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Arthur E. Morgan To Speak At Commencement Exercises

Speaker at Southern's 78th annual commencement on Sunday, June 7, will be Arthur Ernest Morgan, civil engineer, educator and president of Community Service, Inc., in Yellow Springs, Ohio.

Morgan, author of a number of books on engineering and on small community development, has held several important government offices, including the chairmanship of the Tennessee Valley Authority from 1933 to 1938 and temporary head of the Conciliation and Arbitration Board in negotiations between U. S. Steel and the CIO in 1950.

Beginning his career as a civil engineer in St. Cloud, Minn., he rose to become president of his own firm and supervising engineer in charge of designing reclamation works in the southern states. In 1920 he became president of Antioch College, a position he held for 16 years. He has been president of Community Service, Inc., since 1941.

A Commencement Day reception will be held from 4 to 5:30 p. m. at the home of President D. W. Morris for seniors, parents, faculty, alumni and friends of SIU. Commencement exercises are scheduled to begin at 7 p. m.

Guest Speaker Named

A Southern alumnus, J. LESTER BUFORD, 1924-2, E-1928, of Mt. Vernon, will present the main address at the SIU Alumni Banquet Saturday, June 6.

Buford has been Superintendent of Schools in Mt. Vernon for the past 16 years, and prior to that was associated with schools at Johnston City, Eldorado, Galatia, Carbondale, West Frankfort, and Cypress.

The banquet will begin at 6:30 p. m., and will be held outdoors in front of the men's gymnasium. In case of rain, it will be held in the gym. Begin Navy Reserve Unit

Bids For New Library Due June 9

Bids for construction of a new library building at Southern Illinois University are being called for not later than 2:30 p. m. (CST) June 9 at which time there will be a public opening of bids, according to Charles M. Pulley, Architectural Service director.

Plans for study have been obtained by 16 contracting firms. The plans are available from the SIU Architectural Service; Burnham and Hammond, associate architects, Chicago; and F. W. Dodge company, St. Louis and Chicago.

Pulley says his office hopes to be able to make a recommendation on an acceptable bid to the June 12 meeting of the SIU Board of Trustees. There will be one prime contractor for the job.

Bids call for completion of the exterior structure according to the original plans. However, the forseeable allocation of funds for the building will permit only partial completion of the interior, Pulley said. The extent of interior completion is governed by the available funds and the amount of contractors' bids.

Pulliam Fund Started

Mrs. Mabel Pulliam recently presented the University scholarship and loans committee a check for \$536.30 in behalf of the Roscoe Pulliam Memorial Agency fund.

According to Mrs. Alice Rector, executive secretary of the committee, the gift will be used for a scholarship fund to be known as the Roscoe Pulliam Memorial Scholarship Fund.

The late Mr. Pulliam was president of Southern from 1935 until his death in March, 1944. Formerly superintendent of schools at Harrisburg, President Pulliam achieved a limited university status for SIU during his term of office and did much to enhance Southern's prestige, both locally and nationally.

His wife, Mrs. Pulliam, is supervisor of housing in the Office of Student Affairs.

Purpose of the scholarship fund will be to promote leadership and scholarship in Southern Illinois. Anyone who wishes to add to the gift may give any amount he sees fit. The number of scholarships to be made available depends on the total amount of gifts.

The original Pulliam Memorial Agency Fund consisted of \$1,500 given by alumni at the time of Mr. Pulliam's death. A part of the fund was used to purchase a painting of the late president, which was placed in Shryock auditorium in what was formerly the president's office.

Geography Department Chairman Awarded Fulbright Lectureship In Egypt

Dr. Floyd F. Cunningham, chairman of the SIU geography and geology department, has been awarded a Fulbright lectureship in human geography at Cairo, Egypt, for the 1953-54 academic year, according to Dr. Willis G. Swartz, SIU graduate school dean and Fulbright adviser.

Dr. Cunningham will be on sabbatical leave from Southern and will divide his teaching time at Cairo between the American Univer-

sity and the Abrahim Pasha University.

He has been on the university faculty since 1947, is a graduate of Illinois Normal, and received his master's and doctor's degrees from Clark University, Worcester, Mass. He came to Southern after 18 years as head of the geography department at Florence, Ala., State Teachers College.

SIU To Conduct Summer Workshops

Workshop courses in art education and elementary science will be offered to area teachers and undergraduate

students during the SIU summer session.

The art workshop will run for eight weeks, beginning June 15 and ending August 7. Seven members of the art department staff will give lectures in various art fields and lead round-table discussions. There will also be two visiting faculty members, Olga Schubkegel, art supervisor at Hammond, Ind., schools and Catherine Choy, pottery department chairman at Sophie Necomb college, Tulane University.

Students may receive eight hours of college credit by attending the workshop. Enrollment will be limited, and those interested should apply immediately to Burnett Shry-

ock, art chairman.

A second summer workshop course is being offered in elementary science. This course will be conducted as a two-session workshop from June 15 through July 10. Four credit hours will be given students attending morning and afternoon sessions for two weeks (June 15-26) or four weeks of afternoon sessions (June 15-July 10).

Requests for further information concerning advance registration for this course may be directed to Dr. Clyde Brown, University school science supervisor, or Dean Willis G. Swartz, of the SIU graduate school.
