## GENERAL INFORMATION.

You are asked to note carefully following sections from the certificating law:

SEC. 6. Limited certificates shall be as follows:

First. A limited supervisory certificate shall be valid for four years for teaching and supervising in any and all grades of the common schools. It shall be issued to persons who have completed 120 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning including 15 semester hours in education and who have taught successfully for four years in the common schools. It shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

This certificate shall be issued upon a successful examination to applicants who have completed 60 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning and who have taught successfully for four years in the common schools. The examination shall include English, educational psychology, sociology, the principles and methods of teaching and school administration. When obtained by examination this certificate shall be renewable once upon certified evidence that the applicant has completed a total of 90 semester hours and a second time upon certified evidence that the applicant has completed the requirements for a bachelor's degree in a recognized higher institution of learning with a minimum of 120 semester hours. Thereafter, it shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

Second. A limited high school certificate shall be valid for four years for teaching and supervising in the higher six grades of the common schools. It shall be issued to graduates of a recognized higher institution of learning with a bachelor's degree whose college credits shall include the following: Fifteen semester hours in education, and electives sufficient to make up 120 semester hours. It shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

This certificate shall be issued upon a successful examination to applicants who have completed 60 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning. The examination shall include English, educational psychology, the principles and methods of secondary education and seven high school subjects chosen from a list prescribed by the Examining Board, one subject shall be chosen from each of the following groups: (1) mathematics, (2) history, (3) science, (4) foreign language or English literature, or American literature. When obtained by examination this certificate shall be renewable once upon certified evidence that the applicant has completed a total of 90 semester hours, and a second time upon certified evidence that the applicant has completed the requirements for a bachelor's degree in a recognized

higher institution of learning with a minimum of 120 semester hours. Thereafter it shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

Third. A limited special certificate shall be valid for four years for teaching and supervising the special subject or subjects named in the certificate in any and all grades of common schools. It shall be issued to persons who have completed 60 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning including 12 semester hours in education and 20 semester hours in each subject named in the certificate. It shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

This certificate shall be issued upon a successful examination to applicants who have completed 30 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning. The examination shall include English, the principles and methods of secondary education and the special subject or subjects named in the certificate. When obtained by examination this certificate shall be renewable once upon certified evidence that the applicant has completed a total of 60 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning including not less than 20 semester hours in each of the special subjects named in the certificate. Thereafter, it shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

Fourth. A limited kindergarten-primary certificate shall be valid for four years for teaching and supervising in the kindergarten and in the first and second grades of the common schools. It shall be issued to graduates of a recognized kindergarten-primary training school who have completed 60 semester hours of work in such institution. It shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

This certificate shall be issued upon a successful examination to applicants who have completed 30 semester hours of work in a recognized kindergarten-primary training school. The examination shall include, English and the theory and practice of kindergarten and primary work. When obtained by examination this certificate shall be renewable once upon certified evidence that the applicant has completed the remaining 30 semester hours of work required for graduation from a recognized kindergarten-primary training school. Thereafter, it shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

Fifth. A limited elementary school certificate shall be valid for four years for teaching and supervising in the lower ten grades of the common schools. It shall be issued to persons who have completed 60 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning including 10 semester hours in education, 5 of which shall be practice teaching. It shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.



This certificate shall be issued upon a successful examination to applicants who have completed 30 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning including 5 semester hours in education. The examination shall include: Physiology, penmanship, grammar, reading, orthography, geography, History of the United States, Illinois history and civics, arithmetic, the State Course of Study, principles and methods of teaching, general science, algebra, English, European history, and two of the five sciences; botany, zoology, physics, chemistry and physiography. When obtained by examination this certificate shall be renewable once upon certified evidence that the applicant has completed a total of 60 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning. Thereafter, it shall be renewable for periods of four years upon successful teaching experience and professional growth.

Sixth. A provisional elementary school certificate shall be valid for four years for teaching in the lower eight grades of the common schools. It shall be issued to applicants who have completed 30 semester hours of work in a recognized higher institution of learning including 5 semester hours in education.

This certificate shall be issued to graduates of a recognized four year high school upon a successful examination in physiology, penmanship, grammar, reading orthography, geography, History of the United States, Illinois history and civics, arithmetic, the State Course of Study, principles and methods of teaching and general science.

This certificate shall be renewable, once only, and shall not be issued after July 1, 1931. The holder of such certificate obtained on credits or by examination may exchange the same at any time prior to its expiration for a limited elementary school certificate upon filing with the Examining Board certified evidence of having met the requirements for a limited elementary school certificate.

### **Location, Etc.**

Carbondale is a city of nearly 7,000 inhabitants, with many refined people. It is easy of access, and offers inducements for board and social advantages beyond most places of its size. It has, perhaps, fewer temptations to idleness, and combines religious and educational privileges in a degree greater than the average town of its size. Parents may be assured that their children will be as safe as in any school away from home, and students may come here and feel assured that economy and industry will be respected and honored by their fellow students and by the faculty. The Illinois Central Railroad affords ample facilities for convenient access, three of its branches passing through Carbondale.

### **Terms of Admission.**

All applicants for admission must present evidence of good moral character and, to secure free tuition, they must agree to teach in the public schools of the State for a time not less than that covered by their attendance upon the school. This agreement must not be



entered upon unless the applicant fully intends to teach. It may become void, however, if engagement to teach cannot be secured by reasonable effort. In case of a permanent change in plan, the individual is expected to pay to the registrar of the Institution the difference between the regular tuition for the entire time and the incidental fees he has paid.

All other entrance requirements and all graduation requirements are provided for in the following rules adopted by the Board of Trustees of the five Normal Schools:

1. Graduates of any recognized four-year high school or academy may be admitted to any standard two-year or other curriculum of college rank.

2. Fifteen units of entrance credit from a recognized high school shall be the minimum requirement for admission to such standard curriculums of college rank.

*All credentials should be filed in advance of registration.*

Of 15 year credits required for entrance, the 5 units of List A are prescribed for all courses. Of the 10 units that remain, 6 must be selected from List B. The remaining 4 units may be selected from List B or List C or both.

#### ADVANCED STANDING.

1. Credits for advanced standing may be obtained:
  - a. By transfer from recognized higher institutions.
  - b. By examination.  
 (In order to pass off a subject by examination the student must apply to the President for permission, and no examination may be given to any student except at the beginning of the student's school year).
  - c. By earning the credit by work done in, or under the direction of the normal school.
2. Students coming from state normal schools in other states whose standards are the same as obtain in Illinois, may receive full credit for the work accomplished in such schools.
3. Students from city teacher-training schools in Illinois shall receive credit only after the training school has been inspected by a member of the faculty of the normal school in whose supervision district the training school lies, and his recommendation confirmed by the action of the normal school presidents' council.
4. No credits shall be given for high school work in excess of the units required for graduation.
5. No credit except by examination shall be given for work done in business college or like unrecognized institutions unless such credit is recommended by the teacher in the normal school in whose class the student has done one term's work.
6. Graduates of recognized colleges and universities may be admitted to a one-year curriculum.
7. Undergraduates of recognized colleges and universities may enter the normal school and receive credit for such of their college work as will apply to the curriculum upon which they enter.

#### College Entrance Examinations.

College entrance examinations may be taken only at the beginning of the student's school year. Students who wish to enter the college but whose high school work is incomplete may make up by these examinations any deficiency, provided it does not exceed 10 of the 15 year credits required for entrance. Entrance examinations are not given in the laboratory subjects such as Chemistry, Physics, Biology, Manual Arts, Agriculture, Domestic Science.

Any person who wishes to take these examinations must apply in writing at least two weeks before the examinations, submitting an official list of the high school credits already earned and stating the subjects in which the candidate wishes to be examined.

The student's credits earned in high school and by these examinations must satisfy the entrance requirements of the college which are given on page 22 of this catalog.

The questions of these examinations will be based on the description of courses in the high school manual of the University of Illinois. A copy of this manual may be seen in the office of the local high school principal or in some cases may be obtained from the University. Additional information may be obtained by writing this school.

### Graduation.

Every candidate for graduation must file application with the Registrar not later than the beginning of the Spring Term.

Each candidate should appear before the Committee on Graduation to have his record checked at least ninety days before the date of his expected graduation.

### Expenses.

The State Normal School Board has established the following regulations in the matter of fees paid by students enrolled in any of the State Teachers Colleges of Illinois. The paragraphs below are taken from the minutes of the Normal School Board meeting held at Carbondale, Ill., April 29, 1926:

1. The total fees to be charged a student in any of the Normal Schools shall not exceed the maximum sum of \$15.00 per term.

2. A pledge shall be exacted from all students attending any of the Normal Schools of the State of Illinois to teach in the public schools of Illinois for a period equal to the time spent in said schools.

3. While the Normal Schools are organized primarily for the training of teachers, the demands at present seem to justify admitting students who do not pledge themselves to teach, and all such students shall be required to pay tuition fee of not less than \$25.00 per term, which is the same fee as that provided for high school students.

4. The following is a schedule of fees for special services:

5. There shall be no fee for diploma.

6. Student activity assessment shall be left with the various student bodies but provision must be made for the proper handling and auditing of all such accounts under the direction of the governing bodies.

The "Students Activity Fee" has been fixed by the Student Council of this institution at \$2.00 per term for 1929-30.

**Anthony Hall.**

With the beginning of the Fall Term, 1913, the Woman's Building, Anthony Hall, was opened. This model school home for girls will accommodate about seventy students. It was erected and furnished at a cost of \$75,000, and every possible provision has been made for the comfort, safety and well being of its inmates. Board and lodging in this ideal boarding house will be furnished at \$7.00 per week. We reserve the right to charge a higher rate if it becomes necessary.

A deposit fee of \$5.00 must accompany each application for room, and this deposit will under no circumstances be refunded.

**Other Student Homes in Carbondale.**

Much of a students success depends upon the conditions at his boarding and rooming place. He must have not only fresh air, pure water, wholesome food, even temperature and good light in his study room, but also favorable conditions for study and for sleep. The following conditions as applied to rooming places meet the approval of the faculty:

On the part of the householder—

1. Men and women not to room in the same house.
2. Premises hygienically clean and supplied with good, sanitary water.
3. Good light in study rooms and rooms heated to not less than 68 degrees.
4. Telephone accessible.
5. Parlor furnished at reasonable times.



6. Reports to the University authorities of the illness of students, and of habits of study, sleep, or recreation on the part of students if these are likely in any way to injure the health, reputation or character of the student, or to interfere with the success of his work in school, or to bring discredit upon the school.

On the part of the student—

1. Quiet and order in the house at all times.
2. Proper care of furniture and premises.
3. Repair of damages beyond ordinary wear.
4. Householder to be notified when students expect to be away from the house later than 10:30 P. M.
5. Absence from town to be reported to the householder and address left.

6. Vigorous co-operation on the part of both student and householder, in cases of contagious diseases within the house, to prevent the exposure of others and the spread of the disease.

There are three modes of living practiced by the students.

1. Board and room in the same house. The cost of board and room is from \$6.00 to \$9.00 per week.

Room with light-housekeeping. Students who practice light-housekeeping are able to reduce their living expense as low as \$4.00 a week.

3. Rooms without the privilege of light-housekeeping. Such rooms, two persons to the room, cost \$1.50 to \$2.50 per week per person.

Except in unusual cases, the committee believe that two occupants in a room secures the best results. Be sure to have it clearly understood how many are to occupy a room with you and how many occupants there will be in the house.

No contract for a room will be considered binding unless a deposit amounting to one week's rental shall be paid. Said deposit need not be returned unless the renter has good reasons for failing in his part, and not then except he notify said landlady three days before the term of school opens.

Many serious complications will be avoided if students will consult the Housing Committee before engaging rooms. Some houses, now open to students, *are not recommended by the committee*. The committee urges students to secure a copy of the house regulations.

### Free Instruction in Instrumental Music.

The free instruction in violin and other stringed instruments, cornet and other brass instruments, has proved very successful. Encouraged by the interest in the violin, cornet work, etc., the management has opened three music rooms, each provided with a piano,

and an organ has been added to the equipment, so that any student who wishes to prepare himself to lead the music in his school with either the organ or piano, may be accommodated.

### **Literary Societies.**

#### **ZETETIC AND SOCRATIC.**

Within the first term of the first year of the Institution, September, 1874, the Zetetic Literary Society was organized. Later in the year a sister organization was planned for, and in due time was thoroughly established and christened the Socratic Literary Society. These have a large membership and are well attended.

The more elaborate exhibition of what these societies are able to do is annually given to the public on Monday and Tuesday evenings of Commencement Week.

The varied programs of these literary societies from week to week add very materially to the work of the English department in securing additional practice in the delivery of original and other matter, and in the opportunity for becoming acquainted with parliamentary usages, thus fitting the student for more intelligent service in the communities in which he may labor.

The Faculty and Board of Trustees foster, with much care, the best interests of these valuable adjuncts to the literary work of the Institution. Their usual time of meeting is on Friday evening of each week in the halls provided by the School.

### **Attendance Upon Church.**

Students are urged to identify themselves at an early date after entering the Normal School, with some church of the city. It is assumed, of course, that the student will affiliate with the church to which he belongs at home, or with which he is most in sympathy as to doctrine and modes of worship.

### **Christian Associations.**

The Young Men's Christian Association and the Young Women's Christian Association each has a well-conducted organization, which meets weekly in a room fitted for their use on the second floor in the Library Building. Their committees look after new students upon their arrival, and those who may be sick while attending school, and in many ways minister to the wants of their fellow students. Several classes in Bible study are maintained by these societies. The State college secretaries of each of these branches of Christian work pay the Institution a visit twice a year, or oftener, for conference and direction of work. New students upon their arrival may recognize the representatives of these associations by special badges worn, indicating their willingness to render their kindly services whenever needed. These persons may be trusted implicitly in directing strangers to boarding houses and clubs.

## **School Health Service.**

DELIA CALDWELL, M. D.

This department was established at the beginning of the school year 1920-21 and was placed in charge of a graduate physician of wide experience in general practice.

It is the province of the department to have a general supervision of the health of the students. The physician in charge has an office in the school, keeping office hours, during which any student may have the benefit of diagnosis and advice on any medical point. Instructions will be given about the care of the health and methods of treating cases of simple illnesses. It is not the policy of the department to prescribe or to give specific professional assistance, except to render first aid in cases of accidental injuries or sudden illnesses occurring during school activities. All students requiring medical services beyond this are referred to outside physicians, wherever possible, to the family physician of the student.

An important part of the work of this department is to guard against the spread of communicable disease in the school. Every effort is made to detect such diseases in their incipency and to promptly exclude such cases from the school, in accordance with the requirements of our State Departments of Health.

Another part of the health service of the school is the physical examination of every student who registers in the school, which was initiated at the beginning of the school year 1926-27, and is a required part of the school work.

## **COURSES OF STUDY.**

Two basic courses are provided: the Four-Year Course leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Education and the High School Certificate; and the Two-Year Course designed for those preparing for elementary teaching, and leading to a diploma and the Limited Elementary Certificate. Each of these courses is adapted through choice and assignment of subjects to the individual needs of the prospective teacher.

### **THE FOUR-YEAR COURSE.**

#### **Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Education.**

College Requirements—Each candidate must meet the general college requirements with respect to registration and residence, and must also secure credit in approved courses amounting to an aggregate of forty-eight term-credits, (the equivalent of one hundred and twenty semester hours, one hundred and forty-four forty-minute periods of Physical Training not counted). A term-credit represents twelve weeks' work, five periods a week, except in the case of laboratory sciences which require the usual additional periods each week for laboratory work.



In order to receive his bachelor's degree a student must have secured grades not lower than C in subjects aggregating at least three-fourths of the work, prescribed or elective, required for the degree. The system of grading is as follows: A, excellent; B, good; C, fair; D, poor (but passing); E, failure.

A regular graduate of the two-year course who later becomes a candidate for the degree will lose the following two credits made in the two-year course: one-half credit in Penmanship, one-half credit in Manual Arts, and one credit in Arithmetic.

(A) Prescribed Subjects—Rhetoric, 2 or 3 terms, according to the proficiency of the student; Practice Teaching, 3 terms; Health Education, 1 term; Physical Education, 144 forty-minute periods taken without credit.

(B) Group Requirements—Every candidate must offer the minimum of work specified in each of the following groups:

- I. English—At least 2 terms in English and American Literature.
- II. Foreign Language—College French, German, or Latin. At least 3 terms. A student taking his foreign language in his senior year must present four terms in place of three.
- III. History, Political and Social Science—History, Economics, Political Science, Sociology. At least 3 terms.
- IV. Mathematics, and Physical Science—Mathematics, Astronomy, Physics, Chemistry. At least 2 terms.

NOTE—Every candidate for the degree of B. Ed., shall offer a minimum total of 6 terms in Groups IV, and V, combined, with a minimum of 2 terms in each.

- V. Biology and Earth Science—Botany, Bacteriology, Entomology, Geography, Geology, Physiology, Zoology. At least 2 terms. See note under IV.
- VI. Education—At least 9 terms (including 3 terms of Practice).

NOTE—Not fewer than three of the six required courses in Education must be taken in the Senior College. At least one term of Practice Teaching must be done in the student's major subject.

(C) Major Subjects—Each candidate must select some one subject as his major. A major consists of courses amounting to nine terms chosen from among those designated by the Department and approved by the Faculty.

The subjects at present recognized as majors in this college are: Botany, Chemistry, English, French, Geography and Geology, German, History, Latin, Mathematics, Physics, Zoology.

To major in Latin a student must complete five years of college Latin, if he has had no high school Latin; four years of college Latin, if he has had only two years of high school Latin; three years of college Latin, if he has had three or more years of high school Latin.



To major in French, German or Spanish, a student with no previous work in the language chosen must complete four years of college work. If a student comes with two or more years of high school work in the language chosen, he must complete three years of college work.

(D) Minor Subjects—Each candidate must offer in addition to his major, a minor of at least six terms in some one department designated by the major department and approved by the Faculty.

To minor in a foreign language, a student must meet the requirements of the major, less one year of college work.

(E) Elective Subjects—

1. Not more than nine terms in any one subject may be counted for graduation, except in foreign languages, and in special cases with the approval of the Examiners and the Committee on Graduation.

2. A limited amount of credit toward the B. Ed. Degree will be given for courses offered in the special departments of the school, as follows:

*Department of Agriculture*—Agriculture 210, 211, and 212 (Horticulture), Agriculture 105 and 106 (Livestock Judging), Agriculture 101 and 102 (Farm Crops), Agriculture 220 (Teachers Course in Agriculture), Agriculture 205 and 206 (Principles of Feeding), Agriculture 230 (Dairy Production), Agriculture 301 (Soil Physics), Agriculture 306 (Genetics).

The total credit in the Department of Agriculture may not exceed six terms.

*Art Department*—Art 205 (Method Public School Drawing), Art 110 (Principles of Design), Art 115 (Theory of Color), Art 225 (History of Art), Art 310 (History of Architecture), Art 105 (Free-hand Drawing), Art 305 (Freehand Drawing), Art 210 (Commercial Design).

The total credit in the Art Department may not exceed six terms.

*Commercial Department*—Com. 205, 206, and 207 (Accounting—First Year), Com. 305, 306, and 307 (Accounting—Second Year), Com. 210, 211, and 212 (Commercial Law), Com. 315 and 316 (Principles of Economics), Com. 325 (Business Administration), Com. 335 (Financial Organization).

The total credit in the Commercial Department may not exceed six terms.

*Household Arts Department*—Household Arts 105, 106, and 107 (Selection and Preparation of Food), Household Arts 125, 130, and 330 (Clothing), Household Arts 120, 220, and 360 (Nutrition and Dietetics).

The total credit in the Household Arts Department may not exceed six terms.

*Manual Arts Department*—Manual Arts 222 and 223 (Machine Shop Practice), Manual Arts 101, 102, 103, 104 (Mechanical Drawing).

The total credit in the Manual Arts Department may not exceed six terms.

Four courses a term constitute the regular assignment. Two or three terms of rhetoric are required in the freshman year. One term of Health Education is required in the sophomore year. The remaining courses each term are selected with a view to meeting the group requirements as listed above, and furthering the student toward the accomplishment of his major and minor work.

While the work of the freshman and sophomore years is offered in full-year courses, a student may after two terms of a subject (with the exception of the foreign languages), be allowed to substitute a term from some other course for the third term prescribed.

It may be noted again that most of the subjects listed above will be offered in terms other than those in which they are scheduled.

Education and Practice Teaching are required courses in the junior and senior years. Other courses must be so chosen as to complete group requirements, meet the requirement for a major of nine terms and a minor of six terms, and secure through free electives whatever credits may be lacking to make the forty-eight credits necessary for graduation. See Requirements for Degree and Description of Courses as to subjects acceptable for a major and a minor.

## THE TWO-YEAR COURSE.

The two-year course is designed specifically for those who are to teach in the elementary school. A student securing twenty-four term-credits of freshman and sophomore work as outlined below will be graduated with a diploma, and may be recommended for a Limited Elementary Certificate.

A. Subjects Available in the Two-Year Course: Rhetoric 2 or 3 terms; Education 3 terms; Practice Teaching 3 terms; Geography 1 or 2 terms; History 2 terms; Literature 1 or 2 terms; Biology 1 or 2 terms; Chemistry or Physics 1 or 2 terms; Method Music 1 or 2 terms; Drawing 1 or 2 terms; Method Arithmetic 1 term; Method English (Primary or Advanced) 1 term; Method Geography and Method History 1 term; Penmanship and Manual Arts (Primary or Advanced) 1 term; Elective subjects from Agriculture, Household Arts, and Physical Education 3 terms; Health Education 1 term; Physical Education (without credit) 3 terms.

The student will take note of the opportunity afforded to get as much as two terms of a number of subjects. This is of particular importance to those who expect to continue their college work beyond the two-year course.

B. Subjects Prescribed for All: Rhetoric 2 or 3 terms; Education 3 terms; Practice Teaching 3 terms; United States History 2 terms; Arithmetic 1 term; Geography 1 term; Literature 1 term; Biology 1 term; Health Education 1 term; Chemistry or Physics



1 term; Penmanship and Manual Arts 1 term of each with a half-credit in each; Physical Education 144 forty-minute periods (with out credit).

The remaining 6 or 7 credits are to be so selected as to afford the largest amount of definite preparation for the kind of teaching the graduate expects to do.

C. Provision for Differentiation:

- I. Those fitting for primary work should include in their program the following subjects: Child Psychology; Primary Method English; Primary Elementary Construction; Method Music; Public School Drawing; Practice Teaching in the primary grades; and such other prescribed and elective work as is necessary to make up the 24 credits required for graduation.
- II. Those fitting for intermediate and upper-grade teaching should, in the main, include the following subjects: School Management or Measurements; Upper-grade Method English; Upper-grade Manual Arts; Method History and Geography (one-half credit each); Method Music; Public School Drawing; Practice Teaching in the intermediate and grammar grades; and such other prescribed and elective work as may be necessary to make up the 24 credits.
- III. Those preparing for rural school teaching should include the following: Rural Education; Rural Practice Teaching; Method English; Method History and Geography; Method Music; Public School Drawing; and some work in Agriculture, or Household Arts, or both.
- IV. As a means of adapting the two-year course still further to the needs of teachers, the Examiner may, with the consent of the President, make substitutions. In this way, subjects, excepting those in the prescribed group, may in special cases be set aside for additional work in subjects already taken, and for credits (not to exceed three in number) from the Departments of Agriculture, Household Arts, and Physical Education.

*English 101, 102, 103 (9, 9a, 9b). Freshman Rhetoric.* Two or three terms according to the ability of the student. Texts: Composition for College Students (Thomas, Manchester, and Scott), Handbook of Composition (Woolley), M. O. S. Book. Harper's Arthology.

*English 201 (7a). History of English Literature to VRCB.* Texts: Long's Outline Of English Literature: Manly's Prose and Poetry. Prerequisite—three terms of rhetoric.

*English 202 (7a). History of English Literature, 1832-1929.* Long's Outline of English Literature; Manly's Prose and Poetry. History of American Literature. Long's Outline of American Literature with Readings.

*English 205a (10a) English Poetry, Technique; 205b (10b) Classics.* Macbeth, Paradise Lost, Idylls of the King, Princess. Prerequisite, three terms of Rhetoric.

*English 206a (11a) English Prose, Technique; 206b (11b) Classics.* Text: Pancoast's English Prose and Verse; illustrative material drawn from the works of DeQuincey, Macaulay, and Carlyle. Novels studied: Silas Marner, Kenilworth, House of Seven Gables, Henry Esmond, and David Copperfield. Technique of fiction, one-half credit; classics, one-half credit. Prerequisite, three terms of Rhetoric.

*English 210 (8). Public Speaking.* Whole credit will be given to those doing extra work in public speaking. Text: Cumnock's Choice Reading.

*English 211 (8b). Advanced Public Speaking.* Practice in public speaking.

*English 215 (6). English Method.* Theme: How the child works out the problems of expression. This covers the first twelve years of the child's life and extends through the primary and interme-

diates grades. Observation lessons in reading and language in the Training School constitute an important part of the work.

*English 216 (6a). Advanced English Method* (Junior High School). In primary methods, of course, much of the emphasis must be placed upon the mechanics of reading. In advanced method the major emphasis passes over the content of the reading material. Attention is paid to the technique of poetry—to the poet's handling of rhythm, tone, color, and rhyme. In the stories that are used the attention of the class is drawn to the use of scene and setting, plot construction, accessories, character portraiture, use of dramatization, dialogue, humor, etc. Methods in grammar and composition are stressed. Some time is devoted to the study of public speaking.

*English 300 (25). Advanced theme writing.* Course on style and advanced composition, based on Genung's *Working Principles of rhetoric*.

*English 305 (21). Contemporary American Literature.* This course includes a special study of those writers whose books can be used in teaching. Text: Manly and Rickert's *Contemporary American Literature*.

*English 306 (36). Recent American Poetry.* The significant American verse writers of the period 1860 to 1920—Longfellow, Holmes, Emerson, Whittier, Whitman, Lowell, Lanier, Robinson, Frost, and Amy Lowell, with an effort to evaluate the contribution of each, with emphasis upon originality of content and form.

*English 310 (42). Emerson's Essays and Poems.* A study of Emerson's philosophy in prose and poetry.

*English 315 (31). Eighteenth Century Poetry.* Genesis, rise, ascendancy, and decline of Classicism; rise of Sentimentalism; inception of the Romantic Movement. Text: *The Poets of the Eighteenth Century*.

*English 320 (30). British Poets, 1798 to 1830.* The more important poems of Burns, Wordsworth, Shelley and Keats are studied both for technique and content. Text: *British Poets of the Nineteenth Century*, Vol. I.

*English 321 (—). British Poets, 1830-1880.*

*English 325 (16). Victorian Literature.* A survey of the prose and poetry of the Victorian period.

*English 330 (22). Contemporary British Literature.* Text: Manly and Rickert's *Contemporary British Literature*.

*English 335 (15). The Short Story.* This is principally an advanced theme course dealing with the technique of the short story, with illustrative material from the works of the best story writers. Three days will be devoted each week to the study of the story, two days to the writing of original stories.

*English 340 (23). The Essay.* Various types of essay will be read and discussed.

*English 345 (29). Magazine Fiction.* The principles of the short story will be studied in a few classics, but mainly in the fiction in current magazines.



*English 350 (32). Lyric Poetry.* A survey of the English lyric from Shakespeare to the present day. Text: Schelling, *The English Lyric*.

*English 355 (20). Victorian Novel.* A study of representative Victorian novelists.

*English 363 (24). Modern Drama.* This course will include a study of the technique of the Modern Drama, together with the reading of thirty modern plays.

*English 360 (26). Development of the Drama.* Lecture and reading course. A syllabus in the hands of each student will direct the library work. Representative plays will be read showing the development of the drama from the Greek and Roman down to the present period.

*English 365 (14). Shakespeare.* The course consists of a thorough study of *As You Like It*, *King Henry V*, *Hamlet*, and *the Tempest*, with a brief survey of other plays.

*English 366 (38). Shakespeare.* The course consists of an intensive study of *Twelfth Night*, *Richard III*, *King Henry IV Part I*, and *Winter's Tale*, together with readings in the textual critics.

*English 370 (38). Milton.* A study of the poetry of Milton with emphasis on the forms, influences and ethical values. Texts: Cambridge Edition of Milton's Complete Poems, Hanford's *Milton Handbook*.

*English 375 (41). Wordsworth.* A study of Wordsworth's characteristic poems as they reflect his theory of art and his philosophy of human development. Text: Oxford Edition of Standard Authors.

*English 380 (17). Old English.* Grammar and easy reading. Text: Bright's Anglo-Saxon Reader. Some reading of Old English will be done, but principally we shall trace the development of our language, and account for the presence in it of many irregular forms. Prerequisite—one year of foreign language.

*English 384 History of the English Language.*

*English 385 (18) English Method.* This course is open to those who have had two years of college literature. The methods in teaching grammar, composition and the technique and content of poetry and of prose are all stressed.

## PSYCHOLOGY AND EDUCATION.

*Education 205 (2). Educational Psychology.* A study of the facts and laws of mental life with special reference to the learning and teaching processes. The various principles that underlie effective teaching are developed and illustrated by concrete exercises and problems. Text: Colvin and Bagley's *Human Behavior*, or its equivalent.



*Education 206 (5a). General Psychology.* A study of the fundamental facts and principles of human behavior. Text: Gates' Elementary Psychology, or its equivalent.

*Education 210 (3). Principles of Education.* A systematic study of the fundamental principles of education as derived from the basic sciences of biology, physiology, psychology, and sociology. The principles thus derived are applied in the interpretation and criticism of current and proposed educational theory and practice. Text: Bagley's Educative Process, or its equivalent. Prerequisite: Education 205 or 206.

*Education 215 (11). Elementary General Method.* A detailed study of the various processes of teaching and learning involved in elementary education. Text: Parker's Types of Elementary Teaching and Learning or its equivalent. Prerequisite: Education 205 or 206.

*Education 220 (10). Elementary Measurements.* A course including a study of both intelligence tests and educational tests, involving the classroom use of the important test materials for elementary school pupils. Text: Monroe, DeVoss, and Kelley's Educational Tests and Measurements. Prerequisite: Education 205 or 206.

*Education 225 (1). School Management.* A study of such topics as the first day of school; the organization of the school; the daily program; equipment, sanitation, decoration; the conduct of the recitation; discipline and moral training. Lesson-planning is an important feature of the course. Text: Bagley's Class-room Management, or its equivalent. Prerequisite: Education 205 or 206.

*Education 230 (12). Rural Education.* A course designed for those who expect to teach or supervise country schools. It consists of rural school organization and management, rural school methods, an outline of the state course of study, the maintenance of the rural school library, together with about two weeks of rural sociology. Texts: Eels, Mueller and Swain's Rural School Management, and Ritter and Wilmarth's Rural School Methods. Prerequisite: Education 205 or 206.

*Education 235 (8). Child Psychology.* A course designed especially for those who expect to teach in the lower grades. It undertakes a description of the child mind, dealing especially with the phenomena of growth, physical and mental, and with the instinctive capacities and interests of childhood. Text: Norsworthy and Whitley's Psychology of Childhood, or its equivalent. Prerequisite: Education 205 or 206.

*Education 305 (5). Advanced Educational Psychology.* A description of the bodily organs and mechanisms upon which behavior depends; a discussion of instinctive activities and capacities; a formulation of the general laws of learning and their application to teaching; a study of individual differences. Text: Gates' Psychology for Students of Education, or its equivalent. Prerequisite: Education 205 or 206.

*Education 310 (7a). Principles of Secondary Education.* A study of such topics as adolescence; the history and aims of secondary

education; high school courses of study; high school equipment; and the problems of organization, management, and discipline peculiar to the high school. Text: Koos' *The American Secondary School*, or its equivalent. Prerequisite: Education 305.

*Education 315 (7). High School Method.* A detailed study of the various processes of learning and teaching involved in high school education. Texts: Parker's *Methods of Teaching in High Schools*, and Parker's *Exercises for Methods of Teaching in High Schools*, or their equivalents. Prerequisite: Education 305.

*Education 320 (10a). High School Measurements.* A course including a study of both intelligence tests and educational tests, involving the classroom use of the important test materials for high school pupils. Texts: Ruch and Stoddard's *Tests and Measurements in High School Instruction*, and Freeman's *Mental Tests*, or their equivalents. Prerequisite: Education 305.

*Education 325 (9). School Administration.* This course is designed primarily for those who look forward to positions as supervisors, principals, or superintendents. Texts: Cubberley's *The Principal and His School*, and *The Eighth Year Book of the Department of Elementary School Principals*, or their equivalents. Prerequisite: Education 305.

*Education 330 (4). History of Education.* The chief aim is to afford the teacher the sanity of judgment that comes only by seeing present-day education in perspective against its historical background. It traces the evolution of educational ideals and practice in response to social needs and to the contributions of philosophic and scientific thought. Texts: Graves' *A Student's History of Education*, or its equivalent. Additional readings in Cubberley's *Book of Readings*. Prerequisite: Education 305.

*Education 365 (15). Psychology of High School Subjects.* An analysis of the mental processes exhibited by pupils in studying the various high school subjects, with parallel consideration of effective teaching processes. Text: Judd's *Psychology of Secondary Education*, or its equivalent. Prerequisites: Education 305, 310 and 315.

*Education 370 (6). Educational Sociology.* A consideration of the origin, nature, and functions of society and social institutions. A special study of the relation between society and the individual, and of the practical social problems growing out of the complexity and the rapid development of modern society. Text: Good's *Sociology and Education*, or its equivalent. Prerequisites: Education 305, 310, and 315.

## FRENCH.

Students credited with two years of high school French or one year of college French may major in the subject by obtaining nine additional credits, as follows:

*French 151, 152, 153 (7, 8, 9).* Intensive class reading, and more extensive outside reading, from the following or similar texts: Daudet *Contes*, including *La Belle Nivernaise*; Balzac; Eugénie Grandet; Maupassant: *Selected Short Stories*; *Gil Blas*; dramas of Corneille, Racine, Molière, Hugo, Rostand. Grammar review. Composition.

*French 201, 202, 203.* Class and collateral reading with increased attention to literature. The following and similar works: Pailleron: *Le Monde ou l'on s'ennuie*; Renan: *Ma Soeur Henriette*; stories from Loti, Anatole France etc.; Canfield's *French Lyrics*. Composition.

*French 301, 302, 303.* Continued study of drama, novel and verse. Scientific French Reader. Themes in French.

*Elementary French:*—The following courses are for those who wish to begin French in the college, either to meet the foreign language requirement, or to prepare for a major in French. Those without French must take at least a year's work in these courses before beginning the major. These courses may not be counted as a part of the major.

*French 101, 102, 103 (1, 2, 3).* Holzwarth and Price: *Beginners' French*. Supplementary reading: Worman: *First French Book*; Guerber: *Contes et Légendes I*; Lavissee: *Histoire de France (Cours Moyen)*. Novels of Dumas and Hugo.

## GERMAN.

The following three years of College German, with prerequisite of two years of High School German or of one year of College German, form the course for a Major in German.

*German 151, 152, 153 (7, 8, 9).* Heine: *Die Harzreise*. Hauff: *Lichtenstein*. Freytag: *Die Journalisten*. Hoffmann: *Das Gynasium zu Stolpenburg*. Sudermann: *Frau Serge*. Keller: *Bilder aus der deutschen Literatur*. Schiller: *Wilhelm Tell*. Goethe: *Hermann und Dorothea*.

*German 201, 202, 203.* Frenssen: *Joern Uhl*. Goethe: *Dichtung und Wahrheit*. Lessing: *Emilia Galotti*. Schiller: *Wallensteins Tod*. Scheffel: *Der Trompeter von Saekkingen*. Hauptmann: *Die versunkene Glocke*. Grillparzer: *Die Argonauten*.

*German 301, 302, 303.* Klenze: *Deutsche Gedichte*. Goethe: *Faust*. Technical and Scientific German. Historical and Linguistic Relations between German and English. German Newspapers and other recent prose. Methods of Teaching German.

*Elementary German:*—The following courses are for those who wish to begin German in the college, either to meet the foreign language requirement, or to prepare for a major in German. Those without German must take at least a year's work in these courses before beginning the major. These courses may not be counted as a part of the major.

*German 101, 102, 103 (1, 2, 3).* Mosher and Jenney: *Lern- und Lesebuch*. Gerstaecker: *Germelshausen*. Hillern: *Hoher als die Kirche*. *Deutsche Lieder*.



## LATIN.

College students may begin Latin and receive credit for one or two years. Students having two or more years of high school credit are eligible to college classes.

For advanced students majoring in Latin practice teaching is provided.

*Latin 101, 102, 103 (1, 2, 3). Beginning Latin.* Smith's Elementary Latin is used, the aim being familiarity with the elements of Latin grammar.

*Latin 104, 105, 106 (4, 5, 6). Caesar's Gallic War.* The equivalent of four books is read, Walker's Caesar being the text. Scott's Prose Composition.

*Latin 151 (13). Advanced Composition.* This is useful for teachers and is a convenient review for students. Prerequisite, at least two years.

*Latin 152 (14). Cicero's Essays.* De Senectute and part of De Amicitia. Prerequisite as for Latin 150.

*Latin 153 (15). Livy.* Books I and XXI. Prerequisite as for Latin 150.

*Latin 201 (16). Phormio of Terence.* Prerequisite, 1 year of college Latin.

*Latin 202 (17). Horace, Odes and Epodes.* Prerequisite as for Latin 201.

*Latin 203 (18). Letters of Pliny.* Prerequisite as for Latin 201.

*Latin 301 (19). Cicero's Letters.* Emphasis is laid on the history of the times and the personality of Cicero. Prerequisite, 2 years of college Latin.

*Latin 302 (20). Vergil's Eclogues and Georgics.* The hexameter is carefully studied and Vergil's spirit and contribution to Rome are considered. Prerequisite as for Latin 301.

*Latin 303 (21). Tacitus.* The Agricola and Germania. Prerequisite as for Latin 301.

*Latin 341 (41). Methods in Latin.* A half credit. Deals with the psychology of the subject, objectives, text books, etc. For Senior College students.

In both terms of the summer quarter reading courses are offered for Senior College and for Junior College students.

## GEOGRAPHY AND GEOLOGY.

*Geography 100 (11). Principles of Geography.* This is a prerequisite to all other geography courses. It deals with the essential facts and principles which are necessary to understand or to interpret geography. It is a laboratory course requiring five recitations and two laboratory periods per week.



*Geography 200 (11a). Geography of North America.* Influences of climate, surface features, and natural resources of the continent upon distribution of peoples, their industries, routes of trade, and economic problems. Text: North America by J. Russell Smith. Prerequisite: Geography 100.

*Geography 205 (8). Physiography.* This course has two purposes. First, it is desirable as a physical background for interpretation of continents and countries. Second, it is a prerequisite to a study of rocks and minerals and to historical geology. It is a twelve weeks course with five recitations and two laboratory hours per week. Field trips may take the place of part of the laboratory work. Prerequisite: Geography 100.

*Geography 210 (12). Economic Geography.* Geographic conditions affecting industries, production, and trade of the world. Text: Economic Geography by Whitbeck and Finch. Prerequisite: Geography 100.

*Geography 215 (4a). Primary Methods.* Methods of teaching geography in the first three years, usually grades four, five and six. The course continues only six weeks, one-half credit. Prerequisites: Geography 100 and Education 2.

*Geography 216 (4b). Upper Grade Methods.* This course is primarily for those who wish to teach geography in the upper grades, or for city superintendents, and principals. The course deals chiefly with the meaning, purposes, and methods of teaching geography. It is a six weeks course with five recitations or lectures per week. Prerequisites: Geography 100 and Education 2.

*Geology 300 (9). Rocks and Minerals.* Also first part of Historical Geology. The purpose of this course is to give a working knowledge of most important minerals and rocks, together with their field classification. This is a twelve weeks course with five recitations per week. Prerequisites: Geography 100 and 205.

*Geology 301 (10). Historical Geology.* This course gives a general survey of the field of historical geology. Fossil study sufficient to give a general idea of the development of plant and animal life will also be a part of the course. This is a twelve weeks course with five recitations per week. Field work will be a part of this course. Prerequisites: Geography 100, 205, and 300.

*Geography 305 (13). Advanced Economic Geography.* A study of staple commodities of the world and factors influencing their production, transportation and marketing conditions. Prerequisites: Geography 100, and 210 is advisable.

*Geography 310 (14). Meteorology.* This course is designed to give a more comprehensive knowledge of weather and climate, the greatest physical factor in distribution of life. This is a twelve weeks course with five periods per weeks. Prerequisite: Geography 100.

*Geography 315 (15). Geography of Europe.* A study of life conditions as influenced by climate, relief features, soil, and natural resources. Political and economic conditions. Prerequisites: Geography 100, and 205 is advisable.

*Geography 316 (16). Geography of South America.* World relations of South America. Population, economic conditions, and foreign trade as influenced by climate, relief features, size, shape, and natural resources. Prerequisites: Geography 100 and 205 is advisable.

*Geography 318 (18). Geography of Asia.* Life conditions and economic development as influenced by climate, relief features, soil, and natural resources. Prerequisites: Two courses in geography, including 100.

*Geography 325. Conservation of Natural Resources.* This course is planned to give a survey of our natural resources, the rate of their use, ways they are wasted, and what can be done to extend the life of these resources for future generations. This is a twelve weeks course with five recitations or lectures per week. Prerequisites: Three credits in geography, including 100.

## SOCIAL SCIENCES.

*Hist. 105. Modern Europe, 1500-1815.* This is a survey course in European History which is designed to give the student an appreciation of the broad outlines of the history of western civilization. Required of all history majors.

*Hist. 106 (17). Modern Europe, 1815-1929.* This course naturally follows Hist. 105 and is designed to carry forward in their proper sequence and casual relationships those tendencies which exist in the Europe of today. Required of all history majors.

*Hist. 110 (14). American History, 1763-1860.* This is a survey course in the fundamental aspects of American History from the conquest of New France in 1763 to the southern war for independence in 1861. Required of all students.

*Hist. 111. American History, 1865-1929.* A fundamental course dealing with the main features of American History from Appomattox to the present time. Required of all history majors.

*Hist. 205 (13). English History to 1688.* A survey course in English History covering the period from pre-historic Britain to the fall of Stuart absolutism in 1688. Social and economic factors as a basis for political developments are stressed.

*Hist. 206. English History, 1688-1929.* A survey course in English History from the Bill of Rights in 1689 to the second success of the Labor Party in 1929.

*Hist. 210. Methods of Teaching History.* One-half credit. Designed to aid history instructors by providing actual contacts with historical material and by suggesting means for the presentation of history to grade and high school students.

*Hist. 305 (15 and 16). Ancient Civilizations.* A survey course in the development of Greek and Roman social, economic, and political life.

*Hist. 310 (23). The Middle Ages.* Although feudalism as the outstanding political development of the Middle Ages is stressed, the social phase of European History in this period are not neglected.

*Hist. 315 (35). The Renaissance and Reformation.* Pre-requisite, 305. This is a treatment of the Renaissance of culture and humanism and of the tremendous social and political influence growing out of the Reformation.

*Hist. 320 (24). The French Revolution.* Pre-requisite, 105. This course occupies a middle ground between the old and the new order—the final extinction of the remnants of the feudal system. Beginning with the Old Regime the study is carried through the revolutionary cycle concluding with the fall of the Napoleonic Empire.

*Hist. 325. American Colonial History.* This is an advanced course dealing with the transplanting of European institutions to North America but emphasizing those developments which were most important in determining the establishment and development of the English colonies. A close study is made of the British colonial system and of the growth of the movement for independence. Prerequisite, 105.

*Hist. 330. Middle Period of American History, 1815-1860.* A study of those conflicting sectional and nationalistic forces which characterized this period. Those economic and sectional forces leading to the Civil War are properly stressed. Prerequisite, 110.

*Hist. 335 (27). Recent American History, 1865-1929.* This is intended to be an intensive study of reconstruction, of all those financial and political problems growing out of the Civil War, and of the factors which have brought the United States into the position of a world power. Prerequisites, 110 and 111.

*Hist. 340 (42). History of American Diplomacy.* This is an historical treatment of the political relationship between the Government of the United States and the governments of those nations with which we have come into contact from 1774 to 1929. Prerequisites, 110 and 111.

*Hist. 345 (25). Contemporary European History.* In this course a study is made of the most important social, economic, and political developments in European History from 1870 to the present time. Prerequisites, 105 and 106.

*Pol. Sci. 360. European Governments.* This course is a comparative study of the principal governments of Europe, emphasizing those constitutional developments which took place after the World War. Prerequisite, 105.

*Pol. Sci. 365 (44). American Federal Government.* This is an introductory study of our national government with considerable emphasis upon the sources for our constitution, the political conditions responsible for it, and an analysis of the functions of the various branches of the Government. Prerequisite, 110.



*Pol. Sci. 370 (46). International Relations.* This course includes a study of the theories of world relations and the application of these theories in the past. Particular emphasis is placed upon contemporary international problems and politics. Prerequisites, 105 and 106.

## MATHEMATICS.

The Department of Mathematics offers thirteen full two-and-one-half hour courses, and three half-credit or one-and-three-quarter hour courses with a view of meeting three types of needs of students:

(1) The mathematical requirement for graduation from Junior College; (2) A minimum of fifteen hours of college mathematics to meet the requirements for a special certificate to teach mathematics in two and three year high schools; (3) To meet the requirements of a minimum of twenty-two and a half hours college mathematics for a major in the subject in completing the work for a degree.

*Freshman.*

*Math. 101 (91). College Algebra I.* A course in the algebraic topics usually found in the third semester of high school algebra treated more extensively than in high school. It is a non-credit course for those offering a year and a half of Algebra from a credited high school and who wish to review the course before taking College Algebra II. This course does not transfer to the University unless followed by Math. 102, College Algebra II. Prerequisite: One year of high school Algebra.

*Math. 102 (19a). College Algebra II.* A course such as is usually offered as College Algebra in colleges. Prerequisite: College Algebra I or one and a half years of high school algebra.

*Math. 105 (25). Trigonometry.* The work usually covered in a two and one-half hour course in plane trigonometry. Prerequisite: College Alg. I or one year of High School algebra, and one year of Plane Geometry.

*Math. 110 (30). Method Arithmetic.* A course in the pedagogy and psychology of arithmetic for those who are planning to teach arithmetic in the elementary grades. Problem solving in this course is illustrative and supplementary.

*Sophomore.*

*Math. 201 (27). Analytics I.* Cartesian Coordinates, curve and equation, straight line, circle, polar coordinates, functions and graphs, transformation of coordinates, parabola, ellipse, hyperbola. Prerequisites: Trigonometry and College Algebra II.

*Math. 202 (28). Analytics II.* A special study of conic sections, asymptotes, transcendental curves and equations. Prerequisite: Analytics I.



*Math. 230. Solid Analytics.* A two and a half hour course in such topics as are usually found in such course. Prerequisite: Analytics II.

*Math. 205 (36). Descriptive Geometry.* A short course in the elements of descriptive geometry to prepare for further work in engineering or mechanical courses and to enlarge and enrich the student's space concepts. Prerequisite: Analytics II.

*Senior College.*

*Math. 301 (44). Calculus I.* The elements of differential calculus with applications. Prerequisite: Analytics II.

*Math. 302 (45). Calculus II.* The elements of integral calculus with applications and occasional advance forms of differentiation. Prerequisite: Calculus I.

*Math. 303 (45a). Calculus III.* An extension of Calculus I and II. Multiple differentiations and integrations in connection with special applications.

*Math. 304 (45b). Calculus IV.* A half-credit course extending the work of Calculus III, Summation, mass, mean density, moments, centroids singular points, etc. Offered only during First Summer Term. Prerequisite: Calculus III.

*Math. 305. Differential Equations.* A full credit course covering the topics usually found in a two and a half hour course. Prerequisite: Math. 310.

*Math. 310. (1st Half of Math. 46). The Teaching of High School Algebra.* A half credit course—one and three quarter hours—in the methods of teaching high school algebra. Prerequisite: Col. Alg. II.

*Math. 311. (2nd Half of Math. 46). The Teaching of Plane Geometry.* A half credit course in methods of teaching high school geometry.

*Math. 315. History of Mathematics.* A course in the history of the development of mathematical concepts and processes. Prerequisite: Calculus III.

## CHEMISTRY.

*Chemistry 101 (1a). General Chemistry.* A course for students with no previous instruction in this science. A study of the common non-metals and their compounds is started in this course.

*Chemistry 102 (2a). General Chemistry.* A continuation of the study of the non-metals and their compounds. Prerequisite: Chem. 101.

Mr. Browne, Mr. Scott, Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 103 (3a). General Chemistry.* This course is an introduction to the chemistry of the common metals. Prereq. Chem. 102.

Mr. Browne, Mr. Scott, Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 151 (1b). General Chemistry.* A course designed for those who have had a year of high school chemistry. A course in the chemistry of the non-metals. Prereq.: One year of H. S. Chem.

Dr. Neckers, Mr. Scott.

*Chemistry 152 (2b). General Chemistry.* A continuation of non-metal study and preparations. Prereq.: Chem. 151.

Dr. Neckers, Mr. Scott.

*Chemistry 153 (3b). General Chemistry.* An introduction to the metals and their compounds. Prereq.: Chem. 152.

Dr. Neckers, Mr. Scott.

*Chemistry 201 (7). Qualitative Analysis.* A study of the chemistry of the metals and application to the laboratory separation and identification. Prereq.: Chem. 103 or 153.

Dr. Neckers.

*Chemistry 202 (8). Qualitative Analysis.* A continuation of the work started in Chem. 201, also anion analysis. Identification of alloys, ores, and general inorganic compounds. Prereq.: Chem. 201.

Dr. Neckers.

*Chemistry 252 (10). Quantitative Analysis.* Gravimetric determinations and calculations in the inorganic field. Prereq.: Chem. 201, Math. 105.

Dr. Neckers.

*Chemistry 253 (11). Quantitative Analysis.* Volumetric analysis with the stoichiometrical accompaniments. Prereq.: Chem. 201, Chem. 202 or 252, Math. 105.

Dr. Neckers.

*Chemistry 301 (13). Organic Chemistry.* A study of the compounds of the aliphatic series with laboratory preparations. Prereq.: Chem. 201.

Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 302 (14). Organic Chemistry.* A continuation of the study of the aliphatic series and an introduction to the aromatics. Prereq.: Chem. 301.

Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 303 (15). Organic Chemistry.* A continuation of the study and preparation of compounds of the aromatic series which was started in the preceding course. Prereq.: Chem. 302.

Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 401 (New). Physical Chemistry.* A study of some of the physical aspects of chemical reactions. Prereq.: Chem. 253, Physics 202 or 207.

Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 402 (New). Physical Chemistry.* A continuation of the study of physico-chemical relations. Prereq.: Chem. 401.

Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 423 (New). Advanced Quantitative Analysis.* A course for chemistry majors interested in this field. A continuation in the volumetric field with an introduction to water analysis. Prereq.: Chem. 253.

Dr. Neckers.

*Chemistry 443 (New). Advanced Organic Chemistry.* A course for majors in chemistry interested in advanced work in this field, especially in more difficult syntheses and preparations. Prereq.: Chem. 303.

Dr. Abbott.

*Chemistry 463 (New). History of Chemistry.* A course to furnish a background to those who expect to teach in this field.

## PHYSICS AND ASTRONOMY.

The department is provided with excellent equipment for its work. Two distinct courses of one year in general physics are offered,—one for those who have had no previous training in the subject and one for those who have had one year of high school physics. Beyond these there are eight one term courses, any six of which may be added to 206, 207, 208, to complete a major. Those who have not had high school physics but who desire to take more than one year in college should begin with 206 rather than with 201. Those who plan to major in physics should take the following courses in mathematics as early as practicable, either preceding the courses in physics or simultaneous with them: Numbers 101, 105, 201, 202, 301, 302.

*Physics 201 (2), Mechanics and Sound; 202 (3), Magnetism and Electricity; 203 (4), Heat and Light*, constitute a years' work for those who have had no previous preparation. No mathematics is necessary beyond high school. Millikan, Gale, and Edward's College Physics is the text and Millikan, Gale and Bishop, the manual.

*Physics 206 (6), Mechanics and Sound; 207 (7), Magnetism and Electricity; 208 (8), Heat and Light*, constitute the year's work for those who have had high school physics. Mathematics 100 and 105 are desirable preceding or accompanying these courses but they are not necessary. Stewart's text and Taylor, Watson, and Howe's manual are used.

Mathematics 101 and 105 should precede the following courses:

*Physics 301 (13), Mechanics*, Jameson's Elementary Mechanics is the text.

*Physics 303 (14), Heat*, Randall's text. *Physics 305 (15), Magnetism and Electricity*, Timbie's Elements of Electricity for Technical Students is the text.

Math. 201, 202, 301, and 302 should precede the following courses:

*Physics 306, Magnetic and Electrical Measurements*, various manuals.

*Physics 308 (17), Sound*, Miller's The Science of Musical Sounds is the text.

*Physics 310 (16), Light* Edser's Light for Students. *Physics 312 (18, formerly half credit), Radio*. *Physics 314 (19, formerly half credit), Introduction to Modern Physics*, Richtmeyer's text.

*Astronomy 201 (1) and Astronomy 202 (2)* constitute a two-term course. Duncan's text. Five recitations per week, together with frequent evening observations with and without the telescope, constitute the work. As the students go on in their study from the earth to the moon, the sun, the planets, the stars, and the nebulae, their vision is broadened perhaps as rapidly in this ennobling science as it can be in any subject. The varying phases of the moon



and the inferior planets, the vast distances to the stars, their great magnitude and high velocities, their constitution, temperature, and brilliance appeal especially to those who enjoy thinking along these lines. Those who take the course will find it helpful in presenting the difficult problems of mathematical geography and in vitalizing their nature study work.

*Astronomy 301 and 302.* A heavier course, similar to above, for senior college students. Text, Russell, Dugan, and Stewart.

## BOTANY.

*Botany 101 (Biology 20).* An introductory course in botany, consisting of a study of the vegetative organs of the higher seed plants, their form and structure, physiological activities, and their relations and adjustments to their environment. Attention is given to the identification of the more common trees by their leaf and stem characters. Laboratory and field studies, recitations and lectures. Fall Term.

*Botany 102 (Biology 21a).* A brief study of the morphology of representative plants of the great plant groups, the general classification of plants and the evolution of the Plant Kingdom. Laboratory studies, recitations and lectures. Winter Term.

*Botany 103 (Biology 21b).* A course in systematic botany, consisting of a study of the principles of classification and the use of manuals, and work in classifying and identifying seed plants and ferns of the local flora. Field studies, lectures and recitations. Prerequisite. Botany 102. Spring Term.

*Botany 301 (Biology 22). Morphology of the Thallophytes.* A study of the structures, development and relationship of the groups of the Thallophytes, evolution of the plant body, origin and evolution of sex in plants, paratism and saprophytism in the bacteria and fungi. Laboratory studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103, Fall Term.

*Botany 302 (Biology 23). Morphology of the Bryophytes and Pteridophytes.* A study of the structures, development and relationships of the liverworts and mosses, ferns, equisetum and club-mosses. The problems of evolution of the sporophyte, alternation of generations, and heterospory receive attention. Laboratory studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103, 301. Winter Term.

*Botany 303 (Biology 25). Morphology of the Spermatophytes.* A study of the structures, development and relationships of the Gymnosperms and Angiosperms, the vascular anatomy of these plants, the development of flowers, gametophytes, fertilization, embryology, and the structure and development of seeds. Laboratory studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103, 301, 302. Spring Term.



*Botany 320 (Biology 26). Plant Physiology.* A study of the physiological relationships of plants and the soil, absorption of water and mineral nutrients, water relationships and requirements of plants, functions of mineral nutrients. Laboratory studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103. Desirable antecedents: General inorganic chemistry, physics.

*Botany 325 (Biology 27). Plant Physiology.* A study of the constructive metabolism in green plants, the nutritional processes in plants without chlorophyll, movement and storage of materials in plants. Laboratory studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103. Desirable antecedents: Botany 320, general inorganic chemistry, organic chemistry, physics.

*Botany 330. Plant Physiology.* A study of digestion, respiration, fermentation, growth and movement in plants. Laboratory studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103, 325. Desirable antecedents: Botany 320, general inorganic chemistry, organic chemistry, physics.

*Botany 340 (Biology 28). Plant Ecology.* An introductory course in Plant Ecology. Plants in relation to their environment; the effects upon the plant of the factors light, heat, air, soil and water; the succession in the time of flowering of the local herbs and the putting out of leaves by the trees; symbiotic phenomena. Field studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103. Spring Term.

*Botany 345. Plant Ecology.* The community relationships of plants. Local communities will be studied and the factors influencing their development will be noted. The study of the development of deciduous forest community from bare areas, such as bare rock, bare clay, and water, will constitute a portion of the field work. Field studies, recitations and lectures. Prerequisites: Botany 101, 102, 103, 340.

*Botany 350. Plant Geography.* This course will consider the distribution, development, floristic composition, environmental factors, agricultural possibilities, etc., of the great plant divisions of the world. Local field studies on the distribution of our native plants will be a feature of the course. Since Southern Illinois is a meeting ground of many northern and southern species of plants, the region is especially suitable for this kind of study. Lectures, recitations and field studies. Prerequisites: Botany, 101, 102, 103, 340.

## ZOOLOGY.

The Zoology Courses are planned primarily to give general information of the principles that govern all animal life, and further for the benefit of those majoring in Zoology or using it as a basis for professional training.

*Zool. 101 (1a). General Vertebrate Zoology.*

Open to all Junior College students.

It deals with the salient facts of Vertebrate Zoology, taking note of evolutionary development. One form of each Chordate class will be studied, with especial emphasis on the Amphibian type.

Text: Hegner's College Zoology.

*Zool. 105 (2). Invertebrate Morphology.*

Prerequisite, Zoology 100, or its equivalent.

The complex cell will be studied, its specialization into various types, the rise of tissues, organs and systems characteristic of the various groups of Invertebrates.

Text, as above.

*Zool. 110 (12). Field Zoology.*

Prerequisites, courses 101 and 105, or equivalents.

It consists of securing and identifying local material, together with elementary experiments in trophisms and environmental changes.

Texts: Hegner's College Zoology; Allee's Synoptic Key; Ward and Whipple, Fresh Water Life.

*Zool. 115 (6a). Economic Zoology.*

Prerequisites, courses 101 and 105, or equivalents.

Library reading and lecture course in the study of relations of animals to man. Field trips are to include visits to Zoological Gardens, and such industries as orchard spraying, fisheries, furriers, meat markets, etc.

*Zool. 200 (3). Comparative Vertebrate Anatomy I.*

Prerequisite: Zoology 101, or its equivalent.

Here studies of comparative skeletal and muscular structures are made from a phylogenetic and evolutionary view point.

Text: Walter's, Biology of the Vertebrates.

Manual: Hyman's, Vertebrate Anatomy.

*Zool. 201 (3a). Comparative Vertebrate Anatomy II.*

Prerequisite: Course 200.

A continuation of the above, taking up a phylogenetic comparison of the organs and systems of Vertebrates.

Text, as above.

*Zool. 210 (5). Ornithology.*

Prerequisite, Zoology 101, or its equivalent.

Object: To recognize the local birds, and to study the calls, feeding, nesting and migratory habits of birds and their relation to human welfare.

Texts: Reed's Land birds East of the Rockies.

Chapman's Birds of the Eastern United States.

*Zool. 215 (6). Entomology.*

Prerequisite, Zoology 105, or its equivalent.

Identification of the local insects, the study of the critical points in the life histories of insects and their relation to human health and wealth.

Text: Fernald's Entomology.

*Zool. 300 (8). Vertebrate Embryology.*

Prerequisite, Zoology 101, or its equivalent.

Chick and pig embryos are used as types. Emphasis is placed on the ontogeny of the individual in its relation to Vertebrate phylogeny.

Text: Arey's Developmental Anatomy of Vertebrates.

Manual: Lillie and Moore.

*Zool. 315 (14). Genetics.*

An elementary course, with experimental work along the lines of breeding, strains, etc., involving the principles of evolution and genetics.

Text: Castle's Eugenics and Genetics.

*Zool. 305 (3a). Comparative Anatomy of Invertebrates.*

Prerequisites, Zoology 100 and 105, or equivalents.

The comparative study of the development of tissues, organs, and systems and their tendencies in Invertebrates.

Library readings and lectures.

*Zool. 310 (13). Animal Ecology.*

Prerequisite, one year of Zoology including Zoology 110.

Animals in their habitats, relations, formations and associations.

Text: Pearse's or Shelford's Ecology.

*Zool. 311 (13a). Advanced Animal Ecology.*

A continuation of Zoology 310 with stress on some particular phases of animal relationship, or on some environmental factor.

*Zool. 320 (9). Histology of Organs.*

Prerequisite, one year of Zoology.

Microscopic study of organs, and tissues, with their origin and development.

Texts: Hill's Organography; or Dahlgren and Kepler, Principles of Animal Histology.

*Zool. 321 (9a). Histological Technique.*

Prerequisite, Junior College Zoology.

The latest methods of preparing histological material in Biology. The development of a certain amount of technique is required.

Texts: Guyer's Animal Micrology, Chamberlain's Methods in Plant Histology.

*Zool. 322 (9b). Advanced Histology.*

Prerequisite, Zoology 321.

Serial slide making, and the working out of special problems in technique.

Texts, as above.

## AGRICULTURE.

R. E. MUCKLERROY.

The aim of the Agriculture Course is to develop a better appreciation of farm life by study of economic production, and to enable those who choose the work to teach it to others or to find a safe and profitable employment in the practice of farming.



The Normal owns a 110 acre farm which lies just south of the campus. In addition to the regular class work, students are required to make observations and to study the various phases of livestock farming on this farm. Demonstration plots are used to illustrate the various methods of soil treatment in relation to crop production.

All the animals kept on the State Farm are pure bred. Percheron horses, Holstein cattle, Shropshire sheep, Poland China hogs, Barred Rock and Single Comb Rhode Island Red chickens, are used for class demonstration and judging work.

Students of the department find it profitable to join the Agricultural Club. While this club is more or less of department work, it is one of the factors promoting student life and the best interests of the institution. The club meets every Wednesday evening of the school year. The programs are made up of music, optionals, studies in soils and crops, livestock production and improvement, and community work.

*Agron. 101 (Agronomy 1). Farm Crops.* Fundamentals of soil fertility, glaciation, adaptation of crops, insects and methods of control. (Laboratory.)

*Agron. 102 (Agronomy 2). Farm Crops.* Cereal crops. A study of plant structure, habits, characteristics, requirements, methods of production and harvesting. (Laboratory.) Prerequisite Ag. 101.

*Agron. 103 (Agronomy 3). Farm Crops.* Forage crops. A study of plant structure, requirements, habits, and characteristics, with special attention given to legumes and crop rotations. (Laboratory.) Prerequisite Ag. 101.

*Agron. 301 (Agronomy 5). Soil Physics and Management.* The value and functions of organic matter. Soil moisture, erosion, drainage, aeration, temperature, tillage and irrigation. (Laboratory.) Prerequisites Agron 101 and 102, General Physics and Beginning Chemistry.

*An. Husb. 105 (An. Husb. 32). Livestock Judging.* Leading characteristics of the various breeds of livestock, native homes, selection for feed lot, market requirements, breeding, nomenclature of external parts, score card and comparative judging.

*An. Husb. 106 (An. Husb. 32a). Livestock Judging.* Better livestock in relation to economic production, type, utility, show form, judging and management. Prerequisite An. Husb. 105.

*An. Husb. 120 (An. Husb. 4a). Poultry.* Pigmentation, molting, inheritance of type, breeding, mating, influence of environment, incubation, feeding for early maturity, market conditions, marketing, poultry farming, including ways and means of developing the industry, results of egg laying contests.

*An. Husb. 205 (An. Husb. 5). Principles of Feeding.* Relations of plant and animal life, elements of nutrition, composition of plants and animals, digestion, composition of feeds, relative values in balanced rations. Prerequisite An. Husb. 105, or An. Husb. 110.



*An. Husb. 206 (An. Husb. 5a). Principles of Feeding.* Balanced rations, feeding trials, study of various feeding trials from different Universities, value of economic feeding and management. Prerequisite *An. Husb. 205*.

*An. Husb. 230 (An. Husb. 7). Dairy Production.* Balance of factors on a dairy farm, buildings, fields, rotation of crops, study of breeds. Prerequisite *Agron. 101* or *An. Husb. 105*.

*An. Husb. 231 (An. Husb. 7a). Dairy Production.* Breed history, feeding, herd testing, breeding, management. Prerequisite *An. Husb. 230*.

*An. Husb. 306 (An. Husb. 6). Principles of Breeding.* The work embodies variation, mutation, inheritance of acquired characters, the pure line, segregation and dominance, reversion, blending inheritance, mendelian factors, theory of sex determination, prepotency, influence of environment, methods of animal breeding, and the factors involved in conducting breeding experiments. (Laboratory work.) Prerequisite *General Zoology*, or *An. Husb. 110*, or *An. Husb. 105*.

*Hort. 210 (Horticulture 6). Elements of Horticulture.* Vegetable gardening,—the production of vegetables for home use.

*Hort. 211 (Horticulture 7). Small Fruits.* History, varieties, propagation, harvesting, and storing.

*Hort. 212 (Horticulture 8).* The principles of fruit growing with special reference to the home orchard; pruning, spraying, and marketing.

*T. C. 220 (Teachers' Course 4).* The course is planned for teachers with farm experience who wish to teach agriculture in the country or village schools, and who do not care to take regular courses.

The fundamentals of soil fertility and livestock production will be organized with a view of making the vital point of contact with school and community interests.

## HOUSEHOLD ARTS.

LUCY K. WOODY.

MARY LOUISE FRY.

*Household Arts 105 (5a), 106 (6a), 107 (7a). Foods and Cookery.* No prerequisites. A year's work divided into three units for Freshmen and unclassified students who wish to elect a general course in foods and cookery.

*Household Arts 205 (5), 206 (6), 207 (7). Foods and Cookery.* Prerequisites: One year of inorganic chemistry, general botany or zoology. A year's course in the study of production, marketing, relative costs, nutritive values and preparation of food.

Course 205. A consideration of heat, fuels, apparatus, food preservation, fruits, vegetables, starches and sugar.

Course 206. Beverages, dairy products, eggs, meat, fish, poultry, meat substitutes, fats.

Course 207. Flour mixtures salads, desserts, meal planning and service, buying, pure food laws.

Text: Food Products, Sherman; References.

*Household Arts 120 (11c) Elementary Nutrition and Cookery.* No prerequisites. A term of elementary nutrition combined with fundamental cookery problems especially designed for the first course in foods for nurses. Open to nurses of Holden Hospital, freshmen and unclassified students.

*Household Arts 220 (11b) Elementary Nutrition.* Prerequisite: Physiology. A general course in food values designed to teach the fundamental principles of nutrition involved in the planning of meals for children and adults.

*Household Arts 360 (11) Nutrition and Dietetics.* Prerequisites: Foods and Cookery, 205, 206, 207; General Botany, 101, or Zoology, 101; Physiology, 201; two terms of Organic Chemistry. A study of food and its relation to the body, planning dietaries for infants, children and adults.

Text: The Chemistry of Food and Nutrition, Sherman; Laboratory Manual for Dietetics.

*Household Arts 125 (2). Garment Making.* This course embraces both hand and machine work. Stress is laid upon the suitability of material and trimmings and upon economical purchasing. The work involves the use and alteration of commercial patterns, some drafting and the various methods of trimming. The work in textiles embraces the history of the industry and the fundamentals of cloth making.

Text: Textiles, Woolman and McGowan.

*Household Arts 130 (3). Dress Making.* Prerequisites: Household Arts 125. This course involves the making of two summer dresses, a study of materials, color combinations and line in dress, some drafting of patterns and elaboration of plain patterns. In textiles the work includes the study of the important fibers in relation to careful buying.

Text: Textiles, Woolman and McGowan.

*Household Arts 330 (19). Costume Design and Draping.* Prerequisites: H. A. 130 and Art 115 and 110.

In this course dresses are constructed in inexpensive materials. These are planned from the standpoint of becomingness to the individual. A study of historic costume accompanies the work and helps to furnish suggestions for the plans.

*Household Arts 360 (14). Advanced Dressmaking.* Prerequisites: H. A. 330 and H. A. 130.

This course involves the handling of silk and wool in tailoring, draping and the use of commercial patterns. A term paper is required following investigation and discussion.

## ART.

*Art 105 (31). Freehand Drawing.* Perspective and freehand drawing, using pencil, ink, charcoal and other mediums.

*Art 110 (28). Principles of Design.* Origin and theory of design; principles applied in costume design, and tooled leather. Prerequisite: Freehand Drawing 105.

*Art 115 (27). Theory of Color.* A study of the theory and harmony of color. Text: Sargent's *The Enjoyment and Use of Color*. Prerequisite: Principles of Design 110.

*Art 205 (4). Public School Drawing.* Course for grade teachers in common school art. Prerequisites: Freehand Drawing 105 and Principles of Design 110.

*Art 210 (21). Commercial Design.* Design with reference to its application in the business world; principles of advertising; method of reproduction and printing. Prerequisites: Principles of Design 110 and Theory of Color 115.

*Art 215 (7). Advanced Design.* Continuation of the principles of design and their application to art in the home. Prerequisite: Principles of Design 110.

*Art 220 (10). Advanced Water Color.* Work from still life and nature. Prerequisite: Theory of Color 115.

*Art 225 (5). History of Art.* Periods and styles of architecture, sculpture, and painting preceding the Italian Renaissance. Texts: Hamlin's *History of Architecture*; Van Dyke's *History of Painting*; Marquand's *A History of Sculpture*.

*Art 230 (13). History of Art.* Italian Renaissance to present time. Same texts as Art 225. Prerequisite: History of Art 225.

*Art 305 (15). Freehand Drawing.* Continuation of Art 105. Some Drawings finished in water color washes. Prerequisite: Freehand Drawing 105.

*Art 310 (9a). History of Architecture.* Ancient to modern times, considering influence of material, climate, political and economic conditions on styles of architecture; evolution of structural and ornamental forms. Text: Fiske Kimball's *A History of Architecture*.

*Art 315 (30). Home Decorations* Principles of design are studied in terms of the home and its furnished details from the standpoint of the designer. Reference work, color plates, and the compiling of illustrative materials are required. Prerequisite: Advanced Design 215.

*Art 320 (7a). Design, Elements of Composition.* Elementary study of simple architectural problems. Mediums: pencil, ink, water color. Prerequisite: Advanced Design 215.

*Art 325 (21a). Design, Study of Elements.* Continuation of Art 320.

*Art 330 (7b). Design.* Talks and laboratory work dealing with typical problems to illustrate their use in the home. Batik designs studied and developed. Prerequisite: Advanced Design 215.

## INDUSTRIAL ARTS.

LOUIS C. PETERSEN.

*201 (1). Primary Handwork.* For teachers of the lower grades. Method in paper cutting and construction, booklet making, applied de-



sign, knotting, braiding, weaving, raphia work, simple basketry; representation of tribal camps and Colonial villages. Organization and presentation of subject matter.

Text: Paper Craft Problems, Hammond. One-half credit.

202 (1a). *Upper Grade Handwork*. Method of designing and weaving reed baskets, light-wood construction, toy-making, lettering, drawing, working out instruction sheets, organization of material of instruction, class management in industrial arts. One-half credit.

101 (11). *Mechanical Drawing*. This is a course for beginners and includes the use of instruments, applied geometry, lettering, orthographic projection, developed surfaces, intersections of solids, working drawings. Text: Engineering Drawing, French. One credit.

102 (12). *Architectural Drawing*. Prerequisite: Industrial Arts 101. This course includes architectural lettering, conventions, plans and elevations, study of building materials, specifications, computation of strength of beams, pillars, stairways. Text: Progressive Steps in Architectural Drawing, Seaman. One credit

103 (13). *Machine Drawing*. Prerequisite: Industrial Arts 101. In this course the characteristics of metals and machine parts are studied. Typical machine elements are worked out in drawings such as different forms of screw threads, cams, gears, kinematics as applied to machinery. Tracing and blueprinting. Text: Engineering Drawing, French. One credit.

104. *Advanced Architectural Drawing*. Prerequisite: Industrial Arts 102. Study of the Classic Orders, mechanical perspective, shades and shadows, rendering. Complex architectural problems are worked out. Text: Architectural Drawing, Field. One credit.

105. *Advanced Machine Drawing*. Prerequisite: Industrial Arts 103. Study of machine design, properties of metals and alloys, working out tables for proportional machine parts, designing of tools and simple machines. Text: Design of Machine Elements, Mease and Nordenholt. One credit.

211. *Benchwork in Wood*. Practice in the use of woodworking tools, how to adjust and sharpen them, study of processes employed by skilled craftsmen, lumbering and milling, woods and wood finishing, working out small projects. Text: Handwork in Woods, Noyes. One credit.

212. *Woodturning*. Prerequisite: Industrial Arts 211. Practice in the tool processes used by skilled woodturners, care of power-driven machines and tools, working out designs in wood as applied in furniture construction and pattern making. Text: Problems in Artistic Wood Turning, Ensinger.

213. *Furniture Construction*. Prerequisite: Industrial Arts 212. Study of the principles of design and period furniture. Practice in designing and construction of furniture that can be made in school shops. Machine woodworking, care of shop equipment. One credit.

214 (6a). *Pattern Making*. Prerequisite: Industrial Arts 212. Study of draft, shrinkage, finish, core prints and core boxes. Practice in moulding and core making, casting soft metal, making patterns for

small machine parts. Text: Wood Pattern Making, McCaslin. One credit.

221 (8). *Art Metal Craft*. This course is for beginners in metal work and embody in the design and construction of useful articles such processes as forming curves, stretching and raising, punching, drilling, riveting, sawing, filing, annealing, hardening, soldering, etching and coloring by heat and chemicals. Text: 101 Metalworking Projects, Petersen. One credit.

222 (10a). *Machine Metal Work*. Study of the engine lathe and drill press, proper cutting speeds and feeds, shaping and grinding cutting tools, straight and taper turning between centers, filing and polishing, thread, cutting, figuring change gears, chuck work, facing, boring, and reaming. Forging and tempering tools. Text: Machine Tool Operation, Burghart. One credit.

## COMMERCIAL.

T. L. BRYANT.

EDWARD V. MILES, JR.

*Commercial 101 (1). Penmanship*. This course presents the study of Penmanship in the latest methods of developing the subject. All of the work both in movement drills and in letter and word writing are studied in tempo.

The rhythm is first developed by counting. Drill on the straight line and the ovals, direct and indirect, constitute a part of each recitation.

The pedagogy of the subject as presented in the different compendiums of penmanship is carefully worked out and studied in class. Comparative values of different movements are presented, also the rise and fall of different systems.

A study of the plan as outlined in the State Course of Study is required of all taking this work.

Towards the close of each term opportunity will be given to all who desire to write for a Palmer's Teachers' Certificate. To possess a Palmer's Teachers' Certificate ranks the holder as fully equipped, not only as a master of the art of business writing, but also prepared to teach this subject in the most modern and up-to-date method. One-half credit is given for each twelve week term. Text: The Palmer Method of Business Writing.

*Commercial 205 (7). Accounting*. This course in introductory bookkeeping is planned for those who have never studied the subject. The work is taught on the laboratory plan. The double entry system is introduced in the beginning and all the laws governing the debit and credit of business transactions are fully explained and mastered. The journal, day book, cash book, sales book, purchase book, and the auxiliary books are introduced and their use in accounting fully demonstrated. A complete line of business transactions is placed in the books of original entry, posted to the ledger, trial balance taken, inventories entered, and accounts closed. A comprehensive study of the financial

statement is made. Text: McKinsey's Bookkeeping and Accountancy, Vol. 1.

*Commercial 206 (8). Accounting.* Partnership accounting is studied and several sets are worked out. This course embodies all the principles taught in Commercial 205. The student is familiarized with negotiable instruments and their use. Text: McKinsey's Bookkeeping and Accounting, Vol. 2. Prerequisite, Commercial 205.

*Commercial 207 (9). Accounting.* Corporation and Manufacturing Accounting are offered in this course. It takes up the changing of books from single proprietorship and partnership to a corporation. In this work the latest systems of accounting are presented. Commercial 205, 206 and 207 require two hours each, the first is used for discussion, and the second for laboratory work under supervision. Text: McKinsey's Bookkeeping and Accounting, Vol. 3. Prerequisite, Commercial 206.

*Commercial 210 (13). Commercial Law.* The aim of this course is to give a comprehensive training in the law pertaining to business. In the text the fundamental and governing principles of law are stated; differences in fundamental principles of dissenting authorities are referred to. Leading illustrative cases are given.

Contracts, Sales, Negotiable Instruments, Agency, and Bankruptcy are among the topics studied. Text: Child's Business Law.

*Commercial 211 (14). Commercial Law.* This course is a continuation of Commercial 210, covering Bailments, Partnership, Corporations, Insurance and Property.

*Commercial 212 (15). Commercial Law.* A continuation of Commercial 211 covering internal relation and control in Agency, Partnership and Corporations; dissolution and accounting in agency, partnership and corporations. The case method will be used in this course.

*Commercial 305, 306 and 307 (26, 27, 28). Advanced Accounting.* A second year course in accounting designed to give intensive study in theory and practice. This course deals with partnerships and ventures, corporations, investments, stocks and bonds, depreciation, reserves, surplus, dividends, corporate obligations, balance sheet, and profit and loss statement; statement analysis for credit purposes, statement analysis for investment purposes, Mergers vs. Consolidations, Parent vs. Holding Companies, consolidated statements and fiduciary statements. Text: Advanced Accounting, Sherwood. Prerequisite, Commercial 207.

*Commercial 315 (29). Principles of Economics.* A general survey of industrial society, its structures, its institutions, its operations. The first part of the course examines briefly the structures of medieval industrial society and the evolution of modern capitalistic industry. The second part of the course deals with certain out-standing features of the present industrial society, such as private exchange co-operation; the pecuniary organization of society; the significance of technology; specialization and interdependence; risk and risk-bearing; concentration in large-scale production; ownership of wealth and income, and



control of industry; impersonal relations; the guidance of economic activity. The third part of the course is concerned with private property competition and social control of industrial activity. Text: Elementary Economics, Fairchild, Furness and Buck.

*Commercial 316 (30). Principles of Economics.* A continuation of Course 315, being designed to work out the principles of Values, including those determining rent, wages, interest and profits, in our peculiarly organized society. Text: Elementary Economics, Fairchild, Furness and Buck.

*Commercial 325 (32). Business Administration.* A study of business problems from the standpoint of the manager. The course covers location of plant, administration of personnel, marketing, finance, production, risk-bearing, and the selection of the best adapted business unit for a certain industry or business. Text: Business Administration, Marshall.

*Commercial 335 (31). The Financial Organization of Society.* A broad general survey of the whole financial system. It includes a study of the nature and work of the various types of financial institutions, of the forces that have led to their development, and of their relation to the organization of industrial society. The principal forms of financial institutions covered are: coinage and monetary systems; credit; commercial banks; saving banks; bond houses; trust companies; stock exchange, and various forms of co-operative credit associations. Text: Financial Organization of Society, Moulton.

## MUSIC.

*Music 105 (Music I). Sight Singing, Ear Training.* This course is offered to those students who have not had elementary training in music. It consists mainly of sight-reading simple songs and exercises; but also includes drill in pitch, rhythm, and theory; formal ear training (response, oral and written); song singing by use of syllables; and appreciation of music (listening lessons). Text: School Music Handbook, by Cundiff-Dykema.

*Music 110 (Music II). Primary Music Methods.* This course is designed to meet the music requirements demanded of the primary grade teacher. The work covers the following topics, the child voice, rhythm development, note singing, sight singing, music appreciation. Prerequisite: Music 105, or previous training equivalent to that course. Text: School Music Handbook, by Cundiff-Dykema.

*Music 115 (Music 2). Intermediate Music Methods.* This course is designed to meet the music requirements demanded of the Intermediate Grade Teacher. The work covers the following topics, two part singing, sight reading, three part singing, practical use of

the minor mode, music appreciation. Prerequisite: Music 105, or previous training equivalent to that course.

*Music 205 (Music 8). Junior High and Senior High School Methods.* The problems of vocal music and instrumental music relating to the Junior High School and Senior High School are studied. Practical instruction in conducting is given. Prerequisite: Music 105 or equivalent.

*Music 210 (Music 9). Band and Orchestra Methods.* This course offers a study of all the orchestral instruments, the common band instruments, and scoring for the orchestra. The entire course is outlined and conducted in terms of the grade school and high school band and orchestra. Prerequisite: Music 5.

*Music 125 (Music 5). Harmony.* The work covers the formation of major and minor scales, a thorough study of intervals, the common chord, and harmonic progressions. Prerequisites: Music 1 or equivalent.

*Music 130 (Music 6). Harmony.* A continuation of Music 5. The course covers harmonic progressions, the chord of the sixth and the six-four, the dominant seventh and its inversions, and natural modulations.

*Music 135 (Music 10). History of Music.* A general course covering the important movements of the following periods: uncivilized and ancient music, medieval music, the nineteenth century, the seventeenth century, the eighteenth and early nineteenth century.

*Music 215 (Music 11). Harmony.* (Second year). A study of the dominant seventh and its inversions, diminished sevenths, secondary chords of the seventh; chords of the ninth, eleventh and thirteenth. Text: *Modern Harmony*, by Foote and Spalding.

*Music 220 (Music 12). Harmony.* A continuation of Music 11. Chromatically altered chords, suspensions, ornamental tones, and modulations. Text: *Modern Harmony*, by Foote and Spalding.

### Applied Music.

Class instruction in piano, violin, and other orchestral instruments is elective. Classes recite three days each week, one credit being given for three terms' work.

*Music 150-151-152 (Music 21, 22, 23). Violin, First Year.* The subject matter of the text used is correlated with the singing lesson wherever possible. Emphasis is placed upon the mechanics of the instrument by employing: (1) short and easily memorized exercises in rhythmic form for the development of the bow, hand and arm; and (2) technical exercises suitable for young beginners designed for the purpose of training the left hand. Text: Max Fischel's *Graded Course*, Book 1 and Book 2.

*Music 160-161-162 (Music 24, 25, 26). Violin, Second Year.* The work of the second year provides for the presentation and the development of the third position, the more difficult keys, rhythms, bowings, and the easier harmonies; during the latter part of the year the seven positions in scale form are used. Text: *Elementary Violin Lessons* by Eugene Gruenberg and Max Fischel's Book 3.

*Music 170-171-172 (Music 40, 41, 42). Piano, First Year.* Teaching of the rudiments of piano playing from one of the most approved methods for beginners. Careful attention is given to hand culture, touch, music notation, rhythm and ear training. Text: Standard Graded Course of Studies by W. S. B. Mathews.

*Music 180-181-182 (Music 43, 44, 45). Piano, Second Year.* The W. S. B. Mathews Standard Graded Course continued.

The University maintains a band, orchestra, and a chorus. Students who are especially interested in music are urged to apply for membership in at least one of these organizations. Students who qualify for either Orchestra or Band will have their tuition refunded.

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION FOR MEN.

*Physical Education 151 (7).* Fall Term. Marching tactics, calisthenics and posture.

*Physical Education 152 (8).* Winter Term. Continuation of calisthenics and marching tactics with basket ball and volley ball games.

*Physical Education 153 (9).* Spring Term. The greater part of this term is devoted to games for children and adults. Some time will be spent on track work.

All freshmen are required to take physical education throughout the year, four times per week. Unless a student is a member of one of the team squads he will be required to take the above three courses.

Illinois law requires 144 forty-minute periods of physical education for graduation from normal schools.

*Physical Education 155 (10).* Coaching is offered during the two summer terms. The work covers basket ball and track and for those who desire it foot ball. Both theory and practice are gone into thoroughly. A firm grounding in the fundamentals is demanded. The object of the course is to fit the student to coach in high school.

*Physical Education 170 (11).* The school supports a foot ball team during the fall term. Physical training credit is given to the men who remain on the squad. Students are not dropped from the squad because they have no chance of making the team. They are encouraged to work for the physical benefits and to learn the game.

*Physical Education 171 (12).* A basket ball team represents the school during the winter term. The statement above concerning the foot ball team holds true for basket ball.

*Physical Education 172 (14).* Track. The same facts hold for this branch of sport as for courses 170 and 171.

*Physical Education 713 (15).* The men who make the tennis squad are given credit.

*Physical Education 250 (17).* Methods and Materials. A general course in the methods of teaching physical education, including the history, aims, and values of physical education with classification of



activities according to the age, interest and development of elementary school children.

*Physical Education 251 (18).* Coaching. A course in methods and practice of coaching the following games: Soccer, playground ball, basket ball, volley ball, and speed ball.

*Physical Education 252 (19).* Playground. A general course for play leaders in the organization and management of play. The nature of play, its origin, and the growth of modern play movements studied in connection with practical applications and practice of games and playground activities.

15/9 credit in practical courses is required for graduation.

## PHYSIOLOGY AND HEALTH EDUCATION.

DELIA CALDWELL, M. D.

*P. & H. 301 (Biology 24). Bacteriology and Sanitation.* An introductory study of sanitary science, including a study of the morphology of microorganisms and their relationships to human interests. The course includes the following phases of the subject: sterilization and disinfection; preparation and use of culture media; growing and studying cultures; microscopic examination of microorganisms; food preservation; bacteriology of the soil, of milk and of water; and pathogenic microorganisms in relation to production of infectious diseases. One hour of lectures and recitations daily and one hour of laboratory work daily, 120 hours. Prerequisites: Elementary Physiology and Elementary Chemistry. Fall Term.

*P. & H. 201 (Biology 4a). College Physiology.* A study of the anatomy, physiology and hygiene of the great systems of the human body. It will include a study of digestion, secretion, metabolism. Special emphasis will be placed on the circulatory system and its close connection with digestion. One hour of lectures and recitations and one hour of laboratory work daily, 120 hours. Prerequisites: Elementary physiology, Botany or Zoology and Elementary Chemistry. Winter Term. Sophomore Year.

*P. & H. 202 (Biology 43). Health Education.* This course will teach the meaning of health, its value to the individual and to the community, how it may be attained and how preserved. Special attention will be given to the hygiene of the mouth and teeth and to the organs of special sense. The principles of the prevention of communicable diseases will be taught and their application to the individual and to the community clearly demonstrated. This teaching will be adapted to the needs of the students themselves, for the improvement of their own health and detailed instruction will be given for the application of this work to the teaching of health in all of the grades of public schools. One hour of lectures, recitations and demonstrations daily. Fall Term, Spring Term, and Summer Term. Sophomore Year.

*P. & H. 302 (Biology 42). Home Nursing and Child Care.* A study of the anatomy and physiology of the new-born infant and young child and the feeding and care of children in health and disease. Also a study and mastery of the more common and necessary of the nursing procedures which can be carried out in the home, minor illness and injuries and first aid. One hour of lectures, recitations and demonstrations daily. 60 hours. Prerequisites, College Physiology and Bacteriology & Sanitation. Winter Term. Senior Year.

## THE LIBRARY.

Wheeler Library has a working collection of 28,260 books and 1,795 pamphlets. Both books and pamphlets are classified according to the Dewey decimal system. The dictionary catalog has three entries (author, title, and subject) for each book, and many also have analyti-



cal subject headings. Books have been selected with reference to the needs of the various departments, and include standard works in literature, travel, history, science, philosophy, education, and art, as well as general reference books such as dictionaries, encyclopedias, yearbooks, and atlases.

Periodical literature of permanent value is bound and made accessible by the use of the Readers' Guide. The library receives 125 of the best current periodicals. Bibliographical material on children's literature and children's illustrated books are available, in addition to a large collection of classified pictures for the use of all departments.

The library is open on school days from 8 A. M. to 5 P. M., evenings from 7 to 9 P. M., and Saturday mornings. Special hours are announced for the Summer Terms.

### THE TRAINING SCHOOLS.

The Training Schools include the following branches:

1. The Rural Practice Schools, which give practice for Junior College Graduation, include five rural schools, located in near-by districts.
2. The Allyn Training School, which gives elementary school practice for Junior College graduation, is located on the campus.
3. The Brush Training School, which gives elementary school practice and training for grade principalships, is located in the city. The practice is for Junior College graduation.
4. The University High School, which provides the practice teaching required for Senior College graduation, is located on the campus.

### GENERAL INFORMATION.

Past experience in teaching will receive no practice credit.

Three units of practice work are required for Junior College graduation. This work will usually be done in the elementary grades.

Three units of actual practice work are required for Senior College graduation. This work will usually be done in the University High School, and one unit must be done in the student's major subjects.

Application for practice work, except Practice 1, must be made at the beginning of the term preceding the term in which the practice teaching is desired. Assignments in practice teaching will be made on the basis of the student's scholastic attainment and demonstrated ability.

### Rural Practice Department.

During the year we have had charge of five rural schools for the purpose of giving rural practice teaching to those who have elected to teach in the country, or in small villages:

The Glade School, Dist. No. 96, Jackson County.

The Wagner School, Dist. No. 136, Jackson County.

The Bridge School, Dist. No. 92, Jackson County.

The Foreville School, Dist. No. 38, Williamson County.

The Pleasant Grove School, Dist. No. 104, Jackson County.

Within the year two hundred twenty-five teachers have taken at least one term of work in one or another of these schools. More than one hundred of them are now under contract to teach in rural or village schools during the present school year. Added to this large number are many more who had taken our courses in previous years and who are now teaching in various country schools of Southern Illinois. Taken together this makes a respectable showing among the rural and village teachers of this end of the state.

It is our purpose to follow up these teachers as far as possible to see what success they are having in their actual teaching experience in order to strengthen our course in its weaker phases. Several of them, it is now known, have met with such good success that their salaries have been materially increased. Others have proved satisfactory, and with some more practical experience they will be numbered among the best teachers.

One credit is given for six weeks of practice teaching. During this time the teacher puts in three and one-half sixty minute periods each day in the school, and is busy all the time. This equals four and two-thirds periods of forty-five minutes each day, or one hundred forty of such periods for the credit.

In addition to the above, students are required to submit a note book containing anything received from the course which they think might help them when they go out to teach for themselves. Plans, also, for two distinct recitations daily must be submitted and approved by the critic teachers.

For the coming year we have agreed to teach the following seven rural schools, and provide each with a full-time critic:

The Wagner, Dist. No. 136, Jackson County.

The Pleasant Grove, Dist. No. 104, Jackson County.

The Bridge, Dist. No. 92, Jackson County.

The Glade, Dist. No. 96, Jackson County.

The Buckles, Dist. No. 98, Jackson County.

The Foreville, Dist. No. 38, Williamson County.

The Pleasant Hill, Dist. No. 94, Jackson County.

All of these schools are to begin in September, one week before the opening of the College.

The course in rural practice will consist in—

(a) Attention to the purely physical phases of rural or small village schools; such as, the proper heating, lighting and ventilating of rooms; cleanliness in all its aspects; water supply; blackboards; maps; globes; libraries; toilets, etc.

(b) The beautifying of school premises, clean up days, patrons days, parent-teacher associations, club work for boys and girls.

(c) Rural health problems, play and playground activities with a touch of rural sociology.

(d) All routine factors of school management, as, the passing of lines, passing of work materials and other factors in time-saving.

(e) The use of the state course of study and some supervised study and individual instruction.

(f) The proper use of maps, globe and other apparatus.

(g) The technique of teaching Reading, Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic, Language, Geography, and History.

(h) Methods of control, proper questions to ask, etc.

### **The Brush Practice School.**

The purpose of the Brush Practice School is to give Junior College students an opportunity to practice under typical graded school conditions. The school is located in the best residential portion of the city and is a little over half mile from the normal campus. It is housed in a good substantial building, which is well lighted and decorated, and fairly well equipped as an educational work shop. The enrollment is just a little under 500. The school includes grades one to seven each in charge of a regular teacher or critic.

Students spend half of each day at the Brush and receive two credits for the term. They plan their work under guidance of the critic and teach only after such plans have been corrected or approved by the critic. Directed observation is carried on twice each week during the entire term. Such observation is made after study of reading references assigned and discussion of points to be observed.

Close conferences on subject matter and methods of presentation are held as often as deemed best by the critic. These may become fewer in number as the student shows proficiency in his work. Sets of pedagogical points and teaching concepts are presented regularly by the critics so that the student may become acquainted with the commonly accepted teaching procedures. Weekly or bi-weekly teachers' meetings are held throughout the term which serve as a clearing house for harmonizing the work of the school and for the presentation of discussions of general interest.

Students are supervised closely at all times, and especially during the beginning of the term. Gradually more responsibility is given them until they are allowed to take full charge of the room for stated periods. They work in a typical situation and when they go out to teach they feel at home in the school room.

Last year over one hundred forty students took their practice teaching work at the Brush Training School.

### **The Allyn Training School.**

*Junior College* practice work is done in the Allyn Building. The school consists of the elementary grades one to six inclusive, and the junior high school grades seven to nine inclusive. These groups of pupils furnish not only an opportunity for practice teaching but also an opportunity for observation, required in practice one, and for classes doing college work.

Practice *One* is open to freshmen and given in the Allyn Building *only*. During the *first half* of the term an effort is made to fit the student to take up the work of teaching a definite class and a definite



subject without too great a loss to the class and with a minimum of loss to himself. Brief studies are made to discover the practical values of a knowledge of the aim in education, the function of the school, the function of the different lines of work, the cycles of child development, and of some of the more important school practices—the problem and project methods, the socialized recitation, and supervised study. The work consists of library reading, discussions, lecture, reports, tests and the making of a permanent note book. *The second* half of the term is devoted to plan writing, observation of lessons given by critics, and round table discussions of these lessons.

Practice teaching in the Allyn Building requires the preparation of daily, or unit, lesson plans that shall be submitted to the critic in charge for constructive criticisms, before the assignment is made to the class. All students doing practice teaching must arrange suitable consultation periods with critics, and must attend all meetings called by the critic in charge.

General and special meetings may be called from time to time by the Superintendent of the Training School.

### The University High School.

A senior high school department with an enrollment limited to 55 in each year except the fourth, is maintained on the campus. Here a well trained faculty offers a program of studies typical of the best Southern Illinois High Schools. This school provides training facilities for the senior college practice teaching. Each of the four quarters, about 60 college students are enabled to do senior college training work. It also provides an opportunity for those who have not met all the college entrance requirements to make up their deficiencies.

Of 16 year credits required for graduation, the 5 units of List A are prescribed for all courses. Of the 11 units that remain, 6 must be selected from List B. The remaining 5 units may be selected from List B or List C or both. Only 1 unit may be made up of subjects not good for college entrance.

**Additional Requirements for Special Courses.**

Students who expect later in College or University to take up any of the following courses:

Literature and Arts, Journalism, Pre-Legal, Household Administration and Home Economics must take 2 years of Latin, French or Spanish (both units in the same language).

For Pre-Medical courses students must have two years of the same foreign language and also 1 year of History and Civics.

For University courses in Chemistry and Chemical Engineering students must have 2 years of French, 1 year of Chemistry in addition to another unit of laboratory science from List A, and also Advanced Algebra  $\frac{1}{2}$  year.

For University courses in Commerce and Business Administration, students should take 2 years of Latin, French or Spanish (both units in the same language) or Advanced Algebra  $\frac{1}{2}$  year and Solid Geometry  $\frac{1}{2}$  year or Science (in addition to the unit of List A) 1 year.

Students who look forward to Engineering must take Advanced Algebra  $\frac{1}{2}$  year and Solid Geometry  $\frac{1}{2}$  year.

For University courses in Agriculture, 1 year of Science (in addition to the unit of List A) must be taken.

For University courses in Music, the student must have Latin, French or Spanish, 2 year (both units to be in the same language), and Music 2 years.

The student who plans to take University courses involving College Mathematics, Physics, or Advanced Chemistry including the Curriculum in Home Economics, the Pre-Medical Curriculum, and the Curriculums in Commerce and Business Administration in which University courses in Mathematics are prescribed should take  $\frac{1}{2}$  year of Advanced Algebra.

## LATIN.

Four years of secondary Latin are offered. The general aim of the course is to create an abiding interest, to develop subsidiary values, and to prepare for college.

*Latin I.* Text: Francois' First.

*Latin II.* Texts: Scudder's Second Latin and Scott's Latin Composition. The equivalent of the traditional four-book course is covered.

*Latin III.* Cicero's Orations. Texts: Johnston and Kingery and Scott's Prose. An amount equal to six orations is required. With strong classes some letters, or a bit of Ovid or of Sallust may be read. Course III alternates with course IV.

*Latin IV.* Virgil. Text: Knapp's Virgil's Aeneid with Ovid. An effort is made here to develop a feeling for some of the finer literary qualities involved in translation.



## FRENCH.

*French I.* Méras, Le Premier Livre. Worman's First French Book. Guerber, Contes et Légendes.

*French II.* Lavis, Histoire de France. Mairat, La Tâche du Petit Pierre. Dumas, Le Comte Monte Cristo. Mérimée, Colomba. French-English Dictionary. Reference Grammar. French Newspapers.

## ART.

*Freehand Drawing.* This course is offered to meet the requirements of the State University for college entrance. Time required—two hours daily. Subjects covered—perspective, pencil technique, design, blackboard drawing, and elementary water color.

Fall Term: One hour of perspective and one hour of blackboard drawing.

Winter Term: One hour of perspective, one hour of design and pencil technique.

Spring Term. Elementary water color.

## HISTORY.

The Senior High School courses in History are:

Medieval History—one half year.

Modern History—one-half year.

English History—one-half year.

American History—one year.

Civics—one-half year.

Economics—one-half year.

## GEOGRAPHY.

*Physiography.* This is a High School course devoted entirely to the physical phases of geography and their influences. Laboratory work and field observations are an essential part of the work. This is an 18 weeks' course. Text: Salisbury's Physiography, Briefer Course.

*Industrial and Commercial Geography.* This course deals primarily with the commerce and industries of the United States, but with a less intensive survey of other countries. Text: Smith's Commerce and Industry. This is an 18 weeks' course.

## MATHEMATICS.

*Alg. I-1.* The fundamental operations with literal and signed numbers, scale drawings and graphs, simple equations, stating algebraically simple problem situations.

*Alg. I-2.* Factoring and fractions, stating and solving problems involving the difficulties of factoring and fractions, the line graph.

*Alg. I-3.* Simultaneous equations with both numerical and literal coefficients, with both integral and fractional terms, involution and evolution, radicals, and quadratics.

The student should plan to take courses the first year beyond the eighth grade.

*Geom. I-1.* Book I of Plane Geometry.

*Geom. I-2.* Books II and III of Plane Geometry.

*Geom. I-3.* Books IV and V of Plane Geometry.

The usual theorems and exercises of Geometry are covered, including symmetry, maxima and minima, and incommensurables. Emphasis is placed upon proper methods of study. Power and independence are aims rather than retention of a large mass of information.

Elective—Advanced Algebra,  $\frac{1}{2}$  year; Solid Geometry,  $\frac{1}{2}$  year.

## CHEMISTRY.

To meet the needs of students preparing for college the following courses, making a high school unit, are offered:

*Chemistry I-1. Elementary Chemistry.* Recitations and laboratory work. Periods 1 and 2 during the Fall Term.

*Chemistry I-2. Elementary Chemistry.* Recitations and laboratory work. Periods 1 and 2 during the Winter Term. Chem. 1 is prerequisite.

*Chemistry I-3. Elementary Chemistry.* Recitations and laboratory work. Periods 1 and 2 during the Spring Term. Chem. 2 is prerequisite.

## PHYSICS.

*High School Physics.* A year is given to Physics—mechanics and heat the Fall Term, electricity the Winter Term, sound and light the Spring Term. Seven periods per week. Practical Physics, Millikan and Gale. A Laboratory Course in Physics, Millikan, Gale, and Bishop.

## BIOLOGY.

*Elementary Botany.* An elementary course in Botany of high school rank. The study of plants is approached from the physiological viewpoint, with the nutrition of the plant as the central theme. Sufficient study of anatomy and physiology of plants is included to make possible an understanding of the processes of nutrition and reproduction in plants. Recitations five periods per week, Laboratory and field studies five periods weekly.

*Elementary Zoology.* This high school course in Zoology has as its purpose to give a general view of the field of Vertebrate Zoology. Type studies will be used to represent two great groups. Scientific approach will be given by the working out in the field and laboratory of a group of problems leading to the discovery and study of a few of the basic biological principles. These studies will also include an acquaintanceship with animal life in its ecological relations, geographical distribution and economic relations.

*Elementary Physiology.* This is beginning Physiology and is given in the second year high school. It includes human anatomy, the structure and elementary compositions of the body, with the physiology, the performance of all the functions of the body. It also includes an elementary study of health and sanitation, especially the student's health, and the sanitation of the school and home. Spring or Fall Term. One hour of recitation and one hour of laboratory work daily—120 hours.

## AGRICULTURE.

*Animal Husbandry.* Farm animals. This is an elementary course in animal husbandry, covering the types and breeds, life history, native home, adaptability and popularity of our domestic animals.

*Animal Husbandry.* Farm Animals. This is a continuation for six weeks of Animal Husbandry completing the semester's work. Breed characteristics, food nutrients, an explanation of the balanced ration and the Babcock test will be the work of this course.

*Animal Husbandry.* Poultry Selecting the farm flocks, types, breeds, varieties, feeding and general management.

*Animal Husbandry.* Sheep. Origin of the sheep industry, adaptability; types, breeds, market classes and grades, grades of wool, establishing the pure bred flock, grading for market, care and management, feeding and housing, adaptability to Southern Illinois.

*Animal Husbandry.* Beef Cattle. The work in beef cattle includes the general problem of fattening cattle for market, relations of cattle feeding to soil improvement, business phases of feeding, production and feeding of baby beef, market classes and grades, general equipment, diseases, breeding beef cattle, and the elementary principles of cattle feeding and breeding.

*Animal Husbandry.* Dairy Cattle. The dairy cow as a food producer, characteristics, types, breeds, native homes, historic development, adaptation to climatic conditions, judging, selection, breeding for production, and balanced rations will constitute the larger part of this term's work.

*Animal Husbandry.* Elementary Feeding. This course deals with the classification, digestibility and functions of feed nutrients, values of feeding materials, and balanced rations for farm animals.

*Agronomy.* Elementary Soils. The last six weeks of the Winter term will be devoted to the physical properties of soils, type soils, size of soil particles, pore space, internal surface area, water holding power, and air circulation.

*Agronomy.* Elementary Soils. This course will include the ten essential elements of plant food, sources of the different plant foods, water, air and soil, limiting plant foods, organic matter and legumes, crop rotation and the replacement of foods taken out by plants of crops, the purchase of limestone and rock phosphate, and the fundamental principles of a permanent fertility.

*Horticulture.* Elements of Horticulture. Fruit growing in general for home consumption, the family orchard, economic importance, general ornamental planting to beautify the farm home.



## MANUAL ARTS.

*Manual Training I.* One-half the time is spent in actual wood-working, involving the use of different tools, and the application of common joints in useful articles. The other half is spent in a study of allied industries, and mechanical drawing, which conforms to standard methods in technique, and so far as possible, has a practical connection with shop work. Text: Woodwork for Secondary Schools—Griffith.

*Manual Training II.* Care and operation of power machinery. Practice in furniture construction, upholstering, and finishing as employed by cabinet makers. Practice in pattern making and molding for simple castings. Text: Art in Woodturning—Klenke. Wood Pattern Making—Hanley.

## COMMERCIAL.

*Penmanship.* This course presents the study of Penmanship in the latest methods of developing the subjects. All of the work, both in movement drills and in letter and word writing, are studied in tempo.

The rhythm is first developed by counting. Drill on the straight line and the ovals, direct and indirect, constitute a part of each recitation.

The pedagogy of the subject as presented in the different compendiums of penmanship is carefully worked out and studied in class. Comparative values of different movements are presented, also the rise and fall of different systems.

A study of the plan as outlined in the State Course of Study is required of all taking this work.

Towards the close of each term opportunity will be given to all who desire to write for a Palmer's Teachers' Certificate. To possess a Palmer's Teachers' Certificate ranks the holder as fully equipped, not only as a master of the art of business writing, but also prepared to teach this subject in the most modern and up-to-date method. One-half credit is given for each twelve week term. Text: The Palmer Method of Business Writing.

*Commercial Arithmetic.* Short methods in dealing with the fundamentals. Aliquot parts of 100. A mastery of the 45 combinations. Tables of denominate numbers. Fractions. Formulas used in percentage and their applications. Formulas used in mensuration. Solving and analysis of problems by mental processes.

Vocational problems in mensuration, lumber, building, plastering, papering, carpeting, painting. Land measure. Base Line. Principal meridian. Township section and its divisions. Distance. Surfaces. Solids. Capacity. Ratio and Proportion. Longitude and Time.

A mastery of single column addition. Some time will be given to double column addition. Short cuts in dealing with the fundamentals. The single equation method of stating and solving problems and checking results. Arithmetical problems in business.

Denominate numbers. Bills. Statements. Accounts. Sales. Shipment. Cash account. Bank account. Closing and ruling ledger accounts. Daily balances. Percentage. Profit and loss. Interest. Bank discount. Trade discount. Brokerage. Commission. Premium.

Stocks. Bonds. Insurance. Taxes. Negotiable paper. Text: Smith's Arithmetic of Business.

Equation of accounts. Cash balance. Partnership. Trading account. Profit and Loss. Inventories. Financial Statement. Present worth. Balance sheet.

Building and Loan Associations. Terminating. Serial. Permanent Earnings. Distribution of profits. Annual reports.

*Shorthand I-1. (Fall Term.)* The principles of the system as found in the first six lessons of the Gregg Manual form the basis of study. Writing from dictation and reading from notes and printed plates are a part of the program. Texts: Gregg Shorthand Manual, Gregg Speed Studies; Graded Readings in Gregg Shorthand.

*Shorthand I-2. (Winter Term.)* A continuation of Course 1. The work is carried through Lesson 12 of the Gregg Manual.

*Shorthand I-3. (Spring Term.)* The work started the Winter Term is continued. The Gregg Manual is completed and a theory test given.

*Shorthand II-1. (Fall Term.)* A short theory review is given and special attention paid to word signs and phrases. Dictation to attain speed and enlarge the vocabulary. Reading from notes and printed plates. Text: Gregg Speed Studies; Advanced Dictation and Secretarial Training.

*Shorthand II-2. (Winter Term.)* A continuation of Course 1. Advanced dictation to attain speed. Typewritten transcriptions from plates and notes.

*Shorthand II-3. (Spring Term.)* The work started in the Winter Term is continued. Special instruction and work in secretarial practice. A note-taking speed of 100 words per minute and a transcription speed of 40 words per minute are expected before completion.

*Typewriting I-1. (Fall Term.)* A study of the parts of the machine and their uses; care and cleaning of the machine. The learning of the keyboard by the touch system and a series of drills fixing the position of each character. Frequent drills in rhythm. Text. 20th Century Touch Typewriting.

*Typewriting I-2. (Winter Term.)* A continuation of Course 1.

*Typewriting I-3. (Spring Term.)* Elementary Laboratory Practice. Some attention to speed.

*Typewriting II-1. (Fall Term.)* Business Letters with Office Practice. Secretarial Projects.

*Typewriting II-2. (Winter Term.)* A continuation of Course 1.

*Typewriting II-3. (Spring Term.)* This term is devoted to the development of speed and accuracy. A net speed of sixty words per minute is expected before completion.

*Bookkeeping I-1. (Fall Term and first six weeks of Winter Term.)* The principles of the system as found in the first twelve chapters of the 20th Century Bookkeeping and Accounting text are mastered, and the Practice Set on Single Proprietorship is worked out.

*Bookkeeping II-2. (Last six weeks of Winter Term and Spring Term.)* The principles found in chapters thirteen through twenty-three are mastered and the Practice Set on Partnership is worked out.
