## FIELD COURSES

### ANTHROPOLOGY

An anthropological field course in Southern Illinois will be offered during the summer of 1953. Tentative dates for the session are July 2 - August 15. Students may register for as few as four quarter hours and not more than eight quarter hours of credit in Sociology (Anthropology) 341. Qualified advanced students who have had this course may register, with the permission of the instructor, for a research course with four to eight quarter hours of credit. Enrollment will be limited to fifteen students.

Students will participate in actual archaeological field research. They will assist in the excavation of an archaeological site as yet unselected, probably in the Cache River drainage. In addition to the excavations, several field trips will be made to archaeological sites in Illinois and adjoining states. Students will be encouraged to write individual reports on the summer's work for publication in scientific periodicals or in the local newspapers.

All students will live in camp and expenses will be kept to a minimum. There will be no charge for lodging, and expenses of running the camp cafeteria will be allocated among students and staff on a share-expense basis. All transportation will be furnished without charge. A number of student assistantships will be available to aid students who must earn their own expenses.

Interested students should consult the Director, Dr. J. Charles Kelley, Museum, at the earliest possible date, and at any rate not later than June 1, 1953.

### GEOGRAPHY

A field course, Geography 450, Western Canada, Alaska, and Northwestern United States, will be offered by the Department of Geography. Students registering for credit must spend the first two weeks, June 15 to June 29, on the campus studying the areas to be visited. Following the classroom work, seven weeks, June 29 to August 16, will be spent on tour. Students may receive twelve quarter hours of residence credit, which may be counted as natural science. The course is open to juniors, seniors, and graduate students who have had a minimum of Geography 100 or the equivalent.

The exact cost of the course cannot be given. No estimate has been made of the cost of the two weeks to be spent on the campus. The cost of the trip has been set at \$375. This includes registration fee, bus transportation, lodging, insurance, study materials,

and regular tuition. It does not include meals, laundry service, side trips, etc. A deposit of \$50 is required for admittance to the class. The balance of \$325 is due not later than May 15. Students will be accepted in order of receipt of deposit.

In view of the fact that this trip will be somewhat strenuous only those in good physical health will be accepted. Students will be required to submit notes from their doctors stating that their health will permit them to make the trip.

Anyone interested in the tour should write Dr. Floyd F. Cunningham, Chairman of the Department of Geography and Geology.

## WORKSHOPS

### ART

The Art Department will offer an Art Education Workshop, Art 465, during the summer session. Students may receive from 2 to 8 quarter hours of credit.

The course is designed to provide theoretical and practical experiences in art as they are related to the problems of all levels of art education. The program will be so organized that each person participating in the workshop will have the opportunity to study with all members of the University Art Department staff, as well as several outstanding art educators from other institutions. The student may obtain a working knowledge of several art media such as weaving, pottery, metal, drawing, painting. These studio experiences under recognized authorities will be related to the psychology and philosophy of education through art. New and stimulating ideas connected with the problems of organizing an art program in schools, the relation to other areas of study through integration, and new methods will be examined

### EDUCATION

Two workshops, Education 441, Workshop in Teaching Elementary Science, and Education 462, Workshop in High School Curriculum, will be offered by the Department of Education. Authorities from outside the University are to be brought in to take part in workshop instruction.

These courses for teachers and administrators are scheduled during the regular summer session, and each may be completed in either two or four weeks. Persons who wish to take other classes in the mornings may take a workshop for four quarter hours of cre-

dit by attending afternoons for four weeks. Persons who wish to take only a workshop may take either one for four quarter hours of credit by attending both morning and afternoon for two weeks.

Education 441 will be offered from June 15 to June 27 or from June 15 to July 10. Education 462 will be offered from July 13 to July 24 or from July 13 to August 7.

## **SPECIAL INTEREST FEATURES**

### **MARRIAGE AND PARENTHOOD**

A course of practical interest to the married as well as the unmarried, Sociology 303, Marriage and Parenthood, will be offered by the Department of Sociology. This course deals with the social-psychology of dating, courtship, and family relationships. Its purpose is to show the student how to find the answers to his problems, rather than to give him all the answers. Enrollment in the course is limited to 35 students, on a "first come" basis.

For those who have immediate personal problems relating to courtship, engagement, or family relationships, Dr. Herman J. Lantz, an experienced family relations counselor, will be available for individual counseling. Appointments for conferences with Dr. Lantz can be made at the Student Affairs Office.

### **PERSONALITY AND SOCIAL ADJUSTMENT**

A course, Sociology 381, Personality and Social Adjustment, will be offered by the Department of Sociology to meet the needs of welfare workers employed by the Illinois Public Aid Commission. This course will meet for two and one-half hour periods on Friday afternoons and Saturday mornings. Workers in Southern Illinois will be given released time on Fridays and Saturdays to enable them to take this course. Enrollment will be limited to 35 students.

### **INDUSTRIAL PSYCHOLOGY CONFERENCE**

The Department of Psychology will offer a conference in industrial psychology with the theme "Problems in Industrial Supervision" during the summer session. Conference sessions will be held on the campus from 9 - 12 a.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, July 14, 15, 16, 21, 22, and 23.

Representatives from firms or organizations interested in improv-



ing employer-employee relationships are invited to attend this conference. Emphasis will be placed on promoting a better understanding of the individual worker in industry. Discussions will include such topics as "Better Methods of Supervision", "Reducing Absenteeism and Turnover", "Improving Attitudes and Morale", and "Increasing Production Efficiency".

## REGISTRATION PROCEDURE

During the present year this University has changed its student advisement and registration system. Instead of a central registration, there will be an advance registration period extending from April 13 to May 23. Students taking on-campus courses during the spring term must register during the advance registration period or be subject to late fee assessment.

Summer school students should make every effort to consult their academic advisers and register during the advance registration period. Otherwise, they might not be able to secure courses that are needed. Academic advisers will be available by appointment throughout the advance registration period. The Registration Center in Altgeld Hall (Old Science) will be open from 1 - 4 p.m., Monday through Friday and from 8:30 a.m. - 12 p.m. on Saturdays during that period. While students may be advised between the advance registration period and the opening of the summer session, they may not register after May 23 until June 15.

So that a student may know how to initiate his summer registration he should study the following information carefully.

A. If he is an undergraduate student

1. He must first contact the Office of Admissions to
  - a. Be admitted if he is a new student
  - b. Secure re-entry clearance if he has taken work at this University but did not do so during the 1952 summer session or the 1953 spring term.
  - c. Initiate re-admission permission if he has taken work at this University but was dropped at the end of his last attendance period.
2. He should first contact the Office of Student Affairs to be assigned an academic adviser if he attended the 1952 summer session but has not taken on-campus work subsequent thereto.
3. He should first contact his academic adviser if he attended the 1953 spring term.



- B. If he is a graduate student
1. He must first contact either the Office of Admissions or the Graduate School to be admitted if he is a new graduate student.
  2. He must first contact the Office of Admissions to secure re-entry clearance if he has taken graduate work at this University but did not do so during the 1952 summer session or the 1953 spring term.
  3. He should first contact the Graduate School if any of the above conditions do not apply to him.

## REGISTRATION SCHEDULE

- A. Advance Registration - April 13 to May 23. (Registration Center open 1 -4 p.m., Monday through Friday, and 8:30 a.m. - 12 p.m., Saturday.)
1. Students taking on-campus work during the spring term must register by May 23 or register on the first day of the summer session and be assessed late fee payment.
  2. Students not on-campus during the spring term are advised to register during this period if at all possible so as to assure enrollment in desired courses.
- B. Central Registration - June 15. (Registration Center open 8 a.m. - 4 p.m.)
1. Students who are unable to take advantage of the advance registration period should register on this day.
  2. Students taking on-campus work during the spring term may register, but will be assessed late fee payment.
  3. Students not taking on-campus work during the spring term may register without late fee payment.
- C. Late Registration - June 16 to June 22.
1. Students may register until June 22, but will be subject to late fee assessment.
  2. Students desiring to register after June 22 may do so only with permission of the Dean of their College.
  3. Students registering only for a night, or Saturday course may register on the first meeting date of the class without late fee payment.

## ACADEMIC LOAD, COURSE NUMBERS, AND CREDITS

The normal student load for the eight weeks' session is ten to twelve quarter hours. A student with special needs, by permission

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of the dean of his college or the Dean of the Graduate School, may take a maximum of fourteen quarter hours.

Each class period is seventy-five minutes in length. The schedule of periods for the summer follows.

Courses numbered 100-199 are primarily for freshmen; 200-299, for sophomores; 300-399, for juniors and seniors; 400-499, for seniors and graduates, and 500 and above, for graduates. A student may not take classes more than one year above or below his classification.

Students registering during the advance registration period will receive their Fee Address Cards by mail beginning May 4. This card will list the fee amount payable. After receipt of this card a student may pay his fees in person or by mail at the Bursar's Office. Failure to pay fees by May 29 will result in automatic cancellation of advance registration and the student will have to re-register on June 15.

Students registering on June 15, or after, will not receive their Fee Address Cards by mail but will pay fees at the time of registering.
