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MINUTES OF MEETINGS





AUGUST 7, 1958

THE AUGUST MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the

Board on Thursday, August 7, 1958, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, Vernon L. Nickell.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Instructor in Information Service Edmund C. Hasse, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on June 24, 1958, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article IV, Section 14, A, n.; Part III, Article IV, Section 14, D; Part III, Article V, Section 7, C, 5; and Part III, Article VI, Section 3, was mailed to each member of the Board of Trustees on July 14, 1958. On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted unanimously amendments to the sections designated, to read as follows:

In Part III, Article IV, Section 14, A, n., concerning the duties of the Registrar, a sentence added to read:

"n. Subject to the direction of the Chief Officer of Instruction, compiling and editing the general catalog of the University, and checking the University catalog and other official announcements of the University to insure that no course is included in the text for which the approval of the appropriate University authority has not been given and that no rule or regulation is included which has not been authorized by Board legislation or by the Rules of the University Faculty. The Registrar or his delegated representative shall also have general editorial supervision over all bulletins, leaflets, and brochures issued by the various agencies and departments of the University to inform prospective students and others concerning any aspects of its educational program."

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, D shall become:

"D. The Southern Illinois University Press.

1. The Southern Illinois University Press shall be organized as an administrative unit and shall be headed by a Director appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President upon nomination by the Chief Officer of Instruction. The Director shall be immediately responsible for the administration of the Southern Illinois University Press and shall report administratively to the Chief Officer of Instruction, except that in all matters concerning copy-

rights and contracts he shall obtain the advice of the Legal Counsel.

2. The Southern Illinois University Press shall edit, design, and see through publication all scholarly books and monographs accepted by it for publication. In determining what scholarly items are to be published, it shall seek advice not only from professional readers but also from ad hoc groups of University faculty members nominated by the Director to the Chief Officer of Instruction for the purpose of considering specific items. Only items recommended through this procedure shall be published, but the Director shall not be bound by such recommendations and shall attach his own opinion of the value of a proposed item to the University's program of scholarly publication.

3. The University Press shall serve the educational units of the University and may serve any other agencies of the University requiring editorial assistance

for their occasional publications."

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, D shall become Section 14, E, with no changes.

Part III, Article IV, Section 14, E shall become Section 14, F, with no changes.

Part III, Article V, Section 7, C, 5, concerning the duties of the Director of

Auxiliary and Service Enterprises, revised to read:

"5. Business operation and technical management of the Printing Service, in cooperation with a Publications Board consisting of himself, the Registrar, the head of the University Information Service, and the head of the Student Activities Office (or their delegated representatives)."

In Part III, Article VI, Section 3, a substitution of the following for A, B, C, and D:

"Section 3. The University Communications Service.

A. The University Communications Service, which shall be an agency of the

Area Services Office, shall include the Information Service and the Broadcasting Service. The Director of the Area Services Division shall coordinate the work of these services and, in addition, conduct such studies in the problems of modern communication as may advance practice in this field. He shall be responsible for initiating and editing promotional films concerning the University. B. The Information Service, as part of the Communications Service, shall be responsible for centralizing news reporting on the campus and for issuing news releases pertaining to the University. It shall develop promotional pamphlets and announcements concerning the University. It shall also operate a general photographic service and maintain files of photographs, films, and cuts of University scenes, personnel, and activities.

C. The Broadcasting Service, as part of the Communications Service, shall be responsible for scheduling all radio and television programs and for performing and operating radio and television services sponsored by the University other than instruction and research in radio and television."

Final approval of the Annual Internal Budget for 1958-1959, which was submitted and tentatively approved at the meeting of the Board held on June 24, 1958, was requested.

After discussion, Mrs. Stella Collins moved final approval of the Annual Internal Budget for 1958-1959, as presented. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) RECOMMENDED INTERPRETATION OF SCHOLARSHIPS

Under present Board authorization, 350 tuition scholarships for the Carbondale campus, and a proportionate number for the Southwestern Illinois Residence Centers, are awarded to worthy students each quarter. These scholarships have been interpreted as being available only during the regular academic year, that is, the fall, winter, and spring quarters.

With the ever increasing emphasis which we are placing upon full utilization of the physical facilities of our campus, and the increased summer session enrollments, authorization is requested to permit the award of these tuition scholarships during the summer session as well as during the regular academic year.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved this recommendation. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

$\left(J \right)$ approval of application for construction permit for educational television

In 1951, a thorough study of the potential of television as an educational medium was conducted by the University. This study convinced the University that, in spite of the comparatively high cost, a television station which would provide service for a major portion of the 31 southern counties of Illinois would greatly aid and implement the University's educational and Area Services programs. As a result, the Board of Trustees authorized the application for an educational channel assignment at its meeting on December 18, 1951. The University then requested that the Federal Communications Commission allocate VHF television channel 10 to Carbondale for educational purposes.

The Commission in 1952 allocated UHF television channel 61 to Carbondale for educational purposes. Since the coverage of a UHF station is comparatively small, it was deemed unwise to make application for a UHF station.

Through continuing efforts of the University, the Federal Communications Commission in March, 1958, allocated VHF television channel 8 to Carbondale for educational purposes. Although channel 8 was assigned to Carbondale, the transmitter, according to FCC regulations, must be located some 20 miles

northeast of Carbondale. Under this plan, the transmitter could most feasibly be located at, or near, Sesser, Illinois. Transmitting from this point, with the maximum power permitted at this location by the FCC, the University could

reach a major portion of its 31-county service area by television.

Within thirty days after the educational allocation was made, Television Station WREC-TV, Memphis, Tennessee, filed with the FCC an objection to this allocation plan, and suggested that channel 3 be allocated to Carbondale for educational purposes. The channel 3 transmitter, according to FCC regulations, would have to be located south or southeast of Carbondale, and would not provide coverage of southern Illinois. The channel 8 allocation adequately provides the educational service needs of the University.

The University filed a reply to this objection and proposal of WREC-TV. The FCC has not yet handed down a decision on this matter. However, in order to insure that the channel 8 be maintained at Carbondale for educational purposes, it is imperative that this University file a construction permit application at the earliest possible moment in order to assure the FCC that the University is sincere in its intentions to operate a station on that channel.

Several problems must be resolved before this construction permit application can be filed with the FCC:

- 1. The University must secure a plot of land of at least 36 acres near Sesser, Illinois. On this land the transmitter building and proposed 800-foot tower would be placed. The exact location of this plot must be determined before the engineer, who will make up the engineering specifications for inclusion as a necessary part of the application, can start his work. The University has already made a preliminary survey of possible suitable locations in the Sesser area.
- 2. Sources of funds for the construction and operation of the station must be considered. The University Broadcasting Service has made the following estimates of costs for construction:

Studio equipment and facilities are included as a part of the proposed communications building.

One source of funds may possibly be soon available through the bill now before the Congress of the U.S., which would provide up to one million dollars for each state for the equipping of educational television operations. If this bill does pass, which seems entirely probable, Southern Illinois University should be able to secure approximately \$250,000.00 to assist in its installation of such a station.

Another possible source of funds would be foundations interested in educational television, e.g., Fund for Adult Education. However, in order successfully to approach one of these organizations, the University would have to provide evidence that it already had funds to place the station into operation.

The most obvious source of funds would be an appropriation by the Legislature. At this time this source of funds could not be defined in that application as an absolute certainty. However, we are advised that a satisfactory arrangement could be worked out with a statement in the application that the University would seek funds from the Legislature for construction of the station.

Approval of and authorization by the Board is requested to file with the Federal Communications Commission an application for a construction permit for a television station on channel 8.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved filing an application for a construction permit for educational television, as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

(K) AUTHORIZATION FOR APPLICATION FOR HOUSING LOAN

The following resolution, not submitted in advance of the meeting, was presented and accepted by the Board for consideration:

WHEREAS, From time to time the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has authorized and directed the administration of the University to plan and establish an over-all housing program for Southern Illinois University; and

WHEREAS, Preliminary planning and programming for various types of housing have been accomplished; and

WHEREAS, It is recognized that the tremendous increases in enrollment which the University has experienced in the past few years will continue in the future; and

WHEREAS, After investigation and study it is deemed advisable to plan, program, and construct the following housing units:

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the administration of the University be and is hereby authorized to make application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the Federal Government for a loan of \$7,934,000 to finance one-half the cost of construction of the aforesaid housing units.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted the above resolution. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris reported on the progress being made in obtaining options for land and funds for the establishment of the Southwestern Illinois Residence Center. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, the Board endorsed unanimously the following statement concerning site selection:

Southern Illinois University appreciates the expression of interest on the part of East St. Louis leaders in the matter of a site for this area.

More than six months ago the University informed interested citizens of the Southwestern Illinois Council for Higher Education that it would secure the best outside consultants available for the selection of the site that would most adequately serve the needs of the major University development in the Madison-St. Clair County area.

It was at this time that these groups, including representatives from the East St. Louis area, agreed that this procedure for selecting a site was in the best interests of the area as a whole. We believe that departing from this procedure would violate our previous understanding, and lose the value of a system which assures us of the best possible chance to select a site which will best serve the entire Madison-St. Clair County area.

The University considers it a tribute that communities in the area are asking for the establishment of additional university facilities and that citizens' groups are planning to seek funds to purchase the site selected and present it to the University. The University is committed to the continued development of higher education in this area. The facilities of the University's Residence Center in East St. Louis this coming fall will be almost double those of last year and we are looking forward to its continued development.

President Morris advised the Board that the City of Carbondale had made inquiries regarding the possibility of annexing the University grounds into the city limits of the City of Carbondale. The Board instructed the administration to study the advantages and disadvantages which might result and report back at a later meeting.

By common consent, on the request of President Morris, the Board agreed to change the title given the Life Science Auditorium to "George French Auditorium."

The Board engaged in discussion of the format of operation for the Madison-St. Clair counties program and requested the administration to study and recommend revisions of the Statutes for the establishment of the program in a manner better suited for its actual operation within the University structure.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M.



SEPTEMBER 20, 1958

THE SEPTEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Saturday, September 20, 1958, beginning at 2 P.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Vernon L. Nickell. Mr. Oehmke was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on August 7, 1958, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) APPROVAL OF DOCTORAL PROGRAMS IN SECONDARY EDUCATION, SPEECH, AND ZOOLOGY

At the November 3, 1955, meeting the Board of Trustees amended the *Bylaws and Statutes* of the University to permit the awarding of the Doctor of Philosophy degree. It was indicated that the various departments would be thoroughly studied, and that only when there was adequate evidence of their

readiness for developing programs at the doctoral level would they be recommended for approval.

Since that time, five departments, namely, Education, Government, Microbiology, Psychology, and Speech Pathology, have been approved for the doctoral program.

Effective with the fall quarter of 1959, we recommend that the departments of Secondary Education, Speech, and Zoology also be empowered to accept candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

Since the time when approval was given to the Department of Education to conduct doctoral work, that department has been divided into three departments, namely, Administration and Supervision, Elementary Education, and Secondary Education. Of these, Secondary Education now appears to be the most nearly ready to develop a doctoral program, and we have therefore recommended it at this time.

For Speech and Zoology we have invited to the campus the following consultants to advise us concerning the strength of the staff, the library holdings, the laboratory and other physical facilities, and the basic curricula of these departments: Speech—Kenneth G. Hance, Professor of Speech, Michigan State University, former Associate Dean of the School of Speech, Northwestern University; Zoology—Frank A. Brown, Jr., Morrison Professor of Biological Sciences, Northwestern University.

The recommendations of these consultants have been discussed by the Graduate Council, and the Dean of the Graduate School has in turn recommended approval of these departments.

In general, to strengthen our doctoral program, we need to have on our staff more professors who have had experience in supervising the work of doctoral candidates on other campuses. Each of the departments now being recommended has such persons on its staff, and during the year ahead the departments will be encouraged to replace persons on temporary appointments with additional staff members who have supervised doctoral candidates.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board authorized the departments of Secondary Education, Speech, and Zoology to accept candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree, effective the fall quarter of 1959.

(B) MODIFICATION OF FOREIGN STUDENT TUITION SCHOLARSHIPS

The Dean of the Graduate School and foreign student advisor, Dr. Willis G. Swartz, has recommended that the Board approve the granting of fractional tuition scholarships to foreign students from the number of foreign student scholarships which the Board had previously approved. Such a provision would enable the University to assist a larger number of foreign students without additional cost to the University.

Such a provision would also permit a greater flexibility in the foreign student program, since travel to this country from foreign countries does not always coincide with the academic year of the University.

Approval of this modification is requested.

On motion of Vernon L. Nickell, the Board unanimously approved the modification of foreign student tuition scholarships, as requested above.

(J) REPORT OF JUNE AND AUGUST, 1958, GRADUATES

Copies of the official corrected commencement programs, showing the names of students to whom degrees and certificates were awarded, have been placed on file with the Secretary of the Board and have been certified by the Registrar's Office. No action is required.

(K) CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS NEEDS

In view of the fact that our needs for capital improvements have been revised upwards since last presented to the Board of Trustees, because construction costs have increased and enrollments continue to expose our conservatism, these needs are presented for study and reaction.

A tentative total figure was presented to the Illinois Commission of Higher Education. A meeting with the Commission was requested following the last Board meeting and was granted September 4, 1958.

Professor Hand presented a revised report on capital improvements needs of the University. The report was substantially that which had been presented to the Illinois Commission of Higher Education. The report was based on an estimated enrollment of 15,000 students on the Carbondale campus and 12,000 students at the Madison–St. Clair campus. The total figure presented was \$193,998,256.00. Included within the report was a summary of capital improvements needs for the Carbondale campuses, for the Madison–St. Clair campus, and for student housing, together with detailed schedules of capital appropriation needs. A copy

(L) FACULTY-ADMINISTRATIVE PAYROLL—SUMMER, 1958

A report of the faculty-administrative payroll for the summer months of 1958 was submitted, and a copy was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved and ratified the summer payrolls as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

$\left(M\right)$ resolutions accepting bids for family housing and small dormitory housing developments

Six resolutions, not submitted in advance of the meeting, were presented with a recommendation of adoption by the Board of Trustees. Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman explained that the resolutions made tentative award of contracts to the low bidders on Small Dormitory and Family Housing Developments, subject to approval of a loan of \$3,000,000.00 by the Housing and Home Finance Agency. He stated that the bids were within the estimates made by the University Architect.

Mr. Rendleman also presented to the Board the problem of Morrow and Company of Paducah, Kentucky, the low bidder on the combined plumbing and heating work for the Family Housing Development, who had requested that their bid be withdrawn on the basis of a mistake. It was the consensus of the Board that the bidder should not be allowed to withdraw his bid if it were legally possible to hold him to it.

By separate motions on each of the following specific contracts, the Board unanimously adopted resolutions awarding such contracts to the successful bidders:

(N) USE OF UNIVERSITY SEAL

From time to time the occasion arises when agencies and departments within the University wish to use the University seal on commercial items. The University Bookstore has stocked a number of items for students, including, among other things, ashtrays, cigarette boxes, and glasses, which incorporate the University seal. The University Alumni Association has now arranged with Brown and Bigelow Advertising Company to use the seal on playing cards. The cards are to be part of a promotional campaign with the alumni.

The Board of Trustees should approve such uses, and, accordingly, it is requested that the Board delegate to the President the authority for approving or disapproving requests for the use of the seal. Most schools permit their seals to be used in this form, and it is believed that as long as the use of the seal is limited to those agencies which are connected with the University, the results will be beneficial.

Approval for this authority is requested.

Mrs. Stella Collins stated that she believed the use of the University seal was a policy matter and should be given further consideration. She stated that the use of the University seal on some items of merchandise could be objectionable.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, the Board delegated to the President the authority requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Lockard; nay, Mr. Sturgis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Nickell. The Chariman declared the motion carried.

(O) CHANGE OF DEPARTMENT OF APPLIED SCIENCE TO SCHOOL OF APPLIED SCIENCE

At the April 28, 1955, meeting of the Board of Trustees a proposal for the reorganization of departments from the College of Vocations and Professions was presented and approved. The results of this proposal were to establish a School of Communications, a School of Fine Arts, a School of Rural Studies (later Agriculture), and a School of Business. This reorganization left no place for our curricula in Industrial Education and Applied Science, which since that time have been carried on in floating departments.

In spite of the fact that these departments have been unattached, they have

developed with remarkable speed in regard to their offerings, their staffs, their physical facilities, and the number of students enrolled in them. In the fall of 1957, for example, there were 131 new students admitted to these departments as compared to 26 in the School of Home Economics, 34 in the School of Fine Arts, 26 in the School of Communications, and 58 in the School of Agriculture. For the forthcoming year, as of September 5, there were already 121 new Applied Science majors alone, as compared to 51 in the School of Home Economics, 50 in the School of Fine Arts, 51 in the School of Communications, and 159 in the School of Agriculture. It is therefore apparent that on the basis of enrollments also the Department of Applied Science justifies the status of a school.

It is therefore recommended that a School of Applied Science be established, effective July 1, 1959, with objectives as follows:

School of Applied Science

The purpose of the School of Applied Science is to serve as the instrument of the University for providing instruction, demonstration, research, and consultation in mechanical, electrical, civil, industrial, and general engineering, and in engineering physics. In co-operation with the Graduate School, the School of Applied Science will conduct research in the appropriate fields. It will offer work for pre-engineering students and also courses leading to the degree Bachelor of Science (in Applied Science).

During the year ahead, we propose to search for an outstanding physical scientist, preferably one with considerable technological experience, to head

this new school.

In universities with fully developed schools of engineering, Industrial Education is ordinarily a teacher training department in the College of Education. We shall shortly bring in a recommendation as to whether Industrial Education should be attached to the School of Applied Science or to the College of Education.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the establishment of a School of Applied Science, effective July 1, 1959. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Nickell, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

Chairman Wham discussed the September 4 and 5, 1958, meeting of the Illinois Commission of Higher Education and the acceptance or adoption of its engineering education sub-committee report in letter form, directed to Governor Stratton and including a recommendation against removal of the Southern Illinois University engineering degree restriction. He stated that the sub-committee had failed to make its report and the volume of supporting material available to the Commission members and delegates prior to the brief discussion and official action of September 4, and that such action was taken notwithstanding

his protest and request that it be withheld until the report had been made so available for reasonable study and considered action.

The sub-committee report and the volume of material offered to support it were discussed in detail by President Morris, Professor Tenney, and the individual members of the Board. It was observed, among other things, that the report failed to recognize the true question as submitted by Governor Stratton; concludes without any basis, stated or otherwise, that Southern Illinois University must have legislative restrictions in the granting of degrees unless and until made subject to some other or different board of control; is inadequate, uncertain and in fact confusing; and is unsound for many other reasons including misstatements, suppressions, and omissions of material fact—all of which could have been and would be demonstrated by and on behalf of the University and the people of Southern Illinois if afforded an opportunity to do so.

Following such discussion, upon motion of Mr. Fischer, seconded by Mr. Sturgis and unanimously carried, Secretary Lockard was authorized and directed to formally request that the Illinois Commission of Higher Education withdraw its letter report directed to Governor Stratton under date of September 4, 1958, and open the entire matter for further and adequate consideration, including a public hearing in Southern Illinois, and that such request be made by letter directed to Commission Chair-

man Lohr, as follows:

DEAR MAJOR LOHR:

The Southern Illinois University Board of Trustees, by formal action at a regular meeting held September 20, 1958, has directed that I officially request withdrawal of the Commission's letter and report addressed and delivered to the Honorable William G. Stratton, Governor of the State of Illinois, on September 4, 1958, and reconsideration of its negative action concerning the restriction on offering engineering degrees at Southern Illinois University.

Following are the primary reasons for the Board's request:

1. The Board of Trustees questions both the propriety and the legality of the Commission's action. Specifically, it notes that the rights of the Board's delegate, Mr. John Page Wham, to have time to study the report and the recommendations of the Commission and to discuss and debate them before they were sent to Governor Stratton, were violated. This violation is contrary, not only to the law, but also to the Commission's usual procedure in handling reports from its subcommittees. If adequate opportunity for review had been provided to Mr. Wham, certain errors of

fact, suppressions, and inadequacies in the report of the Commission could have been pointed out and eliminated before a determination was made.

2. In its letter to Governor Stratton, the Illinois Commission of Higher Education has, no doubt inadvertently, impugned the judgment of the members of Southern Illinois University's Board of Trustees and hence of Governor Stratton, who appointed them. In its statements on restrictive legislation, the subcommittee on Engineering Education indicated that it believes that the program of Southern Illinois University requires other controls than those supplied by Southern Illinois University's Board of Trustees. This is clearly discriminatory, since the Commission has not advocated legislative restrictions for the programs of certain institutions under other boards of control, one of which consistently approves much more expensive and expansive programs than any approved by Southern Illinois University's Board of Trustees.

The sweeping implications of the subcommittee's report, as incorporated in the letter to the Governor and approved by the Commission, go far beyond the scope of the specific study requested by the Governor and reflect unfavorably upon the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. The Commission should with-

draw these implications or substantiate them.

We believe that the Commission owes to the people of Southern Illinois (and to the rest of the state as well), a specific statement as to precisely what faults it sees in the controls hitherto exercised by Southern Illinois University's Board of Trustees. No evidence has been adduced to show that the program of Southern Illinois University is inconsistent either qualitatively or quantitatively with the needs of its rapidly growing student body and with the needs of the area the University serves. An imputation of the type made in the Commission's letter to Governor Stratton should not be made lightly and should have been thoroughly investigated at first hand before being published.

3. The Illinois Commission of Higher Education as a whole has not held any meetings in Southern Illinois or directly examined the program of Southern Illinois University. Its judgments to date about the University have apparently been made on the basis of materials and impressions gathered from representatives of the Commission and its staff whose objectivity with regard to the various educational institutions of the state has, to say the least, not been demonstrated. Unless and until the Commission makes itself accessible to the people of Southern Illinois and directly acquaints itself with their needs and interests, the conviction will remain that its members have been misled and have acted on incomplete or slanted information. Mere quantity of data, collected and interpreted at a distance, is not enough, and in fact may appear to be window-dressing.

In fairness to the citizens of the whole Southern third of Illinois, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University formally requests a re-hearing of these matters. Specifically it requests an opportunity for a preliminary public meeting with the Commission on the campus of Southern Illinois University in order to enlarge upon the above points and to obtain a first-hand understanding of the Com-

mission's thinking, which it has hitherto had only from newspaper reports.

WHEREAS, Many campuses are already severely handicapped by lack of proper physical facilities; and

WHEREAS, Approval of the State Bond Issue will enable the State of Illinois to provide funds in the immediate future for the construction of critically needed buildings at the state universities, as well as at the state hospitals; and

Whereas, The rising costs of construction in the future will in all likelihood more than offset any interest charges on bonds,

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular meeting assembled that Southern Illinois University endorses the proposed bond issue authorized by the General Assembly of Illinois for referendum at the general election on November 4, 1958.

(I) INSTITUTIONAL COOPERATION

For some time the presidents of the various institutions have been discussing a memorandum of understanding, with a view to facilitating institutional co-operation and to reducing the amount of public opposition by certain institutions to the programs of certain other institutions.

President Robert G. Bone of Illinois State Normal University, at the request of the Joint Council on Higher Education, has been working with the various presidents to create such a memorandum of understanding. Following is the result of his efforts:

Memorandum of Understanding Among the Presidents of the State-Supported Institutions of Higher Learning in Illinois

The presidents, through the Joint Council on Higher Education of the six state-supported institutions of higher learning in Illinois, affirm their full inten-

tion to keep each other informed of plans for new programs, such as the establishment of a new department, college or school, the inauguration of a new service, the opening of a branch; or changes in, or enlargements of, existing programs at any one of the universities that might affect any of the other universities; and to provide opportunity for timely mutual discussion of such matters. The purpose of these discussions shall be to attempt to arrive at the best application of the resources which may become available to any of the universities toward providing the most sound educational programs and service possible in the state.

More specifically, it is understood between said presidents that proposals for new legislation enlarging the scope of the authority of any of the universities or requests for appropriations for new programs at any of them shall be submitted to the others prior to the actual making of the requests. This will be done in order to have a discussion toward the end of attempting to reach a consensus as to whether such enlargements are in the public interest. It is also understood that such discussions are desirable in the interest of avoiding, in every instance reasonably possible and consistent with the important interests of each university, the necessity of public opposition on the part of any one of them to proposals of the others.

It is further understood that, failing to reach such a concurrence or consensus, each president will give the others due notice in the early states of formulation of the position to be taken by his university with regard to such proposals, together with a statement of his reasons therefor. Furthermore, any reactions of the other institutions will be immediately conveyed to the governing boards.

It is further understood that the several universities will remain alert to, and shall seek out, appropriate and practicable opportunities for cooperative programs to be operated by any two or more of them jointly. (October 10, 1958).

It is my recommendation that the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University endorse this memorandum of understanding.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board unanimously approved the above statement.

(J) ACCEPTANCE OF FUNDS FOR LAND ACQUISITION IN MADISON—ST. CLAIR COUNTIES AREA

Funds have been and will continue to be collected for the acquisition of a permanent site for the Madison-St. Clair counties campus of Southern Illinois University.

Whereas, On his motion the new library building on the campus of Southern Illinois University was named *Morris Library* in action taken by the Board of Trustees in regular meeting June 24, 1958; and

Whereas, He has generously given to the University a collection of over three hundred volumes from his personal library; and

Whereas, These volumes include many valuable additions to the collections in Morris Library; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, assembled in regular session, that its appreciation for this gift be expressed to Mr. Lockard. Be it further

Resolved, That this resolution be made a part of the permanent records of this Board, and that a copy be forwarded to Morris Library.

NOVEMBER 25, 1958

THE NOVEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Tuesday, November 25, 1958, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Mrs. Stella Collins, Kenneth L. Davis, Martin F. Oehmke. Mr. Fischer and Mr. Nickell were absent.

Rendleman, Budget Officer Clarence W. Stephens, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees

A resolution entitled "Resolution Approving and Providing for the Execution of a Loan Agreement, and Numbered Contract No. H(402)-153, By and Between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America" was introduced by the Legal Counsel, John S. Rendleman:

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, as follows:

Section 1. The pending Loan Agreement and numbered Contract No. H(402)-153, and relating to the erection on the campus of Southern Illinois University, an educational institution of higher learning located in Carbondale, Illinois, nine (9) dormitory buildings and eight (8) apartment buildings for 128 families by and between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America, is hereby in all respects approved.

SECTION 2. The Chairman, John Page Wham, is hereby authorized and

directed to execute the said Loan Agreement in three counterparts on behalf of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, and the Secretary, Melvin Lockard, is hereby authorized and directed to impress and attest the official seal of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, on each such counterpart and to forward two such counterparts to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, together with such other documents relative to the approval and execution of such counterparts and to this Resolution as may be required by the Government.

Said resolution and the proposed Loan Agreement described therein were then read in full and discussed and considered.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted the above resolution as introduced and read. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Oehmke; nay, none. A copy of the Loan Agreement was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board selected Chapman and Cutler of Chicago, Illinois, as Bond Counsel. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr.

Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Oehmke; nay, none.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board selected the Northern Trust Company of Chicago, Illinois, as Paying Agent, with Northern Trust Company's correspondent bank in the City of New York to serve as Alternate Paying Agent. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Oehmke; nay, none.

On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board named the First National Bank and the Carbondale National Bank, both of Carbondale, Illinois, as depositories for construction funds, if satisfactory to the Housing and Home Finance Agency. It was further moved that, should this arrangement be unsatisfactory to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, the selection of a depository or depositories be remanded to the Board of Trustees' Banking Committee, composed of Mr. Lindell W. The Board next considered the following section presented by the administration:

UNIVERSITY TRAILER PARK MONTHLY RENTAL

The new University Trailer Park will be completed by the middle of November, 1958. A survey of charges made by trailer parks in and near Carbondale has been made in order to arrive at a proper monthly rental charge. This survey revealed that three of the parks charge \$20.00 per month, one \$16.00 and one \$15.00 plus electricity.

We recommend a monthly rental charge of \$19.00, plus electricity and metered washing facilities. This charge seems justified by the fact that the University Trailer Park will be a more desirable place to live than the local trailer parks, and will be attractively maintained.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved unanimously the monthly rental recommended.

The Board next considered the detailed analyses of budget requests for educational operations and for buildings and other capital improvements for the 1959-1961 biennium.

President Morris stated that Mr. Clarence W. Stephens, Budget Officer, had been asked to meet with the Board and go over the budget requests with them. At President Morris' request, Mr. Stephens then presented a detailed explanation of the budget request for educational operations, with frequent references to supplementary materials in explanation of increases requested.

Copies of "Analysis of Budget Request for Operation for the Biennium Beginning July 1, 1959," and supporting material entitled "Explanation of Source of Derivation of Increases Requested for the 1959-1961 Biennium," both of which were presented to the members of the Board, were placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

Matters Presented by President Morris

(A) REPORTING OF TEMPORARY APPOINTMENTS RETROACTIVELY

Because of the large number of persons authorized for temporary or part-time appointments during recent years and because of the fact that there is a large turnover in this group, reporting them in advance to the Board of Trustees has occupied a larger and larger part of our section on Changes in Faculty-Administrative Payroll. Furthermore, some of these individuals do not serve even after being approved for appointment so that the appearance of their names in the Procedures of the Board of Trustees may give the erroneous impression that they have actually served on the staff of the University.

These appointments are all covered by blanket amounts approved in the annual internal budget. Approval is therefore requested for reporting their actual services retroactively following the end of each fiscal year. 
REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

JANUARY 27, 1959

THE JANUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the

Board on Tuesday, January 27, 1959, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Mrs. Stella Collins, Kenneth L. Davis, Martin F. Oehmke, Harold R. Fischer, George T. Wilkins. Mr. Sturgis was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Assistant to the Presidnt Edward V. Miles, Jr., Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for The Southern Illinoisan, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of meetings held on November 25, 1958, and December 10, 1958, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were

approved as presented.

By secret ballot, in accordance with Part II, Article II, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as officers until their successors are elected and qualified: John Page Wham, Chairman; Lindell W. Sturgis, Vice-Chairman; Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary.

In accordance with Part II, Article III, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, the following members of the Board were elected to serve as members of the Executive Committee: Harold R. Fischer and Martin F. Oehmke. As stated in the By-Laws, the third member of the Executive Committee shall be the Chairman of the Board.

The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for considering the bids received for the purchase of \$2,300,000 Student Center Bonds, Series B of 1958 of Southern Illinois University, pursuant to a Notice of Sale published in *The Bond Buyer* on January 9, 1959. The Secretary presented publisher's affidavit of publication of said Notice of Sale, and on motion of Kenneth L. Davis the Board ratified, approved, and confirmed said Notice of Sale. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Davis; nay, none.

Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, stated that the only bid received for the purchase of said \$2,300,000 Student Center Bonds, Series B of 1958, of Southern Illinois University, was from the United States of America, acting by and through the Housing and Home Finance Agency, in accordance with the terms and conditions of that certain Loan Agreement by and between the United States of America and this Board of Trustees, dated December 1, 1958. Melvin C. Lockard moved that the Board accept this bid. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer and was carried by the following vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Davis; nay, none.

The Secretary then read to the Board the Loan Agreement dated as of December 1, 1958, by and between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the State of Illinois, covering the purchase by the State of Illinois of \$2,300,000 Student Center Bonds, Series A of 1958, of Southern Illinois University, all in accordance with the terms and provisions of the said Loan Agreement dated as of December 1, 1958, by and between said Board of Trustees and the United States of America, in reference to Project No. Ill. 11-CH-76(S). Kenneth L. Davis moved that the execution and delivery of said Loan Agreement dated as of December 1, 1958, by and between said Board of Trustees and the State of Illinois be ratified, approved, and confirmed. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution as read. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr.

Wilkins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Davis; nay, none. A copy of this resolution

was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

The Secretary then presented and read a resolution establishing charges for the use of and for the service supplied by the new Student Union Building on the campus of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution as read. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Davis; nay, none. A copy of the resolution was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

The Secretary then presented and read a resolution providing for the filing of a bond by the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board adopted the resolution as read. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Davis; nay, none. A copy of said resolution

was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for considering bids for the purchase of \$3,000,000 Dormitory and Student Apartment Revenue Bonds of 1958 of Southern Illinois University, pursuant to a Notice of Sale published in *The Bond Buyer* on January 9, 1958. The Secretary then presented and read to the Board a resolution providing for the filing of a bond by the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board adopted the resolution as read. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Davis; nay, none.

The Secretary then presented and read to the Board a resolution establishing parietal rules and regulations in reference to Housing and Home Finance Agency Project No. Ill. 11-CH-54(D). On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution as read. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Davis; nay, none.

Copies of each of the above resolutions were placed on file with the

Secretary of the Board.

President Morris explained to the Board that at a planning session held at Allerton Park on November 14, 1958, a system for carrying out certain studies for the Illinois Commission of Higher Education was worked out. After a certain amount of discussion of procedures, Southern Illinois University had agreed to participate in this arrangement. Under this agreement the Board of Trustees was entitled to two representatives on a liaison group composed of members of the governing boards of the six state universities, the public junior colleges, and the Chicago Public School system. He suggested that two members of the Board be named to the liaison group.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, the Chairman was authorized to appoint two members of the Board to serve with the liaison group. This motion was seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins and was carried by unanimous vote. Mr. Wham thereupon appointed Mr. Harold R. Fischer and Mr. Kenneth L. Davis to serve as representatives of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University on the liaison group of Trustees for studies made by the Illinois Commission of Higher Education.

Copies of an editorial entitled "Hobbling Higher Education," which appeared in the *Belleville News-Democrat*, were presented by President Morris for the information of the Board.

President Morris requested the opinions of members of the Board concerning the value of periodic reports covering broad aspects of Uni-

versity operation. He explained that some of the reports would be explanatory, some objective, and some philosophical in nature. He indicated that the first such report would probably concern the drastic shortage of college and university teachers and what procedures might be developed in an attempt to increase the number of such teachers. Another contemplated report might concern research developments, emphasizing the kinds of research projects in progress, and the volume and spread of research over a ten-year period. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that such reports would be very desirable and helpful as a means of understanding the total University operation.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) APPROVAL OF GRADUATE OFFERINGS IN GEOLOGY

Upon recommendation of the Graduate Council and the Dean of the Graduate School, we are requesting approval of a graduate program in

Geology, leading to the master's degree, effective immediately.

In support of this recommendation, the Graduate School points out that four out of the five staff members of the department hold their doctor's degrees and have active records of publication; that space provided to the Geology Department in the new Agriculture Building made it possible for them adequately to carry on instruction and research; and that the collections of fossils, mineral and rock types, economic materials, and necessary equipment have now reached a point to support graduate work. Library holdings are more than adequate, and the Southern Illinois area is ideal for field research in many geological problems.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved unanimously a graduate program in Geology, leading to the master's degree, effective immediately.

(B) DEPARTMENTS OF SECONDARY AND HIGHER EDUCATION

Upon recommendation of the Dean of the College of Education, we propose that the present Department of Secondary Education be divided into two departments, to be called the Department of Secondary Education and the Department of Higher Education, respectively, effective July 1, 1959. Both departments will remain in the College of Education.

The function of the Department of Secondary Education is, strictly speaking, to provide professional training for students intending to teach in high schools. This department has also, however, been responsible for offering courses dealing with the preparation of teachers for colleges, universities, junior colleges, vocational-technical schools, and correspondence schools. With

the current shortage of qualified teachers for post high school programs, it seems desirable to give this type of training a fresh emphasis and to develop full curricula in higher education.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, the Board unanimously approved the division of the present Department of Secondary Education into two departments, to be called the Department of Secondary Education and the Department of Higher Education, effective July 1, 1959.

(J) DAIRY EXTENSION SPECIALIST

On December 30, 1958, Mr. Harold Williamson, Secretary of the Prairie Farms of Southern Illinois, wrote a letter to the deans of Agriculture at the University of Illinois and Southern Illinois University, indicating the concern of his organization about the continuing decline in milk production in the southernmost counties in Illinois. He stated that his Board of Directors had requested the assignment of an additional dairy extension specialist to Southern Illinois, preferably to be located at Southern Illinois University where he might work closely with its dairy specialists. Our School of Agriculture has endorsed this request, and we have learned that the College of Agriculture at the University of Illinois is now studying the matter.

We therefore request approval of the location at Southern Illinois University of a dairy extension specialist, subject to the working out of satisfactory arrangements with the University of Illinois. Presumably the State Extension Service of the University of Illinois would provide the personnel and Southern Illinois University would furnish the necessary facilities for carrying on this work.

(L) GAS LINE EASEMENT

The construction of the Family Housing Project on property south of the Dowdell Tract and east of the Illinois Central Railroad tracks necessitates the extension of a fuel gas line. The Illinois Electric and Gas Company has submitted, with amendments requested by the University, an easement to be approved by the Board of Trustees. Approval of the following resolution is requested.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is constructing a Family Housing Project on property adjacent to an extension of Wall Street south; and

Whereas, The said Family Housing Project is to be heated by fuel gas furnished by the Illinois Electric and Gas Company; and

Whereas, It is necessary for an easement to be granted to the said company for the purposes of construction, maintenance, and operation of a fuel gas line on property of the said Board of Trustees; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, that the *Private Property Right of Way Easement* attached hereto be approved; that the Chairman of the said Board of Trustees be and is authorized and directed to sign the said easement; and that the Secretary of the said Board of Trustees be and is authorized and directed to attest the said execution.

Private Property Right of Way Easement

In consideration of the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00), and for other good and valuable considerations, in hand paid, receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged,

The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a municipal corporation, hereby grants unto Illinois Electric & Gas Company, its successors, lessees, and assigns, the right and privilege to place in, upon, along, and across the property of the undersigned on the location hereinafter described, a fuel gas distribution pipeline and the necessary appurtenances and appliances (all hereinafter referred to as property of said Company), the same to be used by said Company for the transmission and distribution of fuel gas and such other purposes as said pipeline is or may be used, for so long a period of time as said Company shall have the use for said premises, the same to be used and maintained by said Company for such purposes only.

Said property of the Company shall be located on said premises as nearly

as possible as follows:

Beginning at Park Avenue and extending Southerly adjacent to South Wall Street to the located Family Housing Project to the West of South Wall Street a distance of approximately 4400 feet. Said pipeline to be located on private property as nearly as possible 40' West of the centerline of South Wall Street, but not less than 30' West of the centerline of South Wall Street, said centerline of South Wall Street is the section line between Jackson County Sections 27 and 28, all as shown by Plat attached and hereby made a part hereof,

with the right to said Company to so construct, maintain, and operate its said property that normal and necessary appurtenances may extend the necessary distances on either side of above locations.

And permission is further granted unto said Illinois Electric & Gas Company to enter upon the premises of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a municipal corporation, at all reasonable times for the purpose of maintaining, repairing, or replacing its said property, or for any other reasonable purpose connected with the use and operation thereof, provided, however, and the said Company, by its acceptance hereof, agrees to reimburse the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for any and all damage which it may do to any of the property of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in entering upon said premises for such purpose of repairing, replacement, or maintenance.

Said Illinois Electric & Gas Company, by its acceptance hereof, and by the exercise of the rights and privileges hereby granted, agrees that gas line construction is not to damage or interfere with trees now located in Trailer Court area, and that it will keep its said property in proper state of repair, that if it constructs overhead or underground structures, it will replace all earth or grass that may be removed by it, either in construction or repair of same, in as good

condition as the same was before being entered upon.

This agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto, their successors and assigns.

This instrument executed by the corporate officers of the Grantor pursuant to resolution duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of Grantor Corporation.

(M) PROPOSED SCHEDULE OF MEETINGS FOR 1959

(N) POLICY AND PROCEDURES RELATING TO CONTRACTS FOR RESIDENCE HALLS

As requested at the December 10, 1958, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the following information is presented regarding the policy and procedures relating to residence halls contracts:

1. A one page summary of our drop-out procedures

2. Copies of the contract rules and regulations as given to each student showing the policy for cancellation of and release from contracts

3. A one page summary of comparable procedures at certain other universities

4. A chart showing the gradual accumulation of vacancies in the total residence hall program.

Our procedures and policy are designed to make it possible for the individual student to solve his problems if it is necessary for him to drop out of the residence halls and/or drop out of the University. At the same time, we attempt to recover enough from the student who breaks his contract to deter a large scale breaking of contracts in order to protect the overall operation, both for the good of the students who live there and for the holders of the bonds on residence halls with bonded indebtedness.

When a student breaks a contract after the beginning of the school year and drops out of a residence hall, it is a net loss to the total residence halls program. Because of the shifting of students from one residence hall to another, particularly from the poorer residence halls to the better residence halls, we may not experience the vacancy in a particular unit from which the individual student has dropped out. In total, however, a residence hall has lost a net contract. In the final analysis, if vacancy loss should grow to any great extent, the only way to recover money for the operation is to increase the rates to students who do remain in the residence halls. We try to avoid this by a policy which will deter people moving out of the halls unless their reasons are sound.

Although students may petition if they have individual problems and hardships, we have experienced less than 2% vacancy loss in our permanent residence halls.

No action was taken on this information report. A copy of the materials listed was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

(O) ELECTRICAL LINE AGREEMENT

The following self-explanatory resolution providing for the connection of the Family Housing Project from the University's electrical sub-station is recommended for approval:

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has approved contracts for the construction of dormitories on a tract of property east of the Illinois Central Railroad, west of Wall Street, north of the Reservoir Road, and south of Park Street, on University Tracts designated 108, 109, 110, and 111; and

WHEREAS, It is necessary to furnish the said apartments with electricity and desirable to furnish the said electricity from the University's electrical sub-station; and

WHEREAS, It is necessary in furnishing said electrical service from said substation to run an overhead service line from the sub-station east across United States Highway 51, the Illinois Central Railroad tracks, and parallel to the said Illinois Central Railroad tracks south to the University-designated tracts; and

WHEREAS, In so running said overhead service line it is desirable to utilize certain electric service poles owned and on the property of the Central Illinois Public Service Company; and

Whereas, The said company has submitted an agreement providing for the utilization of said poles, which has been examined by the said Board and a copy of which is deposited with the Secretary of the Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the said agreement be and it is hereby approved in all respects, and that the Chairman of the Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute the contract on behalf of the said Board of Trustees, and the Secretary be and he is hereby authorized and directed to affix the seal of the Board of Trustees and attest thereto.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board adopted the above resolution. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

University Architect Charles Pulley, Mr. Carl H. Bowen, and Mr. Gordon W. Neal entered the meeting at this time. Mr. Bowen and Mr. Neal, representatives of Consoer, Townsend & Associates, Consulting Engineers, Chicago, discussed in detail their report entitled "Report on Electric Generation Plant." Copies of this report had been forwarded to the members of the Board in advance of this meeting, and a copy was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved plans for the installation of two 80,000 pound per hour steam generators, shown as Stage 1-A on Page 2 of the above-mentioned report, at estimated construction cost of \$932,000.00. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:30 P.M.



FEBRUARY 26, 1959

THE FEBRUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of ■ Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the

Board on Thursday, February 26, 1959, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, George T. Wilkins. Mr. Oehmke was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for The Southern Illinoisan, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on January 27, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, these minutes were approved as presented.

Consideration was given to the naming of a representative of the Board of Trustees to serve as a member of the Board of Directors of Southern Illinois University Foundation, replacing Mr. Melvin C. Lockard, whose term would expire in June, 1959. Lindell W. Sturgis moved the re-election of Mr. Lockard. The motion was seconded by George T. Wilkins and was carried by unanimous vote.

President Morris explained to the Board the procedure by which the Southern Illinois University Foundation was assisting with purchases of land for the Madison-St. Clair counties campus site. In this connection, the following resolution was presented concerning the utilization of the

Southern Illinois University Foundation for such purposes:

Resolution

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University did on the 31st day of October, 1958, accept certain funds in the amount of \$36,148.00, which had been impressed with a trust for the purposes of land acquisition in the Madison-St. Clair Counties Area; and

WHEREAS, These funds have been pledged and contributed for the acquisition of a permanent site for the Madison-St. Clair Counties campus of Southern Illinois University; and

WHEREAS, There continue to be gifts made for this purpose; and

Whereas, These gifts, as well as the original gifts, have been and will be impressed with a trust for the purposes of the acquisition of said properties for a permanent site for the Madison-St. Clair Counties Campus of Southern Illinois University; and

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University does now find that it is necessary for the acquisition of the property to be accomplished through and by Southern Illinois University Foundation; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University does request the Board of Directors of the Southern Illinois University Foundation to perform the responsibilities of the trust to the end that the lands may be acquired for the permanent site for the Madison-St. Clair Counties Campus of Southern Illinois University, and that if the said Board of Directors be willing to accept said responsibility, then and in that event there be assigned to the Southern Illinois University Foundation all options for properties and pledges of funds heretofore received by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, and that all funds which are now held in trust for this purpose be transferred in trust to the Southern Illinois University Foundation for the same purpose, to-wit: the acquisition of a permanent site for the Madison-St. Clair Counties Campus of Southern Illinois University.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, the Board adopted the above resolution. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Davis, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The following resolution was then presented with a recommendation for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Resolution

Be it Resolved That Continental Illinois Bank and Trust Company of Chicago be and hereby is designated a depositary in which the funds of this Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University may be deposited by its Treasurer and that the Treasurer of this Board of Trustees be and hereby is authorized to open and maintain an account or accounts with said Bank and to endorse and deposit with said Bank negotiable instruments and orders for the payment of money, which endorsements may be made in writing or by a stamp and without designation of the person so endorsing, and it being understood and agreed that on all such items deposited, all prior endorsements are guaranteed by this Board of Trustees whether or not an express guaranty is incorporated in such endorsements.

Be It Further Resolved, That the Treasurer of this Board of Trustees be authorized:

To make and from time to time continue to make such arrangements and to issue such instructions as to him shall seem proper for the conduct of any such account or accounts, and

To sign checks and orders for the payment of money withdrawing funds from said account or accounts and said Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago is hereby authorized and directed to act upon and honor any instructions so issued and to honor, pay, and charge to any account or accounts of this Board of Trustees all checks and orders for the payment of money so drawn when so signed without inquiring as to the circumstances of their issue or the disposition of their proceeds, whether such checks be payable to the order of, or endorsed or negotiated by any officer or person signing them, or any of said officers or persons in their individual capacities or not, and whether they are deposited to the individual credit of any officer or person signing them or of any of the other officers or persons or not, and

To endorse for negotiation, negotiate, and receive the proceeds of any negotiable instruments or orders for the payment of money payable to or be-

longing to this Board of Trustees, and

To identify, approve, endorse, and guarantee the endorsement of any payee or endorser on any checks or drafts whether drawn by this Board of Trustees or anyone else and to guarantee the payment thereof, and delegate to others authority to so identify, approve, and endorse, and guarantee the endorsement of any payee or endorser on any such checks or drafts and to guarantee the payment thereof.

And Be It Further Resolved, That the Treasurer of this Board of Trustees be authorized upon such terms and conditions as to him shall seem proper:

To deliver to and deposit with Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago for safekeeping, custody, or other purposes, any bonds, stocks, securities, and other property owned or otherwise held by this Board of Trustees and in connection therewith to open and maintain with said Bank a safekeeping or custody account or accounts and to make the initial deposit therein and from time to time to make other and additional deposits and to sign orders and issue instructions to said Bank for the conduct of said account or accounts, and

To withdraw, receive, and receipt for and to withdraw upon trust receipt on the responsibility of, and at the risk of this Board of Trustees, and to sign orders and issue instructions for the handling, transfer, registration, sale, substitution, exchange, and delivery of any bonds, stocks, securities, and other property and the proceeds thereof, delivered to, deposited with or otherwise held by said Bank for the account of this Board of Trustees. Such withdrawals, substitutions, exchanges, and deliveries whether subject to payment or not and whether pursuant to sale, exchange, or other transaction, may also be made by the bearer of any order, receipt, or request so signed, and

To purchase bonds, stocks, securities, and other property and to sign orders and issue instructions in connection with the purchase, the payment, the

registration, and the delivery thereof, and

To identify and guarantee assignments, transfers, and endorsements for transfer on bonds, stock certificates, interim, participation, and other certificates and to identify and guarantee signatures on bond and stock powers of attorney.

And Be It Further Resolved, That the aforementioned officer authorized to act for this Board of Trustees in any case aforesaid, shall be and hereby is further authorized, without the concurrence of any other officer or person:

To waive presentment, demand, protest, and notice of dishonor or protest and to give instructions in regard to the handling or delivery of any negotiable or non-negotiable papers or documents involved in any transactions for or on behalf of this Board of Trustees, and

To sign reconcilements and certify to the correctness of statements of account

and approve and authorize adjustments therein, and

To act for this Board of Trustees in the transaction of all other business for its account and to sign orders and issue instructions to Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago in connection therewith.

And Be It Further Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees be and hereby is authorized to certify to said Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago a copy of these resolutions and the name and signature of the Board of Trustees officer hereby authorized to act in the premises, and said Bank is hereby authorized to rely upon such certificate until formally advised by a like certificate of any changes therein, and is authorized to rely on any such additional certificates.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board unanimously adopted the above resolution.

The following resolution was then presented, with recommendation for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Resolution

1. Resolved: That The Northern Trust Company of Chicago, Illinois, hereby is designated a depositary in which funds of this Board of Trustees may be deposited, and that the Treasurer of the Board is authorized for and in behalf of this Board of Trustees to open an account or accounts with said depositary and to make such arrangements for the conduct thereof as he shall deem proper, and also, that any officer, agent, or employee hereby is authorized to deposit the funds of this Board of Trustees in such account or accounts, and to indorse for deposit or collection checks, drafts, notes, certificates of deposit, and like obligations. Indorsements for deposit or collection may be by the written or stamped indorsement of the Board, without designation of the person making the indorsement.

2. Resolved, also, That said The Northern Trust Company hereby is authorized to pay out funds on deposit with it to the credit of this Board of Trustees, upon checks or other orders for the payment of money drawn upon said depositary, and signed in the name of this Board of Trustees by the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University or the

Business Manager of Southern Illinois University.

3. Resolved, also, That each of the aforementioned officers authorized to act for this Board of Trustees in any case aforesaid hereby is authorized without the concurrence of any other officer or person;

(a) To identify, approve, and guarantee the indorsement of any payee or

indorser of any checks or drafts by this Board of Trustees

(b) To waive presentment, demand, protest, and notice of dishonor or protest, and to give instructions in regard to the handling or delivery of any negotiable or non-negotiable papers or documents involved in any of said transactions; and

(c) To act for this Board of Trustees in the transaction of all other business

for its account with said The Northern Trust Company.

- 4. Resolved, also, That said The Northern Trust Company, shall not in any way be responsible for, or have any obligation to inquire into, the circumstances of the issuance of any check or other order for the payment of money, or other instrument signed as hereinabove provided, or the application, disposition, or use of any such check, order, or instrument or the proceeds thereof, or of any of the funds deposited with it as hereinabove provided, and shall honor, receive, certify, and pay any and all checks and other orders for the payment of money and other instruments signed as aforesaid, whether or not payable or indorsed to the order of any officer or other person signing or countersigning the same, or of any other officer or employee of this Board of Trustees, and whether or not deposited to the individual credit of or used in payment of the individual obligation of, or tendered for cashing by any officer or other person signing or countersigning the same, or of or by any of the other officers or employees of this Board of Trustees.
- 5. Resolved, also, That the Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall file with said The Northern Trust Company a certified copy of this resolution under the seal of the Board of Trustees, and also shall file with said The Northern Trust Company a list of the persons at the present time holding office in this Board of Trustees, and said The Northern Trust Company as against this Board of Trustees shall be entitled to presume conclusively that the persons so certified as holding such office respectively continue to hold the same until otherwise notified in writing by the Secretary of this Board of Trustees, and said Secretary is authorized and directed to certify that the provisions hereof are in conformity with the articles and the by-laws of this Board of Trustees.

Matters Presented by President Morris

The following matters were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) THE SHORTAGE OF COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY TEACHERS

(This is the first of a series of reports to the Board of Trustees on certain broad problems affecting Southern Illinois University, requiring no action).

One of the alarming recent developments in higher education is the shortage of qualified staff members. This shortage has appeared in almost every university teaching field, but unfortunately not enough college graduates the country over are becoming candidates for advanced degrees. With the rapid increase of enrollments on university campuses, and the competition for highly trained persons from government and industry, the ratio of qualified teachers to their students is growing smaller each year.

Another difficulty is that colleges and universities have relied heavily on candidates for advanced degrees to do part-time teaching in such departments as English, History, Mathematics, and Government. In the laboratory sciences, these candidates often serve as laboratory assistants and in research departments as research assistants, thereby acquiring experience as well as training in the teaching profession. The lack of candidates for advanced degrees is, therefore, not only cutting down the number of prospective college and university teachers but also affecting the immediate availability of teaching and research assistants.

The most serious effect of the shortage is on the possible quality of the teaching. Not only the number of good teachers available, but also the methods of training college teachers and giving them experience, have come into question. In 1950, the U.S. Office of Education issued a publication, "Toward Better College Teaching," which puts the case for improving college teaching in strong terms:

It is not too much to claim that, in the long run, the speed with which a society progresses and the effectiveness with which a country solves its social, economic, and political problems are influenced greatly by the quality of its college teaching.

In 1957, the Fund for the Advancement of Education, in a publication entitled "Better Utilization of College Teaching Resources," had the following to say about impending shortages:

The problem of staffing colleges and universities for their growing student bodies is a complex one, and is growing more acute. Colleges regularly turn to the graduate schools for new faculty members and have come to regard the Ph.D. degree as a bench mark of quality in liberal arts fields, even though many excellent teachers do not have this degree. But the number of persons with graduate degrees who are available for college teaching is rising much more slowly than the demand for teachers created by the increasing number of students entering college. The low birth rate during the 1930's has limited the potential graduate students in the present decade, and increasing demands of business and government and their higher salaries for people with advanced degrees have further restricted the supply of Ph.D.'s available for college teaching.

The 1957-58 annual report of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching points out the need for a concerted attack upon this problem:

. . . The graduate schools should accept the statistical facts concerning the number of college teachers needed in the decades ahead, and should make a reasonable effort to meet the demand within the limits of their own resources. If there are legitimate demands still unmet (and this is a certainty) by their own rate of production, then they should collaborate willingly with those institutions which must take up the slack. . . . Both the undergraduate college and the graduate school can play a more imaginative and effective role in recruiting future college teachers.

The shortage of qualified college and university teachers is being met on our campuses in a number of ways:

First, our class schedules and course offerings are being examined with a view to making sure that the time of our teachers is being used to the best advantage.

Secondly, the time of experienced and able teachers is being conserved by releasing them from duties which can be performed by our present graduate and research assistants. For example, by handling laboratory sections where considerable time must be devoted to individual students, our laboratory assistants can make it possible for distinguished professors to lecture to larger and larger groups.

Thirdly, radio and television courses are being developed and offered to reach more students without increasing the size of the teaching faculty.

Fourthly, through closed-circuit television, we hope to be able to develop courses which can be offered at several locations simultaneously.

Fifthly, through a program of visitation and counseling, the young instructors already on our campus are being acquainted with some of the problems of college teaching and are receiving the advice of experienced teachers as to how best to reach the numerous students in their classes.

We at Southern Illinois University feel, however, that our obligation during this period of shortage of teachers will not be fully met simply by solving local problems. All colleges and universities have the responsibility for general training of college teachers so that the national shortage can be overcome. We have, therefore, been devoting considerable thought to the problem of recruiting, training, and providing practical experience for prospective college teachers. Among the measures which have been taken or are being studied are the following:

- 1. The establishment of assistantships and fellowships to attract gifted college graduates into departments which train for college and university teaching.
- 2. The development of research and professional courses adapted to the prospective college or university teacher.
- 3. The creation of better living conditions and study facilities for graduate students.

4. A new emphasis on college teaching for our students in Higher Education.

5. The strengthening of the master's degree program in many departments

now authorized to conduct graduate work.

6. The establishment of a doctoral program in a number of subject matter departments (Psychology, Education, Government, Speech Pathology, Zoology, Speech, Microbiology, Secondary Education, Elementary Education,

and Educational Administration and Supervision).

7. The preparation of other departments for offering the doctor's degree in accordance with approved procedures. Many of these departments already have, in large part, the staffs and facilities needed, but (as has been our practice in the past) we shall ask the Graduate Council carefully to review these departments and to make use of the advice of outside consultants concerning the readiness of the departments affected to offer work at the doctoral level. Dean Willis G. Swartz of the Graduate School has supplied the following list of curricula, leading to the doctor's degree, which should be offered at the earliest time: Anthropology, Art Education, Art History, Botany, Business, Business Education, Chemistry, Economics, English, Foreign Languages, Guidance, Health Education, Higher Education, History, Home Economics, Industrial Education, Journalism, Mathematics, Music, Philosophy, Physical Education, Physics, Physiology, Rehabilitation Counseling, Sociology, Special Education, and Theater.

8. Attention is now being given to the possible establishment of doctoral curricula aimed specifically at the preparation of college teachers. It is anticipated that these programs will be coordinated within the framework of the Department of Higher Education, and that they will consist, in the main, of work taken in the academic areas or departments, such as Music, English, Social Studies, Physical Sciences, etc. Their objective will be the production of persons soundly trained in the various academic fields, with adequate background in the fundamentals of college teaching and with orientation in the importance and rewards of such work. Such programs might include a year

of supervised teaching on the university level.

It is our hope that within the next few years the active carrying out of these measures will enable Southern Illinois University to make its proper contribution to the solution of this national and local problem. An immediate effect will be to enable our departments which accept candidates for advanced degrees to give them experience as part-time teaching and research assistants, thereby relieving such departments from teaching overloads and preparing persons well qualified for college and university teaching. The long-range effect will be that Southern Illinois University can more adequately help other colleges and universities, all of whom face the same problem, to overcome both local and national shortages.

The shortage of college and university teachers is so great that the resources and efforts of all colleges and universities in the country now offering

graduate work are scarcely adequate to cope with the problem.

(B) DOCTORAL PROGRAMS IN ELEMENTARY EDUCATION AND EDUCATIONAL ADMINISTRATION AND SUPERVISION

At its June 29, 1956, meeting the Board of Trustees approved the Department of Education in the College of Education to offer the doctor's degree. Since that time the Department of Education has been divided into a Department of Educational Administration and Supervision, a Department of Elementary Education, a Department of Secondary Education, and a Department of Higher Education.

This division has made it necessary to review each of the new departments to ascertain whether or not it possesses the facilities for offering the doctor's degree. The Department of Secondary Education was first reviewed and was approved for doctoral work at the Board meeting held September 20, 1958.

We are now ready to present recommendations for the Departments of Elementary Education and Educational Administration and Supervision.

The staff of the Elementary Education Department consists of Professor J. Murray Lee, Chairman, holding a doctor's degree from Columbia University; Professor Ted R. Ragsdale, holding the doctor's degree from St. Louis University; Professor Willis E. Malone, holding a doctor's degree from Ohio State University; Professor Victor R. Randolph, holding a doctor's degree from George Peabody College; Associate Professor Rebecca Baker, holding a doctor's degree from the State University of Iowa; Associate Professor Ernest E. Brod, holding a doctor's degree from Colorado State College; Associate Professor Clyde M. Brown, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Missouri; and Assistant Professor Luther E. Bradfield, holding a doctor's degree from Indiana University. Professor Lee was Dean of the School of Education at Washington State College and a supervisor of doctoral dissertations. Adequate laboratory facilities are provided by the University School and by the Clinical Center, and additional facilities have been made available through the elementary schools in the Southern Illinois area. The holdings in the library in this field are particularly strong, and there are special collections of study guides published by State Departments of Education and city school systems, and of children's books.

The application of the Department of Elementary Education to offer graduate work was reviewed by the Graduate Council and recommended by the Council to Dean Willis G. Swartz, who states that he endorses the request of

the department for approval.

The Department of Education Administration and Supervision has an unusually strong staff consisting of Professor Arthur E. Lean, Chairman, holding the doctor's degree from Michigan; Professor Roye R. Bryant, holding a doctor's degree from Washington University; Dean John E. Grinnell, holding a doctor's degree from Stanford University; Professor Douglas E. Lawson, holding a doctor's degree from Chicago; Professor Charles D. Neal, holding a doctor's degree from Indiana University; Associate Professor Jacob O. Bach, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Wisconsin; Associate Professor George D. Bracewell, holding a doctor's degree from Washington University; Associate Professor Troy W. Edwards, holding a doctor's degree from Indiana

University; Associate Professor Woodson W. Fishback, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Chicago; Associate Professor James H. Hall, holding a doctor's degree from George Washington University; and Assistant Professor Harlan D. Beem, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Illinois. Professors Lean and Grinnell have served on doctoral committees at Michigan, Stanford, Colorado, and Texas.

Of recent years the library holdings have been greatly strengthened, and adequate space for laboratory facilities has been provided in the University School and by arrangement with various high schools in the Southern Illinois

area.

The application of the Department of Educational Administration and Supervision to offer graduate work was reviewed by the Graduate Council and recommended to Dean Swartz, who states that he endorses the request of the department for approval.

It is therefore recommended that the Departments of Elementary Education and Educational Administration and Supervision be authorized to accept students for the doctoral degree, effective at the beginning of the 1959 summer

session.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board authorized the Departments of Elementary Education and Educational Administration and Supervision to accept students for the doctoral degree, effective at the beginning of the 1959 summer session. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

(J) COMPULSORY RETIREMENT

A recent discovery that we had a 74-year old man employed as a watchman at the Vocational-Technical Institute called to our attention a void in our retirement policy. At present, all employees covered by the Retirement System must retire at age 68 unless re-employed on a year-to-year basis by the Board of Trustees. To our knowledge, we do not have a policy regarding those employees who may be employed, even though they are not eligible for the Retirement System.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees adopt the same policy for non-Retirement System employees that is applied to the Retirement System employees.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board unanimously adopted the policy recommended.

(K) This section, concerning the request of the Alumni Association and the Southern Illinois University Foundation for consultant services, was considered. It being the consensus of the Board members that consultant services seemed desirable, the formal request for specific action was withdrawn by President Morris.

(L) RECOMMENDATIONS FOR HONORARY DEGREES

We recommend that at the June, 1959, commencement, or some commencement thereafter, the honorary Doctor of Science degree be awarded to Dr. Jean Piccard, Swiss Aeronautical Engineer known throughout the world as the pioneer of stratosphere flights.

Jean Piccard received the Bachelor of Science degree from the Swiss Institute of Technology in 1907, and the Doctor of Natural Sciences degree in

1909. He was awarded the honorary Doctor of Science degree by Jamestown College, Jamestown, North Dakota, in 1957. He taught organic chemistry at the University of Lausanne, Switzerland, 1914-16; served as Assistant Professor and Associate Professor at the University of Chicago, 1916-19; as Professor of Chemistry at the University of Lausanne, 1919-26; as Research Instructor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, 1926-29; as head of the research department, Hercules Powder Company, 1929-32; as Research Associate, Bartol Research Foundation of Franklin Institute, 1933-36; and as Special Lecturer and Professor of Aeronautical Engineering at the University of Minnesota, 1936-52, where he is now Emeritus Professor. In 1915, Mr. Piccard served in the observation balloon company of the Swiss Army and made a 16-hour balloon flight to study adiabatic compression and diffusion. In 1936, he designed the new plastic balloon used frequently in cosmic ray and meteorological research today, and in 1937 made the first multiple balloon flight. He was awarded the Certificate of Performance of the National Aeronautic Association in 1935.

We also recommend that the honorary Doctor of Arts degree be awarded to R. Buckminster Fuller, inventor of the Dymaxion House and the geodesic

principle of structural design.

Mr. Fuller was born July 12, 1895, at Milton, Massachusetts, and was educated at Harvard University and the United States Naval Academy. From 1930 to 1944, Mr. Fuller held various research and engineering positions in industry, including the Pierce Foundation-American Radiator-Standard Sanitary Manufacturing Company, the Phelps Dodge Corporation, and the Kelly-Springfield Truck Company. He has served as technical editor of Fortune Magazine; as Special Assistant to the Director of the Foreign Economic Administration; and as Visiting Professor at Cornell University, Yale University, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Southern Illinois University. He initiated and developed research on the geodesic structures now being used by the United States Government and by industries throughout the world, and invented the Dymaxion House shown in Chicago in 1927. In conjunction with the Butler Manufacturing Company, he developed the Dymaxion steel igloo. He is the author of Nine Chains to the Moon (1938), and holds the only United States patent for a new kind of map projection. As a creative artist, he has become one of the most controversial and best known intellects of our

We further recommend that the Board ratify the action taken by conference telephone call on February 23, 1959, approving the award of the honorary Doctor of Laws degree to Colonel Alexander R. MacMillan on the occasion of

his official retirement from the Air Force on February 24, 1959.

Alexander R. MacMillan was born February 12, 1899, in Detroit, Michigan. He was graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1920 and served in the Orient and as Assistant Professor of Military Science and Tactics at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute between 1920 and 1926, when he resigned from the Service to enter the business world. He has served as Manager of the Educational Department of Frigidaire Air Conditioning Division; as General Director of Training for General Motors Delco-Frigidaire Conditioning Di-

vision; as director on the board of the Industrial Training Institute of Chicago; and as Regional Manager of the Detroit district of General Motors Delco (Heating) Division. In 1942, he volunteered for military service and was granted a reserve commission as Major. In 1943, he was appointed Chief of the Preparation-for-Overseas-Movement Division in the Air Inspector's Office in Washington, D.C.; in 1944, Chief of the Field Office of the Air Inspector at Orlando, Florida; in 1946, Chief of the Inspections Division, Office of Air Inspector, Washington, D.C. He was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel in 1943 and to Colonel in 1944. From 1949 to 1951 he served as Inspector General of the Air Training Command, and from 1951 to 1954 as Inspector-General of the Third Air Force in Great Britain. In 1954 he was appointed Professor of Air Science at Southern Illinois University and was instrumental in the establishment of the Singing Squadron, Southern Illinois University Rifle Team, the WAF-ROTC program, and the Angel Flight.

These recommendations have been initiated by our Faculty Committee on

Honorary Degrees and have the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved unanimously the recommendations presented concerning the award of honorary degrees.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris indicated that a letter had been written to Mr. Wilfred H. Holle, President of the Board of Education, Belleville Township High School and Junior College, suggesting a joint meeting with the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, with an agenda concerning matters of mutual interest to be prepared by representatives of the two boards. Mr. Wham stated that he would also like to have joint meetings with the Boards of the Centralia and Mt. Vernon Junior Colleges.

APRIL 1, 1959

THE APRIL MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on April 1, 1959, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Lindell W. Sturgis, Melvin C. Lockard, Kenneth L. Davis, Mrs. Stella Collins, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, George T.

Wilkins.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Dean of Southwestern Illinois Residence Centers Harold W. See, Mr. Carl Mayhew, Reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the regular meeting held on February 26, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by George T. Wilkins, these minutes were approved

as presented.

Dr. David C. Hanna, Manager of the Education Department, and Mr. Jos. W. Cavataio, Chairman of the Education Committee, both of the Illinois State Chamber of Commerce, appeared before the Board and

were welcomed by Chairman Wham.

Mr. Cavataio stated that his committee was interested in the problems of education at all levels, but for the past two years had been active in research in the field of higher education. He mentioned a brochure issued in 1957, entitled "Why and How Illinois Business is Helping Higher Education," which gave enrollment and costs facts, explained Illinois business support practices, and cited examples of company contribution programs. He also explained the support of the State

Chamber of Commerce for the recently defeated bond issue, and the interests which prompted publication of a brochure in January, 1959, entitled "State College and University Admission and Tuition," which contained a survey of central tendencies as to entrance requirements, information on tuition and fees, and a comparison of Illinois institutions with national trends.

Dr. Hanna explained the nature and purpose of the latter brochure and, in answer to questions from the administration and from individual Board members, interpreted the findings with relation to Illinois institutions. He stated that his department was recommending (1) that all boards of state institutions of higher education give consideration to quality students and to a tightening of entrance requirements, and (2) that a program of tuition and fees be set up whereby 25 per cent of the cost of higher education would come from such sources. He summarized by stating that he felt such recommendations were in line with practice, inasmuch as tuition and fees had been gradually rising, and because much concern had been evidenced concerning quality students and the problem of keeping them in school.

Mr. Cavataio and Dr. Hanna expressed their thanks for the opportunity of appearing before the Board. President Morris, Professor Tenney, and members of the Board expressed their appreciation and understanding of the problems involved in the research efforts of the Chamber

of Commerce.

Mr. Charles Pulley, University Architect, entered the meeting at this time.

President Morris requested the reaction of the members of the Board to a revised master plan of the Carbondale Central Campus, dated April 1, 1959, which showed recent developments in campus planning. He explained that a joint committee composed of the City Council, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Carbondale Development Association wished to consider city planning in relation to University planning, and that an up-to-date master plan was desirable for the purpose.

Mr. Pulley explained that the major changes between the master plan approved on June 29, 1956, and the master plan submitted on this date, concerned the Loop Road, sidewalks, an underpass at Mill Street, parking areas, and a service drive to the Dowdell housing area. He mentioned a street and highway plan prepared by H. W. Lochner & Company,

Chicago, for the City of Carbondale, dated 1958.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved the revised master plan of the Carbondale Central Campus, as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins; Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

A preliminary sketch of a typical indoor building plaque was presented, showing the format for a standard bronze plaque to be placed within each new building on the campus and the actual letter style proposed. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved the format of the proposed plaque. Mr. Pulley was excused from the meeting.

Professor Max W. Turner, Professor A. M. Mark, and Assistant Professor Israel Goldiamond were introduced to the Board. Their report, entitled "Engineering Education in Illinois, Revisited," an analysis of engineering education data collected by Southern Illinois University and by the Illinois Commission of Higher Education, was presented and reviewed.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article III, Section 2, A and B, and the addition of a sub-title F to Part III, Article III, Section 2, was mailed to each member of the Board on March 17, 1959.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted amendments and an addition to the section designated, to read as follows:

A. Personnel.

The President's Office shall include the Chief Officer of Instruction, with the title Vice-President for Instruction; the Chief Executive Assistant, with the title Vice-President for Business Affairs; the Legal Counsel and Assistant to the President; the Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus, with the title Vice-President for Southwestern Illinois Campus; and such executive and clerical assistants as may be required and authorized.

B. Appointment.

The Chief Officer of Instruction, the Chief Executive Assistant, the Legal Counsel and Assistant to the President, and the Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus shall be appointed by the Board upon recommendation of the President after consultation with the appropriate deans and other major administrative officers, and shall serve at the pleasure of the President and the Board.

F. The Chief Administrative Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus.

The Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus shall exercise, under the President, general executive and coordinating responsibility as defined in Article IV, Section 15, for all instructional, research, and service programs offered in Madison and St. Clair Counties. He shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to him by the President.

The vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Matters Presented by President Morris

The following matters were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) FACULTY SALARY LEVELS

(This is the second of a series of reports to the Board of Trustees on certain broad problems affecting Southern Illinois University, and requires no

action.)

At the February 26, 1959, meeting of the Board of Trustees, we reported on the shortages of college and university teachers. These shortages are due to many factors, of which salary is only one. Even though faculty salary levels should be raised considerably, recruiting good teachers will be difficult in the years immediately ahead. Nevertheless, the provision of higher salaries for teachers would, in the long run, undoubtedly reduce the shortages, particularly in certain departments and certain types of positions where the salary problem is acute.

Perhaps the most influential and emphatic statement on this point was made in the Second Report to the President of the President's Committee on Education Beyond the High School in 1957:

The Committee recommends to every board of trustees, every legislature, and all others responsible for academic budgets:

- (1) That the absolute highest priority in the use of available funds be given to raising faculty salaries, with the goal of doubling the average level within five to ten years, and with particular attention to increasing the spread between the bottom and the top of each institution's salary structure.
- (2) That action also be taken to provide at moderate cost such benefits as health and life insurance, adequate retirement program, faculty housing, assistance for the education of faculty children, and similar measures whose costs to the institution are small compared to the benefits and attractiveness to faculty members.

This statement has already been cited in our Analysis of Budget Request for Operation for the biennium beginning July 1, 1959. The budget request itself includes an item which would enable us to proceed toward the goal of doubling salaries during the period 1957-1967.

At the beginning of the current biennium (1957-1959), seemingly generous salary adjustments were made for our faculty members through the consideration given by the State Legislature and the Governor to our personal services needs and through the wisdom of the Board of Trustees in approving these increases. For a few months in 1957, our salaries were genuinely competitive, and we operated under the illusion that we at least could obtain and retain the kind of staff members required at the present stage of the University's development. This illusion was soon destroyed, however, because we discovered that other schools, including the universities in this state, had been

able to do even better. As the biennium has progressed, and as salaries elsewhere have continued to rise, our competitive position has become weaker and weaker, with the results that this year we have had less success in recruiting good staff members than for many years before and that our departments are now subject to raids by other universities.

The purpose of this report is (a) to provide certain statistical information which will throw light on our salary position, and (b) to suggest what kind

of measures need to be taken in the near future.

In a bulletin entitled *Higher Education*, published by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare in January, 1959, the average 1958-59 salaries of faculty members in institutions of higher education throughout the country were listed. In the following table we have listed the average salaries both for all public universities and for public universities with enrollment of over 10,000 and compared them to the salaries prevailing at Southern Illinois University:

These figures show why Southern Illinois University cannot attract people from the staffs of other universities and why other universities can attract people from our staff. The situation is one in which our number of vacancies is likely to be increased rather than decreased unless we abandon all efforts at qualitative improvement of the staff.

Specifically, it should be noted that while our academic deans receive above the average salary for all public universities, they are below the average for public universities with enrollments over 10,000. The academic deans are also well below the averages (in monthly salary rates) for professors. A number of our top flight administrative people are feeling the urge to leave their present positions and to accept less strenuous and more rewarding positions elsewhere.

Secondly, our average salary for full professors is below the average salary in this rank for all publicly supported universities and considerably below the average salary for public universities with enrollments over 10,000. It is chiefly through its full professors that a university makes its reputation in the world of scholarship.

Thirdly, the same thing applies to associate professors. We are not able to compete with the average public university, much less with the large public

university.

Fourthly, on the assistant professor level, we are slightly above the average for all public universities, but below the average for public universities with enrollments over 10,000. This is the level at which we have best been able to compete, but unfortunately, it is also the level at which our staff is presently most crowded. To continue to add assistant professors will be to aggravate a bad situation, since our best investment of the University's personal services

monies at present can be made by obtaining more people of demonstrated capacity and performance rather than more of those who are merely promising.

Finally, our average instructor's salary is considerably higher than the average, not only for all public universities, but also for public universities with enrollments over 10,000, but even this does not allow us to recruit instructors except at prohibitive salary levels. Low salaried instructors are virtually unavailable unless we settle for distinctly second-rate people. Young Ph.D.'s without experience are now insisting upon and getting first appointments at the assistant professor level. We have therefore urged our chairmen and deans to attempt to locate persons qualified for the higher ranks and not to increase the present imbalance of instructors' salaries.

Perhaps even more significant than average salaries is the spread of salaries from lowest to highest. The ability to pay a salary considerably above the average for a rank when necessary is the only thing that will enable an institution to attract top flight people and to improve its staff qualitatively. From this point of view the position of Southern Illinois University with relation to the *major* universities (rather than with relation to the *average* university) becomes significant. Southern Illinois University's maxima and minima for the various ranks are in the chart below compared to the maxima and minima of one of the universities in the top five, salary-wise, of the country. The salaries are for nine-months appointments only:

It is hoped that the provision for personal services funds during the next biennium will enable us to raise salary levels generally so that we are at least somewhat above the average of publicly supported universities of our size and that we shall also be able to raise the ceilings where necessary to retain and obtain distinguished professors for our faculty.

(B) POLICY FOR RELEASING INFORMATION RELATIVE TO STUDENTS' OFFICIAL ACADEMIC RECORDS

A basic responsibility of the University is to see that maximum protection is given to official student academic records. These records are confidential in nature and the information contained therein should be released only under authorized conditions. At present, the Registrar's policy for releasing this information is as follows:

- 1. To furnish information concerning dates of attendance and graduation status upon request.
- 2. To furnish potential employers, if non-educational, with general information such as in (1) above, plus a general statement concerning academic achievement if the student has performed at an average or above average level.
 - 3. To permit inspection of the official records, or the furnishing of tran-

scripts, without securing student permission to the instructional staff or offices of this University, to officials of other educational institutions, and to government agencies when requested for official purposes. In all other cases release of the record requires either a request by the student or his permission.

This policy is in keeping with the standards established by the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers in its *Policies and Procedures* for member institutions.

As situations sometimes develop in which information is requested by unauthorized persons, we wish to request Board approval in principle of our present policy and consideration by the Board at a later meeting of the following as an official statement of policy concerning the release of information relative to students' official academic records:

A transcript is sent, issued, or released only upon a student's request or with his permission, except that such permission is not required when University staff members or offices, other educational institutions, and governmental agencies request transcripts for official purposes.

Information supplied upon employers' inquiry blanks is recognized as separate and distinct from official transcripts, not necessarily following transcript specifications, but subject to the same limitations. Good faith and fair play respecting the student, the University, and the employer are governing factors in the preparation of these blanks.

Information concerning dates of attendance and degrees earned is, however, supplied upon anyone's request.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board unanimously approved the present policy concerning protection of official student academic records in principle.

Dean J. E. Grinnell of the College of Education entered the meeting at this time and was welcomed by President Morris and Chairman John

Page Wham on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

The following supplement to the section on Changes in Faculty-Administrative Payroll was presented by President Morris, with a request for approval:

Mr. George H. Hand, Professor of Economics and Vice-President for Business Affairs, to Professor of Economics and Chairman of the Department of Higher Education, effective July 1, 1959. At his own request, and upon recommendation of Dean J. E. Grinnell of the College of Education, Professor Hand desires to relinquish his vice-presidency and become chairman of the newly organized Department of Higher Education next July 1. In this assignment, he will assume leadership of Southern's program for preparing highly qualified college teachers and administrators.

Dean Grinnell outlined briefly the objectives and purposes of the new department, emphasizing the urgent need for service courses to provide training in teaching for doctoral candidates and administrators. He also cited the kind of leadership provided in the three best known centers or departments of higher education at the University of California, New York University, and the University of Michigan.

Professor Hand said: "It is estimated that college and university enrollment will double by 1970. The need for teachers and administrators will also double by 1970. Although the choice was not easy, I have concluded that my greatest contribution to higher education, to Southern Illinois, and to Southern Illinois University, all of which have my sincere devotion and gratitude, can be made by returning to my first love—college teaching."

President Morris stated that Professor Hand, with his broad educational understanding and deep personal integrity, has been a solid, stabilizing force in the University during a difficult decade of development and growth. He added that Professor Hand would be much missed in the business operations of the University, but that he would bring to his new assignment rich experience and a distinguished educational background. With a doctor's degree in economics from Princeton University, Professor Hand taught economics in Denison University, Ohio Weslevan University, and the University of Vermont, where he was chairman of the economics department. In 1945, he became President of Fairmont State College in West Virginia, where he served until 1952, after which he moved to Southern Illinois University to assume the new post of Vice-President for Business Affairs. President Morris further said that the Department of Higher Education would make a full demand on Professor Hand's considerable talents for coordination of efforts of many associates and for anticipating the direction of American higher education. He will offer through the department versatile and farsighted programs and services for prospective college teachers and administrators, and for those already in service.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board granted, in accordance with Professor Hand's request and the recommendation of the administration, the request for change of assignment stated above. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

In a personal statement concerning his request for a transfer, Professor Hand said: "Developing the position of Vice-President for Business Affairs at Southern has been very interesting and stimulating, thanks to my good friends and colleagues. The development of a Department of Higher Education promises to be equally challenging and exciting. This new position will make good use of my administrative, as well as my teaching, experience. It is with a great deal of pleasure and satisfaction that I plan to devote the rest of my active years to this most important task. Although looking ahead, I would like to look back long enough to express my deep appreciation to all who have made my task as Vice-President for Business Affairs easier and more pleasant."

Dean Grinnell left the meeting at this time.

(J) SPECIAL AWARD

It is recommended that the Southern Illinois University Distinguished Service Award be presented to Dean Charles Manfred Thompson at the June, 1959, commencement, or some commencement thereafter.

Dean Thompson has a distinguished record as an educator, public service administrator, author, and scholar. He holds the doctor's degree from the University of Illinois and honorary doctorates from Muskingum College and McKendree College. At the University of Illinois, he advanced through the academic grades to become Professor and Dean of the College of Commerce and Business Administration. He is a member of numerous educational societies and has served with distinction in various civic and governmental capacities. As an authority in his field, he is the author of a number of books in economics and business.

Before retiring from the faculty of the University of Illinois, he showed great interest in the economic betterment of this area. At eighty-one years of age he is a dynamic personality who is still seeking opportunities for capable young men and women of college age.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on

Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board unanimously approved the award of the Southern Illinois University Distinguished Service Award to Dean Charles Manfred Thompson.

(K) AMENDMENT TO EXISTING LEASES WITH SOUTHERN ILLINOIS AIRPORT AUTHORITY (FORMERLY MURDALE AIRPORT AUTHORITY)

At the July 25, 1957, meeting of the Board of Trustees, and again at the September 20, 1958, meeting of the Board of Trustees, leases were approved to be entered into with the Southern Illinois Airport Authority relating to the use of facilities of the said Authority at the local airport. Part of the purpose in entering into these leases was to make available certain sums for improvement of facilities at the Airport. A part of the money for these improvements is to come from the Federal Airport Authority. In reviewing the leases between the Board of Trustees and the Southern Illinois Airport Authority, the Federal Airport Authority has suggested certain modifications.

The requested amendments follow. Essentially, they provide that the July 1, 1957, lease be amended by limiting the use which the Board of Trustees and the University may make of the airport facilities to that of aeronautical use. The amendment to the September 9, 1958, lease provides for the University foregoing exclusive use of the new land purchased for an extension of the north-south runway to that of agricultural use. In addition, it states specifically the location of the north-south runway on the new property.

Approval of these amendments is requested.

WHEREAS, both of the parties to the lease dated July 1, 1957, are agreeable to certain modifications of that lease.

Now, therefore, for and in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained and other valuable considerations, Lessor and Lessee hereby agree that the lease dated July 1, 1957, shall be amended in the following particulars:

- 1. In the first line of the body of the provision in the prior lease designated "1. Use of Airport" there be added the word "aeronautical" between the first and second word of the first sentence.
- 2. That subparagraph (4) of the prior lease designated "1. Use of Facilities" be amended by the addition of the words "For aeronautical purposes" in the first line of said subparagraph between the word "use" and the word "of".
- 3. That the last unnumbered subparagraph of the paragraph of the prior lease designated "1. Use of Facilities" be amended by adding thereto a comma (,) after the last word of said paragraph and by adding thereafter the following words "and in accordance with the development proposed under the master plan for this airport dated February 14, 1957. Further, before any buildings or other structures shall be constructed, the Lessee shall secure the prior written consent therefor from the Lessor."
- 4. That there be added to said lease and made a part thereof the plat which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, showing the land areas demised under the lease dated July 1, 1957.
- 5. That the other terms and conditions and provisions of the lease dated July 1, 1957, between the parties hereto, be and the same are hereby ratified and confirmed.

Whereas, subsequent to the date of the execution of said lease there have been certain changes in the demised premises and certain additional changes are necessary to satisfy the requirements of the Federal Aviation Agency which is participating with the Lessor in the construction of certain facilities in and about the demised premises, and

Whereas, both of the parties to the lease dated September 9, 1958, are agreeable to certain modifications of that lease.

Now Therefore, for and in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained and other valuable considerations, Lessor and Lessee hereby agree that the lease dated September 9, 1958, shall be amended in the following particulars:

- 1. That all of Paragraph "1. Use of Facilities" appearing on pages 1 and 2 of said prior lease be and the same is hereby vacated, and that the same be and it is hereby declared null and void.
- 2. That said Paragraph 1 in the prior lease be and the same is hereby replaced with the following Paragraph 1 in these words and figures:
 - "1. Use of Facilities
- '(a) The use of the following described tracts of land for agricultural pursuits only:

TRACT 1

'That part of the Southwest Quarter of the Northeast Quarter of Section 31, in Township 8 South, Range 1 West of the 3rd P.M. that lies on the South and East side of the Big Muddy River, the same being a fractional part of said Forty Acre Tract, which contains 15 acres, more or less;

TRACT 2

'The East Half of the Northeast Quarter of Section 31, Township 8 South, Range 1 West of the Third P.M., which contains 80 acres, more or less, excepting therefrom the following described tract of land: a tract of land 500 feet in width on each side of the established center line of the NS runway from the southern boundary of the aforementioned tract No. 2 to the northern boundary thereof, reserving unto the lessor the right to control the use of the balance of the tract to assure conformance with Technical Standard Order N18 of the Federal Aviation Agency and with the development proposed under the master plan for this airport dated February 14, 1957; that no use by the Lessee shall be contrary to said master plan or to the contents of TSO-N18.

'It is mutually understood between the parties hereto that the rights of the lessee heretofore granted in the above described property shall be further limited in that the lessee shall not erect, maintain or allow any buildings, structures or other objects to remain or be placed on the herein demised premises or permit any growths thereon, subject however to the lessee's right to use the demised premises for grazing and crop farming purposes and to bring farm machinery on the land temporarily as necessary to carry out farming tasks.

'All of said aforementioned use of the premises by the lessee shall be further subject

to the right of the lessor perpetually, for the use and benefit of the public of a right of way for the unobstructed and unrestricted flight of aircraft in, through and across the air space over and above the aforementioned two tracts of land, at any height

above the ground.

'(b) On property other than described in subparagraph (a) hereof, and in a building presently situated upon the airport property, the lessor will maintain and from time to time improve classroom space previously leased to the lessee in a lease between the parties hereto dated July 1, 1957, and specifically but without limiting the generality of the above, the said lessor will within 18 months from the date hereof, provide and maintain a central heating plant for the building in which said classroom leased by a previous lease is located.

'(c) If lessor shall hereinafter during the term of this lease or any renewals thereof, enter upon the construction of an administration building at said airport, in the area designated in and on the master plan for the development of said airport authority dated February 14, 1957, lessor agrees to provide in said building and to lease for the same consideration heretofore stated at least one additional classroom

for the use of the lessee."

3. That the other terms and conditions and provisions of the lease dated September 9, 1958, between the parties hereto, be and the same are hereby ratified and confirmed.

(L) MADISON-ST. CLAIR LAND ACQUISITION

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees, held on February 26, 1959, the Board agreed to the assignment of pledges and funds previously collected for the permanent site of the Madison–St. Clair Counties Campus of Southern Illinois University to the Southern Illinois University Foundation.

The purpose of this assignment was so that the Foundation could be the vehicle used for negotiating with the banks in the area to borrow funds on the pledges received and the land to be purchased in those amounts committed but not presently contributed for the said site. The banks have now submitted a proposed Loan Agreement between themselves, their agent bank who will do the collecting and disbursing of the monies received, and the Southern Illinois University Foundation. It appears that it would be wise for the Board of Trustees to enter into this agreement also for the following purposes only:

1. To agree to the assignment of pledges and funds to the Foundation;

2. To warrant that they will diligently assist in the collection of pledges

which have been made for the purpose of this site.

A form of the proposed Loan Agreement has been filed with the Secretary of the Board, but has not been finalized and will not be, pending a meeting between the counsel for the banks and the counsel for the Board. Authority is requested from the Board for the entering into of a Loan Agreement of the type described above, limiting the Board's agreements to the items above specified.

(M) INDEPENDENT AUDIT FOR 1958-59

We recommend approval of the following joint agreement between Mr. Frank Whitney, Auditor General; Southern Illinois University; and C. J. Schlosser and Company, Alton, for the audit of the accounts and financial operations of Southern Illinois University for the year ending June 30, 1959:

GENTLEMEN:

We are requesting that you undertake the audit of the accounts and financial operations of Southern Illinois University for the year ending June 30, 1959.

The audit is to be conducted as far as practicable in accordance with practices commonly followed in professional audits of commercial enterprises and universities, with standards of disclosure and reporting recognized by professional bodies of Certified Public Accountants. It is the intention that the statements of Southern Illinois University are to be examined and an opinion concerning those statements expressed by you. No limitations on the scope of the examination are imposed, and it is anticipated that no qualifications of your opinion will be acceptable other than a qualification concerning the fixed assets balance at July 1, 1955.

The report will include a balance sheet for each fund or fund group, including all funds administered by the agency; a related summary operating statement comparing the original appropriation and the appropriation breakdown with actual operating results; a statement confirming the reconciliation of appropriation balances with the records of the State Auditors; and, if feasible, a summary functional breakdown of

operations in sufficient detail to be helpful in judging fiscal performance.

It is anticipated that the preliminary work in connection with this examination will start during the month of May, 1959. You will, of course, include a survey of the internal control and you will submit a copy of this survey with your resultant audit program to the Auditor General and Southern Illinois University on or before June 30, 1959. It is contemplated that in this examination special emphasis will be placed upon the auditing of operations, and the accounting procedures and related practices

of residence centers in Madison and St. Clair Countics as well as Auxiliary Enter-

It is agreed that Southern Illinois University will have their statements in work paper form on or before August 31, 1959, and that these statements, or copies thereof, will be available for your use. It is contemplated that your opinion, or your denial of opinion with reasons pertaining to these statements, will be received by both Southern Illinois University and the Auditor General by September 30, 1959.

Typing of the report will be undertaken by employees of Southern Illinois University and will be completed by October 16, 1959. Your approval of the typed exhibits and schedules will be given within five working days of the time the typed exhibits and schedules are submitted to you. The right to review final printing proofs with a representative of Southern Illinois University is extended to you.

It is anticipated that footnotes and pertinent explanatory comments and your

opinion will be included in this report.

It is further agreed that a separate report of recommendations will be submitted by you to Southern Illinois University and the Auditor General by September 30, 1959.

It is further agreed that both the Business Manager's report and the fiscal management letter will be reviewed in rough draft form by all contracting parties.

The final Business Manager's report will be the printed report of Southern Illinois University and will include your opinion addressed to the Trustees of Southern Illinois University and to the Auditor General of the State of Illinois.

If, during the course of the examination, serious deficiencies in internal control are discovered, or unusual transactions make necessary major modification of the original audit program sufficient to affect the maximum fee, you will contact the Auditor General in Springfield and the President of Southern Illinois University.

It is agreed that the fee billed, including expenses, for this audit will not be in

excess of \$7,500,00.

Billings are to be made on State invoice-voucher forms and will show man hours and rates by class of accountant, the actual travel costs and out-of-pocket expenses. Two-thirds of the charges will be billed to Southern Illinois University and one-third to the Department of Audits of the State of Illinois.

If these arrangements are agreeable, will you so indicate by signing each of the attached carbon copies of this letter and returning two to Southern Illinois University

and two to the Auditor General in Springfield.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by George T. THE MAY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on beginning at 10 A M

May 22, 1959, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Melvin C. Lockard, Mrs. Stella Collins, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Martin F. Oehmke, George T. Wilkins. Mr. Sturgis was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President George H. Hand, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Assistant to the President Edward V. Miles, Jr., Business Manager Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on April 1, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Martin F. Oehmke, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-laws of the Board of Trustees, notice of the intention to request amendment to Part III, Article III, Section 2, F, was mailed to each member of the Board on April 13, 1959.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board unanimously adopted an amendment to the section designated, to read as follows:

F. The Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus.

The Chief Executive Assistant for the Southwestern Illinois Campus shall exercise, under the President, general executive and coordinating responsibility

as defined in Article IV, Section 15, for all instructional, research, and service programs offered in Madison and St. Clair Counties. He shall perform such other duties as may be assigned him by the President.

Matters Presented by President Morris

The following matters were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) POLICY FOR RELEASING INFORMATION RELATIVE TO STUDENTS' OFFICIAL ACADEMIC RECORDS

At the April 1, 1959, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the following policy concerning the release of information relative to students' official academic records was approved in principle:

A transcript is sent, issued, or released only upon a student's request or with his permission, except that such permission is not required when University staff members or offices, other educational institutions, and governmental agencies request transcripts for official purposes.

Information supplied upon employers' inquiry blanks is recognized as separate and distinct from official transcripts, not necessarily following transcript specifications, but subject to the same limitations. Good faith and fair play respecting the student, the University, and the employer are governing factors in the preparation of these blanks.

Information concerning dates of attendance and degrees earned is, however, supplied upon anyone's request.

It is now requested that this statement be formally approved as the policy of Southern Illinois University.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke the Board unanimously approved the statement of policy presented.

(B) PROPOSED TUITION INCREASES

The Board of Trustees last increased tuition rates at the May 16, 1957, meeting. These increased rates became effective with the fall term, 1957. Since that time the costs of education have increased, and studies made both by the University and other agencies have indicated the regrettable necessity of increasing tuition rates effective with the fall term, 1959. Following is a table showing the present tuition and proposed tuition rates:

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it renew and reaffirm with Treasurer Lohman the agreement for the purchase of \$2,300,000.00 Student Center Bonds, Series A of 1958, with the exception of Section 6, requiring the deposit of \$230,000.00 to bind the agreement, which section shall be waived; and that the said deposit of \$230,000.00 be returned to the State Treasurer.

The Board meeting was adjourned at 11:45 A.M., and members of the Board and University administrators visited the Computing Center. Following lunch, the Board re-convened in executive session, followed by an open meeting at which Mr. Charles Pulley, University Architect, and the following guests appeared: Mr. Blaney Miller, Mayor of Carbondale; Mr. Edward Helton, Carbondale City Attorney; Mr. William Ridgeway, State's Attorney; Mrs. Hallie Parrish, Carbondale Township Supervisor; and Mrs. June Snider, Chairman of the Jackson County Board of Supervisors. Chairman John Page Wham extended the Board's welcome and stated the purpose of the meeting to be a consideration of zoning as it affects the University, the City of Carbondale, and Jackson County.

Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman briefly reviewed the provisions of House Bill 834, which would authorize the Board of Trustees to zone the

University and adjacent areas.

Mr. Pulley traced the development of relationships regarding zoning between the University and the City of Carbondale, the Carbondale Chamber of Commerce Committee on Zoning, and H. W. Lochner &


Company, Chicago.

After extended discussion, it was agreed by the representatives of the three legal bodies assembled, namely, the Jackson County Board of Supervisors, the Carbondale City Council, and the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, that each would appoint a representative to meet and examine the possibility of employing a professional planner to the end of effectively zoning the area involved. After the costs of such a study have been determined, each of the bodies will decide whether they can finance their proportionate share. In view of this discussion, the Board agreed to withdraw its support of House Bill 834.

Mr. Pulley and the Board's guests were excused from the meeting.

In a discussion of current and pending University matters, President Morris stated that Governor Stratton had agreed to increase the proposed capital budget by \$1,225,000.00, and to increase the proposed operating budget by \$4,700,000.00, from General Revenue, and to restore the reduction from the estimated income fund.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:45 P.M.





JUNE 17, 1959

THE JUNE MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Wednesday, June 17, 1959, beginning at 10 A.M.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on May 22, 1959, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board:

(A) INTER-DEPARTMENTAL TEACHER TRAINING CURRICULA

The smaller public schools of Illinois need teachers of somewhat broader training and less narrow specialization than is required in the larger schools. To explore this need, Dean John Erle Grinnell of the College of Education, in co-operation with Dean T. W. Abbott of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, has appointed a number of inter-departmental committees representing the departments which might contribute to the broad curricula required.

As a result of the work of these committees, Dean Grinnell has requested permission to develop inter-departmental curricula or majors in the following

fields:

- 1. Health and Physical Education
- 2. Biology
- 3. General Science
- 4. Language Arts
- 5. Social Studies

Dean Grinnell states that his proposal does not seek to eliminate specialized majors in single departments which are in constant demand in the larger public schools, nor does he envision adding new departments. The purpose of his proposal is to authorize the development of inter-departmental curricula as needed for training teachers for the public schools. There is a particular urgency in the field of science. Many smaller schools are not now offering life science or physical science because they cannot find teachers who can handle more than one science.

It is therefore recommended that the College of Education, in collaboration with the other colleges and schools of the University, be permitted to develop inter-departmental curricula for training teachers in the following broad areas: Health and Physical Education, Biology, General Science, Language Arts, and Social Studies.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board unanimously approved the establishment of inter-departmental teacher training curricula, as recommended.

(B) progress report on 1959-1960 annual internal budget

The budget preparation is proceeding slowly because of the number of major and minor decisions which have to be made because of the rigidity of the budget. Proposals for all types of allocations are being reviewed and consultations are being held at the various necessary levels. If the proper steps are followed in the budget preparation, it will be difficult to have even a rough copy ready for the Board of Trustees' meeting on June 17th.

In executive session, President Morris and Budget Officer Clarence W. Stephens explained to the Board the procedures being followed in preparing the annual internal budget, including the general pattern of salary increases; the allowance for expansion positions; and allotments to chief fiscal officers for wages, small equipment, travel, and other current expense items. These general procedures were approved by the Board.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris presented to the Board the format of a proposed publication designed as a dignified and impressive statement of the objectives of the University. He indicated that such a publication would be impressive by its quality and nature and could be used in many ways to convey to the public a representation of Board and University policy.

The history of the proposed publication was briefly reviewed. Reinhard Rutenbeck, a German student, produced and presented photographs featuring the statement of objectives, using quotations from the statement as captions for appropriate accompanying photographs. Mr. Charles Feirich, Field Representative, had visualized the proposed publication as one of prestige, clearly distinguished from other brochures,

leaflets, and bulletins published by the University.

President Morris stated that it was proposed to use the student's photograph of the objectives panel and dedicatory plaque for the cover of the folder, displayed in two colors, followed by the accompanying photographs. He indicated that the University Printing Service could produce 3,000 copies for approximately \$700.00, or 10,000 copies for approximately \$1,400.00. He stated that formal action by the Board was unnecessary, but that the reaction of the Board was requested concerning the desirability of a publication of this kind. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that the project was highly desirable.

President Morris indicated that a small University chapel was being considered for the campus, to be located on the knoll just to the side of Grand Avenue. Drawings prepared by students in the two-year architectural drafting program at the Vocational-Technical Institute were displayed for consideration by the Board. Various procedures for seeking private funds to cover construction costs, as well as for selecting a design for the chapel, were discussed.

President Morris requested authority to present a specific proposal for procedure at the next meeting of the Board. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that the administration should study the matter and present a formal statement of procedure, as requested.

The meeting was adjourned at 5 P.M.

LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

To Members of the Board of Trustees:

- 1. This budget covering the allocation of the University's income for the year beginning July 1, 1959, be approved.
- 2. The President of the University be authorized in accordance with the needs of the University and the equitable interests involved and within the total income (a) to make such changes and adjustments as are needed, (b) to make such additional appointments as are necessary, and (c) to accept resignations.

All the above is subject to the By-laws, Statutes, and Regulations of the Board of Trustees.

House Bill No. 1518 (71st. G.A.)

A BILL

For an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

Section 1. The following named sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, respectively, for the objects and purposes hereinafter named, are appropriated to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University:

The following named sums, or so much thereof as may be necessary, respectively, for the purposes named, are appropriated from the Southern Illinois University Income Fund to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to meet the ordinary and contingent expenses of Southern Illinois University:

INTRODUCTION

ESTIMATED ENROLLMENTS

The estimates of income for 1959-60 are in part based upon estimates of enrollment. The following summary statement shows estimated enrollments for Southern Illinois University. The figures are cumulative for the four quarters of the academic year:

There are several types of on-campus degree students, not all of them producing cash income. Each non-veteran produces \$42.00 per twelve-weeks term. Students on

state scholarships and faculty members taking university courses produce no cash income for educational operations. Veterans of the Korean War do not take the place of World War II veterans as a source of income, since under Public Law 550 they at most pay the same tuition as non-veterans.

PERSONAL SERVICES-FACULTY, ADMINISTRATIVE, AND NON-ACADEMIC

1. It has been possible to recommend substantial increases in salary for members of the faculty and administrative staffs. These increases have been made on a merit basis through careful evaluation of individuals. An attempt has also been made to increase the spread of faculty salaries to bring them closer into line with the spread now prevailing at other universities.

In contrast to past practices, merit salary increases will be given during each year of the biennium rather than the first year of the biennium only. Of the \$3,000,000 provided for salary increases, \$1,000,000 is to be used during each year of the biennium as follows:

It should be noted that the market for qualified teaching and research personnel has continued to become more competitive as the demand has increased much more than the supply. A factor which has become quite important during the past few years is the increasing demand by industries and governmental agencies for personnel having the kind of training which university faculty members have. The result is that universities must now compete not only among themselves, but with these other agencies, for staff members. At the same time rapidly increasing college and university enrollments are requiring large increases in the teaching staffs of collegiate institutions.

The salary increases recommended in this budget will probably not improve the ability of Southern Illinois University to obtain and hold good faculty members. The market has been changing so rapidly that the institution may anticipate many staffing difficulties in the near future. Other institutions are increasing their salary levels as fast or faster than Southern.

- 2. It has been possible in this budget to make general increases for low-salaried office workers and other civil service employees whose scale has been low and who have been falling behind those civil service workers who receive prevailing rates or whose salaries are determined by negotiation. The new salaries are consonant with the ranges established by the University Civil Service System.
- 3. A considerable amount of the additional personal service money has gone into extending on a two-year basis positions added in 1958-59 to meet emergency conditions brought about by the large enrollment increases; to replacing on a permanent basis temporary people employed on an emergency basis; and to adding positions to departments and offices to handle increased enrollments. Little or nothing could be done to upgrade the quality of our programs, or to develop additional services.
- 4. Salary rates for persons on leave without pay are shown in parentheses since they do not affect actual expenditures.

PERSONAL SERVICES-STUDENT

1. A total of \$1,058,115 has been provided for student help from State Appropriations as compared to about \$911,000 during the 1958–59 fiscal year. It is planned in the future to use more, rather than less, student help in the various offices, in laboratories, and in the physical plant. Excellent students with financial need, providing they have the necessary skills or abilities as shown from testing programs, are given the first opportunity in finding campus jobs.

- 2. The pay scale for student employees is the same as for the 1957–59 biennium, ranging from 80 cents to \$1.15 per hour on the Carbondale campuses, and from 80 cents to \$1.25 per hour on the Residence Centers campuses.
- 3. Pre-service training programs have been developed for office workers, food service workers, photographic workers, and workers in parts of the library. In-service training programs are provided for many of the different kinds of workers in the physical plant.
- 4. Great care is being exercised in coordinating the class and work programs of students. Whenever possible, a student is placed in work related to his major or minor study areas.

TRAVEL

- 1. In order to provided equitable distribution and more effective control of travel funds, the allotments for travel are made in four categories as follows:
 - a. Institutional travel, which involves travel on University business not identified with a specific department or office.
 - b. Convention travel, which involves travel to conferences, conventions, and professional meetings. This has been allocated on a pro rata basis to the major functions of the University, and will be distributed from the offices of the vice-presidents, the deans of major educational units, the director of the Office of Student Affairs, and the director of the Area Services office.
 - c. Departmental travel, which involves travel that departments and offices must do in order to perform their regular functions.
 - d. Air travel, which involves travel where additional convenience and speed serve the best interests of the University.
- 2. Travel allotments to the various accounts will be used in part for travel in University-owned passenger automobiles. Since the operating cost of these automobiles is chargable against state appropriations other than travel and such costs are passed on to departments and offices using such service, the allotments for travel exceed the state appropriations for travel.

EQUIPMENT

- 1. With the purchase of an increasing number of books, the proportionate amount of equipment money necessary to purchase small equipment, under \$75 per item, has increased. Including the amount assigned to the Library for the purchase of books, about 44 per cent of the equipment money has been distributed to the departments and offices for the purchase of small equipment.
- 2. Approximately 56 per cent of the equipment money will be placed in a general account to be allotted periodically as studies of needs determine. These studies should show whether or not there are any items of equipment needed for general University use that have not been purchased by the departments and whether or not certain departments have special needs which have not been met by the appropriations hitherto made to them.

OTHER CURRENT EXPENSES

- 1. Since travel and equipment have been allotted separately in this budget, Other Current Expenses include contractual services, commodities, stationery-printing-office supplies, employer contributions to the University Retirement System, refunds, and awards and grants for scholarships.
- 2. The film rental service of the Audio-Visual Education department will charge other departments for the use of instructional films. On the basis of experience, allocations have therefore been made to the departments to be used for this specific purpose.
- 3. The problem of providing for the on-campus expenses of interviewees, consultants, and other official visitors to the campus has been met by allotting limited funds for this purpose to the offices that handle convention travel.

GENERAL COMMENTS

- 1. In general the various programs have been allocated operational funds which are comparable to those allocated for the 1958–59 fiscal year. The allocations obviously do not provide for growth caused by the increasing number of students or for the expenditures necessary as the functions of departments are increased. Allocations of operational funds have been somewhat increased for the Residence Centers campuses but may prove to be inadequate because of unpredictable enrollment increases.
- 2. The University's internal operating budget includes recommended budget allocations for restricted funds, that is, funds not appropriated to the University from General Revenue or University Income Fund. Income for restricted funds is provided from instructional, research, and student aid grants made by outside agencies, from University student activity fees, and from other sources. Also included for information are the estimated operations of the University's Service and Revolving Funds. The titles of all such accounts, as well as those of auxiliary enterprises, are enclosed in parentheses.
- 3. More graduate assistantships have been budgeted to the schools and colleges than in past years. The deans will distribute the assistantships among the departments in accordance with the needs for the instructional services and the availability of suitable candidates.
- 4. Budgeting was decentralized in preparing the internal budget for the 1959-60 fiscal year. Each officer of the University was given a lump sum of money for Salaries which he distributed to his departments for extending existing salaries, raising salary levels, and adding new positions. The same procedure of lump sum allocations was used for the distribution of Wages, Travel, Other Current Expenses, and Equipment monies.
- 5. The budget has been produced by the punched card process and has been run off on IBM machines. In order to adapt the budget to mechanization, it has been "streamlined" in certain respects, but explanatory notes and an index have been added to make it as easy to use as possible.
- 6. A different grouping of accounts has been used in the 1959–60 internal budget. The Residence Centers accounts, including Auxiliary Enterprises, have been separated from the Carbondale campuses accounts and have been placed following the Carbondale accounts.
- 7. For purposes of classifying and controlling positions, each member of the staff has been assigned a position number, which appears in front of his name.
