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

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ANNUAL REPORT of the Board of Trustees 1960-1961

AUGUST MEETING

THE AUGUST MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Friday, August 12, 1960, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Mrs. Stella Collins, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Martin F. Oehmke, George T. Wilkins, Mr. Sturgis was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President J. E. Grinnell, Vice-President Harold W. See, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Carl Mayhew, reporter for The Southern Illinoisan, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held June 15, 1960, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by George T. Wilkins, these minutes were approved as presented. The Board first considered the following report:

DEVELOPMENTS TOWARD AN AUTOMATED DATA SYSTEM

One week following the last Board meeting, on June 22, 1960, a meeting of representatives of the University and Science Research Associates was held in Chicago. Out of this meeting came an agreement that SRA would study the scope of automation of records of Southern Illinois University and prepare a report on its general feasibility at a future meeting on August 8, 1960.

Mr. James D. Turner was designated the chief contact person from the University to facilitate the study by SRA. An immense amount of forms and descriptions of procedures used by the various offices of the University was collected and furnished the research organization. The research was commenced around the first of July.

During July, Mr. Turner also attended a six-day National Institute on Institutional Research held at Florida State University in Tallahassee. There he established contact with a major proportion of the individuals in the country who are charged with this responsibility. This institute, the second of its kind to be held (the first was at Stanford University in the summer of 1959) was,

itself, an indication of the increasing need for information about the increasingly complex organizations which characterize modern large universities.

Representatives of the University and SRA met in Carbondale on Monday, August 8, to receive the research report and recommendations. Also present for the report was Professor Everett F. Lindquist of the State University of Iowa, who had been retained as a consultant for the University on this matter. Dr. Lindquist is an internationally recognized authority in the areas of automated data processing, computing operations and system design.

Science Research Associates recommended a system study, design and development of automation procedures. They noted the magnitude of the task and, indeed, this very magnitude precluded them from acting as a contractor to perform these functions, should they be desired by the University. They recommended the University adopt one of two alternatives:

1. Contract with an outside agency who would be fully responsible for the effort, or

2. Utilize the resources of the University for the main burden of work and contract with outside agencies for consultation and miscellaneous services.

The research organization stated no clear choice between the two alternatives and were unable to designate an organization which could be reliably expected to execute such a contract.

The consultant, Professor Lindquist, was definitely in favor of having the University do its own job, relying on adequate counsel and advice from various consultants. His choice was based on the difficulties of educating an outsider into the complexities of the University. He categorically stated that no generalizable system was available, or was likely to become available in the foreseeable future; that is, every system must be tailored to the functioning organization at hand. He also cautioned as to the magnitude of the job, but pointed out that what was now a voluntary effort will, through the press of expansion, become a mandatory effort in the near future.

Everyone concerned agreed that such an effort, if successfully executed, would have far-reaching effects upon higher education. It was thought, therefore, that outside support for such a project should be sought. Professor Lindquist was of the opinion that support should be sought only after a considerable amount of planning had been accomplished. Others thought an approach might be made earlier but, as is usual in such matters, could not guarantee a successful contact.

If agreeable to the Board of Trustees, we will now seek the services of the best available data processing specialist.

It was the consensus of the members of the Board that it seemed desirable to work internally toward an automated data system and to employ a specialist for consultant and technical services.

Copies of the minutes of a meeting between University administrators and representatives of various religious denominations and organizations, held on the Southwestern Illinois Campus on July 15, 1960, were distributed for the information of the Board. This meeting concerned plans for a centrally located single building on the Edwardsville Campus, for use by the various religious groups in a cooperative effort to serve the needs of Southwestern's students.

President Morris indicated that the University would propose to supply the land, but the religious groups would erect a building. He stated that planning and design of such a building would be under the direction of the University Architect in order to insure conformity to the aesthetic appearance of the new campus. It was the consensus of the Board that such an approach was both sound and desirable.

A progress report on planning for the Southwestern Illinois Campus was presented by University Architect Charles M. Pulley. By use of various maps and charts, Mr. Pulley outlined the work done to date by the professional firms retained for aerial surveys and topographic studies; city planning and landscaping; reports on utilities, soil investigations, flood control, garbage disposal, etc.; and for site and building planning.

A preliminary Campus Master Plan was presented, showing proposed facilities for 18,000 students. The plan included a quadrangle surrounded by general purpose buildings and educational wings. Mr. Pulley stressed the fact that instructional wings were proposed as units containing general purpose classrooms, specialized classrooms, and office space designed to provide the greatest flexibility in space utilization. President Morris explained that proposed plans provide for the grouping of related subjects such as geography, geology, etc., and the use of central core-type laboratories which could provide for the programs of the various related sciences.

Mr. Pulley concluded his remarks with a presentation of charts showing proposed plans for expansion of the educational wings; the areas reserved for parking facilities, access roads, campus roads and lakes; and the peripheral space reserved for expanded services.

Mr. Wham expressed the Board's appreciation for his presentation of plans, and Mr. Pulley was excused from the meeting.

The Board next considered the following:

APPEAL OF AMERICAN FEDERATION OF STATE, COUNTY, AND MUNICI-PAL EMPLOYEES

At the June 15 meeting of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Adrian Mitten, Representative of the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees, appeared before the Board of Trustees in appealing the nonrecognition of his union insofar as University Policemen are concerned. At that time the Board was furnished with a letter by our Legal Counsel concerning this matter and a statement by Mr. C. "Tiny" Groeteke.

Since that time copies of a letter from Mr. Henry T. Wilson, Administrative Attorney for this organization, addressed to Mr. Timothy Swain, have been sent to the Board, further amplifying the position of the union. It is recommended that the Board pass upon the appeal of the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees.

Mr. C. "Tiny" Groeteke and Mr. Adrian Mitten appeared before the Board and explained the position of their union with regard to the representation of the University Policemen. Mr. Wham indicated that they would have ten days within which to submit any additional information to the Board concerning the matter. In the discussion which ensued, it was the consensus of the Board that the University of Illinois should be contacted to determine if they wished to make a joint decision on the matter with the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

APPROVAL OF DOCTORAL PROGRAMS IN ANTHROPOLOGY, HEALTH EDU-CATION, PHYSIOLOGY, AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

To date, the Departments of Government, Speech Pathology, Microbiology, Secondary Education, Psychology, Speech, Zoology, Elementary Education, Educational Administration and Supervision, and Guidance have been approved by the Board of Trustees to offer doctoral programs. The Departments of Anthropology and Physiology, in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and the Departments of Health Education and Physical Education, in the College of Education, have now indicated their readiness to offer programs leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

The following consultants were invited to the campus to advise concerning the strength of the staffs, the library holdings, the laboratory and other physical facilities, and the basic curricula of these departments: Anthropology – Clyde Kluckhohn, Professor of Anthropology, Harvard University; Health Education– Oliver E. Byrd, Executive Head, Department of Health Education, Stanford University; Physical Education – A. A. Esslinger, Dean of the School of Health Education, Physical Education and Recreation, University of Oregon; Physiology – Lloyd M. Beidler, Professor of Physiology, The Florida State University. Their reports are in general enthusiastically favorable, and their advice concerning further strengthening of these departments is being followed.

The graduate staff of the Department of Anthropology includes Professor John Charles Kelley, holding a doctor's degree from Harvard University; Professor Walter W. Taylor, holding a doctor's degree from Harvard University; Associate Professor Charles Henry Lange, holding a doctor's degree from the University of New Mexico; Associate Professor Carroll L. Riley, holding a doctor's degree from the University of New Mexico; Assistant Professor Melvin Leo Fowler, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Chicago; Assistant Professor Charles Raymond Kaut, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Chicago; and Assistant Professor George W. Grace, holding a doctor's degree from Columbia University. During the coming academic year, the department will be strengthened by the services of a distinguished Visiting Professor, Mr. Philip J. C. Dark, who holds the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Yale University.

The Department of Health Education includes on its graduate staff Professor Donald N. Boydston, who holds a doctor's degree from Columbia University; Associate Professor A. Frank Bridges, who holds a doctor's degree from Indiana University; Associate Professor Leslie Ralph Casey, who holds a doctor's degree from Columbia University; Associate Professor Deward K. Grissom, who holds a doctor's degree from Columbia University; Associate Professor John R. LeFevre, who holds a doctor's degree from Columbia University; Assistant Professor Charles E. Richardson, who holds a doctor's degree from the University of California; and Assistant Professor Andrew T. Vaughan, who holds a doctor's degree from Columbia University.

We recommend that the Department of Anthropology and the Department of Health Education be authorized to accept candidates for the doctoral degree, effective with the fall quarter of 1960.

The graduate staff of the Department of Physiology consists of Professor Harold M. Kaplan, holding a doctor's degree from Harvard University; Associate Professor Frank J. Finamore, holding a doctor's degree from The Florida State University; and Associate Professor George Hiram Gass, holding a doctor's degree from Ohio State University. In addition, the department is strengthened by the services of Adjunct Professor Eli L. Borkon, who holds both the Doctor of Philosophy degree and the Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of Chicago.

The Departments of Physical Education for Men and Women include on their graduate staffs Professor Jay A. Bender, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Illinois; Professor Dorothy Davies, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Cincinnati; Professor Helen Zimmerman, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Wisconsin; Associate Professor Leslie Ralph Casey, holding a doctor's degree from Columbia University; Associate Professor John R. LeFevre, holding a doctor's degree from Columbia University; Associate Professor Edward J. Shea, holding a doctor's degree from New York University; and Assistant Professor Andrew T. Vaughan, holding a doctor's degree from Columbia University.

We recommend that the Department of Physiology and the Departments of Physical Education for Men and Women be authorized to accept candidates for the doctoral degree, effective with the fall quarter of 1961.

Applications of these four departments have been reviewed by the Graduate Council and recommended to the Dean of the Graduate School, who states that he endorses their requests.

Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board approve acceptance of candidates for the doctoral degree in the Department of Anthropology and the Department of Health Education, effective the fall quarter of 1960; further, that approval be given to accept candidates for the doctoral

degree in the Department of Physiology and the Departments of Physical Education for Men and Women, effective the fall quarter of 1961. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer and was carried by unanimous vote.

REPORT ON NEGOTIATIONS FOR BEULAH HOME

The option given by the Illinois Health Foundation, Inc., to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, was not exercised by August 1, 1960, due to technical objections to the issuance of revenue bonds. The response by financial institutions in the Madison-St. Clair area in supporting this venture was most encouraging, and the administration regrets to report that the purchase could not be consummated.

Mr. Rendleman explained that Chapman and Cutler had discouraged the issuance of revenue bonds for the purchase of the Beulah Home and felt that the Board's authority for the issuance of bonds for the Southwestern Illinois Campus should be specifically included in the statute. On the basis of this, it was deemed inadvisable to proceed with the issuance of these bonds. Mr. Rendleman also stated that the Illinois Health Foundation had been contacted concerning a request for leasing the Beulah Home, but after consideration they had declined to do so.

He explained that this amount was in addition to bonds maturing October 1, 1960, totaling \$18,000. On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board approved the retirement of bonds prior to maturity, as requested. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

UNIVERSITY BULLETIN FOR SOUTHWESTERN ILLINOIS CAMPUS

Part III, Article IV, Section 3 of the *By-laws and Statutes of the Board* of *Trustees* provides that the establishment, addition, and abolition of colleges, schools, departments, bureaus, and all other education units and of curricula and degrees is a function of the Board of Trustees.

It has therefore been our practice when a new department or other educational unit has been proposed, or when a curriculum which is not strictly identified with the program of such a unit is proposed, to make a thorough review of the soundness of the proposal, usually with the advice of impartial outside consultants, before recommending such units and/or curricula to the Board of Trustees for approval.

It has heretofore been assumed that the curricula being taught at the Southwestern Illinois Campuses are identical with those taught at Carbondale and hence that they have already been authorized. The Southwestern Illinois Campus now needs, however, to put out its own bulletin in the Catalog and Bulletin Series, listing the majors and minors which it can offer students in residence at Alton or East St. Louis. Because of the differences in the staff and facilities of the various campuses, it is not always possible for them to provide curricula identical in every respect with those at Carbondale. The proposed new bulletin, therefore, contains minor differences from the requirements for majors and minors which have prevailed at Carbondale.

A complicating factor is that the Southwestern Illinois campuses are now organized in broad divisions rather than in schools and colleges containing specialized departments. Each of these divisions therefore, needs to offer several curricula. For example, the Social Studies Division of the Southwestern Illinois Campus offers majors and minors corresponding to the curricula offered by the Government, Anthropology, History, Sociology, and Geography departments on the Carbondale Campus. Furthermore, the needs of the students in Southwestern Illinois are not necessarily identical in every respect with the needs of Carbondale students.

Because the facilities for offering the various curricula on the Southwestern Illinois Campuses will undoubtedly change rapidly within the next few years, it is believed that minor changes in existing curricula or creation of new courses should be approved by the President's Office when there is clear indication that new curricula are not coming into being. In any instance, however, where one of the curricula already approved for Carbondale is radically reconstituted to meet the needs of students in Southwestern Illinois, or where new curricula are devised and proposed by the divisions on the Southwestern Illinois Campus, the same sort of careful review of the program by the central administration of the University and formal approval by the Board of Trustees as has been accorded curricular proposals in the past will be required.

By common consent, the Board authorized the publication of a separate bulletin for Southwestern Illinois Campus in the Catalog and Bulletin Series.

Mr. Fischer indicated that in his position as a member of the Executive Committee he would appreciate having more information regarding repair, renovation, and remodeling. It was agreed that the administration would periodically furnish a listing of repair, renovation, and remodeling projects to the Board for their information.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

A report entitled "The Scope and Function of Public Higher Education in Illinois to 1957," prepared by the Committee to Recommend a State Plan for Public Higher Education in Illinois, a subcommittee of the Illinois Commission of Higher Education, was presented for the information of members of the Board. A copy of the report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

President Morris presented a list of recommended salary adjustments and requested approval by the Board. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board approved salary adjustments as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPLICATION FOR LOAN FOR STUDENT HOUSING

President Morris announced that the Housing and Home Finance Agency had recently approved a loan of \$4,200,000 for additional student housing, and that it would now be necessary to seek an additional \$3,900,-000 from private sources. He requested that the administration be authorized to make application for an additional loan for student housing from the Housing and Home Finance Agency and from private sources, in accordance with the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has from time to time authorized and directed the administration of Southern Illinois University to plan such housing as is necessary and desirable to accommodate the expanding student body of the University; and

WHEREAS, the administration, as a result of this directive, has prepared a program and plan for single student housing; and

WHEREAS, as a result of these studies and the proposed program, said administration has recommended the construction of additional facilities for 1,800 single students: 1,000 living units for men and 800 for women; now, therefore be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the administration of the University be and is authorized to make application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the Federal Government for a loan not to exceed \$5,250,000, and to make such arrangements as are necessary to provide for an additional loan of not to exceed \$5,250,000, or a total project cost of \$10,500,000, for the purpose of defraying the cost of the construction and equipping of the said residence hall facilities.

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On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted the above resolution. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris reported to the Board that Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman had recommended the employment of Blyth & Company, Inc., as bond agents. He indicated that this firm had been selected on the basis of national reputation and experience, and that their fee would be onefourth of one per cent of the total \$3,900,000 to be sought from private funds. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the employment of Blyth & Company, Inc., as bond agents to assist in seeking funds from private sources for the construction of additional student housing facilities. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris presented enrollment figures, including an estimate of between 8,500 and 9,000 students on the Carbondale Campus and an increase of approximately 57 per cent on the Southwestern Illinois Campus. Summaries were requested from the Registrars of both campuses showing the total number of students admitted from the lower quarter of their graduating classes under the admissions rule effective with the current academic quarter. A similar summary of transfer students admitted under the new ruling was also requested.

At the request of President Morris, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman reviewed for the Board an incident which occurred in Carbondale recently, during which a student was shot and killed following a drinking party. President Morris explained that the administration had attempted to work with Jackson and Williamson County law enforcement officers to encourage enforcement of laws governing the sale of liquor to minors, as well as the serving of excessive amounts of liquor to adult students. He indicated that little had been accomplished in this respect. In answer to a question, Dean I. Clark Davis stated that he would favor action which would place off-limits for students any place which violated State laws with regard to the serving of liquor. After consideration, Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Southern Illinois University has from time to time experienced grave and grievous problems as a result of the drinking of alcoholic beverages by students, both minor and adult, and in many respects the University stands *in loco parentis*, and must discharge this responsibility with every means available; and WHEREAS, this University and the students enrolled herein are beneficiaries of public financial support, which support is given for the purpose of securing an education; and

WHEREAS, excessive use by adult students and any use by minor students is prohibited by the laws of this state, as well as being contrary to good educational practice; and

WHEREAS, more specifically, the Board takes note of the recent tragedy involving students of this University wherein John Hunter was killed in Carbondale; now, therefore, be it

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session:

1. That the administration of Southern Illinois University is authorized to declare off-limits taverns and establishments selling alcoholic beverages, which by their actions violate the laws of this state or engage in practices not consistent with the welfare of the students of this institution. Any University student, either minor or adult, found frequenting premises declared off-limits shall be subject to immediate disciplinary action.

2. That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Liquor Commissioner of the City of Carbondale with the recommendation that he take appropriate action as provided by the laws of the State of Illinois with regard to the recent death of John Hunter, which was in part precipitated by drinking of alcoholic beverages and in which minors participated. It should further be recommended to the said Liquor Commissioner that he take such action with respect to future violations of the laws regarding alcoholic beverages as he deems necessary and desirable for preservation of the health, safety and welfare of the students of Southern Illinois University.

The motion was seconded by George T. Wilkins and was carried by the following vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Chairman John Page Wham reported the illness and current hospitalization of Mr. Martin F. Oehmke, a member of the Board's Executive Committee. On advice of the Legal Counsel, Mr. Kenneth L. Davis was appointed to serve as interim member of the Executive Committee.

President Morris reported briefly on relationships with the Board of Education of East St. Louis School District #189 and their desire that the University should continue to occupy the old East St. Louis High School building. He stated that the lease of the premises extends for a period of eight years, and it seemed desirable to continue to use these facilities.

At the regular meeting held August 12, 1960, members of the Board requested information regarding repair, renovation, and remodeling projects. A list was presented which showed general improvement and major repair projects instituted on the Carbondale Campus during June, July, and August, 1960, together with a list of proposed construction projects to be undertaken as funds are made available by the release of Capital Funds. A copy of this list was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees. Chairman John Page Wham requested that a similar list be prepared for the Southwestern Illinois Campus.

President Morris explained briefly the new bus service being offered for students through the cooperation of the Carbondale Chamber of Commerce and the Student Council. Schedules of bus service were distributed to the members of the Board for their information.

By common consent the regular meeting scheduled for October 22, 1960, was advanced to Thursday, October 27, and the date for the December meeting was advanced to December 10.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 р.м.

FORMAL APPROVAL OF AGREEMENT FOR LOAN FROM HOUSING AND HOME FINANCE AGENCY

At the meeting held September 17, 1960, the Board was informed by President Morris that the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government had approved a loan of \$4,200,000 for additional student housing. The Loan Agreement which follows sets forth the terms and conditions under which these bonds will be issued.

We recommend that the Board of Trustees formally approve this Loan Agreement. It has been reviewed by the Business Manager and Treasurer, the Director of Auxiliary Enterprises, the firm of Chapman and Cutler, the fiscal agent Blyth & Company, and the Legal Counsel.

A resolution entitled "Resolution Approving and Providing for the Execution of a Loan Agreement, and Numbered Contract No. H(402)-461, By and Between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America" was introduced, as follows:

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, as follows:

Section 1. The pending Loan Agreement and numbered Contract No. H(402)-461, and relating to the erection on the campus of Southern Illinois University, an educational institution of higher learning located in Carbondale, Illinois, six (6) small group dormitories, 522 space dormitories in the Thompson Point housing unit, including an addition to the central service and dining hall, and 148 apartment units at the Southern Hills housing project, by and between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America, is hereby in all respects approved.

Section 2. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees at Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized and directed to execute the said Loan Agreement in three counterparts on behalf of the said Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized and directed to impress and attest the official seal of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, on each such counterpart and to forward two such counterparts to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, together with such other documents relative to the approval and execution of such counterparts and to this Resolution as may be required by the Government.

Said resolution and the proposed Loan Agreement described therein were then read in full and discussed and considered.

Kenneth L. Davis then moved the adoption of the resolution as introduced and read. Mrs. Stella Collins seconded the motion, and, on roll call, the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

The Chairman thereupon declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted as introduced and read. A copy of the Loan Agreement was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

APPROVAL OF ACQUISITION OF LAND BY CONDEMNATION The following Resolution is recommended for adoption:

Resolution

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled this 27th day of October, 1960, has on this and on previous occasions approved certain plans for the establishment, development, and future expansion of Southern Illinois University's Southwestern Illinois Campus at Edwardsville, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide additional grounds for the location of buildings, site development, and future expansion of facilities necessary for the establishment of said Campus, it will be necessary to acquire certain tracts and parcels of real estate; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it is necessary to the establishment, development, and future expansion of the said Southwestern Illinois Campus of Southern Illinois University to acquire for use by Southern Illinois University the following parcel of real estate located in the County of Madison and State of Illinois:

The West fractional half of Section 16, Township 4 North, Range 8 West of the 3rd P.M. in Madison County, Illinois, excepting therefrom the following tracts:

1. The North 25 chains.

2. The South 380 feet of the East 666 feet.

3. That part of the Northwest fractional quarter of said Section 16 falling North of the South 1.48 chains and East of the West 13.85 chains of said fractional quarter section.

4. That part falling westerly of the following-described line: Beginning on the South line of said section 16 at a point 1540.8 feet West of the Southeast corner of said fractional half section, thence North 16 degrees, 13 minutes West, 138 feet to the southerly line of claim 928 survey 587.

5. That part conveyed to Fred E. Allen by deed recorded March 18, 1905, in Book 311, page 16 and shown in Plat Book 6, page 94. Also: Claim 928, survey 587 (except that part thereof falling southwesterly of the following described line: Commencing at a point on the southerly line of said claim and survey which is 206.1 feet northeasterly of its intersection with the South line of said Section 16, thence North 16 degrees, 13 minutes West, 413.3 feet to the line between said claim and survey. And claim 517, survey 589.),

WHEREAS, said unacquired tract is immediately necessary for the proper establishment of the Southwestern Illinois Campus of Southern Illinois University, if reasonable offers of purchase based on able appraiser opinion are refused by the owner or owners of such tracts; be it

Resolved, by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it proceed to condemn the above-described tract to be acquired for the establishment of said Campus.

After discussion, Melvin C. Lockard moved that the Board adopt the resolution presented. The motion was seconded by Harold R. Fischer and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

ESTABLISHMENT OF STUDENT WELFARE DEVELOPMENT FUND

By previous action the Board of Trustees has directed that all net profits from vending machines on the campus and all funds collected from traffic and parking violations should be deposited in the Student Union Building Fund. Since these funds have been used for the purpose designated, but cannot be pledged for the retirement of bonds now issued for the construction of the University Center, it is recommended that the Board authorize the deposit of the funds in and the establishment of a new account, "Student Welfare Development Fund." This fund would be used in the future for the development of projects aimed at the improvement of student welfare and for which the use of appropriations from the state might be unwise, inappropriate, or inadequate.

It is requested that this action be effective as of July 1, 1960.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the establishment of an account entitled "Student Welfare Development Fund," effective July 1, 1960, as requested. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

AUTHORIZATION FOR USE OF SIGNATURE MACHINE

Approval is requested for the following resolution, which would authorize the use of a signature machine at the Southwestern Illinois Campus in signing checks against the local banks, the First National Bank and Trust Company, Alton, Illinois, and the First National Bank, East St. Louis, Illinois. Checks have been signed manually by the Business Manager to date. During absences, such as sickness, vacation, business trips, etc., the processing of routine payments is delayed unless official approval for a temporary change in signature is secured. The signature machine, properly controlled, eliminates such delay in rendering payments.

Resolution

Resolved, that the First National Bank and Trust Company in Alton and the First National Bank in East St. Louis as designated depositaries of the University be and it is hereby requested, authorized and directed to honor checks, drafts, or other orders for the payment of money drawn in the University's name, including those payable to the individual order of any person or persons whose name or names appear thereon as signer or signers thereof, when bearing or purporting to bear the facsimile signature of: C. E. Peebles, and the First National Bank and Trust Company in Alton and the First National Bank in East St. Louis shall be entitled to honor and to charge the University for such checks, drafts or other orders, regardless of by whom or by what means the actual or purported signature or signatures thereon may have been affixed thereto, if such signature or signatures resemble the facsimile specimens duly certified to or filed with the First National Bank and Trust Company in Alton and the First National Bank in East St. Louis, by the Secretary or other officer of the University; said checks to be manually signed by C. E. Peebles personally or machine signed with the signature of C. E. Peebles.

Be It Further Resolved, that the name of the checking account at the First National Bank and Trust Company in Alton shall be changed from S.I.U. ALTON RESIDENCE CENTER to read BOARD OF TRUSTEES, SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY, and the name of the checking account at the First National Bank in East St. Louis shall be changed from S.I.U. EAST ST. LOUIS RESIDENCE CENTER to read BOARD OF TRUSTEES, SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

Copies of the annual audit report prepared by C. J. Schlosser & Company for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, were presented to the members of the Board. Also presented were copies of Schlosser & Company's fiscal management recommendations, together with a letter of comment prepared by Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly. Members of the Board were requested to consider the report for consideration at a subsequent meeting.

The Board next considered the following resolution, copies of which had been mailed to each member prior to this meeting by Chairman John Page Wham:

Resolution

WHEREAS, the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, Local No. 878, has appealed to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University regarding the failure of the administration to negotiate with and recognize them as the union representing the classifications of Policeman and Police Sergeant for personnel employed by this Board under the University Civil Service System; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees and the administration of Southern Illinois University have recognized and do recognize for purposes of negotiating for certain phases of employment the said Local 878 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, in classifications covering Cooks Helper, Second Cook, First Cook, Fountain Attendant, Garage Attendant, Automotive Mechanic Helper, Automotive Mechanic, and Grounds Foreman; and

WHEREAS, the administration's failure to grant the request for union recognition and representation with respect to said Policeman and Police Sergeant classifications was and is based upon an opinion as submitted by the University's Legal Counsel, dated June 8, 1959 stating, among other things, that it would be "entirely improper and illegal for the University to enter into any type of an agreement covering wage negotiations, collective bargaining, seniority rights, rights to observe strikes called by either this union or another union, or a grievance procedure for its police force," and

WHEREAS, as a result of this appeal the Board of Trustees has on two occasions heard presentations made by the representatives of this union, to-wit: Mr. C. "Tiny" Groeteke and Mr. Adrian Mitten, on June 15, 1960, and again on August 12, 1960; and

WHEREAS, no legal precedent has been cited which is contrary to the opinion of University counsel or the court decisions upon which it is based, *Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved* by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that said action of the University Administration be and it is hereby affirmed subject, however, to further consideration if and when the Illinois law be changed or otherwise established.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution as presented. The motion was carried by unanimous vote. The Recorder for the Board was instructed to transmit a copy of the resolution to Mr. C. "Tiny" Groeteke, Illinois State Representative and Organizer of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees.

Preliminary discussions held at previous meetings, concerning assumption by the University of the operation of Southern Illinois Airport and the purchase of the necessary physical inventory to continue such operation, were reviewed by President Morris. He distributed to the Board a report prepared by John S. Rendleman, Acting Executive Director of Business Affairs for the Carbondale Campus, which contained a summary of negotiations to date, future steps to be taken to implement the acquisition, and a report on the educational aspects of the program. Following discussion, Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board authorize the administration to proceed with the acquisition and assignment of operation at a total cost not to exceed \$58,000. This motion was seconded by George T. Wilkins and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris reported upon the progress of the study of nursing in the southern thirty-one counties and presented a requisition to the Executive Committee to cover the initial cost of such study, in amount of \$5,000.00. This requisition was approved by the members of the Executive Committee. The consensus of the Board was that the administration should proceed with negotiations for a study of the health facility needs of the entire thirty-one counties in Southern Illinois. President Morris indicated that the cost of such a study might be between \$10,000.00 and \$12,000.00.

President Morris presented a report on reconstruction and rehabilitation items undertaken by the University for the Southwestern Campus, patterned after a previous report presented for the Carbondale Campus. Mr. Fischer indicated that he was not present at the previous meeting, but that he found the report unsatisfactory. He stated that the report did not cover those items concerning which he had requested information. The item was deferred until the next meeting of the Board.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:45 P.M.

DEGEMBER MEETING

THE DECEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Saturday, December 10, 1960, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Mrs. Stella Collins, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Lindell W. Sturgis. Mr. Oehmke and Mr. Wilkins were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President J. E. Grinnell, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly, University Architect Charles Pulley, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, William Brunner, reporter for *The Alton Evening Telegraph*, Carl Mayhew, reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held October 27, 1960, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, these minutes were approved as presented.

On April 1, 1959, the Board had approved the Campus Master Plan for the development of the Carbondale Campus. University Architect Charles Pulley was introduced to the members of the Board and presented a map showing proposed revisions to the Campus Master Plan, explaining in detail where changes were being requested. Following this presentation, President Morris recommended that such revisions be approved by the Board of Trustees. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved revisions to the Campus Master Plan, as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none. The approved Campus Master Plan, dated December 1, 1960, was placed on file in the office of the Board of Trustees.

Chairman John Page Wham presented a letter received from Mr. Henry T. Wilson, Administrative Attorney for the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees, dated November 22, 1960. Also presented was a copy of Mr. Wham's reply, dated November 29, 1960. The Recorder was instructed to place copies of these letters on file with the Secretary of the Board.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

> APPROVAL OF MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAMS IN INTER-AMERICAN STUDIES AND REHABILITATION

Approval is requested for the offering of a Master of Arts degree in Inter-American Studies through the present Latin-American Institute, effective immediately.

Two consultants, Professor Ronald Hilton of Stanford University and Professor A. Curtis Wilgus of the University of Florida, have investigated our program and stated that our faculty members, our library holdings, and our general facilities for curricula leading to the Master's degree are more than adequate.

The Latin-American Institute has no teaching staff of its own, but will draw upon specialists in the Foreign Languages Department, the Economics Department, the History Department, the Government Department, the Geography Department, the Anthropology Department, etc. The demand for trained people in this field is great and is likely to increase with the growing emphasis on sound working relationships between the United States and other American countries. Both our consultants have commented on our strategic location in the Mississippi Valley and the distinct possibility that Southern Illinois might become the midwestern center for Inter-American relationships.

Approval is also requested for the offering of curricula leading to both the Master of Science and the Master of Arts degrees by the Rehabilitation Institute, effective immediately. This Institute was originally established to train rehabilitation counselors at the graduate level under federal grants. The degrees offered thus far have been confined to this program, but there has been a demand among the trainees for degrees with a somewhat broader base, particularly for those desiring to coordinate or administer rehabilitation programs.

The offering of these Master's degrees in Inter-American Studies and in Rehabilitation has been recommended by the Graduate Council of the University.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the offering of curricula leading to the Master of Arts degree in Inter-American Studies, effective immediately. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board also approved the offering of curricula leading to both the Master of Science and Master of Arts degrees by the Rehabilitation Institute, effective immediately. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPROVAL OF DOCTORAL PROGRAM IN HOME ECONOMICS

Approval is requested for the development of curricula leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Home Economics, with the proviso that students should not be accepted until the availability of additional completed space in the Home Economics Building makes possible the vacating of certain rooms now in use as classrooms and their adaptation to Home Economics research.

Following the recommendation of the Graduate Council for the offering of the doctor's degree in Home Economics, Dean Emerita Marie Dye of the Michigan State University School of Home Economics was invited to our campus to evaluate the proposed program. Dean Dye has stated that we have an excellent staff, with an unusually high proportion of persons holding the doctor's degree; that the library holdings are adequate for research in the major branches of Home Economics; and that the Home Economics Building, as planned for completion, is an unusually good one for this purpose.

Approval of the proposal at this time will enable the departments in the School of Home Economics to plan their curricula and to organize their staffs so that doctoral candidates can be accepted when further work on the Home Economics Building can be completed.

On motion of Mrs. Stella Collins, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved development of curricula leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Home Economics, contingent upon the proviso stated. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

MODIFICATION OF ADMISSIONS POLICY

At the December 12, 1959, meeting of the Board of Trustees, a proposed admissions policy, effective for the fall quarter of 1960, was presented as follows:

1. Students who graduate from approved secondary schools, and who rank in the lowest quarter of their graduating class, will be permitted to enter (on academic probation) for the summer, winter, or spring quarters only. Exceptions to this rule may be made for students desiring to enter in the fall who rank in the lowest quarter of their high school graduating classes, but who show high scores on the University's entrance examinations.

2. The same policy will apply to transfer students who are not in good scholastic standing under our scholarship rules. They can enter (on academic probation) the summer, winter, or spring quarters only, subject to the approval of the appropriate academic dean.

Our initial experience with this policy has demonstrated its value but also has suggested the need for certain desirable modifications if the policy is to be continued. As a result of consultation with the appropriate faculty bodies on the two main campuses of the University, approval is requested for the following University-wide admissions policy, effective the fall quarter of 1961:

1. In general, students who graduate from approved secondary schools, and who rank in the lowest *third* of their graduating class, will be permitted to enter (on academic probation) for the summer, winter, or spring quarters only. Exceptions to this rule may be made for students desiring to enter in the fall who rank in the lowest third of their high school graduating class, but who show high scores on the University's entrance examinations.

2. The above policy will apply to both in-state and out-of-state students, except that for out-of-state students all those in the lower *half* of their graduating class will be covered by the rule.

3. The same policy will apply to transfer students who are not in good scholastic standing under our scholarship rules. They can enter (on academic probation) the summer, winter, or spring quarters only, subject to the approval of the appropriate academic dean.

It is felt that the above policy will not keep out of college any student who really wishes to attend, but that it will make it possible to improve the quality of our student body and to spread the enrollment more evenly throughout the year. It is also felt that the policy will encourage an educationally desirable number of superior out-of-state students to attend Southern Illinois University, but will tend to discourage weak or undesirable students from out-of-state.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the recommended modification of the admissions policy by unanimous vote.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois, as follows:

1. That the aforementioned proposals be accepted by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the contracts be awarded to the bidders in accordance with the terms of their proposals, subject to the concurrence of the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States of America.

2. That the President of the University or his designated representative be authorized to notify the successful bidders of the award of the contracts to them on such terms.

3. That the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and directed to execute such contracts.

A tabulation of all bids received on November 3, 1960, for completion of the Thompson Point Development, was presented. Mr. John S. Rendleman, Legal Counsel, indicated that both the bond agents and the Housing and Home Finance Agency had recommended that this resolution be approved, subject to the availability of funds. He stated that approval would be contingent upon the resolving of legal questions involved in the bid on the general work on the addition to the dining hall and student services building, where Buckley Construction Company had asked that their bid be withdrawn due to mistakes made in the preparation of the bid.

Resolution Approving and Providing for the Execution of a Loan Agreement, and Numbered Contract No. H(402)-461, By and Between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, as follows:

SECTION 1. The pending Loan Agreement and numbered Contract No. H(402)-461, and relating to the erection on the campus of Southern Illinois University, an educational institution of higher learning located in Carbondale, Illinois, five residence halls and necessary appurtenant facilities for approximately 615 students, and five student counselors; six dormitories to provide housing, dining and necessary appurtenant facilities for approximately 184 men and 92 women students and six housemothers; and nine apartment buildings to provide housing and necessary appurtenant facilities for 144 student families, by and between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America, is hereby in all respects approved.

SECTION 2. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees at Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized and directed to execute the said Loan Agreement in three counterparts on behalf of the said Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized and directed to impress and attest the official seal of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, on each such counterpart and to forward two such counterparts to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, together with such other documents relative to the approval and execution of such counterparts and to this Resolution as may be required by the Government.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted the amended resolution as introduced and read. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

FM RADIO SURVEY FOR EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Preliminary conferences and discussions have indicated a desirability for a feasibility and engineering study of the possibility of an FM radio station for Southern Illinois University on the Edwardsville Campus. Before proceeding further with the matter, however, an expression of reaction from the Board of Trustees is requested. If the feasibility and engineering study indicates the desirability of seeking an FM station, we would then submit the matter, together with the study, to the Board for a formal resolution to proceed.

Approval is requested at this time for authorization to investigate and study the matter.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board authorized the administration to proceed with a study relative to an FM radio station for the Edwardsville Campus. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORT ON AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

On Saturday, December 3, at 1:55 A.M., a University vehicle was involved in an accident which totally demolished the car. At the time of the accident the car was being driven by Aubrey E. Neeley of Montgomery, Alabama, who has been a participant in the Blind Counselor's Training Program for the University's Rehabilitation Institute during this fall. In accordance with the grant received from the federal government for conducting this program, travel for personal necessities is provided the trainees. Since approximately sixty per cent of the trainees are blind, it is necessary to provide transportation for them for purposes such as meals, laundry, and plant visitations which they make in this area and in the area of St. Louis. The University is reimbursed from the grant for legitimate travel conducted in University cars.

Upon investigation and discussion with the personnel responsible for this program and upon the statement given by Mr. Neeley to the coroner, it appears that his use of the automobile at the time the accident occurred was not authorized and therefore contrary to the permission which had been given for the use of the car. As a result, the administration requests authority, if it is deemed advisable after the consideration of all factors, to bring suit against Mr. Aubrey E. Neeley for the value of the automobile which was destroyed during its unauthorized use. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board authorized the administration to institute suit for the value of the demolished automobile if such action seemed advisable after consideration of all factors. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris indicated that the administration was ready to proceed with preliminary planning and design of three units of the central area of the Edwardsville Campus, namely, the library, the student center building, and the central office and service building. He requested authorization to negotiate for a contract with the Campus Master Planners for preliminary design and basic design drawings for these three buildings. By common consent the Board authorized the administration to proceed as requested.

Copies of a letter received from the Tractor and Implement Division of Ford Motor Company, dated December 7, 1960, were distributed to the members of the Board. President Morris explained that this company was interested in planning for a training center to be developed through a cooperative program with Southern Illinois University at the Edwardsville Campus, on or adjacent to University-owned land. He requested authorization to continue discussions and explore the possibility of such a cooperative project. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board authorized President Morris to continue discussions concerning the cooperative project; further, the Board empowered President Morris to act if and when he felt such action justified.

President Morris stated that it was necessary to name a depository for loan funds approved by the Housing and Home Finance Agency. He requested authorization to seek a Southern Illinois bank large enough to serve as such depository, and the request was granted by the Board.

Chairman John Page Wham presented three resolutions received December 9, 1960, from certain labor groups in the Madison-St. Clair counties area, in protest to the recent change made by President Morris in the administrative staff at Southwestern Illinois Campus. By common consent the Board adopted the following statement: The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University feels that the decisions of both Dr. See and President Morris are to the best interests of the University program in Madison and St. Clair Counties; we concur in their actions.

Also presented was a letter and attached resolution from Dr. Robert Lynn, Chairman of the Southwestern Illinois Council for Higher Education, which was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

A requisition was presented covering the proposed purchase of a Cessna 310 airplane for use at Southern Illinois Airport. Chairman Wham indicated that the new purchase price on the 1960 model was \$96,000.00, whereas the administration was recommending purchase of a plane which had been flown 250 hours, at cost of \$75,000.00. It was the consensus of the Board that the plane should be purchased at no more than \$75,000.00, and that bids should be sought from various dealers. Mr. Sturgis submitted the name of a Paducah, Kentucky, dealer from whom a bid might be submitted.

A tentative report concerning general degree requirements, prepared by a full-time committee of three persons, was distributed to the members of the Board. President Morris indicated that the report had been submitted to the faculties of the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses with a request for comments.

The meeting was adjourned at 4 P.M.



FEBRUARY MEETING

THE FEBRUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Friday, February 3, 1961, beginning at 10 A.M.

The Board of Trustees has previously approved the offering of doctoral programs in fourteen departments, namely, Government, Speech Pathology, Microbiology, Secondary Education, Psychology, Speech, Zoology, Elementary Education, Educational Administration and Supervision, Guidance, Anthropology, Health Education, Physiology, and Physical Education for Men and Women. At the meeting of the Board held December 10, 1960, the School of Home Economics was authorized to begin planning curricula leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree. The departments of English and Sociology, both in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, have now indicated their readiness to offer programs leading to the doctorate.

Mr. W. F. Albrecht, Chairman of the Department of English Language and Literature, The University of Kansas, was invited to the campus to advise concerning the strength of the staff, the library holdings, the basic curricula of the English Department, and office and classroom facilities. His report was extremely favorable, and his advice concerning improving the department can be followed within our usual procedures for strengthening our programs.

The graduate staff of the English Department includes Professor James Benziger, who holds a doctor's degree from Princeton University; Professor E. C. Coleman, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Illinois; Professor Robert D. Faner, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Pennsylvania; Professor J. E. Grinnell, who holds a doctor's degree from Stanford University; Professor Jesse W. Harris, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Illinois; Professor Harry T. Moore, who holds a doctor's degree from Boston University; Professor W. B. Schneider, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Chicago; Professor Charles D. Tenney, who holds a doctors' degree from The University of Oregon; Professor Georgia G. Winn, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Pittsburgh; Associate Professor Daniel Cook, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of California; Associate Professor Edith S. Krappe, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Pennsylvania; Associate Professor William E. Simeone, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Pennsylvania; Associate Professor E. Earle Stibitz, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Michigan; Assistant Professor George C. Camp, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Illinois; Assistant Professor Fred K. Lingle, who holds a doctor's degree from The University of Illinois; Assistant Professor Walter Staton, who holds a doctor's degree from the University of Pennsylvania; and Assistant Professor Howard Webb, who holds a doctor's degree from The State University of Iowa.

Professor William H. Sewell, Chairman of the Department of Sociology at The University of Wisconsin, served as consultant to evaluate the strength of the staff, the library holdings, the laboratory and other physical facilities, and the basic and proposed curricula of the Department of Sociology. His report also was generally favorable, and he has provided advice which will be helpful in strengthening the department.

The Sociology Department includes on its graduate staff Professor Paul J. Campisi, holding a doctor's degree from The University of Chicago; Professor Joseph K. Johnson, holding a doctor's degree from Washington University; Professor Herman R. Lantz, holding a doctor's degree from Ohio State University; Professor Peter A. Munch, holding a doctor's degree from The University of Oslo, Norway; Professor Charles R. Snyder, holding a doctor's degree from Yale University; Professor William J. Tudor, holding a doctor's degree from Iowa State University; Associate Professor Melvin Brooks, holding a doctor's degree from the University of Wisconsin; Associate Professor A. J. Shafter, holding a doctor's degree from Iowa State University; Assistant Professor Douglas Rennie, holding a doctor's degree from Yale University; and Assistant Professor Eloise Snyder, holding a doctor's degree from The Pennsylvania State University. The department is further strengthened at present by the services of a distinguished and internationally known Visiting Professor, Mr. Stuart A. Queen, who is an expert in the field of urban sociology.

It is recommended that the Department of English and the Department of Sociology be authorized to accept candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree, effective at the beginning of the Summer Quarter, June 19, 1961.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board authorized the Department of English and the Department of Sociology to accept students for the doctoral degree, effective June 19, 1961. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

ELABORATION OF POLICY ON REMISSION OF FEES FOR FACULTY AND STAFF

On February 19, 1957, the Board of Trustees approved formally the traditional policy of remitting tuition, exclusive of costs of books and supplies, for full-time faculty and staff members of the University taking either credit or non-credit courses.

Since that date the University's development in size and scope has been accompanied by a diversity in the type of appointments made to the faculty and staff. This diversity has created fairly frequent need for interpretation of this tuition remission policy as to what constitutes faculty and staff status. Many of the types of appointments now in use traditionally carry remission of tuition but are not necessarily full-time positions.

It appears that a revision of the policy at this time could both take into account new factors and thus reduce the necessity for interpretation, and at the same time extend and continue the University's interest in encouraging all present faculty and staff to undertake technical and professional upgrading, and in attracting and retaining personnel who will endeavor to develop their full capabilities.

It is therefore recommended that the Board approve this extension of the traditional policy of remitting tuition exclusive of costs of books and supplies for all faculty and staff within the faculty payroll classification or administrative classification of the University Statutes or classified as University Civil Service employees under the applicable Statutes of the State of Illinois. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved extension of the traditional policy on remission of tuition, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

AMENDMENT OF RESOLUTION ACCEPTING BIDS FOR THOMPSON POINT FACILITIES

WHEREAS, at the meeting of the Board held December 10, 1960, a resolution was approved accepting proposals for construction of facilities on Thompson Point, subject to the concurrence of the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, it was at that time stated and understood that approval of the proposal for performing the general work on the addition to the dining hall and student services building was contingent on the resolution of legal questions involved in the request of Buckley Construction Company that their bid be withdrawn due to mistakes in the preparation thereof; and

WHEREAS, it now appears that there were clerical errors which resulted in said bid being substantially below the cost of the work involved; now, therefore, be it

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois, as follows:

1. That the Buckley Construction Company be allowed to withdraw their proposal for performing the general work for the additions to the dining hall and student services building, without thereby forfeiting their bid bond.

2. That the action of the Board at the meeting of December 10, 1960, be and is hereby amended by the substitution of "J. J. Altman and Company – \$388,200" in the place of "Buckley Construction Company – \$337,872" as the lowest and best bid for the general work on the additions to the dining hall and student services building in the resolution approved that date entitled "Resolution accepting proposals for five residence halls, additions and alterations to dining hall and student services building, and utilities for five residence halls, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, Illinois."

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the amendatory resolution presented. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

MEMORANDUM OF THE JOINT COUNCIL ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Following is a memorandum concerning staff services, submitted by the Steering Committee of the Joint Council on Higher Education, which is self-explanatory. It is recommended that the Board approve the principle of joint preparation, presentation, and support of budgets by the six state-supported institutions of higher learning in Illinois and authorize commitment of \$7,000.00 as Southern's share in the project outlined.

JOINT COUNCIL ON HIGHER EDUCATION Memorandum Concerning Staff Services

The six state universities of Illinois exist to serve the State through providing high quality educational services for the people of Illinois. In order to promote this goal the universities have associated themselves, for more than two decades, in the Joint Council on Higher Education. Substantial achievements can already be credited to the work of this Council even though it has not had the full-time services of any professional staff.

The Joint Council, for example, has recognized the advantages that would accrue from the development of a degree of uniformity in computing the biennial budget needs of the various state-supported institutions of higher education. Budget preparation is necessarily a complex and detailed process, and budget presentations are not easily understood by those who have not participated throughout their preparation. Such persons are frequently searching for some "yardstick" with which to evaluate the requests and to assure themselves that the requests of the various institutions have been submitted on a comparable basis.

The universities have already achieved uniformity in the form used in presenting the budgets and in the type of detailed information which justifies the budget requests. This information is necessarily quite extensive and likely to be neglected by the casual reader.

The "formula" method of budget preparation is now used to a limited extent in numerous states with varying degrees of success. The extent to which it is useful is dependent on the rationality of the "formula" used. This suggests that the procedures must for a time be experimental. The Joint Council desires to explore the possibility of developing simple, but defensible, procedures which would, to whatever extent possible, produce comparable budget data for the universities of Illinois. If successful, these procedures would be used in the preparation of the budgets for the biennium 1963-65.

Suggested Duties of Professional Staff

The chief initial assignment of the professional staff would be that outlined above. It is believed that this would require the major portion of staff time available for approximately a year.

In addition, the Joint Council has already felt the need for various other inter-institutional studies. Two of these, both of which are closely related to the budget study, concern space utilization (which was reported on as of 1954, 1955, and 1960), and salary costs of instruction (which was the subject of an exhaustive study in 1951-52). The staff would probably need to repeat such studies, and to conduct such others as might be assigned to it by the Joint Council.

Finally, the staff could perform the important organizing and coordinating services which are needed to make the Joint Council function most effectively. This would include such duties as the keeping of records, the activating of committees, and the assembling of reports. At present these duties are likely to be performed, in a somewhat haphazard fashion, by quasi-volunteers who already carry heavy assignments.

Suggested Qualifications of Staff Director

The head of the staff should be a fully qualified professional person with experience in higher education. He should have special competence in research and particular knowledge of the field of budgets and institutional finance. He probably should be selected from outside any of the six universities.

Financing the Staff

The six universities should contribute to a joint fund to finance the work of the staff. It is recommended that these contributions follow the same proportion as was used in 1952 when the Joint Council set up its initial study program (costing \$20,000). These proportions are:

The Joint Council further recommends that the fund now established consist of a total of 35,000 (U. of I. - 14,000, Southern - 7,000, I.S.N.U., Eastern, Northern, Western - 3,500 each), to be allocated substantially as follows:

Note: The above program has been approved by the Joint Council on Higher Education and carried out recommendations of the Illinois Conference on Higher Education and the Illinois Commission of Higher Education.

Southern Illinois University

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board approved the principle of coordination of budgets and authorized the administration to contribute Southern's share of \$7,000.00 toward the expense of the project. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT FOR 1960-61

It is recommended the audit firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Company be approved by the Board of Trustees to make the independent audit of the accounts and financial operations of Southern Illinois University for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961; and that the administration be authorized to enter into a joint agreement between Mr. Frank Whitney, Auditor General; Southern Illinois University; and Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Company for the audit.

The Auditor General concurs with this recommendation and will again share in the cost of the audit.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the selection of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Company to make the independent audit of accounts for the fiscal year 1960-61. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Davis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris presented to the members of the Board copies of Part I (Charter of the Board of Trustees) and Part II (By-Laws of the Board of Trustees) of the By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees. Part I showed suggested changes requiring amendatory legislation, and Part II showed proposed amendments to be made by Board action. The Board authorized the introduction of amendatory legislation at an appropriate time and agreed to consider all the proposed amendments at the next regular meeting.

President Morris briefly reviewed existing arrangements with the Board of Education of School District #189, St. Clair County, Illinois, for use by the University of a part of the old high school building. He indicated that the Board of Education of School District #189 had made several proposals, namely, for increased rent; for purchase of the building by the University; for a reduction in the amount of space to be used by the University; or for a reduction in the number of hours per day during which the University might use the space now occupied.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board agreed unanimously to authorize the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to appoint a committee to work in cooperation with the administration to consider possible negotiation of a long-range workable lease of the old East St. Louis High School Building, School District #189, St. Clair County, Illinois, or to consider possible purchase of the said property; further, to explore and examine other possible available facilities in southwestern Illinois.

President Morris recommended that the word "Carbondale" be deleted from the official seal of the University and from the official seal of the Board of Trustees, and that re-design of the official seal be studied. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved the deletion recommended and authorized study for re-designing the official seals.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:30 P.M.

MARCH MEETING

THE MARCH MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board on Thursday, March 2, 1961, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the Board held February 3, 1961, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice was mailed on February 15, 1961, of the intention to request amendment to Part II (By-Laws of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University) at this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board adopted amendments to read as follows:

Part II, Article I, Section 1

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held at least once each quarter of the academic year on a campus of the University. Additional regular meetings may be scheduled by the Board. Written notice of all regular meetings and of the agenda therefor shall be given by the Secretary to each member of the Board and to the President of the University not less than ten days prior to such meetings. The Board may, by unanimous consent, consider and act upon matters which are not submitted ten days in advance of a meeting.

Part II, Article I, Section 3

Four members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business except as otherwise provided by these By-Laws. Any number less than a quorum present at a meeting, duly called, may adjourn from time to time until a quorum shall be in attendance.

Part II, Article I, Section 4

Action in Regular and Special Meetings. At all regular and special meetings it shall be valid to act on any subject within the power of the Board except as provided elsewhere in these By-Laws. It shall be the policy of the Board to act only upon matters set forth in the agenda or the consideration of which any absent member or members shall have had adequate prior notice.

Part II, Article I, Section 5

Place of Meetings. At least once each quarter a meeting of the Board shall be held on a campus of the Southern Illinois University and other regular and special meetings shall be held on a campus unless otherwise ordered by the Board or another place of meeting is indicated in the written notice for a special meeting.

Part II, Article I, Section 6

Order of Business. The business at each regular or special meeting of the Board shall be conducted in the following manner unless otherwise authorized by appropriate Board action:

- B. Reading and approval of minutes of last meeting.
- C. Reading and action with respect to minutes of prior Committee Meetings.
- D. Selection of officers.
- E. Reports and recommendations of the President of the University.

- G. Communications, petitions, and memorials.
- H. Reports and recommendations of the Treasurer.
- I. Unfinished Business.
- J. New Business.

Part II, Article I, Section 7

Rules of Procedure. Board meetings shall be conducted according to Roberts' rules of parliamentary procedure, except as modified by the Board. The ayes and noes shall be called and entered upon each vote and any motion involving the expenditure of money shall be by call of the roll. Others may be by voice vote.

Part II, Article I, Section 8

Minutes. Minutes of the proceedings of the Board shall be kept by its Secretary, personally or by a competent Recorder designated by the Board. Minutes

of meetings of and actions recommended by the Committees of the Board shall be kept by a secretary designated by each such Committee and shall be submitted to the Board for approval. They shall be deposited with the Secretary of the Board. The offices of the Board shall serve as a depository of all reports and other documents upon or with relation to which the Board has acted. The annual report of the Board may include summary statements covering all the actions of the Board.

Part II, Article III, Section 1

Section 1. The Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chairman and of two other members of the Board elected at the first regular meeting following the third Monday in each January. The Executive Committee shall have authority to transact such routine business as may arise during the recess of the Board and to act for the Board in all matters of an emergency nature upon which immediate decisions are necessary for the present welfare of the University.

The decision of the Chairman as to what matters are of a routine or emergency nature, and therefore within the scope of the above authority, shall be final unless otherwise decided by the Board, in accordance with Section 3 of Article II of these By-Laws. An affirmative decision by the Chairman on this question, in the absence of any prior contrary determination by the Board, together with the concurrence of a majority of the Executive Committee on the action to be taken, shall be sufficient to authorize the execution by the Chairman of contracts or other legal documents necessary to the implementation of the action desired.

All actions taken by the Executive Committee shall be reported in writing to the Board at its next regular or special meeting for information and shall be entered in full upon the Minutes of such meeting of such Board.

Part II, Article III, Section 2

Special Committees. Special committees may be appointed from time to time as the Board may deem desirable. Each committee shall be automatically discharged at the end of the first regular meeting following the third Monday in each January unless the Board takes specific action to extend its life beyond that period.

Part II, Article IV, Section 2

Superintendence of Construction. After any contract shall have been awarded for the construction of a new building, or for rehabilitation and repair projects, supervision of such construction or projects shall be the responsibility of the University Architect, as the agent of the Board through the President. The University Architect shall also certify completion of all major construction projects to the President and the Board of Trustees, for acceptance of such projects by the Board. The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for considering bids received for the purchase of \$3,900,000 Dormitory and Apartment Bonds, Series A of 1960, and \$4,200,000 Dormitory and Apartment Bonds, Series B of 1960, of Southern Illinois University, pursuant to a Notice of Sale published in the Bond Buyer on February 15, 1961. The Secretary presented publisher's affidavit of publication of said Notice of Sale on February 15, 1961, and Trustee Lindell W. Sturgis made a motion that said Notice of Sale as so published be ratified, approved and confirmed by this Board of Trustees, which motion was seconded by Trustee Kenneth L. Davis and carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

The Secretary then presented the bids received for the purchase of \$3,900,000 Dormitory and Apartment Bonds, Series A of 1960. On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board accepted the low bid submitted by John Nuveen & Co. and Associates for the purchase of said bonds. The motion was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

Lindell W. Sturgis then moved that the bids of all other bidders be rejected and all other good faith checks presented be returned. The motion was seconded by Kenneth L. Davis and was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

The Secretary then stated that the only bid received for the purchase of said \$4,200,000 Dormitory and Apartment Bonds, Series B of 1960, of Southern Illinois University was from the United States of America, acting by and through the Housing and Home Finance Agency, in accordance with the terms and conditions of a Loan Agreement by and between the United States of America and this Board of Trustees, dated September 1, 1960, whereunder the United States of America also agrees to exchange on a par for par basis the outstanding \$3,091,000 Dormitory Revenue Bonds of 1956, dated February 1, 1956, of said Board for an issue of \$3,091,000 Dormitory and Apartment Bonds, Series C of 1960. Upon motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board accepted said bid. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

The Secretary then presented and read the resolution creating an issue of \$11,191,000 Dormitory and Apartment Bonds to be issued in Series. A copy of such Resolution was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees for deposit in the office of the Board. Such Resolution was read to the Board of Trustees, and after full discussion thereof, Melvin C. Lockard moved that said Resolution be adopted as read. The motion was seconded by George T. Wilkins and the vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

The Secretary then presented a Resolution establishing charges for the use of and for the service supplied by new dormitory and apartment buildings and Thompson Point Residence Halls on the campus of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois. A copy of this Resolution was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees for deposit in the office of the Board. Melvin C. Lockard moved that the Board adopt said Resolution as read. The motion was seconded by Kenneth L. Davis and was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

The Secretary then presented and read a resolution establishing parietal rules and regulations for the use of and for the service supplied by new dormitory and apartment buildings and Thompson Point Residence Halls on the campus of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Illinois, designated as Housing and Home Finance Agency Project No. Ill. 11-CH-89(D). A copy of said resolution was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees for deposit in the office of the Board. On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, said Resolution was duly adopted by the Board of Trustees. The motion was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

CHRONOLOGY OF THE DEVELOPMENT OF DECREE PROGRAMS

The following table shows the chronology of the development of Southern Illinois University's various degree programs. We have listed only those degrees presently in existence, although at earlier times various degrees and certificates appropriate to the normal school stage of our development were granted. In some fields the progress of the work from a few offerings to a complete degree curriculum is obscure, and hence some of the dates given may not be entirely consistent. In general, however, we have listed either dates when the departments began offering degree programs or of the approval of curricula leading to specific degrees.

Where the dates below are listed between parentheses, the degree is no longer offered. For example, work in agriculture of a sufficient amount to lead to a degree was offered as early as 1939, but this was a general curriculum. At present, no general agriculture degree is offered; instead, each of the departments in the School of Agriculture has developed curricula leading to Bachelor's and Master's degrees.

Possible future developments are indicated by putting question marks after those dates where curricula leading to degrees are presently under consideration and are expected to be recommended to the Board of Trustees for early approval. In some instances a question mark is substituted for a date when it is known that the departments involved are planning toward further degrees but are not likely to qualify for them in the near future.

> APPROVAL OF MASTER'S DECREE PROGRAMS IN FORESTRY AND COM-MUNITY DEVELOPMENT INSTITUTE

Upon recommendation of the Graduate Council and the Dean of the Graduate School, we are requesting approval of a graduate program in Forestry, leading to the Master of Science degree, effective immediately.

Three members of the staff of the Department of Forestry hold their doctor's degrees and have had experience in supervising graduate work. In addition, there are available to the department two Adjunct Professors, both of whom hold the doctor's degree and are available to offer seminars and to direct research at the graduate level.

At the May 7, 1960, meeting of the Board of Trustees a report was made concerning a closed workshop held during the latter part of April, 1960. In general, the consultants who participated in this Forestry Education workshop agreed that the staff, the basic and proposed curricula, laboratory and classroom facilities, library holdings, and field research areas were adequate for the offering of a graduate program in Forestry. They have recommended that for the growth of the graduate program experimental forest facilities should eventually be acquired.

Approval is also requested for the offering of a curriculum leading to the Master of Science degree through the Community Development Institute.

Professor Howard Y. McClusky, Consultant in Community Adult Education and Professor of Educational Psychology at The University of Michigan, served as consultant to the Community Development Institute. After a careful investigation of the facilities available, Professor McClusky endorsed enthusiastically a graduate program to be offered through the Community Development Institute.

The Community Development Institute has no instructional staff of its own, but will draw upon specialists in social studies, humanities, and physical and life sciences. Community development as a field of systematic and academic inquiry is practically a new subject, but the demand for experts in this field is great and is likely to increase as more and more communities realize their shortcomings and seek help in redevelopment. The offering of a curriculum leading to the Master of Science degree through the Community Development Institute has been recommended by the Graduate Council and the Dean of the Graduate School.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Mrs. Stella Collins, the Board approved graduate programs in Forestry and in Community Development Institute, as recommended. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

After discussion, the Board directed that information reports concerning revenue and construction accounts be presented twice yearly.

RECOMMENDATION FOR ADDITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

At the November 5, 1953, meeting of the Board of Trustees approval was given for establishing 175 scholarships covering tuition only, to be awarded to meritorious students in the various extra-curricular activities. At that time the resident enrollment on the Carbondale Campus was 3,449.

By action taken by the Board at its meeting on January 17, 1957, the number of scholarships was increased to 350, including 50 tuition scholarships for foreign students. At the July 25, 1957, meeting of the Board approval was given for awarding scholarships at the Southwestern Illinois Campus in the same proportion as already authorized for the Carbondale Campus.

Approval is now requested for the awarding of not more than 500 scholarships covering tuition to be in effect at the Carbondale Campuses in any one quarter, including summer session, and the awarding in like proportion scholarships covering tuition to be in effect at the Southwestern Campuses in any one quarter, including summer session. This expanded financial assistance program for the major campuses would become effective at the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1961.

Approval is also requested for an additional 25 tuition scholarships for foreign students, or a total of 75 scholarships for foreign students, including fractional scholarships, on the Carbondale Campus.

As has been done in the case of scholarships already authorized, the administration will determine the distribution of such scholarships, will review such scholarships each year, and will authorize the committing of no more than 125 four-year scholarships annually at the Carbondale Campuses and a like proportion of four-year scholarships annually at the Southwestern Campuses.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the request for additional scholarships covering tuition. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Mrs. Collins, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Oehmke, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wilkins; nay, none.

SPECIAL AWARD

It is recommended that a special Diploma of Recognition and Honor be presented to Don Roberto Crespo Ordonez on the occasion of his visit to this campus during Pan American Week, April 10-15, 1961, in recognition of his promotion of hemispheric understanding and of historical writing and research.

Don Roberto Crespo Ordonez is now and has been for nearly twenty years President of the Center for Historical and Geographical Studies in Cuenca, Ecuador. He is the author of a number of articles and historical studies and was responsible for the holding of the Fourth Consultation of the Commission on History of the Pan American Institute of Geography and History in Cuenca in 1959. He is a national member of the *Casa de Cultura Ecuatoriana*, which is a semi-official organization in his country.

Don Roberto's active assistance enabled Southern Illinois University to negotiate successfully the purchase of the Morris Library's recently acquired Ecuadorian collection. Furthermore, he is sending additional volumes of Ecuadorian imprints to aid in keeping the collection up to date. He has also volunteered to promote in every way further additions to the Library's Ecuadorian collection.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Martin F. Oehmke, the Board unanimously approved the awarding of a special diploma of recognition and honor to Don Roberto Crespo Ordonez, as requested.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

At a regular meeting held April 1, 1959, the Board considered and approved a preliminary sketch showing the format and lettering for bronze building plaques to be placed within each new building on the Carbondale Campus. President Morris presented final drawings, prepared by the University Architect, with the request that the same format be used for proposed buildings on the Edwardsville Campus. By common consent, the Board approved use of the same format for building plaques for the Edwardsville Campus.

The meeting was adjourned at 4 P.M.

APRIL MEETING

THE APRIL MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the conference room of The National Bank of Mattoon, Mattoon, Illinois, on Friday, April 21, 1961, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Arnold H. Maremont, Lindell W. Sturgis, George T. Wilkins. Dr. Martin Van Brown was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President J. E. Grinnell, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly, Assistant Director of Information Service Edmund C. Haase, University Architect Charles Pulley, Carl Mayhew, Reporter, *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

Mr. Arnold H. Maremont, recently appointed to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University by Governor Otto Kerner, was welcomed to Board membership by the Chairman of the Board.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held March 2, 1961, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, these minutes were approved as presented.

Consideration was next given to naming a representative of the Board to serve as a member of the Board of Directors of Southern Illinois University Foundation, replacing Mr. Kenneth L. Davis, whose term expires in June, 1961. On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, Mr. Davis was unanimously re-elected to serve until June, 1964.

Consideration was then given to naming a representative of the Board of Trustees to serve as a member of the Merit Board of the University Civil Service System of Illinois, replacing Mrs. Stella Collins. On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board voted unanimously to name Dr. Martin Van Brown as the Board's representative.

Mr. Charles Pulley, University Architect, appeared before the Board and introduced Mr. W. H. Hall, a representative of Warren and Van Praag, Inc., Consulting Engineers, who had prepared engineering studies for the proposed Edwardsville Campus. Mr. Hall presented Report No. 3, covering water supply and treatment; Report No. 4, covering sewerage and sewage treatment; and Report No. 7, covering heating, air conditioning, and electrical power. He prefaced his remarks by stating that studies had been consonant with the Master Plan for development of utilities, based on an estimated enrollment of 18,000 students plus a proportionate number of faculty and service personnel. He indicated that the study covered the period from 1963 to 1970, and that all utilities had been based on estimated per capita consumption, plus operation of the physical plant and fire protection.

Mr. Hall indicated that detailed studies had been made of the use of utilities on the Carbondale Campus of Southern Illinois University, as well as the campuses of Eastern Illinois University and Washington University, to determine ultimate demand. He stated that estimated costs were based on (1) purchase of services, and (2) University-owned and operated facilities. The recommendation of the firm of Warren and Van Praag, Inc., was that the University build and operate its own water supply and treatment facilities, sewerage and sewage treatment facilities, and generation plant for heating, air conditioning, and electrical power. Mr. Hall stated that his firm's studies showed that it would be to the best advantage of both the University and the State of Illinois to own and operate such facilities.

After consideration of the reports of Warren and Van Praag, Inc., the Board agreed to withhold any decision until a subsequent meeting. Certain additional studies were requested concerning the availability of purchased water supply and treatment services and purchased electrical power.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

REPORT ON GROWTH OF RESEARCH PROGRAMS

This is another in the series of reports on the various functions of the University which have been presented from time to time to the Board of Trustees. The purpose of this report is to indicate the growth of the research program of the University and to provide the members of the Board with a basis upon which to found their judgments of the various research projects which are from time to time placed before them.

The budgetary emphasis given to research in the years since World War II can most readily be indicated by an examination of the research budget. The table below indicates both the dollar totals and the percentages of the total budget devoted to research since 1944-45, the year in which our present graduate and research program was organized:

The growth of the University's research program has been twofold: first, the University itself has steadily increased its dollar support for research as State appropriations have permitted; and, secondly, research grants from the Federal government, foundations, and industries have been steadily on the increase since 1948. The year-by-year support for sponsored research is listed below:

These data indicate the trend and importance of research support in the University's recent history. They do not, however, show the variety and importance of the University's current research program. To this end we add a description of its chief features:

Kinds of Research

Currently, Southern Illinois University's research program is tripartite. Generally speaking, the three areas are: Cooperative Research Programs, Special Research Projects, and Sponsored Research Programs. In addition, certain of the instructional departments carry on research supported from their own budgets, and certain of the staff members carry on research for which they do not seek University support.

The Cooperative Research Programs were initiated during fiscal year 1949-50 with the Biological Research Laboratory, under the direction of Professor Carl C. Lindegren. At the end of the 1959-60 fiscal year, there were fifteen Cooperative Research arrangements. The Cooperative Research Programs differ from special research projects and departmental research in several ways: (1) they are budgeted internally as specific functions of the University; (2) they are long term operations as compared to the Special Research projects.

A Cooperative Research venture may be composed of several related individual projects, such as in the Biological Research Laboratory or in Mississippi Valley Investigations, or it may be budgeted for a single operation or pursuit such as "Response to Learning Tasks" (this Cooperative Research Program was established to facilitate the administration of the University's matching funds commitment on a U.S. Office of Education contract).

The Special Research Projects are designed to provide University financial support to individual faculty members for a period of three years for any particular project. During this period, the researcher is expected to be able to advance his research out of the pilot study stage. After the pilot study has been shown to be of real worth, encouragement is given to the researcher to obtain "outside" funds or possibly to take steps toward the reclassification of the project as a "Cooperative Program." Essentially, the Special Research Projects program is in existence to facilitate and encourage research throughout every discipline of the University. Some projects under this classification do not readily reach a point of completion and may therefore necessitate financing beyond the threeyear limitation.

Until 1948, the Southern Illinois University research program was financed in total by State funds. Since that date the *Sponsored Research Program* has grown from a total of three to a total of one hundred sponsored projects. Sponsored Research projects are financed by industry, foundations, local and state governments, and the Federal government. The Federal Government's share of total sponsored research for 1960 was approximately \$250,000.00, or nearly one-half of total aid. Generally speaking, two main types of agreements for research are entered into with the sponsoring agencies – contracts for research or grants-in-aid.

Under the sponsored research classifications there does exist some institutional research, designed to further the sound development of the University itself. An example of this type of program is the "Educational Television Research" project, which is sponsored by the Ford Foundation. It is possible that the recent support by the Ford Foundation for the development and planning of the Southwestern Illinois Campus could also rightfully be called institutional research.

Instruction and Research

The relationship of the research program to the instructional program, or the relationship between "good" teaching and "good" research, or the relationship between professional training programs and research without doubt are all relationships of close partnership. Research, instruction, and service are the fundamental purposes of the University. These prime functions should not be regarded separately, but as vital parts of the same whole.

For at least the past seventeen years, Southern Illinois University has done everything possible to assure the adequacy of the teaching-research partnership. Since 1956, when Ph.D. programs were first authorized, research has grown rapidly and must continue to grow as fast, if not at a faster rate, if this partnership is to be maintained and kept effective.

It is true that aggregate expenditures for research have recently been quite considerable and impressive. However, it has been obvious, especially since 1959, that sponsored research is becoming the "load bearer" for the research programs. The question needs to be considered as to whether or not dependency on outside sources of income may not disturb the relationship between instruction and research.

Research Positions

Currently, seven distinguished researchers hold *Research Professorship* positions. They are Professors Fuller, Poston, Lawrence, Kelley, See, H. Moore, Gorelik. These professors are encouraged to concentrate their talents on research and to limit their teaching and other duties to not more than one-fourth time.

The *Research Associate* position is held by four individuals at this time. Essentially, the title of research associate is reserved for the individual of doctorate rank who is totally involved with research in some Cooperative Research program.

In 1960, a total expenditure of \$196,085.00 went for *Research Assistants*. Of this amount, \$106,466.95 came from sponsored research. Under this classification both undergraduate and graduate students are the recipients and are thereby given valuable training while completing their degree programs. Technicians, such as electro-acoustical technicians, laboratory technicians, and electron microscopists, are generally supported out of sponsored research funds.

Organization of Research

The By-Laws and Statutes of the University designate the Dean of the Graduate School as the general agent of the University for the administration of research. The Dean of the Graduate School is assisted in this function by a coordinator of research. The office staff is composed of the Coordinator, Re-

search Contracts Supervisor, Secretary, Statistical Consultant, and student workers.

Some of the services provided by this office are:

(1) Making available to all faculty members information concerning possible types of research and the support available.

(2) Seeking financial support for research.

(3) Selecting those projects with financial potential and negotiating financial arrangements in conjunction with the Southern Illinois University Foundation.

(4) Serving as transmitting center and clearing house for all contractual arrangements entered into by the University for research and development projects.

(5) Making recommendations to the President's Office concerning action to be taken on various research projects (setting up new restricted accounts, evaluating applications and budgets for cooperative research).

(6) Aiding researchers in making applications for research support from outside agencies.

(7) Approving expenditures from research funds (Travel and Purchase Requisitions, Invoice Vouchers, etc.).

(8) Approving and certifying Research Assistants and their monthly payrolls.

(9) Handling all fiscal responsibilities concerned with Special Research Projects.

In addition to the administrative office, there exist two auxiliary agencies under the direction of the coordinator which are designed to promote and facilitate research. These are: (1) Research Shop; and (2) Mobile Research Laboratory Facilities.

In keeping with the objective of providing the individual researcher with the support and services that are necessary if his research is to be fruitful, the Research Office of the Graduate School has recently set up a Central Research Shop. The staff at present consists of a designer, an electro-acoustics technician, and a Research Assistant. Their job is to assist the researcher in designing, constructing, and maintaining research equipment and facilities. The shop, when equipped, will be available to assist with instrumentation for research, including the research of graduate students pursuing degrees.

The University provides mobile research facilities to aid faculty members in conducting their research. These facilities include:

1. A Travel-All truck with four-wheel drive for transporting personnel or equipment

2. A Ford truck with van providing an enclosed room approximately eight by eleven feet

3. Two Diamond-T vans providing enclosed rooms approximately eight by eleven feet

4. A semi-trailer, thirty-five feet long, which can be instrumented for various research programs

5. A Ford pick-up truck with camper attachment

Southern Illinois University

The problem of administering research has become increasingly complex because of the relationship of research to the instructional program, to educational developments both on and off the campuses of Southern Illinois University, and to the interests in research of Federal agencies, research foundations, and industries. The past organization, which has worked very well in the development stages of the University's program, may now need to be revised. Southern Illinois University has, in general, envisioned a dynamic program which retains the traditional that has been found to be of value, but which never becomes traditional in itself. An administrative framework which will support this objective must be capable of giving direction, coordination, and information to all concerned, so that both the proper diversity and proper continuity of operation can be maintained. Frequent discussions of how best to achieve this kind of organization have been going on during recent months and will necessarily continue.

Pure and Applied Research

The research program of the University has two obligations: (1) to investigate on the frontiers of knowledge, wherever possible expanding those frontiers, and (2) to make available its findings to the community of scholars and, where possible, to the community of citizens. The expansion of knowledge is usually termed *pure* or *basic* research since the motive behind it is not to find something immediately useful, but something which will add to the sum total of man's definite knowledge of the world. Inevitably, however, practical uses are found for a great deal of the additional knowledge, and the application of this knowledge to the needs of the community is called *applied* research.

A great many agencies exist for the application of existing knowledge, but only a few exist for the increase of knowledge. Among these latter, the most prominent are the universities of the country. Without the pure researches carried on by the universities, knowledge would tend to be frozen pretty much in its present state, and ultimately applied research, as well as pure research, would suffer. At Southern Illinois University an attempt has been made to establish a proper relationship between pure and applied research. A great many of the leading universities of the country have, as a result of developments during and following World War II, found that applied research has tended to dominate their programs. Many of these universities are now attempting to achieve a better balance, one that will promote a healthy educational environment for the *increase* of knowledge. Fortunately, Southern Illinois University is not presently out of balance, but it should take care that applied research does not come to occupy too large a share of its total program.

Professor Tenney reviewed for the members of the Board the history of research programs at Southern, their continued growth and support by Federal agencies, foundations, and industries. He pointed out two major problems, namely, the distortion of research resulting from accommodation to the interests of agencies sponsoring research, and the complexity of administrative details involved with research grants. Professor Tenney indicated that Professor Willis G. Swartz, Dean of the Graduate School, was attempting to counteract the distortion of research projects by concentrating the University's appropriated research funds in those fields of interest least emphasized by sponsoring agencies. He also stated that the complexity of administration of research funds was being partially met by the establishment of a centralized agency to handle business matters connected with research projects; a centralized computing service for mathematical analyses; and mobile units for field research.

This report, which required no action, was accepted by the Board for the records.

APPROVAL OF DOCTORAL PROGRAMS IN BOTANY, ECONOMICS, HIGHER EDUCATION, AND GEOGRAPHY

The Board of Trustees has previously approved the offering of doctoral programs in sixteen departments, namely, Government, Speech Pathology, Microbiology, Secondary Education, Psychology, Speech, Zoology, Elementary Education, Educational Administration and Supervision, Guidance, Anthropology, Health Education, Physiology, Physical Education for Men and Women, English, and Sociology. Also, the School of Home Economics has been authorized to begin planning curricula leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree. The departments of Botany and Geography, both in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the Department of Higher Education in the College of Education, and the Economics Department in the School of Business have now indicated their readiness to offer programs leading to the doctorate.

Mr. Ernst C. Abbe, Professor of Botany at The University of Minnesota, was invited to the campus to evaluate the strength of staff, basic and proposed curricula, library holdings, and laboratory and classroom facilities of the Botany Department. His subsequent report was, in general, highly favorable for the offering of a doctoral program, although he recommended early strengthening of the program in several respects. As the enrollment justifies, the changes he has recommended can readily be made.

Included on the graduate staff of the Botany Department are the following faculty members who hold doctor's degrees from the institutions indicated: Professor Ladislao v. Olah, Stephen Tisza University, Hungary; Professor John W. Voigt, The University of Nebraska; Professor Walter B. Welch, The University of Chicago; Associate Professor William C. Ashby, The University of Chicago; Associate Professor Margaret Kaeiser, The University of Illinois; Assistant Professor Howard G. Applegate, Michigan State University; and Assistant Professor Robert H. Mohlenbrock, Washington University. Two of these faculty members have had previous experience in directing the work of doctoral candidates.

Mr. Howard A. Cutler, Professor of Economics and Assistant to the President at The Pennsylvania State University, served as consultant to the Economics Department and spent several days on the campus to evaluate the strength of the staff, the library holdings, the basic and proposed curricula, and the physical facilities. His report was decidedly favorable to offering a doctoral program, and his advice concerning certain necessary improvements can be followed within our usual procedures for strengthening our programs.

The graduate staff of the Economics Department includes the following faculty members who hold doctor's degrees from the institutions indicated: Professor Clark L. Allen, Duke University; Professor C. Addison Hickman, The State University of Iowa; Professor Robert G. Layer, Harvard University; Professor G. Carl Wiegand, Northwestern University; Associate Professor John A. Cochran, Harvard University; Associate Professor Milton T. Edelman, The University of Illinois; and Associate Professor Thomas A. Martinsek, The Ohio State University. At least four members of this group have had previous experience in the supervision of the work of candidates for the doctoral degree.

Professor Alonzo F. Myers, retired, of the Department of Higher Education at New York University, was invited to the campus to evaluate the strength of staff, basic and proposed curricula, library holdings, and laboratory and classroom facilities of the Department of Higher Education. His subsequent report showed the need for a doctoral program in Higher Education as a service department for academic units offering advanced graduate work to students who are college teachers or who are preparing for college teaching, and for offering professional courses related to college teaching. The proper major for a college teacher or prospective college teacher is, of course, in the academic department representing his teaching field. Furthermore, Professor Myers indicates that academic specialization preparatory to college teaching is also an essential part of the preparation for an academic administrative appointment.

Another possible function of a Department of Higher Education is the training of people in such university positions as those in housing, accountancy, purchasing, public relations, alumni relations, physical plant management, business management, and student personnel services.

Included on the graduate staff of the Department of Higher Education are the following faculty members who hold doctor's degrees from the institutions indicated: Professor George H. Hand, Princeton University; Professor Harold W. See, Indiana University; Professor George Axtelle, The University of California; Professor Arthur Lean, The University of Michigan; Professor John E. Grinnell, Stanford University; and Associate Professor Dennis L. Trueblood, Indiana University. Other members of the graduate staff, drawn from related departments, are also available to participate in certain aspects of the program.

It will be necessary for the Department of Higher Education to limit its acceptance of candidates to persons having a heavy concentration in the academic fields until such time as its staff becomes adequate for handling doctoral candidates in Administration and Supervision.

Mr. J. O. M. Broek, Professor of Geography, The University of Minnesota, served as consultant to the Geography Department to appraise the strength of the staff, the library resources, the basic and proposed curricula of the department, and the laboratory and other physical facilities available. In general, Professor Broek's evaluations were favorable. He has made certain recommendations concerning further strengthening of the program which can, for the most part, be carried out next year if the doctoral program is activated in the fall of 1962.

Included on the graduate staff of the Geography Department are the following faculty members holding doctor's degrees from the institutions indicated: Professor Floyd F. Cunningham, Clark University; Professor Robert A. Harper, The University of Chicago; Professor Wilbur Zelinsky, The University of California; Associate Professor Annemarie Krause, The University of Chicago; Assistant Professor Ronald M. Beveridge, The University of Illinois; Assistant Professor Theodore H. Schmudde, The University of Wisconsin; Assistant Professor Howard A. Stafford, The University of Iowa; Assistant Professor Frank Thomas, Northwestern University; and Assistant Professor Joseph Velikonja, The State University of Rome, Italy.

It is recommended that the Botany Department, the Economics Department, and the Higher Education Department be authorized to accept candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree, effective at the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1961. It is further recommended that the Geography Department be authorized to accept candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree, effective at the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1962.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved acceptance of candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree by the Botany Department, the Economics Department, and the Higher Education Department, effective at the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1961, and by the Geography Department, effective at the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1962, as requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard, nay, none.

APPROVAL OF MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAM IN TRANSPORTATION INSTI-TUTE

Upon recommendation of the Graduate Council and the Dean of the Graduate School, approval is requested for a curriculum leading to the Master of Science degree, to be offered through the Transportation Institute, effective immediately.

Few universities now offer graduate programs in transportation, and therefore no outstanding academic consultants are available in this field for investigation of the basic and proposed curricula, library holdings, and facilities available. Instead, numerous contacts were made with leaders in the transportation industry, all of whom have encouraged us to pioneer in this field. Two members of Southern's own faculty have concentrated in transportation, and both have served as advisers in the development of the proposed graduate program.

The Transportation Institute has no instructional staff of its own, but will draw upon the schools and colleges of the University for specialists in the field of business, economics, management, communications, and safety as well as other related fields. Many of the required courses for the proposed curriculum are already being offered by the various departments, and others can be developed as student enrollment makes necessary.

PROPOSED FEDERAL OFFICE AND RESEARCH BUILDING

The Central States Forest Experiment Station of the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service has for a number of years cooperated with the Department of Forestry at Southern Illinois University, sharing space, personnel, and activities with it. The advantage to the University has been the supplementing of its own research and teaching in Forestry with some of the resources of the federal government; and the advantage to the Central States Forest Experiment Station staff has been the provision of a place to work and the atmosphere associated with a university. A number of joint publications have resulted from this cooperation.

It now appears that it might be possible for the Forest Service to obtain a site for a Federal office and laboratory building on the Carbondale Campus of Southern Illinois University. Should funds be received for such a building, it would be necessary that the Forest Service either have a deed to the site or a long-term lease for a minimum of fifty years, with a forty-nine year renewal clause. Mr. Robert W. Merz, research center leader for the local Experiment Station, states that it would strengthen the position of the Forest Service if the University's Board of Trustees would state that they favor the location of such a Federal building on the campus and would take what action might be needed to provide a site. Among the powers of the Board of Trustees, granted by Southern Illinois University's charter from the state, is the power "to acquire, hold, and convey real and personal property," set forth in Section 7 of the charter (Chapter 122 Illinois Revised Statutes, Section 435.7, 1959).

It is therefore recommended that the Board of Trustees indicate its willingness to cooperate in providing a mutually agreeable site on its Carbondale Campus for a Federal office and laboratory building.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board unanimously approved this recommendation and authorized the administration to cooperate with the Central States Forest Experiment Station of the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service by providing a mutually agreeable site for an office and research building on the Carbondale Campus.

RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREE

We recommend that at the June, 1961, commencement or some commencement thereafter, the honorary Doctor of Laws degree be awarded to Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, internationally known educator and statesman.

Ralph J. Bunche was born at Detroit, Michigan, August 7, 1904. He received the Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from Harvard University and has done post-doctoral work in anthropology and colonial policy at Northwestern University, the London School of Economics, and the University of Capetown, South Africa. From 1928 to 1938 he held various academic ranks in the Department of Political Science at Howard University and served as head of the department from 1938 to 1950. Since 1944, Dr. Bunche has held many official government positions, including that of Adviser to the United States Delegation at the 27th Session, International Labor Conference, 1945; United States Commissioner for the West Indian Conference, Virgin Islands, 1946; Principal Secretary of the United Nations Palestine Commission, 1948; and Acting United Nations Mediator on Palestine, 1948-49. He was the recipient of the Spingarn Medal awarded by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, 1949; the Nobel Peace Prize, 1950; the Theodore Roosevelt Association Medal of Honor and the Third Order of St. Frances Peace Award, 1954. Dr. Bunche is a member of the Board of Higher Education, New York City, and a trustee for Oberlin College. He holds an honorary doctor's degree from Boston University. He is presently serving as Under-Secretary to the United Nations, and he makes his home at Kew Gardens, New York.

This recommendation has been initiated by our Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and has the endorsement of the administration.

WHEREAS, He endeared himself to his students, his colleagues, his numberless friends, and his professional acquaintances in the educational field by his gentleness and soft-spoken words of encouragement, faith, and strength; and

WHEREAS, Having served Southern Illinois University with unequalled loyalty for a period of over twenty-five years as Principal of the University School, Director of Teacher Training, Dean of the College of Education, and Research Professor, he commanded the utmost respect and admiration within the entire University community, where his absence is felt so deeply; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees, assembled in regular session, that there be recorded upon these minutes an expression of understanding and apprecia-

tion of Professor Lawson's service to the University; regret for his untimely passing; and sincere sympathy to his family. Be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the members of Professor Lawson's family, to the University administration and faculty, and to the College of Education.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board unanimously adopted the following statement of recognition of the services of Dean Talbert W. Abbott, who will retire in the near future:

It is appropriate to recognize at this time the distinguished service of Dean Talbert Abbott. After years of fruitful service as Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, a vital and exacting position, and reaching a year ago the customary retirement age, he agreed to serve an additional year in the newly created and difficult office of Dean of Academic Affairs for the Carbondale Campus while the search was conducted for a well-qualified person to take over on a continuing basis. His patience, his good judgment, and his knowledge of the University carried the new office with conspicuous success through its difficult first year. Dean Abbott's willingness to assume large obligations and his gentleness combined with strength have contributed much to the healthful growth of Southern Illinois University, not only during the past year but in the preceding years as well. The Board of Trustees by this means wishes to acknowledge deep indebtedness to Talbert W. Abbott for selfless and invaluable service to the University.

POLICY ON RETURNED CHECKS

For the year January 1, 1960, through December 31, 1960, the Carbondale Campus Business Office experienced the return of 745 checks, in the total amount of \$22,183.33, because of insufficient funds or absence of a bank balance by the signatory of the check. Our present procedure for collecting on these checks has been effective, but costly. Involved are long distance tolls, telegrams, and time devoted to the collections by the Bursar, the Office of Student Affairs, and the Security Officer. The University does not presently assess any charge other than the 25ϕ collected by the bank.

The University of Illinois' policy requires a \$2.00 service charge on each check returned, and in the future will, in addition, provide that if the check is not redeemed in ten days the student will be dismissed; however, he may reenter upon the payment of a \$20.00 re-entry fine.

The University of Missouri automatically suspends students when a check is not honored, but reinstates them upon payment of the check and a fine of \$5.00.

It is proposed that the University adopt a system of graduated fines and suspension if the offense reoccurs frequently. We request approval of this policy and authorization for the administration to adjust the amounts of fines as indicated by experience. Initially, a fine of \$2.00 would be exacted for the first offense; \$5.00 for the second offense; and \$5.00 for the third offense, with such additional penalty as may be deemed expedient. On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board unanimously approved the proposed policy of graduated fines and penalties.

FEES FOR CLINICAL SERVICES

The Clinical Center is primarily a service agency staffed by professional diagnosticians, therapists, and counselors drawn from the instructional departments and limited to specific services for which they are trained. By bringing together specialists from several fields, the Center is able to provide an interdisciplinary approach in working with clients. The Center also provides space in which counselors, therapists, and diagnosticians in training may work under professional supervision and in which research data may be collected. Diagnostic services include psychological evaluations, speech and hearing evaluations, and educational evaluations such as reading difficulties, school adjustment problems, and motor skills. Treatment is provided for children, adolescents, and adults, both on and off campus, with the aim of aiding the individual by means of corrective treatment, including auditory training, physical therapy, psychotherapy, speech therapy, training to improve reading skills and study habits, and various counseling service such as rehabilitation, marriage, or vocational counseling.

No charge has been made to individuals for these services, with two exceptions:

1. A token fee of \$2.00 per physical therapy treatment was established when Doctors Hospital instituted physical therapy services. Our fee was established to avoid competing as a free service. This fee is currently being assessed all non-students, university students who have elected not to pay activity fees, and university students who have come to the University with stable or chronic conditions (such as post polio, spastics, etc.). In most case students in this latter group have been sponsored at the University by agencies such as the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, and any fees assessed have been paid by the sponsoring agency. The fees collected are deposited in the Clinical Center Revolving Fund and are used to purchase additional supplies and equipment.

2. Prior to the establishment of the Clinical Center, the departments of Psychology and Speech Correction had concluded agreements with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation whereby the Division paid \$20.00 for hearing aid evaluations and \$25.00 for psychological evaluations. This agreement has continued, with the money being deposited in the revolving funds of these departments.

The Executive Committee of the Clinical Center has now proposed that a fee schedule be established for non-students. The fee proposed need not be equal to professional rates because:

a. It is desired that University faculty with clinical training continue this professional training through the Center;

b. A core professional clinical staff permits the development of an on-going clinic which students in training can observe;

c. An on-going clinic makes it possible to establish referral resources such as the Division of Services for Crippled Children, Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Department of Public Welfare, County Health Departments, etc., which provide a continuous supply of clinical cases to be readily available as needed in the training programs of the cooperating departments;

d. The Center provides a functioning professional facility in which practicum students can work with clients under supervision. Such students are able to work with students and professional staff from other areas to provide an interdisciplinary approach to clinical services, a benefit to both the students and the clients being served.

It is recommended that the following fee policy and fee schedule be placed in effect with the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1961:

Evaluations

Inquiry, preliminary intake, and GED tests – no fee.

All other services – Fees ranging from \$5.00 to \$25.00 (fee to depend upon complexity of the problem and time required to render the service).

Treatments

All services – Fees ranging from \$1.00 to \$5.00 per visit (fee determined by type of treatment, time required of therapist, whether individual or group treatment, etc.)

Other

Ear impression and mold – Lucite – \$8.00 Ear impression and mold – Lucite w/flex canal – \$10.00 Hearing aid batteries – at cost Pamphlets – at cost Consulting – fee open

Exceptions to the above policy are:

1. The Child Guidance Clinic, for the time being, will, upon official request, continue to provide its services without charge to area schools.

2. Short term services of the Clinical Center (other than physical therapy) are provided without charge to University students who have paid activity fees, to faculty, staff and their immediate families.

3. Physical therapy is available by prescription only at the Cooperative Clinical Services Center on a limited basis. Fees are assessed in accordance with the above fee schedule for all treatments except for the following:

a. University students, who have paid activity fees, for any term currently in session, will be given physical therapy without charge for acute, transitory conditions. No fees will be assessed such students continuing in therapy during the period between the end of the summer session and the beginning of the fall quarter.

b. University students for stable or chronic conditions when receiving therapy to meet the University requirements for graduation (for example, physically handicapped students who are registered for adapted or restricted physical education to meet the P.E. requirements for graduation will not be assessed fees for physical therapy if such therapy is prescribed as a part of the course).

c. University employees, when prescribed by the University physicians for treatment of injuries incurred "on the job," (cases where the University would ordinarily assume the cost of treatment).

It is the general policy of the Cooperative Clinical Services Center to deny no person services because of inability to pay.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved the fee policy and fee schedule presented, to become effective with the Fall Term, 1961.

FEE FOR PROFICIENCY EXAMINATIONS

For some time Southern Illinois University has offered proficiency examinations for a limited number of college credits. The Faculty Councils on the two major campuses have been carrying on studies concerning the administration of the proficiency examination program and are still refining their recommendations.

Meanwhile, great interest has been aroused among qualified students, and a backlog of applications is accumulating. One feature upon which everyone is agreed is that a uniform fee of \$5.00 should be charged for each proficiency examination.

In order to begin handling the backlog of applications, we recommend that a fee of \$5.00 shall be charged to each student for each proficiency examination he takes, effective immediately.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board unanimously approved a fee of \$5.00 to be charged each student for each proficiency examination he takes.

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE CLINICAL SERVICES CENTER

This is another in the series of reports to the Board of Trustees on various educational functions of the University. The Cooperative Clinical Center of the University is a device for obtaining the maximum effectiveness and coordination of instruction, research, and educational services from those faculty members professionally qualified to train students in selected clinical skills and to contribute to the advancement of knowledge in their disciplines. Incidental to these educational purposes is service to the public. Although a great many children, college students, and other citizens benefit from the clinic, public services are limited to those activities consistent with the training and research objectives of the clinic.

Background

Since 1936, when the Child Guidance Clinic was established, Southern Illinois University has continued to increase both the variety and quantity of its clinical services. This increase has been consistent with the needs of expanding training programs in a number of academic departments. As training needs became more explicit, clinical service demands increased rapidly. Administratively, these demands became apparent in overlapping departmental requests for additional space, faculty time, specialized equipment, and operating funds.

Traditionally, clinical facilities were developed as adjuncts of the relevant academic departments, i.e., a Child Guidance Clinic for the Department of Guidance; a Speech and Hearing Clinic for the Department of Speech Correction; a Psychological Clinic for the Department of Psychology, and so forth. This concept of separate and distinct clinics for each training program was held at Southern Illinois University until 1958, when it became obvious that for effective operation centralizing the clinical services was necessary. As a result of discussions with members of the participating departments, a Cooperative Clinical Services Center was established in the fall of 1958. Mr. Alden M. Hall was named as Manager of the Center.

Purpose and Functions

The primary purposes of the Center are: (1) to provide to University students and the general public the combined resources of faculty members in various appropriate clinical areas, and (2) to make available to the academic departments an adequate facility for the training of professional personnel and for research as these relate to their needs.

Professionally, the Center provides the opportunity for interdisciplinary approaches to personal problems. It brings together faculty members from different departments, with different skills and insights, to work cooperatively in meeting the specialized needs of those receiving services. At times these needs are specific (e.g., a hearing test, or a psychological assessment); at other times the needs of the individual may call upon combined skills from several areas – speech evaluation, psychological evaluation, and parental counseling. The opportunity for students in training to observe qualified professional people at work, and to cooperate with them, contributes considerably to the development of their clinical competence and the level of service they may eventually render.

The centralized clinical facility and the coordination of professional staff time have also served to provide more efficient use of space, equipment, and secretarial service. Clients requesting clinical services from the University

faculty find these services available in one place and at one time. It has proved to be not only economically sound but professionally and academically stimulating to coordinate clinical services in this fashion. Southern Illinois University is one of the first institutions to attempt this type of clinical organization in a university setting.

Center Facilities

The Center is presently housed in a remodeled, two-story apartment building, located at the corner of Chautauqua and Lake Streets on the Carbondale Campus. To the extent that it is practicable to do so, each room at the Center has been designed and equipped to accommodate a number of clinical activities. The larger part of the initial equipping and furnishing of the Center was achieved through a federal grant (Public Law 565) to the University through the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation.

Organization of the Center

The Center is an independent unit in the University structure, headed by a Manager who reports directly to the Dean of Academic Affairs for the Carbondale Campus. The only full-time budgeted staff members are the Manager and his secretarial staff. This staff is responsible for the housekeeping operation of the Center, which includes:

1. Serving as the channel for communicating Clinical Center needs to the University administration, and communicating policies of the administration to the professional staff;

2. Scheduling, maintaining inventory, and exercising fiscal control over facilities and equipment;

3. Providing secretarial services and specialized equipment to professional staff members in the clinic;

4. Serving as a clearing house for requests from and reports to outside referral sources and agencies.

The professional personnel (faculty) are budgeted to the Center for fractions of their time by their department chairmen, through the deans of the schools and colleges. These faculty time allocations vary from one-fourth to three-fourths, depending upon the requirements of the several departments. Currently there are eighteen faculty members so budgeted to the Center, providing their professional skills to individuals requesting services.

An Executive Committee (consisting of the Manager, the University Physician, and heads of university departments which have staff contributing clinical services) establishes the professional policies and procedures for the Center. This committee meets weekly and acts as the advisory group to the Manager on matters concerning operation of the Center.

It early became evident in the operation of the Center that the Manager needed professional assistance in making referrals to professional staff. In order to provide this assistance, three coordinators were appointed from the budgeted professional staff, to make referrals to other professional staff members: one person to coordinate the services in psychological evaluation, counseling, and therapy; one in speech and hearing; and one in areas not encompassed in the above. This last person is also the Center's social worker.

Requests for services which come to the Center are referred to the social worker so that pertinent clinical information may be obtained. On the basis of this information, the social worker either refers the requests to the appropriate coordinator of service for assignment or, if the presented problems appear to be interdisciplinary, to an intake staff consisting of all three coordinators. If the intake staff agrees that an interdisciplinary evaluation is indicated, such an evaluation is scheduled by the social worker.

Relationship with Educational Programs

As mentioned previously, faculty members from various departments are assigned budgetarily to the Center for fractions of time to render services directly to clients. Each of these faculty members, however, is a member of an academic department where he is concerned with research and training programs for students in his particular clinical area. This is distinctly an academic function, involving a close correlation between course work and practical experience. Wherever possible, therefore, the requests for service at the Center are coordinated with the training needs of the academic departments. When the requests for services are commensurate with the demands of training, students are assigned for practical experience under supervision. Where the needs for service are outside the requirements of the training programs, however, they are met, as far as possible, by direct service from assigned faculty members.

Obviously, the Center's service load does not completely satisfy the varied needs for training. Problems cannot be "ordered up" as needed. Therefore, some of the departments have training programs and facilities external to the Center itself. For example, the Department of Psychology trains students in cooperation with the Counseling and Testing Service and with Anna State Hospital. The Department of Speech Correction has a training program at Marion Veterans' Hospital and at Little Grassy Camp.

Services

The following services are available at the Center:

I. DIAGNOSTIC SERVICES

A. Psychological Evaluation. Both intellectual and personality assessments, through the use of interviews, tests, and other specialized techniques, are made to assist with the understanding of a wide variety of problems such as behavior problems, mental retardation, personal problems, and personality disturbances. B. Speech and Hearing Evaluation. Both speech and hearing assessments, through the use of specialized techniques, are made to assist in understanding a wide variety of handicaps such as aphasia, articulatory problems and delayed speech, cerebral palsy, cleft palate, hearing difficulties (including hearing aid evaluation), and stuttering.

C. Basic Skills and Educational Evaluations. Through the use of interviews, tests, and other specialized techniques, evaluations are made of problems such

as educational achievement, aptitudes and interests, motor skills, reading difficulties, school adjustment, and study skills.

D. Physical Examination. Upon recommendation of the intake staff, physical examinations are given as a part of multidisciplinary evaluations.

II. TREATMENT SERVICES

The following services are provided for children, adolescents, and adults: auditory training, marriage counseling, personal counseling, physical therapy, psychotherapy (including play therapy and individual and group therapy), rehabilitation counseling, speech therapy, training for the laryngectomized, training in lip reading, training to improve reading skills or study habits, and vocational counseling.

III. CONSULTANT SERVICES

Professional persons and organizations may receive consultant services regarding individuals needing assistance generally provided by the Center. Because of limited time budgets, such consultant work must be done in the Center.

Since the Center was established, over 2,600 persons have received services there. This represents a total of nearly 15,000 staff hours and over 10,000 individual client contacts.

Fees for Services

Recently, the Clinical Center Executive Committee submitted to the administration a proposed schedule of fees for services, to apply to all persons except university students. At its meeting on April 21, 1961, the Board of Trustees approved the proposal, which will be placed into effect with the beginning of the 1961 fall quarter.

It is the general policy of the Center to deny no persons services because of inability to pay.

Fees collected for services at the Center will be deposited in a Clinical Center Revolving Fund and will be used to purchase additional equipment and supplies.

Presently, a token fee of \$2.00 per physical therapy treatment is being charged all persons except University students. This fee was established by the Executive Committee in January of 1959, when Doctors Hospital instituted physical therapy services. The fee was established to avoid competing as a free service. Since that time approximately \$1,500.00 has been collected for physical therapy services and has made it possible for the Center to purchase some items of needed additional equipment.

Budget

The Center's budget for the current fiscal year, except for salaries, was \$8,175.00. This included \$3,000.00 for student secretaries' wages; \$375.00 for travel; \$200.00 for small equipment; and \$4,600.00 for other current expenses.

University departments and agencies participating in the operation of the Cooperative Clinical Services Center include the Department of Guidance, the Department of Psychology, the Department of Sociology, the Department of Special Education, the Department of Speech Correction, the Reading Center, the Rehabilitation Institute, the Student Counseling and Testing Center, the University Health Service.

Professor Herbert Koepp-Baker of the Department of Speech Correction appeared before the Board and reviewed briefly the information report presented. He emphasized the primary purposes of the Clinical Services Center, namely, the instructional program for training students in technical clinical procedures; research; and service to the public. He indicated that without the steady flow of persons seeking the assistance of professionally trained staff members, a sound instructional and research program would be impossible. He also stressed the importance of centralized services within the Clinical Services Center, both as a means of avoiding duplication of services and as a means of coordinating the work of professional staff trained in the various disciplines represented.

The fee schedule adopted at the April meeting of the Board was discussed, and it was the consensus that a further study should be made of existing fee schedules at other institutions. It was agreed that after such study had been made the fee schedule would be reviewed by the Board.

RE-NAMING OF SCHOOL OF APPLIED SCIENCE

It is requested that the School of Applied Science be re-named as the School of Technology, effective July 1, 1961, to carry out the intention of House Bill No. 598, which has been passed by both the State House of Representatives and the State Senate, and which was approved by Governor Otto Kerner on April 24, 1961.

The effect of the change of name as of July 1, 1961, will be to provide us with sound bases (a) for reviewing budgetary requests for the programs in Applied Science, Engineering, and Industrial Education next biennium; (b) for locating a Dean of Technology; and (c) for employing consultants and for planning the scope, the nature, the organization, the curriculum, and the facilities required for sound programs in engineering science and related fields. Students intending to take a degree in engineering will also have a sound basis for planning their courses.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the request to re-name the School of Applied Science as the School of Technology, effective July 1, 1961. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved all purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during April, 1961, for the Carbondale and Southwestern Illinois campuses. At the request of President Morris, the Board considered the purchase of offset printing machinery of sufficient size to permit printing *The* *Egyptian*, the student newspaper, four days per week. The proposal for the purchase of equipment was part of the proposal to print the newspaper as a teaching medium by the Department of Journalism. After extended discussion, the Board remanded to the administration for further study the problem of machinery purchase and the printing of the student newspaper.

DEDICATION OF UNIVERSITY PROPERTY FOR PUBLIC ROAD

The Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit of the University conducts operations on a tract of abandoned strip mine property near Pyatt, Illinois, in Pinckneyville Township of Perry County. This tract is bordered on the south by Federal Aid Secondary Route 864, which the Perry County Highway Department intends to widen and resurface.

Some time ago the Highway Department approached Dr. Willard D. Klimstra, Director of the Wildlife Research Laboratory, asking if the University would dedicate to the County a strip of land along the north edge of the road sufficiently wide so that the road could be widened and resurfaced as planned. After some negotiation, the County Highway Department agreed that if the University would dedicate the land required for road widening purposes, the Highway Department would in the course of its operations construct five culverts and access ways into the Wildlife Research area.

Forms of dedication have been submitted to the University for a strip of land varying in width from ten to twenty-five feet along the north edge of the aforesaid road, together with plats showing the land to be dedicated, the points at which the access culverts are to be constructed, and the general type of each access way.

It is recommended that the Board approve the dedication of University property for the purpose of road widening and accept the offer of the Perry County Highway Department to construct culverts and access ways.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved dedication of University property, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORT ON THE UNIVERSITY AUTOMATED DATA SYSTEM

Thus far, the major efforts in this area have been of a research and developmental nature. One of the most difficult of our problems is simply getting literally millions upon millions of bits of information into a system with the fewest possible mistakes and without losing any information. This problem has required us to take an over-all view of what information we need and are legally required to provide, and the reverse, what we do not need and are not legally required to provide. One of the interesting, and rewarding, by-products of this research can be seen in the discovery by our Coordinator of Systems and Procedures, that the State of Illinois is willing, even anxious, to relieve us of certain record-keeping chores. This official, working with the assistance and approval of the State Records Commission, has submitted a proposal which requests permission to destroy approximately five hundred file drawers of obsolete purchasing and accounting documents, and permission to microfilm approximately 80,000 aged documents now housed in twenty-two file drawers by the Office of Student Affairs. These two steps together will effect yearly savings of \$31,062.00, as estimated by the State Records Commission. These savings in space, equipment, and personnel are only the first of many which we and the State Records Commission expect to accomplish.

The University is initiating a new student, faculty, and staff identification card effective next September. This plastic card resembles the common credit card in most respects. The common credit card is designed to (1) identify and certify the creditor, or (2) to do this as well as automatically capture the account number and name of the creditor. This latter action is accomplished through a bar code imprinted on the card, which is transmitted to the sales slip. The sales slip must then be scanned by a machine costing upwards of \$25,000.00, and the purchase amount must be key-punched by hand into a punch card. The card is then used to introduce the information into the electronic data system. Our identification card is used in a machine costing \$175.00, which automatically punches in the name and account number, and which allows the receiver to punch in the purchase amount. The result is a punched card which requires no scanning or separate key-punching operation. The card is permanent, designed for four years' use and subject to quarterly validation by edge-notching. The intake machine will not accept an improperly notched card.

Commencing with modest use, we intend to extend gradually the use of identification cards as our experience accumulates. We are investigating the possibility of using cards recording automobile mileages and similar accounting functions. Our hopes in library book check-outs can be used to illustrate the potential of this system. We hope, in time, that a person can merely present his card and the book and an automatic check-out, using another card in the book, can be effected. This information will then be fed into the electronic data system which will, itself, keep a check on the book's return and have the capability of printing an overdue card to the borrower. The greatest value, however, would be the availability of book use data, which presently cannot be economically assembled. The patterns of library book usage, by class, major, field, etc., are not presently available in any library.

Other work, principally of a research nature, is in the process of development. Data systems on faculty, staff, students, inventories, operations, equipment usage, physical plant facilities, etc., must be constructed and integrated. Our ideal objective is to (1) obtain static information once and only once, (2) have in our possession the most current variable information, and (3) have both types of information readily accessible to all who need such data.

The above report was presented for information only and was accepted by the Board for the record.

JUNE MEETING

THE JUNE MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the President's Staff Office, Edwardsville, Illinois, on Thursday, June 15, 1961, beginning at 10 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Chairman John Page Wham, Dr. Martin Van Brown, Kenneth L. Davis, Harold R. Fischer, Melvin C. Lockard, Arnold H. Maremont, George T. Wilkins. Mr. Lindell W. Sturgis was absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President J. E. Grinnell, Legal Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons, Dean of Instruction William T. Going, Head of Intercollegiate Athletics Donald N. Boydston, Administrative Assistant James D. Turner, Carl Mayhew, Reporter for *The Southern Illinoisan*, and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of the meeting of the Board held May 13, 1961, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice was mailed on June 1, 1961, of the intention to request amendment to Part III (Statutes of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University) at this meeting. On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by George T. Wilkins, the Board adopted amendments to read as follows:

Article III, Section 4

C. The University Council

1. Organization

a. Personnel.

The University Council shall be composed of:

(1) The President.

(2) The Vice-President for Planning and Review, the Chief Executive Assistant for the Carbondale Campus, the Chief Executive Assistant for the Edwardsville Campus, and the Director of Area Services. (3) A member of the Faculty Council, Carbondale Campus, elected by that Council for a one year term.

(4) A member of the Faculty Council, Edwardsville Campus, elected by that Council for a one year term.

(5) A member of the Graduate Council elected by that Council for a one year term.

(6) One member of the faculty, elected for a one year term by the faculty at large of the Edwardsville Campus.

 $(\bar{7})$ One member of the faculty, elected for a one year term by the faculty at large of the Carbondale Campus.

b. Meetings.

Meetings of the University Council shall be held at least once every month during the academic year, but no regular meetings shall be held during vacations and final examinations.

c. Officers.

(1) The President or a member of the University Council designated by him shall act as Chairman.

(2) An Executive Secretary of the Council shall be appointed or reappointed annually by the President after consultation with the members of the Council.

2. Functions

a. The University Council shall consider and advise the President on any matter brought before it by the President, by the Council itself, a member of the Council, or by representatives of the staff or students.

b. The University Council shall be the agency to which all councils of administration shall report all actions and recommendations.

c. The University Council shall resolve all conflicting recommendations received from other councils and agencies in order to present a single recommendation or set of recommendations to the President.

d. The President may either accept the recommendations of the University Council or present to the Council, orally or in writing, his reactions to the recommendations.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

REPORT ON ATHLETICS

This is another report in a series devoted to providing information about various aspects of the University's program. Our subject this time is the assumptions and practices underlying Southern Illinois University's program of varsity athletics.

The first assumption is that athletics should in no way be allowed to dominate or to rival the educational program of the University. On the contrary, it should be regarded as an integral part of the total educational program, with its proper place in that program but no more than its proper place.

To this end, athletics at Carbondale has been placed in the College of Education, in close relationship to the program in men's physical education. The limited facilities are necessarily shared between athletics and physical education, and all the members of the coaching staff qualify for and have appointments in the academic departments. The assumption is that we should name only the best qualified and most able teacher-coaches available. The coaches must be well-prepared professionally in the fields of education, health education, and physical education. Four of our coaches hold doctorates, and all the remainder have at least the master's degree, many with additional graduate work past the master's. The coaches must also have a constant regard for the welfare of the individual student-athlete. The emphasis is on the coach's being a good teacher and a good companion as well as a good coach.

The general scholastic level of athletes is being raised year by year with the recognition that the athletic program should support the academic program of the University rather than handicap it. Consideration of athletics as an instructional arm of the University, not only in the preparation of teachers of health and physical education but also for a well-rounded physical development of all male students, has placed its development in a proper perspective. No athletes at Southern receive a "free ride." All must work under regular University supervision for whatever *aid* is received in addition to tuition scholarships.

Competition in sports is as old as civilization. It has played a prominent role in shaping the cultures of all eras, including the present. In the education of youth, every one should be helped to understand the cultural implications of form and movement inherent in physical activities.

One difficulty in keeping athletics in a proper relationship to the educational program of a university is that undue emphasis on a few major sports, such as football and basketball, has often reduced the number of students who can be benefited by athletic competition and has led to outside interference and to corruption of athletic programs. Few American males play football and basketball after they have finished their education. But swimming, tennis, golf and other individual sports can be enjoyed throughout a lifetime. Hence football and basketball programs so strong that they overwhelm the remainder of the program cannot be justified. The head of our athletics program has stated that at one state university where he was employed, there were powerful football teams, with a dozen coaches working in this one sport. The rest of the "athletic program" was practically non-existent. There was no swimming, no gymnastics, no wrestling, no track, no cross-country. Golf, tennis, and basketball were barely tolerated.

The result of this type of program was that the coaches were uninterested in other sports because they were employed basically as football coaches. After football season, there was little left for the remainder of the year. Football players were given special consideration, and students and faculty members were disenchanted with the entire program. Hence it is a policy and practice at Southern to develop all legitimate sports without particular emphasis on any one sport, except that special encouragement is given to those activities which have carry-over or lifetime value. This policy provides opportunities for a maximum number of students to participate in competitive sports under game conditions and to acquire appreciation and enjoyment of competitive athletics as a form of expression.

This policy has also resulted in increasing support by the students and faculty members of the University for the highest level of skill and good sportsmanship in all events. Good effects are the rapidly increasing attendance at such sports as gymnastics, wrestling, and swimming, and applause for the demonstration of skill on the part of all athletes competing, not merely our own.

Two problems of the moment grow out of the increasing size and diversification of the student body. First, Southern Illinois University has outgrown its present conference. Even though it has not placed great stress on athletics, the excellence of its coaches and the numbers of its students have resulted in an outstripping of its traditional competition. The question of operating as an independent or of seeking new conference affiliations is therefore of great concern just now.

Secondly, a solution must be found for the Southwestern Illinois Campus, which at present has virtually no facilities for athletics and an extremely limited program. The staff and the Faculty Council there have been studying this problem and will no doubt have to give it much careful consideration before coming up with a proposal that will be workable in their location and at the same time conform with the assumptions concerning athletics which have been outlined above.

Professor Donald N. Boydston, Head of Intercollegiate Athletics, entered the meeting and presented to the Board a general statement concerning the philosophy and present condition of the intercollegiate athletic program at Southern Illinois University. A copy of his report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

PROPOSED CENTER FOR THE STUDY OF DELINQUENCY, CRIME, AND COR-RECTIONS

The post-World War II era has seen a rising tide of concern with the social problem of delinquency and crime in our increasingly mobile society. Not since the reforms of the nineteenth century has there been such public interest in attempts to control this problem. Efforts are being mustered on all levels of private and governmental control and, significantly, the federal government is preparing to make a massive effort in delinquency and crime control. President Kennedy's message to Congress on May 11, 1961, committed the Department of Justice and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to this cause.

Southern Illinois University is geographically located in what is to increasingly become the national center of correctional institutions. The new federal institution now under construction at Crab Orchard Lake is to be the "experimental institution" of the system. A new minimum security institution is to be established at Vienna by the State of Illinois. One of the most progressive state institutions in the nation is located at Menard.

Correctional problems are not restricted solely to institutions. Delinquency control and prevention is most typically an urban problem, and the site of the Southwestern Campus in an urban complex provides a very suitable location for study and research in delinquency. The State of Illinois has a pilot delinquency control unit now operative in Alton. Various local, state, and federal probation and parole agencies are located in the East St. Louis-St. Louis metropolitan complex.

The University has, for some years, been active with nearby state institutions in various ways. One major reason for the selection of the Crab Orchard Lake site by the federal Bureau of Prisons was the presence of Southern Illinois University.

During the past year an *ad hoc* committee of interested faculty and administrative officials was created by the Dean of Academic Affairs of the Carbondale Campus and the Dean of the Southwestern Campus. The actions of this committee culminated in an exploratory conference held at Carbondale in April, 1961, which was attended by leading experts in correctional agencies from across the nation. Following this conference, the committee petitioned the administration to recommend to the Board of Trustees the establishment of a correctional program involving instruction, research, and service. This petition was fortified by the opinions and recommendations of the non-University participants in the conference. Among the non-University participants were such nationally known criminologists as Myrl E. Alexander of the Bureau of Prisons and Joseph H. Lohman, who recently was named Dean of the School of Criminology at the University of California at Berkeley.

In response to this petition, the administration created an all-University Advisory Committee to consider the request and issue its judgment. The formalized Advisory Committee prepared recommendations to the administration with the request that the latter recommend adoption to the Board of Trustees of the University. As a result of these actions and in response to an obvious regional and national need, we request approval of the establishment of a Center for the Study of Delinquency, Crime, and Corrections, effective July 1, 1961.

Following is a description of the general purposes and the proposed organization of the Center for the Study of Delinquency, Crime, and Corrections:

1. Purposes

a. To train college students and others interested in careers in the various phases of corrections and crime control.

b. To provide the facilities for regional and national conferences and institutes for those engaged in the processes of the administration of criminal justice.

c. To conduct and encourage other interested agencies and individuals to engage in pertinent theoretical and applied research in the fields of delinquency, crime, and corrections.

d. To provide expert services of an advisory nature for those regional and national agencies needing and requesting relevant assistance.

2. Organization

a. Director. The Center shall be headed by a Director nominated jointly by the Chief Administrative Officer of each of the two major campuses after consultation with the appropriate department chairmen, deans, and directors and approval by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the President. The Director shall recommend for clearance through established channels the personnel, budget, curricula, and basic programs of the Center.

b. Staff.

(1) Those members of existing departments and other units of the University who may be able to contribute to the instructional, research, or service programs of the Center.

(2) Adjunct professors or research associates who are qualified experts in the fields of delinquency, crime control, and corrections but who are not regular full-time members of the University staff.

(3) Such general and office help as may be required.

c. The Advisory Committee on Delinquency, Crime, and Corrections. The Director shall be advised by a committee consisting of the President, or his designated representative, as chairman, and of representatives, both University and non-University, of correctional agencies and related fields. This committee should offer advice on how best the University might provide the instruction, research, and service which are needed to achieve the announced purpose.

Associate Professor James D. Turner, Administrative Assistant in Central Administration, entered the meeting and presented to the Board a brief statement concerning the organization and primary functions of the proposed Center. After discussion, Arnold H. Maremont moved that the Board approve the establishment of a Center for the Study of Delinquency, Crime, and Correction effective July 1, 1961. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPROVAL OF DOCTORAL PROGRAMS IN CHEMISTRY, JOURNALISM, AND PHILOSOPHY

The Board of Trustees has previously approved the offering of doctoral programs in twenty departments, namely, Government, Speech Pathology, Microbiology, Secondary Education, Psychology, Speech, Zoology, Elementary Education, Educational Administration and Supervision, Guidance, Anthropology, Health Education, Physiology, Physical Education for Men and Women, English, Sociology, Botany, Economics, Higher Education, and Geography. In addition, the School of Home Economics has been authorized by the Board to begin planning curricula leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree.

The Departments of Chemistry and Philosophy in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, and the Department of Journalism in the School of Communications, have now indicated their readiness to offer programs leading to the doctorate. Professor Arthur W. Davidson, Chairman of the Department of Chemistry at The University of Kansas, served as consultant to the Department of Chemistry. He spent several days on the Carbondale Campus evaluating the strength of the staff, the adequacy of library holdings and classroom and laboratory facilities, as well as the basic and proposed curricula. His report, which contained excellent recommendations for strengthening several aspects of the program, was in general favorable to the offering of a doctoral program in Chemistry. He stated, however, that only a limited number of candidates could be accepted until additional laboratory space is available.

The graduate staff of the Department of Chemistry includes the following faculty members holding doctor's degrees from the institutions indicated: Professor Roger E. Beyler, The University of Illinois; Professor Elbert H. Hadley, The University of Michigan; Professor James W. Neckers, The University of Illinois; Professor Kenneth A. Van Lente, The University of Michigan; Associate Professor Boris Musulin, Northwestern University; Associate Professor Robert E. Van Atta, Pennsylvania State University; Assistant Professor Wilbur N. Moulton, The University of Minnesota; Assistant Professor Douglas E. Sellers, Kansas State University; and Assistant Professor Russell F. Trimble, Jr., Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Each of these nine staff members has an impressive record of publications in professional and technical journals, and all are actively interested in research.

Professor James W. Markham of the School of Journalism, Pennsylvania State University, was invited to the campus and spent several days evaluating the strength of the staff, the library holdings, the basic and proposed curricula, and classroom and laboratory facilities available for a doctoral program in Journalism. His report was decidedly favorable, and he has given advice and made recommendations concerning strengthening the program which can, in general, be followed within our usual procedures.

The graduate staff of the Department of Journalism includes the following faculty members who hold doctor's degrees from the institutions indicated: Professor James L. C. Ford, The University of Minnesota; Professor Howard Rusk Long, The University of Missouri; and Associate Professor Donald G. Hileman, The University of Illinois. Two of these faculty members have had previous experience in directing the work of doctoral candidates. Also approved for graduate instruction are Professor Charles C. Clayton, who holds the Bachelor of Journalism degree from The University of Missouri, and Assistant Professor William Manion Rice, who holds the Master of Arts degree from The University of Missouri.

Professor Newton P. Stallknecht, Chairman of the Department of Philosophy at Indiana University, served as consultant to the Philosophy Department and considered the strength of the staff, the adequacy of librarv holdings, the basic and proposed curricula, and the physical facilities available for the offering of a doctoral program in Philosophy. His subsequent report was definitely favorable to this new program, and his advice concerning necessary improvements can be followed within our usual procedures for strengthening programs.

The graduate staff of the Department of Philosophy includes the following faculty members who hold doctor's degrees from the institutions indicated:

Professor George D. Axtelle, The University of California; Professor Willis Moore, The University of California; Professor George Kimball Plochmann, The University of Chicago; Professor Charles D. Tenney, The University of Oregon; Associate Professor James A. Diefenbeck, Harvard University; Associate Professor William Henry Harris, Boston University; and Assistant Professor George T. McClure, Ohio State University. In addition, the department has recently benefited from the services of two distinguished Visiting Professors, namely, Henry Nelson Wieman, who holds a doctor's degree from Harvard University and Luis A. Baralt, holding a doctor's degree from The University of Havana, Cuba. Two of the six regular staff members have had previous experience in directing the work of candidates for the doctor's degree.

It is recommended that the Department of Chemistry, the Department of Journalism, and the Department of Philosophy be authorized to accept candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree effective at the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1962.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board authorized the Departments of Chemistry, Journalism, and Philosophy to accept candidates for the Doctor of Philosophy degree, effective at the beginning of the Fall Quarter, 1962, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

TUITION FEES FOR INMATES OF SOUTHERN ILLINOIS PRISONS

The Division of University Extension has for several years offered credit courses at Menard State Penitentiary. The faculty members who have participated in this program, which has consisted of only one or two courses each term, have been unanimous in thinking that this type of work is an excellent rehabilitation service for these men, many of whom are soon to be returned to public life.

Many of these prisoners have no outside source of income whatever. Some of them make a few cents each day by working in some of the industries at the prison. The amount they may earn, however, does not exceed \$5.00 per month. Most of it is used for such small items as cigarettes.

Warden Ross Randolph has informed us that the only source of funds which he has to pay tuition for these prisoners is the profit from the canteen which the prisoners operate. Although he has used this source in the past, the profits from the canteen are supposed to be used to purchase books and provide other things for the entire prison population supporting the canteen, rather than for the benefit of a limited number in these classes.

With the growth of the University, there undoubtedly will be more and more campus departments which wish to cooperate with the prison in a number of research studies, which thus provides an unusually valuable laboratory right here on our doorstep. Furthermore, both the Penitentiary and the University are state-supported institutions which have made it a practice to provide services for each other.

This recommendation is being made, therefore, for a special tuition rate for all prisoners taking classes organized for them by the Division of University Extension, this rate to be 25% of that charged in other classes.

Because of an assumption which one of the staff members made at Menard this year whereby he thought that a television course, the Continental Classroom, a nationally broadcast program, would be free, the prison is in a position whereby it must deny college credit to approximately twenty persons who participated in this venture or in some manner obtain a lowered tuition fee. The recommendation is being made, therefore, that the action suggested above be made retroactive to September, 1960.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved a special tuition rate for prisoners, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

EASEMENT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF TELEPHONE LINE

At the May 13, 1961, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board approved the grant of a strip of land to Perry County for use in widening the road through University-owned strip mine property near Pyatt. The General Telephone Company of Illinois has now requested as easement for the placement of telephone poles and lines along and within eighteen inches of this roadway. The installation will consist of four poles on the north side of the east end of the road which borders the property on the south. The exact location is set out on the drawings attached to the easement forms supplied by the company. Dr. W. D. Klimstra, Director of Cooperative Wildlife Research, has indicated his approval of their plan.

Approval of the following resolution is recommended:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that the General Telephone Company of Illinois be granted an easement for the construction of telephone transmission facilities within eighteen inches of the public road right-of-way bordering University-owned strip mine property near Pyatt, Illinois, on the south, said property being located in the north half of Section 15, Township 6 South, Range 3 West of the 3rd P.M., in Perry County, Illinois, with the right to permit the attachment of the wires of any other company and to trim now and hereafter any trees along the lines so constructed so as to provide forty-eight inches clearance from the wires, and to erect and set the necessary guy and brace poles and anchors, and to attach thereto the necessary guy wires; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized and directed to execute the appropriate documents to effect the above grant and to attach the seal of the Board of Trustees thereto.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution granting easement for construction of a telephone line, as recommended. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

GENERAL OFFICES AT EAST ST. LOUIS AND ALTON

Certain problems of controlling the use of space, furnishing students and the public with general information, and providing a means of referral to the various special offices, all point toward the need of general offices at Alton and at East St. Louis for the coordination of its various activities. These functions are now largely served by the officers in charge of the evening programs. It now appears necessary to generalize these functions to cover the entire twenty-four hours of the day, so that responsibility for the geographical and mechanical operations of the two centers can be fixed.

While these general offices will not direct the programs of the two centers, it is expected that they will serve as clearing houses for information and calling attention to problems arising at the respective centers which are not specifically in the province of other offices. In this way they can inform, protect, expedite, and assist in coordinating the programs at Alton and at East St. Louis.

After consultation on the Southwestern Campus with all administrative officers concerned, we are ready to request approval of Mr. Virgil Seymour to serve as Assistant to the Vice-President (currently the President) for the General Offices, East St. Louis, effective July 1, 1961. Mr. Seymour's bachelor's and master's degrees are from Southern, and he is currently completing work for his doctorate in Sociology. Since 1959, Mr. Seymour served as *ad hoc* supervisor of the evening programs at East St. Louis, and in this capacity he has demonstrated outstanding ability in office management and liaison work among various divisions of the University.

A similar recommendation for the General Offices at Alton will be forthcoming.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the above recommendation. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris presented a comparison of summer term enrollments on the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses, showing total enrollment of 5,502 students during the 1960 summer session, with an estimated 6,300 students in 1961. Similar figures were cited for the fall term, showing total enrollment of 13,332 students in 1960 and an estimated 15,000 students for the fall term, 1961.

Approval was requested to change the names of two of the six educational divisions at the Southwestern Illinois Campus, as follows: Science Division to Science and Technology Division, and Social Studies Division to Social Sciences Division. On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board unanimously approved the changes in name recommended by the administration.

A tabulation of the bids received for the construction of a television transmitter building was mailed to each member of the Board of Trustees prior to this meeting, and a copy is on file with the Secretary of the Board. After discussion, Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board approve acceptance of the bids recommended for the construction of a television transmitter building. The motion was seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Copies of a report prepared by Olin E. Freedman of Chicago, who served as consultant to examine facilities for printing *The Egyptian* four days a week, and facilities for the Journalism laboratory, were presented. The substance of this report was that the printing machinery recommended for purchase was the best available for the purpose for which it was intended. A copy of Mr. Freedman's report was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board authorized the administration to purchase the printing machinery recommended, requisitions for which were presented at the May 13, 1961, meeting of the Board of Trustees. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The following resolution was presented with recommendation for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Resolution

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University has been conducting, and is conducting, educational activities in East St. Louis, Illinois, in the building known as the old East St. Louis Senior High School; and

WHEREAS, Tenancy of such building has been by virtue of a written lease with the Board of Education of School District No. 189, St. Clair County, Illinois, which lease is about to expire; and

WHEREAS, It is in the best interests of the East St. Louis area and the State of Illinois that the educational activities at that site continue for at least two years; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, sitting in regular session, that the building known as the old East St. Louis Senior High School be leased from the Board of Education of School District No. 189, St. Clair County, Illinois, for a period of two years from June 30, 1961, for the rental of One Dollar (\$1.00) for said period, with successive options to renew for varying periods continuing to June 30, 1968, and that the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University are hereby authorized and directed to execute such a lease and attach the seal of the Board to same and do any and all things necessary in order to enter into such an agreement.

On motion of George T. Wilkins, seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, the Board adopted the above resolution. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Wilkins, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The meeting was adjourned at 5 P.M.

INTRODUCTION

ESTIMATED ENROLLMENTS

The estimates of income for 1961-62 are in part based upon estimates of enrollment. The following summary statement shows estimated enrollments for Southern Illinois University. The figures are cumulative for the four quarters of the fiscal year:

There are several types of on-campus degree students, not all of them producing cash income. Each non-veteran produces \$42.00 per twelve-weeks term. Students on state scholarships and faculty members taking university courses produce no cash income for educational operations. Veterans of the Korean War do not take the place of World War II veterans as a source of income, since under Public Law 550 they at most pay the same tuition as non-veterans.

PERSONAL SERVICES - FACULTY, ADMINISTRATIVE, AND NON-ACADEMIC

1. It has been possible to recommend increases in salary for members of the faculty and administrative staffs. These increases have been made on a merit basis through careful evaluation of individuals. An attempt has also been made to increase the spread of faculty salaries to bring them closer into line with the spread now prevailing at other universities. Since the State Appropriation for Personal Services for the biennium is fixed, it is planned that salary increases at a somewhat lower level will be given the second year of the 1961-63 biennium.

It should be noted that the market for qualified teaching and research personnel has continued to become more competitive as the demand has increased much more than the supply. A factor which has been quite important during the past few years is the increasing demand by industries and governmental agencies for personnel having the kind of training which university faculty-administrative members have. The result is that universities must now compete not only among themselves, but with these other agencies, for staff members. At the same time, rapidly increasing college and university enrollments are requiring large increases in the teaching staffs of collegiate institutions.

The salary increases recommended in this budget will probably improve the ability of Southern Illinois University to obtain and hold good faculty members. It should be pointed out, however, that other institutions, in general, are increasing their salary levels as fast or faster than Southern.

2. It has been possible in this budget to make general increases for low-salaried office workers and other civil service employees who have been falling behind those civil service workers who receive prevailing rates or whose salaries are determined by negotiation. The new salaries are consonant with the ranges established by the University Civil Service System.

3. A considerable amount of the additional personal service money has gone into extending on a two-year basis positions added in 1960-61 to meet emergency conditions brought about by the large enrollment increases and to replacing on a permanent basis temporary people employed on an emergency basis. It has been possible to develop some additional services. Provisions have been made to upgrade the quality of our programs to some degree. Teaching loads will probably be parallel to those prevalent during the 1960-61 academic year.

4. Salary rates for persons on leave without pay are shown in parentheses since they do not affect actual expenditures.

5. The contract for every twelve-month faculty-administrative staff member having academic rank on a continuing or permanent basis will indicate that the twelve-month appointment will be dependent on his assignment.

PERSONAL SERVICES - STUDENT

1. A total of \$1,222,440 has been provided for student help from State Appropriations as compared to about \$1,112,815 during the 1960-61 fiscal year. It is planned in the future to use more, rather than less, student help in the various offices, in laboratories, and in the physical plant. Excellent students with financial need, providing they have the necessary skills or abilities as shown from testing programs, are given the first opportunity in finding campus jobs. 2. The pay scale for student employees on the Carbondale Campuses and Southwestern Illinois Campus remains the same, ranging from \$0.80 to \$1.25 per hour. Beginning with the fiscal year of 1960-61, new student employees were given an automatic increase of five cents after one term of successful work.

3. Pre-service training programs have been developed for office workers, food service workers, photographic workers, and workers in parts of the library. In-service training programs are provided for many of the different kinds of workers in the physical plant.

4. Great care is being exercised in coordinating the class and work programs of students. Whenever possible, a student is placed in work related to his major or minor study areas.

TRAVEL

1. In Order to provide equitable distribution and more effective control of travel funds, the allotments for travel are made in four categories as follows:

- a. Institutional travel, which involves travel on University business not identified with a specific department or office.
- b. Convention travel, which involves travel to conferences, conventions, and professional meetings. This has been allocated on a prorata basis to the major functions of the University, and will be distributed from the offices of the vice presidents and the deans of major educational units.
- c. Departmental travel, which involves travel that departments and offices must do in order to perform their regular functions.
- d. Air travel, which involves travel where additional convenience and speed serve the best interests of the University.

2. Travel allotments to the various accounts will be used in part for travel in University-owned passenger automobiles and airplanes. Since the operating cost of these automobiles and airplanes is chargeable against state appropriations other than travel and such costs are passed on to departments and offices using such service, the allotments for travel exceed the state appropriations for travel.

EQUIPMENT

1. With the purchase of an increasing number of books, the proportionate amount of equipment money necessary to purchase small equipment, under \$100 per item, has increased. Including the amount assigned to the Library for the purchase of books, about 37 per cent of the equipment money has been distributed to the departments and offices for the purchase of small equipment.

2. Approximately 63 per cent of the equipment money will be placed in general accounts to be allotted periodically as studies of needs determine. These studies should show whether or not there are any items of equipment needed for University use that have not been purchased by the departments and whether or not certain departments have special needs which have not been met by the appropriations hitherto made to them.

OTHER CURRENT EXPENSES

1. Since travel and equipment have been allotted separately in this budget, Other Current Expenses include contractual services, commodities, stationery-printing-office supplies, employer contributions to the University Retirement System, refunds, and awards and grants for scholarships.

2. The film rental service of the Audio-Visual Education department will charge other departments for the use of instructional films. On the basis of experience, allocations have therefore been made to the departments to be used for this specific purpose.

3. The problem of providing for the on-campus expenses of interviewees, consultants, and other official visitors to the campus has been met by allotting limited funds for this purpose to the offices that handle convention travel.

GENERAL COMMENTS

1. In line with the reorganization of the University's administrative pattern, a different grouping of accounts has been used in the 1961-62 internal budget. The General University accounts for the Carbondale Campuses have been placed first in the budget. These are followed in order by those accounts for which the Vice-President for Operations of the Carbondale Campuses has responsibility, General University accounts for the Southwestern Illinois Campus, and accounts for which the Vice-President for the Southwestern Illinois Campus has responsibility.

2. In general, the various programs have been allocated operational funds which are moderately above those allocated for the 1960-61 fiscal year. The allocations do not provide adequately for growth caused by the increasing number of students or for the expenditures necessary as the functions of departments are increased.

3. Graduate assistantships have been budgeted to the schools and colleges on the Carbondale Campuses at an increased level for 1961-62. An additional amount of \$50,000 has been set aside in the General Instruction budget of the Dean of Academic Affairs for the employment of new graduate assistants how have completed their master's degrees at other institutions and are working toward their advanced degree in a department which has been authorized to grant doctoral degrees.

4. Funds, to be distributed according to enrollment and other pressures, have been set aside in General University Carbondale Campuses and Southwestern Illinois Campus budgets.

5. The University's internal operating budget includes recommended budget allocations for restricted funds, that is, funds not appropriated to the University from General Revenue or the University Income Fund. Income for restricted funds is provided from instructional, research, and student aid grants made by outside agencies, from University student activity fees, and from other sources. Also included for information are the estimated operations of the University's Service and Revolving Funds. The titles of all such accounts, as well as those of auxiliary enterprises, are enclosed in parentheses.

6. The budget has been produced through the mechanical facilities of the University Data Processing and Computing Center. In order to adapt the budget to mechanization, it has been "streamlined" in certain respects, but explanatory notes and an index have been added to make it as easy to use as possible.

7. For purposes of classifying and controlling positions, each member of the staff has been assigned a position number, which appears in front of his name.
