July, 1964

THE JULY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held at the Mid-America Club in Chicago, Illinois, on Wednesday, July 1, 1964, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Dr. Martin Van Brown, Mr. Kenneth L. Davis, Mr. Harold R. Fischer, Mr. Melvin C. Lockard, Mr. Arnold H. Maremont, Mr. John Page Wham. Mr. Ray Page

and Mr. Lindell W. Sturgis were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President J. E. Grinnell, Vice-President Clarence W. Stephens, General Counsel John S. Rendleman, Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly, Assistant Director of Information Service C. A. Frazer; Associated Press representative James R. Peipert, reporters Ben Gelman, Marion R. Lynes, Chris Agrella, Morton Kondracue, Richard Philbrick; and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of a regular meeting held May 28, 1964, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by

Harold R. Fischer, these minutes were approved as presented.

In compliance with Part II, Article V, Section 5 of the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees, notice was mailed to the members of the Board on June 16, 1964, of the intention to request adoption of an amended version of Parts II,

III, IV, and V of the By-Laws and Statutes at this meeting.

President Morris indicated that the revised Statutes were drafted by Provost Harvey Davis of the State University of Iowa, submitted to the University Faculty for specific suggestions for changes, reviewed by groups of staff and faculty members from both campuses, refined by the University Council, and finally approved by a University Faculty vote of almost three to one. He stated that the chief changes were simplification of wording and assimilation of Parts IV and V into Part III, with organization around four main all-University functions: academic affairs, business affairs, student services, and area services.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, the Board approved the revised version of the *By-Laws and Statutes*, as recom-

mended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

The Chairman announced that this was the time and place for considering bids received for the purchase of \$3,250,000 Student Union Revenue Bonds, Series A of 1964, and \$2,250,000 Student Union Revenue Bonds, Series B of 1964, of Southern Illinois University pursuant to a Notice of Sale published in *The Bond Buyer* on June 16, 1964. The Secretary presented publisher's affidavit of publication of said Notice of Sale on June 16, 1964, and Trustee Harold R. Fischer made a motion that said Notice of Sale as so published, and the Official Statement prepared by Blyth & Co., Inc., Fiscal Agents for said Board of Trustees, be ratified, approved and confirmed by this Board of Trustees, which motion was seconded by Trustee Melvin C. Lockard and carried by the following vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis.

The Secretary then presented the bids received for the purchase of \$3,250,000 Student Union Revenue Bonds, Series A of 1964, and \$2,250,000 Student Union Revenue Bonds, Series B of 1964. On motion of Trustee Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Trustee Harold R. Fischer, the Board accepted the low bid submitted by John Nuveen & Co. and Associates for the purchase of said Series A of 1964 Bonds. The motion was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis.

Trustee Kenneth L. Davis made a motion that the bid of John Nuveen & Co. and Associates for the purchase of \$750,000 Series B of 1964 Bonds be accepted. The motion was seconded by Trustee Harold R. Fischer and was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis.

Trustee Arnold H. Maremont then moved that the bids of all other bidders be rejected and all other good faith checks presented be returned. The motion was seconded by Trustee Harold R. Fischer and was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis. The motion was declared unanimously adopted and the Secretary returned to all unsuccessful bidders their good faith checks.

The Secretary then stated that the only bid received for the purchase of \$1,500,000 Series B of 1964 Bonds was from the United States of America, acting by and through the Housing and Home Finance Agency, in accordance with the terms and conditions of a Loan Agreement by and between the United States of America and this Board of Trustees, dated December 1, 1963. On motion of Trustee Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Trustee Kenneth L. Davis, said bid was accepted by the following vote: Yea, Mr.

Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis.

The Secretary then presented and read the Resolution creating an issue of \$5,500,000 Student Union Revenue Bonds to be issued in Series as therein described. A copy of such Resolution was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees for deposit in the office of the Board. Such Resolution was read to the Board of Trustees, and after full discussion thereof Trustee Harold R. Fischer made a motion, seconded by Trustee Arnold H. Maremont, that said Resolution as read be adopted, which motion carried by the following vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis.

The Secretary then presented and read a Resolution establishing charges for the use of and for the service supplied by the new Student Union Building on the campus of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, Illinois. A copy of this Resolution was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees for deposit in the office of the Board. On motion of Trustee Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Trustee Martin Van Brown, the Board adopted the Resolution as read. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis.

The Secretary then presented and read a Resolution providing for the filing of a bond by the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University. A copy of such Resolution was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board of Trustees for deposit in the office of the Board. On motion of Trustee Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Trustee Harold R. Fischer, said Resolution was adopted by the Board. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Wham, Mr. Davis, Mr. Lockard, Dr. Brown, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont; nay, none; absent, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

APPROVAL OF POLICY OF RELIGIOUS COUNCIL FOR EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

At the January 23, 1964, meeting of the Board of Trustees a uniform policy regarding the use of land by religious organizations was approved. The policy was as follows:

Subject to final approval by the Board of Trustees, the administration is authorized to negotiate for the grant, lease, or conveyance of land to student religious organizations. The location of the lands shall be in conformity with the overall University land use policy as approved from time to time by the Board of Trustees, providing the religious organization has a satisfactory financial condition; that the organization is an approved student organization; and that the plans for the buildings or facilities to be constructed by the student religious organizations, including land-

scaping, do conform to the architectural and engineering standards of the University buildings and grounds.

Since that time the Religious Council for the Edwardsville Campus has met and prepared a policy statement regarding its relationship both to the faiths represented therein and to the University. This policy is in accord with the official policy statement of the Board approved January 23, 1964. Therefore, it is requested that the Board formally note its approval of the Religious Council's policy. Their policy follows:

In 1960, members of several denominations met and organized the University Religious Council for Edwardsville Campus of Southern Illinois University, under unique and favorable circumstances. During the succeeding months planning and actions have taken place that not only involve expenditure of considerable sums, but gradually formulated a fresh and vital force for a religious ministry to students, staff, and faculty on this campus. The organization incorporated as a not for profit corporation on September 14, 1962, known as the Religious Council, Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville Campus.

In recent months events have occurred that have tested the basic principles and assumptions of the Religious Council. In view of the questions and commitments that have been made and are now being re-examined, we feel that the following reaffirmations will help to relieve anxieties and reform the atmosphere of creative accomplishments:

- 1. The Religious Council is a unified, coordinating board of directors for the religious programs on the campus in which all religious groups will now and will continue to be represented.
- 2. It is agreed that there be a central building with acceptable facilities as the focal point for this cooperative religious ministry.
- 3. It is agreed that all religious groups seeking to carry on a ministry on the campus be represented in the building, share in the expenses, administration and use of the building and facilities.
- 4. It is agreed, in order that there may always be a clear understanding, that Southern Illinois University and the Religious Council will communicate with one another concerning those actions and decisions that affect the policy or program of the other. It is agreed that criteria for recognizing groups who intend to sponsor a religious ministry on the campus, and the criteria for expansion of religious ministry of a group are matters of mutual concern.
- 5. The Religious Council reaffirms its intentions and objectives as declared in Article 5 of the Articles of Incorporation:

The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is organized are:

- A. To cooperate with university officials in the advancement of matters of mutual interest, and to serve as a clearing house in subjects of common concern; as far as practicable, to provide for persons attending and interested in Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville Campus, ways and means to receive religious and moral instruction and entertainment, having due regard to the views of persons of different religious beliefs.
- B. To purchase, erect, or lease and maintain student religious centers, lecture and assembly rooms, reading rooms, club rooms, interfaith chapels, and business offices, and to equip the same with all things necessary for the benefit of those attending or interested in the work of Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville Campus activities.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the Religious Council's policy statement as an addition to the policy previously adopted by the Board. The motion was carried by unaninous vote.

CONSIDERATION OF OFFER OF LAND

Following is a letter which was delivered to counsel for the Board regarding certain property on the Edwardsville Campus:

Edwardsville, Illinois May 27, 1964

Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, Illinois

Re: Board of Trustees of
Southern Illinois University
vs.

Wilbur H. Gehring et al 64-G-2

GENTLEMEN:

In order to eliminate any necessity for further litigation in this matter and as an offer of compromise in this case I shall be very happy to make a gift to Southern Illinois University of forty acres of my land valued at \$60,000.00 (located immediately adjacent to lands now owned by Southern Illinois University) upon condition that this suit be dismissed and the University agree that it will not seek further Condemnation against me, Louise K. Gehring, Elizabeth D. Gehring, Wilbur E. Gehring, Gertrud Kramer, their heirs or assigns.

Legally the Board is the only one who can accept or reject gifts in the name of the University. Mr. Gehring's offer of forty acres of land is conditioned upon the University not seeking an additional two hundred acres owned by him and members of his family which will round out the Edwardsville acquisition program.

It is recommended that this offer not be accepted since the Board in its original decision to acquire the total 2,600 acres selected only such land as was necessary for the purposes of development of the campus.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board refused to accept the land offered. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

INFORMATION REPORT ON ACTIONS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

It is requested that the Board of Trustees consider and ratify the actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during May, 1964, for the Carbondale and Edwards-ville campuses. Detailed reports of such actions were mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees in advance of this meeting, and copies were placed on file in the office of the Board.

Actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to less than \$2,500, in

the total amount of \$179,678.13 for Carbondale Campus and \$65,703.03 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during May, 1964, were considered. The Board also considered actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to over \$2,500, in the total amount of \$1,102,314.19 for Carbondale Campus and \$320,947.33 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during the same period.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved and ratified actions of the Executive Committee as shown in the detailed reports considered. The vote was recorded as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION CONCERNING TRAFFIC STUDY

In 1956 the State Highway Department initiated a study, known as the Lochner Report, of traffic conditions in and about the City of Carbondale. Because of the University's deep involvement in this matter, it was consulted from time to time during the study. Because of the unusual growth of the area, the Highway Department now wishes to update its study, and to this end has suggested adoption of the following Resolution by all of the agencies involved. The Resolution is self-explanatory of what is proposed to be done jointly between the University, the city, the county, and the State Highway Department.

Approval of the following Resolution is recommended:

Resolution

Whereas, the Carbondale Area has experienced a dynamic growth within the last several years, and

Whereas, this growth has created an urgent need for a new evaluation of the transportation requirements within the area, and

WHEREAS, it is of mutual benefit to the City of Carbondale, the Southern Illinois University, the County of Jackson, and the State of Illinois to develop a comprehensive transportation plan for the Carbondale Area; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, that the Board of Trustees agrees to cooperate with the State in preparing a comprehensive transportation plan and in a continuing planning process

for the Carbondale Area and that this resolution be considered as the "memorandum of understanding."

Be It Further *Resolved*, that for the purpose of implementing the planning process hereinabove specified and referred to, the Board of Trustees agrees to the formation and establishment of certain committees having composition, function and responsibilities as follows:

Policy Committee. This committee shall consist of local elected officials, a representative of Southern Illinois University, and a representative of the Illinois Division of Highways. Each member will be expected to reflect the official position of his constituent agency. The members will be:

- 1. The Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Jackson County or his designated representative.
- 2. The Mayor of the City of Carbondale or his designated representative.
- 3. The President of Southern Illinois University or his designated representative.
- 4. The District Engineer of the Illinois Division of Highways or his designated representative.

The policy Committee shall elect its chairman, and appoint a Technical Committee. It shall be the responsibility of the Policy Committee to direct and administer the preparation of a comprehensive transportation plan and the continuing planning process with assistance and advice from the Technical Committee. The Illinois Division of Highways representative also shall advise the Policy Committee in matters of State and Federal policies and regulations.

The Chairman of the Technical Committee shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Policy Committee and also shall serve as Secretary to the Committee.

Specific responsibilities will be to:

- 1. Adopt a prospectus and work program for the comprehensive transportation plan and the continuing planning process.
- 2. Prepare an estimate of the cost of making the required studies and reports and make recommendations for the proration of the local share of such cost among the participating agencies. Such recommendation shall be in the form of a supplemental agreement to be adopted by each of the agencies contributing financial assistance to the studies.
- 3. Periodically review its estimates of the cost of accomplishing the required work and recommend such changes as are necessary.
- 4. Review each major phase of the study and direct the Technical Committee as necessary.
- 5. Adopt the initial short and long-range transportation plan, including priorities for improvement.
- 6. Meet as necessary after the preparation of the initial plan, but not less than annually prior to budget preparation, to review all materials pertaining to changing transportational needs in the area and to revise the plan as necessary.
- 7. Implement its plan by taking steps to gain official acceptance of its proposals by the governing bodies of the several units of government involved and by the people of the area.
- 8. Support and cooperate with other planning agencies in areas of mutual interest such as updating and implementation of comprehensive plans, zoning, subdivision design and controls, official maps, and capital improvement programs.
- 9. Exercise all other functions necessary to implement the continuing planning process.

Technical Committee. This committee shall be composed of technical representatives of each of the agencies represented on the Policy Committee, and such other agencies as may provide technical assistance or technical data in the preparation of the comprehensive transportation plan and the continuing planning process.

Additional members may be added to the Technical Committee from such other agencies in the planning area as may become able to provide technical assistance or

data.

The Technical Committee shall act as a working committee under the direction of the Policy Committee. The Illinois Division of Highways district representative shall act as chairman of this committee and call meetings as necessary to meet the objectives heretofore stated. The chairman of the Technical Committee also shall serve as secretary of the Policy Committee.

Minutes of all committee meetings shall be kept and distributed to all interested

agencies by the Chairman of the Technical Committee.

Specific responsibilities, for and subject to the approval of the Policy Committee, will be to:

- 1. Inventory and analyze existing and future conditions relating to the following basic elements:
 - (a) Economic factors affecting development
 - (b) Population
 - (c) Land use
 - (d) Transportation facilities
 - (e) Travel patterns
 - (f) Terminal facilities
 - (g) Traffic control features
 - (h) Zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations, building codes, etc.
 - (i) Financial resources

(j) Social and community-value factors, such as preservation of open space, parks and recreational facilities; preservation of historic sites and buildings; environmental amenities; and aesthetics.

The responsibility for the studies concerning the ten planning elements (a through j) shall be agreed upon at the time of the preparation of the inventory and work program. Every effort shall be made to utilize plans and data, and additional studies will be undertaken cooperatively by the staffs of the participating agencies unless there is need for specialized assistance from outside agencies. Because of its responsibilities and resources, the Illinois Division of Highways will assume the responsibility for the coordination of the activities of the study and the preparation of the plan in cooperation with the other participating agencies.

The Technical Committee will report its findings to the Policy Committee in the form of a prospectus, work program, and cost estimate for the recommended studies.

- 2. Develop and evaluate an initial comprehensive transportation plan compatible with the continuing planning process.
- 3. Prepare and disseminate pertinent information needed by governing bodies, in their consideration of planning proposals and improvement programs, and for the encouragement of public understanding and support.
- 4. Prepare recommendations concerning the scheduling and financing of highway improvements, coordination with other development programs, revision of ordinances and regulations, and additional legislation, if necessary.
 - 5. Continue collecting and analyzing data on land use, travel and transportation,

and related facilities by appropriate staffs at State and local levels in order to keep abreast of all conditions as they change from those initially analyzed and forecasted.

- 6. Meet as necessary to review information and data collected in Item 5 and advise the Policy Committee on the status of the comprehensive transportation plan and the continuing planning process.
 - 7. Perform all other functions as designated by the Policy Committee.

Be It Further *Resolved*, by the Board of Trustees that President Morris or his designated representative is hereby authorized to serve as a member of the Policy Committee.

Be It Further *Resolved*, that approval of this resolution by the Illinois Division of Highways shall be considered its acceptance of the provisions and objectives contained herein and shall constitute an agreement between the Board of Trustees and the State for the preparation of the comprehensive transportation plan and continuing planning process for the Carbondale Area.

Be It Further *Resolved*, that the Secretary of the Board of Trustees is hereby directed to transmit the original reproducible copy of this resolution to the Division of Highways through its District Engineer's Office at Carbondale, Illinois.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, the Board adopted the resolution presented, with the understanding that Board approval will be required for any expenditure of funds. The motion was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR ELEVATED WATER STORAGE TANK, ED-WARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received June 9, 1964, for construction of the elevated water storage tank, Edwardsville Campus. There is presented herewith a tabulation of the proposals received, together with a summary sheet showing the recommendation of the University Architect for the award of contract to the low bidder, Chicago Bridge & Iron Company, in the amount of \$187,450.00.

We recommend that the Board of Trustees approve the award of contract to the low bidder as indicated.

A copy of the tabulation of proposals, together with a copy of the summary sheet showing the administration's recommendation for award of the contract, was placed on file in the office of the Board.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Dr. Martin van Brown, the Board approved the award of contract as recommended. The motion was carried by the following recorded vote: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

RATIFICATION OF ACTION ON TAX-DEFERRED ANNUITY PROGRAM

At the regular meeting held May 28, 1964, the Board of Trustees authorized the administration to present a specific plan for a tax-deferred annuity program for consideration at a subsequent special or regular meeting. The plan document was mailed to the members of the Board and was approved prior to this meeting.

President Morris stated that approval of the program makes a unified program among all the state universities, enabling faculty and staff members to move from one location to another with no loss of benefits. He requested ratification by the Board of the action taken by mail.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Arnold H. Maremont, the Board ratified action taken by mail to approve the tax-deferred annuity program, to become effective July 1, 1964. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris then requested authorization for signing contracts with the five companies selected as insurers for the annuity program.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board authorized the President of the University to sign contracts implementing the tax-deferred annuity program. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris requested that the Board approve the following statement delegating special authority:

"The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University hereby authorizes Dr. Delyte W. Morris, President of Southern Illinois University, to act in all matters and to sign all instruments pertaining to the application to the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare by this University for matching funds for the construction of a television facility near Olney, Illinois."

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved the statement recommended. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

President Morris indicated that a letter from the Civil Defense Agency requested approval for the selection of facilities at Southern Illinois University as an emergency relocation site by the United States Army Finance Center. He stated that approval would commit the use of facilities in case of an emergency, and that it seemed desirable to locate a Finance Center on a university campus because of the availability of machine bookkeeping and computing equipment.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved the request presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris stated that the Board previously had authorized the administration to negotiate with two private investors, Mr. Cherry and Mr. Reeves, who were interested in the construction of dormitories in the southeast part of the city. This action was taken at the regular meeting held April 26, 1963. Subsequently, agreements were made with these two

parties to become agents of the University to construct dormitories on University-owned land on a lease-back basis. Difficulties had been encountered, and Mr. Reeves wished to sell his land to the University for a total of \$124,500. President Morris recommended that the Board refuse Mr. Reeves' offer and follow the original agreement. No formal action was taken, but it was the consensus of the members of the Board that this procedure was satisfactory.

President Morris next indicated that the University had received a formal resolution from the Carbondale City Council, requesting that the University yield a strip of right-of-way to make possible the widening of Mill Street from Illinois Avenue to Oakland Avenue. He stated that the resolution also requests that the University bear one-half of the cost of the widening project. President Morris recommended that the wording of the resolution be changed to show that the University was willing to yield right-of-way as necessary to widen the street; further, that the Board could bear one-half the cost of widening only by seeking funds from the Legislature. After consideration and discussion, the Board deferred action concerning the proposed two-part resolution submitted by the Carbondale City Council, with the request that a specific plan be submitted at the August meeting of the Board.

For information, President Morris read a telegram sent by Congressman Kenneth Gray stating that the loan of \$10,200,000 for construction of University Park and the high-rise dormitories had been approved. No action was requested.

There being no further business to come before the Board at this time, Trustee Harold R. Fischer made a motion that the meeting be adjourned until August 7, 1964, at 9:30 A.M., which motion was seconded by Trustee Melvin C. Lockard and unanimously carried.

August, 1964

HE AUGUST MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board in Carbondale, Illinois, on Friday, August 7, 1964, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The following members of the Board were present: Dr. Martin Van Prown, Mr. Kenneth L. Davis, Mr. Melvin C. Lockard, Mr. Arnold H. Maremont, Mr. Lindell W. Sturgis, Mr. John Page Wham. Mr. Harold R.

Fischer and Mr. Ray Page were absent.

Also present were President Delyte W. Morris, Vice-President Charles D. Tenney, Vice-President Clarence W. Stephens, Dean of Academic Affairs W. J. McKeefery, General Counsel John S. Rendleman, Legal Counsel C. Richard Gruny, Business Manager and Treasurer Robert L. Gallegly, Director of Information Service William H. Lyons; reporters Ben Gelman, Marion R. Lynes, Leonard R. Granato; and Mrs. Louise Morehouse, Recorder for the Board of Trustees.

The Chairman presented the minutes of a regular meeting held July 1, 1964, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by

Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

At the regular meetings held April 24 and May 28, 1964, salary lists for faculty-administrative and staff personnel were presented to and approved by the Board, with authorization granted for subsequent changes to be made as indicated by further examination. Copies of the Annual Internal Budget for 1964–1965 were forwarded to the members of the Board prior to this meeting.

President Morris presented the budget document with the recommendation that it be approved by the Board. On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the Annual Internal Budget for 1964–1965, as presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Mr. Maremont suggested that explanation of various aspects of the budget be presented to the Board, by sections, at several meetings prior to presentation of the budget document. The Board, by common consent, agreed that such study would be helpful. Discussion was held concerning procedures for handling common, repetitive items and submission of purchase requisitions to the Executive Committee for partial purchases under encumbrance authorizations. It was agreed to defer decision as to procedure until Mr. Fischer would be present.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

PROPOSED ELIMINATION OF FEE

There is listed in the General Information Bulletin a \$1.00 fee for completing an incomplete course. The Registrar's Office, Carbondale Campus, states that traditionally a student is required to pay the fee unless a statement from the University Physician indicates his inability to take the final examination because of illness.

In past years, when the University was basically an undergraduate institution and it was to be expected that a student could start and finish a course to coincide with the beginning and ending of a quarter, this fee was no doubt justified. However, there are now many types of courses for which incomplete grades are commonly submitted at the end of a quarter. The registrars of both campuses feel that this fee has become no more than a nuisance charge, principally affecting students seeking transcripts.

It is recommended that the Board approve the elimination of the \$1.00 fee for completing an incomplete course, effective with the Fall Quarter, 1964.

On motion of Dr. Martin Van Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the elimination of the fee, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

WAIVER OF TUITION AND FEES

The Federal Government, through the Department of Labor, has made a grant to the University for credit course work for students enrolled in the Counselor Trainees and Youth Advisors Training Program. The grant covers the expenses of the program, which started July 20. The Department of Labor has taken the position that this grant reimburses the University for the tuition and fees of the trainees, as well as for the other costs of the program. Since the provisions of the grant are generous, it would appear that there is considerable merit in this position.

It is requested that waiver of individual tuition and fees for all students enrolled in this program be approved by the Board of Trustees, retroactive to July 20, 1964.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the waiver of tuition and fees requested. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATE A, SITE DEVELOPMENT PHASE I, ED-WARDSVILLE CAMPUS

On March 6, 1964, the Board of Trustees awarded a contract for Phase I of the Site Development Work in the amount of \$1,710,418.07 to the Bituminous Fuel and Oil Company of East St. Louis. The award was made subject to the contractor granting an extension to reinstate Alternate A for extension of Entrance Road "B" to Highway 66. This alternate has now been extended to August 28, 1964. However, the land over which it is to be located has not as yet been acquired.

We should like to accept the alternate, contingent upon obtaining the necessary land for the construction of this road.

A tabulation of bids received March 3, 1964, and a summary sheet showing contracts awarded and recommended, was presented. A copy of these documents was placed on file in the office of the Board.

President Morris indicated that a contract of agreement had now been signed to acquire the land required for the extension of Entrance Road "B" to Highway 66 By-Pass. He presented the administration's recommendation for the award of contract to the low bidder, Bituminous Fuel & Oil Co., East St. Louis, Illinois, in the amount of \$121,657.85.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the award of contract as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS

Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that for the construction of the Student Union Building, Edwardsville Campus, (Housing and Home Finance Agency Project No. CH-Ill.-144(S)) the Board shall make available funds necessary up to the amount of \$300,000.00 to be added to the proceeds received from the sale of bonds for expenses estimated to be incurred in the course of construction from other capital funds available for expenditure by the Board.

INCREASE OF STUDENT ACTIVITY FEE FOR MEDICAL BENEFIT FUND

On July 24, 1950, the Board of Trustees approved an increase of the Student Activity Fees of \$1.00 per quarter, effective the fall quarter of 1950. On November 5,

1954, the Board of Trustees approved another increase of \$1.00 per quarter to bring the Student Activity Fee to \$9.50 per quarter, designating \$3.15 to be distributed to the Medical Benefit Fund. In each instance the increase was approved to enable the Health Service to provide essential services to students.

It is recommended that effective the beginning of the winter quarter, 1964–65, the Student Activity Fee be increased by \$1.00 per quarter for a total Student Activity Fee of \$10.50 per quarter for each full-time graduate and undergraduate student and for designated part-time students and special program enrollees in Southern Illinois University. \$4.15 per quarter is to be distributed from the Student Activity Fee by formula to the existing Medical Benefit Fund.

ACQUISITION OF LAND

In order to make land acquisition authority readily accessible and to organize this authority into a compact series of resolutions clearly stating the land to be acquired and the authority granted by the Board of Trustees, four resolutions have been heretofore offered to and adopted by the Board covering respectively two areas within the City of Carbondale on the east side of the Illinois Central Railroad tracks, and all property within the City of Carbondale situated on the west side of the Illinois Central Railroad tracks and all the unacquired property located to the west of Little Grassy Lake. All of this property was within the approved Master Plan of the Board of Trustees. The final resolution in this series is now offered. With one exception, it includes all land immediately south of the Carbondale city limits included in the Master Plan, together with properties within the city limits which were omitted from the other resolutions because they were in the process of acquisition at the time. The one tract omitted will be submitted separately, if necessary; an accurate legal description of it is not now available. The properties in process of acquisition are included here in order to secure certified acquisition authority for filing with the Illinois Building Authority, preliminary to requesting that body to supply purchase funds for these properties.

Whereas, It is deemed desirable by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to condense into a limited number of resolutions the authority heretofore granted for the negotiation and acquistion of land within the University's master plan, for the purposes of consolidation and ease of reference,

Now, Therefore, Be It *Resolved* By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a body politic and corporate of the State of Illinois, in regular session assembled, that it is hereby determined that it is necessary and desirable that the Board of Trustees shall acquire title to and possession of the following described real property, which real property is required and needed for the expansion of the Carbondale Campus of Southern Illinois University and for the educational purposes of that Campus, to-wit:

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris briefly reviewed for the members of the Board previous discussions related to the location of a branch office of the U.S. Forest Service, Division of Research, on University-owned land. He indicated that the Forest Service had sought funds for a building and had now obtained an appropriation for architectural planning, necessitating approval of a specific site for the construction of such building. Using a chart of the area, President Morris indicated two sites under consideration and recommended approval by the Board of Site \$2, to be leased to the Forest Service on a long-term basis.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, the Board approved Site \$2 for the location of the proposed forestry research building. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris discussed with the Board various locations proposed for construction of housing for middle-income groups, under the terms of Federal Housing Act, Section 221-D3. At his request, General Counsel John S. Rendleman specified five tracts of land which had been considered for such housing. He indicated that the most desirable tract was south of Reservoir Road, requiring annexation of most of the campus to the City of Carbondale in order to meet the requirements of the Act to build such housing within the city limits.

The Board discussed the implications of annexation to the City and concluded that the question of annexation should be considered independently of any consideration of building sites for middle-income housing. No action was taken.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:45 P.M.

IMPLEMENTATION OF ADMINISTRATIVE REORGANIZATION

In accordance with the new Statutes recently approved by the University Faculty and established by the Board of Trustees, the geographical vice presidents have been replaced by functional vice presidents.

It is now fitting to express deep personal appreciation to both Vice-President Grinnell and Vice-President Stephens, our former chief operating officers, for the heroic work they have done at Carbondale and Edwardsville, respectively, in guiding the two major campuses through periods of rapid growth and complex readjustments.

This information item required no formal action.

ESTABLISHMENT OF ADDITIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

By previous actions, the Board of Trustees has established 125 four-year tuition scholarships annually at the Carbondale Campus and a like proportion of four-year scholarships annually at the Edwardsville Campus.

In order to stimulate attendance at the junior colleges in Illinois and to encourage the most qualified graduates of junior college programs to attend Southern Illinois University, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees establish fifty two-year tuition scholarships annually for the most deserving graduates of junior college programs in Illinois. The administration of this program will be handled by the appropriate staff members, in accordance with policies of the Board and of the Scholarships and Loans Committee of the University, and in cooperation with appropriate academic divisions of the University.

President Morris briefly outlined for the members of the Board the various ways in which the University had attempted to encourage the growth of junior colleges in Illinois. He indicated that provision of scholarships for superior junior college graduates would seem to be a tangible and specific way of expressing the University's sincerity in acknowledging the importance of junior college programs.

On motion of Ray Page, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved and ratified all temporary appointments reported. The vote was unanimous.

APPROVAL FOR INCREASING APPLICATION FOR STUDENT HOUSING

Further cost estimates and experience in construction of Phase I of University Park Residence Halls have resulted in a final figure of \$10,800,000 for University Park, Phase II. The maximum Housing and Home Finance Agency participation therein is \$5,100,000 and that agency has agreed to this amount. In order to formalize this arrangement, an increase is necessary in the amount for which loan application is authorized over that granted November 9, 1961, as amended February 1, 1963.

The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption:

Resolution

Whereas, The cost estimates for construction of two additional tower dormitories and a Food Service—Commons Building as University Park, Phase II, to provide housing, dining, recreation and appurtenant facilities for approximately 800 men students, 800 women students, 32 resident fellows, and four counselors have now increased to a total of \$10,800,000; and

Whereas, The Housing and Home Finance Agency of the Federal Government has indicated its willingness to participate in a revenue bond issue for this purpose by purchasing bonds up to a face value of \$5,100,000; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the administration's increase in the amount of loan application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency for such purpose to the amount stated above is hereby authorized, ratified and confirmed as the act of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

FORMAL APPROVAL OF AGREEMENT FOR LOAN FROM HOUSING AND HOME FINANCE AGENCY

On November 9, 1961, the Board of Trustees authorized and directed that an application be made to the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the Federal Government for a loan of \$4,000,000 to finance one-half the estimated cost of construction of Phase II of the University Park Residence Halls Project. On February 1, 1963, the Board approved an application to increase the amount of such loan to

\$4,850,000, or one-half the total estimated construction cost of \$9,700,000. By separate action to be taken on September 29, 1964, the Board is requested to authorize, ratify and confirm as its act an increase in the amount of the loan application to a total of \$5,100,000.

We recommend that the Board of Trustees formally approve this Loan Agreement, which has been reviewed by the Business Manager and Treasurer, the Vice-President for Business Affairs, and the Legal Counsel.

A Resolution entitled "Resolution Approving and Providing for the Execution of a Loan Agreement, and Numbered Contract No. H(402)-2015, By and Between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America" was introduced by the President of the University.

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, as follows: SECTION 1. The pending Loan Agreement and numbered Contract No. H(402)-2015, and relating to the erection on the campus of Southern Illinois University, an educational institution of higher learning located at Carbondale, Illinois, of two new dormitories and a Food Service—Commons Building to provide housing, dining, recreation, and appurtenant facilities for approximately 800 men students, 800 women students, 32 resident fellows, and four counselors, by and between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the United States of America, is hereby in all respects approved.

SECTION 2. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, John Page Wham, is hereby authorized and directed to execute the said Loan Agreement in two counterparts on behalf of the said Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and the Scretary of the said Board of Trustees, Melvin C. Lockard, is hereby authorized and directed to impress and attest the official seal of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University on each such counterpart and to forward two such counterparts to the Housing and Home Finance Agency, together with such other documents relative to the approval and execution of such counterparts and to this Resolution as may be required by the Government.

Said Resolution and the proposed Loan Agreement described therein were then read in full and discussed and considered.

Trustee Kenneth L. Davis then moved the adoption of the Resolution as introduced and read. Trustee Lindell W. Sturgis seconded the motion, and, on roll call, the following voted "Aye": John Page Wham, Kenneth L. Davis, Melvin C. Lockard, Dr. Martin Van Brown, Harold R. Fischer, Lindell W. Sturgis, Ray Page; and the following voted "Nay": None.

The Chairman thereupon declared the motion carried and the Resolution adopted as introduced and read. A copy of the Loan Agreement was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION APPOINTING BOND COUNSEL; TRUSTEE, PAY-ING AGENT, AND DEPOSITORY OF INTEREST AND SINKING FUND ACCOUNT; AND CONSTRUCTION ACCOUNT DEPOSITORIES

The following resolution is recommended for adoption by the Board of Trustees.

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, a body politic and corporate of the State of Illinois, in regular session assembled, that for the purposes of carrying out the Loan Agreement and Numbered Contract No. H(402)-2015, with the United States of America:

- 1. That Chapman and Cutler, Attorneys at Law, Chicago, Illinois, are hereby appointed Bond Counsel to the Board.
- 2. That the Northern Trust Company, of Chicago, Illinois, a banking corporation with corporate trust powers authorized to do business in this state, is designated Trustee, Paying Agent, and Depository of the Bond and Interest Sinking Fund Account to be created thereunder; and that an Alternate Paying Agent for this purpose in the City of New York shall be designated by the successful bidder for the bonds to be issued thereunder within twenty-four hours after the award is made to him.
- 3. That the First National Bank of Carbondale, Illinois, and the Carbondale National Bank of Carbondale, Illinois, are hereby designated as Depositories of the Construction Account to be created thereunder.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

ACQUISITION OF SURPLUS PROPERTY

The following resolution is recommended for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Resolution

Whereas, certain real property owned by the United States, located in the County of Williamson, State of Illinois, has been declared surplus and is subject to assignment for disposal for educational or public health purposes by the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, under the provisions of Section 203(k)(1) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949 (63 Stat.377), as amended, and rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto, more particularly described as follows:

138.22 acres of fee-owned land, improved with 23 miscellaneous structures containing an approximate floor area of 216,907 square feet. Improvements consist of storage facilities, classrooms, housing units, cafe, bus station, boiler house, boiler room, and dry kiln. Buildings are of various construction, wood, tile, and metal. This land is located approximately nine miles east of Carbondale and seven miles west of Marion.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, needs and can utilize said property for educational purposes in accordance with the requirements of said Act and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder;

Now, Therefore, Be It *Resolved*, That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, shall make application to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare for and secure the transfer to it of the above-mentioned property for said use upon and subject to such exceptions, reservations, terms, covenants, agreements, conditions, and restrictions as the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, or his authorized

representative, may require in connection with the disposal of said property under said Act and the rules and regulations issued pursuant thereto; and

Be It Further Resolved That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, has legal authority, is willing and is in a position to assume immediate care and maintenance of the property, and that Delyte W. Morris, President, be and he is hereby authorized, for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, to do and perform any and all acts and things which may be necessary to carry out the foregoing resolution, including the preparing, making, and filing of plans, applications, reports, and other documents, the execution, acceptance, delivery, and recordation of agreements, deeds, and other instruments pertaining to the transfer of said property, and the payment of any and all sums necessary on account of the purchase price thereof or on account of fees or costs incurred in connection with the transfer of said property for surveys, title searches, appraisals, recordation of instruments, or escrow costs.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, the Board adopted the resolution authorizing application for transfer of surplus government land, as recommended. The vote was as follows. Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION MODIFICATIONS, CENTRAL CAMPUS AREA, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

The switch breaking gear at the University sub-station is insufficient to handle the present possible power fault. Proposals were received August 27, 1964, for the general and electrical construction work relating to modifications of the electrical distribution system which will eliminate the possibility of discontinuance of electrical power to major portions of the campus and will provide proper switch breaking gear.

A tabulation of all proposals received, together with Summary Sheet No. 1 showing the recommendation of the University Architect for the award of contracts for this work, is attached hereto. It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the award of contracts to the low bidders in the total amount of \$278,384, as indicated, plus contingency allowance of \$13,919, for a total project cost of \$292,303. The administration's recommendation for award of contracts is as follows:

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR UTILITIES RESERVOIR NO. 1, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

There is attached hereto a tabulation showing all proposals received on September 3, 1964, for the general construction work for Utilities Reservoir No. 1 on the Edwardsville Campus. The lake, which covers approximately eighty acres, will be used as a source of cooling water for the air conditioning condensers, in lieu of a conventional cooling tower.

The recommended contract award of \$246,874.00 is 4% above the engineers' cost estimate for the project.

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees approve the award of contract in the amount of \$246,874.00 to the low bidder, Fruin-Colnon Contracting Company of St. Louis, Missouri.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the award of contract as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none. A copy of the tabulation of proposals received was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

PRE-FINANCING OF COST REIMBURSEMENT CONTRACTS

Under the commitments of various cost reimbursement contracts with various Federal agencies, including AID, Peace Corps, and Department of Labor, the University must finance the current payroll and other expenditures authorized and directed under these contracts from its own resources. On the basis of expenditure reports, the University is later reimbursed for allowable direct and indirect costs.

The rapid expansion of the University into these activities has exhausted the limited available resources existing for the purpose of pre-financing these contracts and has caused the administration to examine various methods of fulfilling this need.

Normally a substantial balance in the form of investments and cash exists in the overall Restricted Fund group of accounts, due largely to the practice in many research and instructional grants of the various grantors pre-paying the grant amounts upon execution, or in advance installments.

It is recommended that the President of the University be authorized to consider the total resources of the Restricted Fund group of accounts as a unit for the purpose of pre-financing cost reimbursement grants and contracts with total Restricted Fund resources available, and to utilize these resources when in his judgement it is necessary and appropriate to do so to fulfill contract obligations.

On motion of Ray Page, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board tabled the recommendation made by the administration until the next regular meeting; further, the Board directed that investigation be made as to how other universities are handling the pre-financing problem. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR HEATING—REFRIGERATION PLANT, ED-WARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received on August 21, 1964, for various components of construction of the heating and refrigeration plant for the Edwardsville Campus. A tabulation of all proposals received, together with summary sheet, is attached hereto. We are recommending acceptance of the low bidders for the total project cost of \$1,112,469.00, plus a contingency allowance of \$11,125.00, for a total project cost of \$1,123,594.00. We are recommending the rejection of the bids on the control system work. The low bid for this work was \$51,463.00, which is 92.02% over the engineers' estimate of \$26,800.00. Re-bidding this portion of the work will not affect construction progress. The award of the other work, minus the contingency, is 4.51% over the engineers' estimate of August 18, 1964.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the award of contracts as recommended by the administration and rejected all proposals for control systems, authorizing the administration to seek new bids. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none. A copy of the tabulation of all proposals was placed on file with the Secretary of the Board.

RENTAL OF CLASSROOM SPACE, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

The University will be unable to commence operations on the Edwardsville Campus until the fall of 1965. In the meantime, however, facilities at the Alton and

East St. Louis Centers are greatly crowded. In addition, it would be desirable to begin the orientation of students toward the Edwardsville Center. For these reasons it has seemed advisable to attempt to provide classroom space for the offering of courses in the Edwardsville area commencing with this fall.

Negotiations have been conducted with the Edwardsville Community Unit School District No. 7, Madison County, for the use of seventeen classrooms, together with restrooms, entry ways, lobbies, corridors, administrative office space, and parking areas on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday evenings from 5:20 P.M. to 10:20 P.M.

A report was presented which showed the estimated cost per square foot for classroom space, hall space, and restroom space. Based on use by the University for a total of 585 hours per academic year, application of such estimated cost figures resulted in a total of \$21,459.67 for lease of space, exclusive of parking areas. The administration then presented the following lease for approval by the Board of Trustees:

CONTRACT FOR USE OF CLASSROOM SPACE IN EDWARDSVILLE JUNIOR AND SENIOR HIGH SCHOOLS

This agreement made this——day of———, 1964, by and between the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, hereinafter called the University and the Board of Education of the Edwardsville Community Unit School District No. 7, Madison County, Edwardsville, Illinois, hereinafter called the School Board, Witnesseth:

Whereas, The Parties hereto, being mutually interested in developing educational programs in the Edwardsville area, desire to cooperate in the furtherance of such educational programs, and

Whereas, The School Board is willing to provide the classroom space and building facilities necessary for the University to initiate and carry out an educational program in higher education in the Edwardsville area during the 1964–65 academic year,

Now Therefore, the Parties hereto, in consideration of the payment by the University to the School Board of the sum of twenty-two thousand seven hundred and sixteen dollars (\$22,716) hereby mutually agree according to the following terms and conditions as hereinafter set forth:

- 1. Space to be Provided. The School Board shall furnish to the University for higher educational purposes the following identified classrooms in the Edwardsville Junior and Senior High School Buildings, together with restrooms, entry ways, lobbies, corridors, administrative office space and parking areas necessary and incident to the use thereof: Junior High School Classrooms: 101, 102, 103, 104, 108, 201, 202, 203, 204, 205, 206, 207, 208, 209, 210, 211, and the Senior High School music room.
- 2. Period and Time of Use. The period of use by the University of the above identified space during the 1964–65 academic year shall commence on or about the 15th day of September, 1964 and terminate on or about the 15th day of June, 1965, provided, however, that the period of use for rooms 210 and 211 shall not commence until the Winter Quarter on or about the 2nd day of January, 1965. The University shall occupy and use the aforesaid classroom space on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings between the hours of 5:20 P.M. and 10:20 P.M. except that the music room shall be used on Tuesday evenings between 7:30 P.M. and 9:30 P.M.
- 3. Payment. The University shall pay as rental to the School Board for the use of the

above identified classroom space the sum of \$20,651 and in addition thereto, an administrative fee based on ten per cent (10%) of the rental in the sum of \$22,716. Payment by the University to the School Board shall be made in full on or about the 15th day of September, 1964.

- 4. University Responsibility for Students. The University shall be responsible for the enforcement of all regulations with reference to the conduct of University students on the premises.
- 5. Damage to Premises. The University shall be liable for all damage to the premises, in excess of ordinary wear and tear, arising out of the use thereof by the University.
- 6. Administrative Space. The School Board shall provide the University such administrative space as is reasonably necessary and suitable, which space shall later be selected and agreed upon between the respective administrative representatives of the Parties hereto.
- 7. Insurance. The School Board shall provide liability insurance incident to use of the premises by the University, its Faculty, Students and other Personnel, and any additional premium required therefore shall be paid by the School Board, the same having been heretofore understood to be included in administrative expense.
- 8. Janitor Service. The School Board shall provide necessary Janitor Service and clean-up as necessitated by use of the premises and buildings by the University.
- 9. University Administrative Liaison. The University shall appoint one of its faculty or staff as an administrative liaison between the University and the administrative representative of the School Board which administrative liaison is hereby designated as George T. Wilkins.
- 10. Traffic Control and Parking Area Supervision. The University shall furnish necessary police personnel to control traffic and supervise the Junior High School Parking Area. 11. Cooperation. The parties hereto shall each cooperate with the other in carrying out the purpose and intent of this contract.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Ray Page, the Board approved the lease of classroom space from the Edwardsville Community Unit School District No. 7, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

RECOMMENDATION FOR AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR PHYSICAL SCIENCE BUILDING, CARBONDALE CAMPUS

Bids were received by the University Architect September 1, 1964, for the construction of the Physical Science Building, Building "C," Cores "B" and "C," by the Illinois Building Authority. Award of construction contracts therefor by the Illinois Building Authority is proposed in accordance with the following resolution, now recommended for adoption:

Resolution

Whereas, The 73rd General Assembly in Senate Bill 1177 declared it to be in the public interest for the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, to construct a Physical Science Building on the Carbondale Campus of Southern Illinois University, and

Whereas, Competitive bids for construction of Building "C" and Cores "B" and "C" of a Physical Science Building have been received in accordance with the Illinois

Purchasing Act and Southern Illinois University Rules and Regulations Governing Purchasing Practices and Procedures, and said bids have been carefully evaluated by the University Architect.

Now, Therefore, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, hereby *Resolves* that its recommendation for award of contracts by the Illinois Building Authority for construction of Building "C," Cores "B" and "C," Physical Science Building at Carbondale Campus, Southern Illinois University, is as follows:

Members of the Educational Committee present were Chairman John G. Gilbert, Carbondale; Vice Chairman Miles E. Mills, Effingham; Secretary Richard R. Larson, Galesburg; and member Clarence G. Hall, Catlin.

President Morris outlined the progress being made toward completion of Phase I of the Edwardsville Campus. He stated that because of continuing increases in construction costs at least \$6 to \$7 million would be needed to complete Phase I, in addition to the \$25 million appropriation made from State Bond Issue funds. Questions posed by members of the Educational Committee were answered by President Morris.

Chairman Wham and President Morris expressed the appreciation of the Board and the administration for the opportunity to meet with members of the Educational Committee and to discuss plans for the new campus at Edwardsville.

HE NOVEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board in Carbondale, Illinois, on Friday, November 13, 1964, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The Chairman presented minutes of a regular meeting held September 29, 1964, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved these minutes as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

DOCTORAL PROGRAM IN PHYSICAL AND MATHEMATICAL SCIENCES

We recommend approval of a Doctor of Philosophy program in Physical and Mathematical Sciences which, subject to approval by the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education, will enable us to make our contribution to the large supply of scientists needed in university teaching and research, in industry, and in government.

During the 1965-67 biennium the new Physical Science and Technology Buildings will become available for use and will provide physical facilities which will enable us to move beyond the master's degree level and to round out the doctoral program. The Department of Chemistry has carried on doctoral work for several years, but has been proceeding cautiously and accepting only a small number of candidates until more space and equipment become available to it. Our recent North Central Association consultants recommended emphasis on doctoral work in both pure and

applied physical and mathematical sciences at the earliest date possible. We therefore regard the development of advanced work in pure and applied physical and mathematical sciences as our highest priority in new instructional programs. Permission to plan in this area the full use of the new buildings, acquisition and installation of equipment, and assignment and recruitment of staff will allow us to proceed on a sound educational and fiscal basis.

Davis, the Board approved a program in Physical and Mathematical Sciences leading to the Doctor of Philosophy degree, subject to approval by the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education. DESIGNATION OF GENERAL OPERATING DEPOSITORIES FOR THE EDWARDS-VILLE CAMPUS

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University,

1. That the Bank of Edwardsville and the Edwardsville National Bank and Trust Company, Edwardsville, Illinois, be, and are hereby, designated as Depositories of the general operating funds of The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and that C. E. Peebles, the Director of Business Affairs, Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville Campus, be and hereby is, authorized to deposit in said Depositories funds of Southern Illinois University, and to endorse in the name of Southern Illinois University for that purpose, checks, drafts, notes and other like obligations.

2. That the Bank of Edwardsville and the Edwardsville National Bank and Trust Company, be, and are hereby, authorized to pay out funds on deposit from time to time to the credit of The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University upon checks drawn upon said Depositories and signed, either personally, by machine, or facsimile, in the name of Southern Illinois University by its Director of Business

Affairs, Edwardsville Campus, C. E. Peebles.

- 3. That the Scretary shall cause to be certified and filed with the Bank of Edwardsville and the Edwardsville National Bank and Trust Company facsimile specimens, mechanical specimens, and personal specimens of the signature of C. E. Peebles and the said Bank of Edwardsville and the Edwardsville National Bank and Trust Company shall be entitled to honor such checks, drafts, notes and other like obligations regardless of by whom the actual, mechanical, or facsimile or purported endorsement or signature of the said C. E. Peebles may have been affixed thereto if such endorsement or signature resembles the actual, mechanical, or facsimile specimens duly certified and caused to be filed with the Bank of Edwardsville and the Edwardsville National Bank and Trust Company by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.
- 4. That Melvin C. Lockard, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, shall cause to be filed, with the Bank of Edwardsville, and the Edwardsville National Bank and Trust Company, a certified copy of this resolution, under the seal of Southern Illinois University and the said Edwardsville Banks shall

be entitled as against Southern Illinois University to presume conclusively that the said C. E. Peebles continues to hold such office and be entitled to the powers authorized herein until otherwise notified in writing by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

5. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect and binding upon Southern Illinois University until it shall have been repealed and until written notice of such repeal shall have been delivered to said Edwardsville Banks.

INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE RULING ON TAX SHELTERED ANNUITY

For the protection of our employees it is considered advisable to apply for a letter ruling from the Internal Revenue Service as to whether the tax sheltered annuity program adopted by the Board of Trustees, effective July 1, 1964, meets the requirements of Sections 403a and 403b of the Internal Revenue Code. Pursuant thereto, it is recommended that we retain the law firm of Pope and Driemeyer of East St. Louis to compile and present this application. This is the same firm of tax lawyers which procured the Internal Revenue Service ruling on the exempt status of the University. The Internal Revenue Service requires that one of the members of the firm be given our Power of Attorney to execute the requisite documents, and for this purpose the following resolution is recommended for adoption by the Board:

Resolution

Be It *Resolved* By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled that Joseph R. Lowery of the law firm of Pope and Driemeyer, 322 First National Bank Building, East St. Louis, Illinois, be and is hereby appointed attorney for the Board to sign, execute, file and prosecute before the Internal Revenue Service, U.S. Treasury Department, the application of the Board of Trustees for a ruling whether the tax sheltered or tax-deferred annuity program of the Board meets the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code, and to perform all acts necessary to this end, the Board hereby ratifying and confirming all claims and other documents which said attorney has filed or executed or may file and execute in this matter.

And Be It Further *Resolved* That the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees are hereby authorized and directed to execute a written Power of Attorney in such form as may be necessary or desirable to accomplish the purposes of this resolution.

CONSIDERATION OF RENOVATION OF INTERIM EDWARDSVILLE SERVICE CENTER (WAGNER PLANT)

On October 3, 1963, the Board of Trustees authorized the purchase of the Wagner Electric property for \$75,000 and rehabilitation of \$25,000. The purchase is being made by Contract for Deed through the Southern Illinois University Foundation in five annual payments of \$15,000 each. The Wagner Electric Company paid to the Southern Illinois University Foundation \$7,500 on the acquisition date, representing proceeds from an insurance settlement for storm damages to the roofs of the buildings which occurred just prior to the purchase date.

The rehabilitation funds of \$32,500, representing Permanent Improvement funds of \$25,000 from the University's operating appropriations and \$7,500 from the insurance proceeds of the Foundation, have been committed for the following:

Proposed Phase II—Preservation of the Exterior of Buildings

The Interim Edwardsville Service Center has been unoccupied since 1957. The exterior masonry walls have collected water and have undergone serious deterioration both to the exterior and interior surfaces because of poor drainage. Except for the

repair or replacement of roofs, the renovation work in Phase I did not provide for the rehabilitation and preservation of the exterior of the buildings.

The Associate University Architect's Office estimates the costs for rehabilitating and preserving the exterior of the buildings would be as follows:

LIBRARY ADMINISTRATION AND TECHNICAL SERVICES—OFFICE AND WORK AREA

The Library at Edwardsville, encompassing administration, technical services, and public circulation services for the Edwardsville evening program, is currently operating at two locations. The administrative offices and work areas for ordering, cataloging, binding, etc., are housed inadequately in two frame residences and a garage located on Bluff Road on the Edwardsville site. The public circulation services for students and faculty members, including reading area and open stack facilities, and general storage for books which cannot be housed in the limited library space at the Alton and East St. Louis Centers, are located at the Edwardsville Service Center.

Included in the Movable Equipment Funds to be provided through the Illinois Building Authority is \$400,000 for the acquisition of books for the Lovejoy Memorial Library. In addition, funds available from General Revenue Funds for the purchase of books amount to \$140,000. Since for the remainder of this fiscal year the library staff will be actively involved in the acquisition and storage of these books, it is believed this responsibility can be more effectively carried out if the offices, work areas, and storage areas are provided at one location.

ACCOUNTING, AUDITING, AND DISBURSING-OFFICE SPACE

The external audit firm, Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Company, has suggested that a Disbursing Department comparable to the department established approximately two years ago on the Carbondale Campus would strengthen internal business operations control on the Edwardsville Campus.

The Disbursing Department would perform such functions as the following:

(1) pre-audit all vouchers, (2) sign all checks, (3) disburse all checks, (4) control the delivery of all payroll checks. These functions are presently being performed by personnel in the Purchasing and Auditing Departments.

If the suggestion of the external audit firm for establishing a Disbursing Department is followed, it should be housed separately from the Purchasing and Accounting Departments, but close enough to facilitate the transmittal of vouchers and checks to expedite disbursement and delivery of payments. Purchasing is presently located at the interim Edwardsville Service Center. The Accounting and Auditing Departments do not have sufficient space in the quarters they now occupy on the Edwardsville site. If space at the interim center were made available, it would improve the services of all four departments: Purchasing, Accounting, Auditing, and Disbursing.

MECHANICAL MAINTENANCE SPACE

The Edwardsville Campus has never had an adequate mechanical maintenance facility. Maintenance services for trucks, automobiles, tractors, and other Physical Plant equipment have been provided by local service agencies from Contractual Services funds. It is believed mechanical services can be more effectively and economically performed by the University.

STORAGE AREAS

Phase I and Phase II provide physical storage for Surplus Property, Textbook Rental, University Stores, New Building Movable Equipment, and Construction Contractors' materials. It is anticipated that portions of these areas may have to be committed to office purposes in the future, which would require additional renovation work

Proposed Phase IV—Use After Occupancy of New Buildings, Fall Term, 1965

The office space suggested for the library in the interim Edwardsville Service Center later after occupancy of the Lovejoy Memorial Library by them would be occupied by the Auxiliary and Service Enterprises Department currently housed on the Edwardsville site. The work and storage space of the Library would be occupied by Textbook Rental and University Stores, thus freeing their presently used areas of the service center for general storage purposes. These changes can be made without incurring additional costs.

It is recommended the Board of Trustees approve the proposed use of the Interim Edwardsville Service Center and authorize the additional rehabilitation work at this time in the amount of \$35,676, which represents a cost per square foot of \$1.68 computed as follows:

CONSIDERATION OF BIENNIAL BUDGET REQUESTS FOR OPERATIONS, 1965–1967

Copies of the "Biennial Budget for Operations—Analysis of Increases Requested" for the biennium beginning July 1, 1965, were presented by President Morris. At his request, Budget Officer Clifford R. Burger appeared before the Board and explained item by item the figures presented, pointing out specifically those amounts which were mandatory or fixed. The Board then considered the detailed budget requests for operations.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the biennial budget requests for operations, with authorization granted to President Morris to make adjustments agreed upon by the administration and the staff of the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONSIDERATION OF BIENNIAL BUDGET REQUESTS FOR CAPITAL APPROPRIATIONS

President Morris next presented copies of "Capital Appropriations Budgets—Carbondale Campus and Edwardsville Campus" and requested Vice-President Rendleman to explain the requests for capital funds.

Mr. Rendleman briefly explained the various items included for Carbon-dale Campus, based on Instruction Facilities, Research Facilities, Service Facilities, Related Services and Development as requested for 1965–66 and for 1966–67. For the Edwardsville Campus, he explained each item requesed for Completion of Phase I, Phase 2 of Stage I, and Stage II. The Board then considered the detailed budget requests for capital appropriations.

After discussion and consideration, the Board determined that additional information was desirable and necessary before approval could be given for the biennial budget requests submitted. No formal action was taken.

DESIGNATION OF AGENT FOR HIGHER EDUCATION FACILITIES ACT OF 1963

Copies of the following resolution were presented by President Morris, with a request for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Resolution

Whereas, The United States Congress has enacted the Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963 (Public Law 88-204) to provide grants for the construction of academic facilities for institutions of higher education; and

Whereas, Title I, Section 104 of Public Law 88-204 makes specific grants for the construction of academic facilities for institutions of higher education other than a public community college or a public technical institute; and

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University needs and can utilize such grants for the construction of educational facilities under Title I, Section 104 of Public Law 88-204; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University shall make application to the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, Office of Education, for and to secure said grants to aid in the construction of academic facilities under Title I, Section 104 of Public Law 88-204; and

Be It Further *Resolved* That the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, has legal authority, is willing and is in a position to accept and administer said grants in accordance with the requirements of said Act and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, and that Delyte W. Morris, President, be and he is hereby authorized, for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University

to do and perform any and all acts and things which may be necessary to carry out the foregoing resolution.

At the request of President Morris, Vice-President John S. Rendleman explained that under the provisions of Public Law 88-204 there is available \$11,000,000 in Illinois, of which \$2,000,000 is for two-year schools. He indicated that under the terms of the Law, the University must have funds available, or must have requested funds for a building before an application for forty per cent of the total cost of the building can be considered. He further indicated that a grant by the Federal Government would necessarily be contingent upon the allocation of State of Illinois funds.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

At the request of President Morris, Vice-President Rendleman briefly reviewed for the Board the status of the transfer of properties to the University from the Illinois Baptist State Association. He indicated that to date it had been impossible to obtain clear title to the building located at the corner of Grand Avenue and South Thompson Street, and that the administration was currently working for an escrow payment. The Board accepted the report for the records.

At the March 6, 1964, meeting of the Board of Trustees, the Board requested that University Architect Charles M. Pulley make a comparison of unit costs for construction on the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses. At that time the administration indicated that such comparison could be made at the time bids were received for the Science Building at Carbondale. A report was presented showing a comparison of total costs for the Carbondale Science Building and the Edwardsville Science Building. A copy of the report was placed on file in the office of the Board.

At the March 6, 1964, meeting of the Board of Trustees, a report was made concerning a claim made by the Air Force for the return of funds accumulated by the University as a result of providing cadet uniforms by commutation, rather than issue in kind. At that time the administration was authorized to leave the decision of ownership of such funds to a court of competent jurisdiction. At the request of President Morris, Vice-President Rendleman reported briefly that independent counsel had advised that to bring suit in this matter would be futile. He indicated that the money would not be refunded to the Air Force, but would be used to purchase various items of clothing for members of the Air Force-ROTC unit.

President Morris reported to the Board that the Mayor of Carbondale had again requested that the University and the Board of Trustees consider annexation of the Carbondale Campus to the City of Carbondale. It was

the consensus of the members of the Board that the administration should set out all the conditions which might affect the problem of annexation and present such report to the Board for consideration at a subsequent meeting.

President Morris reported briefly on the termination of negotiations with the City of Edwardsville for the purchase of water for the Edwardsville Campus, and the University's plans for construction of a water treatment plant. He indicated that engineering consultants had estimated that to supply and operate water treatment facilities would be much more economical than to purchase water from the City of Edwardsville. No action was taken on the report.

President Morris explained that a mid-year salary increase program, effective with the January payroll, was being considered. He asked if any member of the Board had objections to such a plan, which he indicated was dependent upon (a) final winter term enrollments, (b) the condition of the budget at that time, and (c) agreement by the staff of the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education. It was the consensus of the members of the Board that such a program should be considered, but no formal action was taken.

President Morris reported briefly his attendance at a meeting of the Association of Land-Grant Colleges, at which legislation to provide funds for research in forestry, water resources, and other programs was discussed. He indicated that he felt it might be wise to attempt to attain land-grant status for Southern Illinois University in the next legislative ssesion. Vice-President Rendleman was requested to look into the matter and report to the Board at a subsequent meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 3 P.M.

December, 1964

HE DECEMBER MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board in Carbondale, Illinois, on Saturday, December 12, 1964, beginning at 2 P.M.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING APPLICATION FOR CONSTRUCTION OF TELE-VISION STATION AT OLNEY, ILLINOIS

The Board at its July 1, 1964, meeting authorized application to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for matching funds to assist in the construction of another television transmitter at Olney, Illinois. The administration is also preparing an application to the Federal Communications Commission for a license to construct such a station. The authorization of the Board is necessary for the execution of this application, and the following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that application be made to the Federal Communications Commission of the United States Government for a license to construct an ultra high frequency television transmitting facility to be located at or near Olney, Illinois, and that the President of the University is hereby authorized and directed to execute such application in the name of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University and to do and perform and cause to be done and performed all other acts and to

execute or cause to be executed any and all other documents necessary or desirable in the prosecution of such application before the Federal Communications Commission.

LEASE OF SITES TO FOREST SERVICE

Research in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service has been a continuing activity on the Carbondale Campus for the past twelve years. Presently eight offices and a classroom in the Agriculture Building are allocated to the Forest Service for this purpose. In order to free this space and expand the cooperative research program the Forest Service will construct and develop research facilities including a laboratory-office building on campus and a greenhouse-headhouse, water impoundment area and outplanting area on the University Farms if we will provide the land. APPROVAL FOR USE OF PLANNING FUNDS

S.B. 1177 allocated \$500,000 to Southern Illinois University through the Illinois Building Authority for Plans and Planning, Architectural and Engineering Studies. \$100,000 of this fund has been used for the plans and specifications for bidding the Physical Science Building for the Carbondale Campus. We recommend that the remaining \$400,000 be expended for the purchase of plans and specifications for bidding which is 75% of the architects' fee and that the remaining 25% for supervision be paid from the allocation of money for construction. EXCHANGE OF LAND WITH GIANT CITY STATE PARK

In order to straighten and align the common boundary of the Little Grassy Campus with Giant City State Park the 73rd General Assembly passed enabling legislation in Senate Bill 1183. This bill provided that within thirty days after the Board of Trustees conveys certain portions of its Little Grassy Campus which jut into the Park land to the Department of Conservation, State officials are authorized to convey to the Board certain portions of Giant City Park which jut into the Little Grassy Campus. This will align the south and southeast boundaries. Legislation will be sought in the next General Assembly to enable similar adjustment of the west and northwest boundaries where land acquisition was incomplete during the last legislative session.

Whereas, It is desirable to straighten and align the common boundary of the Little Grassy Campus with Giant City State Park.

And Whereas, Enabling legislation authorizing the state to enter into a land exchange for this purpose has been enacted by the said 73rd General Assembly in Senate Bill 1183, and said Bill has been signed and approved by the Governor of the State of Illinois.

Now, Therefore, Be It *Resolved* By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the land belonging to the Board of Trustees described in Senate Bill 1183 of the 73rd General Assembly is hereby authorized and approved for conveyance to the State of Illinois for the use of the Department of Conservation thereof, in return for conveyance by the State of Illinois to the Board of Trustees of portions of Giant City State Park described in the said Senate Bill 1183 of the 73rd General Assembly.

AMENDMENT OF AIRPORT OPERATOR'S LEASE AND RENTAL OF AIRPOR CLASSROOM FACILITY

The Board is already aware of the aircraft mechanics classroom facilir planned for the Southern Illinois Airport. The Airport Authority sold revenue born for the financing of this project on November 30, 1964, and is ready to award contracts for construction, the bids on which are already in hand. It is appropriate this time to formalize the agreement of the Board to rent the facility from the Airpo

Authority on a biennial basis for such time and for such rental as required to retire the revenue bonds. This is proposed as an amendment to the Fixed Base Operator's Lease already held by the Board on the airport. This lease was originally written between the Airport Authority and private corporate operators and assigned to the Board. The amendment therefore includes a redrafting of other provisions of the operator's lease to fit present circumstances, with no material change except that the new basic term will be for ten years from the present or until retirement of the revenue bonds, whichever is later, instead of a basic term of ten years from March 31, 1958. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption by the Board at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the amendment of the agreement with the Southern Illinois Airport Authority with reference to a fixed base operation at Southern Illinois Airport to provide for lease of a classroom facility to be erected thereat by the Authority by the addition of the following new section to the said agreement be and is hereby approved by the Board:

(20) The Owner agrees to construct a classroom facility at the said airportin accordance with plans and specifications furnished by the Board, construction to begin as soon as may be after the execution of this Agreement. Said classroom facility shall be constructed on a site described as follows:

General Description: Situated in the Southwest Quarter of the Southeast Quarter of Section 31, Township 8 South, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian, Jackson County, Illinois.

Detail Description: Beginning at the Southwest corner of the Southeast Quarter of Section 31, aforesaid, thence East along the Section line, a distance of 890.76 feet to a point situated 225.50 feet West of the intersection of the said Section line and the center line of the entrance road to Southern Illinois Airport; thence Northwesterly, with a deflection angle of 120° 31′, a distance of 448.13 feet to the point of beginning for this description; thence Northeasterly, with a deflection angle of 90° 00′, a distance of 400.0 feet to a point; thence Northwesterly, with a deflection angle of 90° 00′, a distance of 400.0 feet to a point; thence Southwesterly, with a deflection angle of 90° 00′, a distance of 400.0 feet to a point; thence Southeasterly, with a deflection angle of 90° 00′, a distance of 180.0 feet to the point of beginning.

It is agreed that all financing, legal, and construction costs therefor will be met by the sale of Owner's revenue bonds. The Owner further agrees that said classroom facility shall become an additional property leased to the Board as of the date the Bond Resolution requires the first deposit of revenue in any account established by said Resolution, and the Board agrees to lease said classroom facility as of that date for a term expiring on June 30 of the next odd numbered year, subject to renewal as hereinafter provided. This lease of additional property is agreed to be subject to all terms of the Fixed Base Operator's lease into which it is hereby inserted except those in conflict with this paragraph. The Board shall be responsible for the maintenance, upkeep, repair and adequate property insurance of the premises during its period of tenancy thereof, and further shall pay all charges for utilities including without limiting the generality thereof the cost of gas, water, electricity, etc. The first installment of rental attributable to said classroom facility shall be due on that date provided twenty (20) days prior notice has been theretofore given to the Board

by the Owner, and shall be in the amount required for debt service from that date to the next June 30. Future rentals for said facility for remaining years of that term or during any extension hereof shall be paid annually on a fiscal year basis by July 31 of the applicable fiscal year, and shall be in the amount required for debt service for that fiscal year. Such rental shall continue on the same basis throughout each extension of this Agreement which may be made until retirement of the said revenue bonds and no longer, and the Owner agrees to retire said revenue bonds as soon as may be and to devote all of said rental together with interest during construction and any interest derived from investment of revenue to such purpose. Subject to availability of appropriations the Board hereby declares its intention to continue this Agreement in force until retirement of revenue bonds issued for construction of the new classroom facility pursuant hereto. This lease of additional property may be renewed by the Board for further terms of two years each or until retirement of the said revenue bonds, whichever occurs sooner, by written notice to the Owner not less than thirty (30) days after the expiration of the initial term hereof or the term of any future renewals thereof; such renewal shall be under the same terms and for the same rental expressed above.

The said classroom facility shall be erected on the northeast 240 feet of the described site and the Board is hereby granted the right to erect temporary appurtenant buildings and to install necessary footings, foundations and bases therfor on the remainder of the described tract.

And Be It Further *Resolved* That the further incidental amendment of the said agreement to conform to this addition and to extend the term thereof and to conform to present circumstances and practices, as approved by the University administration, be and is hereby approved by the Board.

And Be It Further Resolved That the President of the University is hereby authorized and directed to execute in the name of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University an amended agreement with reference to a fixed lease operation at Southern Illinois Airport substantially as hereby approved by the Board, provided that the facility does not exceed the cost of \$325,000 and that the annual rental to the Board does not exceed \$25,000.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board adopted the resolution, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

WALL STREET WIDENING

Approximately four years ago negotiations were commenced for the improvement of Wall Street on the eastern boundary of the Carbondale Campus. These negotiations were concluded with the University and the Highway Department agreeing to share certain costs for this project. The matter was presented to the Board in an informal session at that time.

Subsequent thereto, at the April 27, 1962 meeting of the Board of Trustees, the matter was again discussed in connection with the dedication of the right-of-way by the Board to the Township. Work has progressed since that time cooperatively between the University, the Township Road District, the City of Carbondale, and the State Highway Department. A new bridge was constructed by the City and the Township at the intersection of Park and Wall Streets. The State Highway Department has now completed plans for the further improvement of Wall Street south of this bridge to the southern edge of University property.

In connection therewith, a letter has been sent to the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, as follows:

DEAR MR. WHAM:

In March of 1960, officials of Southern Illinois University met with the Chief Highway Engineer to discuss the improvement of South Wall Street in Carbondale. Subsequent to this meeting, the District Engineer in Carbondale was authorized to make the necessary survey, compile an estimate of cost of the project, and meet with the University officials to work out further details.

Several conferences to discuss the subject have been held between personnel of the Division of Highways District office and Mr. John Lonergan and Mr. Kenneth Miller of Southern Illinois University, as well as representatives of Jackson County, Carbondale Township, the City of Carbondale, and the Carbondale Planning Commission.

Reference is made in particular to a meeting held June 5, 1964, attended by Mr. Lonergan, District Engineer Vernon T. Kupel, and District Design Engineer Richard D. Miley. At this meeting the entire project and the division of responsibility was reviewed.

It is my understanding from this meeting that the scope of the work and the division of responsibility on this improvement are as follows:

The State of Illinois, acting through its Department of Public Works and Buildings, Division of Highways, and Southern Illinois University, proposes to jointly improve an extension of Wall Street (Township Road 344) from the intersection of East Park Street (Township Road 297A), thence in a southerly direction for a distance of approximately 5716 feet to the intersection of the Pleasant Hill Road (Township Road 311), said improvement to consist of:

- 1. Construction of a new roadbed with a shoulder to shoulder width of 36 feet for two (2) ten-foot traffic lanes and two (2) eight-foot shoulders. The traffic lanes will consist of a gravel or crushed stone base with a bituminous surface, Class A-3.
- 2. Construction of the necessary drainage structures.
- 3. Construction of curb or curb and gutter at specific places shown on the plans.
- 4. Other incidental work such as adjustment of manholes, water lines, power and telephone lines which are within the construction limits.

The State of Illinois, acting through its Department of Public Works and Buildings, Division of Highways, is willing to participate in the improvement under the authority granted in Section 4-201.5 of the Illinois Highway Code to the following extent:

- 1. Make the necessary surveys, prepare the plans and specifications, and prepare right of way instruments for dedication in the name of Carbondale Township.
- 2. Receive bids and award the contract or contracts, furnish engineering inspection during construction, and cause the improvement to be built in accordance with the plans, specifications, and contract or contracts.
- 3. Include water line adjustments in the plans and contract or contracts.
- 4. Initially pay all construction costs.
- 5. Bear two-thirds of the final cost of construction other than the cost of utility adjustments. This amount is presently estimated at \$80,000.00.

Southern Illinois University will participate in the improvement to the following extent:

- 1. Make all arrangements and assume all costs for moving pole lines and gas pipe lines that may interfere with construction; and
- 2. Acquire all right of way or cause said right of way to be acquired.
- 3. Execute an agreement with the Carbondale Road District Highway Commissioner providing for future maintenance of the improvement, either by the Road District or by Southern Illinois University, and obtaining the right for the STATE and its contractor or contractors to enter upon the location and construct the improvement as set forth in the plans.
- 4. Reimburse the STATE 100% of the costs for adjusting water lines.
- 5. Reimburse the STATE one-third of the final construction costs other than the costs involved in the adjusting of water lines. This amount is presently estimated at \$40,000.00.

Under date of August 20, 1964, a requisition in the amount of \$60,000 was submitted to and approved by the Executive Committee. This covers the cost of right-of-way acquisition necessary for the widening of the road, the moving of certain utility lines, and the obligation contained in the letter of Mr. Lorenz.

Ratification and approval of the action of the Executive Committee is requested.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved and ratified the action of the Executive Committee in approving the requisition mentioned above. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

WAIVER OF TUITION

During the Summer Quarter, 1965, the National Science Foundation will sponsor students in an undergraduate research participation program. As part of this program, students may register for credit in an independent study or undergraduate research course. Since the cost of program allowance covers the full cost for such students, they personally are not allowed to pay for the fees for such courses. In accordance with previous Board action, it is recommended that tuition for all participants for that portion of enrollment representing participation in this sponsored program be waived during the Summer Session, 1965.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the waiving of tuition, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPROVAL FOR MID-YEAR SALARY ADJUSTMENTS

The rapid increase in the number of students attending institutions of higher education has produced an unprecedented demand for faculty. The recruitment efforts of Southern Illinois University are being replicated throughout the nation. It is recommended, therefore, that as recognition for excellence of service and as a defensive move against the most mobile element of the faculty being "raided," approximately 15% of the faculty in the rank of Assistant Professor and 3% of the aculty in the rank of Associate Professor be given mid-year adjustments in the range of \$25-\$50 per month, effective January 1, 1965. The total number involved will approximate 53, and the total commitment for fiscal 1964-65 will be \$12,500.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, The Board approved mid-year salary adjustments, effective January 1, 1965. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; 1ay, none.

It is requested that, commencing with the Fall Term, 1965, the Board fix and collect an additional \$15.00 a term fee to be held in trust for a Student Welfare and Recreational Facility Building Trust Fund. This fee would permit the future contruction of certain facilities for which it is difficult to obtain state appropriations. Such projects as a student health service facility, an intramural and non-educational physical recreation facility, swimming pools, golf courses, and other similar type acilities could be provided.

Several state colleges and universities have levied such a fee and have found it a nost fruitful source of revenue for these various types of projects. Although it is lesirable to keep tuition as low as possible so that no financial barrier is erected gainst educational opportunity, nevertheless as the student body grows larger, and

with the ban on automobiles, it becomes incumbent upon the University to arrange avenues for recreation for the student body. Any specific building or project would be brought to the Board for approval, with a suggested financing arrangement, before it was commenced.

Approval of this request would simply provide a fee which can be deposited and maintained for the purpose of future implementation. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Whereas, Subsection 5 of Section 8 of the Statutory Charter of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University prescribes a power and duty in the Board of Trustees to fix and collect fees for student recreational facilities and further prescribes the power and duty of the Board to fix and collect student welfare fees, and

Whereas, Student welfare and recreational facilities are badly needed at the Carbondale campus of the University principally because the size of enrollment on that campus is disproportionate to the public recreational facilities of the immediate area.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled that effective the beginning of the Fall Quarter of 1965 there shall be and hereby is fixed an additional fee to be collected at the rate of \$15.00 per academic quarter from each full-time student as so defined for fee purposes in the Board action of May 22, 1959, which fee shall be covered over and paid in its entirety on each campus, respectively, into funds hereby created to be known as the Student Welfare and Recreational Facility Building Trust Fund for the Edwardsville campus and for the Carbondale campus, and held therein for the purpose of future construction of physical facilities for student recreation or student welfare in accordance with the future authorization and direction of this Board of Trustees.

Whereas, although Tract 77 has been acquired pursuant thereto, it has been found that the Illinois Baptist State Association cannot convey clear title to Tract 51-A, as required by the terms of the contract for purchase of the aforesaid tracts heretofore entered into between this Board of Trustees and the Illinois Baptist State Association,

Now, Therefore, Be It *Resolved* By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that it is hereby formally determined that it is necessary and desirable that the Board of Trustees acquire the use and possession of the following described real property, which real property is required and needed for the expansion of the Carbondale Campus of Southern Illinois University and for the educational purposes of that campus, to wit:

Tract 51-A: Commencing at the Southeast corner of the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 21, Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the 3rd Principal Meridian, and running thence West 25 feet, thence North 25 feet, thence continuing North 6.88 chains, thence West 250 feet, thence South 110 feet, thence East 250 feet, thence North 110 feet to the place of beginning, said premises being located within the corporate limits of the City of Carbondale, Illinois.

And Be It Further Resolved, That the University administration be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed to negotiate with the owner or owners thereof for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees for the purchase thereof by the Board of Trustees or the Illinois Building Authority on behalf of the Board of Trustees at a net cost not to substantially exceed the contract price heretofore agreed upon between the Board of Trustees and the Illinois Baptist State Association, by means of contracting for conveyance of any rights held by other than the Illinois Baptist State Association at a price to be deducted from said contract price, and that in the event such negotiations fail the University administration is further authorized, empowered and directed to institute proceedings in the law courts to acquire title to and possession of the said property for the Board of Trustees, or to request that the Illinois Building Authority institute such proceedings to acquire title to the said property for the use and possession of the Board of Trustees pursuant to the statutes

in such case made and provided, all in accordance with the eminent domain laws of the State of Illinois.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board adopted the Resolution submitted by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

January, 1965

THE JANUARY MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the office of the Board in Carbondale, Illinois, on Friday, January 29, 1965, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

Lockard to serve on the Board of Directors, Southern Illinois University Foundation, with term expiring in June, 1968; and to re-elect Robert L. Gallegly, Business Manager, to serve as Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. Mr. Harold R. Fischer was designated as the Board's

representative to meetings of the Merit Board, University Civil Service System, during the current absence of Dr. Martin Van Brown.

By common consent, the Board named Kenneth L. Davis as its representative to the National Conference on Higher Education, to be held in Chicago, Illinois, March 7 through March 10, 1965.

PROPOSED PARTIAL USE OF BUILDING FEE

At the December 12 meeting of the Board of Trustees, action was taken for the assessment of a student building fee as a part of tuition requirements of the University. At the time the matter was brought to the attention of the Board with the recommendation that the fee be assessed, it was indicated that specific buildings or projects to be constructed from this fund would be individually recommended to the Board. The administration is now ready to make the first such recommendation.

It is recommended that the Board authorize the administration to complete the construction and financing of the University Center ballroom-auditorium on the Edwardsville Campus. It is estimated that the cost of this project will be \$540,000.

The shell of the ballroom-auditorium is being built during the present phase of the University Center construction. The project here requested would be the completion of the interior and its furnishing.

The reasons for the recommendation of the completion of this facility are as follows:

1. At present there is no facility provided in the first phase of construction which can serve as an auditorium for any large group of students. The only other facility is a 200-seat auditorium in the library. This ballroom-auditorium will seat 1,500 when completed.

- 2. There is not a facility of quality in which the cultural, educational, and social needs of the area can be served in the immediate Madison-St. Clair County area.
- 3. Major social events which have been held involving large groups of students have of necessity been held in St. Louis.
- 4. This facility will permit an annual estimated food service revenue of from \$75,000 to \$100,000.

Approval of this project is recommended from the student building fee fund as funds become available.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board approved the requested use of funds. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

APPLICATIONS AND INTERPRETATIONS OF BASIC PROMOTION POLICY

At the March 21, 1952, meeting of the Board of Trustees, regulations of the Board containing applications of the basic promotion policy in the University Statutes enacted May 25, 1951, were approved.

In accordance with the policy of the current Statutes, it is requested that the following portion of the regulations, which appear on page 70 of the Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for the year ending June 30, 1952, be rescinded and that the working out of procedures of application of promotion policy be remanded to the internal operating organization of the University:

C. Current Administrative Applications and Interpretations of Basic Policy for Promotion

1. The Evaluation Sheet should start at the level of the chairman or office head, go from there to the dean of the college concerned, thence to the conference of academic deans, and finally to the President's Office. If changes in the recommendations made take place at any administrative level, the proposed changes should be discussed with the administrators concerned at the lower levels.

2. The Evaluation Sheet should provide for the rating of a staff member as excellent, good, fair, poor, or very poor, with respect to each criterion applicable to his

particular work or assignment.

3. The Evaluation Sheet shall also contain a quantitative rating of the faculty members of a given department or office of the University by its chairman or head based on a percentage distribution in which 100 per cent would be the total for the department or division concerned.

4. The evaluation procedure outlined is a method of applying and interpreting the above Statutes and Regulations for the current year according to faculty desires. Since evaluation is an extremely difficult matter, and since both the faculty and the administration desire to continue their study and observation of evaluation procedures, this method should be regarded as a stage in the continuing long term development of evaluation techniques.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board rescinded points 1 through 4 of the quoted regulations and remanded to the internal operating organization the formulation of procedures to implement the basic promotion policy. TRANSFER OF PHYSICAL SCIENCE BUILDING SITE TO ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

In order for the Illinois Building Authority to proceed with construction of the Physical Science Building at Carbondale it is necessary for the University to transfer jurisdiction over the site to the Authority. The following resolution is therefore recommended for adoption at this time:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the transfer of jurisdiction of the below-described site for the Physical Science Building at the Carbondale Campus to the Illinois Building Authority, a body corporate and politic of the State of Illinois, be and is hereby approved:

General Description: Situated in and a part of the East One-Half of the Northwest Quarter and the West One-Half of the Northeast Quarter of Section 28, Township 9 South, Range 1 West of the Third Principal Meridian, Jackson County, Illinois.

Detail Decsription: (Omitted in the interest of economy; such description is on file in the office of the Board).

And Be It Further *Resolved*, That the Chairman and Secretary of this Board be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute in the name of the Board a formal document of transfer of jurisdiction and any and all other documents needful or desirable to effectuate the said transfer.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

AMENDMENT TO LEASE WITH TRUSTEE OF ASSETS AND PROPERTY OF SHURTLEFF COLLEGE

The following resolution is recommended to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for adoption:

Resolution

Whereas, The Trustees of Shurtleff College of Alton, Illinois, Entered into a Lease Agreement with The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University on June 13, 1957, by which The Trustees of Shurtleff College leased to The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University the real estate in Alton, Illinois, comprising the former Shurtleff College Campus, for a term of two years with the right to renew for additional two year terms and with the option to purchase the leased property at the purchase price provided in said Lease Agreement, and

Whereas, by Amended Decree of the Circuit Court of Madison County, Illinois, entered November 16, 1962 (as amended by orders entered December 28, 1962, and November 6, 1963) in a certain cause captioned "The Trustees of Shurtleff College, Petitioners v. Illinois State Convention, et. al. Respondents, Chancery No. 61-C-539," First National Bank & Trust Company in Alton was appointed Trustee of the Assets and Property of Shurtleff College and pursuant to said Amended Decree The Trustees of Shurtleff College of Alton, Illinois, conveyed the leased real estate to said First National Bank & Trust Company in Alton, As Trustee of the Assets and Property of Shurtleff College, which conveyance was made by Deed dated March 29, 1964, and recorded in the Recorder's Office of Madison County, Illinois, in Book 2297, Page 475, and

Whereas, said Lease Agreement dated June 13, 1957 does not describe the leased real estate other than by reference to a map of the property shown on a certain appraisal report by Roy Wenzlick & Company and said Lease Agreement does not provide for the furnishing of title insurance or other evidence of title in event of exercise by Lessee of its option to purchase the leased premises, and

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University have renewed said Lease Agreement at the end of each successive two year term thereof and said Lease Agreement is in full force and effect on the date hereof, and

Whereas, First National Bank & Trust Company in Alton, as Trustee of the Assets and Property of Shurtleff College, and as the owner of the legal title to the leased real estate, has been authorized by the Circuit Court of Madison County, Illinois, to amend the Lease Agreement as therein provided and set forth, and

WHEREAS, First National Bank & Trust Company in Alton has submitted the said lease amendment to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for execution, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, having duly examined the aforesaid lease amendment and being fully advised in the premises,

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois Univer sity in regular session assembled this 29th day of January, 1965, that the lease amendment, duly signed and submitted to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for execution, by First National Bank & Trust Company in Alton, Trustee of the assests and property of Shurtleff College, be and the same is hereby approved, and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized and empowered to execute the same; And Be It Further Resolved that Southern Illinois University Administration is hereby authorized and empowered to pay one-half the cost of title insurance on the real property described in the said lease amended in the sum of \$585.38, and in the event the option to purchase the real property described in said lease is exercised by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, to pay one-half the cost of transferring the title insurance on the said real property from the First National Bank and Trust Company in Alton, Trustee of the assets and property of Shurtleff College, to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, all as provided under the terms of the amended lease agreement.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Harold R. Fischer, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard: nay, none.

ACQUISITION OF LAND BY ILLINOIS BUILDING AUTHORITY

The following resolution is recommended to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University for adoption:

Resolution

Whereas, It has heretofore been deemed necessary and desirable by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to acquire certain tracts of land for the establishment, development, and future expansion of the Edwardsville Campus site of Southern Illinois University, according to the Master Plan therefor, and

Whereas, Tract 5, more particularly described hereinafter, has been acquired by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, subject to the right of appeal by Respondents, under condemnation proceedings commenced by the said Board of Trustees in the Circuit Court of Madison County, Illinois, in a Petition to Condemn identified as Case No. 63-L-135, and that by virtue of said condemnation proceedings the sum of Twenty-one Thousand Dollars (\$21,000.00) was awarded by the jury in the proceedings as just compensation to the owners of said Tract 5 for the taking thereof, and

Whereas, Tracts 35, 54, 55, 56, 57, 57a, 61, 63, and 71, more particularly described hereafter, have been condemned by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University under the Right of Eminent Domain in petitions to condemn filed in the Circuit Court of Madison County, Third Judicial Circuit, Edwardsville, Illinois, identified as Case Nos. 64-G-2 and 63-L-135 respectively, which cases are now pending, and

Whereas, It is now deemed desirable by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, that the Illinois Building Authority, upon proper motion filed with the Court, join with the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in the aforesaid condemnation proceedings as a co-plaintiff, as provided under Chapter 127, Sec. 213, et seq. of the 1963 Illinois Revised Statutes, and that upon a determination in the

proceedings fixing the amount of the award to be paid to the owners of the land so taken by condemnation, that the Illinois Building Authority pay the amount of the award, and take legal title to the land so taken under judgement, order and decree of the Court, or by Warranty Deed in the event parties to the action should so stipulate, and that thereafter the Illinois Building Authority lease the tracts of land so taken by condemnation to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University that it request the Illinois Building Authority to purchase Tract 5 hereinafter described, and to pay the amount of the jury award therein in the sum of Twenty-one Thousand Dollars (\$21,000.00), as compensation to the owners therefor, and Be It Further Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University request the Illinois Building Authority to authorize and empower the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University to join the Illinois Building Authority as co-plaintiff with the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in the condemnation of tracts 35, 54, and 56 in the Amended Petition to Condemn, identified as Case No. 63-L-135 in the Circuit Court Third Judicial Circuit of Madison County, Illinois, and of Tracts 55, 57, 57a, 61, 63, and 71, in the Amended Petition to Condemn identified as Case no. 64-G-2, and that upon determination of the amount of the award to be paid by the Petitioners to the owners of the said tracts for the taking thereof, that the Illinois Building Authority pay the amount of the award and take legal title to the lands so taken, either by judgment order and decree of the Court or by Warranty Deed in the event a stipulation agreement approved by the Court is made and entered into between the Parties in the aforesaid Petition to Condemn; and Be It Further Resolved that upon the vesting of legal title to the tracts of land hereinafter described in the Illinois Building Authority, that the Illinois Building Authority lease the said tracts to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

(Note: Detailed descriptions of land in Tract 5, Tract 35, Tract 54, Tract 56, Tract 55, Tract 57a, Tract 61, Tract 63, Tract 71, and Tract 57 are omitted in the interest of economy; such descriptions are on file in the office of the Board).

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board adopted the resolution presented. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REPORTS ON CURRENT AND PENDING MATTERS

President Morris indicated that new legislation had been enacted which makes major changes in the Air Force ROTC Program. He further indicated that several decisions should be made concerning the program and requested authorization from the Board to proceed with negotiations with the Air Force. The Board authorized the administration to continue negotiations with the Air Force, with the understanding that a final decision should be made by conference telephone call or postponed until the next meeting of the Board of Trustees.

President Morris reviewed for the members of the Board recent communications from the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education and their recommendations concerning the University's operating and capital budget

requests. He indicated that the Board of Higher Education is holding strictly to the concept that it was set up to develop a Master Plan for universities within the state, and to develop the means by which existing needs for facilities will be met. He further indicated that the formulae developed for the allocation of funds is being adhered to by the Board of Higher Education, with no recognition of differences among the six state-supported institutions. A general discussion followed, but no formal action was requested.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the

Board unanimously adopted the following resolution:

Resolved That the administration be authorized to enlarge the present Committee for Study of Needs for Medical Education and to have undertaken for the Board a supplemental study of medical and related needs in Illinois, with especial emphasis on downstate Illinois.

The meeting was adjourned at 12 noon.

March, 1965

THE MARCH MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held in the President's Staff Office on the Edwardsville Campus on Wednesday, March 17, 1965, beginning at 9:30 A.M.

The Chairman presented minutes of a regular meeting held January 29, 1965, copies of which had been forwarded to all members of the Board in advance of this meeting. On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, these minutes were approved as presented.

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

MODIFICATION OF ADMISSIONS POLICY

At the December 12, 1959, meeting of the Board of Trustees, an admissions policy designed to defer the enrollment of low-ranking high school graduates in Southern Illinois University was proposed and approved. This policy was modified by actions taken by the Board of Trustees on December 10. 1960, and April 24, 1964.

Our Faculty Council and University Council now recommend another modification of admissions standards for undergraduate students without previous college experience and for undergraduate transfer students. We therefore request approval of the following admissions policy, effective the Fall Quarter of 1965:

To be eligible for admission, a person must be either a graduate of a recognized high school (graduates of non-recognized high schools may be admitted by the Director of Admissions by examination), or must have passed the General Educational Development Test. A person seeking admission through the latter procedure will be considered only after his high school class would have graduated.

In-state high school graduates who rank in the upper two-thirds of their graduating class will be permitted to enter any quarter, while those who rank in the lower one-third of their graduating class will be permitted to enter, on academic probation, for the summer, winter, or spring quarters only. Exceptions to this rule may be made for lower one-third students who desire to enter in the fall who show high scores on the University entrance examinations. Such admissions will be on an academic probation basis.

Out-of-state high school graduates who rank in the upper forty per cent of their graduating class will be permitted to enter any quarter, while those in the lower sixty per cent of their graduating class will be permitted to enter, on academic probation, during the summer quarter provided that they show high scores on the University entrance examinations.

Both in-state and out-of-state lower-ranking students who elect to enter during the summer quarter can qualify for fall quarter attendance by carrying a minimum academic load of eight quarter hours and completing them with at least a "C" average.

Students who rank in the upper quarter of their graduating class will be considered for admission after completion of the sixth semester. Other students will be considered after completion of the seventh semester. Upper quarter students who seek admission after the sixth semester must furnish University entrance examination scores prior to their first registration. All other students must furnish examination scores prior to their being admitted to the University.

All admissions granted students while in high school are subject to the completion of high school work and maintenance of rank upon which the admission was made.

Students applying as undergraduate transfer students with a 3.00 grade point average are eligible for unconditional admission in any quarter. Students who do not have a 3.00 grade point average and who are in good academic standing at the school of last attendance will be considered for admission for summer, winter, and spring. Students who do not have a 3.00 grade point average and who are not in good academic standing at the school of last attendance will be considered for admission for summer or spring provided there has been an interruption of schooling of at least one quarter's duration and there is tangible evidence to indicate that additional education can be successfully undertaken by the student.

Transfer students suspended for any reason other than academic failure must be cleared by the Dean of Students' Office before admission will be granted by the Director of Admissions.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved modification of the admissions policy, as recommended.

SIMPLIFICATION OF BACCALAUREATE DEGREE TITLES

In the revised By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees, adopted July 1, 1964, the specific degrees designated in the earlier Statutes have been omitted, with the result that there is only a general authorization for doctor's, master's, bachelor's, associate, and such other degrees as may be deemed appropriate by the Board of Trustees (Part III, Article IV, Section 11, D, 1).

As a result, consideration has been given to the possibility of simplifying degree titles at the baccalaureate level, and the Faculty Council and the University Council have concurred in a proposal to grant only the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees without the separate designation "in (such and such a field)". It

is requested that this reduction in the number of baccalaureate degree titles be approved.

On motion of Ray Page, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved a reduction in the number of baccalaureate degree titles, as recommended. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

INFORMATION REPORT ON ACTIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

It is requested that the Board of Trustees consider and ratify the actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during January, 1965, for the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses. Detailed reports of such actions were mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees in advance of this meeting, and copies were placed on file in the office of the Board.

Actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to less than \$2,500, in the total amount of \$256,391.94 for Carbondale Campus and \$94,205.09 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during January, 1965, were considered. Also considered were actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to over \$2,500, in the total amount of \$785,931.19 for Carbondale Campus and \$175,220.15 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during the same period.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved and ratified actions of the Executive Committee, as shown in the detailed reports considered. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

PROPOSED PARTIAL ANNEXATION TO THE CITY OF CARBONDALE

At the November 13, 1964, meeting of the Board of Trustees a discussion was held regarding the possible annexation of portions of the campus to the City of Carbondale. Since that time, at the Board's direction, we have prepared what appear to us to be statements representing both arguments in favor and arguments opposed to the proposed annexation.

The positive features of annexation are:

1. Annexation would augment the City's tax base by providing additional motor fuel taxes. The Bureau of the Census conducted a special census for the City in November, 1964, which indicated a growth of about 3,900 persons since 1960. The State's motor fuel tax allotment to the City will increase by about \$23,400 per year as a result. If the Campus were annexed to the City, a potential increase in motor fuel tax allotment of about \$30,300 would be possible after University Park dormitories are completed and occupied, considering also the occupants of Thompson Point, Small Group Housing, and Southern Hills. The City has indicated that it would request another special census after annexation and completion of University Park in order to qualify for the additional tax allotment.

The need for strengthening the City's tax base is an acute one. The rapid growth of the City because of University expansion has thrown heavy burdens on City facilities and services which are not adequately supported by present general revenues. Property taxes are already very high and will rise significantly this year as the result of the passage of bond issues for schools, streets, and parks. Services such as water and sanitary sewer, street construction and maintenance, storm sewers, garbage collection and disposal, and the administration of building codes, zoning ordinances, and subdivision regulations are very important to both faculty and students, as well as the University administration. These services cannot be adequately maintained and upgraded by the City without additional revenue.

- 2. Annexation would improve the likelihood that the City's urban renewal projects within the campus boundaries would be expedited by the Federal government. These projects will enable the University to acquire presently developed land more cheaply and, ultimately, urban renewal funds may constitute the major source of financial assistance for relocating the railroad. The Federal Urban Renewal Administration would regard a move to annexation as a clear sign of a close and harmonious working relationship between the City and the University.
- 3. Annexation would aid the University's housing program for married students. If the campus were in the City, it would be possible to build large numbers of low-cost apartments, to be financed under Section 221 D(3), in open areas of the campus where land and development costs could be kept at a minimum. In order to qualify for such assistance the housing sites must fall under a certified Workable Program for Community Improvement. The City is certified whereas the unincorporated area around the City is not.
- 4. Annexation would strengthen relations with the City government. The City Council would feel that such an action constitutes an expression of confidence and good will. Recently the Council took the unusual step of appointing a member of the University staff in the President's Office to fill a Council vacancy. This action showed a willingness on the part of the City to improve communications with the University and a recognition of the University's dominant role in community life. Annexation would undoubtedly reinforce the Council's progressive tendencies and enhance its prestige with the public.

The closer relationship which annexation would foster would also facilitate a cooperative approach to long-range planning for physical improvement. As an added advantage, the University could qualify for federal grants for planning under the local planning assistance program, if the campus were within the City limits.

5. The City is now readying for passage by the Council ordinances to extend zoning regulations to a mile and a half beyond the City limits and has already adopted subdivision regulations both within the City and a mile and a half beyond. If the campus were annexed, these regulations would protect the borders of University lands in the southwestern corner of the campus which are presently more than a mile and a half from the City limits. This will become increasingly important because many developers and investors are now showing great interest in the areas which border the campus on the south.

The negative features of annexation are:

- 1. The City at some future time might attempt to impose burdensome obligations on the University. The University is well protected as of now by an opinion of the Attorney General that the Board's authority over the campus supersedes that of local governments. This could be changed by statutory enactment or judicial interpretations which would negate the opinion.
- 2. De-annexation might be a difficult process if at some future time it were deemed advisable to do so. Under present law it would not be difficult as long as the proposed annexation took property of the campus not now contiguous to the City up to within five feet of the University property line.
- 3. The City might not be in as desirable financial position to maintain long border roads as the township or county.
- 4. The City might try to interfere with future campus development planning through its zoning or planning commissions or through overzealous City employees or officials.

It is our recommendation that by appropriate resolution the Board of Trustees request annexation to the City of Carbondale.

President Morris displayed Land Map A, dated January 26, 1965, as revised March 16, 1965, and indicated that only Area 2 was to be recommended for annexation at this time. A minor change in Area 2 was indicated, extending the area proposed for annexation to within five feet of University property lines.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board approved the recommendation for annexation of University property to the City of Carbondale, as presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

RATIFICATION OF CONTRACT FOR CONTROL SYSTEMS, HEATING AND REFRIGERATION PLANT, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

The following resolution is recommended for approval, ratifying the action of the Executive Committee. It was necessary in this instance to obtain verbal approval from the Executive Committee prior to the expiration date of the bids, which was February 5, 1965.

Resolution

Whereas, The Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University at its meeting September 29, 1964, rejected the low of two bids received for the Control Systems of the Heating and Refrigeration Plant at the Edwardsville Campus, the low bid being in the sum of \$51,463.00, and in excess of the engineering estimate of \$36,800.00, and

Whereas, Warren and Van Praag, Inc., Consulting Engineers for the project, re-examined the previous cost estimate and concluded that the cost of the said control system could be approximately \$35,000.00, and

Whereas, from requests for bids made to seven contractors, four new bids on the said Control System were received on December 22, 1964, the low base bid No. 3 of Johnson Service Company, in the sum of \$35,505.00 being the low bid received, and resulting in a savings of \$15,958.00 under the rejected prior low bid of \$51,463.00, and

Whereas, the University Architect, having recommended approval of the low base bid No. 3 of Johnson Service Company in the sum of Thirty-five Thousand Five Hundred and Five Dollars (\$35,505.00) for the Control Systems of the Heating and Refrigeration Plant on the Edwardsville Campus, and two members of the Executive Committee having approved the said bid and authorized the University Administration to proceed with the award of contract to the said bidder before the expiration date of February 5, 1965, and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University deems it to be in the best interest of Southern Illinois University to award the contract for the said Control System of the Heating and Refrigeration Plant at the Edwardsville Campus to the Johnson Service Company, the low bidder thereon,

Now, Therefore, Be It *Resolved* By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled this 17th day of March, 1965, that the action of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees and the University Administration in approving and awarding Contract Number C-16513, in the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand, Five Hundred and Five Dollars (\$35,505.00), to the Johnson Service Company, as the low bidder for the Control Systems of the Heating and Refrigeration Plant on the Edwardsville Campus, is hereby approved and ratified.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Kenneth L. Davis, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT FOR 1964–1965

It is recommended that the audit firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Company be approved by the Board of Trustees to make the independent audit of the accounts and financial operations of Southern Illinois University for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965, and that the administration be authorized to enter into a joint agreement between the Auditor General, Southern Illinois University, and Peat, Marwick, Mitchell & Company for the audit.

The Auditor General concurs with this recommendation and will again share in the cost of the audit.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the recommendation made by the administration. The

vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR IMPROVEMENTS AT SOUTHWESTERN ILL-INOIS EXPERIMENTAL FARM, BELLEVILLE, ILLINOIS

Bids were received February 25. 1965, for construction of a Residence-Office, alterations to the North Igloo, and provision of water and sewerage service at the Southwestern Experimental Farm near Belleville, Illinois. Presented herewith are a tabulation of all proposals and Summary Sheet No. 1 showing the recommendations of the University Architect for the award of contracts to the low bidders. The administration recommends acceptance of the respective low bids, as the total contract amounts are well within our cost estimates for this work.

INFORMATION REPORT ON BIDS FOR 16 INCH WATER MAIN UNDER ROUTE 51 AND ILLINOIS CENTRAL RAILROAD

Bids were received January 28, 1965, for a 16 inch water main in a 36 inch casing under the highway and railroad tracks. All bids were in excess of twice the estimated cost and therefore the Board was not specially convened to consider them before their expiration March 15. The project is being rebid, calling for the line to be hydraulically pressed through a drilled hole, thus eliminating the expensive casing and possible subsurface water problems in installing it. Bidding documents will be issued March 16, with bids to be returned April 13, in time for consideration at the next meeting of the Board.

The above report was submitted for information, and no action was required.

DEDICATION OF RIGHT-OF-WAY FOR MILL STREET WIDENING

In accordance with the street and traffic flow improvement plans of the City of Carbondale as implemented by the bond issue for such purpose approved by referendum last year, the widening of Mill Street is planned by the City as one of its first projects. This will be of great benefit to the University as this street presently constitutes the northern boundary of the portion of the Carbondale Campus within the city limits and west of South Illinois Avenue. The reconstruction of Mill Street between South University and South Illinois Avenues is being handled under separate agreement with the State Highway Department in connection with the one-way couple of these streets. From South University west to South Oakland will be administered by the City, and the University has been asked to provide the funds for fifty per cent of the cost of this improvement and to provide the requisite additional right-of-way.

On July 1, 1964, the Board of Trustees considered the matter of participation in the City of Carbondale's project for widening and reconstructing Mill Street between Oakland and Illinois avenues. The City had requested that the University grant 31 feet of right-of-way along the south side of Mill Street from Oakland to Illinois

and participate to the extent of fifty per cent of the project cost.

Since the July 1, 1964, meeting, the City's engineers have made substantial progress toward the completion of designs and specifications for the project and further discussions have been held with City officials.

Authorization is now sought for the dedication to the City of such property as the University now owns or may acquire along the south side of Mill Street between University Avenue and Oakland Avenue as may be needed, when the City is pre-

pared to let construction bids for this project, and to authorize financial participation if funds are made available to the Board by the General Assembly.

Resolution

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that in return for the City of Carbondale's undertaking to widen Mill Street from Oakland to Illinois Avenues to a minimum of four lanes of traffic divided by a median strip, to provide a reasonable width for a retaining wall, utility space, and sidewalk along the north side of the improved street, to preserve all present curbing breaks required by the Board, the Board of Trustees agrees to provide not to exceed fifty per cent of the cost of the said street improvement, subject to appropriation of funds therefor by the Illinois General Assembly, and to dedicate to the City of Carbondale additional land along the south side of the present street of sufficient widths to enable the City to construct said street and related improvements, together with the necessary appurtenant grading easements for the accomplishment of this street widening purpose.

And Be It Further *Resolved*, that the President of the University be and is hereby authorized to execute from time to time such legal documents as may be necessary and desirable for the accomplishment of the said street improvement in substantial accordance with the conditions set forth above.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted the resolution presented by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

PRIVATELY CONSTRUCTED DORMITORY AT V.T.I.

When land acquisition activities were expanded into the area north of East Grand Avenue the administration encountered some landowners in the area whose dormitory building plans were far advanced. Plans have been discussed with the Board from time to time whereby our acquisition of their projected private dormitory building sites would be facilitated by arranging for the planned construction to be carried out on a University-owned and selected site more compatible with our overall planning. The site would be leased to the builder and the completed dormitory leased back to the University, all through the Foundation. Revenue from room and board would be devoted to lease payments which would eventually result in University ownership of the facility.

It is now the judgment of the administration that these plans should promptly be put into execution for the purpose of providing more adequate residential facilities at the Vocational-Technical Institute, a possibility which has just arisen because of our recent acquisition of title to that land. According to our deed, however, we must still obtain written approval of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare prior to implementing such a plan. The Board is therefore now requested to enact the following resolution authorizing the first such dormitory project:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular session assembled, that the lease of a dormitory building site on the recently acquired Vocational-Technical Institute campus to the Southern Illinois University Foundation

for rental of One Dollar per year, with right to sublease to Mr. Robert Reeves of Carbondale, Illinois, be and is hereby authorized; provided, however, that Mr. Reeves undertakes in return therefor (1) to construct thereon a dormitory by competitive public bid-letting and in accordance with plans heretofore approved by the University Architect and subject to the periodic inspection of construction by the University Architect, (2) to lease back to the Southern Illinois University Foundation said dormitory for a term coincident with or in excess of his mortgage and for a total rental not to exceed construction and financing costs and the agreed value of his previously planned site, Tract 162, plus seven per cent (7%) thereof, together with any interest, real estate tax and insurance costs during the term of the lease, (3) to convey to the Board of Trustees the aforesaid Tract 162, (4) that at the expiration or termination of said lease the said dormitory shall become a fixture on and a part of the land of the Board of Trustees, and (5) that at any time after seven years from the commencement of said lease the payments may be accelerated and the lease thereby terminated, and provided, further, that the Southern Illinois University Foundation agree to sublease the said dormitory to the Board of Trustees for the same rental being paid by said Foundation to the said Mr. Reeves for a term with renewal options which will equal the term of the basic leaseback, and provided, further, that as a condition precedent to entering into the above agreement the written consent of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare to such use of the Vocational-Technical Institute property be procured.

And Be It Further *Resolved*, that the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute on behalf of the Board such leases and other legal instruments as may be necessary or desirable for the provision of a privately constructed dormitory facility under substantially the above terms.

After consideration and discussion, it was the consensus of the Board that this matter should be held for further consideration at a subsequent meeting.

EARNED DEGREE OF SPECIALIST

The By-Laws and Statutes of the Board of Trustees now provide (Part III, Article IV, Section 10, D, 1), among the degrees and awards authorized, the following earned degrees: doctor's, master's, bachelor's, associate, and such others as may be deemed appropriate by the Board of Trustees.

We request approval in principle of the Degree of Specialist. This degree is intermediate between the master's degree and the doctor's degree, and is granted upon completion of at least six full years of college work.

At present, the University has a six-year program leading to an Educational Specialist's diploma or certificate. Approval of this request would make it possible to grant these students and students in other fields a degree rather than a certificate, subject, however, to the proviso that all programs leading to the Degree of Specialist would have to go through the usual channels for approval, including the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved, in principle, the Degree of Specialist. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris discussed with the members of the Board two workshops sponsored by the Association of Governing Boards of Universities and Colleges to be held at Albuquerque, New Mexico, April 26–27, and at Williamsburg, Virginia, May 17–18. Mr. Maremont moved that two members of the Board and President Morris be authorized to attend one of these meetings, at University expense. The motion was seconded by Melvin C. Lockard and was carried by unanimous vote.

The meeting was adjourned at 12 noon.

RATIFICATION OF AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR REPAIR AND REHABILITATION, ENROLLEE DORMITORIES, BRECKINRIDGE JOB CORPS CENTER

On April 8, 1965, a conference call was held with members of the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees to take action on the bids received for the repair and rehabilitation of twenty-one enrollee dormitories at the Breckinridge Job Corps Center, Morganfield, Kentucky. Approval was given for award to the Wilkins Construction Company, Calvert City, Kentucky, the low bidder for all general work in the amount of \$185,115.00, and to Meadows and Owens, Henderson, Kentucky, the low bidder for all electrical work in the amount of \$25,664.10.

Formal ratification of this action is requested.

Lockard, the Board approved and ratified the award of contracts for repair and rehabilitation of enrollee dormitories at the Breckinridge Center. The following resolution is recommended for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University,

- 1. That the Union Bank and Trust Company and the Morganfield National Bank, Morganfield, Kentucky, be, and are hereby, designated as Depositories of the general operating funds of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, Breckinridge Job Corps Training Center, and that R. D. Isbell, Director of Administrative Services, or E. S. Daniel, Associate Director of Administrative Services, Southern Illinois University, Breckinridge Job Corps Training Center, be and hereby are, authorized to deposit in said Depositories funds of Southern Illinois University, and to endorse in the name of Southern Illinois University for that purpose, checks drafts, notes and other like obligations.
- 2. That the Union Bank and Trust Company and the Morganfield National Bank, be, and are hereby, authorized to pay out funds on deposit from time to time to the credit of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University upon checks drawn upon said Depositories and signed, either personally, by machine, or facsimile, in the name of Southern Illinois University by R. D. Isbell, Director of Administrative Services, or E. S. Daniel, Associate Director of Administrative Services, Southern Illinois University, Breckinridge Job Corps Training Center.
- 3. That the Secretary shall cause to be certified and filed with the Union Bank and Trust Company and the Morganfield National Bank facsimile specimens, mechanical specimens, and personal specimens of the signatures of R. D. Isbell and E. S. Daniel and the said Union Bank and Trust Company and the Morganfield National Bank shall be entitled to honor such checks, drafts, notes and other like obligations regardless of by whom the actual, mechanical, or facsimile or purported endorsements or signatures of the said R. D. Isbell or E. S. Daniel may have been affixed thereto if such endorsements or signatures resemble the actual, mechanical or facsimile specimens duly certified and caused to be filed with the Union Bank and Trust Company and the Morganfield National Bank by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.
- 4. That Melvin C. Lockard, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, shall cause to be filed with the Union Bank and Trust Company and the Morganfield National Bank a certified copy of this resolution, under the seal of Southern Illinois University and the said Morganfield banks shall be entitled as against Southern Illinois University to presume conclusively that the said R. D. Isbell and E. S. Daniel continue to hold such offices and be entitled to the powers authorized herein until otherwise notified in writing by the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

INFORMATION REPORT ON ACTIONS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

It is requested that the Board of Trustees consider and ratify the actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during February and March, 1965, for the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses. Detailed reports of such actions were mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees in advance of this meeting, and copies were placed on file in the office of the Board.

Actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to less than \$2,500, in the total amount of \$583,521.43 for Carbondale Campus and \$268,405.45 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during February and March, 1965, were considered. Also considered were actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to over \$2,500, in the total amount of \$786,480.55 for Carbondale Campus and \$812,740.37 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during the same period.

HOUSING REGULATIONS

The Board of Trustees on April 26, 1963, passed by unanimous vote a Resolution on Student Housing. The following explanatory material pertaining to that resolution is presented for the information of the Board:

"The principles incorporated in the following resolution are intended to emphasize the continuing concern of the Board of Trustees for the environment in which students live and to set forth the successive steps of upgrading living facilities both on and off campus.

"The importance of the University's cooperating with private householders in

order to allow the individual householder to meet and fulfill the minimum physical and supervisory standards which are to be required is apparent if at least 9,000 students are to be housed in Carbondale and neighboring communities and an undetermined number of students are to be housed in Edwardsville and neighboring communities. Moreover, the minimum standards can be anticipated to be raised at periodic intervals and private householders investing in new construction must anticipate the upgrading of standards in safety, sanitation, health and recreation, environment for good study conditions, and supervision."

It is recommended that the Board of Trustees amend paragraphs two, four, and five of the April 26, 1963, action. The Resolution as amended will be as follows:

Resolution

Be It Resolved That the Board of Trustees remands to the Administration the implementation of all necessary policies and procedures which will result in the establishment of acceptable living centers for all single undergraduate students.

Be It Resolved That effective September 1, 1965, single undergraduate students not residing with their parents or guardians will be permitted to reside only in those accommodations which have been and which continue to be classified by the Administration as "Accepted Living Centers." Any single undergraduate student who resides in accommodations not designated as "Accepted Living Center" shall be subject to disciplinary action.

Be It Resolved That the Administration shall vigorously encourage that all accommodations used by graduate students and married undergraduates shall meet the

same minimal standards.

Be It Resolved That the qualifications necessary for a living unit to be classified as an "Accepted Living Center" shall encompass due consideration for safety, sanitation, health and recreation, supervision and the creation of an environment which is conducive to good study conditions, and in addition is limited to students of Southern Illinois University and available to all students of the University regardless of race, color, religion, or national origin.

Be It Resolved That the Administration shall review annually the Housing Policies and Standards and make appropriate recommendations to the Board of Trustees

It is recommended that the Resolution, as amended, be adopted by the Board of

for upgrading living conditions for students of Southern Illinois University.

Trustees.

On motion of Harold R. Fischer, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board adopted the resolution by unanimous vote.

FAMILY HOUSING, PHASE III, FHA

On April 24, 1964, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University authorized the University administration to submit a loan request application to the Federal Housing Administration to fully examine University participation in Section 221(d)3 multiple family housing projects. At the same time, the Board authorized a request to allow Southern Illinois University to maintain its own priority and assignment procedures to best serve the low and moderate income student, faculty, and staff families.

By letter dated June 24, 1964, the Federal Housing Administration approved priority preference for rental to students, faculty, and staff for the Southern Illinois University project.

By letter dated November 10, 1964, the Federal Housing Administration gave preliminary approval to Southern Illinois University as project sponsor and Southern Illinois University Foundation as mortgagor. In the same letter an allocation of \$4,000,000 at 3-7/8 per cent was approved for the building of up to 452 two- and three-bedroom apartments for students, faculty, and staff of Southern Illinois University.

On April 8, 1965, Southern Illinois University Foundation gave approval as follows: "Preparations should now be made for the formal application including the payment of fees leading to the FHA commitment and eventual loan with which to construct the project. The S.I.U. Foundation is therefore requested to assume the ownership of the land; proceed as loan applicant to FHA; let contracts for the project; obtain the note and mortgage loan; and enter into a lease or management agreement with Southern Illinois University for the period of the loan."

Formal application to FHA with application fee designed to obtain FHA's commitment for insurance on the loan should now be submitted. This application proceeds from Southern Illinois University as sponsor in behalf of the Southern Illinois University Foundation as eventual mortgagor to both the Commissioner of FHA and an FHA approved mortgagee. Eventually the parties will become the Southern Illinois University Foundation as mortgagor borrowing from the Federal National Mortgage Association mortgagee lending at sub-market rates.

In connection with the application, it will be necessary to represent that the University will comply with FHA's standard requirements in connection with construction and financing; that the Southern Illinois University Foundation will have guaranteed by the University cost expenditures which may be incurred during the application and loan processing; and that the execution of documents is authorized by the Board to permit the Southern Illinois University Foundation to acquire University land for the specific purpose of this project.

In addition, the University will be expending monies in advance of commitment by the FHA to properly prepare the application for such things as the retention of legal counsel specializing in FHA regulation and processing (similar to bond counsel in revenue bond matters) and engineering studies with regard to the site and extension of utilities.

Formal approval is now requested from the Board of Trustees for the University administration to proceed as outlined above.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR A 16 INCH WATER MAIN UNDER ROUTE 51 AND THE ILLINOIS CENTRAL RAILROAD

Bids were received January 28, 1965, for a 16-inch water main in a 36-inch casing under Route 51 and the Illinois Central Railroad tracks. The bids were greatly in excess of the estimated cost, and therefore consideration by the Board of Trustees was not recommended. The low bid at that time was \$62,996.00, and the estimate was in excess of \$30,000.00. This information was reported to the Board of Trustees at the meeting on March 17, 1965.

Bids were again received on April 13, 1965, and a tabulation of these bids is

attached. The revised specifications provided for the 16-inch water main incased in a 24-inch conduit. The engineers' estimate was \$30,000.00.

It is recommended that the contract for this work be awarded to the low bidder, Kieffer Brothers Construction Company, Mt. Carmel, Illinois, in the amount of \$27,128.25.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR EXTERIOR LIGHTING SYSTEMS, EDWARDS-VILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received April 1, 1965, for the exterior lighting systems at the Edwardsville Campus. There is presented herewith a tabulation of all proposals received, showing the recommendation of the University Architect for the award of contract to the low bidder.

The recommendation covers the provision of all underground electric work and necessary switch gear for the proposed lighting system in the academic core and parking lot. It is necessary to install this underground work to avoid delay in connection with site development. The deductive alternate which is recommended deducts the concrete foundations, lighting standards, bracket arms, and lighting fixtures.

At this time it is recommended that the Board accept the low bid, with Alternate E (deduction), as follows:

RECOMMENDATION FOR HONORARY DEGREES

It is recommended that the honorary Doctor of Laws degree be awarded to Abdoulaye Singare, Minister of Education of the Republic of Mali, during his visit to Southern Illinois University, April 25–28, 1965.

For the past ten years, Abdoulaye Singare has served as a senior administrator of former French West Africa, the Sudanese Confederation, and the Republic of Mali. He has served as Counsellor General to the Territorial Assembly of Sudan and as Municipal Counsellor of Bamako and Koulikoro, concurrently holding the position of Secretary General of the Civil Servants Union of the Sudan. Since 1957 he has

served as Minister of Education of the Sudanese Republic and now serves the Republic of Mali in that position. He was an elected Deputy to the National Assembly. He has traveled extensively in most of the countries of Africa, Europe, and Asia and has made one previous trip to the United States. His current visit was arranged by the Department of State and members of Southern Illinois University's faculty working in Mali.

It is recommended that at the June, 1965, commencements the honorary Doctor

of Laws degree be awarded to Carter Davidson and to Harold B. Gores.

Carter Davidson was born September 23, 1905, in Louisville, Kentucky. He received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Harvard University, the Master of Arts degree from the University of Louisville, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree from the University of Chicago. He has been awarded honorary degrees by several colleges and universities. He served as Instructor of English in a Louisville high school, 1925-26; as assistant professor of English and Speech at the University of Idaho, 1926-28; as Instructor of English at the University of Chicago, 1928-31; as assistant professor of English at Carleton College, 1931-32, and as associate professor and assistant to the President, 1932-36; as President of Knox College, 1936-46; and has served as President of Union College, Schenectady, New York, since 1946. In 1935 he was ordained to the ministry of the Congregational Church. He is a trustee of the Schenectady Savings Bank; a director of the Schenectady Hotel Corporation; and a member of the Commission on Higher Education, Middle States Association of Colleges. He has served as trustee of the Institute for International Education and of the International Mass Education Movement, Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching; as president of the College Federal Agency Council and of the Association of Colleges and Universities of the State of New York; as chairman of the board of directors of the Empire State Foundation, Independent Liberal Arts Colleges; as a member of the Commission on Financing Higher Education; and as chairman of the Commission on Colleges and Industry, Association of American Colleges. He is the co-author of several books, including Poetry, Its Appreciation and Enjoyment, 1934, and Colleges for Freedom, 1947.

Harold Bismark Gores was born September 20, 1909, at Abington, Massachusetts. He received the Bachelor of Science degree from Bridgewater State Teachers College, the Master of Education and Doctor of Education degrees from Harvard University. He has been awarded the honorary Doctor of Laws degree by Northeastern University and the honorary Doctor of Science degree from the College of Emporia, Kansas. He served in various capacities in the public schools of Massachusetts, 1931-58, including the office of superintendent of schools, 1949-58. He served as New England regional chairman of the Fulbright Teachers Exchange Program, 1953-57; as national chairman of the fellowships program for high school teachers, Fund for Advancement of Education, Ford Foundation, 1954-55; as a member of the executive committee of the Harvard Foundation for Advanced Study and Research, 1954-57; as a member of the President's Science Advisory Committee, 1959; as a member of the education advisory group, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company; as a member of the national advisory committee on school relations, Girl Scouts of America; and is presently president of Educational Facilities Laboratories, Inc., Ford Foundation.

These recommendations have been initiated by the Faculty Committee on Honorary Degrees and have the endorsement of the administration.

On motion of Dr. Martin Van Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard,

the Board approved the award of the honorary Doctor of Laws degree to Abdoulaye Singare, Carter Davidson, and Harold B. Gores, as recommended. The vote was unanimous.

CHANGE OF NAME OF DEPARTMENT OF GUIDANCE

Approval is requested for changing the name of the Department of Guidance in the College of Education on the Carbondale Campus to the Department of Guidance and Educational Psychology.

The title proposed provides a more complete and accurate description of the function of the program as it presently exists than does the old title, and hence will be more informative to students and to faculty members. The limitations of the present title have been something of a handicap in the employment of staff.

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board unanimously approved the administration's recommendation.

CONSTRUCTION OF DORMITORY AT VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL INSTITUTE

The following resolution is recommended for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Resolution

Whereas the Board of Trustees at its meeting April 26, 1963, authorized the administration to negotiate with Mr. Robert Reeves for the construction of a dormitory on University property to be leased by the University to the Foundation and after the construction of the dormitory to be leased back to the University; and

Whereas at the request of the administration of the University the Southern Illinois University Foundation on June 7, 1963, by formal resolution did approve such an arrangement; and

Whereas in accordance therewith a Memorandum of Agreement was drawn and executed by and between Mr. Reeves and the Foundation on December 12, 1963, copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

Whereas this arrangement was ratified by the Board of Trustees on July 1, 1964; and

Whereas it now appears desirable to have said dormitory built on a recently acquired campus of the Vocational-Technical Institute;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in regular meeting assembled, that the lease of a dormitory building site on the recently acquired Vocational-Technical Institute campus to the Southern Illinois University Foundation for rental of One Dollar per year, with right to sublease to Mr. Robert Reeves of Carbondale, Illinois, be and is hereby authorized provided that Mr. Robert Reeves delivers a fee-simple title to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University free of any liens and encumbrances to property designated and known as University Tract 162;

And Be It Further Resolved, That the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University be and are hereby authorized and directed to execute on behalf of the Board such leases and other legal instruments as may be necessary or desirable for the provision of a privately constructed dormitory facility under substantially the above terms.

Memorandum of Agreement

THIS AGREEMENT, entered into this twelfth day of December, 1963, by and between the Southern Illinois University Foundation, a not-for-profit corporation, located in Carbondale, Illinois, hereinafter called the Foundation, and Robert Reeves, of Carbondale, Illinois, hereinafter called Reeves,

Witnesseth:

- 1. Reeves agrees to cause to be constructed at his own expense a dormitory on a site to be made available for this purpose by the Foundation by means of subletting the site to Reeves under a lease of the property by the Foundation from Southern Illinois University. Said dormitory is to be constructed in accordance with plans and drawings, preliminary versions of which have been heretofore submitted to the University Architect of Southern Illinois University, and the final working drawings version of said plans shall be approved in writing by the said University Architect prior to the letting of bids for construction. The contractor who is to execute the plans shall be selected by means of competitive public bid lettings to be administered by the designing architect and evaluated by the University Architect. The sub-lease of the building site to Reeves shall be for a rental of \$1.00 per year, and shall be of a basic term which shall coincide with the requirements of the holder of the mortgage or other security interest in the dormitory granted by Reeves to his lender; such lease shall nonetheless terminate upon final payment of all sums due Reeves hereunder. The principal amount of such mortgage or other security interest shall not exceed the totals of sub-paragraphs A, B, and C of Paragraph 2 hereof. The dormitory when constructed shall be considered a fixture and annexed to the land; it shall revert to the owner of the land at the expiration or termination of such lease. Reeves agrees that the University Architect shall be privileged to visit the construction site either personally or through his agents or employees a minimum of once each week during construction, although supervisory architectural services during construction shall be provided by Reeves' architect.
- 2. Upon completion of construction of the dormitory in a manner certified by the University Architect to be in substantial conformity with the plans he approved, the Foundation agrees to lease the said dormitory from Reeves for a term which shall coincide with the term of the mortgage or other security interest in the building granted by Reeves. It is agreed that the Foundation shall have the right to assign this lease to Southern Illinois University. The rental of the dormitory shall be computed as follows:
- A. The total cost of construction of the dormitory, including insurance during construction, architectural design and supervision costs, and financing costs, including interest.
- B. The sum of \$51,000 for the site for which the dormitory was originally planned, plus direct costs incurred relating to the land for which the dormitory was originally planned as described under Paragraph 3 hereof.
- C. A sum computed by taking seven (7) per cent of the total of A. and B. above.
- D. Periodic interest charged during the period of the operation of the dormitory provided herein following completion of the construction thereof for a loan obtained for the totals of A, B, and C above.
- E. To the above shall be added a sum sufficient to reimburse Reeves for the cost of fire, extended coverage, and vandalism and malicious mischief insurance for the period during which the dormitory is leased by the Foundation.

Such rental shall be paid in equal annual installments at the beginning of each year of tenancy; each such installment shall be in the amount of the basic rental divided by the number of years in the term of the mortgage or other security interest, prorated for periods of less than a year, plus the actual cost of insurance for that period. Real estate taxes, if any, shall be paid or caused to be paid by the Foundation.

PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that the Foundation is hereby granted an irrevocable option to purchase the said building at any time after the expiration of seven years from the commencement of such lease of the building, for a price equivalent to the total of the remaining rental for the term, less mortgage interest cost and insurance cost for the remainder of the term, plus any pre-payment premium required by the mortgage or other security instrument.

3. The execution of the above agreement is conditioned upon the prior acquisition of title by Southern Illinois University of tract of land denominated by said University as University Tract 162, said tract of land being in the block situated northwest of the intersection of South Marion Street at East Grand Avenue in the City of Carbondale, and consisting of one city lot facing South Marion Street.

RATIFICATION OF AWARD OF CONTRACTS FOR WATER TREATMENT PLANT (PHASE I) EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received February 4, 1965, for construction of Phase I of water treatment facilities at the Edwardsville Campus. The low bids totaling \$94,559 were well within our engineers' estimates, and the respective low bidders are both firms which have previously performed or are performing work at the Edwardsville Campus in a satisfactory manner. The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees has made the contract awards accordingly, and the Board at this time is requested to formally ratify such awards.

Resolution

Be It Resolved By the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled, that the construction contract awards for Water Treatment Plant (Phase I) Edwardsville Campus, heretofore made by the Executive Committee of this Board in accordance with said Committee's authority in the premises, which awards were, respectively, to R. & R. Construction Company, Alton, Illinois, for construction of a 400,000 gallon clear well structure (Bid No. 1, Division A) \$65,592, and to Luhr Bros., Inc. of Columbia, Illinois, for construction of water well and installation of pumping equipment and water lines (Bid No. 2, Division B) \$28,967, be and are hereby ratified and confirmed in all respects.

The above resolution, ratifying and confirming action of the Executive Committee in the award of contracts for Water Treatment Plant (Phase I), Edwardsville Campus, was adopted unanimously by the Board of Trustees. This action was taken by mail, subsequent to the meeting held April 23, 1965, and also authorized incorporation of such action in these minutes.

OPTION IN AVIATION TECHNOLOGY

Approval is requested for submitting to the State of Illinois Board of Higher Education as a new program the option in Aviation Technology leading to the degree of Associate in Technology offered by the Vocational-Technical Institute.

Although this option has been planned since February 23, 1960, when the University acquired the facilities of the Southern Illinois Airport, we have been advised that it should be presented to the State Board for formal approval.

A general discussion was held concerning the Vocational-Technical Institute and the possibility of expansion of programs with support from the Federal Government under the Poverty Act. The administration agreed to supply the members of the Board with further detail concerning current programs and plans.

On motion of Dr. Martin Van Brown, seconded by Arnold H. Maremont, the Board approved the request made by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard.

May, 1965

Matters Presented by President Morris

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

REVISED PERSONNEL POLICIES AFFECTING CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES AT SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

On January 14, 1954, personnel policies for civil service employees were adopted by the Board of Trustees. Since then there have been singular Board actions which have changed specific items.

Recently a complete revision of these policies was undertaken and the following recommendations for amendment are suggested. These have been reviewed by the personnel officers of both campuses, the officials of the University Civil Service System, and the State Universities Retirement System.

It is recommended that these amendments be effective immediately (amended language is underlined):

ARTICLE III, SECTION 4

The University recognizes the principle of collective bargaining with respect to

civil service employees not in administrative or semi-military positions.... However, the By-Laws, Statutes, and Regulations of the Board of Ttustees of Southern Illinois University, made and enacted within the laws of the State of Illinois, shall govern the University at all times and such By-Laws, Statutes, and Regulations cannot be negated by negotiation.

ARTICLE III, SECTION 6

No person, group of persons, or organization will be permitted to solicit membership in any organization with a University employee during the employee's working hours nor at the employee's normal place of employment.

ARTICLE III, SECTION 9

An employee will be given time off without pay to vote in general elections not exceeding two (2) hours, provided that such employee is scheduled to work more than four (4) hours during the hours the polls are open.

ARTICLE VI, SECTION 2, PARAGRAPH 9 (Page 11)

Any other time off becomes the prerogative of the President of the University and the announcement of such time off shall be made by the Office of the President or his delegated representative.

ARTICLE VI, SECTION 3, PARAGRAPH 5 (Page 12)

The fiscal week of the University shall be considered as starting at 12:00::01 A.M. on Monday morning and ending at 11:59::59 P.M. Sunday evening.

ARTICLE VII, SECTION 1

For all employees in their first year of service, no vacation shall be available for employees with less than six (6) months of service, but at the end of six (6) months of employment (completion of the probationary period), one-half of the first year's vacation as listed in sections 2, 3, and 4 shall be considered as earned and available, and the fractional amount of the first year's vacation shall be available thereafter in proportion to the fraction of the year worked.

ARTICLE X, SECTION 1

Leaves of absence with pay shall be granted for an employee who is summoned for jury duty or in the fulfillment of annual military obligation in the armed forces of the United States or its Allies. Compensation for such leave will be computed at the normal rate of pay not to exceed fifteen (15) calendar days per year.

On motion of Dr. Martin Van Brown, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved the proposed amendments to personnel policies for civil service employees, as recommended. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

CONVEYANCE OF TRACTS, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Tracts 6 and 9 on the Edwardsville Campus were obtained by the Board through condemnation and title taken in the name of the Board with funds made available from the Foundation. It is now requested, by the approval of the following Resolution, that the land be conveyed to the Foundation and in turn to the Illinois Building Authority so that the money can be repaid to the Foundation:

Resolution

Whereas, tracts 6 and 9 of the Edwardsville Campus were conveyed by Warranty Deed to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University by the respective owners thereof in settlement by stipulation agreement of condemnation proceedings commenced by the Board of Trustees to acquire fee simple title thereto; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees has heretofore by Resolution resolved on the 12th day of December, 1964, requested the Illinois Building Authority to acquire title to and pay for the aforesaid tracts the sum of Thirty-Three Thousand, Three Hundred Dollars (\$33,300.00) for tract 6, and Thirty-Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$37,500.00) for tract 9, the same to be leased back to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University; and

Whereas, in order to make prompt payment of the purchase price to the owners of the aforesaid tracts for the taking thereof by condemnation, the Southern Illinois University Foundation, on behalf of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, paid the sum of Thirty-Three Thousand, Three Hundred Dollars (\$33,300.00) to the owners of tract 6, and the sum of Thirty-Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$37,500.00) to the owners of tract 9, with the understanding the Southern Illinois University Foundation be repaid therefor; and

Whereas, the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University, in order to assure repayment of the aforesaid monies to the Southern Illinois University Foundation, consider it desirable to convey the aforesaid tracts 6 and 9 to the Illinois Building Authority through the Southern Illinois University Foundation and that the Illinois Building Authority, upon acquiring title thereto, then lease the same back to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

Now, Therefore, Be It *Resolved* by the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University in regular session assembled on this 26th day of May, 1965, that it hereby requests the Illinois Building Authority to purchase the lands identified as tracts 6 and 9 on the Edwardsville Campus Site of Southern Illinois University from the Southern Illinois University Foundation at the purchase price of Thirty-Three Thousand, Three Hundred Dollars (\$33,300.00) for said tract 6, and Thirty-Seven Thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$37,500.00) for said tract 9, and that upon acquiring legal title thereto, that it lease the said tracts to the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University.

And It Is Further *Resolved* that the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University is hereby authorized and empowered to execute a Warranty Deed conveying tracts 6 and 9 of the Edwardsville Campus to Southern Illinois University Foundation for and in consideration of conveyance thereof, by the Southern Illinois University Foundation to the Illinois Building Authority, the legal description of said tracts 6 and 9 being fully set out in the Resolution entitled "Acquisition of Land by Illinois Building Authority," passed by the Board of Trustees on the 12th day of December, 1964, which legal description is by this reference incorporated herein and made a part of this Resolution.

It is requested that the Board of Trustees consider and ratify the actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations awarded during April, 1965, for the Carbondale and Edwards-ville campuses. Detailed reports of such actions were mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees in advance of this meeting, and copies were placed on file in the office of the Board.

Actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to less than \$2,500, in the total amount of \$295,190.87 for Carbondale Campus and \$115,430.68 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during April, 1965, were considered. Also considered were actions of the Executive Committee in approving purchase orders, contracts, and encumbrance authorizations amounting to over \$2,500, in the total amount of \$227,263.70 for Carbondale Campus and \$596,812.60 for Edwardsville Campus, awarded during the same period.

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR WATER TREATMENT PLANT, PHASE II, EDWARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received May 6, 1965, for general construction; mechanical piping, water treatment, and pumping equipment; plumbing work; heating and ventilating work; electrical work; and an access road for the Water Treatment Plant, Phase II, Edwardsville Campus. A copy of the tabulation sheet showing all proposals received is attached hereto.

The apparent low bids were 30.7% over the cost estimates. In view of the excess of the low bids over the estimates, and in view of the recommendations of the Associate Engineers, Warren and Van Praag, it is recommended that all bids be rejected and that the administration be authorized to proceed to ascertain an alternate way of accomplishing this work.

The delay in award of this phase of the work will defer the addition of filtering and softening, but it will be possible to use the water obtained from Phase I of the construction of the water treatment plant until April of 1967, when it is hoped that Phase II would be accomplished. The water coming from Phase I, however, will be pure.

On motion of Lindell W. Sturgis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board rejected all bids received for Phase II, water treatment plant, as

REPAIR AND REHABILITATION

Bids were received on May 4, 1965, for the construction of the following facilities at the Breckinridge Job Corps Center, Morganfield, Kentucky:

- 1. Repair and rehabilitation of medical facilities
- 2. Repair and rehabilitation of a dining facility
- 3. Repair and rehabilitation of an exchange facility

The following condition obtains in each of these programs:

1. Medical Facilities. The estimate for renovation, excluding painting, was \$30,000. Recommended contract award, excluding the painting alternate, is \$24,865.42, or \$5,134.58 below the engineers' estimate. In addition, it is recommended that the painting alternate be accepted, bringing the total contract award to \$26,115.02. It is recommended that the base proposal for the mechanical requirements not be accepted in view of the non-concurrence of the engineers for the Job Corps. This non-concurrence is not based upon the failure of the bid to correspond to estimate, but rather on the difference in method of achieving this work. A contract from the Office of Economic Opportunity concurring in this recommendation will be on file with the Board at the time of the requested action.

consideration of bids for piping work, power plant boilers phase II, carbondale campus

On March 17, 1965, the Board of Trustees rejected bids for piping, plumbing, and ventilation work for the Power Plant Boilers, Phase II, Carbondale Campus, upon recommendation of the administration. This work was readvertised and new bids were received May 6, 1965. As a result of the rebidding, the low bid is now \$236,000, as compared to the original low bid of \$243,295, a reduction of \$7,295. Attached hereto is a tabulation of the proposals received May 6, 1965, and a summary sheet showing the recommendation of the University Architect for the award of contract.

The low bid is 10.8% above the cost estimate of \$212,910 made by Consoer, Townsend and Associates.

The administration and our associate engineers considered the possibility of having the piping work done by members of the Physical Plant staff, but an analysis of the complexities of the work proved this method was not feasible.

It is recommended that the Board accept the proposal of the low bidder, as follows:

REVISION OF THE AIR FORCE ROTC PROGRAM

The Board of Trustees authorized establishment of a required Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps program in 1951 for all physically qualified freshman and sophomore male students at the University. This action was taken after faculty members and student in a poll on February 13, 1951, expressed a favorable

reaction to the establishment of Air Force ROTC on a permanent basis at the University.

The Reserve Officers' Training Corps Vitalization Act of 1964 was signed into law by the President on October 13, 1964. This Act made different provisions than previous law under which AFROTC functioned at the University.

After preliminary discussions with representatives of the Secretary of the Air Force regarding alternatives available to Southern Illinois University, a poll was taken by the Military Policies Committee on April 9, 1965, on the question:

Shall the program of Air Force ROTC at Southern Illinois University be continued on a required basis under present policies or become elective for eligible male students at Southern Illinois University thereby extending the program to enrolled students on the upper (Junior and Senior) level at the Edwardsville Campus?

Based on the results of this poll favoring an elective program, the review by the Military Policies Committee of the alternatives available to the University, and the discussions and correspondence with the officials of the Air Force, the following recommendation is made:

Effective in September of 1965 the required two-year basic AFROTC program is to be terminated at Southern Illinois University and changed to a voluntary program at the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses.

The cooperative efforts of the Secretary of the Air Force and his staff, the officials of Air University, the Air Force ROTC, and the Professor of Aerospace Studies at Southern Illinois University are to be commended for making possible this expansion of opportunity for all students of Southern Illinois University.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Melvin C. Lockard, the Board approved termination of the compulsory two-year basic AFROTC Program, effective September 1965, and change to a voluntary program at the Carbondale and Edwardsville campuses. The vote was as follows: Yea, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; pass, Dr. Brown; nay, none.

The Board of Trustees by unanimous vote adopted a statement of tribute to be forwarded to the survivors of Senator R. G. Crisenberry, deceased.

Tentative lists of salaries proposed for administrative and/or faculty-administrative personnel for the fiscal year 1965-66 were mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees prior to this meeting, and a copy was placed on file in the office of the Board.

After full consideration, Kenneth L. Davis moved that the Board approve the proposed salaries, as recommended, effective June 1, 1965. The motion was seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, and the vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

President Morris then presented the following resolution concerning

salary adjustments proposed for Civil Service employees, with a request for adoption by the Board of Trustees:

Be It Resolved, The administration of Southern Illinois University is authorized to grant salary increases to Civil Service employees effective June 1, 1965, in an amount not to exceed \$300,000 to June 30, 1966.

On motion of Kenneth L. Davis, seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, the Board adopted the resolution recommended by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page,

On motion of Melvin C. Lockard, seconded by Lindell W. Sturgis, the Board approved the administration's recommendation to employ George A. Fry & Associates, 135 S. LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois, to undertake a business management survey of the University, under contract ranging from \$22,000 to \$24,000, plus out-of-pocket expenses; further, the Board approved the employment of Mr. Leonard Shaw of Lutter, Maremont and Company, Inc., 35 E. Wacker Drive, Chicago 11, Illinois, at the rate of \$225 per day on a per diem basis, including all expenses, to carry out studies and investigations as requested by the administration. The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Page, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Wham, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

Near the close of the meeting Mayor Raymond O. Rogers, accompanied by Mr. Howard Percy and Mr. Thorp, representing the administration of the City of Edwardsville, presented to the Board a proposal for the sale of water for the University—Edwardsville Campus. At the request of the Chairman of the Board, Mayor Rogers agreed that this proposal would be submitted to the administration of the University.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:30 A.M.

A SPECIAL MEETING of the Board of Trustees of Southern Illinois University was held by conference telephone at 10 A.M., Wednesday, June 30, 1965. The call was initiated by Mr. Melvin C. Lockard, Secretary of the Board of Trustees, from his office in Mattoon, Illinois.

Davis called the meeting to order.

THE FOLLOWING UNIVERSITY MATTERS were presented by the administration for consideration by the Board of Trustees:

CONSIDERATION OF BIDS FOR SCIENCE LABORATORY FURNITURE, ED-WARDSVILLE CAMPUS

Bids were received on May 20, 1965, for science laboratory furniture at the Edwardsville Campus. There is presented herewith a tabulation of all proposals received, showing the recommendation of the University Architect for the award of contract to the low bidder.

The purchase of this equipment will provide the needed furniture to complete the teaching laboratories at the Edwardsville Campus for the winter term of 1965. A new and original type of convertible furniture, readily adaptable to disciplines in the life sciences and physical sciences, will be employed. This new scientific furniture will provide for maximum utilization of equipment and will provide the flexibility necessary for the expanding programs on the Edwardsville Campus.

It is recommended that the contract for this furniture be awarded to the low bidder, the Walrus Manufacturing Company, Decatur, Illinois, in the amount of \$316,768. This low bid is well below the engineers' estimate of \$453,827.

On motion of Arnold H. Maremont, seconded by Dr. Martin Van Brown, the Board approved the award of contract to the low bidder, as recommended.

The vote was as follows: Yea, Dr. Brown, Mr. Davis, Mr. Fischer, Mr. Maremont, Mr. Sturgis, Mr. Lockard; nay, none.

REVISION OF ILLINOIS AVENUE AND MILL STREET

The Division of Highways of the State of Illinois is proposing improvements to Illinois Avenue and Mill Street bordering upon the University. Illinois Avenue is to be widened, as is Mill Street, and Illinois and University Avenues are to become one-way streets going in opposite directions. A series of meetings between representatives of the Highway Department and the University have led to a recommended agreement with respect to the realignment of sidewalks, the development of traffic control signals, and right-of-way adjustments.

The following letter represents these agreements and approval of the Board for its execution by the President is requested:

DEAR PRESIDENT MORRIS:

The north-south traffic couple utilizing Illinois and University Avenues for U.S. Route 51 traffic through the City of Carbondale is scheduled for the completion of planning and for the awarding of the construction contract this year at the earliest date that planning can be completed.

This joint City-State project has been a subject of several conferences among representatives of Southern Illinois University, the City of Carbondale, and the Illinois Division of Highways District Office personnel at Carbondale. On matters of right of way adjacent to Southern Illinois University, right of way is being obtained through the joint efforts of Southern Illinois University and the Division of Highways under an existing agreement.

It is my understanding that certain additional items affecting Southern Illinois University have been worked out as follows:

- 1. The right of way line on the south side of Mill Street from University Street eastwardly to the new south diagonal street will, in general, be 4 feet back of the curb with the proposed 10 foot wide sidewalk (requested by SIU) and the earth grading back of the sidewalk to be constructed on a "construction easement" to be granted by SIU. Since the south curb of Mill Street in this vicinity is a curved line, the deeds will be so drawn that the right of way line will be square across each lot and will vary as necessary from the general rule of being 4 feet back of the curb.
- 2. The right of way line and sidewalk southeasterly along the diagonal street to Illinois Avenue and south along Illinois Avenue to the intersection with Grand Avenue will follow the same general plan as in Item 1 above except on Illinois Avenue fronting the property of the Wesley Foundation. At this location the right of way will extend out to include the sidewalk.

- 3. The cost of the sidewalk will be divided as follows:
- (a) The 10 foot wide sidewalk on the south side of Mill Street from University Street easterly to the diagonal street, thence southeasterly along the diagonal street to Illinois Avenue and the north line of the Wesley Foundation property, will be charged to SIU.
- (b) The 10 foot wide sidewalk fronting the Wesley Foundation will be charged to the Department of Public Works and Buildings.
- (c) The 10 foot wide sidewalk from the south line of the Wesley Foundation property south for a distance of 166 feet to Station 101 + 80, where there is an existing 5 foot wide walk, will be charged 50% to the Department and 50% to SIU.
- (d) From Station 101+80 south to Grand Avenue there is an existing 10 foot wide walk. The new 10 foot wide walk in this area will be charged 100% to the Department.

After construction is completed, SIU shall reimburse the Department for the actual cost of the sidewalk described above at the contract unit price per square foot. This is presently estimated to be 6685 sq. ft. at \$0.85/sq. ft. or \$5,685.00.

- 4. The entire 10 foot wide sidewalk, discussed in Item 3 above, beginning at University Avenue and running easterly along the south side of Mill Street to the south diagonal street, thence southeasterly along the south diagonal street to Illinois Avenue, thence south along the west side of Illinois Avenue to Grand Avenue, except that portion on Illinois Avenue fronting the Wesley Foundation property and measuring approximately 147.5 feet in length, will be maintained by Southern Illinois University.
- 5. The installation of Traffic Control Signals at the intersection of Grand Avenue will be provided in this project as requested by SIU, provided that SIU will reimburse the Department for the actual contract cost of the signals and installation which is presently estimated at \$10,000.00, plus \$600.00, for engineering costs which amount is approximately 6% of the estimated cost of construction.
- 6. Southern Illinois University will move the existing lighting facilities that interfere with the proposed work prior to construction with its own forces and replace them as it sees fit after construction is completed. This will be considered a Right of Way matter and the cost of this work will be allowed as a credit to SIU when ROW costs being shared by the Department and SIU are balanced.
- 7. SIU will be given a set of the completed plans for this project in order that the provisions for sidewalk, signals, earth slopes, and construction easement limits may be examined. A letter from SIU approving the plans will be requested by the District Office at Carbondale and this letter will constitute the granting of construction easements as shown on the plans.
