x 50 feet, with a separate building for bath, laundry, and toilet facilities. He indicated that such facilities were to be rented to married students, graduate students, and young faculty members, but that trailers would not be provided. President Morris stated that over a period of time the rental charges would pay for the construction costs and take care of operating expenses. He stated that minimum standards for trailers were to be established, and that each lot would have a concrete block which would be a service outlet for sewer, water, and electrical connections and a parking place for an automobile. He indicated that a playground would be provided for young children, and that the park would be within easy walking distance of the schools.

It was the consensus of the members of the Board that the project was desirable.

President Morris indicated to the Board that he had requested an appointment with Governor Stratton for the purpose of placing before him the report of the present status of the residence centers operation in Madison-St. Clair counties, and the necessity for additional funds for operations. President Morris also stated that a group in Alton, Illinois, was starting a move to try to induce the location of a continuing institution in that vicinity. He indicated that Professor Alonzo Meyers had been engaged to make a further study of the problem during December and

January, and that a proposal for an area location or a specific location would be presented to the Board at a subsequent meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 5 P.M.



MEETING OF JANUARY 30, 1958

THE JANUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held at the Alton Residence Center, Alton, Illinois, on Thursday, January 30, 1958, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, Vernon L. Nickell. Mr. Sturgis was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Executive Dean of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Centers Harold W. See, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on December 11, 1957, copies of which had been sent to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, these minutes were approved as presented.

By secret ballot, in accordance with Part II, Article II, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as officers until their successors are elected and qualified: John Page Wham, Chairman; Lindell W. Sturgis, Vice-Chairman; Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary.

In accordance with Part II, Article III, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as members of the Executive Committee: Harold R. Fischer

and Martin F. Oehmke. As stated in the By-Laws, the third member of the Executive Committee shall be the Chairman of the Board.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) POLICY FOR NAMING UNIVERSITY BUILDINGS

At the request of the Board of Trustees, a faculty committee was selected to consider and recommend a policy for naming of University buildings. This committee consisted of the following: Professor E. V. Miles, Jr., Chairman; Dean T. W. Abbott; Professor I. P. Brackett; Professor E. C. Coleman; Dean I. Clark Davis; Professor J. Cary Davis; Miss Florence E. Denny; Dean John E. Grinnell; Mr. Dilla Hall; Miss Lucy K. Woody; Professor E. G. Lentz; Professor Willis Moore; Professor Ted Ragsdale; Miss Marjorie Shank; Miss Hilda Stein; Dean W. G. Swartz; Dean C. Horton Talley; Professor W. A. Thalman; Professor W. C. Westberg.

This committee, after deliberation, has arrived at the following policies:

1. Buildings given to the University may be named for donors or memorial funds.
2. Instructional buildings shall be named in terms of function.
3. Residence halls shall be named for distinguished members of the University faculty, retired or deceased.
4. General-purpose buildings shall be named for (a) distinguished former members of the Board of Trustees and Presidents, and (b) other administrators, retired or deceased.
5. The above provisions shall not preclude the naming of any appropriate part of a building for a member of the Board of Trustees or a member of the University faculty, retired or deceased.

It is recommended that this policy be approved by the Board.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board adopted the following amended policy:

In those cases in which the Board deems it wise to name any building, the following general policy is adopted to serve as a guide:

1. Buildings given to the University may be named for donors or memorial funds.
2. Instructional buildings named in terms of function.

3. Residence halls named for distinguished members of the University faculty, retired or deceased.

4. General-purpose buildings named for (a) distinguished former members of the Board of Trustees and Presidents, and (b) other administrators, retired or deceased.

5. The above provisions shall not preclude the naming of any building or appropriate part thereof for a member of the Board of Trustees, a member of the University faculty, or any other worthy or distinguished person, retired or deceased.

The vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(B) RESEARCH BUREAUS IN BUSINESS, EDUCATION, AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

A number of the schools and colleges at Southern Illinois University have attempted informally to make their fact-finding facilities available to various agencies, such as the public schools, municipalities, business organizations, state and federal government, and others in a position to apply certain of the findings of our research staff in the public interest.

For example, the College of Education has made surveys for a number of public schools concerning such matters as finance, staffing, enrollments, and building programs. The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, through its Government Department, has provided advice and has issued publications on local government. The School of Business has cooperated with businessmen in the area in locating information of use to them and has periodically issued a *Business News Letter*.

These activities have now reached a volume which makes it desirable to recognize them formally in the organization of the schools and colleges. We therefore recommend that the Board approve, to become effective July 1, 1958, a Public Affairs Research Bureau as an agency of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, a Business Research Bureau as an agency of the School of Business, and an Educational Research Bureau as an agency of the College of Education.

It should be understood that each of these bureaus would concern itself entirely with making available for use by the general public the kind of information our scholars have in their possession. These bureaus will not in any way affect the organized and individual research projects being carried on by staff members of the University, nor will they be concerned with basic, theoretical, or pure research as such. They are, in effect, agencies of applied research, drawing upon the results of investigations already made.

The head of each bureau will be nominated to the President jointly by the appropriate undergraduate dean and by the dean of the Graduate School, who has a general responsibility for all research activities of the University. Each head will serve on a part-time basis and will be a member of the regular instructional and research staff of his school or college. Each of the bureaus will have available to it the research talents of the various faculty members of its school or college and will therefore not require a staff of its own. Occasionally, however, one of the bureaus may wish to undertake an investigation for which it is reimbursed by some business or some public agency. In these circumstances the bureau might need to employ additional personnel paid from its restricted funds in order to carry out the terms of the grant. For the sake of centralizing information, each of the bureaus will report to the dean of the Graduate School all its projects, grants, and special appointments.

It is anticipated that these bureaus will not require additional funds from the University during the current biennium and that their future budgets will depend entirely upon the general growth of their work and of the University's budget.

After discussion, Vernon L. Nickell moved that the Board direct the administration to consider the establishment of a program of study for the wider utilization of natural resources, especially those abundant in southern Illinois. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer, and was carried by unanimous vote.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by Kenneth I. Davis, the Board approved the establishment of research bureaus in Business, Education, and Public Affairs.

(C) AMENDMENT TO UNIVERSITY TRAVEL REGULATIONS

The Board of Trustees, at its meeting on September 26, 1952, approved travel regulations governing the travel of staff members of the University. These regulations provide that:

"Travel on University Business

A staff member who travels on University business shall do so only with the consent of his department chairman and academic dean or his office and division heads. . . .

Use of Private Automobile on a Mileage Basis

To obtain reimbursement for use of a personal car on a mileage basis, you should take the following steps:

1. Make inquiry of the Physical Plant as to the availability of a University automobile when a trip is to be made. If a University car is not available for that time and for the length of time which the trip would take, other transportation not being

suitable, the trip cannot be postponed to a later date, use of a personal car may be authorized by the head of the department requesting the service.

2. Maintain an accurate record of mileage involved in the use of a personal car for University business, and the name of places visited during the trip. A copy of this record must be attached to the Business Office copy of the reimbursement voucher.

3. The Travel Expense Voucher must carry the statement that it was not practicable to take a University car. The present rate of reimbursement, which is subject to change at any time, is seven cents per mile."

Mr. Edward V. Miles, in considering matters dealing with faculty benefits, has recommended, after consultation with members of the administration, that Paragraph Number One above be amended by adding the following:

"; however, the use of a personal car by a staff member who wishes to attend a meeting, conference, or convention accompanied by one or more members of his family may be authorized by the chairman of his department and academic dean or his office or division head. Reimbursement for the use of a personal car for such purposes will be at the same mileage rate as charged for University-owned cars."

This amendment would mean that faculty members would be reimbursed at the same rate with which their department travel budget would have been charged for use of a University car. At the present time, they are reimbursed at the rate of seven cents per mile when it becomes necessary for them to use their own cars. If, however, the staff member preferred to take his own car in lieu of the University car so that one or more members of his family could accompany him, he would be reimbursed at the same rate which the Physical Plant charges for this vehicle. At the present time, this rate is five and one-half cents per mile.

At the request of John Page Wham, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman and Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly were instructed to investigate insurance coverage.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the recommended amendment to University travel regulations.

(D) PURCHASE ORDERS, CONTRACTS, AND ENCUMBRANCE AUTHORIZATIONS AWARDED DURING THE MONTHS OF NOVEMBER AND DECEMBER, 1957, AMOUNTING TO LESS THAN \$1,000.00

To date, we have been reporting the names of these individuals and the terms of their part-time appointments. It is requested that hereafter they be cleared in a single listing, to be supplemented from time to time as additional appointments are recommended. It is also recommended

that their salaries be stated on a per hour basis, so that they can be called upon to teach as needed.

These recommendations would make it possible to handle call staff lecturers at the Residence Centers much as we now handle practice supervisors in the affiliated schools and temporary lecturers in Adult Education.

(L) CONVERSION TO UNIVERSITY UTILITIES BY THE SOUTHERN ILLINOIS COLLEGE OF BIBLE

As the result of conferences with the administration of the University, the Southern Illinois College of Bible (Baptist Foundation) has had plans and specifications prepared for conversion from their present means of obtaining electricity by poles and overhead lines and of obtaining heat by two furnaces within their building to obtaining these services from the University underground utilities. This connection to the University's utilities of the Baptist-owned property at the corner of Grand and Thompson Streets, which is the center of the University campus, will greatly enhance the appearance of this portion of the campus. It will provide for removal of unsightly poles and wires for electrical service and, with the elimination of drives, now necessary for coal deliveries and ash removal, will allow beautification of the landscape in this vicinity.

In addition, it will reduce the number of large trucks and other vehicles using the area and consequently will alleviate the possibility of students being injured by them.

The conversion will necessitate the use of University steam and electrical lines. These services will be metered at the point of entry into the College of Bible property and the College of Bible will reimburse

the University for the actual unit cost. In the case of the electrical services, the Central Illinois Public Service Company may prefer to use the lines of the University for transmission, being responsible for the maintenance of the equipment, and bill the College of Bible directly.

We consider the project well-advised from the standpoint of the University, since the University will gain in the welfare of its students and improve the appearance of the campus.

The College of Bible is concerned, however, before expending approximately \$17,000 for the conversion, that they be assured of availability of the supply of utility services by the University. To this end, the Legal Counsel and the attorney for the College of Bible have conferred. The College of Bible has agreed to accept a letter from the Board of Trustees which has been approved at a regular meeting stating the Board's intention to make such utility supply available.

Approval of the following letter is therefore recommended:

DEAR SIR:

It has come to the attention of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the Southern Illinois College of Bible is desirous of converting from their present means of obtaining heat and electricity to obtaining these utility services from the University. The purpose of this letter is to advise you that the matter has been considered by the Board at its January 30, 1958, meeting. The Board agreed that the College of Bible could make steam and electrical connections to the utility lines of the University.

With regard to the steam which will be furnished to you by the University, the College will be charged the actual unit cost of such services plus any expenses incurred in the operation and maintenance of the specific lines supplying the steam to your property.

With regard to the electrical service, the Central Illinois Public Service Company may wish to bill you directly for this service, but the University lines may be used for transmission.

It is understood that the College of Bible will, when conversion is complete, landscape the grounds of this property after consultation with the University Architect.

We believe that the proposed project will be to the mutual benefit of the University and the College of Bible.

(M) INSTITUTION OF SUIT FOR SPECIFIC PERFORMANCE OF CONTRACT FOR SALE OF TRACT 407-b

On July 23, 1957, Mr. Orin A. Tiller, the owner of property which has been University designated as tract 407-b and which is located adjacent to other property of the University at Little Grassy Lake, called at the office of the Legal Counsel and offered to sell this forty acre tract to the University for \$1,600.00. An option was taken from Mr. Tiller by the University, with an expiration date of September 15th. On the 5th of September, after authorizations for purchase were received from the Governor and the Board of Trustees, a registered letter was sent to Mr. Tiller stating that the University was exercising the option to purchase. Subsequently, when the Attorney General's opinion as to the condition of the title was obtained and the warrant for payment issued by the Auditor's office, Mr. Tiller refused to perform his contract and to convey the property to the Board of Trustees.

In 1956 Mr. Tiller had sold the University approximately 165 acres located adjacent to the property presently in question. Mr. Tiller places his refusal to comply with the terms of the contract on the basis that in the original transaction the University obtained more acreage than he had agreed to sell. With regard to this first transaction, Mr. Tiller had originally executed an option to one Ray Miller, which was assigned to the University by Mr. Miller. When the University attempted to exercise this option, Mr. Tiller refused to comply on the basis that the University could not exercise an option which originally had not been given to them. Mr. Tiller was in error with regard to the legal consequences of the option, but when the preliminary investigation was done upon which to predicate a suit against him at that time, the condition of the title to this property was so confused that it was impossible to compel him to execute the deed specified in the option. At that time it was determined not to submit the matter to adjudication. Subsequently, Mr. Tiller executed a correct option (at an increased price) to the University. It was necessary to renew this option, which was done prior to its expiration.

Mr. Tiller is correct that the renewal option, which was actually a new option, specified more land to be conveyed by him than the original option did. However, the original option was based on the amount of land which Mr. Tiller represented he owned within certain boundaries. After investigation it was discovered that he actually owned some thirty acres more within the prescribed boundaries. The second option

or renewal option was drawn to conform to this description. This section option was exercised by the University.

At the time of closing on the first transaction, Mr. Tiller raised the question of the increased amount of land as compared with the original option. The matter was discussed with him at length and with full knowledge of the amount of land which he was conveying to the University, Mr. Tiller executed the deed.

The above related circumstances are those upon which he now bases his refusal to comply with the agreement for the sale of this additional forty acres to the University.

The land in question is necessary for the University's program at Little Grassy. It will afford an excellent buffer and use zone for the University's outdoor program and its cooperative programs with other agencies.

For these reasons, adoption of the following resolution is recommended:

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University assembled in regular session that it authorize and direct its attorney to commence and prosecute a suit for specific performance against Orin A. Tiller to compel compliance with his contract for the sale to the Board of Trustees of the following described real estate:

The Northwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$ excepting an area commencing at a point on the East line of the Northwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of the Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 6, T. 11 S., R. 1 E. of the 3rd P.M., where the county road leading East from Makanda strikes said line and then turns south. Thence South 10 rods, thence West 10 rods, thence North 10 rods, thence East 10 rods to the place of beginning, in Section 6, Town 11 South, Range 1 East of the 3rd P.M., Union County, Illinois, and for such other relief as the appropriate court may deem proper.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the above resolution authorizing institution of a suit for specific performance of contract for sale of Tract 407-b. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(N) IMPROVEMENTS AT SOUTHERN ILLINOIS AIRPORT

At the July 25, 1957, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board's attention was called to proposed improvements and additions to the Southern Illinois Airport which is maintained and operated by the Murdale Airport Authority.

The purpose of calling this matter to the Board's attention at that time was that the University had been requested to assist in the program to the extent of approximately \$120,000 of the \$444,000 which it was estimated the proposed improvements and additions would cost.

Since that time the amount of money which the Illinois Department of Aeronautics was to have received for the proposed project was re-

duced by one-half. Further, since that time the Civil Aeronautics Authority has had a reduction in the amount of money which is available to it for participation in local airport projects. In view of the subsequent developments, the scope of the proposed improvements has been reduced.

The present increments of work and their estimated cost together with the participation by local (Southern Illinois University), State, and Federal Funds is as follows:

The suggestion that the University participate in the proposed improvements was made by Governor Stratton when the Airport Authority sought a direct appropriation from the Legislature for the purpose of improving the airport facilities.

If the University is to participate in the suggested improvement, it is necessary that a letter of commitment for funds be sent to the Civil Aeronautics Authority in the name of the Board of Trustees.

Even with the letter of commitment, there is no assurance that the Civil Aeronautics Authority will approve and participate in the proposed project. It will be necessary, before the money can be expended, for the Airport Authority to grant consideration to the University for the expenditure of the funds. It has been agreed that this will be handled by a long term lease for a nominal consideration, for use and control of certain airport facilities.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved a letter of commitment for funds to be forwarded to

the Civil Aeronautics Authority in the name of the Board of Trustees. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(O) LEASE OF EAST ST. LOUIS HIGH SCHOOL

The Board has previously approved, in principle, entering into a lease with the East St. Louis Board of Education for use of their high school as a residence center. The approval of the following resolution is requested, which will authorize entering into this lease:

Resolution Approving Lease of East St. Louis High School

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is desirous of obtaining a facility in East St. Louis for a residence center; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Education of School District No. 189, St. Clair County, Illinois, desires to lease a certain building to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, known as the old East St. Louis Senior High School, which is located in the block bounded by Ninth, Tenth, and Ohio Streets and College Avenue in the City of East St. Louis, Illinois; now, therefore, be it

Resolved That the Lease which is attached hereto and made a part hereof be and is approved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, and that the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees be and are authorized to enter into such Lease for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

A copy of the attachment mentioned above was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockart; nay, none.

The members of the Board and university administrators adjourned for luncheon to the Lockhaven Country Club, and were joined there by the following members of the Executive Committee of the Southwestern Illinois Council for Higher Education: Dr. Robert B. Lynn, Chairman; Mr. Val Cox, Mr. Truman Davis, Miss Bernice Goedde, Mrs. Lester Klope, Mr. George Moorman, Sr., Mr. Charles Schmidt, Mr. Matt Welch, Mr. George Wilkins, and Dr. Frank L. Eversull.

Chairman John Page Wham welcomed the members of the Executive Committee, and called upon Dr. Lynn, President Morris, Mr. Nickell, Dr. Eversull, Mr. Wilkins, and Dr. See. Each spoke briefly regarding the progress being made in the field of higher education in the Madison-St. Clair counties area. Dr. See presented copies of an enrollment analysis for the Residence Centers for the winter quarter.

Following luncheon, the Board reconvened in regular session.

(P) CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEE PAYROLLS

A report showing changes in civil service employee payrolls for the period July 1, 1957, through December 31, 1957, was presented. A copy of the report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board ratified all changes, as reported. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(Q) RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREE

We recommend that at the June, 1958, commencement, or some commencement thereafter, the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities be awarded to Carl Sandburg, one of the world's leading poets.

Carl Sandburg was born January 6, 1878, in Galesburg, Illinois. He began his career as an editorial writer and associated editor of various newspapers and magazines. In 1914 he was awarded the Levinson's Prize by *Poetry Magazine*, and was the recipient of the Pulitzer Prize for poetry in 1950. Mr. Sandburg is highly respected by his literary contemporaries, and has made great contributions to American literature as an author, columnist and editor, lecturer, soldier, and scholar. He is a noted Lincoln biographer, having published *Abraham Lincoln: The Prairie Years* in 1926; *Abraham Lincoln: The War Years* (4 volumes) in 1939; *Lincoln Collector* in 1949; *Mary Lincoln, Wife and Widow* (co-author Paul M. Angle) and *The Photographs of Abraham Lincoln* (co-author Frederick Hill Meserve) in 1944. Mr. Sandburg has been cited by many colleges and universities, and is a famous son of Illinois. His home is in Flat Rock, North Carolina.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration. We recommend its approval.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, the Board unanimously approved the above recommendation.

(R) SPECIAL AWARD

It is recommended that the Southern Illinois University Distinguished Service Award be presented to Miss Joan Hunter at the August, 1958, commencement, or some commencement thereafter. Miss Hunter is an outstanding teacher in the Edwardsville High School.

Joan Hunter is a graduate of the Edwardsville High School, and received the Master of Science degree from the University of Michigan. She has served as vice-president and president of the Illinois State Acad-

emy of Science, and was the first high school teacher so honored. In 1952-53, and again in 1953-54, she served as state chairman of the Illinois Junior Academy of Science. Miss Hunter is an inspired leader of junior and senior scientists, and an energetic and respected teacher of Biology on the senior high school level. She is a member of Delta Kappa Gamma.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board unanimously approved the above recommendation.

(S) POLICY OF COOPERATION WITH JUNIOR COLLEGES

In response to various expressions of interest concerning Southern Illinois University's attitude toward junior colleges, the administration has developed the following statement of present practices. Approval is requested for this statement as an official policy of the University:

Southern Illinois University has supported legislative action at the State level and encouraged communities at the local level to establish junior colleges when need has been determined and resources are available. Junior colleges have much to contribute in meeting the increased need for higher education, and by their very existence stimulate college attendance.

Whenever the citizens of a school district vote to approve the establishment of a junior college, Southern Illinois University is ready to cooperate in program planning and development and where possible to provide supplementary courses as requested.

Copies of a similar statement prepared and released by the University of Illinois on October 9, 1956, were presented to the Board. President Morris stated that, so far as he knew, this policy stood as a policy statement of the University of Illinois.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, the Board unanimously approved the policy statement presented by the administration.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris reported that a study had been undertaken, exploring the need for a special type of training program for personnel on the commercial river crafts on the inland waterways. He explained that because laws written in the 1800's require licensing for steamboat personnel, while most river traffic is now carried on by diesel powered boats, there is no licensing requirement. He further explained that a training program would relate to accident rates to property and life, to safety of non-commercial craft on the rivers, and to the total program of river transportation and needs.

Dr. Guy Trump, a former faculty member now Dean of the Instructional Program at King's Point Maritime School, had conducted the investigation. His conclusion was that a short terminal-type program for deckhands, a two-year terminal program for mates, masters, and pilots, and eventually a four-year program with full degree status for those persons interested in shore executive duty, were needed.

President Morris pointed out that this area, near the junction of the Wabash, Tennessee, Ohio, and Mississippi Rivers, and close to the junction of the Mississippi, Ohio, and Missouri Rivers, would be an ideal training center. He further indicated that such training was closely related to the skill programs already being offered.

President Morris discussed briefly the opposition of the University of Illinois to the bill which would authorize the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to award degrees in engineering.

President Morris mentioned the work of the Committee for Objectives and indicated that a written report would be presented to the Board in the near future.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:45 P.M.



MEETING OF FEBRUARY 28, 1958

THE FEBRUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held on the Southern Acres campus on Friday, February 28, 1958, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Martin F. Oehmke. Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Fischer, and Mr. Nickell were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on January 30, 1958, copies of which had been sent to each member in advance of this meeting. President Morris explained that in final negotiations with the East St. Louis Board of Education, it had been requested that six additional rooms in the Rock Junior High School be reserved for their use. He requested that the Board approve this amendment to action taken on January 30, 1958, when approving the minutes. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, these minutes were approved as amended.

Consideration was given to the naming of a representative of the Board of Trustees to serve as a member of the Board of Directors of Southern Illinois University Foundation, replacing Mr. Kenneth L. Davis, whose term would expire in June, 1958. After discussion, Melvin C. Lockard moved the re-election of Mr. Davis. The motion was seconded by Martin F. Oehmke and was carried by unanimous vote.

President Morris stated that Mr. Kenneth R. Miller, whose appointment as Administrative Assistant to the President would begin on April 1, 1958, would devote part of his time to the furtherance of the interests of the Southern Illinois University Foundation. He requested that the Executive Secretary of the Foundation be instructed to place on the agenda for a full meeting of the Board of Directors the question of whether or not it would be desirable for Mr. Miller to devote some of his time to fund raising.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) APPROVAL OF GRADUATE OFFERINGS IN INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

Upon recommendation of the Graduate Council and the dean of the Graduate School, we are requesting the approval of a graduate program in Instructional Materials leading to the master's degree.

Although the Instructional Materials Department was only recently organized, its staff has been drawn from the former Library Service Department and from the Audio-Visual Aids Service, a number of whom have been with us for many years. These people have built up a strong undergraduate program in Instructional Materials and have also built up the library and the equipment in this field to a point where there is a sound basis for graduate offerings. Three of the staff of six members have doctor's degrees and the others have special degrees in library work.

If this recommendation is approved, Southern Illinois University will be one of the first schools in the country able to offer graduate work in an integrated program for both library and audio-visual personnel.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved a graduate program in Instructional Materials, leading to the master's degree.

(B) LAND ACQUISITION

The adoption of the following resolution is recommended, authorizing the administration to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of Tract 65-e, Tract 65-h, Tract 65-k, Tract 77-e, and Tract 77-e-1, if and when it becomes apparent that these tracts should be acquired:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled this 28th day of February, 1958, has, on this

date and on previous occasions, approved certain plans for the growth, campus enlargement and expansion of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In order to provide additional grounds for the location of buildings, site development, and expansion of facilities necessary for such campus enlargement, it will be necessary to acquire certain tracts and parcels of real estate; now, therefore, be it

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it is necessary for campus enlargement to acquire for use by Southern Illinois University the following parcels of real estate, all located in the County of Jackson, State of Illinois:

Tract 65-e: The east half of 120 feet of the west 259 feet of the south 63 feet 3 inches of Lot 3, Block 8 of Krysher's Addition to the City of Carbondale, Jackson County, Illinois.

Tract 65-h: The north 50 feet of the south 113 feet 3 inches of the west 259 feet of Lot 3, Block 8, Krysher's Addition to the City of Carbondale, Jackson County, Illinois.

Tract 65-k: The south 72 feet 6 inches of the north 221 feet 6 inches except 17 feet off the east end of Lot 4, Block 8, Krysher's Addition to the City of Carbondale, Jackson County, Illinois.

Tract 77-e: Beginning at the Southeast corner of Lot 1 in Block 7 of Krysher's Addition, running West 184 feet to a point of beginning of this tract on the North Line of Grand Avenue, thence North 180 feet, West 50 feet, South 180 feet, East 50 feet to the point of beginning, being a part of Lot 2 in Block 7, Krysher's Addition, Carbondale, Illinois.

Tract 77-e-l: Beginning at a point on the north line of Grand Avenue 234 feet west of the southeast corner of Lot 1 in Block 7 running thence north 180 feet, west 60 feet, south 180 feet, east 60 feet, along the north line of Grand Avenue to the point of beginning being a part of Lot 2 in Block 7 of Krysher's addition, and

Part of Lot 3, Block 7 of Krysher's Addition to the City of Carbondale, Illinois, beginning at a point 294 feet West of the Southeast corner of Lot 1, Block 7, thence North parallel to Lake Street 180 feet, thence West 5 feet, thence South 180 feet to the North line of Grand Avenue, thence East along the north line of Grand Avenue 5 feet to the point of beginning; all the above in Carbondale, Illinois.

WHEREAS, Said unacquired parcels of real estate are necessary for the expansion and campus enlargement of Southern Illinois University and reasonable offers of purchase based on able appraiser opinion have all been refused by the landowners of said parcels of real estate; be it further

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it proceed to condemn the above described parcels of real estate to be acquired for necessary campus enlargement.

President Morris explained that this request was a supplement to the list of tracts presented at the January and February, 1957, meetings of the Board, and would bring up to date the Board's approval of the University's land acquisition program.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(C) INDEPENDENT AUDIT FOR 1957-1958

It is recommended that the C. J. Schlosser & Company be approved by the Board of Trustees to make the independent audit of the University accounts for the year July 1, 1957, to June 30, 1958. The cost will be approximately \$7,000.00. Last year the cost was \$6,000.00, but the volume of business will be greater this year and it is hoped that the auditors can make a more thorough and complete audit of auxiliary enterprises and service departments. It is desirable that this be approved at this time so that the company's auditors can set up their working schedules now, which will make it possible for them to get our audit completed at a much earlier date than in the past.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved C. J. Schlosser & Company to make the independent audit for the year July 1, 1957, to June 30, 1958. The vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(D) PURCHASE ORDERS, CONTRACTS, AND ENCUMBRANCE AUTHORIZATIONS AWARDED DURING THE MONTH OF JANUARY, 1958, AMOUNTING TO LESS THAN \$1,000.00

(K) CONSOLIDATION OF BANK BALANCES

In reply to a question raised concerning the deposit insurance afforded the funds of the Board of Trustees deposited with insured banks, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation has written the Legal Counsel, in part, as follows:

“With respect to the deposit maintained by the university in a single insured bank, in determining the ‘insured deposit,’ all deposits maintained in the same *capacity and right* are added together and insured in the aggregate to the maximum of \$10,000.00. Deposits maintained in different *rights or capacities are not added together*, but are separately insured to the maximum of \$10,000.00 in the capacity or right in which they are maintained.”

It is the Legal Counsel’s opinion, based upon interpretation of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation’s letter, that all of the University’s accounts at the First National Bank could be consolidated into one account with the assurance that the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation coverage would be no less than that at the present time. This would also be true for the consolidation of the accounts at the Carbondale National Bank, excepting, of course, the Southern Illinois University Foundation account, which should not be co-mingled with the accounts of the University.

Although the several accounts at the First National Bank as well as the several accounts at the Carbondale National Bank may be classified into separate rights or capacities, this classification would not be affected by the consolidation of the accounts. Neither would the co-mingling of the funds at each bank destroy the identity of the several capacities or rights or the identity and balance of each University fund since the accounts on the records of the University will definitely show, as they do now, the identity and balance of each group of funds as well as the identity and balance of each fund within each group.

The bond resolutions passed by the Board for Woody Hall and the Thompson Point Residence Halls provide that separate funds and separate accounts shall be maintained for the dormitory construction funds and the dormitory revenue funds. It is not clear, however, that it was intended to require separate bank accounts for each of these funds; namely, the Dormitory Construction Fund of 1952, the Dormitory Construction Fund of 1956, the Dormitory Revenue Fund of 1952, and the Dormitory Revenue Fund of 1956. The University is now maintaining

a separate bank account for each of such funds as well as maintaining on its records the identity of the separate funds and separate accounts for each fund. We are advised that the University of Illinois was confronted with this same problem and proceeded to consolidate bank accounts into a single account.

It is our judgment that the consolidation of bank accounts will provide more economy in the administration of our bank balances. It is, therefore, our recommendation that the several University bank accounts at the First National Bank be consolidated into one account entitled, "Board of Trustees—Southern Illinois University" and the several University bank accounts at the Carbondale National Bank be consolidated into one account entitled, "Board of Trustees—Southern Illinois University," such consolidation to become effective April 1, 1958.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the consolidation of bank accounts as recommended above. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(L) APPROVAL OF PETITION FOR RAILROAD CROSSING PROTECTION

As the commuter population of the University increases, the safety problems created by the close proximity of the Illinois Central Railroad tracks also increases. In the fall of 1955 there were 1,345 commuters; in the fall of 1956, 1,432; and last fall it was estimated that there were in excess of 1,600 commuters.

Hazardous conditions are created at rush hours, at times when the visibility is poor, and at those times when driving conditions are less than ideal. On January 18, 1955, a car driven by a University student, Charles W. Mueller, Jr., was struck at the Grand Street crossing. Mr. Mueller died as a result of the injuries he received and a passenger, John Harold Huber, was hospitalized. On July 5, 1956, two other University students were injured (not seriously) in an accident at the same intersection. Unsafe conditions exist at all times.

At the present time there are no safeguards provided at either the Grand Street crossing or at Harwood Avenue crossing. These two crossings are the most heavily used by University traffic, and are within the campus. The Grand Street crossing is within the city limits, while the Harwood Avenue crossing is a township road.

For some time the University administration has been working with the City and the Township for protection of these crossings. For various reasons these bodies have not seen fit to join with the University in petitioning the Illinois Commerce Commission for crossing protection.

The situation has now reached the point where it appears that the Board should request decisive action with regard to these crossings.

The recommendation which we would formally make to the Illinois Commerce Commission would be for the erection of protection gates at the Grand Street crossing, and the closing of the Harwood Avenue crossing to all but pedestrian traffic.

The following resolution is recommended for adoption by the Board:

WHEREAS, It appears that conditions dangerous to the welfare of students and staff of Southern Illinois University exist at the intersections of Grand Street and Harwood Avenue with the Illinois Central Railroad tracks; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees as a body politic and corporate is charged with the responsibility for maintaining and operating Southern Illinois University and as such have a responsibility for the health and welfare of its students and staff; and

WHEREAS, The present conditions of these aforesaid intersections do bear on the safety and welfare of Southern Illinois University's students and staff; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Commerce Commission of the State of Illinois is legally designated as the body charged with the duty of determining remedial measures for increasing the safety at railroad crossings; now, therefore, be it

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, that the Legal Counsel of the University be and is authorized to petition the Illinois Commerce Commission (1) for the erection of automatic protection gates at the Grand Street intersection with the Illinois Central Railroad tracks; and (2) for the elimination of all traffic other than pedestrian at the Harwood Avenue crossing.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board adopted unanimously the resolution recommended for presentation to the Illinois Commerce Commission.

(M) APPROVAL OF REDEMPTION BONDS, DORMITORY REVENUE FUND OF 1952

The Bond Resolution, Dormitory Revenue Fund of 1952, requires that any surplus remaining in the Construction Fund shall be used for the redemption of bonds. On February 12, 1958, we transferred \$10,930.86 from the Dormitory Construction Fund of 1952 to the Dormitory Revenue Fund of 1952, Interest and Sinking Fund Account, which exhausts the Construction Fund. This is the final transaction against the Dormitory Construction Fund of 1952, which has been held until the

University could be sure that there were no additional funds to be expended for construction. In conformance with the requirements of the Bond Resolution, approval is requested for the redemption of bonds in the amount of \$10,000.00 on the next call date, April 1, 1958.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved the redemption of bonds as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(N) APPROVAL OF SALE OF NATIONAL LEAD COMPANY STOCK

As a part of a research grant made to the University for immigration studies, eighty-three shares of National Lead Company common stock was given to the Board of Trustees for purposes of financing the studies. It is necessary to sell this stock to obtain the funds to finance the project. A formal resolution must be adopted by the Board of Trustees before a sale can be effected. Approval of the following resolution is requested:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University hereby approve the sale by the Business Manager of Southern Illinois University of the eighty-three shares of National Lead Company common stock, ownership of which is evidenced by stock certificate number CO 170084, issued by the National Lead Company, which certificate has been received by the Board of Trustees from the Guaranty Trust Company of New York, and the Business Manager of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute such documents as may be necessary for the sale of the stock evidenced by the said certificate.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris briefly reported on a second conference which he, Mr. Wham, and Mr. Sturgis had with Governor Stratton on February 18, 1958. He stated that the picture of enrollments at the Residence Centers at Alton and East St. Louis was presented, and the extraordinary demands for funds for operation were emphasized.

President Morris announced that Governor Stratton would deliver the June 15, 1958, commencement address, following dedication ceremonies for the new Home Economics building.

The meeting was adjourned at 3 P.M.



MEETING OF MARCH 31, 1958

THE MARCH MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the University Library on Monday, March 31, 1958, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Martin F. Oehmke. Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Fischer, and Mr. Nickell were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, Reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on February 28, 1958, copies of which had been sent to each member in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) TAX-FREE ALCOHOL PERMIT—SOUTHWESTERN ILLINOIS RESIDENCE CENTERS

The residence centers at Alton and East St. Louis have made application to the U.S. Treasury Department for a permit to use tax-free

alcohol at these branches. To obtain these permits, it is necessary that the Board of Trustees pass resolutions granting officers of the University the authority to sign tax-free alcohol documents at each location. Adoption of the following resolutions is recommended.

It is hereby resolved that the following officers of the University have charge of the tax-free alcohol on the Southern Illinois University Residence Center campus at Alton: Assistant Business Officer, whoever he or she may be; Stores Supervisor, whoever he or she may be; or the Business Officer, whoever he or she may be. This person shall have charge of all records and be responsible for all reports, ordering, housing, and dispensing of the alcohol under the tax-free permit assigned to Southern Illinois University Residence Center, Alton, Illinois.

It is hereby resolved that the following officers of the University have charge of the tax-free alcohol on the Southern Illinois University Residence Center campus at East St. Louis: Assistant Business Officer, whoever he or she may be; Stores Supervisor, whoever he or she may be; or the Business Officer, whoever he or she may be. This person shall have charge of all records and be responsible for all reports, ordering, housing and dispensing of the alcohol under the tax-free permit assigned to Southern Illinois University Residence Center, East St. Louis, Illinois.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board adopted the above resolution by unanimous vote.

(B) INDEPENDENT AUDIT

Prior to the 1956-57 fiscal year, Southern Illinois University and the Auditor of Public Accounts joined in paying for an independent audit. The Auditor of Public Accounts paid one-third of the cost. In view of the uncertainties in the Auditor's Office at the time, there was no provision for joint sharing of the cost for the fiscal year 1956-57. Also, the action of the Board at the meeting on February 28, 1958, regarding the independent audit for 1957-58, mentions the possibility of a joint audit. Mr. Frank Whitney, Auditor General, visited our campus recently and expressed a desire to return to our former practice of joining with the State office, in this case the Auditor General, in sharing an independent audit. Mr. Whitney is willing for his office to pay \$500.00 of the cost of the 1956-57 audit and will pay one-third of the actual cost of auditing for the proposed 1957-58 audit. It is recommended that Mr. Whitney's proposal for this joint audit be approved.

(J) RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREE

It was recommended that at the June, 1958, commencement, or some commencement thereafter, the honorary degree of Doctor of Science be awarded to Spencer T. Olin, Alton, Illinois.

Spencer T. Olin was born August 20, 1900, at Alton, Illinois. He was graduated from Cornell University in 1921 with a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering degree. In 1945, when Olin Industries, Inc., was formed as a consolidation of Western Cartridge Company, Winchester Repeating Arms Company, Olin Corporation, and others, he became First Vice President of Olin Industries, Inc. He continued in that position until the merger of Olin Industries, Inc., with Mathieson Chemical Corporation in 1954. At the present time he is a director of Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation and also serves as a member of the Executive Committee. Mr. Olin's interest in education has been evidenced by his service as a director of Washington University, as a member of the Board of Trustees of Cornell University and also of Monticello College, Godfrey, Illinois. Mr. Olin is a director of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association. He has also served as a director of the National Association of Manufacturers and is a past president of the American Hardware Manufacturers' Association.

This recommendation has been initiated by the Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration. We recommend its approval.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board unanimously approved the recommendation submitted, as above.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris referred to a letter received from Mr. J. C. Williams of J. C. Williams & Sons, General Contractors, requesting an appearance before the Board of Trustees regarding liquidated damages withheld for failure to complete the heating tunnel to Thompson Point dormitories within the contract time.

The Board authorized the administration to advise Mr. Williams that his request would be granted at 2:30 P.M. on the day of the next regular meeting, provided (1) clearance was obtained by Mr. Williams from the prime contractor, the Joseph Latta Construction Company (formerly the L & R Construction Company), and (2) that Mr. Williams furnish the Board, at least 15 days in advance of the meeting, a written statement itemizing the basis for his dissatisfaction with the decision of the University Architect. The University Architect was instructed to submit a statement to the Board, following receipt of Mr. Williams' statement, and prior to the next regular meeting.

The following resolution concerning the acquisition of land was presented and adoption by the Board was requested:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled this 31st day of March, 1958, on this date and on previous occasions, approved certain plans for the growth, campus enlargement and expansion of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In order to provide additional grounds for the location of buildings, site development, and expansion of facilities necessary for such campus enlargement, it will be necessary to acquire certain tracts and parcels of real estate; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it is necessary for campus enlargement to acquire for use by Southern Illinois University the following parcel of real estate:

The North 56 feet of regular Lot 747, located in the City of Carbondale, Jackson County, Illinois.

WHEREAS, Said unacquired parcel of real estate is necessary for the expansion and campus enlargement of Southern Illinois University, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it acquire the above described parcel of real estate for necessary campus enlargement; and be it further

Resolved, That if the landowner refuses reasonable offers of purchase based on able appraiser opinion, then and in that case condemnation proceedings shall be brought in the name of the Board of Trustees for the acquisition of this parcel of real estate.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board adopted the above resolution. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

WHEREAS, He exhibited an unusual understanding of the contributions higher education, research, and educational service make to the improvement of all phases of living, particularly rural; and

WHEREAS, He demonstrated a keen and sympathetic understanding of the needs, aims, and efforts of Southern Illinois University to improve the economic, social, and cultural level of Southern Illinois; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees in regular meeting assembled that the Board express its understanding and appreciation of Otto Steffey's services to the University, its regret for his untimely passing, and its sympathy to his family and friends. Be it further

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND MILITARY TRAINING BUILDING

At a previous meeting a brochure was presented to the Board on the Physical Education and Military Training Building. At this time sufficient progress has been made to request Board approval of the preliminary plans and specifications for this building. We are prepared to present any materials and answer any questions which may occur to the Board.

President Morris indicated that the plans and specifications represented the preliminary planning stage, and that the same principle used in the Library and University Center was being followed, namely, a building planned for future expansion to meet increased enrollments.

Initial seating capacity was indicated to be 2,608, with an eventual capacity of 10,000. It was indicated that efforts were being made to obtain federal funds to assist in meeting construction costs of the portion of the building applying to the ROTC program.

President Morris indicated that a shelter-type, unheated building was proposed in the general area of the Physical Education and Military Training Building, for use for indoor track, baseball practice, and ROTC drill.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved preliminary plans and specifications, as presented.

(B) LISTING OF GRADUATE ASSISTANTS AND GRADUATE FELLOWS

As a result of the rapid growth of the Graduate School, an increasing number of graduate assistantships have been awarded each year. Graduate assistants receive a nominal salary for part-time teaching only, but hitherto we have followed the practice of reporting them to the Board as though they were full-time members of the staff.

Because the reporting in full of these part-time temporary appointments tends to swell out the matters for consideration, approval is requested for listing graduate assistants hereafter as we presently list graduate fellows; namely, in a summary showing their names, degrees, assignments, and monthly stipends.

It is further recommended that graduate fellows and graduate assistants be employed quarter by quarter as needed, within the limits of the allocations to the various schools and colleges for their salaries.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the recommended procedure for listing graduate assistants and also approved the employment of graduate fellows and graduate assistants quarter by quarter as needed, within the limits of the allocations to the various schools and colleges for their salaries.

(L) APPLICATION FOR LOAN FOR UNIVERSITY CENTER

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees held on June 29, 1956, the University administration was authorized to seek a loan in the amount of \$3,600,000 for construction of the University Center. It is necessary that an amended resolution be passed by the Board of Trustees, authorizing application for a loan from the Housing and Home Finance Agency in the amount of \$2,300,000.00. This is the maximum which the Housing and Home Finance Agency is willing to guarantee for the purchase of bonds.

Approval of the following amendatory resolution is requested:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has authorized and directed the University administration to plan a University Center as a part of the total University building program; and

WHEREAS, Preliminary planning, programming, and final plans and specifications have been accomplished; and

WHEREAS, It is deemed advisable to build a University Center at an estimated cost of \$4,600,000.00; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University sitting in regular meeting that the Legal Counsel be and is authorized to make application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government for a loan of \$2,300,000.00 to partially finance the construction of the said University Center.

President Morris requested approval of the above resolution authorizing application for a loan of \$2,300,000.00 from the federal government, and further authorization to seek a similar amount from private sources.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented and authorized the administration to seek funds from private sources. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

The audit report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1957, prepared by C. J. Schlosser & Company, was presented to the members of the Board. President Morris stated that the audit for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1958, would be started immediately after July 1.

President Morris presented to the Board a confidential report of negotiations with Roy Wenzlick and Company and the Carl G. Stifel Realty Company, concerning appraisals and options for certain tracts of land under consideration in the Madison-St. Clair counties area.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board accepted proposals made by the appraisers and realtors for the acquisition of options for the permanent location of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Center campus. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

A request from Mr. A. B. Gill, President of the Board of Education of Albion, Illinois, Community District #1, for a hearing with the Board concerning the establishment of a residence center in that area, was presented. Professor Tenney reported that the Albion representatives had been advised to make common cause with the Mt. Carmel group, being in the same vicinity. By common consent the Board agreed to invite representatives of Albion to meet with the Board for luncheon on June 16, 1958.

Copies of a study on Southern Illinois University faculty salaries and ranks, prepared by the Faculty Salary and Rank Committee, was presented for the information of the members of the Board.

President Morris reported briefly concerning the work of the Student Council and the Director of Student Affairs on a new constitution and a new procedure of representation on the Student Council. By common consent the Board remanded to President Morris consideration of the proposed constitution.

President Morris reported his suggestion to the Chairman of the Board that Board meetings should be held on the junior college campuses at Belleville, Centralia, and Mt. Vernon, to discuss with the administration of those colleges matters of common interest and the means by which the University might be most helpful to them. Mr. Wham suggested that, since the Board favored the idea of such meetings, details could be left to the administration.

President Morris discussed at length the proposed general education requirements for graduation from the University. He indicated that he had received a recommendation from the Faculty Council which he felt represented a compromise, rather than statesmanship, in education. He further indicated that he intended to express this feeling to the faculty at the next faculty meeting, and ask for suggestions as to the procedure for obtaining recommendations which would represent a real step forward.

The Legal Counsel advised the Board that Mr. J. C. Williams of the J. C. Williams & Sons, General Contractors, had indicated that the letter sent his company by the Chairman of the Board, regarding his request for a hearing with the Board, had satisfied the action which he wished taken by the Board and that his company no longer considered a hearing necessary.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 P.M.



MEETING OF JUNE 24, 1958

THE JUNE MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Tuesday, June 24, 1958, beginning at 10 A.M.

Miles, Jr., Acting Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Executive Dean of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Centers Harold W. See, Bob Haring, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

In executive session, copies of the proposed operating budget for the fiscal year 1958-1959 were presented to the members of the Board. A memorandum had been forwarded previously which set out in detail the differences in budget allocations for the 1958-1959 fiscal year and for the 1957-1958 fiscal year.

President Morris suggested that the Board might approve the budget insofar as it related to the payrolls, but only tentatively approve budget allocations, contingent upon a conference which he and Mr. Wham would hold with Governor Stratton on July 2, 1958.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the budget in accordance with President Morris' sug-

gestion. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickel, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

In open session, the first item considered was the minutes of the regular meeting held May 19, 1958. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard the Board unanimously approved these minutes as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) APPROVAL OF DOCTORAL PROGRAM IN MICROBIOLOGY

At its November 3, 1955, meeting the Board of Trustees amended the By-Laws and Statutes to permit the granting of the doctoral degree. On June 29, 1956, the Board approved four departments for doctoral curricula, namely, Speech Pathology, Psychology, Government, and Education.

We are now ready to present a recommendation for a fifth department, Microbiology. The staff of the Microbiology Department consists of Professor Carl C. Lindegren, Chairman, holding a doctor's degree from the California Institute of Technology; Associate Professor Maurice Ogur, holding the doctor's degree from Columbia University; Associate Professor I. L. Shechmeister, holding the doctor's degree from the University of California; and Assistant Professor Dan O. McClary, holding the doctor's degree from Washington University.

Both Professor Lindegren and Professor Shechmeister have had extended experience supervising the work of doctoral candidates in Microbiology at other universities. Dean Willis G. Swartz of the Graduate School points out that Microbiology has what is probably the best equipped laboratory in the world in its field (the genetics of yeast). The department has the further advantage of occupying over 11,000 square feet of space in the new and modern Life Science Building, fully equipped to carry on any researches which its graduate students might undertake. The holdings in the Library in this field are especially strong, and there is an extensive reprint library of articles covering many topics in Microbiology available for student use.

The application of the Department of Microbiology to offer graduate work was reviewed by the Graduate Council and recommended by the Council to Dean Swartz, who states that he endorses the request of the Department for approval.

It is therefore recommended that the Department of Microbiology be authorized to accept students for the doctoral degree, effective at the beginning of the 1958 summer session.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board authorized the Department of Microbiology to accept students for the doctoral degree, effective at the beginning of the 1958 summer session.

(B) APPROVAL OF SALE OF U. S. TREASURY BONDS

From time to time the Board has authorized the investment of surplus funds in direct obligations of the United States government. Some of these funds have been used to purchase U.S. Treasury Bonds, 3%, '95 series. At the present time the Board has invested \$36,696.26 in bonds having a par value of \$37,000.00. Due to the condition of the U.S. Treasury Bond market, it appears desirable for the Business Manager to have authority to sell these bonds at advantageous times. These times do not always coincide with a meeting of the Board, and the following resolution giving blanket authorization for the sale is requested:

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University hereby approve the sale by the Business Manager of Southern Illinois University, for and on behalf of the said Board, of U.S. Treasury Bonds, 3%, '95 series, at times when the sale or sales, and in such amounts as, in the opinion of the said Business Manager, will be most advantageous to preserving and conserving the funds of the Board; and, the Business Manager of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to execute such documents as may be necessary from time to time to consummate the said sale or sales.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, the Board adopted the resolution presented, giving authorization for the sale of U.S. Treasury Bonds.

(J) FINAL SETTLEMENT OF CONTRACT 4504 WITH L & R CONSTRUCTION COMPANY

At the time of acceptance by the University of Residence Halls No. 1, 2, 3, and 4 and the Dining Hall-Student Services Building at Thompson Point from the L&R Construction Co., there remained in dispute \$30,500.00 which represented liquidated damages for failure to complete the buildings within the stipulated contract time and extensions thereof. For each day of delay on the residence halls the contractor was liable for \$150.00 per building. On the steam tunnel the rate was \$100.00 per day and on the Dining Hall-Student Services Building the rate was \$300.00 per day.

The steam tunnel was to have been completed March 19, 1956. It was not accepted until April 5.

Residence Hall No. 4 was to have been completed September 16, 1956. It was not accepted until October 26, 1956. Residence Hall No. 3 was to have been completed September 19, 1956, and was not accepted until November 29, 1956. Residence Hall No. 2 was to have been completed on December 10, 1956, and was not accepted until January 27, 1957. Residence Hall No. 1 was to have been completed on January 11, 1957, and was not accepted until February 4, 1957. The Dining Hall-Student Services Building was to have been completed on February 27, 1957, and was not accepted until March 8, 1957.

The failure of the L&R Construction Company to complete within the times specified resulted in assessment of liquidated damages in the amount of \$30,500.00.

The L&R Construction Company, together with the Aetna Surety Company, have presented to the University Architect and the Legal Counsel mitigating factors which they asked to be considered in determining the final liquidated damages to be assessed. Generally, these factors were:

1. The inability of their suppliers for window sash to make delivery on schedule due to:
 - a. Broken dies in the plant of its supplier
 - b. A steel strike reducing the material available at their fabrication plant
2. Failure to obtain finish hardware schedules from the University Architect in time for completion of the building.
3. Delays in obtaining approvals from the University on Change Order proposals.
4. Delays which occurred as a result of reduction in forces of sub-contractors when the University became delinquent in their periodic payments.

In considering these items, the University Architect and the Legal Counsel have negotiated with the L&R Construction Company at length and have given consideration to the following factors:

1. The failure of the window sash supplier to provide the aluminum windows to L&R had actually delayed the L&R Construction Company from meeting its construction schedule. It was established by documentation that it was not the fault of the contractor. Since a strike was involved at the source of supply, there is a legal question involved as to whether damages assessed for the days delayed due to this could be sustained.

This delay, however, resulted in only two of the buildings. The window sash was on hand for three of the buildings at the time it was needed.

2. In considering the failure to obtain finish hardware, it was found that two of the buildings were accepted without the finish hardware installed so that any delay occasioned by failure to obtain hardware on time was not pertinent to those buildings. With regard to the other buildings, a request was made by the University for quotations for hardware changes. After a period of negotiation it was decided that it would not be in the best interests of the University to make these changes.

L&R alleged that the period of negotiations delayed it from placing its order for the hardware, thus delaying its construction schedule. It is impossible to determine whether there was actual delay occasioned, and if such delay was occasioned, to determine precisely the exact number of days of the delay.

The legal implications are that a jury might consider the length of time during which negotiations were in process as having an effect upon the completion of those buildings, and reduce the liquidated damages due the University accordingly.

3. It is true that in many instances during the contract considerable time transpired from the time the University Architect would ask the contractor for proposals for Change Orders and the final formal approval to proceed with the Change Orders. There were forty-eight Change Orders, of which only twenty-three are in contention. They covered such matters as a change of the type or the size of steel used in the dining room for the trolley system, the installation of splash boards in and about lavatories, electrical and partition changes in the buildings, addition of towel bars in residence fellows' and counselors' apartments, increasing the size of footings, etc. It was the opinion of the University Architect that the contractor could, if the matter was litigated, give evidence of additional delay occasioned by these changes.

4. Regarding the failure of the University to make periodic payments when due as provided by the contract, it should be noted that this occurred when it was impossible for payments to have been made as scheduled due to the failure to obtain funds from the Housing and Home Finance Agency at the propitious time. The delays in payment involved approximately \$28,000.00 for one month and approximately \$32,000.00 for the succeeding month.

This is the most serious weakness in the University's case. Subcontractors and suppliers have acknowledged that they used only minimal forces during this period of construction, since they had not received their periodic payments and were thus lacking in capital to meet the payroll for the number of men which they would have actually employed

during this period. L&R contends that this reduction of working force delayed the completion of the project.

Legally, this contention would be most difficult to refute. But, again, it is impossible to determine with exactitude the delay which resulted.

5. L&R did complete their buildings in less time than did the Edgar Stephens Construction Company. The contract entered into with the L&R Construction Company called for a shorter period of construction than did the contract with the Edgar Stephens Construction Company. This factor had no legal significance, but was considered by the University Architect and the Legal Counsel in arriving at a recommendation for the Board.

Bearing in mind these factors, the University Legal Counsel recommends, with the concurrence of the University Architect, that the final assessment of liquidated damages be \$16,000.00. It is the opinion of the University Legal Counsel that this is as fair and reasonable a settlement as the University could obtain if the matter was litigated.

The L&R Construction Company, through its attorneys and the Aetna Surety Co., have agreed to the recommended settlement. If the Board of Trustees is agreeable, formal approval should appear in the proceedings of the Board.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the recommended settlement. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

(K) RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREE

We recommend that at the August, 1958, commencement the honoray degree of Doctor of Humane Letters be awarded to Francis Henry Horn.

Francis Henry Horn, a native of Toledo, Ohio, has served as Visiting Professor in the Department of Secondary and Higher Education during the past year. He holds the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Yale University. From 1936 to 1942 he served in various capacities at the Junior College of Commerce (now Quinnipiac College), New Haven, Connecticut, and in 1945-46 served as Assistant Dean of the Biarritz American University in France. He was a Director of the Summer Sessions of Johns Hopkins University, and most recently served as President of Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, New York. His interests cover a wide variety of fields, including those of business, advertising, music, mental hygiene, and education. He is an author and an editor of various bulletins and reports. Professor Horn is the new President of the University of Rhode Island.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration. We recommend its approval.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board unanimously approved the award of the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters to Francis Henry Horn, as recommended.

* * * * *

As mentioned in the minutes of the meeting held on May 19, 1958, a request for a hearing with the Board of Trustees had been granted the Edwards County Community Unit School District No. 1. Accordingly, the Board of Trustees and University officials recessed for lunch to Lentz Hall, where they were joined by the following representatives from Albion, Illinois: Mr. A. M. Walton, president of the Board of Education, and Mr. F. Frank Saxe, member of the Board of Education; Mr. Gilbert Chalcraft, Mr. Melvin Dixon, and Dr. Floyd Ewing, members of the Albion Chamber of Commerce.

John Page Wham welcomed the representatives from Albion and called upon Mr. A. M. Walton, who stated the purpose of the meeting as follows: The Albion school district, in planning for the construction of a new high school building, wished to include facilities for some form of higher education in their building plans. Mr. Walton stated that if the University could establish a residence center operation, the Board of Education would make available a building at a nominal yearly rental. If a junior college seemed advisable, the assistance of the University was being sought as an aid to the establishment of such a facility.

Mr. Wham read a recent recommendation of the Illinois Commission of Higher Education, which stated, in essence, the desirability of attempting to establish a community college before a branch of a publicly supported institution of higher education was considered.

Mr. Nickell spoke regarding a provision for a full-time professional staff member in the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, to be available for assisting communities in their efforts to obtain local facilities for higher education. He pointed out that in the case of sparsely populated areas, two or more school districts might establish a community college jointly.

President Morris reviewed the Board's policy concerning the junior colleges, and assured the representatives from Albion that the University would do everything possible, within the limits of resources, to aid them in studying the establishment of some type of higher education facilities in their area.

* * * * *

Following the luncheon meeting, the Board reconvened in open session.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, the Board named the new library building "Morris Library," in recognition of

Mr. Lockard left the meeting at this time, and Kenneth L. Davis was designated by the Chairman to serve as Secretary pro tempore.

(L) CONVERSION TO UNIVERSITY UTILITIES BY THE COLLEGE OF THE BIBLE

At the January 30, 1958, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board approved sending the following letter to the Dean of the Southern Illinois College of the Bible:

It has come to the attention of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the Southern Illinois College of the Bible is desirous of converting from their present means of obtaining heat and electricity to obtaining these utility services from the University. The purpose of this letter is to advise you that the matter has been considered by the Board at its January 30, 1958, meeting. The Board agreed that the College of Bible could make steam and electrical connections to the utility lines of the University.

With regard to the steam which will be furnished to you by the University, the College will be charged the actual unit cost of such services plus any expenses incurred in the operation and maintenance of the specific lines supplying the steam to your property.

With regard to the electrical service, the Central Illinois Public Service Company may wish to bill you directly for this service, but the University lines may be used for transmission.

It is understood that the College of Bible will, when the conversion is complete, landscape the grounds of this property after consultation with the University Architect.

We believe that the proposed project will be to the mutual benefit of the University and the College of Bible.

Following this action by the Board, the administration of the University, the Southern Illinois College of Bible (Baptist Foundation), and the Central Illinois Public Service Company engaged in discussions regarding the provision of electricity for the Southern Illinois College of the Bible.

The position of the CIPS is that their rate structure, as filed and approved by the Illinois Commerce Commission, does not provide for sale

to users which, in turn, resell the electricity furnished them by CIPS. This means that the University cannot meter the electricity which the Foundation will use and bill them for it separately. Consequently, the rate which the Baptist Foundation will pay would not be reduced as a result of the conversion being made.

The position of the Southern Illinois College of Bible is that they do not object to spending the \$6,350.00 necessary to make the conversion from overhead pole lines to underground connections, if they can be assured that the money so expended will be reimbursed to them over a period of time.

Since the University will materially benefit from the conversion as indicated when this matter was originally before the Board on January 30, 1958, and since the College of Education administrative offices will be serviced by underground connection from the connection made to the Southern Illinois College of Bible, it is suggested that the Board approve the sending of the following letter. This letter represents an amendment to the one previously approved by the Board and assumes the payment of the electric bills of the Southern Illinois College of Bible until \$6,350.00 has, in effect, been recovered by the College of Bible. The Board may also note that the Southern Illinois College of the Bible uses its facilities for purposes of teaching students of the University and that University credit is given for these courses. This relieves the physical plant and facilities of the University and is sufficient consideration to justify the proposed expenditure.

In this connection and in consideration of (1) permitting the University to connect its College of Education administrative office building to your building; (2) the use of your facilities and staff for teaching courses for which Southern Illinois

University gives full credit; and (3) your expenditure for conversion of your source of electrical supply to underground, thereby permitting the removal of several power line poles from University property, the University agrees to assume your bill for electrical power until it has expended \$6,350.00 for said power.

It is understood that the College of Bible will, when the conversion is complete, landscape the ground of this property after consultation with the University Architect.

We believe that the proposed project will be to the mutual benefit of the University and the College of Bible.

(M) SPECIAL SCHOLARSHIPS FOR A SUMMER INSTITUTE FOR TEACHERS OF SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS

Southern Illinois University has an opportunity to cooperate with the National Science Foundation to conduct a summer institute for teachers of science and mathematics. The National Science Foundation will provide sufficient funds for each participant and his family to attend this eight-week institute. There is space in our residence halls and dining room facilities and the necessary faculty are available.

The National Science Foundation wishes to encourage the teachers of science and mathematics to take this refresher program, so they are anxious that the teachers have no cost at all if possible. Therefore, the National Science Foundation seeks the cooperation of the University by asking that the tuition and fees be waived for this special institute. With this in mind, it is recommended that the University's share in this worthy program be handled in the form of an estimated maximum of fifty special scholarships for this purpose.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Vernon L. Nickell, the Board approved participation in the summer institute for teachers of science and mathematics. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Davis; nay, none.

(N) AGREEMENT BETWEEN SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY AND SOUTHERN ILLINOIS SWINE HERD IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

This agreement by and between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the Southern Illinois Swine Herd Improve-

ment Association shall take effect as of the _____ day of _____, 1958, and shall continue in full force and effect until June 30, 1959, and from year to year thereafter unless the same shall be cancelled by either party at the termination hereof, or at the end of any succeeding year, upon the giving of notice in writing to the other party. The purpose of this agreement is to provide for the cooperative establishment, operation and maintenance of a Southern Illinois Boar Testing Station by the parties hereto.

In recognition of the support and assistance of S.I.U. to this project, the said Association and its members agree that upon the termination of the operation of the Boar Testing Station located upon the S.I.U. experimental farm in Carbondale, Illinois, the building and facilities of said Boar Testing Station shall pass to and become the property of the Board of Trustees of S.I.U.

It is further agreed that S.I.U. will furnish only the land and water for this boar testing station. The chief of the swine division in the Animal Industries Department of the School of Agriculture of S.I.U. will act in an advisory capacity to the Southern Illinois Swine Testing Station and in a direct supervisory capacity in the operation of the testing station. All records and data derived from this test station will become the joint property of the Southern Illinois Swine Herd Improvement Association and the S.I.U. Animal Industries Department.

It is understood that the Southern Illinois Swine Herd Improvement Association will assess fees from the participating members of the Association to cover the costs of operation and maintenance of the station. The chief of the Swine division will be designated as treasurer for the Southern Illinois Boar Testing Station to facilitate handling of funds derived from entrance fees and sale of the barrows slaughtered for carcass data. These funds will be handled through an S.I.U. agency account established for this specific purpose.

All the above is subject to the By-laws, Statutes, and Regulations of the Board of Trustees.

SENATE BILL No. 502 (70th G.A.)

A BILL

For an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. The following named sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, respectively, for the objects and purposes hereinafter named, are appropriated to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University:

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Section 3. The following named sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, respectively, for the purposes named, are appropriated from the Southern Illinois University Income Fund to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University:

Section 4. The appropriations herein made are subject to the provisions of "An Act in relation to State Finance," approved June 10, 1919, as amended.

INTRODUCTION

During the first year (1957-1958) of the present biennium, approximately fifty percent of the amount appropriated by the 70th General Assembly to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of the University was allocated. It should be noted that \$722,500 was allocated from the 1957-1958 internal budget for major repairs; however, because of pressing needs for personal services and other types of monies, it was necessary to curtail expenditures by more than \$200,000. To make up for this curtailment and to take care of other essential repairs and constructions, it has become necessary to place almost \$300,000 for major repairs in the budget for the 1958-1959 fiscal year.

With continuing large enrollment increases almost a certainty for the 1958-1959 school year, the fifty percent remaining has proved to be inadequate. Actually, the recommendations which follow will not thoroughly provide for the approximately 1680 additional students expected in the fall of 1958, or for all the students expected in the summer session of 1959. The history of the past two bienniums, when enrollments increased very rapidly, is being repeated; and it now appears that the budget here proposed will fall short of providing a safe minimum for 1958-1959 educational operations.

ESTIMATED ENROLLMENTS

The estimates of income for 1958-1959 are in part based upon estimates of enrollment. The following summary statement shows estimated enrollments for Southern Illinois University. The figures are cumulative for the four quarters of the academic year:

There are several types of on-campus degree students, not all of them producing cash income. Each non-veteran produces \$35 per twelve-weeks term. Students on state scholarships and faculty members taking university courses produce no cash income for educational operations. Veterans of the Korean War do not take the place of World War II veterans as a source of income, since under Public Law 550 they at most pay the same tuition as non-veterans.

PERSONAL SERVICES—FACULTY, ADMINISTRATIVE, AND NON-ACADEMIC

1. It was possible the first year (1957-1958) of this biennium to grant substantial increases for members of the faculty and administrative staffs. For the second year of the biennium more increases were granted than is ordinarily true.

These selective increases have been made to hold valuable persons in the face of competition for their services, to adjust salaries where new responsibilities have been assigned, and to correct a small number of inequities that have become apparent since last year. These individual increases are small for the most part, serving as an indication of intent rather than completely rectifying the situation. No changes have been proposed in the salary ranges for each rank, as set forth in last year's internal budget.

It was hoped that salary increases made at the beginning of the biennium would bring the members of Southern Illinois University's staff closer to performing comparable work at other universities in the state. The gap is now as wide as it was before, with the result that in the competitive market for highly qualified teachers, Southern Illinois University is scarcely holding its own.

If Southern Illinois University is to handle its own enrollments and to maintain the quality of its instruction, it must hold all competent staff members and add others of similar or greater competence. Its salaries must keep pace with the market levels. Since it cannot keep up with salaries with the funds provided in the present budget, a primary consideration for future bienniums must be the raising of general salary levels.

2. It has seemed necessary to include in this budget a few highly selective increases for low-salaried office workers and other civil service workers blanketed into prevailing rate pay groups. The new salaries are consonant with ranges established by the University Civil Service System, but are in many instances below the prevailing rates for the area.

3. An additional increase in personal service monies has gone into extending positions added recently to meet emergency conditions brought about through unanticipated enrollment pressures; to replacing temporary people acquired on an emergency basis with qualified personnel; to extending minimal salary increases made during 1957-1958 to certain civil service employees; to adding personnel to activate new departments; and to adding positions to those departments and offices hardest hit by heavy enrollments.

4. Salary rates for persons on leave without pay are shown in parentheses, since they do not affect actual expenditures.

PERSONAL SERVICES—STUDENT

1. A total of \$863,630 has been provided for student help as compared to \$838,630 last year. As is true in other categories, the \$25,000 added will barely meet the needs of a growing institution. It is planned in the future to use more, rather than less, student help in the various offices, in laboratories, and in the physical plant. Excellent students with financial need, providing they have the necessary skills or abilities as shown from testing programs, are given the first opportunity in finding campus jobs.

2. Pre-service training programs have been developed for office workers, food service workers, photographic workers, and workers in parts of the library. In-service training programs are provided for many of the different kinds of workers in the physical plant.

3. Great care is being exercised in coordinating the class and work programs of students. Whenever possible, a student is placed in work parallel with his major or minor study areas.

TRAVEL

1. In order to provide equitable distribution and more effective control of travel funds, the allotments for travel are made in four categories as follows:

a. Institutional travel, which involves travel on University business not identified with a specific department or office.

b. Convention travel, which involves travel to conferences, conventions, and professional meetings. This has been allocated on a pro-rata basis to the major functions of the University, and will be distributed from the offices of the vice presidents, the deans of major educational units, the director of the Office of Student Affairs, and the director of the Area Services office.

c. Departmental travel, which involves travel that departments and offices must do in order to perform their regular functions.

d. Air travel, which involves travel where additional convenience and speed serve the best interests of the University.

2. Travel allotments to the various accounts will be used in part for travel in University-owned passenger automobiles. Since the operating cost of these automobiles is chargeable against state appropriations other than travel and such costs are passed on to departments and offices using such service, the allotments for travel exceed the state appropriations for travel.

EQUIPMENT

1. With the purchase of an increasing number of books, the proportionate amount of equipment money necessary to purchase small equipment, under \$75 per item, has increased. Including the amount assigned to the library for the purchase of books, about thirty-five percent of the equipment money has been distributed to the departments and offices for the purchase of small equipment.

2. Approximately sixty-five percent of the equipment money will be placed in a general account to be allotted periodically as studies of needs determine. These studies should show whether or not there are any items of equipment needed for general University use that have not been purchased by the departments and whether or not certain departments have special needs which have not been met by the appropriations hitherto made to them.

OTHER CURRENT EXPENSES

1. Inasmuch as travel and equipment have been allotted separately in this budget, Other Current Expenses include contractual services, commodities, stationery-printing-

office supplies, employer contributions to the University Retirement System, refunds, and awards and grants for scholarships.

2. The film rental service of the Audio-Visual Education department will charge other departments for the use of instructional films. On the basis of experience, allocations have therefore been allotted to the departments to be used for this specific purpose.

3. The problem of providing for the on-campus expenses of interviewees, consultants, and other official visitors to the campus has been met by allotting limited funds for this purpose to the offices that handle convention travel.

GENERAL COMMENTS

1. In general the on-campus programs have been given operational funds which are comparable to those for the 1957-1958 fiscal year. This obviously does not allow for growth caused by the increasing number of students or for the expenditures necessary as the functions of departments are increased.

2. Equipment needs are such that \$1,000,000 more than has been appropriated could be spent wisely and constructively during the 1958-1959 year; however, with the increased equipment allocations, we are in better condition than during the previous biennium.

3. To maintain the same departmental level of operation as was true for the 1957-1958 year, about \$100,000 more than the amount allocated is needed for other current expense items. Actually, other current expense monies were in short supply for operational purposes during the 1957-1958 year.

4. Because of rapidly growing departments and new departments, additional student help funds could be used effectively in many departments.

5. The increasing number of students without the proportionate addition of staff members will aggravate the overloaded conditions which are already present in many departments.
